The District 8-5A co-MVP performed so well that she was able to earn that honor this season in the same district that features All-American shortstop Jayda Coleman from The Colony. Lucas led the Lady Lobos in the circle with a 24-7 record, over 200 strikeouts and a 1.53 ERA, but her presence at the plate made her unstoppable with seven home runs, 63 RBIs and a .643 batting average.



BAILEY BRENEK C, FLOWER MOUND, SR


GRACE CANTU OF, CELINA, SOPH.




NEWCOMER OF THE YEAR
