MACY TAYLOR OH, Sachse, Jr.



per set, to go along with 171 assists and 62 aces as a key cog in Lovejoy's run to a third straight state title.


ROSEMARY ARCHER UTIL, Lovejoy, Sr.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER

AVERI CARLSON Lovejoy, Sr.

The state's preeminent floor general on the high school volleyball hardwood, Carlson closed the book on a decorated career in familiar fashion as a senior — leading the Lady Leopards to their third consecutive Class 5A state championship.

Carlson was given the keys to the car as a freshman and was up to the task of running the offense for one of the country's premier volleyball programs. And although her production remained elite as a senior, Carlson acclimated to a role change within the Lovejoy offense.

Under first-year head coach Natalie Puckett, the Lady Leopards ran a two-setter system that split

passing duties largely between Carlson and senior Rosemary Archer. Although Carlson engineered the Lovejoy attack to the tune of 919 assists, she took on a more pronounced role as a hitter with 212 kills — 100 more than her previous season high.

Carlson added 72 aces, 378 digs (both career-high marks) and 23 blocks en route to District 10-5A setter of the year honors, an American Volleyball Coaches Association All-America firstteam selection and a spot in the Under Armour All-America Volleyball Game.

Carlson backed up those accolades by earning MVP honors at the 5A state tournament, submitting a triple-double of 10 kills, 16 assists and 10 digs in a 3-0 sweep of Grapevine in the state final.

HITTER OF THE YEAR

MAGGIE BOYD Marcus, Sr.

The Lady Marauders didn't lack in experience on offense heading into the 2021 season, returning their top four hitters from the year prior. That included Boyd, a UCLA commit for beach volleyball who doubles as one of the most imposing hitters in the area.

Boyd played all over the floor for Marcus, indispensable with her ability to impact the game in various ways. She was at her best at the net, however, producing 601 kills on .330 hitting to go along with 486 digs, 54 aces, 49 blocks and 35 assists. She was named an AVCA All-America first-team selection and the 6-6A MVP

after helping lead the Lady Marauders to a three-way split of the district title with Flower Mound and Plano West — a resurgent run for a program that had to play the homestretch of district and its entire postseason without star blocker Ifenna Cos-Okpalla, who was sidelined by injury.

Boyd's well-rounded play helped keep Marcus afloat, so much so that the program advanced to the regional quarterfinals for the first time since 2011.

In a testament to her allaround ability. Anyanwu was actually voted as the 9-6A offensive player of the year, recording 371 kills, an average of 2.9 per set, to go along with 39 aces.

Anyanwu was a key cog on a Sachse team that rolled to an undefeated district championship, dropping only one set along the way and holding opponents to 15 points or fewer in 37 of its 43 sets in 9-6A action.

In the playoffs, she helped lead the Mustangs to sweeps of Tyler Legacy and Waco Midway, followed by a five-set thriller over Rockwall to advance to the regional tournament.

AYDEN AMES OH, Prosper, Soph.

A move-in from California who acclimated to a new position, Ames handled that transition in stride. Voted as newcomer of the year in 5-6A, Ames led the Lady Eagles in kills with 455 to go along with 46 aces, 68 blocks and 138 digs — helping lead Prosper reach the



regional quarterfinals as a No. 4 seed.

IFENNA COS-OKPALLA MB, Marcus, Sr.

Although Cos-Okpalla was sidelined by injury late in the season, missing Marcus run to the regional quarterfinals as a result, the Texas A&M-bound blocker was a force when on the court. An AVCA All-America firstteam selection, Cos-Okpalla was responsible for 244 kills


Plano, Sr.
