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Soccer coach sees potential growth for the game in LC

It's no secret that soccer is a big deal in Lincoln City.

And after the Taft 7-12 boys soccer team made it all the way to the semifinals of the State Playoffs this past fall, head coach Ryan Ulicni started thinking even bigger for the town's soccer program.

For the past five years, Ulicni has been drafting an idea to create a non-profit organization that would provide year-round soccer to the community, and build an indoor soccer arena to support it. After his successful second season with the Taft Tigers, Ulicni got to work and created his non-profit group titled 'Sand Tigers Inc.' It was the first step in what he first began dreaming of before coming to Lincoln City three years ago.

"Moving from Pendleton, Ore., where soccer is kind of nonexistent, it's very hard to pitch this kind of a plan," Ulicni said. "I still worked on it, still wanted to do it and everybody thought it was a great idea, but there just wasn't any support. Here, there is the support. There are people behind it that would love to see this happen. I'm doing the work and I think it's going to pay off in the

City approves food truck, pod ordinance

In November, the Lincoln City City Council worked through a draft of an ordinance that permitted food trucks or 'mobile food units and mobile food pods,' to be able to operate within the city limits. After several discussions between both the council and the Lincoln City Planning Commission, the City has reached an agreement to approve the ordi-

The City Council held a public hearing meeting on Feb. 10 to discuss the final details of the ordinance. The Planning Commission submitted their final recommendation for the ordinance on Jan. 7 and after looking over the packet, several councilors had concerns about some of the nuts and bolts of the provisions.

One of the concerns was regarding the Commission's recommendation to prohibit the operation of class one and class two mobile food units, which sell pre-packaged items, such as the operation of non-profits like the Taft Boosters.

"They're not selling cooked food, so we're eliminating their ability to fundraise essentially... I'm not in support of that," Councilor Riley Hoagland said.

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Oregon Coast Community College achieves independence

OREGON COAST COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Oregon Coast Community College is now an independently accredited institution.

On Tuesday, Feb. 4, the college was informed of the decision by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities. OCCC hosted a celebration sharing the news on Thursday, Feb.

The 33-year-old college serves Lincoln County through its locations in Newport, Waldport and Lincoln City. OCCC students pursue Health Care, Aquarium Science, Teaching, Early Childhood Education, Associates, and Transfer degrees at Oregon Coast, along with Adult Basic Education and numerous other certificate and degree programs.

"Up until this year, every diploma earned by the students at Oregon Coast over the past three decades bore the name of an 'accrediting college,' through which Oregon Coast delivered instruction," said OCCC President Dr. Birgitte Ryslinge.

Since 2014, OCCC gradu-

ates earned diplomas and credits from Portland Community College.

"Other small community colleges in Oregon followed the same path over their early decades," Ryslinge said. "Oregon Coast was the last community college in Oregon to lack its own independent accreditation."

In May 2004, Lincoln County voters approved \$24 million in bonds to build the college's North, Central and South County facili-

ties. Construction on those buildings was completed in 2009. In 2014, Ryslinge was named president of OCCC and was charged by the OCCC Board of Education with the task of leading the college to independent accreditation.

The process Ryslinge led involved many students, as well as every member of the staff and faculty at Oregon Coast over the past six years. Virtually every college system and process was

examined and improved. The work was documented through the submission of multiple reports and selfevaluations totaling thousands of pages of written reports and appendices.

During that time, the college also hosted two separate NWCCU teams comprised of community college presidents and deans representing institutions from throughout the Northwest. A complete history of the college's pursuit of independence can be found at oregoncoastcc.org/ accreditation.

What it means As an independently accredited institution, Oregon Coast Community College will manage processing and distribution of financial aid for its students, including work study. College credits will transfer as earned at OCCC, and the college will maintain its students' transcripts, streamlining the process students need to go through to request transcripts and other records when transferring to other colleges and universities.

The college will be able to set its own qualifications for faculty hiring (as opposed to following standards established at Portland Community College). Further, OCCC faculty will have control over selection of textbooks and materials most appropriate for their coursework, while also

Over 5,000 Oregonians, mostly from rural areas and representing jobs and businesses related to timber and agriculture, descended on the state capitol on the morning of February 6.

Lincoln City Mayor and State Senate candidate, Dick Anderson, stood alongside the current 12 Republican senators during

"This is an example where urban politicians have forgotten the rest of the state," Anderson said.

The rally was organized by #TimberUnity, as HB 2020, a Cap and Trade proposal, continues to be a priority of Democratic legislators. A similar version in 2019 was blocked when the Senate Republicans denied quorum and staged a boycott in the waning days of the 2019 session.

Senate Republican Leader Herman Baertschiger (R-Grants Pass) gave a dramatic

speech to the crowd at noon, citing the Battle of the Alamo as a reference to how the minority party has bought rural Oregonians time to make changes.

"We bought you the time... You bring the army... to change the makeup of this building," Baertschiger said in his opening introductions. "With us today is a candidate from the coast who will join us in the Senate soon, Dick Anderson."

Timber Unity is a grassroots organization that represents various industries in Oregon that would be negatively impacted by cap and trade, including forestry, transportation and agriculture. Cap and trade is a gas tax or environmental bill that could force businesses to move out of state and cost thousands of living-wage jobs, according to Baertschiger.

"It is an honor to meet the Oregonians who are part of the Timber Unity rally," Baertschiger said. "These are hard-working people who took the day off work to use their voices in a powerful way to stand against cap and trade. Today is a great day

On why he chose to attend the rally, Anderson said, "I think it is important that leaders from rural Oregon take the time to show up and make them remember us. On the coast we do not have the luxury of sacrificing workers' pay."

Opponents of HB 2020 believe the bill will force energy reliant employers to shed large numbers of family wage jobs and cost the average Oregon family hundreds of dollars more in energy costs per year.

Sinkhole north of Lincoln City causes traffic delays

You may have recently noticed a dip in the road during your morning commute from Otis to Lincoln City. Or perhaps you're wondering why traffic has been backed up along Highway 101 North of Lincoln City.

According to the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), the delay is due to an apparent sinkhole near milepost 106 on Highway 101, between Highland Estates and Cherry Hill Park.

"The sinkhole appears to have been caused by water under the road," ODOT Public Information Officer Angela Beers-Seydel said. "Crews excavated the road and did a temporary patch (Thursday, Feb. 6). Repairs were complete by 4 p.m., flaggers were on site directing traffic from about 8 a.m. to 4

On Friday, Feb. 7, crews returned to the site to continue work on hole. The southbound lane has been closed during working hours. ODOT said expect single lane closures with flaggers directing traffic. Delays of up to 15-20 minutes

or less should also be expected.

Beers-Seydel said they will be keeping a close eye on the site and will continue making repairs as needed before they make a permanent fix.

"Once the water level recedes some we will inspect and line or replace the failing culvert under the road, depending on conditions," Beers-Seydel said. "The road surface is still rough and there are signs. We will do more work on the surface when we have a better understanding of the conditions, tentatively early next

Work is scheduled during the

day, Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., through February 28, according to ODOT. You can visit the ODOT Tripcheck site at tripcheck.com to stay up to date on delays.

'There's still a significant bump from where we excavated and filled the sinkhole last week, so drivers should be cautious in the area," Beers-Seydel said. "We're still waiting for the water to go down enough to get back in there and look around. Then we'll be able to determine what's needed for a long term fix."

Coastal risks and land use policy create economic tradeoffs for armoring the Oregon Coast

An Oregon land use policy creates a large economic value for some private homeowners who are allowed to protect their shoreline against erosion, according to a new Oregon State University study.

The research directly informs policy on a contentious issue on the Oregon Coast - the tradeoff between a homeowner's ability to protect their private property and public access to Oregon's beaches, said Steven Dundas, corresponding author and economist in OSU's College of Agricultural Sciences and Coastal Oregon Marine Experiment Station.

The study, published in the Journal of the Association of Environmental and Resource Economists, also comes at a time when the future of coastal management in Oregon is up for discussion given the threats of sea-level rise due to climate change.

Oregon's Statewide Land Use Planning Goals inform mandatory and comprehensive land-use plans at the local level. Goal 18 sets rules for protecting beaches and dunes from development and reducing impacts from natural hazards, including a prohibition on "armoring" private property. Armoring the shoreline with sloped structures composed of large rocks slows down erosion on that property – but it has potential to change sediment flows, redirects wave action, and disrupts recreation access and aes-

Goal 18 exempts property from the restriction on shoreline armoring if it was developed or slated for development prior to Jan.

Winter storms routinely generate large ocean waves off the Oregon Coast, making bluff and dune erosion a common and irreversible occurrence. At the time of the study, 49 percent of Oregon's residential $ocean front\ property-4,628$ parcels — were eligible for armoring. Thirty-six percent were ineligible, and the remaining parcels were either state-owned or deemed undevelopable under other

'We found that vulnerable properties capitalize on this armoring option in a big way, Dundas said.

In their empirical analysis of the Oregon oceanfront housing market from 2004-2015, Dundas and co-author, OSU economist David Lewis, found that the option for armoring private property can increase the

value of vulnerable properties by 13 percent to 22 percent, but doesn't affect the value of properties that aren't vulnerable.

"Given the large economic value that is attached to the option to armor oceanfront property, our results indicate that the oceanfront land market expects low elevation land on eroding shorelines to be vulnerable to serious damage without armoring,'

Dundas said. While Goal 18 is aimed at protecting coastal resources from overdevelopment, ineligible properties adjacent to eligible ones sell for eight percent less due to the potential for increased damage from deflected wave action.


Dundas was a member of a focus group convened by the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development, which administers Goal 18. The focus group discussed the future of the policy during six public meetings in 2019 and submitted its final report in

Dundas and Lewis are faculty members in the Department of Applied Economics in OSU's College

of Agricultural Sciences. Funding for the study was provided by the National Ocean and Atmospheric Association's National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science Competitive Research Program, through its Cooperative Institutes Program.

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
The mission of Ulicni's nonprofit is to nurture the physical, mental and emotional growth of the youth through the sport of soccer. Teaching from grass roots level, up to advanced skill training.

After coaching the fall season, Ulicni came to the realization that their success was predicated on the dedication of the kids who have been working on their skills outside of the season, which is what kicked him into gear to start a year-round program.

"It really doesn't come down to my coaching, it comes down to is that small group of kids that have done things like this for years," Ulicni said. "They've taken advantage of every little program they could find that was within reach. But it was only a small core group of kids. If we had their whole class doing something like this we could start competing with the big boys,

Ideally, Ulicni said he would like to launch his year-round program in spring of 2021. For the program it won't just be a few games in the spring in summer. It will be full training sessions and competitive play.

"Kids can get the experience that they need, through skill lessons and those who are advanced, of course, we can make a travel team, still teach them, and take them to tournaments," Ulicni said.



The proposed soccer arena would be able to host the year-round soccer program that would be open to all ages and skill levels in the Lincoln City area.

The program also won't be limited to just high school players. It will include kids as young as 18 months and include adult divisions as well.

"There should be something for everyone," Ulicni said. "I'm even proposing a child development program. It's a little kickers program ranging from 18 month to nine years old. It's fantastic, parent inclusive and gets everyone involved."

According to Ulicni, Lincoln City currently has over 200 kids competing in the soccer program during the fall, just ages six through 14. During the offseason, several are playing other sports, but others aren't.

"There's no soccer right now," Ulicni said. "They cut the indoor

soccer season at the community center to extend the basketball season, which is fine. They still play once a week, but they aren't really learning. It's more of a recess kind of a feel.

"I'd like to include every age group, similar to how the Community Center operates now, because they do a lot of fantastic things. I would just keep the focus on soc-

The Facility

To help accomplish his goal, Ulicni has also drafted a plan to build an indoor soccer arena to accommodate the community during the cold, rainy season. The 300 ft by 150 ft facility would hold two fields, locker rooms and showers, a food court and several rooms.

"I could set up a small indoor arena that would host one field, one game at a time, and it wouldn't draw much attention," Ulicni said. "What I'm shooting for is a bit more of a reach, because it is like a youth community center. There's possibility for other sports to use it as well and train indoors.'

The size and space Ulicni has been scoping out can easily host two full teams inside and provide enormous possibilities for other community sports. Creating a single activity space would alleviate the pressure from other facilities and provide easier scheduling. Additionally, Ulicni said it would be easier to provide longer and more meaningful lessons for the kids' experience.

"In this program I would be getting coaches ahead of time and training them, and getting referees and training them," he said. "It would be more of a proper learning experience for everyone. I just want a better quality experience for the kids."

Currently, Ulicni is waiting for his 501(c)(3) application to be processed, and then he will be applying for grants. In the mean time, he's been getting out in the community and building support.

"Going out and getting the word out is what I've been doing," Ulicni said. "Going and talking to people, talking to businesses, talking to parents, I'm going to city council meetings, parks and

rec meetings. I'm just trying to get the whole community involved because I think it's something that will benefit Lincoln City."

Regardless of if he is able to build an indoor facility, Ulicni said a year round program is something he definitely wants to make happen in Lincoln City.

"In the spring we'd do additional training with just small games and we could do something in the summer that would be more play than training," Ulicni said. "We could make up a couple of teams and bring in other schools like Newport, or teams from Salem to play games."

Overall, the goal is to create opportunity for the kids in the community to play year-round, while also providing the best education and environment possible. Soccer has been a passion of Ulicni's his entire life. As a coach at every level and advocate of the game, he sees the potential of a full fledge soccer program in Lincoln City.

'I grew up in Chicago, and I played all year long and I got trained all offseason up until fall season... and fall season was where you put it together and you win," Ulicni said. "I would love to bring that here. It's totally possible to do just take somebody willing to do it. There is support, so I do believe it's possible."

Appicello noted that with a street vendor license, those non-profits would still be able to operate. The Council also disagreed with the terminology written by the Planning Commission that stated packaging for any food must be biodegradable, prohibiting any plastic or pre-packaged items.

"That would limit greatly what people will be able to sell," Hoagland said.

The Council then heard comments from the public, including food truck advocate Dan Clanton, the owner of The Grill 1646 restaurant. Clanton also operates a food truck in Bend and is very familiar with the rules and regulations regarding mobile food units.

Clanton also raised concerns about the Planning Commission recommendations, such as the class one and class two truck prohibitions. The second concern was the use of generators by mobile food unit. Clanton was in support of prohibiting external generators due to the noise they produce. His food units are able to operate at full capacity via a power cord and sees no need for an external generator.

Finally, Clanton touched on the kitchen requirements for these mobile food units, citing the fact that as the ordinance was stated, most food units would have to cook their food in a commercial

kitchen, then reheat it on their food truck.


"We don't have the infrastructure for that in Lincoln City," Clanton said. "There is a large number of families here that are operating in other markets, providing jobs in other cities and making money for other cities because this law is in place here.

We all want to come home. We want to bring our carts, bring our families and provide more jobs."

Mayor Dick Anderson brought up the concern of balancing brick and mortar restaurants paying property taxes while the mobile food units are not. Clanton countered by saying most restaurants are leasing property in Lincoln City, so they wouldn't be paying property taxes, only occupancy tax, which is what a mobile food unit would pay as well.

The Council continued discussions about prohibiting plastics and prepackaged items. The Councilors made the determination that the focus should be on packaging provided to the general public such as to go containers made of plastic or Styrofoam.

The Council decided to strike the class one and class two prohibition, prohibit plastic and Styrofoam packaging and prohibit external generators. After a vote, the Council voted unanimously to approve the ordinance with the changes made.

Lara explained that it would be unfair to transition students receiving financial aid between institutions mid-year, so students graduating in June 2020 will still earn PCC diplomas. Some of the OCCC students without financial aid packages, however, may have the option to receive the College's first-ever official diplomas in 2020.

"The name on a diploma may seem just symbolic," Lara said, "but to the OCCC community, it represents so much more. Not only does it reflect the unprecedented amount of hard work put in to get us here – work performed by our management team, our students, our staff, and our amazing

faculty – but it also calls out the commitment Lincoln County residents have repeatedly and consistently shown to their community college.

"The donors who have supported the college and its students, through gifts to the OCCC Foundation, are paramount examples of this support. On behalf of those donors and our entire OCCC family, we're extremely proud and excited, and we want our students and our community to share that pride and excitement. The 'Oregon Coast Diploma' is one of many ways they'll be able to do just that."

"For me, personally and professionally, this is the most meaningful accomplishment of my career," Ryslinge said. "I am deeply touched to be part of the history of this incredible college, and to have helped secure its place in Lincoln County, in Oregon, and nationally."

Oregon Senators react to President Trump's State of the Union, impeachment acquittal

United States President Donald Trump gave his 2020 State of the Union address Feb. 4 as he mulled through

several talking points. Sandwiched between President Trump's appeared snubbed handshake of U.S. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Pelosi ripping up a copy of his speech at its conclusion, the president spoke on the state of the economy, low unemployment statistics and Medicare for All. in President Trump's own self-dealing, attempting to use the power of the U.S. government to cheat in the

2020 election. Today, we face another key juncture in the great American story. May the path ahead be one of restored integrity and partnership in tackling the great challenges facing America."

Amanda Benjamin announces candidacy for Lincoln County Circuit Court

Amanda Benjamin was appointed as a Circuit Court Judge Pro Tempore by the Oregon Supreme Court in December 2018 and began working in that capacity for the Lincoln County Circuit Court on January 2, 2019. She has since remained in that role.

Lincoln County suffered a great loss with the medical leave and medical retirement of Judge Paulette Sanders, who, in addition to her many other responsibilities, was the juvenile dependency and delinquency judge.

When Judge Sanders began to take medical leave in early 2019, Benjamin stepped up to handle her docket despite this involving more responsibilities than are typically required of a pro tem judge.

"I did this because I recognized that Lincoln County needed a judge with knowledge of both criminal and juvenile law to provide consistency to these cases," Benjamin said. "I have been dedicated to making sure the courts run as smoothly as possible in her absence, but also to improving the courts in every way that I can in the process."

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


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HELP Families Connect brings more than 110 children to Compass Center

On Friday, January 31, the Lincoln County School District (LCSD) Compass Center for Youth and Families hosted the first annual HELP Families Connect.

This event was strategically held on the same day as Project Homeless Connect so that families could access services from both events.

Jan. 31 was a non-school day. Over 110 children and their parents/guardians came through the Center and represented 47 families. Families received information about resources available to them in The Compass Center for Youth and Families.

Resources including school supplies, books, socks and hygiene items were provided during the event. Families were also encouraged to participate in their children's educations by volunteering with LCSD.

"It has always been a desire to offer an event tailored to students and families that was similar to Project Homeless Connect providing information on services and distributing resources," HELP Program Coordinator Katey Townsend said. "Now that we have new space at the Compass Center for Youth & Families, it seemed like the perfect opportunity to launch HELP Families Connect."

There was something for everyone at HELP Families Connect. To attend, the only requirement was that you had children or students. Many of the families that came were looking for more information on school district resources or to check out the Compass Center. The Homeless Education & Literacy Project (H.E.L.P.) Program is housed at the

Compass Center and many families facing unstable housing came to the event.

"Since starting with the H.E.L.P. Program in 2010, I have seen a growing awareness in our community about the reality of student homelessness," Townsend said. "17 percent of our student population faced unstable or inadequate housing during the 2018-19 school year. Over the years the community has stepped up to provide and create critical resources for these families.

"Although there are still some gaps in services and not enough affordable housing, there are a lot of resources and programs we can guide families to in order to better their situation. Sometimes navigating the resources can be complicated or certain services are not on a family's radar, but we are here to help!"

HELP Families Connect was spearheaded by Jutta Pearce, the Community Connections Coordinator and AmeriCorps with LCSD. She led a group of volunteers from Roby's Furniture and Appliance and Toledo Foursquare Church's youth group to assemble supply bags. She recruited community volunteers to help set up at the event and distribute items.

"Jutta has done an amazing job of bringing the community together to help others," Townsend said. "She is also a major advocate for volunteerism in the schools and is paving the way for more parents and adults to get involved in supporting students' education."

Pearce said she was excited to see the community come in such large numbers to access resources here.

"We can continue to grow the resources and information available at The Compass Center with your help," Pearce said. "I am always available to help organizations or individuals learn more about partnering with LCSD to provide services for families."
