Caring for our cops

Social media has had a lot to say about law enforcement across the states within recent weeks. From slaying of officers in Texas to videos showing bad seeds abusing their power, it is hard to sit in front a monitor and not witness some sort of unnecessary violence.

Luckily for the citizens of Meade County, these acts of anger and hatred are not rooted in our community.

The officers within city police departments and the Meade County Sheriff's Department are vital parts of the community. These brave men and women are more than just a badge; they are beating hearts and compassionate souls that risk everything to serve their communities.

Being a law enforcement officer is not an easy task. There are calls that these individuals respond to

that shake them to the core - but they put on the uniform the next day and continue on.

Meade County Sheriff William "Butch" Kerrick recounted how he responded to a house fire over 30 years ago, but he can still feel the infant breathing its last breaths in his arms.

"You always remember the children," said Kerrick.

This memory, along with countless others, are on the backburner of every officer's mind. One second, one trigger, can take them back to a moment when they did all they humanly could, but it was not enough to save a life.

"People have no idea what these officers go through," said Laura Dutschke, dispatcher for Meade County. "There's no way they do what they do and go through what they do for the

Zika: what needs to be known

The summer months of 2016 have brought deluges of standing water across Meade County, arming the public with an obscene amount of mosquitoes.

This situation arises every year, but there is the possibility of something a little more sinister than just an itchy bug bite.

There have been two confirmed cases of the Zika virus in Hardin County. The patients contracted the disease in an area where the virus is spreading quickly. There has been no confirmation on infected mosquitoes in

the area though.

With the Zika virus spreading like wildfire through the countries in South America, there is the possibility of the illness reaching regions in North America - including Kentucky.

According to the Center for Disease Control's (CDC) website, Kentucky is in the potential region that both the *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus* species of mosquitoes could expand to.

As of publication, the only identified outbreak within the United States is in Miami, Fla.

There are five proposed modes of transmission for the Zika virus: through mosqui-

to bites, from mother to child during pregnancy, through sex, through blood transfusion - although there have been no confirmed cases of this in the United States, and through laboratory exposure.

Mosquitoes become infected with Zika after feeding on the blood of an infected person. The insect then lives long enough to bite another human and transfer the infection to them. The mosquitoes that could carry the virus are known as "aggressive daytime biters," but will also bite at night.

A pregnant woman can transfer the Zika virus to her fetus during the pregnancy or around the time of birth, according to the CDC.

The Zika virus has become known for the exponential rise in microcephaly in South America, but it has also been linked to eye defects, hearing loss, and impaired growth. Researchers at the CDC are still collecting data to understand links between infants and mothers infected with Zika.

There has been no documented link of

infants contracting the virus through breastfeeding.

The Zika virus can be transferred during sex before infected individuals show symptoms, while they show symptoms, and after the symptoms end. The virus can remain in seminal fluid longer than in other fluids, such as blood, urine, etc.

Many people infected with the virus will only show mild symptoms, or none at all. Common symptoms include fever, rash, joint pain, conjunctivitis (red eyes), muscle pain, and headache.

The symptoms, while mild, can last anywhere from a few days to a full week. People rarely die of Zika, or become sick enough to require hospitalization.

In addition to the rise in microcephaly, there has been a documented spike in Guillan-Barre Syndrome (GBS), an illness where the immune system damages the nerve cells, causing muscle weakness and possibly paralysis. CDC

research has suggested that there are strong ties between the two illnesses, although a very small percentage of those infected with Zika develop GBS.

If an individual believes they may have become infected with the virus, they should contact their healthcare provider. A diagnosis will be issued based on recent travel history, symptoms, and

test results. A simple blood or urine test can confirm the infection.

There is no treatment for Zika. Instead, the CDC says to treat the symptoms. Acetaminophen or paracetamol are recommended to reduce both fever and pain. Aspirin and other NSAIDs are not advised until a professional has ruled out any possible dengue infection due to the risk of bleeding.

Blending industries in Payneville

Hard work and passion for creating custom flavored meats are finally paying off in a big way for Marty Webb, owner of Webb's Country Store.

Webb has been an instrumental component for a far-reaching endeavor to make what he believes is the first meat product enhanced with industrial hemp. The results and speed have astounded all those involved, considering Webb's facility had to be certified by both the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the United States Department of

Agriculture (USDA).

Webb was approached by David Neville, a Kentucky Proud cattleman, with an idea so far-fetched that it had been rejected from several other processing plants.

Neville had an interest in industrial hemp - particularly in the nutritional facts.

Industrial hemp is high in protein, omega-3s and -6s, and contains a complete set of amino acids when ingested.

While belonging to the *cannabis* species, the plant does not possess any significant traces of psychoactive tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) - in fact, the

product, approached Webb.

The combined product, branded as Kentucky Beef Hemp Dawgs, is made from industrial hemp hearts and oil. It has enough protein in one serving to fulfill an individual's recommended daily intake.

"The best way I can describe industrial hemp is: wow, what a super grain," said Webb in an interview.

Both the industrial hemp and beef used for the Kentucky Beef Hemp Dawgs are Kentucky Proud and sourced from farms within the Commonwealth.

Webb's store makes it the perfect size to serve to this niche; he can trace the beef and hemp he uses for his products back to the farms they came from - a feat that larger corporations cannot do.

The response from the international community has been swift and surprising to Webb. There has been interest for his products expressed from China, Australia, and Canada.

"I think this will be a good vessel to promote the beef industry in Kentucky," said Webb.

A Focus on Frankfort

Kentucky received some welcome news last month when a national study found that no state had a smaller gap when comparing the high school graduation rates of students from low- and higher-income families.

The average gap across the country stands at 15 percent, but it's just one percent here in the commonwealth. In fact, our low-income students graduate at a higher rate than the overall national average, something only five other states can say.

This news speaks volumes about the good work our schools and students are doing, especially when considering Kentucky's relatively high poverty rate. Reports like these also help show us where we are doing well and where we need to improve.

Fortunately, there's a publication dedicated to this very thing. Each year it publicizes more than 500 state rankings in subjects ranging from education and criminal justice to agriculture and the economy. Connecting these statistical dots paints a more complete picture of who we are.

In most cases, we tend to fall roughly in the middle of the states, beginning with our population. We have a few more people than Oregon and not quite as many as Louisiana, for example. Geographically, we rank lower

at 37th. Our 40,000-plus square miles put us, appropriately enough, between Tenn. and Ind.

We're also among the bottom half of states in the number of sunny days, which occur here about every other day on average. We are warmer than most states, however, with only 16 having a greater daily average temperature.

We rank a little higher when measuring the percentage of native-born citizens still living here. Almost three out of four of our residents fit in that category, which is far better than Nev., where less than a third of its citizens are native-born.

We're a little bit older than most states – our median age is almost 40 – and we also are more likely to drive to work alone.

Speaking of travel, we drove almost 47 billion miles in 2013 and bought 2.12 billion gallons of gas. We're right in the middle of the states in both of these categories.

The same goes for the number of students attending our elementary and secondary schools, which teach about 677,000 overall. Our student-teacher ratio is also just a hair over the national average.

Academically, our fourth graders made the top 10 in reading last year, while eighth graders were tied at 17th with their counterparts in Iowa, Maine, MO, Ohio, Oregon, VA and Wyo.

Math was a tougher subject. Our fourth graders landed in 25th place, but the eighth graders were tied with Georgia at 38th.

We slightly trail the national average in the rate of adults 18 to 24 who are pursuing a post-secondary degree, but we have a lot of work to reach that same threshold when it comes to increasing the number of Kentuckians with a bachelor's degree. On the plus side, fewer college students graduate with debt here than they do nationally.

Economically, we rank fifth among the states in the percentage of workforce in manufacturing, and these employees work more hours a week than similar employees in any other state. They also earn more, with their weekly pay ranked fourth highest.

We're fifth in the number of farms, which total more than 76,000. On those farms, you will find 308 million chickens – seventh highest among the states – and 415,000 hogs and pigs, which ranks us 18th.

Kentucky is also in the top 20 for cattle (2.1 million head); soybeans (1.8 million acres); corn (1.3 million acres); and wheat (440,000 acres). Although the rankings don't include tobacco and horses, it's worth adding we are among the nation's leaders in those two areas.

In good news, our overall crime rate trailed the national average in 2014, and we were 44th when just looking at the violent-crime rate. Five southern states, meanwhile, were among the top 10 highest.

We also have one of

the lowest juvenile arrest rates, which is less than half of the national average, and we have one of the lowest rates of identity-theft complaints.

Because Kentucky plays a prominent role in the nation's defense, we rank 11th in the number of military personnel stationed here and 14th in the amount of procurement contracts awarded by the U.S. Department of Defense. In 2013, that totaled \$5.8 billion.

In the field of health-care, we have almost 12,000 physicians and a greater rate of nurses per 100,000 people than most other states.

Interestingly, we have the second-highest rate of adult smokers but the third-lowest per capita consumption of alcohol. Here, each person drinks about 2.1 gallons a year, far below the 5.3 gallons they drink in New Hampshire.

There are, as I mentioned, many other statistics, and while they may not fully explain why we are the best place to live, they do give us a lot of information that can help us make that case.

I am a Meade County native who is quite disturbed at the possibility of the controversial Confederate monument being moved to Brandenburg. At a time of increased racial tensions, why would our community want to welcome a divisive symbol which Louisville wants to lose? Symbols of the Confederate cause were, after the Civil War, against the law. Are we still fighting it here in Meade County?

The Civil War reenactments on Main Street seem playful and innocent, and I am sure many good-hearted folks participate.

But this desire to bring a Confederate monument to a family and community space bears more of a threat. At the worst, it would fan the embers of racism. At the least, it contradicts Meade County's claim to be a welcoming community.

Some Caucasian neighbors that I've talked with, dismiss concern with a shrug of the shoulders and the easy words, "It's history."

I've spent a lot of time pondering this. What I've come to is the following:

Not all of U.S. history is shining. As a people, we chose what we want to memorialize. Such icons should represent the very best of our values.

What stands out shockingly is the negligence of seeking out the thoughts and feelings of our African American friends and neighbors. I have, with some hesitation, risked reaching out. I challenge Meade County residents to do so. The discussion will be better balanced if we are more inclusive in our opinion-sharing.

General Fund and Road Fund Receipts for July 2016

General Fund receipts increase 4.8 percent

Road Fund receipts decrease 4.5 percent

State Budget Director John Chilton announced today Kentucky's General Fund receipts for July, the first month of Fiscal Year 2017 (FY17), totaled \$769.3 million, a 4.8 percent increase compared to July 2015 receipts.

The official revenue estimate for all of FY17 calls for revenue to grow 2.7 percent compared to full year FY16 actual receipts. Based on July's receipts, General Fund revenues need to increase

2.5 percent for the remainder of the fiscal

year to meet the official estimate.

State Budget Director Chilton noted that while the 4.8 percent growth of July is robust, the underlying revenue accounts reveal a more cautionary tone. "July's revenue totals were very encouraging, but sustainability of the current revenue trend remains a concern.

Of the main revenue sources, only three saw growth and each had unique circumstances. Sales and gross receipts were inflated in July due to changes in the required tax payment dates for certain accelerated filers. Without those additional monies, the sales and use tax would have been flat or negative. Individual income tax revenue rose \$40.9 million in July, and withholding taxes increased 13.4 percent or \$39.5 million, a level that is unsustainable. Lastly, property

tax revenue grew \$4.5 million but this account frequently shows large fluctuations early in the fiscal year and cannot be counted on to recur."

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last July. Chilton noted that collections were in line with expectations. "A timing issue helped bump up motor vehicle usage tax receipts last July while growth in motor fuels tax collections were moderate and based only on an increase in consumption."

The official Road Fund revenue estimate for all of FY17 calls for revenue to decline 1.7 percent compared to full year FY16 actual receipts. Based on the first month's receipts, revenues can fall 1.5 percent for the rest of the fiscal year and still meet budgeted levels.

Among the major Road Fund categories, compared to July 2015:

- Motor fuels tax receipts rose 1.9 percent.

- Motor vehicle usage tax decreased 9.0 percent.

- License and privilege taxes fell 11.2 percent.

Planting fall vegetables in Kentucky

It's not too late to continue to enjoy your garden and to add new plantings. You can grow a variety of produce in Kentucky gardens in the coming weeks and have several fresh items available well into the fall.

Cooler nights later in the year can increase the sugar content of many crops and thus increase their quality. Cooler nights also slow growth, so your crops can take longer to mature than in the summer. Keep this slower pace in mind when you check seeds for days to maturity.

Early August is the right time to make your last planting of bush beans, carrots, sweet corn, kale, collards, bibb lettuce, turnips, and cole crops such as kohlrabi, Chinese cabbage, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli. For late August

and into September you can try planting mustard greens, spinach greens, radishes, turnip greens and leaf lettuce.

Before planting, remove any existing debris, including crops and weeds from your garden bed, move them to the compost bin and then prepare the soil.

If the previous crop was well fertilized and grew vigorously you may not need to add much, if any additional fertilizer, otherwise apply about two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 5-10-10 or 10-10-10 per 100 square feet of planting area.

Remember to keep fall gardens well watered as this tends to

be a fairly dry time in Kentucky. A weekly irrigation sufficient to wet the soil to six or eight inches should be adequate. This is more or less equivalent to a weekly one inch rain.

KDA carries out numerous responsibilities to enhance the fair experience.

The Kentucky State Fair will attract thousands of people to the Kentucky Exposition Center for its 112th running Aug. 18-28, and the Kentucky Department of Agriculture will be there to help keep the fair running smoothly.

"The state fair is a celebration of everything that is Kentucky," Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles said. "But more than anything else, the state fair is a showcase for the very best of Kentucky agriculture. We are proud to do our part to make the 2016 Kentucky State Fair a success."

Employees of the state veterinarian's office will check the health papers of every animal that enters the fairgrounds to prevent a disease outbreak. Staff with the Division of Show and Fair Promotion will help conduct the livestock shows at the fair. Other KDA workers will oversee the crop and vegetable displays and the bees and honey exhibit. Inspectors with the Division of Regulation and Inspection will check the amusement rides

on the midway to ensure that they are assembled and operating in accordance with the manufacturers' specifications.

Commissioner Quarles will host the Commodity Appreciation Breakfast on Aug. 18 to open the fair. To commemorate the KDA's Hunger Initiative, attendees are asked to bring canned goods that will be donated to local charities. The Hunger Initiative is an effort to examine the hunger problem in Kentucky and search for solutions.

Commissioner Quarles also will address the Kentucky Farm Bureau Country Ham Breakfast on Aug. 25. He is scheduled to crown the state champion in the Farm to School Junior Chef competition on Aug. 26 and attend livestock shows, public meetings, the Kentucky 4-H Foundation Breakfast, the Kentucky FFA Awards Program, the Sale of

Champions, and other events. Commissioner Quarles will maintain an office in the West Hall during the fair.

The KDA's West Hall display will feature Kentucky Proud Popcorn, a premium popcorn product produced by western Kentucky growers; the Kentucky Hunger Initiative; and the popular chick hatch. Across from the KDA display, the Kentucky Corn Growers Association will exhibit a car that runs on ethanol. A display for Homegrown By Heroes, the brand for Kentucky farm products produced by military veteran farmers, will appear outside the commissioner's office.

The department, in partnership with the State Fire Commission, will host a display in the South Wing featuring the KDA's rollover tractor simulator and Mobile Science Activity Center as well as a combine provided by Wayne Supply. The display will focus on farm safety and grain production. It will include a "scAvenGer hunt" in which participants answer questions about the display.

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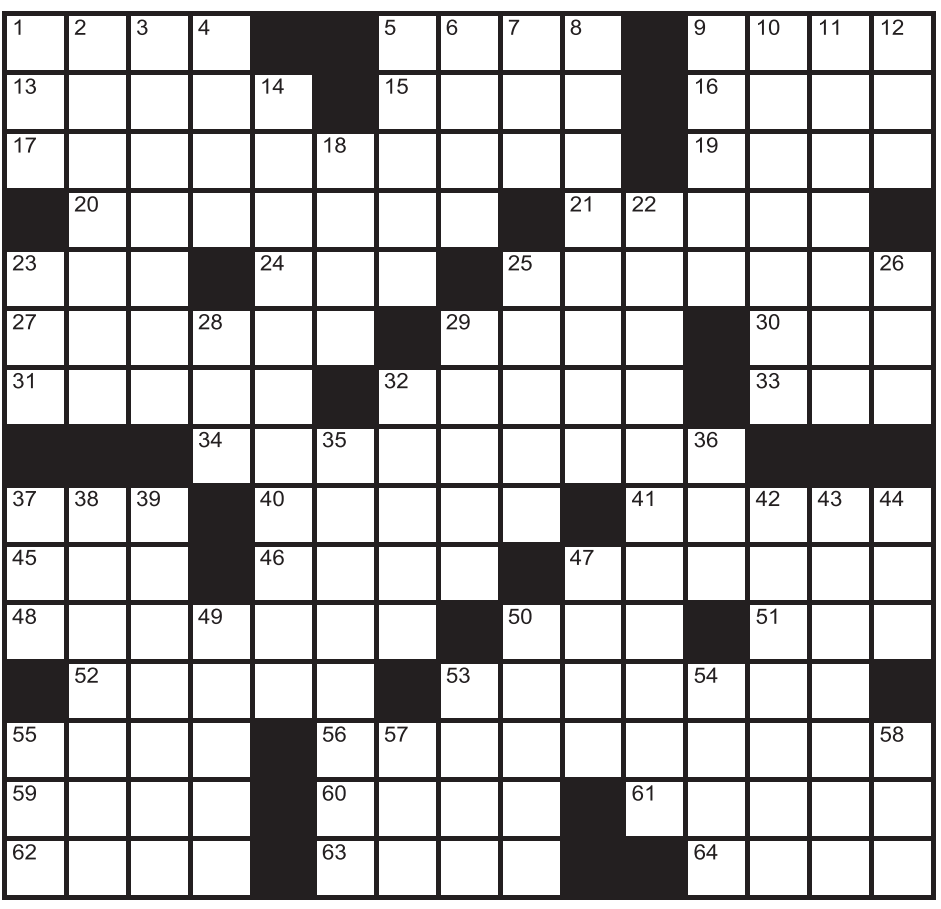

Help your children eat healthier

If we lived in a perfect world, all of our children would consume the daily recommended serving of five fruits and vegetables every day, but we don't. As with many

adults, getting kids to eat healthier is easier said than done. Here are some tips and tricks to help you get your family eating more nutritious foods.

- Offer vegetables every day. Children will not eat vegetables if you do not have them prepared and available to them.
- Allow children to help with the preparation of meals. When they do, allow them to create fun shapes with food. Children are more likely to eat what they prepare.
- Add vegetables to existing meals. For example, add lettuce to sandwiches. Add fruits like

strawberries, blueberries and bananas to breakfast cereals and oatmeal.

- Serve vegetables, alongside a dip children love, as an appetizer before meals or as an after school snack.
- Offer vegetables to your children in a relaxed environment. Do not force, threaten, or punish children for not eating them. On the other hand, do not reward them when they do. These strategies could lead to overeating and weight gain. It also teaches children to eat when they are not hungry, and it interferes with the child's natural ability to sense or know when

they are full.

- Sneak healthy foods into childhood staples. Blend carrots with mashed potatoes; mix chopped broccoli into macaroni and cheese; layer zucchini in lasagna, or shred spinach into coleslaw (or spaghetti sauce). Good hiding places for vegetables include inside a tortilla wrap, under pizza cheese or at the bottom of a pita.

Most of us love desserts. Adding fruits and vegetables to them is a great way to make the dishes healthier and encourage more fruit and vegetable consumption.

Here are some healthy dessert ideas:

- Layer berries, yogurt and whole-grain cereal to make a parfait.
- Make a no-bake cookie by combining a high-fiber cereal with raisins, peanut butter and just enough honey to hold it together. Shape into balls.
- Make a smoothie by blending low-fat milk, frozen strawberries and a banana.
- Stuff a whole-grain pita pocket with ricotta cheese and Granny Smith apples. Add a dash of cinnamon.

Don't be discouraged by how little of a par-

ticular fruit or vegetable your child consumed. Remember children's serving sizes are smaller than adults. A general serving guideline is one tablespoon of vegetables for each year of a child's life. Also remember that children under age two need a higher level of calories from fats to support their growth and brain development and those should not be limited.

Regular Meeting August 9

The Meade County Fiscal Court held their regularly scheduled monthly meeting on August 9.

The meeting started as usual with the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer.

The following business was covered:

- Industrial Authority
- 2016 Tax Rates
- Detention Center
- 2015 Sheriff Excess Fees - Amendment
- EMS Hire
- Closed Session: KRS 61.810 (1) (f) (c)
- Approve Claims and Transfers

During the public session, individuals voiced their support for Meade County approving some sort of ordinance backing the City of Brandenburg's new alcohol ordinances.

During the Committee Reports, it was announced that the Extension Office lowered their tax rates for the third year in a row. The Meade County Public Library Board kept their's the same.

David Pace, Chairman of the Industrial Authority Board, announced that Industrial Authority

will be publishing a new website, in addition to a new logo, within the next week.

Pace also said that two local companies are in the process of closing sales at Buttermilk Falls and should be under construction by the end of the year.

The Board will also hire a new Economic Development employee within the next week.

The 2016 Tax Rates were kept the same as last year, with real property at a rate of 21.60 cents per \$100 of assessed value; personal property at 38 cents per \$100 of assessed value; merchant inventory tax at 19 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation; and motor vehicle and watercraft tax rate stayed at 13.4 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Judge Executive Gerry Lynn motioned for the rates to stay the same, saying, "We at Fiscal Court have a pretty good record of staying in budget with these tax rates; I motion to keep Meade County tax rates the same."

J.J. Scarborough, Meade County Jailer,

announced several business items happening at the jail. The Detention Center was contacted by another county's Dentention Center to house some inmates because their's was too crowded.

Scarborough said that after doing some research, he found that if the Center continued to house inmates from other counties, they could bring in more money than just the state inmates.

The Center also switched pharmacies, with a projected \$22,000 in savings on every day medications.

The Dentention Center will be installing a body scanner soon. The \$150,000 cost will be paid from the Canteen Account over a six year period. A recent audit at the Meade County Sheriff's Department found excess funds totaling over \$14,000. The magistrates approved for the reassignment of the funds.

The Fiscal Court then met for a lengthy closed session with no action taken before adjourning.

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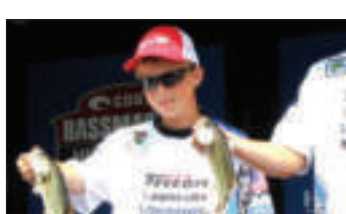

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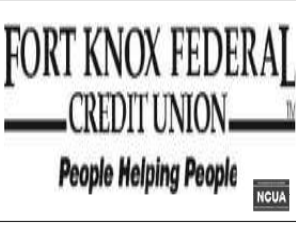

Two local fishermen casted their pole in Carroll County Thousand Acre Recreational Lake to place 15th in Bass Master's Junior National Championship. Kurtis Swanson and Chaney Weick traveled with their fishing talents to Huntingdon, Tenn. July 30-Aug. 3 for the national competition. The two competed in the tournament together, along with 28 other junior division teams. Swanson and Weick were Kentucky's representatives, while other young fishermen from ages eight to 14 years-old trekked from as far as Canada. The journey to Tennessee has been a long time coming. The duo qualified back in the fall of 2015.

Thirteen year-old Swanson was awarded the title of Kentucky Angler of the Year at the Kentucky State Championship in 2015. His accomplishment is a result from scoring the highest number of points throughout the Kentucky Bass Nation fishing tournament season. Swanson's fishing game is more than a pole and a boat. He has been fishing in tournaments' tike program with his grandfather, Bill Swanson, since the age of six. Now, the papaw-grandson pair fish with Bottom Line Bass Club. Twelve year-old Weick qualified through the state tournament as well. Weick is relatively new to the fishing industry, as he began his career in the spring of 2015. Bass Master's Junior National Championship was a five

day event, beginning with prefishing on the lake July 30 and 31. The partners registered Aug. 1, allowing them to compete Aug. 2 and 3. Swanson and Weick officially fished Aug. 2 for the tournament and weighed in three fish, for a daily total of two pounds and 11 ounces. 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Kentucky Afield Outdoors: 2016-17 deer season looks promising

The 136-day Kentucky archery deer season kicks off Saturday, Sept. 3. The season looks similar to the past several in which Kentucky deer hunters racked up a string of record harvests. Hunters in the state harvested more than 155,000 deer last season, establishing a new record. This number included 55 male deer that met the minimum score for entry into the Boone and Crockett Club's awards book.

Many archery hunters in Kentucky will spend the last long weekend of summer getting an early jump on fall.

Kentucky's 2016-17 deer season kicks off the first Saturday in September with the start of the 136-day archery season. Anticipation has been building for months.

"Everything right now points toward another good season," said Gabe Jenkins, deer program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

That is welcome news following a string of record harvests.

Hunters in Kentucky established a new benchmark last season by taking more than 155,000 deer. It was the third record harvest in the past four seasons and included 55 bucks from 40 counties documented by Kentucky Fish and Wildlife that met the Boone and Crockett Club's minimum entry score for its awards book.

"Our deer hunting in Kentucky is better than it's ever been," said Steve Beam, wildlife division director for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "We're harvesting record numbers of deer and our production of

large-antlered bucks is completely incredible."

A state believed to hold fewer than 1,000 white-tailed deer a century ago now is considered one of the nation's premier hunting destinations. The latest herd estimate – derived from harvest and age structure data – pegged the statewide population at more than 820,000 after the 2015-16 hunting season and before fawning this spring.

"We've really hit the scene in the past 10 years because of our quality white-tail," Jenkins said. "That's a product of good management, good habitat and being diligent about what's being put on the landscape. With that, we still have to be good stewards."

The archery season is just one facet. Crossbow, muzzle-loader and youth deer hunting opportunities are part of the overall season framework. But it is the modern gun deer season in November that drives the harvest, accounting for 70 percent of the total harvest last season.

"We've been setting archery records nearly every year and every month, so we're seeing more interest in archery hunting," Jenkins said. "But we're still a modern gun-dominated state and

weather is the biggest key in that."

The modern gun season opens statewide Nov. 12, 2016, and spans 16 consecutive days in Zones 1 and 2 and 10 consecutive days in Zones 3 and 4. There are 43 counties assigned Zone 1 status after the addition of Hardin and Webster counties this season. In another zone change, Marion County is now a Zone 2 county.

Herd health assessments are underway and results are not yet available from the annual statewide mast survey. Hunters should take into account the availability of hard mast as the season progresses.

"Traditionally, when you have good mast years, we usually see a decline in the harvest from the previous year mainly because of a change in feeding habits," Jenkins said. "They're not coming to corn feeders and they're not coming to green fields. They're in the woods."

"I don't know what the mast results are going to show, but in speaking with our staff and seeing for myself in the field, it looked pretty good. We'll see."

Hunters must check the animals they harvest and can do that by phone at 800-245-4263 or online at fw.ky.gov. The telecheck process will include some new questions this year. Hunters checking an

antlered deer will be asked to enter the total number of antler points that are at least one inch and indicate if the outside antler spread is less than or greater than 11 inches. Those checking an antlerless male will need to distinguish if it is a male fawn (button buck) or if the animal has already dropped its antlers.

The additional data will help biologists, Jenkins said.

"What we're looking to do is obtain additional age data, something that indicates how old that harvested animal is," he said. "For all of the population models that we do, we need to know approximate age in the harvest. Additional age data allows us to better predict the standing crop and the age of our herd. That in turn helps us be more efficient managers of the herd."

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife owns, leases or manages more than 80 wildlife management areas across the state for public use. Some require a user permit, hold quota hunts or have special regulations for deer hunting.

"We've been able to add a significant amount of acreage in recent years," Beam said. "As a result, hunters now have more high-quality public hunting opportunities across the state."

The department is working with partners to further expand the

amount of public land available for hunting. One recent addition is the new 2,900-acre Rockcastle River WMA in eastern Pulaski. Presently, it is closed to the public while Kentucky Fish and Wildlife makes improvements necessary for public use.

The Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide, available on the department's website and wherever licenses are sold, is a valuable resource for hunters. It includes the full list of fall hunting and trapping season dates, summarizes hunting and trapping laws, and provides information about public lands hunting by region, youth hunting opportunities, hunter education requirements and quota hunts.

There are 30 quota hunts to choose from this year. New this year is an archery and crossbow only quota hunt at Big Riv-

ers WMA and State Forest in Crittenden and Union counties. Hunters may apply for quota hunts via the department's website or by calling 877-598-2401. The application period runs the entire month of September.

Hunters are reminded to ask and obtain permission before hunting on private property and to report game violations by calling 800-25-ALERT. Callers are asked for the county that they are calling about and forwarded to the nearest Kentucky State Police post, which dispatches a Kentucky Fish and Wildlife conservation officer.

"We've had a really wet spring and a wet summer so far with lots of food available. That just equals healthy deer," Jenkins said. "Anecdotally, it looks good across the state. Our data also supports that assertion."

Kentucky's jobless rate drops to five percent in June 2016

Kentucky's seasonally adjusted preliminary unemployment rate for June 2016 dropped to five percent from a revised 5.1 percent in May 2016, according to the Office of Employment and Training (OET), an agency of the Kentucky Education and Workforce Development Cabinet.

The preliminary June 2016 jobless rate was 0.3 percentage points lower than the 5.3 percent rate recorded for the state in June 2015.

The U.S. seasonally adjusted jobless rate for June 2016 was 4.9 percent, according to the U.S. Department of Labor.

Labor force statistics, including the unemployment rate, are based on estimates from the Current Population Survey of households. It is designed to measure trends rather than to count the actual number of people working. It includes jobs in agriculture and those classified as self-employed.

In June 2016, Kentucky's civilian labor force was 1,973,887, a decrease of 6,448 individuals compared to the previous month. Employment was down 4,559, and the number of unemployed decreased by 1,889.

"Our unemployment rate is at a reassuring five percent," said economist Manoj Shanker of the OET. "For all practical purposes we are right at the national average. But our low labor force participation rate is still ranked near the bottom among the states."

In a separate federal survey of business estab-

lishments that excludes jobs in agriculture and people who are self-employed, Kentucky's seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment increased by 1,800 jobs in June 2016 from the month before and was up 22,500 positions since June 2015.

"June's job report showed a sharp pick-up, especially when compared to the tepid performance in April and May when the number of jobs shrank on a monthly basis," said Shanker. "Though average weekly earnings have softened considerably across the board, especially when compared to last year."

Nonfarm data is provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Current Employment Statistics program. According to this survey, seven of Kentucky's 11 major nonfarm North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) job sectors registered gains in employment, while four declined from the previous month.

The construction sector jumped by 1,300 jobs in June 2016 from a month ago. Since June 2015, construction jobs have risen by 800 positions.

"The strong upward movement in construction jobs was accompanied by an almost five percent increase in hourly earnings in response to demand for workers in heavy and civil engineering projects," said Shanker.

Kentucky's professional and business services increased by 1,100 positions in June 2016 from a month ago. Year-over-year, there was a gain of 3,400 jobs. This category includes establishments engaged in services that support the day-to-day activities of other organizations, including temporary employment services and payroll processing.

Employment in the other services sector, which includes repairs and maintenance, personal care services, and religious organizations, grew by 900 positions in June 2016 from a month ago.

This sector has decreased by 500 jobs from a year ago.

The financial activities sector expanded by 600 jobs in June 2016 from a month ago. The sector has added 2,800 jobs since last June.

The educational and health services sector added 400 positions in June 2016, and there was a robust gain of 8,700 jobs from a year ago.

The government sector, which includes public education, public administration agencies and state-owned hospitals, rose by 200 jobs in June 2016 but lost 3,100 positions compared to last June.

The information sector gained 100 jobs in June 2016. This segment has declined by 1,400 positions from a year ago. The industries in this sector include traditional publishing as well as software publishing; motion pictures and broadcasting; and telecommunications.

"Despite the slight uptick in June, the industry has been in a slow decline for almost eight years, as the traditional media tries to figure out how to be profitable in an ever-changing landscape of electronic news and entertainment," said Shanker.

Kentucky's manufacturing sector declined by 100 jobs in June 2016 compared to the previous month. Since June 2015, employment in manufacturing has increased by 2,500. Durable goods account for two-thirds of the manufacturing sector and grew by 3 percent from a year ago with the addition of 4,600 jobs, whereas nondurable goods lost 2,100 jobs over the year.

Employment in the mining and logging sector decreased by 300 jobs in June 2016 from a month ago. The industry has de-

clined by 2,900 positions from a year ago.

Kentucky's trade, transportation, and utilities sector fell by 1,000 jobs in June 2016 from a month ago. This is the largest sector in Kentucky with nearly 400,000 jobs accounting for one-fifth of all nonfarm employment. Since June 2015, this sector has expanded substantially with a gain of 10,500 jobs. Retail trade added 100 jobs over the previous month, and expanded by 6,900 jobs over the year while transportation and warehousing lost 1,100 jobs from a month ago but gained 3,600 positions over the year.

The leisure and hospitality sector dropped by 1,400 jobs in June 2016 from a month ago. Since June last year, the sector has added 1,700 jobs. This sector includes arts, entertainment, recreation, accommodation, and food services.

Civilian labor force statistics include nonmilitary workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

Kentucky's statewide unemployment rate and employment levels are seasonally adjusted. Employment statistics undergo sharp fluctuations due to seasonal events, such as weather changes, harvests, holidays and school openings and closings. Seasonal adjustments eliminate these influences and make it easier to observe statistical trends. However, because of the small sample size, county unemployment rates are not seasonally adjusted.
