# **Producer's Comments**

Who could have ever imagined that what happened was going to happen? A bit over 1 year ago we were cancelling SITP's 30{sup}th{/sup} anniversary festival. In 29 years we encountered many many challenges



but never once came remotely close to cancelling. I don't want to belabor this point, except to acknowledge that the last 18 months left all, or at least most of us

BERNSTEIN at least most of us with a completely new outlook on life, new perspective, and, at least for me, a significantly greater ap-

for me, a significantly greater appreciation for so many people and things I love, including just the ability to be able to present a festival like Saturday in the Park.

What did I miss the most about last year you might ask? Working with our committee. I have come to realize we have such an

amazing, close knit bond, just like a family, and going a year without being able to get in the trenches with everyone was really sad and I really missed it. That being said I know they were there every step of the way, from initial planning last spring to cancellation, and that brutal zoom press conference where so many committee members were online to hear the news for themselves, first hand, even though they all knew it was coming (one of the most gut wrenching moments of my life). It was a collective bummer for all of us, as so many cancellations were for everyone in our community, and the world, last year. We, after all, are a society that loves to connect, and gather at times in very large groups to hear really awesome music performed live (and for free), and to that end not experiencing that last year was really sad...but also will make our pending return that much sweeter.

The last year represented great

loss for so many of us. much unrelated to COVID. For me, knowing my friends Danny Hasha (who loved John Fogerty), Cherie Hansen and Paul Frank won't be able to attend SITP this year is incredibly sad. For our SITP family, not having Bob Cannon in the Volunteer tent flipping burgers or Curt St. Cvr performing at our 30th fest fills us with sorrow. We all experienced much loss over the past 18 months, on many different levels, and will be thinking of all who are no longer with us as we get back out there and do what they all loved so much...if nothing else we owe it to those not only who are gone, but those who worked so hard to keep us safe over the past 18 months to carry on so this year's fest is a tribute to them.

30 years is a long time. Much has changed but so much stays the same. Somehow we have survived as a festival. Upon reflection on the subject the main reason I can think of is community. Our


community cherishes SITP, and events and gatherings like it. Sure, it wouldn't have happened without the aid of many individuals. but without the support of our community it would not have survived. This starts with our committee of course, and our sponsors who "foot the bill" for this craziness yearly and keep it free. Free is no small point, and probably why we have endured, and without the sponsors that wouldn't happen. Our City government gives us great support as well and has since day one, when Joanne Grueskin and Judy Nicholls shepherded us through the innerworkings of City Hall. So many local businesses and individuals drop everything to help us, to volunteer, to lend a hand however they can. Without community we wouldn't have lasted 5 years, let alone 30/31.

So that brings us to this year. So much will be different. A new location for the amazing Abe Stage, a fenced off park with no beer gardens but instead one big one, a family friendly zone with no beer, two nights...lots of changes for an event coming off of a forced hiatus. John Fogerty was slated to perform last year and we are so grateful he hung with us and will close Saturday night. AJR will be amazing Friday, a fantastic group with an awesome young appeal that will keep us fresh and relevant by continuing to help us build a new fan base for SITP. And the Abe with its amazing line up of headliners as well help keep us more relevant today than we were 30 years ago.

This year's "theme" at SITP will be RESPECT. Many months ago we announced a number of safeguards we were going to implement to be able to produce a festival this year and still be respectful of the need to protect public health and respect the incredibly hard work of our communities' public health officials. We have continued to evolve those safeguards, but still request the utmost respect for all involved, starting with our planning committee and producers of the festival this year. We have strived to strike a balance that works for as many as possible, realizing it won't work for everyone. Whether



# Legal Stuff

1. NO GUNS, NO FIREWORKS, NO WEAPONS OR FIREARMS ALLOWED (EVEN WITH A LICENSE TO CARRY OR A CONCEAL CARRY PERMIT). A City of Sioux City ordinance prohibits both inside city parks, and we prohibit them at this festival event.

2. COVID-19. DUE TO FEDERAL REOUIREMENTS. YOU MUST WEAR A MASK ON THE SHUTTLE BUS. NO EXCEPTIONS.

At the festival itself, if you have received a COVID-19 vaccine, you do not need to wear a mask. You are welcome to wear a mask and social distance if you feel more comfortable. If you have not been vaccinated, we recommend that you wear a mask and social distance per CDC recommendations. If you have tested positive for coronavirus recently, please do NOT attend the festival.

3. No PETS allowed at the festival except for as needed for disability purposes WITH CREDENTIALS.

The large crowds and heat that we frequently have at the festival are not good for your pet, who might suffer from heat stress or even get stepped on at the festival (that's not mentioning the stuff your pet may leave behind for others to sit on). If you leave your TV set tuned to Animal Planet and plenty of animal beverages around, your pets should do fine on their own. Of course, with any adult doggie beverages, make sure that your dog is at least 3 years old (21 in dog years). "RIVER MON-STERS" MUST BE LEFT IN THE MIS-SOURI RIVER.

4. No COOLERS except for health issues such as diabetics and gluten free conditions. ALL BAGS SUBJECT TO SEARCH AT ENTRANCE GATES.

Coolers simply take up too much valuable sitting space at Saturday in the Park, not to mention the negative impact they have on beverage and food sales that are needed to help keep this event FREE each year. Plus, we often end up picking up stray coolers Sunday morning. Please leave your own beverages at home

5. SATURDAY IN THE PARK IS NOT **RESPONSIBLE FOR LOST OR STO-**I FN ITFMS.

You should turn your lost people and lost personal possessions in at the Information Booth. Although we're told the Info Booth has a person who is able to figure out the owner's phone number for practically any cell phone, we cannot guarantee your lost phone (or any other item) will be returned to you. We can only guarantee that we might IT. find one and use it to call or text your girlfriend or boyfriend.

## 6. ALL BAGS SUBJECT TO SEARCH.

6A. CLEAR BAGS REQUESTED.

7. NO SMOKING IN DESIGNATED AREAS – especially in the seating areas close to the Bandshell. If we see any smoke coming from you, we will assume that you are on fire and promptly put you out!

8. PARENTS SHOULD BE RESPON-SIBLE FOR THEIR OWN CHILDREN. Please keep track of your kids. If for some reason you lose track of




# FACE TO FACE - 9 P.M. (FRIDAY HEADLINER)



ehorlyk@siouxcityjournal.com roy Andrews was five minutes late for his phone interview because he had to help his mom get shopping bags from the car.

"You see, my mom's been living with me for a while," he said as the ping of an opened door was was born into a family business heard in the background. "In fact, this has been the longest stretch I've been home in New Orleans since I graduated from high school and before I went on tour with Lenny Kravitz's band."

You see. Andrews is better known as Trombone Shorty, a Crescent City-based performer who will be going on right before headliner John Fogerty on July 3 at the Main Stage for Saturday in the Park (SITP).

He is already an SITP veteran,

having performed at the event with Orleans Avenue back in 2017.

To be fair. Andrews can also be considered a veteran musician since he's been making music in the Big Easy for nearly 30 of his 35 years.

Some might say that Andrews when he took up his signature trombone. This is because his older brother James is a wellknown bandleader and any number of honorary uncles, aunts and cousins were in the music business.

Even his mom would be plaving the music of Aretha Franklin. Rav Charles and Prince all the time.

"When you live in New Orleans, music is a part of who you are," Andrews said.

This was especially for

Andrews, who grew up in Treme, which is widely considered to be Ground Zero for New Orleans' African-American street music culture.

"I was always that little kid who would be playing music and dancing, pretending I was much older, during all of the second line (street) parades," he said.

Apparently, Andrews was hard to miss. His talent and insatiable interest in jazz history set him apart.


It also allowed him the opportunity to study at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOC-CA), a prestigious arts high school whose alumni include everybody from Jon Batiste to Harry Connick Ir. as well as at least four members of the musical Marsalis family.

"At NOCCA, it felt like I was living a parallel life," Andrews explained. "My jazz classmates couldn't understand why I like rock and rap. My friends from the neighborhood couldn't understand why I was getting bogged down into all of this technical stuff.

"I knew people who rely only on natural ability can only go so far," he said. "You need to have that technical training to take you to the next level."

However, too much technique isn't good either.

"I remember my first school concert and the audience was just listening and not on their feet," Andrews said. "It was weird."

Yet it was this versatility that allowed him to subsequently play with everybody from Prince to Dierks Bentley. Andrews has even branched into children's literature. He is the author of "Trombone Shorty" (2015) as well as "The 5 O'Clock Band" (2018), with illustrations by Bryan Collier.

Despite that, his heart remains with the music of New Orleans.

"There is no one sound for New Orleans music," Andrews said. "It takes from a little of this and little of that. Taken all together, it becomes a big pot of gumbo."

Still, he can't wait to get back on the road.

"I love New Orleans but I miss that spiritual connection a musician makes with an audience when he plays a live set," Andrews said. "I miss that energy and I miss the smiles."


Andrews let out a chuck-le.

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# Inspired by a wide variety of artists, WizTheMc is taking hip-hop to a new level

ehorlyk@siouxcityjournal.com It wasn't that long ago when WizTheMc would freestyle rap in the shower before heading off to high school.

A Cape Town, South Africa, native who was raised in Germany before moving to Toronto, Canada, the now-22-year-old literally learned how to rap by watching YouTube tutorials.

"I love music," Wiz explained. "For a short time, I'd picture myself being a director, shooting music videos for other people. Then, I couldn't picture anybody else in the videos other than myself."

Indeed, it became Wiz's mission to make it in the music business.

"There was never a Plan B," he said with confidence.

With hit singles like "The One," "For a Minute" and "All My Friends Are Stoned," Wiz is clearly on his way.

In fact, he'll be on the Grandview Park Bandshell Main Stage at Saturday in the Park on July 2, opening for headliners AJR.

But Wiz's rap is different than other hiphop artists.

Inspired by artists as diverse as The Beatles and Queen, his sound is decidedly old school and new school at the same time.

"If you had to define my sound, it would be sort of a new school Red Hot Chili Peppers," Wiz explained. "Like their music, my songs have a melody, plus I'm singing while I'm rapping."

He said his sound continues to evolve.

"The rap that I first got into was super masculine," Wiz said. "Now, I feel comfortable enough to write powerful songs about love and heartbreak while staying authentic."

Taken even further, he said music allows him to create a whole new world with a sound that is infectious as it is accessible.

However, Wiz's world is currently a bit chaotic.

In Los Angeles for the first time in his life, Wiz said his days revolve around rehearsals and networking with music industry professionals.

"That's a bit different," Wiz admitted. "I'm not quite anonymous anymore and can't hang out with my friends. It is pretty much music all the time right now."

When he does have free time, Wiz is keeping fit by playing basketball or doing


**The price is right.** Buy 5 tickets for \$25. Individual tickets cost \$6.

All beers will be sold as packaged beers (cans). Brands available will be Budweiser, Bud Light, Busch Light, Michelob Ultra, Bud Light Seltzer Mango, Bud Light Seltzer Black Cherry, Goose Lemon Shandy, Goose IPA, Golden Road Mango Cart. Ready to drink Liquor - (Cutwater) Tequila Margarita 13% ABV, Tequila Mango Margarita 13% ABV, Vodka Soda Lime 5% ABV, Vodka Mule 7% ABV, Rum & Cola 7% ABV. Local offerings will also be available from Sioux City's local brew pubs.

# Lessons from a 'Fortunate Son' JOHN FOGERTY ON BEING A ROCK AND ROLL REBEL AT AGE 76

ehorlyk@siouxcityjournal.com When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, rock legend John Fogerty was in the midst of a "John Fogerty: My 50 Year Trip" concert tour.

As concert venues closed down around the world, the 76-year-old Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee was forced to end the tour that commemorated the golden anniversary of the breakout year for Creedence Clearwater Revival (CCR).

In 1969, CCR – which Fogerty helped to found – appeared at Woodstock while releasing such seminal "swamp rock" hits as "Bad Moon Rising," "Born on the Bayou" and "Proud Mary."

Fogerty left CCR just two years later in order to begin a successful solo career.

With the coronavirus now on the wane, Fogerty is finally ready to hit the road again, and Saturday in the Park (SITP) will be among his first post-COVID gigs.

"I'm not comfortable in a football stadium yet, but the (Grandview Park) Bandshell will be perfect," he said a few weeks prior to his date as the SITP July 3rd headliner. "I'm really looking forward to it."


BORN ON A BAYOU ... BY WAY OF EL CERRITO, CALIFORNIA After all, Fogerty has been a rock and

roller since junior high school.

"I started playing in bands in junior high as well as in high school," he said. "Like everybody else in the early 1960s, I was influenced by guys like Little Richard, Bo Diddley and Jerry Lee Lewis, who were the forefathers of rock and roll."

Eventually, Fogerty formed a band called the Blue Velvets, which subsequently became the Golliwogs.

Drafted into military service during the Vietnam War in 1966, he began a two-year stint with the United States Army Service.

Following his service, Fogerty rejoined the Golliwogs, which would soon be renamed Creedence Clearwater Revival.

"I've always had a theory that bands begin by emulating the musicians they admire," he explained. "Just like me, (The Beatles') John Lennon and Paul McCartney were influenced by people like Little Richard. As they became more established, they began writing innocent songs like 'I Wanna Hold Your Hand' before writing edgier, confident material.

"I matured a lot and grew confident in my songwriting after I was discharged from the service," Fogerty said. "That was when I hit a creative peak by writing 'Born on the Bayou' and 'Proud Mary!"

Which reminds us: how could a guy who was born in Berkeley, California, and raised in El Cerrito, California, write such southern roots-y soul classics?

"Don't know? Maybe I was feeling swampy at the time," Fogerty said with a chuckle.

#### FINALLY BACK IN 'CENTERFIELD'


After leaving CCR, Fogerty struggled to find his way as a solo artist. With his foot squarely in the genre of roots rock and blue-eyed soul, he saw the music world turn to a dance music known as disco.

"I'm not a fan of disco," he said in no uncertain terms. "I wasn't upset when it died."

Fogerty's fortunes changed with his 1985 album "Centerfield," which yielded a bestselling title track in addition to "The Old Man Down the Road," another top ten hit.

By then, Fogerty's musical acumen – as well as his fashion sense – began to inspire a younger generation of rockers.

"I didn't know it at the time but (Nirvana's) Kurt Cobain was a fan of mine," Fogerty said. "My wardrobe of plaid, flannel shirts was about as un-rock-star-like as you can get. When Cobain came out in similar clothes, he was influenced by me."

Performers were also drawn to his lyrics, which have always been poignant and raw.

Just as raw was Fogerty's 2015 autobiography, "Fortunate Son," which was hard on former cohorts, record labels and, especially, himself.

"When you write songs or a book, don't be afraid to show your scars," he said. "Don't hide it by bandaging it up. Those scars come from life."

Indeed, performing has allowed Fogerty to showcase his life spent, scars and all.

That is, until COVID-19 hit and the music stopped for a while.

### A PERFECT, PANDEMIC-INSPIRED PROJECT

During lockdown, Fogerty's wife suggested that he do classic cover songs for an album that would be called "Fogerty's Factory," a nod toward CCR's 1970 classic "Cosmo's Factory."

Further more, Julie Fogerty wanted the album to be recorded at the couple's home, and use sons Shane and Tyler as well as daughter Kelsy as fellow musicians. "In the back of my mind, I was wondering if we could pull it off," Fogerty said. "The kids sounded great and I'm pleased with the result."

To be fair, it's hard to go wrong with an album full of iconic, Fogerty-penned tunes like "Down on the Corner," "Have You Ever Seen the Rain" and "Long As I Can See the Light," right?

"There's a part of me who wonders, am I a good songwriter or did I get lucky?" he said "Songwriting is a process and a lot of my first ideas weren't good ideas. I just kept working and reworking on songs until I got it to where I wanted it to be.

"On the other hand, some songwriters can write a hit song in 15 minutes," Fogerty noted. "Who's a better songwriter: them or me?"

It's surprising for an artist of Fogerty's caliber to express self-doubt. But music still matters to him.

Plus he's in no hurry to retire.

"I'll retire when I can't perform the way I want to perform," Fogerty said. "This time hasn't come yet."

With the release of "Fogerty's Factory" last year, he now has 10 solo albums to his credit. And he's considering going back into the recording studio again.

"It used to be a sign of rebellion for a young person to make a rock and roll record," Fogerty said. "I'm beginning to rethink that. It's not hard for a 26-yearold to release an album. When you're a 76-year-old who is releasing an album? Now, that's being a rebel."

sjackson@siouxcityjournal.com GhostCat has come a long way since they formed nearly eight years ago, going from small, local gigs, to performing on the Main Stage at Saturday in the Park.

After playing the Abe Stage twice before, the band will be making its Main Stage debut.

On Friday, July 2, they will open at 5 p.m., followed by hip-hop artist WizTheMc, with the Main Stage headliner, indie-pop trio AJR, closing for the night. GhostCat, fronted by vocalist and guitarist Alex Erwin, has continued to gain a local following over the years as they play bigger live shows.

On June 11, they played their biggest one yet at the Sioux City Hard Rock Hotel & Casino, opening for the alt-rock band Everclear in front of a sold-out crowd.

But Saturday in the Park will be a step above that as far as excitement for the band.

"Most of us growing up here or around here know how huge Saturday in the Park has always been," Erwin said. "And its tradition, how many people turn out, and the legends that have been on that main stage."

And after a year of limited live shows and having to focus more on songwriting, being able to perform in front of full audiences again has to add to the excite ment.

"We definitely focused more on songwriting since shows were kind of limited," Erwin said.

"We've been wanting this for a

long time," he added. "And when we found out, we were pretty excited."

GhostCat released their first studio album, "Useless Fairy-Tales," in 2014, and have since released two more studio albums, two demos and the 2019 single "Lasers." The band currently consists of bassist Cody Garwood; his twin brother, keyboardist Josh Garwood; guitarist Josh Lee; drummer Steve Skog; and Erwin.

Their music is described as

alternative/indie rock, but they are not limited to one sound. Erwin has said in the past that the band has a lot of varied sounds.

Some bands that have influenced Erwin in his songwriting have been the Beatles, Radiohead and the Strokes. He said that he likes alternative and indie rock because of how simple and relatable it is.

"I try to write things for myself that I'll enjoy but also that people will feel connected to and enjoy easily," Erwin said.

"When you're young especially, you're trying to figure out who you are and you want to do," he added.

Before forming GhostCat, Erwin started playing music in eighth grade and has been in numerous bands throughout high school and in college at Iowa State.

"I'm proud of GhostCat and where we are," Erwin said. "Of all the projects I've been involved with, this is definitely my favorite."

Erwin has been thankful for the journey he and GhostCat has been on thus far and is excited for the band to keep growing and making music together.

After Saturday in the Park, what's next for GhostCat? Erwin said that the band is writing and recording new material and they will continue to play big live shows.

"Just really try to hone in on the energy and momentum we've created and not slow down," he said.

### Veteran drummer Seraphine brings CTA to SITP

ehorlyk@siouxcityjoranl.com For the first time in 30 years, it is likely that Saturday in the Park (SITP) concertgoers will actually hear "Saturday in the Park," played by one of the song's originators.

That's because Danny Seraphine, one of the co-founders of the pioneering jazz-rock band Chicago, will be on Grandview Park's Main Stage on July 3.

The veteran drummer – and actual Chicago native – will be joined by California Transit Authority (CTA), a band he's helmed since 2006.

"Audiences know me best from Chicago," said Seraphine, a 23-year member of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame-inducted group. "They'd be disappointed if I didn't play Chicago tunes and that includes 'Saturday in the Park.'

"I'll never disappoint the fans," he added.

Indeed, the 72-year-old Seraphine is still very much a showman.

Growing up in the Windy City's

northwest side, he began playing drums at age 9 while attending St. Priscilla Catholic Grade School.

Enamored by such hardcore drummers as Gene Krupa and Buddy Rich, Seraphine set out to emulate their frenetic playing style.

"Now, those guys were crazy aggressive on their drums," he said, chuckling at the memory. "That's why I wanted to be crazy aggressive."

The ambitious Seraphine was also inspired by rock and roll drummers like The Beatles' Ringo Star in addition to the big band drummer Chuck Flores and the jazz drummer Papa Jo Jones.

This diverse background helped Seraphine when he and a handful of his friends started a band that described itself as "a rock and roll band with horns" in the late 1960s.

Originally called Chicago Transit Authority, the group subsequently shortened its name to Chicago as a way to avoid confusion – and a lawsuit – with the mass transit provider in Illinois' largest city.

Seraphine parted ways with Chicago in 1990, retiring from the music

scene for more than 15 years.

"I burned out from touring," he said. "I said I'd only get back into music if I began to miss music. Took me a while to figure it out but, yeah, I missed it. That's when CTA was born."

Teaming up with veteran guitarist Marc Bonilla and keyboardist Ed Roth, Seraphine subsequently added vocalists Tony Grant and Travis Davis into the mix.

"We used to say CTA is Chicago on steroids," Seraphine said. "That's pretty much what it is."

It certainly is whenever Seraphine plays an extended drum solo.

"I don't always do drum solos but when I'm inspired, I'll do one," he said. "In a live setting, there is something really exciting about the drums that gets to you."

In fact, Seraphine said playing the drums is a real workout for him.

"I compare it to going to a health club," he said. "I still belong to a health club but the drums keep me in shape."

Off stage, Seraphine is actually a bit of a sportsman, going fly fishing and playing golf during his leisure time.

Having said that, he continues to love performing.

"I play what I love to play," Seraphine said. "Nothing can be better than that."

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# **Ultra Violet Fever living their musical dream**

The band will be making its Saturday in the Park debut on Saturday, July 3, as the opening Main Stage act preceding Valerie June and Trombone Shorty.

In June 2019, they released a limited edition vinyl record, "Epimedium Sagittatum," with Las Vegas drummer Carl Collison.

Already a local musician for quite a few years, Lambrecht started Ultra Violet Fever with her friend Velvet Adams in 2015. Around that time, they met Blomberg and Kolbo at a Vangarde Arts show.

"When Velvet decided to start a new journey in a different state, Shawn and Adrian were like 'hey we should just join forces and keep Ultra Violet Fever going;" Lambrecht said.

And by the end of the next year, Wood had also joined the band.

When Ultra Violet Fever isn't playing local or regional gigs, Lambrecht and Blomberg tour together as a duo with their trusty dog and PR manager Zephyr.

Lambrecht and Blomberg both thrive on the gypsy lifestyle, traveling the country and living in their RV while on the road.

"I love traveling, I love experiencing new places, new surroundings, new environments," Lambrecht said. "And music has been a total way to be able to do that.

"It's a really phenomenal experience that I think everybody needs to embark on at some point in their life," she added.

So what's next for Ultra Violet Fever? After Saturday in the Park, Lambrecht said that the band will play a show at Blackbird Bend Casino, opening up for the country/pop crossover band Exile.

"I just have a really good feeling that we're just going to continue to grow, and continue to evolve," she said.







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
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


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# Mural art

### Well-known Siouxland movers and shakers to be immortalized in new exhibit

Weapons of mass destruction? What about weapons of mass *construction*?

That's been a guiding principle behind Tim Kerr's art as well as in life.

A native Texan, Kerr has been a part of such seminal hardcore punk and post-punk bands as Big Boys, Poison 13, and Bad Mutha Goose and the Brothers Grimm.

When he wasn't making music, the 65-year-old was creating art on album covers, posters, skateboards and, increasingly, in galleries across the country and around the world.

A large selection of Kerr's art will be on display during an exhibit at the Sioux City Conservatory of Music's The Block Gallery, 1307 Pierce St., which opens at 6 p.m. July 1.

The Sioux City-based indie band GhostCat is slated to perform and Kerr will officially unveil a large mural called, what else?, "Weapons of Mass Construction," that will highlight individuals who've made a difference in Siouxland.

"Art can change hearts and art can change minds," Kerr said.

Kerr should know. He's been making socially aware art ever since he took home first place honor at a fire prevention contest when he was in elementary school.

Sioux City Conservatory of Music cofounder – and original member of the legendary punk group T.S.O.L – Ron Emory befriended Kerr nearly 40 years ago.

"Tim and I bonded over punk rock, skateboarding and surfing," Emory said.


The two men also bonded over art.

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# **Tennessee spirit**

### Singer-songwriter Valerie June is a breath of fresh air any month of the year

ehorlyk@siouxcityjournal.com The first post-pandemic live performance of critically acclaimed singer-songwriter Valerie June will be at a "Black Women Breaking Ground" concert at Washington, D.C.'s Kennedy Center, alongside such iconic artists as Estelle and Angelique Kidjo.

Her second public appearance will be on Saturday in the Park's Main Stage on July 3.

Which performance is June most jazzed about? Maybe SITP.

"You mean there will be fireworks!" she exclaimed during a phone interview. "I love fireworks! I don't like setting them off myself but I love watching them in the night sky!"

A Tennessee-born singer, songwriter and multi-instrumentalist, June has built up a devoted following of music fans, which encompasses a mix of blues, country, gospel, soul and bluegrass.

Or as she described it, "organic moonshine music."

"Not every song has to fit into a certain genre," June said. "Yet, they all have lives and feelings and dreams and desire. As a singer, I get to interpret what those songs mean and allow it to get into my headspace."

And as they get into her headspace, music has the ability to become little spells.

"I've always been a fan of

(singer) Esperanza Spalding and she does a song that I love called '12 Little Spells,'" June said. "People don't realize there is a whole lot of magic and a whole lot of spirituality involved in music. We can't physically see it but we can all experience it."

With six albums under her belt (including this year's "The Moon and Stars: Prescription for Dreamers"), June has had many people come under spells for years now.

She's even released a book of poetry, "Maps for the Modern World," under her full name of Valerie June Hockett.

When it comes to poetry, June says she is inspired by the great Lebanese-American writer, poet, philosopher and visual artist Kahlil Gibran ("The Prophet").

credits her dad, a construction company owner and a part-time promoter, for introducing her to gospel singers as well as performers like Prince, Bobby Womack, and K-Ci & Jo-Jo.

"Music has the power to change minds and to change lives," June said. "You can't listen to Sam Cooke's 'A Change is Gonna Come' and not be moved by it."

Yet June credited her mom for keeping her grounded.

"My mom can sing, paint, cook, sew and do everything else well," she said. "Mom is truly a superwoman."

Indeed, June has spent much of the pandemic with her mom in Tennessee.

"Tennessee has everything But when it comes to music, she when it comes to music," she said. "Country, gospel, the blues, soul, we have it all."

Plus the state reportedly has plenty of record stores and June admitted she's addicted to vintage vinyl. Her last big splurge included purchases of records by everybody from Dolly Parton to Johnny Cash to the Kinks.

Though she said big stacks of records aren't always conducive with "the suitcase world" of a performer.

"That's been the biggest, unexpected pluses of the pandemic," June said. "I'm a bit of a home-

that forgiving someone who's wronged vou is the healthy, constructive thing to do - and, sure, it can be. Evolutionary social psychologist Michael McCullough defines forgiveness as "an internal process of getting over your ill will for an offender." He explains that forgiveness is "adaptive" - functional, beneficial - when there's a valuable relationship at stake: continuing contact with the perp (and it seems unlikely they'll be a repeat offender – harm you again in a similar way).

But you aren't looking

to re-up with the guy! And you probably have zero indication he's changed anything aside from which woman he's two-timing (or, uh, 22-timing, as a rough quarterly estimate). What you're really seeking is peace of mind. Consider that anger, like forgiveness, can be functional. The anger you still have probably remains for a reason: a warning sign that you're in danger of being cheated on again. But there's a way to shut off that alert – and protect yourself in the future and it's by turning this into a learning experience.

Be accountable for the part you played in what happened – not because, "Yay, blame the victim!" - but because it's the part you can control. Did you, perhaps, want so badly to

believe you'd found love that you ignored signs vou'd landed a cheating creep posing as an adoring bovfriend? Being honest about what you could and should – have done differently can become vour guide for what you *will* do differently the next guv around. A man can give you the sense he has a moral compass, but it's best vou give it a hard look to see it isn't cracked and dusty from constantly being dropped in other women's bedrooms.

**GLUED-IN ALLERGY** 

I've been dating a guy for three months, and I'd like us to be exclusive, but I don't know how to go about addressing it. I'm worried that if I say I need him to commit. he'll feel pressured and bolt. -Quandary
