





Thirty-four years ago, Tanya Jones and the Surry Arts Council began what would become Mayberry Days. The annual festival, set for Sept. 18 - 24, began all those years ago as a one-off, single-day celebration of "The Andy Griffith Show's" 30th anniversary.

Now, more than three decades later, Jones is still at the helm of both the arts council and the festival, and her answer to how to keep people coming is simple: Finding new ways for those associated with the show to entertain the legion of Mayberry fans, while mixing in a healthy dose of the familiar.

This year's event has plenty of

joining those making an appearance. Margaret Teele, who played Agnes Jean Parker in the episode "A Visit to Barney Fife" as well as Stella in an episode of the spin-off show, "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C." and an unnamed "girl" in another episode of the latter show, will be among those at the festival to meet with fans.

Teele made a number of appearances on shows and in movies throughout the 1960s, including "Batman," "Captain Nice," and the Jerry Lewis movie "Hook, Line and Sinker."

Another act making its first appearance at the festival is the Christian rock band, David and the Giants. The group has its roots in the 1960s, as a rock group that achieved significant success regionally in the Southeast, as well as nationally in Great Britain. In 1977, the group

switched to contemporary Christian rock, releasing a string

of successful albums between then and 1989, and has been recording and playing again in recent years.

The band's connection to Mayberry Days comes through its drummer, Keith Thibodeaux, who appeared in more than a dozen "Andy Griffith Show" episodes as Opie's childhood friend, Johnny Paul Jason. Thibodeaux was already a recognized child star before joining the Griffith Show cast, having played Little Ricky on both "I Love Lucy" and "The Lucy–Desi Comedy Hour."

Thibodeaux first attended Mayberry Days in 2018, but has been to most of the festivals since. In addition to several appearances during the festival, Thibodeaux and his band will be in concert at the Andy Griffith Playhouse, beginning at 3 p.m. on Sept. 23.

Another new face will be that of Denise Glass. The Virginiaborn singer has appeared in a number of concerts and musical festivals over the years, most notably performing as a Patsy Cline tribute artist.

Michael Hoover, an Elvis tribute artist who has proven immensely popular with Mayberry Days fans, will be returning. He and Glass have been appearing together in

recent shows, and the two will be doing so at Mayberry Days.

The two will be appearing in concert on Friday, Sept. 22 at 2 p.m. on the stage at the Historic Earle Theatre.

A television and movie star making his second appearance at the festival will be Dan Roebuck. While he was not in "The Andy Griffith Show," fans will recognize him as Cliff Lewis from "Matlock." In that series, Roebuck played the private investigator working for attorney Ben Matlock, played by Griffith.

Roebuck made his Mayberry Days debut in 2022, and was so taken with Mount Airy and the event he is returning this fall. He will also be coming back to the city in December to play the role of Scrooge in "A Christmas Carol," to be on stage at the Andy Griffith Playhouse.

"Dan Roebuck was on 55 episodes of Matlock and has a different set of insights about Andy and working with Andy and guests loved him last year," said the arts council's Tanya Jones.

Of course, Mayberry Days just

wouldn't quite be the same without some of the old favorite guests.

In addition to the aforementioned Michael Hoover, fan favorite Rodney Dillard and the Dillard Band will be in town for a concert and related appearances, Karen Knotts will be on stage talking more about her famous father, and Ronnie Schell of both "The Andy Griffith Show" and "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C." will be on hand.

Others returning include Dennis Rush and Margaret Kerry, both of whom made multiple appearances in the show; "Murder in Coweta County" producer Dick Atkins; Professor Neal Brower with his annual talk featuring those who were affiliated with the show; a presentation by author Randy Turner, who has written a number of Mayberry-related books and travel guides; along with games, contests, and many displays.

There will also be several concerts for those in town, including a show by John Floyd, known as the "Mouth of Mayberry;" concerts featuring Envision Band, Embers featuring Craig Woolard, Band of Oz; and a number of

Cherry Orchard Theatre marks 25 seasons

Sometimes tragedy leads to joy, loss paves the way for new birth.

Such was the case a quarter of a century ago, on the face of Virginia's Fancy Gap Mountain, overlooking Mount Airy and the surrounding Piedmont, the same Fancy Gap that Sheriff Andy Taylor referenced once or twice during the run of "The Andy Griffith Show."

This summer and autumn a celebration of that new joy, new birth, is being celebrated as the Cherry Orchard Theatre's 2023 season marks the 25th season of shows on the mountain.

Frank Levering, founder of the theater and owner of Levering Orchard, home of the theater, said the theater is expanding its schedule this year as part of that celebration, with eight different shows spread over July, August and September.

When he first staged a play at the site, in the summer of 1999, Levering said he had no inclination that effort would grow into such a fixture on the local art scene, one whose reach extends far beyond the mountain and valley below.

"I had pictured it as just a one-off," he said of that initial weekend's show, a play he had written which ran over three nights.

That play, and the story of Cherry Orchard Theatre, truthfully goes back much further — more than a century when Levering's grandparents, settled the land just north of the North Carolina-Virginia border, with the long-range goal of establishing an orchard.

"Ralph and Clara Levering arrived at what's now the orchard in a wagon, being drawn by a horse," Levering said recently. "That was in February 1908. They came all the way from Maryville, Tennessee. My grandmother was eight months pregnant with my dad when they got there."

He said the two took up residence in a small two-room log cabin. A month later, Levering's father was born, and a year later the two had built what would become the family homestead, where the resided and built what would become Levering Orchard.

Eighty-seven years later, Levering said the house burned to the ground.

"We had some college students from Guilford College staying there," he said. Levering was living in the newer homestead on the grounds, the one his parents had lived in. "One night, at about 9 o'clock, they came running down to my house, told me my house was on fire. I thought they were talking about the house I was in, but when I went outside, I could see there were flames coming out of the roof."

By the time the fire department arrived and extinguished the blaze, the roof and chimneys had collapsed, the walls had burned down to one-story ruins, and everything else inside was lost.

Not long afterward, he was walking the grounds, looking at the ruins of the home his grandfather had built.

"That's when I had the idea to do a play about the people who lived in that house" he said. That Levering would turn to drama and the theater as his way of dealing with the tragedy should be no surprise — he spent a number of years in California as a script writer, has penned plays, poems, and authored or co-authored a half dozen books. Writing, particularly for performance art, is one of Levering's passions.

"It took me a couple of years, as it usually does, to write the play, but I got the play completed in early 1999," he said. He gathered a few friends and local artists to collaborate with him on producing the story.

"We did this play with the idea of paying tribute to the people who lived in the house, my grandparents, my dad, and everybody. I had pictured it as just a one-off."

Area residents and visitors put other ideas in his head.

"We wound up doing that play over the course of three weekends in the summer of 1999, over 1,200 people came, which was a shock...That's when the idea of a summer theater came from, I really had no intention of that, but I realized something wonderful might be happening here."

He worked with his friend, well-known local storyteller Terri Ingalls, and a few other artists and put together what has become a 25-season odyssey that has led to an untold number of live performances at the orchard.

"It's got to be over a hundred," Levering said of the number of productions which have come to life on the outdoor stage there. "Probably well over a hundred. "It's been at least three or four weekends a year, and often a different show each weekend."

Those shows generally would have a three-day run, Friday,

Saturday and Sunday, and occasionally a second weekend with a different show taking stage the following month, and vet another one the month after.

Some of the shows there have gone on to much larger audiences, to be performed by international stage and television stars. One show, "The Distance Between Us,"

debuted at the Cherry Orchard Theatre, and eventually found its way into other stages, where actresses Holly Hunter and Amy Madigan played the two major roles.

Another involved local resident Dan Hornak, whose portrayal of fictional John Wayne tribute artist Jack Thorne debuted at Cherry Orchard but has seen Hornak perform the show in Texas as well as multiple California venues.

Some of the other shows have also taken to the road, with the local actors putting on the shows in Mount Airy, in Charleston, South Carolina, and elsewhere.

But getting big-name actors, or launching a traveling show, isn't really what Levering is after at Cherry Orchard.

"That doesn't have to happen," he said of his measure of success at the theater. "If it happens, that's great. But if we do it with a local audience, and everyone has a great time, that's what we're about...something for our community."

This year, the community will have far more opportunities to see the shows and productions at Cherry Orchard, with eight different shows set.

In addition to the opening weekend's offering, held in July as a story-telling and open mic night, will be the Celebration of 25 Seasons at Cherry Orchard Theatre from August 4 – 6, and from August 11 – 13 and from August 11 - 13 the theater will have a two-play set in one evening featuring "The Dead Speak" and "The View From Clara's Porch."


Running August 18 - 20 will be another two-show evening with An Evening with the Browns and a short play "Raw Toads." On August 25-27 the stage will feature an evening with actor Robert Dobson.

Cherry Orchard opens the new month with "H5" running from Sept. 1 -3 and then on Sept. 8 - 10: "All We Know of Heaven." Finally, "The Witches Brew: Tales of Appalachian Witches" will take the stage Sept. 15 - 17.

Anyone who misses the 2023 season can check out Cherry Orchard's Facebook page for updates — during the winter months, the theater sometimes puts on its shows at indoor

venues, and then in summer of 2023 another outdoor season will be running at full speed.

movie now free to stream

Mayberry Man: The Series set to debut this year

The nostalgic family comedy Mayberry Man, inspired both by The Andy Griffith Show and a visit to Mayberry Days by two sons of an Andy Griffith Show actor, is now streaming free on several services, quickly

wracking up hundreds of thousands of views.

The movie, largely filmed over 2021 and released in autumn of 2022, follows an arrogant, self-centered movie star named Chris Stone, played by Brett Varvel, who is sentenced by a judge to spend a week at a festival celebrating "The Andy Griffith Show." The film was conceived by several children of Mayberry stars,

The film was conceived by several children of Mayberry stars, especially brothers Stark and Cort Howell. Their father, Hoke Howell, played Dud Walsh, a local boy who married the character Charlene Darling. They had an experience a little bit like that of the fictional Chris Stone, learning first-hand about the passionate and friendly Andy Griffith Show fan base when they visited Mayberry Days in Mount Airy.

"I've always been a fan of the show, but I was shocked to discover the spirit of Mayberry still exists today within the tight-knit Mayberry fan community," Howell said in a 2019 interview with The Mount Airy News announcing the movie. "It's the perfect setting to tell a modern-day, family-friendly story that expresses the virtues of the fictitious town of Mayberry that we all fell in love with so many years ago."

Filmed partially in Andy Griffith's hometown of Mount Airy, Mayberry Man follows the arrogant movie star showing how he ended up sentenced to a week at Mayberry Fest, the disregard he had for the show's fans and the townfolk at first, and it shows how, surrounded by Mayberry fanatics including colorful tribute artists pretending to be characters from the show, he is given the chance to discover what Mayberry Spirit is all about.

"The touching, light-hearted story pays homage to the classic television series through replica sets, vintage wardrobe, Mayberry squad cars and other period vehicles, plus a film score that includes music from the original series by renown composer Earle Hagen," according to the Stark brothers.

In another twist, the movie was filmed independently, with some of the financial support raised through crowdfunding efforts — and many of those who contributed to the movie ended up with on-screen roles.

The movie had a limited release in the autumn of 2022,

featuring three premieres — in Mount Airy; Danville, Indiana (where the now-defunct Mayberry in the Midwest festival was held); and in Los Angeles. It has since been available via DVD, direct download, and through several streaming services.

Beginning on July 1, the film became free for a limited time, available through Amazon Prime, on YouTube's EncourageTV channel and on TubiTV.com. The first weekend the movie was free, it surpassed 100,000 views and has continued being viewed hundreds of thousands of times since.

There may soon be additional viewing options for Mayberry fans, with the coming debut of "Mayberry Man: The Series."

Because of the popularity of and response to Mayberry Man, the Howells and others involved in the production have gone on to make a five-episode television series which picks up where the movie left off presented to cable and streaming networks with a potential fall 2023 release.

ANDY referenced his hometown in many ways during show

Andy Griffith was fond of including the occasional reference to Mount Airy, North Carolina, as a sort of "hello" to folks from his hometown area. One of the most used of these references were the names of his cousin, born Virginia Lorraine Beasley, and her husband, Earlie Gilley.

When "The Andy Griffith Show" first aired, Andy's cousin and her husband lived in Pilot Mountain, North Carolina. (The town's name was also the source of Mount Pilot in the series.) Lorraine's mother was a sister of Carl Griffith, Andy's father.

Andy first inserted the name "Beasley" into an episode in "Irresistible Andy," which aired in Season 1 on Halloween of

1960. After Andy convinces himself that Ellie Walker is a "desperate hunter" looking for a husband, he tells Charlie Beasley that she is interested in him. Charlie is soon in Walker's Drugstore, trying to woo her by flexing his muscles.

The name appears again near the end of the same season, attached to the often-referenced but never-seen Juanita, Barney's main girl on the side. When she is first referenced, Juanita Beasley is the new waitress working at the Junction Cafe where the truck drivers stop. Andy reads her full name off Barney's citation pad. Barney claims to have written her name and number on the pad as he did "trouble checks" with her periodically. Her last name was never referenced again, but the character certainly was repeatedly, though by the second season, Juanita is working at the diner.

Griffith used his cousin's middle and last name in the third season episode "A Wife for Andy." When trying to find a potential spouse for his friend, Barney spots Lorraine Beasley walking downtown but thinks she might be a little young for

In Season 4, Opie is mistakenly awarded a straight-A report card he had not earned in "Opie's Ill-Gotten Gain." Andy is so proud he tells Aunt Bee he is considering having a photo taken by a photographer of Opie holding his report card to send to Edgar Beasley, a man he knows who brags about his children a great deal.

In the Season 5 episode "Opie's Fortune," Andy is teasing Barney to get him to reveal details about a date with the apparently quite attractive Phoebe Gilbert. When Barney reads in the "Mayberry Gazette" that Virginia Beasley is engaged to Earlie Gilley, Andy says the engagement will be off once Earlie finds out about Virginia. He says this just to rankle Barney by then nonchalantly explaining he learned the information from Phoebe's brother while Andy was at her

house. This was a use of his cousin's first and last name, though she usually went by her middle name, Lorraine.

Later in the same season, in "The Case of the Punch in the Nose," Andy is surprised to learn Bobby Gribble and Emma Lars are engaged. Floyd says they had been dating ever since Bobby stopped seeing Andrew Beasley's daughter.

But perhaps the most discussed use of the surname among Mayberry fans is from the fifth season when Andy introduces the character we know as Goober Pvle as Goober Beasley to Mr. Harvey in "TV or Not TV."

Goober had been referenced long before being seen, such as Gomer and Goober fixing Malcolm Tucker's car and Goober lending Gomer tools to fix the bandstand for a concert. No last name was ever used.

with Gomer always simply referring to Goober as his cousin. Nor was a last name given for Goober in his first appearance in "Fun Girls" and for quite a while afterward. His last name was eventually established to be "Pyle," just like his cousin Gomer, so sources customarily state that was his name all along, disregarding the single time his name was given as Goober Beasley.

Just like Andy often used portions of the full name of his cousin, Virginia Lorraine Beasley, he also used the name of her husband, Earlie Gilley, a number of times.

As mentioned above, one of the references to Andy's cousin, Virginia Lorraine Beasley, was in the Season 5 episode "Opie's Fortune," when Barney reads in the "Mayberry Gazette" that Virginia Beasley is engaged to Earlie Gilley. This was not the first time Gilley was used in the series.

It was first used in in "The Jinx." When Barney is convinced Henry Bennett is a jinx and the reason their rowboat sank, Andy says it has nothing to do with Henry and sank because Earl Gilley did not properly caulk a leak in the boat. Here Andy used a slight variation on Earlie's first name.

In the Season 4 episode, "Prisoner of Love," Andy tells the attractive female prisoner the story of Henry Gilley, a shy Mayberry resident who courted Tyla Lee Vernon for 16 years. trying to get up the nerve to propose.

During Season 5, the character Gilley Walker appears twice, his first name also a nod to Earlie Gilley. Only concerned with "speed, speed," Gilley Walker is first seen in "Goober Takes a Car Apart." He appears later in the same season in the episode "The Case of the Punch in the Nose."

Finally, near the end of the sixth season, the name was used with a sort of double nod back home. In "Goober's Replacement," Goober's attractive girlfriend, Flora, filled in for him at Wally's and became quite the draw for male customers who enjoyed having the gas pumped by a pretty girl. A dejected Goober said he might move to Mount Pilot and work in Earlie Gilley's garage. The reference was two-pronged. It obviously was a use of the full name of his cousin's husband. But in addition, Earlie really did operate an automotive garage in Pilot Mountain!

It is not surprising that in addition to his cousin's name, Andy also used the name Gilley often. After all, Lorraine, once said, "Andy just loved his name!"
