Geneva prepares for Winterfest

GENEVA — City and business leaders are prepping for an annual celebration of winter, scheduled for Saturday in downtown Geneva.

A wide variety of activities are available for families seeking to get out of their houses to experience chilly activities downtown. Winterfest will be from 11 a.m.-4 p.m. Saturday.

"It's cold outside and we can't get away from it so we might as well celebrate it," Geneva Recreation Director Myke Dowd said, "So come out tions are scheduled to sell

and enjoy the snow."

A traditional kick-off to the event is a pancake breakfast that is scheduled to get rolling at 9 a.m. Events are scheduled at a variety of locations throughout downtown Geneva.

Dowd said a basket raffle and soup are scheduled from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and the annual chili cook-off is will take place from noon-2 p.m.

The city's Winterfest Parade is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. with a variety of units scheduled to participate. Dowd said volunteers lead games and paint children's faces.

Non-profit organiza-

GENEVA — Winterfest has been a staple in downtown Geneva for two decades, as community leaders succeeded in bringing people out of their homes in the frigid cold of February.

She said area businesses, the chamber of commerce, fire department and other organizations all found ways to add to the event.




