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NLFR board to make Dahlman full-time Fire Chief

After a heated debate, the North Lincoln Fire and Rescue (NLFR) Board of Directors decided to offer Interim Fire Chief Rob Dahlman a one-year contract to serve as full-time Fire Chief. On March

1, then NLFR Division Chief-EMS, Dahlman became the interim fire chief, effective until February 2020. At the Oct. 9 NLFR Board of Directors meeting, board members discussed several options for dealing with the pending opening at the Fire Chief position.

While several board members felt Dahlman was the right person for the job, considering the possible service merge with Depoe Bay Fire within the next year or two, others felt a new hiring process was in order.

"This board represents the taxpayers and the citizens of the district overall," Board Member Danny Curler said. "I'm recommending initiating a hiring process to find the best candidate for the position of Fire Chief, showing no favoritism on the

Surftides VRD expansion shut down by City

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At the Oct. 14 meeting, the City Council reviewed an application submitted in place, restricting the operation of vacation rental dwellings (VRD) to one per owner, the Cho family's application would've allowed them to use all four units in the twin duplexes as VRD's. "What we're asking is essentially just an expansion of the Surftides units to be able to use these

duplexes across the street as additional hotel units," said Adam Springer, the apLincoln City Planning Commission reviewed this application prior to the City City. Springer cited a city plan that states that there will be a 1,600 short-term unit need in the coming years.

The Lincoln City City Council made it clear on Monday night that there is a fine line between commercial and residential properties in the City, which is NW Jetty Avenue. That line is something the City Council will not be crossing.

Rock Creek Stables hops into Lincoln City saddle



It's all about the horses at the new Rock Creek Stables Equestrian Center in Lincoln City.

Formally known as the Green Acres Equestrian Center, the nearly 60-acre property at 2915 S Hill Rd., Lincoln City is under new ownership. Owner of Rock Creek Stables, Justin Alderman, has a background in software but a passion for horses. And that passion spurred the takeover of the large property behind the Lincoln City Outlets.

After signing the lease on Sept. 1, Alderman and his crew got right to work cleaning up the barn, which he said was long overdue.

"A lot of the stalls were very dirty, (the previous owners) allowed birds to nest, which did damage and there's just tons of dust," Al-

derman said. "There's years of build up and we want to make sure that's all cleaned up so it's not only presentable, but is considerate of our horses and our boarders... That's our number one priority."

With about 40 stalls in the barn available for horse boarding, Alderman and his crew has been power washing the stalls, replacing floor mats and stall boards and bringing the facility up to the Rock Creek Stables standard.

"We want to make sure

we can do what we can to elevate things and provide a good service," Alderman said. "To a lot of people, their horses are their family."

In addition to the 40 stalls in the barn, Rock Creek Stables has about 50 acres of usable pasture for the horses, as well as both an indoor and outdoor arena. Alderman said he hopes to utilize both arenas for equestrian related events in the future, especially the indoor facility.

"It can be used for a variety of events and being on the Oregon Coast, having this is probably the biggest asset because it allows people to ride and work with the horses even when the weather isn't great outside," Alderman said.

Out on the pasture, plans are already in place

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Longtime NLFR District Captain announces retirement

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After 23 years of dedicated service, North Lincoln Fire and Rescue (NLFR) Public Information Officer Jim Kusz is calling it quits.

"I'm announcing my retirement from the Fire Service effective Feb. 28, 2020," Kusz said at the Oct. 9 NLFR Board Meeting. "I am doing this over safety and ethical concerns."

Throughout his 23 years, Kusz has served as a Public Information Officer, Public Education Officer and District Safety Officer, as well as the liaison for the Community Emergency Response Team. He has been involved in numerous community education classes regarding safety and emergency preparedness, as well as community engagement events.

"My 23 years of service is coming sooner than I intended, but my morals and values which guide me lead me to this decision," Kusz said. "I have had the pleasure to serve the district, volunteers,

a.net importantly the public we serve."

Kusz asked the NLFR Board of Directors for their commitment and support in his ongoing programs and thanked the community and district.

Kusz Suspended

Newly appointed Fire Chief for NLFR, Rob Dahlman announced Oct. 14 that Kusz would no longer be serving as the Public Information Officer (PIO) for the district.

Dahlman stated that Kusz would remain the district's Public Education Officer and Safety Officer for the district.

"With Jim's announced retirement, the district is moving forward with a replacement for PIO duties," Dahlman said. "I appreciate the many years Jim has devoted to being the PIO for NLFR."

Dahlman also said that volunteer Captain Dennis Knudson would assume PIO duties with assistance from Fire Marshal Ed

Ulrich.

Kusz chose not to speak on the announcement.

Lincoln City City Councilor and wife of Jim, Diane Kusz said Jim had received a letter from NLFR stating that he had been suspended from the PIO position due to his comments made at the board meeting on Oct. 9.

"Jim has been doing his job, he does it fair, he does it well, he takes it serious and never applies his own feelings within his media releases," Diane said. "It's kind of a slap in the face in a sense because he has never let the district down. He has supported them over everything else and he may have a difference of opinion, but it's never in his press releases."

Diane, who was a member of the NLFR Support Team, a program started by Jim to help the fire district without being a firefighter, said she has resigned from her position within the program and is no longer personally involved with NLFR.

Music Is Instrumental receives \$10,000 grant from Oregon Arts Commission

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The Oregon Arts Commission recently announced that 19 arts organizations would receive a \$10,000 grant. Among them was the Lincoln City nonprofit, Music Is Instrumental.

The grant awards are used to support each program's educational projects in Oregon schools, all together totaling in \$190,000.

"We are delighted by the creativity and collaboration behind this year's applications, and are confident that the education of students around the state will be enriched as a result," said Arts Commissioner Michael Dalton, who chaired the review panel. "The variety of funded projects demonstrates the capacity in which the arts can help students learn."

Arts Learning grants are designed to: support highquality projects that provide a responsive opportunity for learning in and through the arts to benefit K-12 students; foster exchange of knowledge between artists and educators; and impact the achievement, skills and/ or attitudes of learners.

Applications were evaluated based on project quality and responsiveness, project support and project impact.

Music is Instrumental set a goal of giving all students access to music from kindergarten through 12th grade. This year they have achieved that goal by providing almost 1,200 students in Lincoln City with instruments. The program spent \$64,926 on 82 instruments, technology, supplies, repairs and technician time.

The Oregon Arts Commission grant will be used to support 333 hours of music instruction from expert technicians (retired musicians/educators) for K-12 students at three Lincoln City schools.

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

for major improvements such as re-fencing to provide protection to the horses. With 22 horses currently at the barn, Alderman said getting past boarders to see the big picture for the facility was a lot easier once they showed how much progress was being made.

"It's been challenging with some of our boarders, helping them understand that there are changes that need to be made, but ultimately everyone has been fairly receptive, especially now that they are seeing the action that's taking place and they're seeing that we are cleaning up, taking care of our staff and setting standards for what we want to see done," Alderman said.

Because of this, Alderman said they are already drawing interest from former boarders of the property.

"I think the fact that we are getting

previous boarders might indicate that they like seeing the progress we are making," Alderman said. "We hope to continue down that path."

Rock Creek Stables currently offers only long-term boarding, but according to Alderman, they will be looking at offering summertime boarding if they have open stalls or the boarder wants to use the pasture.

By next summer, Alderman hopes to be closer to their capacity, and as long as they keep making improvements and maintaining the barn, he feels they will reach that goal.

"We are a little late to the punch in getting all this work done because it should've been started in June, but we're getting through the work at a good pace," Alderman said. "Our staff has a lot of heart into this because it's all about the horses here. This is about the heart and passion we have for these

horses and for riding."

The facility will not have house veterinarians or farriers to allow boarders to have that flexibility and Alderman said they are looking to begin offering pony rides for anyone looking to get on a horse, which can be made by online reservation.

The property offers an hour to two-hour trail ride for boarders that overlooks all of Rock Creek Stables and provides ocean views. In the future, Alderman said he'd like the community to utilize their facility as they look at possibly adding a big screen projector for viewing parties or by coming to equestrian events.

"It'll give people an opportunity to get out here and see the horses, maybe meet our boarders and interact with them," Alderman said. "We have a whole mix of riders. It's definitely a good smorgasbord of different people with different desires for horses."

part of the board of directors."

Curler stated that although Dahlman has been excellent as an administrator, he also felt the interim chief's management skills leave room for improvement.

"I think we need to do our due diligence as elected officials to find the best candidate we can... we have that obligation to the citizens," Curler said.

Fellow board member Alan Lee took exception to Curler's comments regarding favoritism among the Board of Directors, stating that although Dahlman was somewhat 'shoehorned' into the job, he was the best candidate they had.

"I saw all the candidates, I

spent a lot of time reading resumes and looking at candidates and I can't say that had we gone through that process that Rob would've ended up where he is now, but I can say from what I saw, he would've been very close in the running," Lee said. "I did not nominate Rob out of favoritism, I nominated him based on what was in front of me and who I considered the best candidate to walk in here and take over. If you want to repeat that process, we'll be repeating what we did a year ago."

Dahlman, who originally signed a five-year contract as the Division Chief-EMS, is in the third year of that contract and would retain that title if the board decided to hire another candidate as Fire Chief. Dahlman expressed his desire to take the position at the meeting.

"You open it up again, I'm going to apply again," Dahlman said. "You put an end date on it, I'm still going to be here working for you guys. I said I would give five years, that was the minimum and that gets you through the consolidation."

The consolidation, or merger with Depoe Bay Fire, was a big topic of discussion amongst the board members. Dahlman explained that everything would be changing with the merger, including creating a new nine station fire district, appointing a new Board of Directors and appointing a new Fire Chief. Board members Ron Woodard and Tim Beatty each expressed their concerns in hiring a short term Fire Chief for NLFR.

"My concern is even if we did go through the process again, with the consolidation, how do you get a candidate to even want to go through the pool (of candidates)?" Beatty said. "The pool that we did have (a year ago), they weren't from around here. You can say, you'll have a job for six months, a year or whatever, and then you don't. I think based on what Rob's been doing that he deserves the job."

After listening to public comment both in support of Dahlman and in support of starting a new 90-day hiring process, the board discussed the potential ramifications of bringing in a new Fire Chief.

"Another thing we need to consider is that we have a good relationship with Depoe Bay as to the consolidation, and I would not like to upset or create an issue by bringing in another Chief for a few months," Lee said. "I don't think we would appreciate that if it happened to us.

"It's very tough to make all the people happy all the time."

After discussion, the Board made the motion to offer Dahlman a one-year contract as full-time Fire Chief, which passed unanimously. After the one-year contract expires, the board will reevaluate, taking into consideration the merger with Depoe Bay Fire.

offer some different options that makes their resources more competitive."

Springer stated that each unit was worth about \$335,000 and argued that they should not be considered affordable housing.

Mayor Dick Anderson pointed out a few issues he had with allowing these units to operate as VRD's. The first was the supposed 1.600 unit need for future "What this has done has, in essence, used up developable land," Anderson said.

Anderson pointed out that the city has used Northwest Jetty as somewhat of a demarcation line of commercial and residential properties and addressed concerns of crossing that line, which could create a slippery slope effect. "I could hear tomorrow your neighbors saying, 'I like that, that's a good way to get around the cap,'" Anderson said. "My hesitancy is because we've done a good job holding that line and it does hold continuity on the East side of Jetty."

But not all of the City Councilors were against the idea of allowing Surftides to use these units as VRD's. "It seems like a nice use of that property and certainly seems like it conforms with the neighborhood, so I have no problem with it,"

Councilor Rick Mark said. "I'd like to see the business make use of the building as it was intended." Ultimately, the City Council voted five to one to turn down the application, denying the Cho family from using the two duplexes as VRD units.



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"I find that interesting because you have to have infrastructure, water, sewer, streets to handle that... there may be demand, but having that kind of demand would help elevate grants as well if you don't have the supply," Anderson said. "I take that reasoning with a grain of salt."

Anderson also countered Springer's affordable housing comment, stating that any housing stock at any price range or rent range is needed.



vessels in port will be visible near these locations on the above dates as part of the training.

The training gives commercial fisher-

men the opportunity to receive valuable hands-on safety equipment and emergency drill training in select Oregon fishing ports leading up to the commercial Dungeness

crab season.

Participants will practice with emergency equipment required onboard most commercial fishing vessels, such as personal flotation devices, life rafts, immersion suits, distress signals, EPIRBs and fire extinguishers. They will learn and practice man-overboard recovery procedures, abandoning ship, firefighting and flood control through onboard emergency drills and practical demonstrations.

"This is required training for documented commercial fishing vessels that operate beyond the boundary line," said Curt Farrell, Coast Guard Fishing Vessel Safety Coordinator for Oregon and Southwest Washington.

"Fishermen who have already taken the course are encouraged to attend again to sharpen their skills. A refresher course is recommended every five years. A study by The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health determined that after five years, the effectiveness of training in reducing fatalities declines significantly."

Upon completion of the course, participants will receive certification to conduct emergency drills aboard commercial fishing vessels

Portland man threatens to kill girlfriend, arrested in Newport

On Oct. 5, Newport Police Department (NPD) units were dispatched to a harassment complaint in North Newport.

The victim advised dispatch that her boyfriend, Alexander Halbersma, 30, of Portland, had threatened to kill her on the phone and was en route to Newport from the Portland area. The victim also

"Several hours after receiving the initial call, Newport officers located an older blue Mercury Grand Marquis traveling through Newport," stated NPD officials. "Officers were able to positively identify the driver and sole occupant of the vehicle as Halbersma."

An NPD officer conducted a high-risk vehicle stop at the intersection of N Coast Hwy and NE Avery St. Halbersma was compliant during the stop and was taken into custody without incident.

During a subsequent search of Halbersma's vehicle, an amount of methamphetamine was located along with a .22 caliber revolver

and ammunition.

Halbersma was lodged at the Lincoln County Jail on charges of Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Unlawful Possession of Methamphetamine. His bail is set at \$500,000.



The Day of the Dead is celebrated throughout Mexico and by people of Mexican heritage elsewhere. Scholars trace the

origins of the modern Mexican holiday to indigenous observances dating back hundreds of years and to an Aztec festival dedicated to the goddess Mictecacihuatl. The Day of the Dead celebrations in Mexico developed from ancient traditions among its pre-Columbian cultures. Rituals celebrating the deaths of ancestors had been observed by these civilizations perhaps for as long as 3,000 years. The festival that developed into the modern Day of the Dead fell in the ninth month of the Aztec calendar

and was celebrated for an entire month. The festivities were dedicated to the goddess known as the 'Lady of the Dead,' corresponding to the modern La Calavera Catrina.

During the multi-day holiday communities gather together to honor friends and family members who have passed on, and help keep their memories alive. To be clear, Day of the Dead is not a Mexican version of Halloween. In Mexican culture, death is viewed as a natural part of the human cycle. Mexicans view it not as a day of

Chinook Winds' grand opening for Sports Wagering Lounge

The ribbon was cut, bets were placed and Chinook Winds Casino celebrated a successful start to its Sports Wagering Lounge unveiling.

On Aug. 27, the Lounge held a soft opening that featured a special guest, former Super Bowl champion and Dallas Cowboys defensive end Ed 'Too Tall' Jones, who placed the inaugural bet. Then on Oct. 11, Chinook Winds reconvened in the Lounge for a grand opening celebration for the only Sports Wagering Lounge in the Pacific Northwest.

Since it officially opened over a month ago, Assistant Operations Manager of the Lounge, Matthew Pond, said they've received a good amount of praise for their Lounge from people all over the state and beyond.

"It's small but it's exactly what we need," Pond said. "We are getting a lot of people from Portland, Salem, even Seattle since we are the only place in the Pacific Northwest that offers this. But we also have people that come in daily that live around here."

In the midst of football season, Pond said they see about 70 percent of bets going toward NFL or NCAA football games. And almost all bets are on individual games.

"It's mostly betting on games," Pond said. "We do get Super Bowl bets, World Series bets and things like that, but probably 90 percent of the wagering has been on games."

The Sports Wagering Lounge added five new jobs to fill the needs of the area and training was a priority for Will Robertson, director of casino operations.

"The hardest part of getting this up and running has been educating ourselves and with any new gaming introduction we're going to have those hurdles," Robertson said back when the Lounge first opened. "But I can't say enough about everyone who's helped get us off the ground."

Since then, Pond said they haven't been planning any major additions involved with the Lounge, but rather excelling at the services they currently offer.

"We've mostly been focused on getting our staff trained as of right now and they've done a very good job at adjusting since most of the employees here were formally in the Keno lounge, which is somewhat similar," Pond said.

The Sports Wagering Lounge is located on the second floor of the Casino and is open daily.

Aquarium announces \$18.2 million campaign for remodel

The Oregon Coast Aquarium is raising \$18.2 million for a Capital Campaign to remodel facilities, enhance the learning experience and build a marine rehabilitation center.

The Capital Campaign includes five main projects: a marine rehabilitation center, a children's nature play area, a renovation of the Aquarium's entryway and grand hall, a remodel of three indoor galleries and an enhancement of educational programming.

The Aquarium has welcomed 15 million visitors through its doors since 1992, providing people of all ages and backgrounds with a living classroom and a connection to the Oregon Coast. But the facility and its programming has not had a major remodel since its opening.

"When the Aquarium opened more than 25 years ago, it was never built to see the number of people that come through our doors," said Oregon Coast Aquarium President and CEO, Carrie Lewis. "We welcome more than 420,000 guests each year, and attendance is growing. It's time to update

our exhibits. It's time to improve the visitor experience. It's time to provide a true facility for the animal rehabilitation that we do behind the scenes."

In addition to necessary remodels and renovation, the aquarium will expand with the construction of a children's nature play area and a state-of-the-art, behind-the-scenes veterinary facility for marine wildlife rehabilitation and resident animal medical care.

"As we grow toward our vision of serving as a trusted resource for ocean education and conservation in the Pacific Northwest, it is more important than ever that our facility reflects that," said Lewis.

The Oregon Coast Aquarium is one of three facilities in the Pacific Northwest, and the only in the state of Oregon, authorized to provide critical care to endangered marine wildlife, like sea turtles, northern fur seals and snowy plovers. But unfortunately, the aquarium only has one building-an old, repurposed warehouse-to do

gency triage and procedures within a building that is not suited for animal medical care," said Evonne Mochon-Collura, Curator of Fish and Invertebrates at the Aquarium. "Over the last ten years, we have seen an increasing number of stranded sea turtles. We have had to redirect some of those animals to other places.

"If we had a larger build-



ing that we could devote to rehabilitation, we could actually increase our ability to accept wildlife that is sick or injured and provide care on a much greater scale."

The marine rehabilitation center will also provide a necessary space for resident animal veterinary procedures and increase capacity for expanded research and learning op-

nary Association.

The annual economic impact of the Oregon Coast Aquarium in Oregon is more than \$100 million, and the 501(c)3 non-profit organization supports 125 staff and 400 volunteers. An accredited Association of Zoos and Aquariums institution, the Aquarium is consistently ranked as one of the top 10 aquariums in the U.S.

"The Oregon Coast Aquarium is truly a jewel in the state of Oregon," said Lewis. "This Capital Campaign is so important for our future. Our reach right now is considerable, but when this campaign is complete, we're going to reach even more. We invite you to join us in continuing the aquarium's mission for generations to come."

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LCSD to track buses via FirstViewApp from First Student

Lincoln County School District (LCSD) Director of Facilities and Maintenance, Rich Belloni, shared that the First Student, Inc., the bus company contracted to transport LCSD students, is ready for implementation of their bus tracking and communications application.

The app is called FirstViewApp and it will allow guardians the ability to receive messages and status updates from mobile phones or online using a desktop.

"We are ready to start the pilot of this tracking app so that our guardians are up to date on when arrivals and departures of the buses are taking place," Belloni said. "They can have messages come directly to them and get updates which will allow greater peace of mind when they can have access to the tracking on their own devices or using a desktop to go online."

Guardians will be sent a link to the application to download via text. LCSD is using the highest level of security to gain access to the students and routes using student identification numbers and school codes obtained directly from the school. According to the First Student, Inc. website, the application is, "easy to download, set up and use. FirstView contains helpful features, including estimated bus arrival time, opt-in

district messaging regarding delays or issues, customizable alerts for when the bus is a chosen distance or number of minutes away, secure password protection and built-in customer support. It's also now available in 10 languages to better meet the needs of districts and users."

Implementation for the areas will be rolled out after this pilot in the Toledo area in the next few weeks. When the guardians of LCSD students obtain the required security codes they are able to Opt-In. At this time, the system is ready for the guardians of Toledo area riders to pilot the FirstView Parent App. These pilot users will receive a text message with a link to the app and further instruction.

Patience and understanding is requested as LCSD works out any bugs in a new system. The GPS data will have a minimum of a 3-5 minute delay from real time due to uploading and processing.


