#### 884 Main Street

This ostentatious Queen Ann house at 884 Main Street is now known as Grandpa's Castle B & B, but many people from the Conneaut area grew up calling it the Kreger home because longtime residents Charles and Marilyn Kreger raised their family there. John J. Cummins built this house in 1886/1887 and it is listed by that name in the Ohio Historic Inventory. John was the son of David Cummins (The Octagon House) and followed him as owner operator of the Cummins Canning Company after David died in 1909. The current owners, Dale and Shelia Griffis, purchased the house in 2003 with the intentions of lovingly transforming it into a bed and breakfast.

Many of the interior features will be revealed during this tour but newspaper articles and reports have long championed the third floor ballroom and the attic cistern that provided running water to the home. From the Main Street façade the architectural elements are clearly visible including the corner tower, stone lintels and sills, the curved bay window on the third floor, and the open porch on the second floor. The Tuscan columns and stone bases of the full front porch complete the look from the circular brick driveway. The granite stone was hand cut on the property and the mortar was made from backyard sand when this parcel was a large 70acre tract of land.

Dale and Sheila Griffis will be our hosts for the Conneaut Rotary Tour of Homes showcasing all three floors of their home and they will explain the historical and architectural significance further, and maybe why they named it Grandpa's Castle.





## 10 Biscoff Road (Corner of Middle & Biscoff)

Due to Sandy's husband Dick 20+ years in the Air Force she was never able to fully decorate at Christmas the way she wanted to. Once he retired and they purchased a home in Conneaut, Sandy started going all out at Christmas.

Sandy's style is a Country Christmas with many family heirlooms and antiques.

Her home will feature 5 Christmas trees and the main Christmas tree has 5000 lights on it. The Christmas Village under the tree was made mostly by her mother and aunt in ceramics. You will see a train amongst the village Dick has been collecting since 1970's.

It takes Sandy, Dick, as well as their family & friends, approximately 3 weeks to transform the house from everyday living to the Country Christmas scene.

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The construction of the church sanctuary building was begun in 1879 and completed in 1888. The original wood interior is highlighted by the large cross on the ceiling. The 1888 building included the original 3 beautiful large stained glass windows, each sided by 2 smaller stained glass windows. This original building was red brick with a 100 foot steeple. In ensuing years the steeple was shortened. The first Sunday School building was completed in 1911. The historic Sunday School building section was torn down in 1964 and was replaced by the present cinder block structure (which includes offices, class rooms, fellowship hall and parlor). During this time frame the sanctuary altar was remodeled to its present 1960's appearance and the exterior was sheathed in a tan brick which resulted in 6 stained glass windows being covered.

A \$2,5000.00 Pilcher pipe organ with a very ornate facade was installed in 1906 replacing a reed organ from the late 1800's. The Pilcher organ was replaced in 1953 with a \$15,000.00 Tellers Kent pipe organ. The structure added behind the altar to house the Pilcher organ was done in 1905. It has been verified that some of the old Pilcher pipework was retained by Tellers Kent during the installation along with a few of the gold facade pipes on the back wall of the chamber. It is believed that the Tellers Kent organ consisted of 20 ranks of pipes and the 2 manual consoles which still reside in the sanctuary. In the mid 2000's the organ was restored, upgraded and enlarged by Victor Organ Company,

The former New Leaf United Methodist Church and Sunday school building is now owned and cared for by the D-Day Ohio, Inc. and has become the administration center as well as storage for the many items needed for the annual reenactment. The group has made both the sanctuary and fellowship hall available for weddings and other gatherings. A volunteer will be playing the sanctuary organ during the tour. Many historic pictures and articles will be displayed during the tour.



Our museum is housed in the former First Maygar Hungarian Church, built in 1914 by local craftsmen to serve Hungarian immigrants who had settled in this neighborhood. In 2012 the remaining members of the Congregation donated the building to D-Day Ohio with the un-

derstanding the building would be used as a museum when the congregation was no longer holding services. The North Coast WWII Museum opened in June 2016.

For the Rotary Club tour we will depict a typical 1944 Christmas setting in our basement Home Front display area with original Christmas tree lights, ornaments, and other decorations. Join us to string some popcorn garland and learn more about Christmas on the Home Front.







## 639 Furnace

Our home was built in 2000 we took 1 1/2 years to build it ourselves, a true dream come true. When the main house was done and garage was also we began to work on our basement.

What started Jim and I on our collection of the 1950s Christmas decor was the love of classic cars. After Jim restored his 1956 Chevy Bel Air the collection began.

We started collecting and restoring everything 50s and turned our basement into a 50s style bar and diner.

#### 930 Main Street Chidester Home Circa 1895

Built in 1895 for Amelia Chidester and her family. Amelia lived from 1834-1924 and is buried in City Cemetery. She was the Guest of Honor for the dedication of the Conneaut viaduct in 1923. The Chidesters owned the home for 75 yrs., the Jackson's for 20 yrs., the Swicks for 4 yrs., and now the Tanners (since 1996).

The house was once part of a 40 acre farm which extended N. to the end of Reig Avenue, W. as far as the Dairy Queen, and E. to include the property which was once West Main School.

There are 45 windows in the house, 6 door to the outside, 3450 sq. ft. of living space not including the cathedral type ceiling in the attic and a full basement. 10ft.

ceilings in all rooms downstairs, original woodwork and window framing in most rooms, pocket doors, transom windows and original floor to ceiling cabinets in the kitchen and pantry. 18 areas to clean!!

First Floor: Entrance is complete with blistered varnish handrails and balusters, Dining Room and Den light fixtures are original from when house was wired for electricity. Living Room with pocket doors, Den, Piano Room all with original woodwork. Kitchen has 124 yr. old floor to ceiling cabinets. Also a Pantry, Bath, and Mud Room on the first floor.

Second Floor: North Bedroom Civil War Room – woodwork is original, Civil War motif wallpaper and flooring were added by us. Laundry room at one time was a kitchen when a family occupied the second floor. E. Bedroom Pink Décor, totally remodeled but with some original woodwork. Bedroom W. Master Bedroom, original woodwork but totally remodeled. Office -South E. corner of house with original woodwork. Office - Civil War Room with attached small room, small room at one time was a nursery all with original woodwork. Bath totally remodeled.

Shop Area North side of house – at one time was a 1 car garage, now just use the area for storage and tools.
