### **DYLAN MCKEON** G, Sachse, Sr.



Wakeland has made three consecutive playoff appearances and Sisco has been a centerpiece of that run of success.

Sisco made an immediate impact as a sophomore, being named first-team all-district in helping the Wolverines to just their fifth playoff appearance.

Last season, Sisco averaged 16.0 points and 3.0 assists per game and was named district most valuable player after leading Wakeland to the second district title in school history.

In his final high school campaign, the 6-4 senior raised the bar

Peters-Teague stepped into a go-to role for a Trojans team that graduated plenty from its regional quarterfinalist squad in 2020. The guard thrived, splitting district MVP honors with teammate Thibaut Tagnon and earning a spot on the TABC



all-region team. In the penultimate year of his high school career, Peters-Teague averaged 15.4 and 6.5 rebounds as Smith returned to the third round of the playoffs.

## IAN MOTTA F, Allen, Sr.

Plenty was placed on the shoulders of Motta and fellow senior Mason Gibson to lead a young Allen team hammered by graduation. Committed to Bucknell, Motta responded with a career year across the board



earning all-district first team after averaging 19.5 points and 7.1 rebounds, plus 1.5 assists and 1.7 steals, as the Eagles qualified for the playoffs for the 10th consecutive season.

## MICAH ROBINSON F, Frisco, Fr.

The 9-5A newcomer of the year has one of the brightest futures of any players in the area. A 6-6 freshman, Robinson showed the ability to not only use his size on the inside, but the versatility to knock down shots from the perimeter. The Raccoons were able to finish third in



the district to return to the playoffs and Robinson emerged as an immediate contributor, tallying 13.0 points and nine rebounds per contest.

# **DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR**

## **MAKHI DORSEY** Plano, Jr.

Dribble against Dorsev at your own peril. It's a harsh lesson that many an opposing backcourt have learned over the past two seasons as Dorsey has carved out a prominent role in Plano head coach Dean Christian's rotation.

After graduating the majority of its offensive production from 2020, Prosper stayed affoat in District 5-6A — finishing third in the conference and qualifying for the playoffs for the eighth consecutive vear. One of the reasons why resided in the Eagles' frontcourt where

Ford, a 6-foot-7 freshman, played well beyond his years. The forward wasted no time locking down a spot in head coach

Jonathan Ellis' starting lineup and emerged as a go-to option for the playoff-bound Eagles. He nearly averaged a double-double at 10 points and 9.4 rebounds per game to go along with a stirring defensive presence at the rim with 3.1 blocks per game.

# COACH OF THE YEAR

# **PERCY JOHNSON**

## **Newman Smith**

When Johnson was named Star Local Media's all-area coach of the year in 2020, it came after guiding the Trojans to the best campaign in program history - an undefeated regular season that prefaced a threeround playoff run that matched the deepest ever for Smith boys basketball.

Plenty changed for the Trojans since that momentous year. They graduated a wealth of experience and production

from their 2019-20 roster, including several players with four years on varsity under their belts. Although that meant

recalibrating expectations a bit heading into 2020-21, Johnson's approach didn't change. He said no matter the circumstances, he'll continue to coach hard and expects his players to follow suit. At the end of the day, all he wants is for his team to

work hard. The Trojans bought in, turning in another strong season that included a repeat district championship after going 15-1 in 11-5A, followed by a return to the regional quarterfinals. Smith went out on its shield, hanging tough with top-ranked Lancaster for threeand-a-half quarters before the Tigers' size and depth took over late.

"Since I've been here, our goal has always been to outwork the other team," Johnson said after the Lancaster game. "It's nothing flashy, but we're go-

ing to outwork you on both sides. Eventually it takes a toll, but we gave it our best shot. I've got to take my hat off to these guys. They didn't look back once we started they kept going.'

## SIXTH MAN OF THE YEAR

The Lions submitted one of the best years in program history, going 25-3 and finishing the regular season ranked in the state's top 10 by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches.

Although much of that success can be found throughout a tenured starting five, McKinney had an additional leg up on its competition behind an advantage in bench production. The Lions were blessed with several reserves talenteď enough to start for other teams in the district, including 5-6A sixth man of the year Fry.

The backup guard assured little drop-off when head coach Wes Watson had to turn to his bench, chipping in 6.9 points, 2.7 rebounds, 1.7 steals and 1.0 assists. Despite averaging the sixth-most minutes on the team, Fry's 1.9 deflections ranked first

on the team and his steals third. The two-sport star, currently thriving as a long and triple jumper for McKinney's track team, had a penchant for highlight-reel dunks in transition as well, providing an intangible quality to the Lions that will be tough to replace
