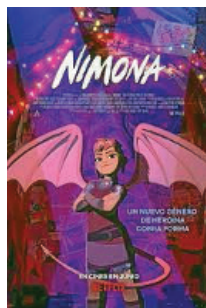
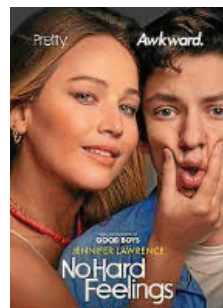

MRHD and Hard Rock named as RAGBRAI's main Sioux City sponsors

Missouri River Historical Development (MRHD) and Hard Rock Hotel & Casino - Sioux City has been named the main sponsors for the Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI) when it kicks off its 50th year in Sioux City.

Starting off in Sioux City on July 22, RAGBRAI will then take cyclists to Storm Lake, Carroll, Ames, Des Moines, Tama/Toledo and Coralville before ending in Davenport on July 29.

The event will welcome more than 25,000 riders, along with their support teams, representing all 50 states and countries from around the world.

A nonprofit agency dedicated to promoting Sioux City and Woodbury County through community grants, MRHD holds the license for gaming



in Woodbury County, generating funding through an agreement with Hard Rock Hotel & Casino - Sioux City, allowing the corporation to run its gaming operation in Woodbury County using MRHD's license.

"MRHD is thrilled to support the 50th anniversary of RAGBRAI and we're proud to share the sponsorship with our partners at the Hard Rock Hotel & Casino," said MRHD president Steve Huisenga.

This makes the eighth

time Sioux City has served as the starting point and an overnight town on the RAGBRAI route. When Sioux City last hosted in 2015, Hard Rock also played a role in the kickoff celebration.

Sioux City's RAGBRAI Expo - featuring food vendors and main stage entertainment - will be held in the Tyson Events Center and Long Lines Family Rec Center parking lots.

"The beauty of RAGBRAI is how riders connect with the community," Sioux City RAGBRAI chair Matt Salvador said. "We hope Sioux City's locals will join in the festivities downtown and throughout the city. As they do, they'll meet so many fun and interesting people who are genuinely excited to spend the week connecting with the people of Iowa."

SITP memories at 33

What started as a small summertime blues fest has become a community-wide event

Being the point man for Sioux City's premiere summertime music festival has its perks.

But Saturday in the Park co-founder Dave Bernstein said it isn't for the faint of heart.

"As each Saturday in the Park approaches, my anxiety seems to rise," he said on a sunny afternoon in Grandview Park. "Has everything been accounted for? Are we forgetting something important?"

Then, Bernstein remembers the advice a friend's mom once gave him.

"Instead of wasting away your life on the small details, she'd say, be thankful in all that's been accomplished."

Those words of wisdom have seen Bernstein through many of the past Saturdays in the Park.

The 33rd Saturday in the Park, beginning at noon Saturday, will be no different.

Featuring a lineup of musical A-Listers like Earth, Wind & Fire, The War and Treaty and Samantha Fish, the free, outdoor festival will likely bring out more than 25,000 people to Grandview Park's Bandshell.

That was exactly what Bernstein, who cofounded Saturday in the Park with childhood friend Adam Feiges, wanted to happen.

Why did you and Adam choose Grandview Park for Saturday in the Park and what was the significance of the Bandshell?

"I've always thought Grandview Park was such an untapped resource in the community. As a kid, I remembered going down the big hill on a sled every winter. I don't think the Bandshell was being utilized in any meaningful way. We wanted to raise the park's profile because it was such a gem."

What was the first SITP like?

"We had Clarence 'Gatemouth' Brown as a headliner, along with Blues Cartel and Buckwheat Zydeco as supporting acts. To separate

ourselves from other summer concert series, we billed ourselves as being a 'blues' festival, even though we didn't strictly book blues acts. Another thing that Adam and I did was to never refer to it as the first annual anything. If the first year turned out to be a disaster, we wouldn't be on the hook for year two. It would be one and done."

Yet, it seemed that SITP attracted positive word-of-mouth from the very start, right?

"That seemed to be the case. (Longtime Sioux City Convention Center, Tourism Bureau and Siouxland Sports Authority executive director) Denny Gann became a supporter early on and so were (Gateway cofounders) Norm and Ted Waitt. People seemed to understand what Saturday in the Park was and could be from the very beginning. Now, it is, very much, a community event where people plan family and school reunions to coincide with the festival. That says more about the countless number of committee members and volunteers who make SITP run. They've made what it is today."

Who have been your biggest SITP "gets" and who've been

"Certainly, I kick myself for not booking talented people who are no longer with us. Tom Petty and Stevie Ray Vaughan immediately come to mind. As I've gotten older, I'd stopped beating myself over whom

we haven't booked and marveling at the performers who've said yes to us. It still blows my mind that we got Aretha Franklin and Santana. I had no idea who AJR (a pop music trio consisting of Adam, Jack and Ryan Metzger) were when

they played SITP in 2021. As soon as they hit the stage at the Bandshell, AJR gave one of the best performances I've ever seen. And this year promises to be even bigger. When you look around, there aren't very many acts who've had the endurance of Earth, Wind and Fire. They could've been the headliners for the first Saturday in the Park. Instead, they're headlining the 33rd Saturday in the Park."

We bet by the time Earth, Wind and Fire finishes up, you'll be glad that Saturday in the Park is in the rearview mirror for another year, right?

"Well, it all goes back to what my friend's mom told me: Don't waste your life away. The anxieties that I feel toward Saturday in the Park isn't because I want it to be over. Instead, I can't wait for it to get here again. I love meeting with our board members and volunteers. They're as invested in SITP as I am and that's so important. The day after Saturday in the Park, I'll totally veg out. When I was younger, I'd get a bit depressed, post-SITP. I'd take a few weeks off before booking a small show in Okobojo or somewhere like that. You know, trying to stay in the swing of things. Nowadays, I can appreciate what the festival has become."

Spouse's media fame straining our marriage

Dear Annie: My spouse has become a viral social media sensation. They have been quite popular, and I recently learned of many “friendships” that have developed with members of the opposite sex. One in particular has become, and I quote, “the best friend I have ever had.”

The last year has been filled with many struggles on my end, and I fell into a very deep depression. My spouse chose to ignore this and reach out to these “friends.” They claim they are all platonic.

We have been trying to work on our marriage, but I am really hurt by this. I love this person with all of my heart and really want to make our marriage work. We have had some amazing heart-to-heart conversations recently, and I think they are starting to understand how badly I am hurting by the way they have behaved.

I just don't know if I can trust the words they say. My intuition says yes, but my head makes me cautious.

Social media is not positive for our marriage, but they won't give it up. Please help. I am already so heartbroken. — **Lonely and Sad**

Dear Lonely and Sad: Social media, or any online connection, doesn't hold a candle to the real heart-to-heart conversation you have had with your spouse. Continue to be open with your feelings and listen to your intuition. If the social media is part of your spouse's job, then asking them to give that up is not the solution either. The solution is to have personal boundaries on what your partner can and cannot allow on social media.

Talk about what you both feel comfortable with. Healthy communication and trust are

great muscles to work in a marriage, and your spouse's newfound social media fame is certainly giving you the opportunity to do just that. Best of luck to you. In addition, I would encourage you to seek the help of a professional therapist if you are suffering from depression. Try to surround yourself with friends and family when you are

feeling down.

Dear Annie: In recent columns, you have addressed the issue of helping a disabled child. I agree that we need to take care of ourselves before we can help others. In my own case, at age 66, I ended up having knee surgery after assisting my physically disabled son during an emergency. Because of that surgery, I am not as much help to my son as I used to be.

Every disabled person's condition is unique, and some disabilities are progressive, so things can get worse over time.

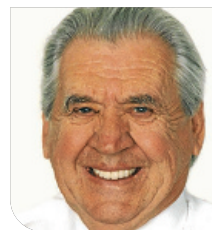
But what a parent does now can provide security for what comes later, especially after the child is an adult and the parent unable to help. One suggestion is to do research to find alternative caregiving sources, such as durable medical equipment (DME), transportation options, proper medical care and a permanent living place.

Do these things while you can afford them rather than waiting until they are absolutely necessary — because the child's illness has progressed so much. In a recent letter from the 63-year-old mother of a disabled daughter, I would suggest that, if possible, Mom pays off her car loan or home mortgage payment. Remodel her home for upcoming physical changes unique to her disease. Provide whatever DME she needs. Load up her bank accounts. Look to patient groups for specific disabilities as they have information, as well as medical staff, doctors and social workers.

Another mom, hopefully doing the best for her beautiful disabled son. — **Another Mom**

I'm not sure if either of you have college plans, but it's not impossible for you to both attend the same college someday.

Also, take note that your relationship was brief but sweet, and know that you'll be all the better for it. 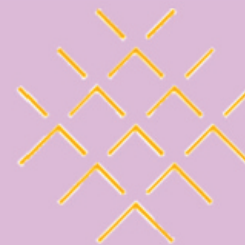
