





LOAVES AND DISHES



START FRESH WITH THE HANGING ROCK POLAR PLUNGE ON NEW YEAR'S DAY

Jumping into a lake in the cold of winter may be an unusual way to kick off the new year, but it's become a tradition for many.

The Stokes County Arts Council hosts a polar plunge at the Hanging Rock State Park lake annually on New Year's Day.

"The party of the year on the first day of the year," says Eddy McGee, Stokes County Arts Council director. "It's the best!"

The 10th Annual plunge was held on Jan. 1, 2025, drawing another great crowd of folks from all over.

The weather that day at Hanging Rock was sunny but chilly, with temperatures in mid-40s and the lake at 46 degrees.

"It's been colder," McGee said while standing on the beach after the plunge, still dripping and shivering, recalling a year when ice had to be broken up off the surface of the lake before the swimmers could jump in.

The annual off-season dip in the lake benefits the Arts Council, which uses the funds to support programming in schools and communities.

In addition to a good time, free chicken stew and a sense

of personal accomplishment, each registrant receives some swag, which this year was a Hanging Rock Polar Plunge mug.

COOL COSTUMES

Participants don't just plunge —
they plunge in
style, parading
down to the
beach in a

wide variety of costumes. The best of the best win prizes such as gift certificates to The Arts Place or Rocky's.

Elementary school principal Eric Pritchett plunged for the first time this year. He was dressed in a full suit and tie.

"I figured if I died I'd already be prepared to be buried," a soaking wet Pritchett joked after he emerged from the lake.

Claire and John Wait, of Clemmons, tapped into a pop culture moment in "Wicked" cast costumes, Claire as Elphaba and John as Galinda.

"We play to win every year," Claire said as the couple marched down to the lake, and win they did — for the fourth consecutive year.

The Waits previously dressed as a Santa and elf they described as on the "naughty" side, the Adams Family, and Barbie and Ken, winning awards for each.

"We have a reputation to preserve — our legacy," Claire said. Jax, of Winston-Salem, wore a Kitsune costume, which is a fox spirit in Japanese mythology. The plunger stayed in the lake after many had fled and said a shorty wetsuit helped.

"It still prickles," Jax said of the cold water.

"I love this park, I love this lake, and I like doing crazy, memorable things. And this is an interesting way to start off the year," Jax said. "I first came here several years ago, saw the people doing it and I was like I'm tempted but I'm afraid. Eventually I finally bit the bullet and did it one year, and then I've been doing every year since."

Liz Laprade's crew had participated last year but it was her first

"It was fun but it was scary — it was freezing," she said. "I was worth it."

Laprade's group from the Germanton area won a prize for their "Napolean Dynomite" movie themed costumes.

"Every year I see familiar faces, and I see a lot of new faces every year," he said. "It's really awesome to see this event from when it started the first year to where it is now.

This year, Leonard's youngest of three sons went in with him for the first time. Now all three sons have plunged.

"I look for forward to this every year," Leonard said.

"Everybody's all hyped up about Thanksgiving, Christmas — I

count down the days to this.

"You can't ask for a better way to start off the beginning of the year."

Leonard noted that for a lot of people it's simply a fun, local thing to be a part of.

"For me, and I know for a few other people, it's more kind of like a spiritual thing," he said. "I've been quoted as saying this is a Stokes County baptism. But it's more of getting in tune with yourself, your inner self, and getting in tune with nature, and people that are coming together just not talk about anything other than we're all just a little bit nuts."

SANDY RIDGE ANNUAL Bluegrass Show

SANDY RIDGE — Premiere bluegrass musicians Flatt and Scruggs headlined the inaugural Sandy Ridge Bluegrass Show in 1948 and did so annually for 20 years — until the legendary duo broke up about two weeks before the 1969 event.

The show went on, as they say it must, and the event has continued for more than 75 years with no signs of slowing down.

"We researched to the best of our ability and we can't find any other show of that type in the United States that's been running continuous for that long," other than The Grand Ole Opry itself, which is a weekly show, said Jay Adams, event organizer.

The Annual Sandy Ridge Bluegrass Show is scheduled for the third Saturday in March each year and is held at Sandy Ridge Elementary School. Concessions are available, and the doors typically open at 5 p.m. and the show starts at 6 p.m.

Proceeds from ticket sales benefit the school.

Junior Sisk Band, 2024 Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music of America (SPBGMA) Album of the Year winner, headlined in 2025 with The Churchmen gospel group will starting things off.

In 2026, Lonesome River Band will headline and The Churchmen will open.

Lonesome River Band is lead by Sammy Shelor, a five-time International Bluegrass Music Association (IBMA) Banjo Player of the Year and winner of the Steve Martin Prize for Excellence in Banjo and Bluegrass.

"It's gonna be fun," said Adams, of Pine Hall. "It's always been a really good concert. We've got a really good audience."


'The Music Man'

Cleo Lemons, grandfather of Stokes County Sheriff Joey Lemons, started the Annual Bluegrass Show and kept it going for decades.

After Cleo passed away in 2016, "Bluegrass Today" magazine published an article by John Lawless that notes his contribution to the genre:

"Lemons was among the first promoters to book Lester Flatt & Earl Scruggs. He had contacted them as soon as he learned that the pair had formed their own group after leaving Bill Monroe, bringing them in to perform at the Sandy Ridge High School in Stokes County, NC in 1948."

Adams recalled that The Osborne Brothers filled in for the 1969 show. Lester Flatt eventually came back with a different band, and

many Opry acts came to Sandy Ridge to do the show over the years.

Cleo Lemons, "The Music Man," had started a tradition that with enduring significance.

"Cleo was really passionate about the concert," Adams said. "He understood the history of it in association with Flatt and Scruggs and the other Grand Ole Opry people."

Things almost stalled out when Lemons had to step back in 2011.

"They were not going to have a concert, and so I thought it'd be a good time to step in," Adams said. "And Cleo had told me previously that he wished I would take it...so I did."

Several loyal sponsors have supported the event over the years as well as new ones. Along with ticket sales, enough is brought in to pay the musicians and make a donation to Sandy Ridge Elementary School.

"I've had a lot of good help from different directions," Adams said.

There's also been interest from documentary television programs and films exploring traditional music.

"It's a lot of stories that are associated with this little concert,"

said Adams.

The show posters are one of those stories. The iconic Nashville print shop Hatch Show Print used to print the promotional materials for the Sandy Ridge and send them to Stokes County on busses several weeks in advance.

So the posters from the 1969 Flat and Scruggs show in Sandy Ridge — that they didn't end up playing — had already been printed.

Lemons had one of those original posters for the '69 show, but he might have traded it with The Osbourne Brothers' bus driver, Adams said.

Hatch Show Print music posters were collector's items.

"It just made it really interesting, the more you dig into it," Adams said.

"It's just a lot of history there that a lot of entertainment fans don't realize, and that's been a big thing for me since I started organizing it," he said. "I think it's got a certain amount of value both in North Carolina history, Stokes County history and just bluegrass music and country music history in general."

PARK SUPERINTENDENT

Built in the 1930s, Hanging Rock State Park offers sheer cliffs and peaks of bare rock, quiet forests and cascading waterfalls, with views of the Piedmont and the Blue Ridge that stretch for miles.

Hanging Rock's allure is strong. In 2024, visitors to the park numbered nearly 1 million, and it was the seventh most visited state park in North Carolina.


Visitors enjoy the park in many ways. There are 21 miles of hiking trails, 5 miles of bridle trails and 15 miles of mountain bike trails. The park hosts regular events and family programs that are free and open to the public, and topics range from adegids to zoology and everything in between. Last year, park staff provided 478 nature programs and guided hikes to 4660 people.

NEW TRAILS

A new section of the Hanging Rock Trail, which leads to the park's namesake rock formation, was opened for hikers in February. The old section of trail was severely eroded, followed a steep contour, and was becoming hazardous to users. The new section of trail is 6 feet wide and now has no steps. Hikers can walk a more gradual incline to the summit than before. The added distance made the trail 0.4 miles longer, but it's almost unnoticeable since the climb is gentler.

Several miles of Mountains-to-Sea-Trail are currently being built that will connect Hanging Rock to the middle of Danbury.





VADE MECUM MEANS 'GO WITH ME'

The renovation of Vade Mecum is progressing well. In late 2025, the park will be re-opening the Vade Mecum area for visitors. The hotel will open with 14 individual guest rooms available to reserve for overnight visits. Twelve rooms will be queen beds, two will be king ADA suites. Each room will have its own private bathroom — a big change from the old hotel with 30 tiny rooms and only 4 shared bathrooms! Each room will have a TV and Wi-Fi.

An elevator will help guests navigate the three stories. The dining hall has been converted to a small restaurant for overnight guests. The park is exploring opening the restaurant to the public at some point. The Pretty Room, a former conference room, will be furnished as a library / lounge for hotel guests. Offices have been updated for staff and will include a gift shop off the lobby.

The beautiful double-decker porch will remain the same, with rocking chairs, ferns and a breeze. Park staff, with the help of local historian Steve Shelton, are working with exhibit experts to develop interpretive displays that will grace the hallway walls telling the eventful and storied history of the property.

The chapel now has a restroom addition with an adjoining bridal room and was given a full face lift inside and out with a new roof, heating and AC.

A modern restroom building is being built beside the gym for hikers and day visitors. A widened two lane road, parking lots, sidewalks, exterior lighting, landscaping with native plants and underground utilities will complete the facility upgrade. Look for more updates about a grand opening event in fall 2025!!!

RENT A HANGING ROCK CABIN

Visitors are familiar with the picnic areas, lake and trails, but sometimes overlook the vacation cabins that are available to reserve.

Ten cabins are located on Cabin Road near the campground and are within walking distance of most trailheads and the lake.

Cabins 1-6 were built in the 1960s, and Cabin 7-10 were from 2006. They have central heating and AC and are open year-round. Each cabin has a screen porch, charcoal grill, picnic table and a community style campfire ring with benches.

The cabins are designed for up to six people comfortably, and they all have similar layouts. Each cabin has its own bathroom with showers. The living room has a pull-out sleeper sofa and cushioned chairs and adjoins the dining area with a table for six. The kitchen includes sink, oven, refrigerator, microwave, coffee

maker, dishes, silverware, pots and pans, and cooking utensils. There are two bedrooms, each with two twin beds. Sleeping capacity is extended by the pull-out sofas in each living room. Cabins 1-6 have queen sleepers, and Cabins 7-10 have full sleepers.

Guests must supply their own bed and bath linens, food and toiletries. The gift shop in the Visitor Center carries supplies for sale in case anything vital is forgotten. Sorry, pets are not allowed in the cabin area.

Prices are \$110 per night, with a two-night minimum stay. A seven-night Monday to Monday stay is required from mid-June through August for a reduced weekly rate of \$520. Reservations can be made online at www. ncparks.gov/make-reservation or by phone at 1-877-722-6762. Reservations are highly recommended as cabins can be reserved 6 months ahead of time.







FRANCISCO CRUISE-IN

A WHOOTY OF A TIME

While most vintage automobiles stand out among their modern peers, Francisco farmer Joe Glen George's 1966 Ford Bronco Roadster was iconic even when it was new.

It has no doors, no roof, was one of only 5,000 produced with that body style (U13), and it sat in view on the Pilot Mountain Ford Motor Co. lot for two years before George bought it.

So plenty of locals were happy to see the familiar Bronco back in Francisco on June 15 for the inaugural Cruise-In and Art Extravaganza presented by Our Communities of NW Stokes.

"It's kind of neat because all these folks here remember it or remember the people that owned it," said new owner Cindy Wilson, of Mount Airy, who purchased the vehicle from George's son last year. "She's in the neighborhood where she grew up, her old stomping grounds."

Wilson said she picked up lots of the Bronco's history from the George family when she bought it and had been hearing lots of new stories throughout the day from cruise-in visitors.

As a kid, Roger Stevens, one of the event organizers, used to play ball with George's sons Don and Jimmy on the field where the cruise-in was held next to the Francisco Elementary School.

"Their dads would sit in the Bronco, under the big oak trees that were up there at one time and watch them play ball in this field," Wilson said. "Other people would walk

up and say, 'ohh this was Joe Glen's, I've been looking at this thing for 40 years!"

Another Francisco resident told Wilson he would leave high school and go sit in the Bronco at the dealership.

"He loved it so much, and he just turned 16 and he really wanted one," Wilson said.

David Parker, of Francisco, recalled riding to school in Raleigh in the Bronco with Jimmy George.

Wilson named the vehicle "Pearl" (because she's rare and pearl colored), and made a few fixes to get her running and safe, but otherwise plans to leave the Bronco in original condition — including the Pilot Mountain Ford sticker on the back bumper.

"All these stories are so awesome," Wilson said. "I've really enjoyed it."

WHAT'S A WHOOTY?

The Bronco's return to Francisco helped make the community's inaugural cruise-in extra special.

"It's been amazing," said Texie Jessup, event coordinator.

About 100 cars participated and visitors — some from as far as Nevada — were plentiful.

The idea of a cruisein in Francisco had been in the works for some time.

Stevens, a Francisco resident and automotive painter who frequents car shows, had for several years been sitting on the idea of making an owl out of a Harley-Davidson gas tank and the "WHOOTY" acronym: WHO is number One This Year.

"I waited for the perfect opportunity," Stevens said. About five or six years ago, while Stevens battled cancer, the Francisco community held a benefit for him. It meant a lot. A community cruise-in with a WHOOTY prize was that perfect opportunity to use the idea and give back.

> He built the owl-shaped WHOOTY as a best in show prize that would stay on display in the

Francisco Community Building throughout the year with a photograph of the winner.

"It iust kind of snowballed from that," Stevens said. He and fellow artist Jamie Smith also

> crafted smaller WHOOTY's for winners of different categories to keep.

ART EXTRAVAGANZA

Across the street from the cruise-in at the school, in the relatively cool shade of the Francisco Community Building, home cooked food was available for purchase and folks filled the tables surrounded by works by local

Stevens, who uses old satellite dishes and automotive paint to create vintage style signs, displayed his art for the first time.

He paints what he likes, Smith helps out with the fine detail work and, much to the disappointment of many of those who viewed the exhibit, the pieces aren't really for sale.

"I like old antique stuff," he said, recalling that he saw an old 7 Up sign at an antique store one time that he liked but the price tag was too high. So he decided to make his own, and he kept at it.

"I'll look up stuff on the internet and if I see something with an oval shape that will compare with a satellite dish then I'll make me a sign for it,"

Though Stevens had been taking his 1969 Chevrolet Camaro (which he also painted) to car shows for years, the art extravaganza was the first time his sign art had been on exhibit to the public.

"It's pretty neat," he said of

the experience.

Those who went home with a "Whooty" by Stevens or Smith (who also doesn't sell his art) truly won something priceless.

Tina Moore, of Danville, Virginia, also had never done an art exhibit before.

She creates vases using a pour paint technique makes jewelry and other trinkets using by-products of the process called "drippings."

Stevens had run across Moore's work and was excited about it, Moore said.

"I love to see people get as excited about my stuff as I get excited," Moore said, so when Stevens asked her to be a part of the art exhibit, her response was: "Well, why the heck not."

It worked out well for Moore.

"The last show, where I saw [Stevens] was a three day show, and I've almost sold more here than I did at a three-day event," Moore said. "I'm definitely not complaining."

The art exhibit also provided

an opportunity for 12-year-old Delana Kitzmiller to display her work for the first time.

"It feels nice," said Delana, of Sandy Ridge.

Delana was not an official exhibitor but had asked her dad Ted Kitzmiller if she could set up her drawings to display, having driven by and seeing a sign advertising the event.

She was inspired, "just coming and knowing that I'm able to do this," she said.

Delana set up her sketchbooks on a table for folks to view.

"So far, everybody who see's it likes it," Ted Kitzmiller said. "Just wanted to give her a chance to be up here and let people see her work."

WHO GETS THE WHOOTY?

The event culminated with an award ceremony where silent auction and raffle winners were announced.

WHOOTY winners, who were chosen by ballot and staff picks, were also announced.

Rodney Burcham, of





BE THE 'FIRST TO CELEBRATE THE FOURTH' IN THE COVE

Fourth of July celebrations commemorate the July 4, 1776 signing of the Declaration of Independence, but for Stokes County business owner Aaron Shaver, the holiday represents an additional anniversary.

"My first event was the Lawsonville fireworks," said Shaver, owner of Town Fork Mobile Kitchen, thinking back on things just a few minutes before the fireworks started at this year's "First to Celebrate the Fourth" in Walnut Cove on July 3.

Town Fork has been a vendor at the annual Independence Day event since the Lawsonville fireworks were discontinued.

Shaver, of Germanton, noted how that first event helped shape his business.

"I didn't intend on being a hibachi food truck; I was going to be a smash burger, roving little gourmet truck," he said, but the Lawsonville event already had a taco truck and a burger truck.

So Shaver changed gears.

"I was like, what can I do to not be in anybody else's lane, to be different and what could I do fast," he said. "I ended up doing this, and it went over really well, so then I did it again...and now that's what I do."

Shaver described Walnut Cove's 2024 event as fantastic.

"Definitely a good crowd," he said. "It's always a good crowd, but I think it's a little bigger crowd this year actually."

The food truck operator said his history with "First to Celebrate the Fourth" goes way back, well before he started Town Fork.

"We've lived in this county for 25 years, and my kids have grown up coming here every Fourth of July," he said. "It's a nice, small-town, hometown event, and it's grown over the years."

Shaver's more recent visits to the annual event have been work related, but it's still a family affair. His 20-year-old daughter, Addy, spent the evening working too.

"I love it," said Addy. "When I was little, I used to be one of the kids standing up at the front dancing the whole time, that was the best."

Addy Shaver said that while it was a bit strange to work at the event it was still a great experience.

"I love that we still get to see the fireworks every time and see everybody," she said.

The popular event was held at Lions Park in Walnut Cove, which was soon filled to capacity. By 8 p.m. nearby business lots were filled with overflow traffic eager for a good view of the fireworks.

Other vendors included Kona Ice, Rub & Grub and Boy Scout Troop #444.

The Phase Band provided musical entertainment.

"It's going great," said Earnest Johnson, band manager and performer.

"The crowd is very motivated...very responsive," he said. "We just love coming to Walnut Cove. They always welcome us with open arms."

While on a break from dancing, Patrina Adams, of Walnut Cove, sat with Frances Martin and Phyllis Hairston. Adams said she was having a good time.

"Truly, yeah," she said. "The band's awesome.... They always do a great job," said Martin, adding that the trio had seen the band perform at one of The Cove Group's downtown concerts the previous Thursday.

The annual event is a tradition for lots of folks.

"Every year," said Sam McBride, of Walnut Cove, there with his wife, Jennifer, and son Codey. The McBrides like to tailgate in a pickup and showed up last year at 3:30 p.m. to grab a spot in the front parking row at the top of the hill. This year, the couple had to work, and their 5:30 arrival got them through the gate, but a row or two back.

"The event is going

absolutely great," said Mayor Nellie Brown. "The crowd is large this year, we've got people from surrounding areas...family, friends, everybody is bringing the kids out, which is nice to see all the young children running around having a good time."

Brown thanked a long list of those who helped make the day special: the citizens of Walnut Cove, the Phase Band, the Walnut Cove Lions Club, Wetzel Pyrotechnics for the fireworks, Cook Rental for the bandstand, Royal Luxury Rentals for the restrooms, the vendors: Walnut Cove Boy Scouts Troop 444, the town staff, the Stokes County Sheriff's Office, Chief Brian Booe and the Walnut Cove Fire Department, Walnut Cove Fire Marshal Jason Farris.

Brown also thanked the veterans for their service, and noted that all the town commissioners attended the event.

Andrew Smith, retiring building inspector, delivered the invocation at the event and was honored for his retirement. Smith started working for the town in 1985.
