

The Baseball All-Stars

Tyler Dunlea, Attleboro

A workhorse who took over the biggest games for the Bombardiers, Dunlea led the team in innings pitched at 35, going 3-3 with 37 strikeouts and an ERA of 2.20. Owning a powerful right arm with a complementary off-speed repertoire, the two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star closed out his senior season as the Bombardiers' ace and a Hockomock League All-Star.

Michael Huntington, Attleboro

Rarely did Huntington get beat by an opposing pitcher this season, tallying 24 hits with 12 RBIs, 22 runs scored and 11 stolen bases — all team-high totals. The senior Hockomock League All-Star batted .407 as a dependable member for his final season for the Bombardiers in the outfield. Huntington is a two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Jack Gasse, Bishop Feehan

Gasse logged 61 ²/₃ innings on the mound and when he got the ball, the Shamrocks delivered in the grandest of ways. In 11 appearances (10 starts) Bishop Feehan's team MVP went 9-0 for half of the Shamrocks' total wins with 44 strikeouts, only four walks issued and an ERA of 0.90 in 61 ²/₃ innings. The junior's WHIP was even lower at 0.71. The Catholic Central League All-Star's elite arm talent will be even tougher to beat next season.

Randen May, Bishop Feehan

An elite talent, May hit .415 with an OPS of 1.216 for the Shamrocks in his senior season at second base. The two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star had seven doubles, legged out five triples, and had a home run to his credit. A top of the order bat, he drove in only eight runs, but scored 28 times and was a perfect 15-for-15 in stealing bases to put himself in scoring position. The Catholic Central League All-Star was perfect in the field, going without an error in 55 total chances.

Andrew Shute, Bishop Feehan

Shute started nine games on the mound as a junior, pitching 33 innings, and went 4-3 with 51 strikeouts. When Shute was on, he was one of the best in the state. At the plate, the Catholic Central League All-Star was one of the biggest pieces to the Shamrock order, hitting .397 with an OPS of 1.019, leading the team in hits (31). A two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star, Shute also had four doubles and five triples and a team-leading 21 RBIs with 16 runs scored as he was the CCL's Offensive Player of The Year.

Jake Webster, Bishop Feehan

Webster's junior season saw him hit .397, posting an OPS of .915 with a 29 hits. He drove in 20 runs and scored 14 times, keeping his strikeouts to a minimum with only five. The Catholic Central League All-Star also stole 10 bases and committed only one error in the field all season.

Lucas LeTourneau, Dighton-Rehoboth

LeTourneau was a Falcons' co-captain and led D-R in most hitting categories for

his senior season. He hit .478 with an OPS of 1.266, posting 32 hits with seven doubles, three triples and a homer. A South Coast Conference All-Star, LeTourneau also drove in 16 runs and was a hard batter to fool, striking out just six times.

Ben Miller, Dighton-Rehoboth

A premier hitter-pitcher combo, Miller garnered South Coast Conference MVP honors. At the plate, the senior batted .424 with seven doubles and 14 RBIs. He was just as impactful on the mound, posting a 1.69 ERA and an opposing batting average of .182. The multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star went 5-3 with 62 punchouts as a big-game player for the 15-win Falcons, finishing his career with a .359 batting average and 139 strikeouts as a pitcher. He will play at Southern Maine next season.

Nolan Gordon, Foxboro

The two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star was nails for the Warriors as a senior in a pitching-only role, firing 40 ¹/₃ innings with a 1.56 ERA and a WHIP of 1.16. Gordon struck out 39 batters and had five winning decisions, along with one save.

Mike Marcucella, Foxboro

The senior catcher was crucial for Foxboro in controlling the pitching staff. A valuable team leader, the senior posted an average of .325 with an on-base percentage of .430. Marcucella drove in three runs, scored 21 runs and utilized his speed for 12 stolen bases. He was also a workhorse behind the plate defensively, gunning down nine base stealers.

Ryan O'Leary, Foxboro

The Hockomock League Davenport Division MVP proved he was a cut above the rest this spring in his senior campaign, posting a mind-boggling 0.84 ERA in 58 innings for Foxboro. The Rhode Island College commit struck out 68, allowed just seven earned runs with an opponent batting average of .198. At the plate, he had 26 hits, batting .356 with nine doubles and a triple. A multiple-time Sun Chronicle All-Star, O'Leary also drove in 13 runs, scored 12 times and was walked 12 times.

Tom Watts, Foxboro

Watts split time between first base and pitcher as a senior with great success. At the dish, the Hockomock League All-Star

batted .333 with 27 hits, five doubles, eight RBIs and 16 runs scored. On the mound, Watts put up elite numbers with a 1.36 ERA, a WHIP of 1.11 and 20 strikeouts in 20 ²/₃ innings of work. Watts is a two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Cam Hasenfus, King Philip

The senior ace for the Warriors went 7-0 in eight starts with 56 ¹/₃ innings pitched, four earned runs allowed and an ERA of 0.49. He scattered 40 hits throughout the year to keep opponents batting averages at .197 with a WHIP of .834. The hard-thrower struck out 57 batters and issued just seven walks in his Hockomock League's Kelley-Rex Division MVP season. Hasenfus posted a 13-2 career mark at King Philip and had a 1.54 ERA in 120.1 innings. He will play at Wheaton College next spring.

Ryan Higgins, King Philip

Higgins was a Hockomock League All-Star and another one of King Philip's very talented arms. In 43 innings (seven starts), the senior hurler put up a 7-2 record with 46 strikeouts with an ERA of 2.60. He also posted a WHIP of 1.14 and an opponents batting average of .218, while walking just 11 batters. Used effectively in a three-man stable, Higgins worked out of both the bullpen and as a starter.
