season to lead the league with 46 points. A two-year captain and Bentley University commit, Lawrence never let King Philip's offense slow down at any point due to her ability to create at will while also looking to create chances for her teammates. She is a multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Dani Lomuscio, King Philip

A junior midfielder for King Philip, Lomuscio was key in kick-starting the offense while also limiting any chance opposing attacks had at trying to cut a deficit. She was third on the team in goals scored with 14 and led in assists with 19, feeding either Lawrence or Thompson up top. Lomuscio was a Hockomock League All-Star while also earning Eastern Mass. All-Star recognition as both a playmaker and goal scorer.

Mikayla Thompson, King Philip

When Lawrence was unable to find the twine, Thompson was right there for the chances. A creative player in a dangerous King Philip attack, Thompson scored 17 goals with nine assists throughout the season for the Warriors, who went 16-3 and made it to the Division 1 Round of 16 for the second straight season. A Hockomock League All-Star, Thompson was also an Eastern Mass. All-Star.

Olivia Dunham, Mansfield

Another young star in Mansfield who continues to improve, Dunham stepped into the midfield spot with defensive intentions as one of the first players opposing offenses saw. The Hockomock League's 'Underclassman of The Year' as a sophomore league all-star, Dunham was another key piece to Mansfield's defensive wall and pivotal to setting up the attack. She had five goals and 26 assists, and was a league all-star. A defensive player, Dunham played out of position all season due to the team's need for someone to organize the midfield. "She's a centerback by trade," Mansfield coach Kevin Smith said. "I needed her as a center-mid, so she's been playing out of position all year. For her to do what she did this year is even better. I thought it was just amazing."

Aly Fernandes, Mansfield

A young phenom in the Hockomock League, Fernandes led Mansfield in scoring for the second straight season with 15 goals and six assists. The sophomore was a key winger for the Davenport Division champs and Div. 2 state finalists. A playmaker and goal scorer who plays at a level well past that of a sophomore, Fernandes was a Hockomock League All-Star. "She got better and better as the year went on as she's learning and understanding how teams are starting to play her," Mansfield coach Kevin Smith said. "People have to respect how fast and how good of a scorer she is and that alone opens up other people."

Jill Kopyy, Mansfield

A three-year starter for Mansfield at right back, Kopyy was often paired with one of the best attackers. The Hornets' senior posted four goals alongside Santos on the back line, helping Mansfield be a tough team to crack with two goals or more allowed in games six times this past season. "She was always shutting down the best forward or winger. She's been a stud for us for years," Mansfield coach Kevin Smith said.

Kara Santos, Mansfield

An anchor centerback for the Hornets, Santos started every game over the past four years for Mansfield, which recorded 11 shutouts with the senior leader on the back line. Mansfield posted 38 shutouts in Santos' high school career. She had seven goals with four assists this season and lined up for free kicks. A three-time Hockomock League All-Star, her ability in the air and to take the ball from opponents proved to be a massive part in Mansfield's first-ever run to the Div. 1 state final. "Her play was definitely the key to our back line," Mansfield coach Kevin Smith said of the a multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star. "She played in all 74 games, started all 74. I don't think I've had anyone do that. The level of trust was super high. She kept showing how good of a leader she was by taking on what she was taught from her freshman year and passing it on. She's able to really marshal (the entire defense) together as a group."

Abbie Pratt, North Attleboro

Pratt did everything for the Rocketeers, starting games as a centerback, midfielder and striker. A capable fielder in all spots, the senior's strength came on defense due to her ability to put her body on the line and show no fear

against opposing strikers. A Hockomock League All-Star, Pratt scored one goal while proving her value to the team on defense in her 18 games. She is a multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Phoebe Gesner, Norton

Gesner matched Norton's high in assists with eight along with scoring a team-leading 10 goals, for a team-high 18 points. A two-year striker at the varsity level, her versatility saw her move throughout the field to outside or center back or to a holding midfield position when needed. A leader and specialist as well, she's committed to compete in both soccer and track and field for University of Massachusetts Dartmouth. "Phoebe is a dedicated and hard-working athlete with determination and resiliency who has great ball control, mobility, route running, field awareness, and game IQ," Norton coach Meagan Elliott said. "She was the team specialist for free kicks and corner kicks and stepped up as a leader this year on the field both physically and verbally. Never settles and is always looking to improve."

Kaylin Hebert, Norton

Hebert played every minute in goal for Norton this season, racking up 1,600 minutes with 178 saves and a goals against average of 1.6 (85% save percentage). Her seven shutouts marked a career best, and she also had one assist. With soft hands, power and one of the strongest clearing kicks from keepers in the area, the senior was selected a Tri-Valley League All-Star. She also was the Lancers' MVP and an Eastern Mass. All-Star. "(An) absolute beast as an athlete and an incredible soccer player," Norton coach Meagan Elliott said of Hebert, who will attend Assumption University. "Kaylin is a big communicator on the field, and not just when we are in our defensive zone. She will direct the offensive play from the box as well. Insane work rate, meticulous work ethic, strong leadership, above-average game IQ, extreme dedication, and high caliber fitness. Solid hands, great technical ball skills, unreal power and strength (goal kicks consistently go minimum 45-50 yards and punts consistently go 50-plus yards). She's the definition of a player who changes an entire soccer program for the better." Hebert is a multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Zoe Santos, Norton

Santos' eight assists tied the team lead in the category and her six goals put her third on the team, capping her third year at the varsity level. An attacking midfielder, Santos nearly every play ran through the junior whether it was on offense or defense, playing with skill and grace while also being forceful on and off the ball. "She's an active part of every single play we make as a team, both defensively and offensively," Norton coach Meagan Elliott said. "The ball is constantly at her feet whether she is winning a tackle defensively, progressing our attacking possession, and then assisting a goal or scoring herself. She plays composed, effortlessly and gracefully, but is extremely forceful and dominant at the same time. Zoe was double- and triple-marked everywhere on the field this season and still had minimal issues controlling the ball and maintaining possession."

Gabriel Dergham, Tri-County

The senior played through the whistle, never giving up from wire-to-wire as a way to lead by example. Dergham's final season with the Cougars saw her put home 10 goals with seven assists while donning the captain's arm band. In her final game, Dergham scored twice and had two assists as an integral midfielder to Tri-County's 8-7-1 season.
