Curling final plus Klaebo, Stolz, Gu on tap Saturday

MILAN — Cross-country skier Johannes Hoesflot Klaebo, speedskater Jordan Stolz and freeskiier Eileen Gu are all scheduled to compete as the Milan Cortina Games wind down.

Here is a guide of what to look out for Saturday:

- Norwegian star Klaebo goes for a sixth gold medal at these Olympics. He is scheduled to line up for the men's 50-kilometer mass start classic at 4 a.m. ET/5 a.m. ET.

On Wednesday, the 29-year-old Klaebo won his fifth gold at the Milan Cortina Games — and a Winter Olympics record-extending 10th overall — in the men's team sprint.

Klaebo has won every race he has entered at these Games.

"It's going to be a hard race on Saturday, for sure, and a lot of strong athletes who haven't done five races (at these Olympics) will perform well, but I'm going to try," Klaebo said Wednesday. "I will put myself on charger mode for the next couple of days."

Klaebo has the second-most over-

all Olympic golds. U.S. swimming great Michael Phelps has 23.

- The men's hockey bronze-medal game will be at 1:40 p.m. CT/2:40 p.m. ET.

The matchup will be between the losing teams in Friday's semifinals. The final will be on Sunday.

- The Canadian men persevered through accusations of cheating to reach the curling final. They'll face Britain in the gold-medal match that starts at 12:05 p.m. CT/1:05 p.m. ET.

Canada beat Norway 5-4 in the semifinals. Earlier in the tournament, several players had been accused of double-touching the rock, a rules violation.

After winning three consecutive gold medals, Canada's men failed to make the podium at the 2018 Pyeongchang Games and settled for bronze four years ago in Beijing.

It's back-to-back finals for Britain, which missed out on gold in Beijing when it lost to Sweden.

Britain, whose entire curling contingent hails from Scotland, stunned previously undefeated Switzerland 8-5 in the semifinals. Scottish curling traces the sport's local roots back to 1540 in Paisley Abbey.

Also Saturday, the women's bronze-medal game — Canada vs. the United States — is scheduled for 7:05 a.m. CT/8:05 a.m. ET.

- Gu of China shook off a fall to advance to the final in freeski halfpipe. She won gold in the discipline four years ago in Beijing.

The 22-year-old Gu, who was born in the United States, took silver in slopestyle and big air earlier at the Milan Cortina Games.

Saturday's final is scheduled to begin at 12:30 p.m. CT/1:30 p.m. ET.

- Stolz takes another shot at winning a third gold medal at these Games.

The 21-year-old American captured gold in the 500 and 1,000 meters before taking silver in the 1,500 Thursday.

The Wisconsin native will participate in Saturday's mass start final at 9:40 a.m. CT/10:40 a.m. ET). The women's mass start final will follow immediately after.

America's Ferreira adds gold medal to freeski halfpipe career haul

LIVIGNO, Italy — American freeskiier Alex Ferreira won the men's halfpipe final at the Milan Cortina Winter Games on Friday to complete his collection of Olympic medals.

The 31-year-old Ferreira won with a third and final run worth 93.75 points, adding the gold medal to his silver from Pyeongchang in 2018 and bronze from Beijing in 2022.

The Colorado native delivered the United States its first gold medal in nearly two weeks of freeskiing or snowboarding at the Livigno snow park.

Estonia's 19-year-old Henry Sildaru captured the silver in his first Olympics. His third run was just 0.75 points off Ferreira's mark. Brendan Mackay of Canada took the bronze, nudging American Nick Goepper off the podium on the last run of the 11-man final.

Ferreira twirled a pole above his head with a flourish upon finishing his medal-clinching run. He

then had to watch his final rivals take their last shot before each came up short.

Goepper was going for a career fourth Olympic medal, only for Mackay to edge him for third place. The 31-year-old Goepper had switched to halfpipe for this Olympic cycle after winning two

silvers and a bronze in slopestyle in the previous three Games.

Goepper gave the crowd a scare on his final run when he smashed into the deck. But he was up in a few moments and appeared to be unhurt.

Lee Seunghun of South Korea did not compete in the final after

he crashed making a warmup run.

The finalists also competed in the morning for qualifying, which was pushed back to Friday because of heavy snow in the Italian Alps.

Reigning world champion Finley Melville Ives of New Zealand missed the final after crashing during both of his qualifying runs.

In freeski halfpipe, like in snowboarding, competitors take turns zooming up and down the curved surface and launching into a series of acrobatic leaps that are scored for their difficulty and execution. Only their best of three runs counted.

The halfpipe at the Livigno ski resort hosting these Olympic events measures 240 yards in length, 24 yards in width, and rises to 23.6 feet in height.

American Elizabeth Lemley won gold in women's moguls freeskiing at the Winter Games, but the moguls events are held at a separate venue in Livigno. The Livigno snow park hosts the halfpipe, slopestyle and big air events

Norway breaks record for most golds in single Winter Games

ANTERSELVA, Italy — Johannes Dale-Skjevdal of Norway was the only biathlete to hit all 20 of his targets in the 15-kilometer mass start race Friday and skied his way to gold.

It was Norway's 17th gold medal of the Milan Cortina Winter Olympics, breaking the record for the most gold medals won by a nation at a single Winter Olympics.

Norway had set the record at the 2022 Beijing Olympics

with 16 gold medals.

"It's quite a good ending to my first Olympics, and it is also my first time shooting 20 out of 20," Dale-Skjevdal said. "What a day to do it on. It's real, and I can't find the words, but it's just amazing, of course."

Dale-Skjevdal had taken the lead after the first standing bout with clean shooting and completed the five laps on newly packed snow and gusty winds in 39 minutes, 17.1 seconds. His teammate Sturla Holm Laegreid only missed one target and finished 10.5

seconds back for silver. It was his fifth medal of these Olympic Games: three silver and two bronze.

"After the third shooting, I was really hoping for something special, because then I got quite a solid gap, and then I knew that on my last shooting I would be alone on the range," Dale-Skjevdal said. "It was a situation that you dream of: coming alone on to the range, shooting in Antholz, in the Olympics, in my favorite discipline in mass start. I'm so happy."

Laegreid, who turned 29 on

Friday, said it was a special day.

"It was a tough race," he said. "The snow is very slow. The conditions on the range are windy, so it was like a race I had to fight for. Today I was in fighter mode, so it suited me well."

Philipp Horn of Germany missed only one target on his last shooting bout and left the range in third place, but Quentin Fillon Maillet of France, who missed four on the day, chased Horn and passed him on a big hill, and took the bronze, 25.6 seconds behind Dale-Skjevdal.
