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Council opts for a mayor special election

Since former Lincoln City Mayor Dick Anderson's decision to resign on Dec. 14, the city council has been stewing on how to fill the vacant position. On Jan. 11 the decision was made.

The Lincoln City city council has two options to fill the mayor position: by appointment or through a special election. After the oath of office ceremony that swore in councilors Diana Hinton, Riley Hoagland, Judy Casper and Anne Marie Skinner, the new six member council made their first official decision as a council.


Councilor Hinton opened up the discussion straight away by expressing her support for an appointment.

"After reviewing our charter and listening to council members and consulting the League of Oregon Cities attorney on a couple of occasions about all of this, and just doing some hard thinking about it, I'm ready to move to appoint Susan Wahlke to the mayor position," Hinton said. "I have a lot of reasons why."

During the 2018 election for Lincoln City mayor, Wahlke lost to Dick Anderson by a mere 16 votes. With an extensive list of qualifications and the fact that she was runner up for the mayor position two years ago, Hinton made the motion to appoint Wahlke to the interim mayor position. Casper made a second to that motion.

Councilor Mitch Parsons pumped the brakes on the motion during the council

Man indicted on alleged murder

On Jan. 14, a Lincoln County Grand Jury indicted Waldport resident, Jack E. Sigler, 52, on charges of Murder in the Second Degree, four counts of Burglary in the First Degree and one count of Theft in the First Degree in connection with the death of Mark Campbell on

Dec. 6, 2020 in Waldport. On Dec. 6, 2020, Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies responded to the report of a burglary in progress at 1680 S. Crestline Drive, Apartment #3, Waldport. Upon arrival, deputies found Campbell unresponsive inside the apartment. Campbell was subsequently pronounced deceased at the scene. The cause of death was determined to be severe trauma received from multiple stab wounds.

Campbell was a long-time member of the Waldport City Council and a local businessman who co-owned the Crestview Golf Course in town.

The Lincoln County Major Crime Team conducted an extensive investigation into the death of Campbell. Multiple witnesses were interviewed, physical evidence was gathered from several locations and submitted to the Oregon State Police Crime Lab for forensic analysis. On January 13, 2021, the Oregon State Police Crime Lab completed forensic analysis on physical evidence submitted, a Grand Jury proceeding was scheduled for the following day. The Grand Jury returned with an indictment on the listed charges.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office received assistance in the criminal investigation from the Oregon State Police Criminal Investigation Unit (CID), Oregon State Police Forensics, City of Newport Police Department, City of Lincoln City Police Department and the Lincoln County District Attorney's

Sheriff Curtis Landers would like to personally thank all the agencies involved in the investigation leading to the indictment in the tragic death of Campbell. Sheriff Landers expresses his sincere condolences to all those affected by this tragedy in our community.

Further information regarding the investigation/prosecution of this case should be directed to the Lincoln County District Attorney's Office.

NLFR lawsuit resolved, chief announces

North Lincoln Fire and Rescue (NLFR) Chief Rob Dahlman announced last week the sexual harassment and retaliation lawsuit filed in 2019 has officially been resolved.

In July of 2019, former firefighter Phillip Rilatos filed a lawsuit against the NLFR claiming he was sexually harassed and then retaliated against after he complained. Rilatos alleged he was terminated by the department in April 2019 as retaliation for reporting the harassment.

During the regularly scheduled Jan. 13 NLFR Board meeting, Chief Dahlman said he had receive a document from special districts insurance that closes out the Rilatos claim against the fire district. Dahlman said the resolution is that all

Oregon adjusts vaccine distribution plans

On the heels of learning that Oregon will not be receiving the shipment of vaccines from the federal reserve it had expected, state plans to vaccinate school staff and seniors ages 65 and older have changed.

Instead of opening vaccination eligibility to those groups on Jan. 23, school staff will be eligible for vaccination starting Jan. 25 and only seniors over age 80 on Feb. 8.

On Tuesday, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azal announced the full reserve of vaccines would be released to states and encouraged state leaders to expand vaccine eligibility. Brown and other state officials learned last night that Oregon and other stated will not receive increased shipments of vaccine, "because there is no federal reserve of doses," she said.

In a press conference today, Gov. Kate Brown said the discovery that Oregon would not be receiving the expected shipment of vaccine doses from the federal government was shocking, and called it "deception on a national

"I am shocked and appalled that the federal government would set an expectation with the American people on which they knew they could not deliver - with such grave consequences," Brown said. 'While the Trump Administration pulled the rug out from under us like a cruel joke, let me assure you that Oregon's priorities, my priorities, have not changed."

Instead of opening vaccination eligibility up to all residents over the age of 65, the eligibility criteria for seniors will be divided into four waves. The first wave will open up to seniors ages 80 and older starting Feb. 8.; the second wave opens up to people over 75; the third to people over 70; and the fourth phase to people over 65.

Specific dates on when the second, third and fourth phases may begin was not specified.

Part of the reasoning behind prioritizing teachers and school staff before seniors is due to the

size of the two groups and the ongoing push by Brown to resume in-person classes.

"I made the decision to prioritize our educator personnel because I am absolutely committed to getting our children our stu-

dents back into the classroom as quickly as possible," Brown said.

Pat Allen, director of the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), estimated there are approximately 100,000 people in Oregon who work in school settings, and an

estimated 800,000 people in the state age 65 or older.

'While we want to vaccinate seniors as soon as we can, our ability to immunize this vulnerable population depends on getting enough doses from the federal government," Allen said. "We must have the supplies we've been promised.'

Brown said vaccinating school staff is expected to take around two weeks, and Allen said original plans estimated it would take around 12 weeks to vaccinate seniors ages 65 and older with the expected vaccine shipment from the federal government.

While it seems that no official dosage numbers were promised by the federal government, Allen said the state was expecting between 135,000-225,000 additional doses of both the Pfizer and Moderna

Approximately 2.8% of the state has been vaccinated thus far, Allen said. To reach community immunity, between 70% to 80% of the state needs to be vaccinated.

It amends ORS 3.041 and requires that these vacancies must be filled by persons who are residents of or have principal offices in the judicial districts to which they are appointed or adjacent judicial districts.

whether we were going to pick somebody. Now we're in a situation where we've decided who we're going

to pick."

Hinton then explained her motion by citing the previous election for mayor two years ago and saying that she thoroughly evaluated all of Wahlke's qualifications, which included serving on city council, as council president and serving on several community and city boards and committees. Hinton said it would be hard to find someone who would have better

qualifications for mayor. "We've already gone through the election process, people did speak at that time and votes were cast and counted," Hinton said. "Susan Wahlke was within 16 votes of Dick. That's a pretty good showing of how the people of Lincoln City feel about her as being mayor."

Councilor Rick Mark agreed that Wahlke would be an excellent candidate for the position, but in light of recent events, he felt now would be the time

for a special election. "We just witnessed the horror last week of lawless mobs of people who were fighting democracy, opposed to democracy at the state capitol and the U.S. capitol," Mark said. "I'd like to send a message to the Lincoln City residents that we are very much supporters of letting the people have a voice and

the democratic process." The newest councilor, Skinner, echoed councilor Mark's statements in that Wahlke would be a great fit for the position, but also said she would be in favor of an election.

"Given what I have heard from constituents in Ward II, and also along with what councilor Mark said in light of the events that have transpired in the last week, I think it behooves us more than ever to be as democratic as possible and that is a special election," Skinner said.

With no further comments made, the council voted down the motion to appoint Wahlke as mayor with a 4-2 vote, (Hinton and Casper voting in favor).

Parsons then made a motion to hold a special election in May 2021. It received a second from Hoagland and after no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Immediately following the decision, the council reserved time for public comments. Among citizens on hand to speak was Wahlke, who had to adjust her written comments as she expected to speak before council made their

final decision. Wahlke reminded council they would be electing a council president during the meeting and wanted them to take the decision seriously as the council president will fill the role of mayor until one is elected in May. Later in the meeting, the council voted unanimously to keep Casper as

council president. Wahlke also made note of saving that an appointment was made in 2015 for a vacated council position, which happened to be Dick Anderson. The term was about 3 1/2 years, and this mayor position is roughly 18 months. However, she expressed her interest in running for mayor again.

"As Diana said, I ran against Dick and lost by 16 votes, and I'm ready to run again," Wahlke said. "I have my (campaign) signs and I'm ready to file as soon as I can."

Ted's wife, Star Johnson, also grew up in Dallas. After a career building circuit boards and working in a lumber mill, she decided to retire, until Ted convinced her to do L&L's bookkeeping. "As you can see, I'm still here," laughs Star, who took over management of the business after Ted's death and purchased the remaining shares of the company from Ted's uncle, George Jr., about a year ago.

Star has a refreshing business philosophy. "We're a mom and pa shop and proud of it," she says. "We run off of our reputation and treat everyone's equipment like it was our own. The best part about owning a family business is the freedom to take care of customers right." Ask the pros about L&L, who all seem to swear by the place, and they use words like "dependable", "reliable" and "loyal."

L&L stocks an enormous array of chainsaws, blowers, mowers, weed eaters, log splitters, generators, tools, parts, workwear and boots, representing lines including STIHL, Husqvarna, Honda, Briggs & Stratton, Carhartt, Georgia Boot, Danner, and Hoffman's Boots. L&L Master Mechanics service everything the company sells. Customers include municipalities, businesses, government agencies, as well as local families.

When the pandemic hit, L&L introduced contactless service, including pickup and delivery, for customers who wanted it. When business slowed, Star cut back the hours of the 6-person staff somewhat, first taking herself off the payroll, saying "my employees have people to support." But when congress rolled out Economic Impact Payments in April, a lot of folks bought power equipment with their stimulus checks and business at L&L gradually picked back up.

What also helped is that Jake Postlewait, L&L's banker at Oregon Coast Bank, called Star and said that he would submit an application for a Paycheck Protection Program Ioan. Within just a few days L&L received the funds, which Star used to keep her employees working. When PPP loan forgiveness became available, Jake took care of that too.

So why does a business in Dallas do all their banking at the coast? Star had initially contacted Jake on the recommendation of several of her customers. She loves the service that she receives and the fact that she can talk directly to a bank decision-maker whenever she has banking questions. In fact, she's now referred several of her friends to Oregon Coast Bank, saying "they do business the way we do."

So what's on the horizon for L&L Equipment? "When I finally really retire, my son, Eric Bufka, will take over, then hopefully my grandkids," explains Star. In the meantime, she has plenty of customers to tend to, stories to be shared, and trophies to be hung. And when it comes to taxidermy, Star tells everyone: "If your wife won't let you hang it at home, we'll put it up in the store."

FEMA finds new location for housing units

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In November, Lincoln County received word they would be approved for FEMA's Direct Temporary Housing solutions program, which included bringing transportable temporary housing units for victims of the Echo Mountain Complex fire in North Lincoln County.

These units can be used for up to 18 months from the date of the disaster declaration (Sept. 15, 2020 through March 15, 2022) while survivors continue to work on their long-term housing plans. In partnership with FEMA, Lincoln County and the City of Lincoln City identified a

property in North Lincoln County called the Fernwood development as a potential site for the mobile housing units

The City of Lincoln City signed off on a resolution authorizing for emergency operations uses of the property in December. However, FEMA identified several hurdles with the Fernwood property including uneven

terrain for the housing units, making sure the necessary utilities were available for the location and more.

Because of this, Lincoln City Attorney Richard Appicello announced at the Jan. 11 city council meeting that FEMA has 'walked away' from the Fernwood property and are in negotiations with property owners at another location.

"Before we reached an agreement with FEMA, they were talking to the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Indians and they have an RV Park property, which I believe is about 20 acres and is more suitable because it is flatter for the use that they are asking for," Appicello told the City Council last week.

Appicello said the Logan Road RV Park is on tribal property near the Chinook Winds Casino in North Lincoln County and that FEMA is still in negotiations with the tribe for the housing units. The city council voted on a resolution authorizing the emergency operations uses of the property subject the agreement between the tribe and FEMA.

Councilor Diana Hin-

ton, who has been closely following the project with FEMA representatives, thanked FEMA for their hard work on this ever-changing project and acknowledged the fact that their were a lot of hassles that involved the Fernwood property.

"That was an exercise that didn't pay off, but we tried," Hinton said.

Councilor Rick Mark said the RV park seemed like a way better option than the other property since all other utilities are already in place and asked how it came about and why it wasn't presented earlier. Hinton said she presented FEMA with the idea early on but the option wasn't presented to the decision makers from FEMA until later on.

"There's a disconnect somewhere and that's with FEMA, because they were aware of this site," Hinton said. "I suggested it as one of the early options but it's okay, everything's fine and moving along."

The city council unanimously voted to pass the resolution.


Scheduling instructions are available at samhealth. org/GetTheVaccine. This web page also includes a list of individuals and positions who are eligible, paperwork to be completed before the appointment and directions for the day of the vaccination appointment

The paperwork will also be available at the event, but it will reduce wait times significantly if the patient brings the filled-out paperwork to the event.

The vaccine has been reported up to 95% effective at preventing illness with COVID-19. Samaritan infectious disease specialists, as well as leadership from Samaritan and the county health departments, highly recommend everyone get the vaccination when it is available to them.
