New U.S. Postal Service Standards Leads to Snail Mail Delivery Delays

The headline for a news article in a 1942 issue of the Lowell Sun about slow mail delivery referred to the carrier service as 'snail mail'. Recent changes in United States Postal Service standards have many postal customers, including Minden Courier subscribers, wondering if the proverbial snail got lost en route as delivery delays become a more frequent problem.

For 250 years, the U.S. Postal Service has provided a vital service to every American community. As technology advanced, the postal service adapted in an effort to increase efficiency and improve delivery. While new forms of transportation and the implementation of automated sorting machines reduced delivery times, the invention of telephone, email, and other forms of communication have reduced the popular use of traditional mail while populations continue to grow. This trend has affected the financial stability and service of the postal service.

The 'Delivering for America' plan is the newest evolution of the U.S. Postal Service. The 10-year plan is meant to modernize postal network, restore long-term financial sustainability, improve service, and maintain organization. Service standard refinements outlined in the plan were implemented in two phases, the first on April 1 and the second on July 1.

While the changes in the Delivering for America plan are estimated to save the U.S. Postal Service at least \$36 billion during the next decade, the adjustments seem to have negatively impacted delivery times for periodicals like the Minden Courier.

Closing postal processing plants and consolidating smaller regional facilities into larger urban plants may provide the U.S. Postal Service significant savings, but these actions have also added to the distance a lot of mail travels before reaching its intended destination.

Furthermore, periodical mail is not considered first class which can lead to even longer delays when mail volumes are high or there are other disruptions in processing.

Here is the basic process of getting the Minden Courier from printing to subscribers' homes each week:

- 1. Newspaper bundles are delivered to the Post Office in Minden every Wednesday morning where they are sorted for local and outgoing delivery. Local deliveries are made usually by Thursday.
- 2. Outgoing bundles are transported to the Omaha Processing and Distribution Center including those destined for nearby communities like Axtell, Wilcox, Hildreth, and Upland.
 - 3. At the processing center, newspapers are sorted based on their destination.
- 4. The sorted periodicals are then transported to local post offices for further sorting for delivery by mail carriers.
 - 5. Mail carriers deliver the newspaper to their intended destination.

This process can be delayed at any point by weather, transportation issues, labor shortage, system malfunctions, mail volumes, or natural disasters.

In an effort to try and shorten delivery time for our Kearney County subscribers, the Minden Courier recently began delivering bundles bound for Axtell and Wilcox directly to those local Post Offices. By the decrease in subscriber phone calls asking where their paper is, we assume this has helped our most local readers receive their news in a more timely fashion. We hope to add the Hildreth Post Office to this new delivery plan soon.

For those subscribers outside of Kearney County, we humbly apologize for continued delivery delays. We are currently at a loss for how to address this problem beyond county lines. That's not to say we don't care or that we've given up. We love to share news of what's happening in Kearney County with readers near and far.



Connections Create Community

When asked what they love about their hometown, do people say, "rigidity?" What about, "no one invites me to get involved?" Or "we don't like new ideas?"

None of those are likely responses to that question – thank goodness! Instead, we are more likely to answer that we love our community's tight-knit connections, our creativity, our tenacity, and, most of all, our neighbors.

The next generation of Nebraska leaders understands this deeply.

Earlier in June, I had the pleasure of being invited to the first ever Youth Connection Summit in McCook, hosted by a group of amazing, civic-minded high school students. The group, Youth Change Reaction (YCR), is the youth engagement branch of McCook Community Foundation Fund, the local Nebraska Community Foundation (NCF) affiliated fund. Students approached both MCFF and NCF about hosting an event in McCook for their peers across the state.

From the beginning, YCR members led the conversation and held decision-making power. During their planning discussions, they collectively uncovered the invisible

asset that brings all communities together: relationships. In recognition of the ties that bind us to our places, they decided to name their event "Connections Create Community."

Among the vine-laden brick of Norris Alley, YCR members welcomed students from Bertrand, Columbus, Grant, Howells, O'Neill, Callaway, Spencer and Verdigre. Before a walking tour of downtown McCook, summit guests paired up with a new acquaintance and shared their names, where they were from and one thing they loved about their hometown. In these conversations, a common thread emerged. Attendees noticed that their conversation partners began their responses talking about their place in terms of physical assets, but quickly shifted the focus to the power that relationships have to charge our spaces with meaning and significance. To quote one YCR member: "connection is the reason we love our communities."

Those informal conversations informed the rest of the summit. Stories enrich our lives with meaning and purpose; our shared stories imbue our places with value. A town without stories is hardly a place at all. "Connections create community" resonates deeper than maybe even YCR considered. A building without stories is a collection of neatly stacked bricks; with stories, that same building becomes something more. It becomes a community treasure, a place where people made and continue to make memories. It's the stage for deeper connections.

When attendees were asked what they love about their hometown, they spoke about tight-knit communities, proximity to family and a feeling of unity. Many also mentioned that their hometowns are more than buildings. Community shines first because people share their gifts with one another. That's the special sauce.

It can be intimidating to share our talents with our neighbors. That's why Nebraska Community Foundation is celebrating "The Year of Invitation" in 2025. We're encouraging all Nebraskans to invite newcomers to be in community with us. Or to invite someone who left to come back to their hometown. Or invite a young person to get involved. Or invite your friends and neighbors to invest in the future.

Remember, however, that invitation and action should never venture far from one another. Without action, an invitation risks losing meaning. And when an invitation loses its meaning, the invitee loses trust. But when an invitation is fully realized, doors are opened to stronger bonds and bolder ideas. The high school students in YCR were not just invited to sit at a table; they were called to unleash their ideas for their

community. The invitation was not performative, and neither is YCR's work. It's joyful, hopeful, and fueled by a love for their hometowns.







Closing out the week before 4th of July, was a home matchup against Ogallala that First Bank prevailed by a score of 4-1. The matchup lacked fireworks compared to




Janice retired a year and a half ago and was enjoying her free time. Janice loved to cook and bake. She was always looking for a reason to try out a new recipe that she recently found.


Lloy Dean cared deeply about his family, his church, and his many friends in Axtell and the surrounding area. He will be missed and fondly remembered by all who knew him.
