

35th Annual Minden Bandfest Oct 18

PRESS RELEASE

October 18, 2025 marks the 35th year of the Minden Bandfest, sponsored by the Minden Chamber of Commerce. The event started in 1991 after Phil Fahrlander, a long time Mlnden band director, approached Todd Jensen, who was the incoming President of the Minden Chamber of Commerce, with the idea to start a parade and field competition.

"Phil felt if it was done right it could fill a need out there, while also bringing a great event to Minden," said Todd, who has continued to serve as the Bandfest coordinator every year of the event.

Eight bands participated the first year, and that number soon began to grow. In recent years, there has been as many as 42 bands marching through the streets of Minden. This year 37 school marching bands are expected to attend.

"We attract bands from across a wide area of the state, and many have told me it's their favorite event," said Todd. "We are unique because the focus is totally on them, and they enjoy the friendly atmosphere."

The bands will march by class, with the Junior High bands starting the parade off at 1:00pm. Lining up on West First Street, the bands march onto Brown Avenue where they perform for the judges at Fourth and Brown before returning to the school again via Fifth Street. Parade awards follow at Kuper Field with the field competition immediately after that.

The field competition gives the bands going onto the NSBA state marching competitions one last chance to be critiqued before the state competitions. The bands are scored by a group of three judges. They judge music, marching ability and overall presentation, as well as their creativity, precision, uniformity and entertainment value. This year's judges are Janet Palmer of Holdrege, Dave Klein of Kearney, and Paul Ramp of Friend.

Todd says Phil knew what he was talking about all those years ago. "It's not only filled a need, but it makes for a big day for Minden and the Chamber of Commerce.





Kearney County Courthouse Survey

Kearney County is asking residents to complete a survey to help determine next steps regarding the courthouse dome repair.

The project began with an assessment of rust on the interior and exterior of the courthouse tower. It was immediately clear the scope of the project would be well beyond that of a standard paint job. The tower has insufficient ventilation and condensation occurs frequently. Rust exists on most of the horizontal steel connections as well as many of the vertical joints. Because of the unique structural system, utilizing the exterior skin as support, removing and replacing rusting structural components becomes dangerous to the structure.

City Council Met Oct 6 Fire Safety at

The Minden City Council made guick work of the agenda during the October 6 regular meeting.

Second reading of ordinance 1306 authorizing the issuance and sale of bond anticipation notes not to exceed \$700,000 for the K Road paving project was quickly approved. There was no changes on the matter from the previous meeting to report.

A bid opening for the project was held on Sep-

tember 24 with six bids submitted. The engineer's estimate was \$602,000. Nielsen Contracting submitted the lowest bid at \$464,673. The council approved the bid from Nielsen Contracting for the K Road paving project.

State statute allows for deferral of special assessments on agricultural land. Dave and DeAnna Anderbery, owners of agricultural land adjacent to the K Road paving project, have gone through the necessary steps and submitted an application for deferral of special assessment. The council approved the Anderberys' application for deferral of special assessment.

With the holidays just around the corner, the council took action on employee appreciation gifts. Full-time City employees will receive \$100 chamber bucks and regular part-time employees will receive \$50 chamber bucks. All City employees and volunteer firemen will also receive gift certificates for a ham or turkey from Mason's Market.

Longshot Property Development was approved for a \$100,000 loan from the Minden Revolving Loan Fund last October with a 12-month deferment on payments for the commercial space in the Zu Haus Flats building. The space will not be ready by the time payments are scheduled to begin due to construction delays. Owners Jacob and Emily Rafert requested an additional two months of deferment to allow time for the build out and the tenant to begin leasing the space. The council approved the extension to allow for repayment to start on January 1, 2026.

Police Chief Jarvis Kring told the council the department's current body and dash camera system is outdated and no longer supported by Watchdog. This has presented complications as the cameras shut off in the middle of investigations creating a liability for the City and the officers. The City received a quote from Axon Enterprises for new body and dash cameras for \$109,111.80. This expense has been budgeted and the company is highly recommended. The council approved the contract for the purchase to be paid over a five year period.

The council approved the City's comprehensive fee schedule as presented. There were no significant changes, but some cleaning up of language.

In other business the council: Approved minutes from the September 15 & 22 meetings. Approved bills and claims. Approved excused absence of Councilman Jack Yant. Approved special designated liquor license for Gutterz Fun Center LLC at the Kearney County Fairgrounds for a reception on 11-8-25 from 3:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m.

Kearney County District Court Clerk Resigns

Another long time employee of the County will be taking her leave after the new year. Clerk of District Court Jill Fritson submitted her letter of resignation to the Kearney County Board of Commissioners prior to the October 7 regular meeting.

Fritson has been employed by the County for 27 years. The board regretfully accepted her resignation effective January 31, 2026. The County will be accepting applications for a replacement to finish the 11 months that will remain in the current term.

County Attorney Melodie Bellamy had previously informed the board she would like to be removed as the IT contact person for the County. Bellamy informed the board Darin Haight is willing to take on this role, but had inquired if there would be financial compensation for the additional duties and requested a job description to outline expectations. The board discussed how best to proceed. Following the discussion the board determined Haight would be made head of the IT Committee and asked to keep track of the time commitment involved with this new position over the next ten months. The County will then build compensation for the duties into the next budget.

Highway Superintendent Joe Anderson submitted a snow plan to ensure everyone is on the same page with how snow removal will be handled this winter. The basic plan, as it has been in the past, is to begin plowing after the snow stops and to only salt approaches to major intersections and railroad crossings. This plan can be altered at any time as Anderson recognizes no two storms are the same. This plan provides a general guideline for snow removal that takes into consideration the time and cost associated with the work. The board approved the plan as presented.

Anderson also informed the board he had missed the deadline to apply for the grant utilized by the County every other year to host a tire cleanup. Rather than take on the full cost of tire disposal, the board determined the cleanup should be skipped for 2026. Residents can anticipate a tire cleanup in 2027 instead.

Jerry Berggren from Berggren Architects informed the board another wrinkle has presented itself in the courthouse dome tower restoration project. Berggren provided pictures of a floor/ceiling issue and explained this would need to be

remedied before the tower can be sealed off. Furthermore, these repairs may require the courthouse to be closed for a time. The framing involved needs to be cleared before a cost estimate can be determined.

County Assessor Jennifer Pittner informed the board the survey to gather public feedback regarding the dome restoration project will go live on October 15. The survey can be found at https://tinyurl.com/SaveChristmasCity or by scanning a QR code found on flyers that will be distributed throughout the county. Paper copies will also be available at the Kearney County courthouse and Jensen Memorial Library. Pittner will be working to get paper copies into the other communities in the county as well. The survey will close on November 15.

County Clerk Jenni Lupkes provided an update from

the Central District meeting. Funding cuts were announced at the meeting as well as changes in the distribution of property tax. The state will also be moving to a single license plate in 2029.

Before adjourning, the board discussed holiday gifts for employees. Chairman Brent Stewart will coordinate with Midwest Meats to create a meat bundle for County employees to pick up before Thanksgiving.

In other business the board: Approved September 16 minutes. Approved bills and claims, payroll, and hospital taxes. Approved September 2025 County Clerk and Clerk of District Court fee reports. Approved Sheriff quarterly report ending 9-30-25. Approved child support costs allocation plan. Appointed Jenni Lupkes as the County's registered NACO voter.

MPS Hosts Community Information Meetings

Minden Public Schools held the first of three informational meetings about a proposed \$27 million bond issue on October 8 at the Minden High School theater. East Elementary Principal Sandy Pohl welcomed attendees with a brief history of the 100 year old elementary school building and encouraged the public to take a similar attitude toward education and the future that residents had when the building was constructed.

Pohl explained the current building doesn't fit the physical needs of students and doesn't meet safety standards. Escalating maintenance costs are putting a strain on the district. Pohl also stated teacher retention is a concern due to the issues faced at the current facility.

Superintendent Jim Widdifield took over the presentation explaining what the district has done in the past two years since the previous bond failed. Improvements to C.L. Jones Middle School including a secure entrance remodel and roof, boiler, and electrical upgrades were included in the previous scope of work but have since been completed using special building funds. Similarly, high school parking has been expanded and a traffic study of the high school and middle school area has been completed. Widdifield said the new elementary school project will help ensure all facilities are effective and efficient as possible.

Matt Kreutzer from CMBA shared an overview of the project scope and changes from the previous proposal. With this project, the district is looking to create a K-12 site with the elementary located east of the middle school that allows the district to plan for future growth. The current elementary site is physically out of space restricting expansion. The proposed new elementary building would have secure entrances, be ADA compliant, and provide fire safety and appropriate tornado shelter that the current building lacks. Shared resources will also provide the district long term savings.

Cody Wickham from DA Davidson explained the neutral levy financing plan the district plans to use if the bond is approved. The plan includes redirecting special building funds from repairs and maintenance of the current elementary building to pay for the new building. Once the high school bond is paid off in 2034, the bond levy will be eliminated. Additionally, LB1107 gives Nebraska taxpayers a credit that reduces school property taxes by 30% for both general fund and special building fund on ag land and commercial and residential property. This credit helps lower the impact on taxpayers and provides long term financial stability for the district.

Wickham explained the school's total levy may go up to account for salary increases and inflation, but the bond levy will drop off after the current bond is paid off and the special building fund levy will stay flat through 2049 when the new bond will be paid off. If valuations stay steady or increase, the elementary bond could be paid off even sooner. The district will also have the opportunity to refinance the bond for further savings if interest rates improve.


Mike Kalb from BD Construction explained the purpose and role of the Construction Manager at Risk for the project. In addition to reviewing the architect's information and creating a detailed budget, the CMR helps bid the project and keep things on track while the work is being done. Kalb stated the market is as good as it has been since 2008 and MPS can expect competitive bid activity on this project.

Attendees were reminded the election will be held by mail with ballots mailed to registered voters between October 13-24. Completed ballots must be returned to the county election office by November 4 at 5 p.m. Completed ballots should be mailed back by October 27 in the envelope provided to ensure it arrives in time or they can be hand delivered to the local election office during business hours or put inside the election drop box outside the county election office. Residents may register online to vote by visiting nebraska.gov/apps-sos-voter-registration by October 17. The last day to register in person to vote is October 24.

Following the presentations, the floor was opened to questions. Questions ranged from clarifications regarding financing to what the district has planned for the current elementary building if the bond is approved. Several members of the public shared their frustration with the many proposed projects from the School, City, and County that could affect their taxes. School board members joined the presenters in answering questions posed by the public.

Answers to the questions asked during the meeting as well as additional information about the proposed project and bond can be found at mindenforward.org. Questions can also be submitted on that site. MPS will host two more informational meetings. On Friday, October 17 at 9 a.m. join the district for coffee and a self guided tour around East Elementary. On Thursday, October 23 at 7 p.m. a presentation of general information including finance options will be given at East Elementary.

Residents are encouraged to get the information they need to make an informed decision on the proposed bond issue.



"We are aiming to build on the successes of last year in the hopes of earning superior ratings at all of our parade and field show contests this Fall," Stubbs said.



Kearney County Extension News

Use it or lose it. I'm sure you have heard that phrase before. Sometimes it refers to knowledge, or muscle. If you don't regularly exercise you grow weaker over time at an accelerated rate. If you don't use a skill such as a foreign language, eventually you forget, so Use it or Lose it.

How does that equate to living in a rural community? It fits in many ways. During our work with the grocery store cohort with the Center for Rural Affairs, it was a common topic of the grocery stores that they wished that more people would shop in their stores. Use it or Lose it. These grocery stores are existing on very thin margins. Another couple of shoppers really do make a difference in their bottom lines. More shoppers means that they can continue to serve the community. Fewer shoppers means that they may no longer be a sustainable business and service in your community. Use it or Lose it.

Another community aspect would be the school system. Use it or lose it. How do you use a school? Have children, send them to school. School consolidations have happened throughout Nebraska. Do you think that these would be necessary if every school was filled to capacity with kids? Our enrollments are declining and because of this we consolidate schools because it is expensive to have 5 kids in a classroom or pay a superintendent for 50 children. Use it or Lose it.

Restaurants are another community asset where use it or lose it comes into play. Restaurants have significantly better profit margins on sales than grocery stores, but they still need customers. It is easy to find yourself only going out to eat when you are out of town. It seems that my family falls into that category many times. It is much cheaper to eat at home. Yet, if you want to continue to have the option of dining in your community, make an effort to support your local restaurants. Use it or Lose it.

The Extension Office is no exception. Use it or Lose it. The University of Nebraska – Lincoln Extension Office is provided to your county by the county and the University. The Extension Office may only have an office manager and an Extension Educator with a singular expertise in it, but they are able to bring other Extension Educators and University resources to any issue. The more used it gets, the easier it is to get continued funding. Extension has many programs including 4-H, Crops and Water, Ag Profitiability, Livestock, Horticulture, Food and Nutrition, Health, Rural Prosperity and Early Childhood. Every county has access to all of these programs. Whatever your community is facing, Extension can provide you with an expert. Use it or Lose it.

Rural Prosperity Nebraska is a piece of Extension. We currently have a couple of large areas of the state that have no local coverage. As budget cuts go through the University system, hiring has been slowed. Perhaps if the communities in these areas were clamoring for more RPN programming, the hiring would be completed. As an RPN team we just met and discussed our programming offerings. We cut or limited the rollout of many programs because they sit unused, they are excellent programs, but no one asks for them. Use it or Lose it.

Norris John aka 'Norry' or 'Poke' Christensen



Norris "Norry" John Christensen of Minden was born to Martha and Chester Christensen who farmed east of Minden on October 25th, 1925. Norry died on Tuesday, March 1st, 2022 at the age of 96. We as a family decided we would give our bodies to UNMC in Omaha for medical education. It has been three years and it's time for a Celebration of Life memorial service for Norry that will be held at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, October 24th, at the Bethany Lutheran Church in Minden, with a military service at the Minden Cemetery directly following. We will be celebrating the life and 100th birthday of a wonderful son, father, husband and a friend to all.

When Norry was 14 years-old, the almost impossible life of working a small farm during the dirty

'30s forced the Christensen family to move into Minden in 1939. Norry was baptized at the Christian Church in Minden on August 8, 1940. He was then confirmed into the Bethany Lutheran Church on December 18, 1955. I think wife Norma had something to do with that. Norry graduated from Minden High School in 1943 where he had become a very good athlete. He was contacted by area colleges and a couple minor league teams about playing baseball but as he was making up his mind. Uncle Sam came calling and Norry enlisted into the Navy and was stationed on the troop transport carrier the USS General E.T. Collins. Their assignment for the next three years was to distribute roughly 4,000 soldiers per trip to different fighting "Hot Spots" in the Pacific Theatre and then pick up all the wounded and dead on the way back to headquarters in Hawaii or the USA. When he wasn't dodging bullets, planes and torpedoes, he played on both the men's baseball and basketball teams in the service league. Norry attained the rating of 3rd Class Petty Officer and his main duty was fire control. When the war ended they were sent to collect troops that were still abroad. When finished with this enormous task Norry was decommissioned from the Navy in Seattle, Washington in 1946. He had traveled over 134,000 miles on his tour of duty.

When he returned to Minden he married Norma Jensen, the girl of his dreams since they started dating at the age of 14, and they remained sweethearts to the end. Through this marriage were born three boys: Robert, Mark and Jim. After returning from the war Norry had very little money so he found a job for awhile in house construction until he bought the milk delivery service in the Minden area from Vic Silvrants and it became "Norry's Delivery", and was the first pasteurized milk sold in Minden. The "Milk Man" continued delivering milk for over 20 years. During this time he continued to play baseball and basketball for Minden in the Kansas-Nebraska League and town team ball. Area teams would recruit him for tournaments and play-off games. Norry was a competitive golfer as well and had many thrilling tournaments against friends old and new. At times his temper got the best of him and at one tournament he was seen climbing a tree to retrieve his putter. He got pretty good at climbing trees.

In 1972 Norry and Norma were hired to run the Pioneer Village Motel. In 1982 they decided to visit their boys who all worked in or around Casper, Wyoming. They ended up staying for 11 years. They joined Our Savior's Lutheran Church and Norry became their "handy man/janitor" for the entire church and pre-school. They made a million friends and truly loved Wyoming.

Norry decided to retire and they moved back to Minden to rekindle old friendships

and live out the rest of their lives. He played a lot of golf, cheered on the Whippets and the Huskers every weekend, and enjoyed painting on canvas as well as houses. He did this well into his 80s and played golf until he was 92.

Norry also loved music, had a good voice and liked to sing. He sang in school and then in the Navy. He sang for the Bethany Lutheran Church choir, a barbershop quartet, and the Minden Chorus who were fantastic and entertained thousands in south central Nebraska and were loved by all who heard them sing. There were many things going on in Norry's life and these were but a few.

At the end of Norry's life he would sit by his picture window and gaze at the sky, the trees, his lawn, the neighbors working and playing outdoors, the kids coming and going to and from school and watching them play on the school playground. In his eyes you could see him looking back on 96 years of life. And what a life. I couldn't imagine a better father.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Chester & Martha Christensen, his wife Norma Jensen Christensen, his sister Luann and husband Roger Johnson, two sons Bob and Jim, his daughter-in-law Janet Christensen, his grandson-in-law Shawn Duncan, his great-granddaughter Kristian Duncan Morgan, and his childhood dog Rover, who after 90 years he still cherished and brought a tear to his eye when he told stories of their years and journeys together on the farm.

Family left to cherish his memory include his son and daughter-in-law John Mark & Jane (Jensen) Christensen of Minden; daughter-in-law Karla Fandry and husband Jim of Grand Island; granddaughter Heather Thesenvitz and husband Tom and their children Kylie, Tarah, Tucker Norris, Elizabeth, Max and Molly, and great-great grandsons Bently and Austin and great-granddaughter Amelia; granddaughter Megan Duncan and great-granddaughters Ariah and Madison; granddaughter Dana Fetters and her husband Donnie, and great-grandchildren Mary and her husband Alex, James, Ruth and Anna, all from Colorado; granddaughter Brooke Graham and husband Eric, and their children Elijah and Isaac; granddaughter Robin Mortenson and husband Ty, and their children Ryleigh and Brynlee; grandson Jon and wife Maddie and daughter Murphy; and daughter-in-law Eddie Christensen and son John, all of Wyoming. Also many Bogaard, Christensen and Jensen cousins in the USA and Denmark, as well as numerous friends.






Litchfield, Giltner and Silver Lake.



Electors voting in favor of the proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words "FOR such Bonds and tax" following the proposition.

Electors voting against such proposition shall blacken the oval opposite the words "AGAINST such Bonds and tax" following the proposition.

Ballots for early voting may be obtained from the County Election Commissioner's office.

By Mail Election

This election will be an election by mail. All registered voters residing within Kearney County School District 0503 (Minden Public Schools) in the State of Nebraska will receive their ballot by mail, and therefore, no polling places will be open for voting. Ballots will be mailed by the Election Commissioner not sooner than the 22nd day and not later than the 10th day before the election date of November 4, 2025 (between October 13, 2025, and October 25, 2025). Upon receipt of the official ballot, the registered voter shall mark it, seal the ballot in the identification envelope supplied with the ballot, sign the identification envelope, and comply with the instructions provided with the ballot.

Voter Registration Dead-

lines

The deadline to register to vote at an agency, online, with a deputy registrar, by mail, or delivered by an agent is the third Friday before the election date (October 17, 2025). The deadline for in-person registration is the second Friday before the election date (October 24, 2025), by 6:00 p.m. at the County Election Commissioner's office for the County in which the voter lives. Any voter who changes information on a current registration or registers to vote after the ballots have been mailed but before such in-person registration deadline will be given a ballot at the time of registration or change. Ballots for early voting may be obtained at the Election Commissioner's office of the County in which the voter lives.

Ballot Return Deadline

Voted ballots, sealed in the completed identification envelope and completed in accordance with the instructions provided with the ballot, must be delivered by mail, in person, or by an agent to the Election Commissioner. Ballots must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on November 4, 2025.
