

# The Softball All-Stars

## Hailey Perry, Attleboro

The Bombardier junior shortstop played every inning of every game (committing just three errors) and batted .466 atop the batting order. “She’s a stalwart, an absolute competitor,” Bombardier coach Mark Homer said. The quick-footed three-year varsity player, “has great range and did a great job of preventing balls to get through the infield and saved runs,” Homer added. Perry drove in 18 runs and scored 17 runs. She is also a member of the AHS basketball team.

## Lindsey Perry, Attleboro

“She’s very collected under pressure,” AHS coach Mark Homer said of the junior, the recipient of the Coaches Award. Perry hit at a .365 rate out of the No. 2 spot in the batting order, stole six bases, while driving in 22 runs. As a pitcher, Perry posted a 4-3 record with a 3.40 ERA, taking 31 strikeouts over 47 innings. And as a second baseman, Perry committed just two errors and was a Hockomock League All-Star. “She was a great contact hitter, especially with a two-strike count,” Homer said.

## Lora Woyton, Attleboro

The Bombardier MVP each of the past two seasons and a two-year captain, the senior pitcher-catcher “is a natural leader and team player,” according to AHS coach Mark Homer. Batting No. 4 in the order, Woyton hit .469, while driving in 22 runs. In the pitching circle, Woyton compiled a 5-3 record with a 2.20 ERA and 43 strikeouts over 47 inning. “She’s the most unselfish player that I’ve had the privilege to coach,” Homer said. Woyton will attend Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts in the fall.

## Haley Coupal, Bishop Feehan

The Shamrocks’ dynamic junior shortstop was the MVP of the CCL. A product of the Thunder Softball program, the two-year starter batted .432 this season, collecting 16 hits and driving in 12 runs. “She’s a productive player with her bat and her glove,” Shamrock coach Bill Milot said. In the field, Coupal had 27 putouts and 20 assists. Coupal owned a .543 OBP and a .676 slugging rate, while scoring 17 runs..

## Haley Petrucci, Bishop Feehan

Without a doubt, the Shamrock junior catcher dominated the field with her defense behind the plate and with her bat, hitting anywhere from leadoff to cleanup in the order. “Her defense is unbelievable (one passed ball) and she crushes the ball with her bat,” coach Bill Milot said. The All-CCL selection belted 28 hits for a dazzling .657 batting average. Petrucci smashed four homers and drove in 17 runs, owning a .706 OBP and a 1.095 slugging rate.

## Lucy Latour, Dighton-Rehoboth

Without a doubt, the rookie of the year in the South Coast Conference, the Falcon freshman was a player of impact, atop the batting order and stationed in the outfield. Latour batted .403 (with 20 hits, including five doubles, two triples and a homer), while having a .473 OBP. Latour drove in 11 runs and scored six runs for the Division 2 South champions, having just one error in the field. She is also a member of the basketball team.

## Emily Marcotte, Dighton-Rehoboth

The quick-footed, sure-gloved Falcon center fielder and leadoff hitter in the order was a catalyst for the Falcons’ SCC and Division 2 South title success. “She made things happen,” coach Katie Holmes said of Marcotte, who batted .414 (24 hits with three doubles, one triple and three homers). Marcotte drove in 14 runs and scored 13 runs. In the field, Marcotte made 11 putouts and had just one error with her solid “read and react” tendencies.

## Kyleigh McGreevy, Dighton-Rehoboth

The Framingham State College-bound McGreevy was one of the most feared players in the SCC due to her defensive tenacity at catcher and hitting, batting in the No 3 or 4 spot. McGreevy batted .528 on the season with a .561 OBP. McGreevy smashed 28 hits, including two triples and a team-best six homers, while driving in 21 runs. Behind the plate, McGreevy had a hand in 138 putouts, while committing just two errors.

## Eliana Raposo, Dighton-Rehoboth

D-R’s starting goalkeeper in soccer and playmaker on the basketball court, Raposo was the pitcher of record for the MIAA Division 2 South and SCC champion Falcons. Raposo took the ball and flourished in the MIAA Tournament with five wins in the circle. She posted an 8-2 record in 13 appearances with 105 strikeouts in 75 innings. At the plate, Raposo did not strike out once. She batted .625 with a .660 OBP, having 30 hits (five doubles, two triples, six homers), while driving in 23 runs and scoring 20 runs.

## Emma Callahan, Foxboro

How many eighth graders pitch shutouts (of Medfield and Notre Dame) in the MIAA Tournament as Callahan did for the 11-win Warriors? “Without her, we were in trouble,” Foxboro coach Mark Maguire said of her impact in the circle. She posted an 11-5 record with 60 strikeouts over 83 innings. Callahan was just as important at the plate where she batted .426 with 20 hits and five doubles while scoring 15 runs.

## Peyton Feldman, Foxboro

A two-year starter at third base, the Warrior junior Hockomock League All-Star stroked the ball for a .583 batting average.

Feldman slashed 28 hits with seven doubles and two triples. “She’s such a heads-up baserunner,” coach Mark Maguire cited of her situational instincts and footspeed, scoring 24 runs in the leadoff spot of the batting order. With Feldman, the Warriors won 11 games and advanced to the Division 2 South semifinals. Feldman also filled in at left field and is a captain-elect for next season.

## Morgan Sylvestre, Foxboro

A two-year captain and two-year starter at shortstop, the three-sport (soccer, basketball) standout was a Hockomock League All-Star for the 11-win, Division 2 South semifinalist Warriors. Sylvestre batted .452 out of the No. 3 spot in the order. “She’s very focused at the plate, has great hand-eye coordination and great timing,” Foxboro coach Mark Maguire said of Sylvestre, who showed great anticipation and footwork to take away hits.

## Jordan Bennett, King Philip

In her first varsity season, Bennett proved that she belonged in the pitching circle. Bennett posted an 8-1 record with a 2.43 ERA. “She was beyond our expectations,” KP coach Kate Comeau said of her mound and plate contributions. Bennett totaled 48 strikeouts in 60 ⅓ innings of work for the 14-win Division 1 South Tournament semifinalist Warriors. At the plate, Bennett hit .271 and drove in 11 runs out of the No. 9 spot in the order. She is also a member of the KP basketball team.

## Paige Berdos, King Philip

The Warriors’ senior center fielder was an undeniable leader on and off the field, being named KP’s “Female Athlete of the Year” as well. Berdos, batting in the leadoff spot, stroked 21 hits with six doubles to finish with a .350 batting average. She drove in 14 runs, stole four bases and scored 21 runs. In the field, her foot speed and anticipation allowed her to make 21 putouts and start two double plays. Also a track athlete, she will attend Endicott College.

## Sarah Cullen, King Philip

Warrior coach Kate Comeau can’t count the number of plays that Cullen executed to deny extra bases or a run with her defense behind the plate. “She’s just remarkable, so very sound defensively,” Comeau said of the errorless Cullen, who had 66 putouts and four assists. Also a third baseman, Cullen batted in the No. 3 and 4 spots of the order, hitting .500 with five triples and three homers among her 23 hits. She drove in 18 runs, scored 16 runs and struck out just three times.

## Charlotte Raymond, King Philip

Another super sophomore and a foundation for the Warrior future, the right fielder and first baseman made substan-

Raymond drove in 19 runs, scored 23 runs and had a 1.018 slugging percentage. In the field, she made just one error and had three assists.

## Libby Walsh, King Philip

The Warriors’ sophomore shortstop was destined for big things in her first varsity season before a torn ACL sent her to the sidelines for the MIAA Tournament. “She’s a natural,” KP coach Kate Comeau said. Stationed at No 3 in the order, Walsh batted .438 with a .875 slugging percentage, clubbing two home runs, while driving in 12 runs. “In the field, she’s a golden glove performer,” Comeau said of her situational skills.
