# Welcome to the 56th Geneva Grape Jamboree

GENEVA — This year marks the 56th Grape Jamboree and preparations are well underway for the event.

The two-day festival has quite a bit going on and organizers have been working on the project for some time, the President of the Grape Jamboree Committee Dave Johnson said.

"Everything's coming along," he said.

This year marks a number of firsts for the half century old festival including a wedding on the main stage.

There will also be a winery at the event on Saturday on Sunday along with a living statue and the traditional grape stomping and pie eating contests, according to the event's schedule.

There will be six musical groups at this year's event as

well as a magician.

Entry into the event is free, as is the entertainment on the main stage.

The headlining musical number, Adam Calvert, has previously performed at the Jamboree, according to the event's schedule.

The Grape Jamboree is known for it's pie eating contest, grape stomping, grape ice cream, and various kinds of grape juice. All of those grape treats require grapes and the Jamboree goes through crates and crates. "It's got to be hundreds of pounds," Johnson said.

"You have gallons of fresh grape juice sold and glasses of it. You have various sized boxes of fresh grapes that are purchased," he added.

This year's parade is shaping up to be significant and the committee received applications to be a part of the parade as early as June, Johnson said.

GENEVA — The Grape Jamboree is always huge, thanks to about 1,500 acres of vineyards in the Geneva area.

The local grapes, especially the Concords, will be featured at the 56th annual Geneva Grape Jamboree held downtown every vear on the last full weekend of September.

The late Raymond Gruber and his brother. the late Ioseph Gruber. who were grape farmers in Harpersfield Township for more than 50 years, founded the Geneva Grape Jamboree

in 1963.

They wanted a festival to celebrate the grape harvest, said Raymond Gruber's wife, Fina, now deceased. in a Star Beacon interview in 2011.

The first Grape Jamboree hosted about 5.000 visitors, but since that time, the festival has grown to be one of the largest outdoor festivals in Ohio. The Gruber family's

grape farm is a legacy that goes back to Franz and Louise Gruber. Slovenian immigrants who in 1920 started the 24-acre vinevard off Route 534 South. The vineyard has sold Concord grapes to

Welch's for juices and grape products for 96 years now. They also sell white Niagara grapes to local wineries. The Gruber's and many other local vineyard owners' success

Two parades, an art show, craft show, wine tasting, car show and exhibits make the Jamboree a jam-packed weekend for the entire family.

### **ROADS CLOSED FOR THE EVENT**

Routes 20 and 534 will be closed in for the Grape Jamboree.

Route 534 will be closed from Depot Street to Park Street, and Route 20 will be closed from Eagle Street to Forest Street.

Route 20 will be closed along the parade route on both Saturday and Sunday. The event draws hundreds of thousands of of visitors to Geneva every year, and finding parking for that many cars can be difficult.

There will be some parking available at Memorial Field, city manager Doug Starkey said. "It's always a challenge with parking," Starkey said.

Street parking is available around the city, and private property owners sometimes set up parking lots on their property, Starkey said.

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# Winery new to grape festival this year

GENEVA — Wine lovers will have an opportunity to try some wines that they may not have had an opportunity to try before.

"In the past, we did a wine tasting," Garett Germack, the head of the winery committee, said. That tasting has brought in a number of larger wineries in the past, Germack said.

The Jamboree takes place in the harvest season, making it harder for smaller wineries to participate in tastings, due to staffing.

"Some of the smaller wineries couldn't particpate because of the time the festival is, and it's during harvest season, and they didn't have the people, so I decided to change it up, and instead of having a wine tasting, just open it up to having a winery instead," Germack said. "I was able to secure several different kinds of wine from various wineries."

This year, there will be a wide variety of different wines from area wineries including St. Joseph's, Hudley Cellars and Markko Family Winery, Germack said.

There will be music accompanying the event in the form of a DJ on Saturday and an acoustic duet on Sunday.

There will be whites, reds and blushes available at the Community Center, Germack said. "I tried to cover everything," he said.

The event will have a \$10 cover charge, which will get a visitor entry to the Winery for the day, along with a glass of wine in a commemorative glass, Germack said. More wine beyond the first glass will be available for purchase.

Extra commemora-

tive glasses will also be available for purchase, according to the event's website.

The winery will be held at the Geneva Community Center from noon to 8 p.m. on Saturday and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday according to the Jamboree's website.

Saint Joseph Vineyard's Riesling will be available at the event, Doreen Pietrzyk, one of the owners of the vineyard, said.

"The Riesling is a big seller for whites. It always is, because you can make it dry or sweet. So ... it can fit anybody's palette, so it's a very likable wine," Pietrzyk said.

The Jamboree is a positive for the community, Pietrzyk said.

"It's just a great event I think for the area. It promotes the Geneva area and promotes the wine area," she said.

# All Revved Up, a Meatloaf tribute band to be Saturday headliner

GENEVA — There will be a variety of bands at this year's Grape Jamboree, but if you're a fan of rock ballads you'll want to be at the festival Saturday night.

This year's headliner, playing at 8:30 p.m., will be Meatloaf tribute band All Revved Up, Grape Jamboree President Dave Johnson said. Meatloaf found fame in the 1970s and 1980s with hits like 'Paradise by the Dashboard Light', and a comeback in the mid 1990s with the hit song 'I'd Do Anything for Love (But I Won't Do That).

All Revved Up comes complete with backup singers, high energy, theatrics and costume changes, Johnson said.

The tribute band was booked one year ago and found through a promoter the Grape Jamboree utilizes, Johnson said.

"They are from Long Island and they are supposed to be the premiere Meatloaf

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# Festival is a boost to tourism, local economy

GENEVA — Those who come to visit wineries or apple orchards at the end of September might learn much about grapes and locals if they happen upon the Grape Jamboree.

And they do happen upon it this time of the year — according to the Ashtabula County Visitor's Bureau the festival is not just something locals attend.

Stephanie Siegel, executive director of the Visitor's Bureau, said people would be hardpressed to find a hotel on festival weekend due to the draw.

"Of course the majority of people attending are locals, but it's such an attraction and unique festival and event," she said.

People tend to come to Ashtabula County in early fall to visit apple orchards during harvests, Siegel said. They also come to the wineries with the hope of seeing fall foliage, she said.

The Grape Jamboree paints the town purple during a time when people are specifically coming for those other reasons, Siegel said. It's an opportunity to present outsiders with something special about Geneva, she said.

"When else do people have a chance to stomp grapes or taste fresh the Visitor's Bureau is interacting with during this time of year are much different than those they encounter in

grape juice," Siegel said. "It gives them a really positive experience. When we all travel don't we look for the most unique things to do that you can't do anywhere else? It makes a trip that much more special." The tourists that the summer, Siegel said. They are people looking for "one tank trip" experiences and long weekend drives during temperate weather, she said.

They are people who either learned of the event earlier in the year, or from others who filled them in after a visit to Ashtabula County, Siegel said.

"We love that the Grape Jamboree happens a little later in the traditional travel season because it helps to extend tourism here," Siegel said. "This and the Covered Bridge Festival give people a reason to come a little later in the vear."

Every other year an economic impact on tourism is conducted. A study in 2017 on the economic impact of tourism in the county showed that 4 million people visited Ashtabula County. The study uses a variety of data from sales and tax figures collected within counties.

"Next year we will do a study that will pull all the numbers from 2019," Siegel said.

The Grape Jamboree, specifically, has thousands of people who attend. Studies show that when people visit an area for a day trip they spend around \$100, and when they stay for a night that number triples, Siegel said.

The Grape Jamboree is also a time to celebrate and inform others that 50 percent of Ohio's grapes are grown in Ashtabula County, Siegel said.

"This year we will have all the usual favorites – the fries, pizza, fried veggies, ice cream and blooming onions everyone loves," she said. "But we are also looking at bringing in some new vendors. I think we are going to have vegan burgers this

year."

Goodlin and her husband, Matthew, are celebrating their 11th year of heading up the volunteer team that brings food concessionaires and vendors to town.

They've been concession and vendors chair persons for the past four years, and this will be their fifth with the Jamboree.

They trained for the spot two years before that.

"We look forward to every September," she said. "I've been coming to the Grape Jamboree since I was little ... I volunteer to support

my community." Goodlin said she works hard to make sure festival-goers have a variety of choices at the Jamboree, even though many festival vendors return year after year. "We have a 90 percent retention rate," she said. "The vendors love the Jamboree so much, they sign up a full year in advance and we often have a three- to-fiveyear waiting list. We do limit vendors based on quantity, so we don't end up with 15 sausage vendors at one time. But we are also always looking to bring that variety and something unique and different, too. So as soon as we have an opening, I'm on the lookout."

This year Jamboree foodies can enjoy ice cream, sausage, hamburgers, waffles, fried vegetables, desserts, hot dogs, corn dogs, pizza, lemonade, gyros, cheesesteak sandwiches, and the Jamboree's famous grape pies and Purple Cows.

Many events take place on the main stage, while others are spread through downtown Geneva.

#### **GRAPE STOMPING**

Grape Stomping is a Jamboree tradition, and this year is no different, with two children's and two adult's events scheduled.

Children's grape stomping will start at 11:45 a.m. on Saturday, and 12:45 p.m. on Sunday.

Adult grape stomping will start at 12:15 p.m. on Saturday, and 1:15 on Sunday. Sign-ups will take place behind the Main Stage 30 minutes before the event itself.

Five contestants will be drawn randomly from those who signed up, for both the children's and adult's event.

#### THE GENEVA GI'S

Geneva High School's show choir, Geneva's Image, will be performing at 5:30 p.m., Sunday, on the main stage.

#### CHILDREN'S COSTUME CONTEST

There are two different contests for children to win the title of Baby Grapette.

On Saturday, children 2 to 4 years old will get a chance to compete at 3:30 p.m., with sign-ups starting at 3 p.m. behind the main stage. The winner of that contest will be named Senior Baby Grapette.

At noon on Sunday, children from newborn to 23 months old will have their time in

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the spotlight, and a chance to win the title of Junior Baby Grapette.

Sign-ups for the event will start at 11:30 a.m.

dreamed (the marshal) could be me."

Smith (a recent marriage changed her last name from Cheney) was selected to be Geneva's Citizen of the Year in December.

Per tradition, the town's top citizen serves as parade marshal, said Dave Johnson, president of the Jamboree board of directors.

Even if that tradition was kicked to the curb, Smith's lengthy history of community service easily qualifies her to ride at the head of the parade, Johnson said.

"She is typical of so many people in the area who are doing so many good things," he said.

The Geneva Area Chamber of Commerce selected Smith as Citizen of the Year based on a long list of civic involvement, including various roles with the local Chamber, the city's Business Association, a businesswoman's organization and the local Winterfest celebration.

Smith also serves as the Jamboree's chairperson of merchants contests and window contests committees.

She has worked many years at Rae-Ann Skilled Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Geneva, and currently oversees the admissions/marketing department.

A love for the area motivates her volunteerism, Smith said.

"I think being born and raised in Geneva, (civic involvement) is something I feel strongly about," she said.

Because of its length, the Jamboree parade is split over two days, and Smith will preside over both versions.

At 3 p.m. Saturday, following the first procession, she will receive a plaque honoring her service as marshal.

Smith is not taking her weekend duties lightly. "I've been practicing my smile and waving," she said, laughing.

Saturday's parade begins at 1:30 p.m. and features marching bands and floats.

Part Two on Sunday starts at 2 p.m. and showcases more floats and bands, as well as visiting festival queens.
