Early-blooming spring flowers

The arrival of spring is a welcome occurrence for many people. Budding flowers are among the harbingers of spring. Spring flowers can revitalize winter-weary people just when they need it most — and provide reassurance that brighter, warmer and longer hours of sunlight are just around the corner.

Cold-tolerant flowers are hardy enough to start blooming before the last frosts have dissipated. Other flowers will begin to fill in as days warm a little bit more, according to Better Homes and Gardens. Home gardeners looking to warm up their gardens with early blooms can use these flowers in their early-season containers, window boxes and planting beds.

- **PANSY:** Pansies prefer cool weather, which can make them one of the best flowers to plant in early spring and late fall. Pansies come in a variety of colors, so there's bound to be an offering that will blend with any homeowners' landscape design.
- **CREEPING PHLOX:** Also known "moss phlox," creeping phlox is a short ground-cover that is a herbaceous perennial. Phlox produces small, fragrant flowers in dense clusters, which can attract wildlife, such as butterflies, to their mats across the soil surface.
- **SNOWDROPS:** Snowdrops can peek out even when there is snow still on the ground — sometimes as early as January and February. But their name is actually a reference to their appearance, as snowdrops have three white petals that hang down like drops dripping off the stem.
- **VIOLETS:** These flowers are closely related to pansies and, as a result, prefer cool seasons. Violets are generally slightly smaller than pansy blooms, but they can be just as beautiful. But as with pansies, violets will start to fade when the heat arrives.
- **CROCUS:** Crocus plants are relatively small, only reaching three to six inches in height. However, their grass-like leaves are some of the first sprouts that can be seen among bulb and corm plantings. Preferring full to partial sun, these gold, purple, lavender,

white, or yellow flowers can be enjoyed during the earliest days of spring.

- **DAFFODIL:** Daffodil bulbs produce cheerful, yellow flowers in early spring. They're one of the most recognizable flowers thanks to their

familiar shape and fragrant aroma.

- **LENTEN ROSE:** Hellebores, also called the Lenten rose or Christmas rose, can tolerate light frosts. These blooms get their name from the time of year when they bloom, which is typically around the Christian Lenten season. Despite their name, these delicate flowers are not actually related to roses, however.

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Conneaut’s Applebee to attend Siena Heights for school, football

John Applebee decided he wanted to continue playing football at the college level. He went on a search for the right fit in both academics and on the gridiron and in the end, Siena Heights won out. “When I got on campus, I felt comfortable,” the Conneaut senior said of the NAIA school located in Adrian, Michigan. Applebee, voted the county lineman of the year the last two seasons, also looked at Wooster, Allegheny, Rochester and Kentucky Christian. He said he wants to study

education-chemistry. “I think it’s a great decision to give college football a shot,” Spartans coach Rocco Dobran said. “He really loved the game and all that went in to it his senior year. I also think he went through the process the correct way. “He visited several colleges that he was interested in playing football at and talked to several coaches before making his decision. I feel his decision was well thought out and will be a good fit for him.” Applebee, who will play on the offensive line, will join a Siena Heights program that started in 2011 as a club team, finishing 8-1.

The Saints were 6-4, 5-5 or 4-6 from 2012-2017, before securing a 7-3 mark last season. It was the first seven-win season in program history. Siena Heights also recorded its first 5-0 start as a program and finished as high as 20th in the NAIA Football Coaches’ Top 25 poll in the 2018 season. “It will be fun to play in college,” said Applebee, who is listed at 6-foot, 280 pounds. “My life will be more structured because of football.” Siena Heights joined the Mid-States Football As-

The ‘right decision’

Indians’ Bauer pulled in seventh, no-hitter denied

CLEVELAND — Trevor Bauer never backs down from any challenge or debate. He accepted this call. Health mattered more than history. Bauer was pulled by manager Terry Francona after seven hitless innings and 117 pitches, and sat in the dugout watching as Toronto’s Freddy Galvis broke up Cleveland’s bid for a combined no-hitter with a leadoff single in the

ninth inning of the Indians’ 4-1 win Thursday night. Bauer was attempting to throw Cleveland’s first no-hitter in 38 years — on the 25th anniversary of Progressive Field’s opening — but was taken out when his pitch count climbed too high for Francona. Bauer understood the move. “It was the right decision,” he said. Once Bauer was out, Jon Edwards came in and got two outs before closer Brad Hand

worked out of a bases-loaded jam. Hand, however, gave up a hard single to center by Galvis. Moments later, Alen Hansen followed with Toronto’s second hit and the Blue Jays scored before Hand struck out two for his third save. Bauer (1-0) was six outs away from completing his no-hitter, when Francona removed him as a precautionary measure. The right-hander may have been able to go farther — he threw a career-high 127 pitches last

season — but on a chilly night and with so much season left, Francona played it cautiously. “I didn’t want to take him out,” Francona said. “He said he knew it was the right thing. I told him I hate it. He goes, ‘I hate it, too, but I know it’s the right thing.’ I care too much about him and this organization to hurt somebody. I would have loved to have seen it because I don’t doubt that he would

Lakers’ Lonzo Ball sues Big Baller co-founder

LOS ANGELES — Los Angeles Lakers point guard Lonzo Ball and his company Big Baller Brand are suing co-founder Alan Foster, alleging he conspired to steal millions of dollars from the shoe and clothing line. Foster concocted “a fraudulent scheme” to enrich himself with company money and also buy property in Ethiopia, according to the lawsuit filed Tuesday in Los Angeles Superior Court. It seeks more than \$2 million in damages. A number for Foster and information about his attorneys could not be found Wednesday. Foster mishandled tax filings and failed to distribute profits to Ball, the complaint alleges. Ball, who owns 51% of Big Baller Brand, has removed Foster as a manager of the company. The lawsuit accuses Foster of making unexplained cash withdrawals totaling at least \$1.5 million between 2016 and 2018. The suit says when confronted, Foster was unable to account for the missing funds and threatened “to publicly disseminate false

Studrawa rebuilds Ohio State’s offensive line

COLUMBUS — Standing at the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains, in the shadow of the Rose Bowl, Greg Studrawa didn’t conceal his interest in the Bowling Green head-coaching job. The Fostoria native, who played for the Falcons and then coached at his alma mater, discussed interviewing for his dream job — and being turned down.

Bowling Green hired Boston College offensive coordinator Scot Loeffler. At the same time, Urban Meyer announced his retirement, leaving Studrawa’s future in limbo. As Studrawa, a mountain of a man with a gravelly voice and teddy bear exterior, spoke two days before the Rose Bowl, his desire was obvious. “You hope that you’ve done a good enough job and you’ve got the proof in the

pudding that the guy wants you on his staff,” Studrawa said. On Jan. 14, reports indicated Ryan Day would retain the offensive line coach. Nine days later, it became official. “When you look at not only being an Ohio guy, but what he’s done with the line-men, not only here but where he’s been before, I don’t think — if there has I’d like to know who

UConn, Notre Dame set to renew their rivalry at Final Four

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — There’s a different vibe around Geno Auriemma and his UConn Huskies at this year’s Final Four. Unlike the previous two years, they don’t have the burden of a record winning streak or an unbeaten season.

One thing is familiar for the Huskies, however: They have to beat rival Notre Dame to reach the championship game. Heading into their showdown with rival Irish tonight, the

Huskies have already lost two games this season and don’t have as Auriemma put it “the fear of losing” this year.

“Our players have already experienced something different than they’ve experienced the other couple years,” he said. “Any other team in America, they lose the game, it’s in the newspaper tomorrow, probably on page 4, or can’t find it on dot-com anywhere. We lose a game, it’s at Baylor, it’s on the CBS Evening News. Our kids have experienced that dramatic feeling of, Oh, my God, we lost. ... I think there’s this sense coming out here this year, What’s the big deal?”

Auriemma said the experience has made his squad stronger mentally.

“For the first time, I can honestly say in a long time, in the UCLA, second half, and the Louisville game, I was coaching a Connecticut team that wasn’t burdened by afraid to lose and was playing to win,” he said.

Besides the losses, UConn had to rally a few times to pull out victories.

“We’ve had more close games this year than we have in all my years combined,” UConn senior Napheesa Collier said. “Again, that experience really does help you because you’re not in that position for the first time on the biggest stage in the biggest game. We know if we get in those positions, we know what to do in order to bring ourselves out of

whatever is going on, to stay calm, kind of just trust in ourselves and know we’ve been here before, there’s no reason to, like, panic.”

The Huskies will have to figure out a way to beat the defending champion Irish. UConn and Notre Dame have played six times in the Final Four or national championship game since 2011. They have split the six meetings with the Irish going 3-1 in the semifinals.

“I think it’s very competitive and intense. I think it is the best rivalry in women’s college basketball,” Notre Dame coach Muffet McGraw said. “I think it’s one the fans and teams all look forward to.”

Baylor will play Oregon in the first game of the Final Four. Here are some other things to know about the game:

TIP-INS

Katie Lou Samuelson and Collier have combined for 4,708 points which is the highest combo for a pair of classmates in school history. ... The starting five for Notre Dame has combined to score over 10,070 points that is No. 1 in the history of men’s and women’s basketball. ... This is the 50th meeting between the schools and UConn holds a 37-12 lead in the all-time series.

SHE’S BACK

sociation in 2012. Schools are located in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan and Missouri.

After a grueling Conneaut 2018 season, Applebee wasn’t sure what his future held, then assistant coach Aaron Joslin said something to him.

“He said, ‘If I’m thinking about playing in the spring, then I’ll probably end up playing,’” Applebee said.

Applebee made his visits throughout the winter, continued to work out and decided on Siena Heights.

He’ll cherish his playing time with the Spartans.

“It was fun,” Applebee said. “The coaches were great and my fa-

ther (Jeff) pushed me. I learned that hard work will get you there.”

“I remember Sharpsville this year (a 32-28 loss) and beating Grand Valley (45-0 in the regular-season finale),” he said.

Applebee even scored a touchdown in the GV contest.

He also paved the way up front on two District 10 football championship teams and lent a big hand in running back Mike Williams being selected as county player of the year in the 2018 season.

But even though he’ll have those memories forever, he’s also excited for the next step in his journey.

“It will be something different,” Applebee said. “I’m looking forward to that.”

it is — back-to-back Rimington Award winners,” Day said. “What he’s done speaks for itself, not only here, but at LSU. His background is excellent. What I’ve seen him do in terms of development with our offensive line is why [he was re-tained].”

During the spring, Studrawa is undertaking his most significant task yet: replacing four starters.

And he’s doing so with a mishmash cast. Left tackle Thayer Munford is out with an injury, and Rutgers graduate transfer Jonah Jackson, a guard, and true freshman center Harry Miller, a five-star recruit, aren’t enrolling at OSU until June.

The depth chart is incomplete, and it’s light on experience.

But Studrawa isn’t allowing the process of identifying the Buckeyes’ top five linemen to be a stressful endeavor.

“The young guys are really coming on,” Studrawa said. “Josh Myers is having a heck of a spring. Nick Petit [-Frere] is having a heck of a spring. Wyatt Davis is having a heck of a spring. Branden Bowen is getting back in the swing of things. So I’m pretty pleased. Josh Alabi has missed four practices in a row now with the flu, so I want to get him some work. Gavin Cupp is coming along. I like where we are right now.”

The presumptive starting offensive line Aug. 31 is Bowen at right tackle, Davis at right guard, Myers at center, Jackson at left guard, and Munford at left tackle.

Studrawa isn’t concerned about a lack of chemistry since the unit will only have the summer and fall camp to gel. He actually sees a sliver of positives, though he’d certainly prefer having all hands on deck in the spring.

But it allows younger players and backups to get valuable snaps with the first- and second-team offense.

The more players who filter through the better.

some depth,” Studrawa said.

The most encouraging development for the Buckeyes is the emergence of Myers, who seized an opportunity to take over the starting center position.

He hasn’t earned the nod yet, but it would be a stunning event if he doesn’t deliver the first snap against Florida Atlantic.

Myers, a 6-foot-5, 310-pound redshirt sophomore from Miamisburg, came to Ohio State to play tackle, was moved to guard, and now fills a need at center.

He becomes the latest in an assembly line of versatile linemen to play the position for the Buckeyes.

“I had the mindset of, ‘I just want to play. It doesn’t matter where I am at,’” Myers said. “I’ll be at tight end if they want me there.”

Studrawa isn’t one to label a player during the recruiting process. Instead, he assures them they can play college football and a position will be found when they get to Columbus.

Once they’re on campus, Studrawa educates them on all five positions on the line, insisting that they answer questions unrelated to their spot during team meetings.

The pitch apparently works, because Studrawa is a big-game hunter, reeling in two five-stars (Miller and Petit-Frere) the past two recruiting cycles. The coaching theory also produces high football IQs.

“It develops versatility,” Studrawa said.

As the spring game nears, marking the conclusion of spring practice and the beginning of a player-led timeframe, Ohio State is forging ahead with the bodies it has, intent on building a fortress for the future.

Woods, McIlroy have Masters on mind for different reasons

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — The Masters should have been the first major Rory McIlroy won. Now it is the only one he is missing.

Augusta National was thought to be the domain of Tiger Woods when he won four green jackets before turning 30. Now he is 43, with eight surgeries behind him, so far removed from his last Masters victory that the club has changed chairmen twice since he last won 14 years ago.

McIlroy and Woods are the central figures at the 83rd Masters, which starts April 11. They share the stage with a cast of characters that gets deeper and stronger every year, so tough that 23 of the last 25 major champions were among the top 25 in the world ranking. One is looking to join the most elite group in golf by capturing the final leg of the career Grand Slam.

The other is looking to recapture glory on a course where his red shirt was blazing among the azaleas, dogwoods and all the colors of springtime in Augusta.

Woods has always had a hold on the Masters, so much that his Sunday shirt packed as much interest as the green jacket. To see him two years ago walk gingerly to the Masters Club dinner for past champions was to wonder if he would ever shine at Augusta, much less play. It was only a few weeks later that Woods had a fourth surgery on his back to fuse the lower spine.

He not only returned, Woods capped his remarkable comeback by winning in Georgia last year for his 80th career victory on the PGA Tour. But it was at East Lake in late September, not at Augusta National the second week in April. Woods is building, and while his results in five tournaments this year have not been anything special, he has been gearing for this week.

have kept pitching and probably not given up a hit the way he was throwing.

“I just have an obligation to do the right thing, even when it’s not the funnest thing to do,” he said.

The enigmatic Bauer, best known for his quirky personality and unorthodox training methods, had only himself to blame for throwing too many pitches earlier in the game against Toronto’s weak lineup.

“I knew it was probably time to come out,” he said. “That being said, I think my velocity was higher in that last inning probably than all innings. My stuff was sharp. If I’d gone back out, I feel like I would have gotten it, but it’s a long season. We’re in the second week of it.”

The odd developments prevented Bauer from ending Cleveland’s no-hit drought, which dates to May 15, 1981, when Len Barker threw a perfect game against the Blue Jays.

Bauer’s performance was anything but pristine. He walked six — including two in the third when he also hit a batter — and even though he struck out eight, was never dominant against a Blue Jays team that has come close to being no-hit several times this season.

On opening day, Detroit’s Jordan Zimmermann was perfect against the Blue Jays until giving up an infield single with two outs in the seventh. Baltimore’s David Hess was pulled with a no-hitter intact after 6 1/3 innings Monday at Toronto.

Aaron Sanchez (1-1) took the loss.

Before his pitch count got too high, Bauer was backed by some terrific fielding, highlighted by first baseman Carlos Santana’s diving stop to rob Socrates Brito

of a possible hit to end the fifth inning. In the sixth, right fielder Tyler Naquin ran down Rowdy Tellez’s sinking liner toward the line.

The Indians have had numerous close calls over the years since Barker’s gem. Despite having several Cy Young winners and All-Stars, none of Cleveland’s pitchers have been able to make history and now Bauer has a near miss.

“I don’t really care about a no-hitter or not,” he said. “I care about putting up zeroes for the team and winning. I care about coming to the ballpark and seeing the fans and the seeing the people of Cleveland. I care about my teammates and trying to win a World Series.

“If I throw a no-hitter that’s great. If not that’s great too as long as we win the game. “

BAUER POWER

Bauer, who went seven strong innings at Minnesota last week, is the first pitcher in history to start the season with consecutive starts of at least five innings and allow just one hit.

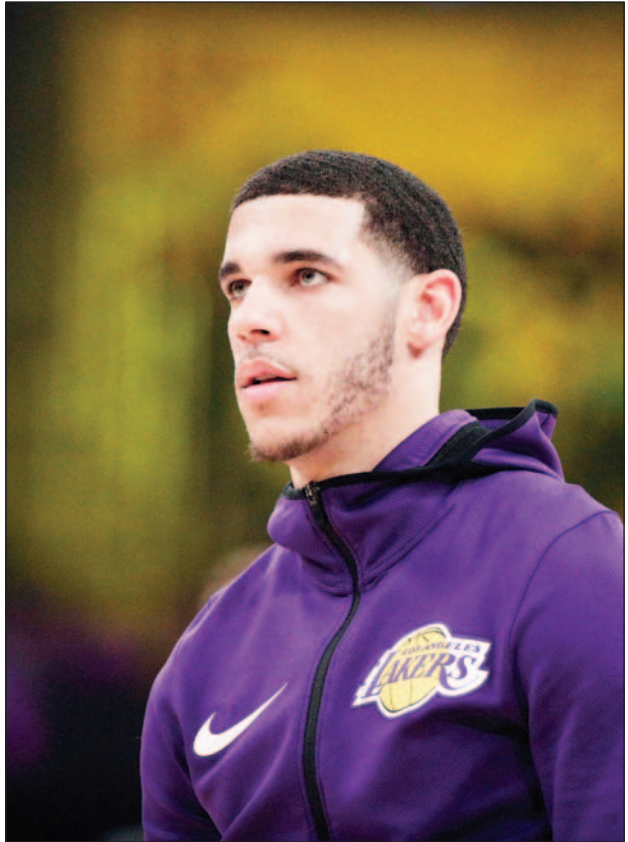
He’s the first pitcher since 1934 to open the season allowing one hit or fewer in back-to-back outings of seven innings.

and misleading information” about the Ball family.

Ball said in a statement last month that he had recently learned Foster was a convicted felon.

Foster hid his criminal past from his partners and presented himself as an experienced business manager who could help maximize profits, according to this week’s court filing.

Foster was convicted in 2002 of defrauding more than 70 people of nearly \$4 million, ESPN reported last month.

He was forced to pay back most of that money and was sentenced to seven years in prison.

Foster served five years but violated the terms of his probation and spent another five months behind bars in 2009, the report said.

Foster, a longtime friend of Ball’s father LaVar, co-founded Big Baller Brand in 2016.

Lonzo Ball, 21, has been out since Jan. 19 with an ankle injury and is expected to miss the remainder of the season.

Home sales for the first quarter of 2019 appear to be down slightly over the same quarter last year, but the average sales price for the county has increased to about \$110,000, she said.

Despite its ups and downs, Marich said she enjoys the challenges and fast pace of real estate sales.

"I love that I can continuously learn and grow in this industry in so many different ways, from business improvement, to customer service skills implementation, to negotiation tactics and more," she said. "I enjoy every aspect of this business and love running my brokerage."

Marich described her office as "a tight-knit group of agents who truly enjoy working together."

They help each other and bounce ideas off of each other, she said.

Sarah Glassky, a real estate agent at Novella, said Marich is one of the most driven people she knows.

"If something needs done, she will get it done," she said. "She's always busy and doing something. She doesn't believe in down time."

Glassky said she and the other agents are impressed with all Marich has accomplished at such a young age.

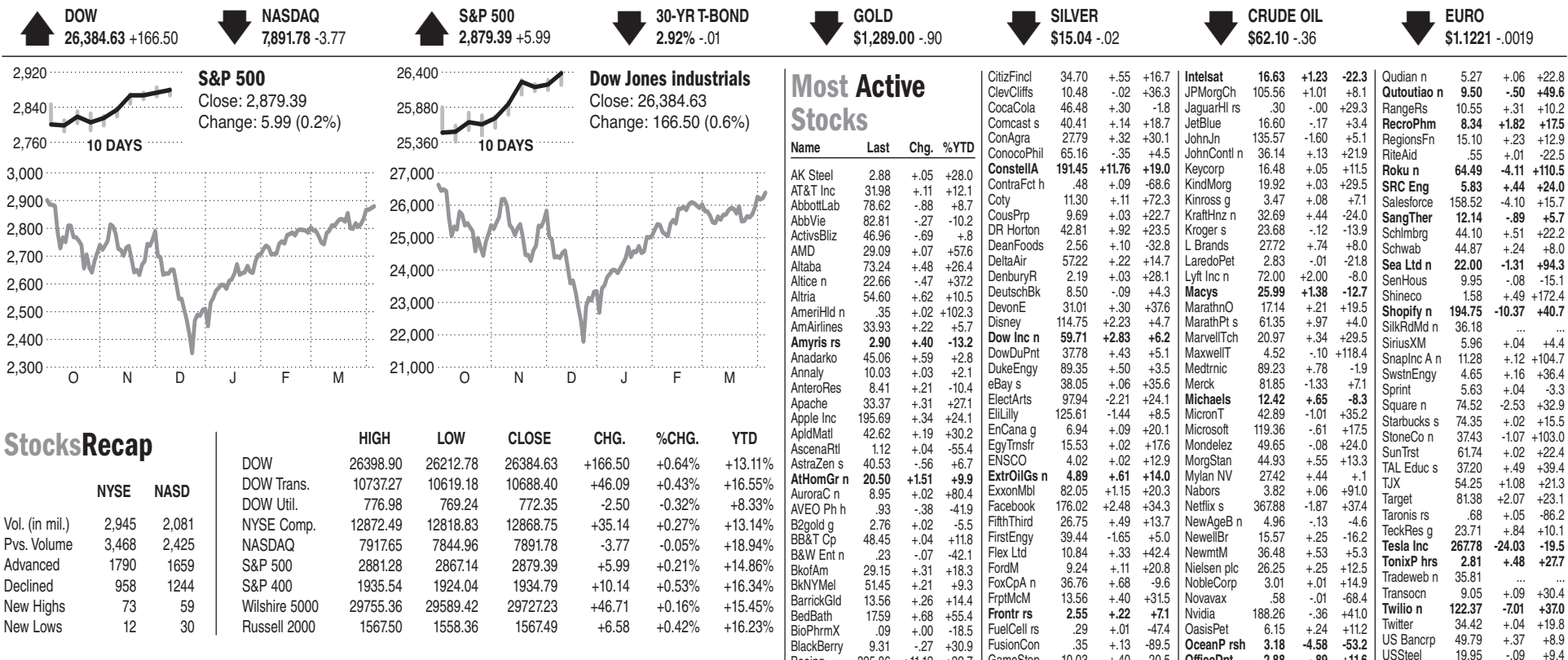
