FIREMEN PRAISED FOR STOPPING HEBRON BLAZE

Whole Camp Ground Was in Danger But Only Five Cottages Were Destroyed--Pawtucket Woman Partially Stunned by Bolt Which Started Fire.

In a letter to the Sun today, William Hutchinson of Camp Hebron expresses his sincere thanks to the members of the Attleboro fire department for their efficient work yesterday in extinguishing the blaze at Camp Hebron which destroyed five cottages.

His letter follows: "To the Editor of the Attleboro Sun:—Will you, through your columns, kindly extend to the fire departments of Attleboro and Hebronville the heart-felt thanks of the cottagers and myself for the prompt and efficient services rendered at the fire yesterday at Camp Hebron."

Today it was learned that Mrs. Alfred Pollard of Pawtucket, came near meeting with serious injuries from lightning. A bolt entered her cottage and fire started there immediately afterwards. Mrs. Pollard was seated in the cottage with her infant child and she was partially stunned by the lightning. She managed to make her escape before the flames spread to any great extent.

She said: "I was sitting in the rocking chair with baby in my arms when a bolt struck in the house. I felt a stinging sensation in my arms. I was able to rise and ran out of the house. I clung to baby, but he seemed not to be in the least frightened. He only laughed."

"I had been in a neighboring cottage but a few moments when I smelled smoke, and looked out to see my cottage afire. I had to go from cottage to cottage as they were burning up one after another."

"The Hebronville camp meeting grounds were brought into existence by the American Millennial society, but later passed into possession of the Pentecostal society, or 'Holiness Jumpers' as some term them. There are about 50 cottages and two large tabernacles on the ground."

MRS. C. E. WILBUR IN BOATING ACCIDENT

Fell from Catboat at Biddeford, Me., and Was Rescued with Difficulty.

Mrs. Charles E. Wilbur of Attleboro had a narrow escape from drowning Wednesday at Biddeford, Me., where she is stopping for the summer with Mr. Wilbur and Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Estes of Attleboro. She was knocked overboard from a small catboat and was rescued with great difficulty by Mr. Estes and Mr. Wilbur.

Mrs. Wilbur and Mr. and Mrs. Estes started on a sailing trip Wednesday afternoon. When the boat was a short distance from the shore a heavy wave washed over the stern and Mrs. Wilbur stood up suddenly to escape getting wet. Another wave struck the boat while she was standing with the result that she was thrown overboard, head first.

Mr. Wilbur, who witnessed the accident from the shore, immediately plunged into the water and swam to her aid. Mr. Estes, who was in charge of the catboat, also jumped overboard to her rescue. When he reached Mrs. Wilbur she was nearly exhausted, and it is doubtful if he would have been able to rescue her alone. Mr. Wilbur reached the spot soon after and between the two they managed to get Mrs. Wilbur ashore. She was assisted home and experienced no bad results from the incident.

Disloyalty Among Czar's Troops

St. Petersburg, July 27.—While Emperor Nicholas was reviewing the troops encamped at Krasnoye-Selo, the Semenovskiy regiment refused to participate in the maneuvers and broke up the order of parade. They demanded the retirement from their command of General Roman. The regiment was immediately dismissed from parade and its barracks searched. Much illegal literature and papers were found and four soldiers of the regiment were placed under arrest.

Firemen Seriously Hurt

Albany, July 27.—Six firemen were seriously injured, four by the collapse of a ladder on which they were working and two by the giving away of a roof, at a fire in a stable and storehouse owned by Swift & Co., packers. The injured all will recover.

Court Acquits Anarchists

Mannheim, Ger., July 27.—Twenty-nine anarchists, composing the entire national convention of the German Anarchist societies, who were placed on trial here on the charge of holding an illegal open air meeting, were acquitted by the court.

Death Penalties Confirmed

Guatemala City, July 27.—The supreme court of Guatemala has confirmed the death penalty of all those sentenced in connection with the recent attempt to assassinate President Cabrera and who had appealed their cases to the highest court.

A naval parade by United States war vessels on the lakes will be a feature of the ceremonies attending the unveiling of the Victory monument at Put In Bay, O., in memory of Perry's victory.

G. H. Folger, superintendent of the terminal division of the Boston and Maine railroad, has been appointed assistant general superintendent of the railroad, an office just created.

EXPRESS CLERK SAID TO HAVE STOLEN \$36

In Court Today, Earle & Prew Company Acknowledged Satisfaction—Case Filed.

Edmund W. Cheever of North Attleboro was arraigned in the district court this morning on a charge of larceny of \$36 from the South Attleboro office of the Earle & Prew Express company. Satisfaction was acknowledged by the company and the case against Cheever was dismissed on payment of costs which amounted to \$9.50.

It was alleged that Cheever was given a package containing \$36 on the 29th of May to deliver to the Estate of O. M. Draper. He returned his express book to the office with the signature of Mrs. E. McLane, the estate's bookkeeper, showing that the package had been received. It is alleged that he forged Mrs. McLane's name, and that the package was never received.

Cheever pleaded not guilty to the charge of larceny, but later the attorneys in the case agreed on a settlement. Restitution was made and satisfaction was acknowledged. With that understanding the court ordered the case dismissed. Judge P. E. Brady appeared for the company and George H. Davis of North Attleboro for the defendant.

VIRGINS' GARLANDS.

Memorials in an English Church to Girls True to First Love.

There are seven "virgins' garlands" still in existence in Minsterley church, Salop, the first of them bearing the date 1554 and the last 1751.

They consist of silk ribbons and paper, ball shaped, and are covered with rosettes, the inside center of the cane or wire frame supporting a pair of paper gloves. They represent a romantic custom of very ancient origin and are sacred to the memory of girls who while betrothed in their youth lost their intended husbands by death, yet remained true to their first loves.

Each maiden designed her own garland, and at her death this shapely emblem was borne before her by the village lasses, the white gloves being afterward added. After the obsequies these garlands were suspended in the village church on a rod bearing at its extremity a heart in the shape of an escutcheon, upon which the initials and date were inscribed. These were originally fixed above the maiden's pew.

Some of the earliest and forgotten garlands were composed of real flowers, but later the covered hoops described were substituted.

There is a passing allusion to this "simple memorial of the early dead" in "Hamlet." "Yet here she is allowed her virgin crants," "crants" signifying garlands.—London Graphic.

J. H. WARD RESIGNS AS PRINCIPAL OF MEDWAY SCHOOL

John H. Ward of Attleboro, son of John Ward, has declined reappointment as principal of the Medway high school for season of 1907-1908. He has accepted an appointment as teacher at Bridgewater, and does not care to continue his work at Medway. He is a graduate of the Attleboro high school and of Brown university.

LOCAL MAN GIVEN BRITISH PENSION

Charles Bilson of Mechanics st. has secured a pension from the British government, negotiations having been concluded by Judge Philip E. Brady. Mr. Bilson was a member of the Light brigade, immortalized in Tennyson's poem, and was awarded a medal for service in the Alma battle. He took part in the ride at Balaklava, in which 600 were sent against an army by a mistake in orders, and was also at the battle of Sebastopol. Mr. Bilson also saw service in the Indian mutiny under Sir Colin Campbell and holds medals for serving in the Turkish army. He is married and has lived in Attleboro for a number of years.
