

COACH OF THE YEAR

LIBBY RODRIGUEZ **McKinney North**

Sometimes a change of scenery is all it takes. After seven years coaching at Lewisville, Rodriguez made the move to McKinney ISD in 2019. In her first year, she led McKinney North to back-to-back playoff berths for just the second time in program history. In 2020, she and the Lady Bulldogs turned in their best season ever.

North posted a 23-4 record and advanced to the regional finals, the program's deepest run in the playoffs by a considerable margin. Entering the 2020 season, the Lady Bulldogs had just a single postseason win under their – all the way back in 2013. North matched that feat with a three-round sweep of

Frisco Liberty in the bi-district round and made history the rest of the way — defeating Woodrow Wilson, Frisco Lebanon Trail and North Forney. Of the Lady Bulldogs' four losses, three came to the state's No. 1-ranked team, Lovejoy. Rodriguez pushed all the right buttons in her second

year at the helm, entrusting numerous underclassmen with prominent roles and helping her program navigate the COVID-19 pandemic for a record-breaking season.

As the Lady Marauders continue to reassert themselves as an area power, they've done so behind one of the stingier defenses in the Metroplex. At the heart of that effort is Einspahr, who closed out her

high school career on a high note. Einspahr anchored the Marcus back line to the tune of 461 digs on the season, averaging 22 per match and six per set on her way to 6-6A libero of the year honors. She amassed that total in a district

that featured two stateranked teams (Flower Mound and Plano West) and a wealth of Division I-caliber hitters. Playing 77 sets on the year,

Einspahr had two matches of 40 or more digs in five-set bouts against Frisco Lebanon Trail and Highland Park and helped key a big 3-1 district victory over Coppell on Oct. 27 by averaging a whopping nine digs per set.

Einspahr also chipped in 87 assists for a Marcus team that finished third in 6-6A and totaled a 16-6 record.

KAYLEE COXFlower Mound, Sr.

The last name "Cox" is synonymous with athletic excellence at Flower Mound, with Kaylee being one of four sisters to have played significant roles at the varsity level for the Lady Jaguars.

Cox announced her arrival as one of the state's premier volleyball players as a sophomore when she helped lead Flower Mound to its first-ever UIL state championship in 2018. She did so behind one of the state's most versatile skill sets — something that served the Lady Jaguars well this year when they advanced to the state semifinals for the second time in three years.

Cox, a six-rotation player committed to Missouri, led Flower Mound in kills (362), aces (40) and digs (331) and was second on the team in blocks (36).

She hit .277 on the year and was named both 6-6A MVP and an All-American second-team selection by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.
