The top athletes and coaches from a fivecounty area were celebrated at the eighth-annual Best of Preps Awards Banquet on May 20.

More than 180 high school athletes, coaches, relatives and friends convened at Mount Airy Baptist Church for the banquet, put on by the Mount Airy Regional Media Group, which recognized the highest athletic achievements and performances of the 2024-25 school year.

Athletes and coaches from 13 high schools across five counties - Surry, Stokes, Wilkes and Yadkin Counties in North Carolina and Carroll County in Virginia - were eligible for the Best of



Preps awards.

Each school submitted nominations. then the nominees were voted on by a panel of local sportswriters with input from coaches. Awards were handed out for each statesanctioned sport as well as other awards that honor the top overall athletes, athletes that are active in their community, the top athletic director, athletes that overcame

injuries and coaches that went the extra mile this past year.

This year's banquet also introduced a new award to honor Sandy Hurley - the former publisher of the Mount Airy Regional Media Group who was instrumental to the success of the Best of Preps Awards.

The 2024-25 awards recognized athletes that combined for more than two dozen state championships. These athletes ranged from a freshman pitcher that led her team to a deep playoff run to an 11-time state champion that will suit up for UNC Chapel-Hill in the fall.

In addition to their awards, attendees were treated to a guest speaker that experienced success at every level of baseball: Danny Sheaffer.

> franchises over the span of 18 years. His road to the Show was winding and featured numerous highs and lows, but he persevered and made it to the pinnacle of his sport.

> After his playing career, Sheaffer moved into management before retiring from the sport in 2020. Now, Sheaffer spends his time running the FIRM Foundation, which is aimed at coaching and mentoring young athletes. All the money generated by the foundation goes back to the community to support full-time missionaries, prolife ministries and short-term mission trips for middle school and high school students.

Sheaffer called the athletes in attendance the best of the best. While talent is important, Sheaffer stressed the importance of selfmotivation, maintaining focus, not listening to doubters or people that want to hinder your progress, fighting through adversity and making a difference in the world.


PREMIER STUDENT-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

Aniya Edwards set the bar wherever she went, whether that was on the track, in the classroom or in her community.

Edwards won three state championships as a senior - one in indoor track and two in outdoor track. For indoor track, she won a IA/2A State Title in the 300-meter dash with a time of 40.29 seconds; she was the only runner from a IA school to finish on the podium in the event. She also won an indoor bronze medal in the 55-meter dash.

In outdoor track, Edwards' time of 55.53 seconds in the 400 meters set a new IA State Record. She also held the previous record of 56.16 seconds. In addition to her

title in the 400, Edwards won a gold medal in the 200 meters and a bronze medal in

the 4x800-meter relay in her final high school meet.

In her four years at Elkin, Edwards won II total state championships, seven state silver medals and four state bronze medals. She won indoor state titles in the 55, 300 and 500-meter runs, and in outdoor she won titles in the 100, 200 and 400-meter runs, as well as the 4x400-meter relay.

Edwards holds conference records in

Edwards' success extended far beyond the track. She is a member of the Phi

Theta Kappa Honor Society at Surry

Community College, is an AP Scholar and was inducted into the National Honor Society with a 4.65 GPA. She is part of the Beta Club, Journalism Club and Interact Club, and is active with the Saint Peter's World Outreach Center. She serves as a youth leader in her community and has taken mission trips to Belize.

She will continue her academic and athletic career at UNC-Chapel Hill.

WHY HE WON:

Fisher Leftwich was a three-sport all-conference athlete in football, basketball and track as a junior.

He was voted
Foothills 2A
Conference Offensive
Player of the Year in
football as a split wide
receiver and running
back. He scored 24
total touchdowns,
scored at least once
in all II games and
scored multiple
touchdowns in 9-of-II
games.

He racked up 1,014 receiving yards on

51 receptions for an average of nearly 20 yards per reception. He also scored 12 receiving touchdowns.

He also played defensive back, where he grabbed two interceptions – including one pick-6 – and deflected seven passes.

He scored his 1,000th career point as

a junior and was named the most outstanding player of the conference tournament. He was also named to the N.C. Basketball Coaches Association All-District Second Team.

Then in the spring, Fisher earned all-conference honors and was a regional qualifier in outdoor track despite nursing a hamstring injury most of the season. He holds the North Surry school record in the 100-meter dash.

FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

South Stokes' senior Rebecca Amos was named the Best of Prep Women's Athlete of the Year following exceptional performances across three sports during the 2024-25 season.

Amos led South Stokes volleyball to its first conference championship since 1992 and firstever conference tournament title in the school's 60-year history. The Northwest **IA All-Conference** and All-Tournament selection recorded 248 kills (second on

team), 2.8 kills per set, and maintained a team-leading 97.3% serving percentage. Her defensive contributions included 19 solo blocks and 40 total blocks as the

team finished 18-6 (II-I conference) and advanced to the third round of the IA State playoffs.

> In basketball, Amos averaged 12 points, 6 assists, 5 rebounds and 2 steals per game, earning Northwest **IA All-Conference** and All-Tournament honors. She was named conference tournament MVP while leading South Stokes to both regular season and tournament championships the school's first basketball titles since 1988. The team reached the second

round of the IA State playoffs.


The Winthrop University signee capped her high school career with a stellar softball season, batting .558 with 53

> hits, 10 doubles, 3 home runs, 18 RBIs and 41 runs scored. Amos struck out just three times in 86 plate appearances while stealing 32 bases and recording a perfect 1.000 fielding percentage. She was named Northwest IA Co-Conference Player of the Year as South Stokes finished 18-9 overall (9-3 conference), reaching the IA West Regional semifinals.

SANDY HURLEY AWARD

WHY HE WON:

The Sandy Hurley Award was handed out for the first time in 2025. The award is named after the former publisher of the Mount Airy Regional Media Group, Sandy Hurley, who played a pivotal role in the Best of Preps Awards since its inception. Sandy led by example by being the first at the office and the last to leave each day. And, many weekends, her car could be found at the Mount Airy News office as she continued working away.

More than a dedicated worker, Sandy was a strong leader, a trusted advisor, a compassionate friend, and a loving wife and mother. She always maintained a positive attitude regardless of the obstacles thrown in her way. Sandy overcame Stage Four Breast Cancer in 2024 but had other health complications leading to her passing in January of this

The award recognizes a student-athlete

who personifies hard work, determination, and a relentless pursuit of greatness despite facing heavy adversity. Austin Nash was the unanimous selection.

Austin was adopted by Robbie and Treva Nash when he was 3 years old. When he was six, Austin was diagnosed with Embryonal Rhabdomyosarcoma, or ERMS, which is a rare soft tissue cancer that only has about 350 cases diagnosed each year. ERMS is a recurring cancer, and when he was 16 Austin began his third battle with the disease.

He received chemotherapy through an IV once a week while also taking oral chemo drugs, but he didn't let that slow him down. In his first football game this year, Austin had 205 rushing yards, 83 receiving yards and scored three touchdowns. He finished the year with more than 1,000 total yards, was the team's leading receiver and scored 13 total touchdowns. East Wilkes won 10 games in a season for the first time in a decade.

> Austin won three medals at the conference championship for indoor track, then won three more conference medals at the outdoor conference championship. He won a regional championship as part of East Wilkes' 4x200-meter relay team and bronze medals in the 100-meter dash and 4x100-meter relay, then went on to win the IA State Championship in the 4x200.

WHY SHE WON:

Molly Swaim sets a positive example through her service to the community as well as her strong character on and off the court.

She provided food and gifts to area families during the holidays as part of the Collide Church Christmas Blessing Store. She reads to students at local elementary schools, cleans up the football stadium after games and helps run concession stands as part of the Beta Club. Swaim has completed numerous volunteer projects through the National Honor Society and passes on her love of sports to the next generation by helping run camps and clinics for volleyball, basketball and softball.

Swaim also led by example and showed the power of determination after breaking her ankle during volleyball season. She worked tirelessly to return to the court for basketball season and suited up for the team's first game. She scored 2I points in the season opener to record her first of 18 double-digit games. Swaim went on to average 14 points per game, was voted Northwest IA Conference Player of the Year, was named to the N.C. Basketball Coaches Association's All-District Third Team, and helped Starmount win a share of the conference title for the first time in more than 30 years.

Swaim transition to softball following basketball, but her season ended prematurely when she was diagnosed with a torn Achilles tendon.

WHY HE WON:

West Stokes senior Myles Knox has shown extensive volunteer work while maintaining an impressive athletic career across multiple sports.

Myles, a four-year member and secretary of the Interact Club, has participated in numerous youth mission trips through First Baptist Church. His service includes building wheelchair ramps at Shelby Mission Center, volunteering at King Outreach food pantry, and traveling to Greece where he worked with missionary children at a vacation Bible school.

The multi-sport athlete has also volunteered at the Special Olympics, serving both as a buddy for athletes and as an event timer. Knox has worked with young

As a member of the National Honor Society, Myles participated in Read Across America, reading to elementary school students. He also volunteered at local apartments in the King area, sharing the Gospel and teaching children football skills.

On the field, Myles excelled in four sports simultaneously. In football, he was named Mid-State 2A Specialist of the Year, converting 47 of 51 extra points and 7 of 11 field goals while helping his team reach the third round of state playoffs with a 10-3 record.

While playing football, Myles also served as goalkeeper for the soccer team, earning All-Conference and All-Region honors with 132 saves. He helped lead the team to its first conference championship in 12 years with a perfect 10-0 conference record.

In basketball, Myles earned All-Conference recognition, averaging 8.9 points, 5.6 rebounds, 3.1 assists and 2.5 steals per game.

Myles competed on the tennis team, where he earned All-Conference honors and won the doubles conference championship with his partner, Peyton Spainhour. The team finished 10-2 and reached the third round of state playoffs. He and Spainhour also qualified for the state doubles tournament after finishing third in regionals.

MALE COMEBACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY HE WON:

Blake Collins was primed for a successful freshman year on Surry Central's wrestling team before tearing his ACL during football season. The injury kept him out of action until the summer of 2024 when he was finally allowed to start training again.

Collins entered the starting lineup in November and won his first seven matches. His regular season was highlighted by a first-place finish in the Big A Memorial Tournament and runner-up finishes in the Danny Linker and Jeff Peal Memorial Tournaments.

Collins only dropped three matches during the regular season, then finished third in the 150-pound weight class at the Foothills 2A Conference Tournament. Collins went on to reach the 2A Midwest Regional Championship match in the 150 class but fell short of a regional title.

Collins dropped his opening match at the 2A State Tournament, then responded by winning his first consolation match in just 44 seconds. Collins' season came to an end in his next match.

"I couldn't be more proud of him for making it to states with this really being his first season," said Surry Central coach Stephen Priddy. "It's pretty remarkable to come back from that injury and make it to states. It's a testament to all the hard work he's done."

Collins finished the season with a 32-7 record.

FEMALE COMEBACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

When Savannah Wilson crumpled to the floor in just the second game of her junior season with a torn ACL, it could have marked the end of her high school basketball career. Instead, it became the beginning of a comeback story that culminated in South Stokes' first conference championship in 36 years.

Wilson, who recently signed with Bridgewater College, returned for her senior season not just as a participant but as a catalyst for the Sauras' historic run. The senior forward averaged 10 points, 7 rebounds, 2 assists and 2 steals per game while leading the team with 10 charges taken — a testament to both her physical recovery and fearless style of play.

"Other than wearing a brace, you could not tell she had gone through what she had gone through," South Stokes coach Hunter Ford said. "Her first game back she dove on the floor in the first quarter getting tangled up with another player."

Wilson's determination during rehabilitation set the stage for her return. Despite being sidelined, she attended every practice during her junior year, maintaining her connection with the team while focusing on her recovery.

Her leadership helped guide South

The senior's collegiate career will continue at Bridgewater College, where she'll bring the same resilience that defined her final high school season.





Brady Clark led South Stokes to a 27-3 record and a deep playoff run, establishing himself as one of the region's premier players during the 2024-25 season.

The standout guard was named Northwest IA Player of the Year after averaging 19.7 points, 5.7 rebounds, 6.4 assists, 2.6 steals and 0.8 blocks per game. His all-around performance helped the Sauras secure both the conference regular season and tournament championships for a fourth consecutive season.

Clark scored 591 points on the season, connecting on 149 two-pointers and a district-leading 73 three-pointers. He also shot 73.5% from the free-throw line (74-of-102).







WHY HE WON:

West Stokes senior Riley Tuttle capped a remarkable high school baseball career with a dominant final season, earning Mid-State Pitcher of the Year honors while leading the Wildcats to both the Mid-State 2A Conference regular season and tournament championships.

Riley compiled a perfect 9-0 record on the mound with a 1.49 ERA over 47 innings pitched. The senior right-hander struck out 79 batters while issuing just 23 walks, facing 188 batters and allowing only 10 earned runs all season.

At the plate, Riley was equally impressive, batting .422 with a .505 on-base percentage. He collected 13 doubles and one triple while driving in 28 runs and scoring 29 times for the Wildcats.

West Stokes senior midfielder Landis Pritchard turned in one of the most prolific offensive seasons in school history despite the Wildcats' challenging finish to the 2025 campaign.

Landis tallied 43 goals and 17 assists for a total of 60 points, coming within six goals of tying the school record for most goals in a season. His scoring output ranks as the third-highest single-season total in West Stokes lacrosse history.

The senior standout also collected 35 ground balls while helping the Wildcats to an 8-10 overall record and a 6-6 mark in the IA/2A/3A Northwest Piedmont/Mid-State/Mid-Piedmont Conference, good for fourth place.

West Stokes' season ended with a first-round loss to Hickory in the NCHSAA IA/2A/3A State Playoffs.

Mathis' leadership and consistency were instrumental in establishing West Stokes as a perennial cross country powerhouse in the Mid-State 2A Conference over the past four years.





With her senior season still ahead, Bowles will look to build on her remarkable junior campaign and further cement her legacy in West Stokes' storied cross country program.







Connor will enter his senior season with an overall record of 122-14.





Meadows went undefeated with a perfect 43-0 record during his junior campaign, and only one of his 43 wins wasn't decided by either a pin or forfeit.



Meadows enters his senior year with a career record of 129-10.




There were points during her junior campaign that Jenevy Olalde wasn't even sure she'd be physically able to wrestle in the postseason due to an injury. Despite wrestling most of the season with a metal plate in her foot, Olalde went on to compete in the 100-pound State Championship match and finished runnerup.

Olalde pulled double duty and wrestled for both the men's and women's teams early on. She competed in 11 matches in the men's 106-pound division during the regular season and won nine. On the women's side, Olalde won her first 22 matches before falling short in the state title match.

Olalde won the Northwest IA Conference Championship match in just 24 seconds. At states, Olalde won her opening match in just 54 seconds then went up 15-3 in the quarterfinals before earning the pin. She battled back from a 3-0 deficit in the semifinals to win via fall in the second period, then lost the championship match 14-2.



Riggs also finished state runner-up in discus throw with a mark of 125-7. She and R-S Central's Jimerson swapped places from shot put as Jimerson won the state championship with a mark of 126-9.

Riggs joined Alex Cooke as the only North Surry women to win multiple outdoor track state championships; Cooke won the 2A Shot Put titles in 2013-14.

Her recent state title put Riggs ahead of Cooke in total state championships. Riggs first won the outdoor shot put championship in 2023, then won the indoor shot put titles in 2024-25 before capping her career off with this latest championship.

Jared Hiatt, a 2023 graduate, is the only other North Surry athlete to win four track state championships.

Riggs graduated with 10 total state medals in high school – four in indoor track and six in outdoor. She will continue her track career at Gardner-Webb University.

She will continue her swimming career at Campbell University.




