McKinney has authored one of the great high school careers of any player in the state over the past decade, helping steer the Lady Eagles' basketball dynasty to another appearance in the Class 4A state championship game. Along the way, the



three-time state champion staked her claim as one of the top players in Texas by averaging 24 points per game during the postseason, including 33 against No. 1-ranked Canyon in the regional semifinals

CHELSEA WOOTEN G, McKinney North, Sr.

After making first team all-district last year, Wooten saved her best for her senior campaign, averaging 20 points, five assists and four rebounds per game while leading North to its first share of a district title since 2015. Wooten's ability



to beat opponents off the dribble was the key to her success, as she lived in the paint while scoring or setting up teammates this season. Up next for Wooten is the College of Charleston where she'll be taking her talents after being a starter on four consecutive Lady Bulldog playoff teams.

JASMINE SHAVERS G, Mesquite Horn, Jr.

A three-time all-district first-team selection, Shavers earned 11-6A offensive player of the year honors this season. While running the offense at point guard, Shavers still led the team in scoring at 18.9 points per game, including a 37-point outing against



Mansfield Summit and a 34-point effort against Irving MacArthur. Shavers did much more than put the ball in the basket, as she pulled down 5.6 rebounds and led the team with 3.3 assists and 3.5 steals per game.

ADHEL TAC F, Sachse, Sr.

Tac made the all-district first team for the third consecutive season, capping her career by winning MVP honors, as the Lady Mustangs won their fifth consecutive 10-6A championship and extended their district winning streak to 69 games in




The Liberty standout capped off a sensa-
