

Yanks, Aided by 2 Homers Lead Giants, 7 to 1

NEW YORK (AP)—Tied at two victories apiece, the Yankees and Giants met in the fifth game of the world series today before another capacity crowd of some 50,000. The score at the end of the fourth was 7 to 1.

The Giants scored in the very first inning when Monte Irvin got his 10th hit, sending Al Dark to third. Woodling juggled the ball and Dark continued home.

The Yanks went to town in the third inning scoring five runs on three hits. McDougald walloping a grand slam homer.

Here's what happened: Woodling walked. So did Rizzuto, but he was forced at second base on Berra's hit. DiMaggio singled Woodling home. Mize was passed, then came the grand slammer. McDougald's wallop tied a world series record, first set by Elmer Smith Oct. 10, 1920, for Cleveland and equaled by the Yankees' Tony Lazzeri Oct. 2, 1936.

Montie Kennedy replaced Jansen as the Giants' pitcher at the top of the fourth.

Woodling walked and Phil Rizzuto homered to add two runs to the Yanks' tally.

Manager Casey Stengel of the Yankees shook up his lineup, inserting Johnny Mize at first base. He batted fifth. Joe Collins was switched from first to right field. Gene Woodling was returned to leadoff role. That put six south-paw swingers in the lineup.

Manager Leo Durocher of the Giants benched Lefty Hank Thompson and inserted right-hander Clint Hartung in right field. He batted seventh behind Willie Mays. That gave the Giants eight right-handed hitters.

It was a clear, cool day with very little wind.

Today completes the three-game stand at the Polo Grounds and tomorrow the series shifts over to the Harlem river to Yankee stadium, the gray walls of which can be seen from the Polo Grounds.

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Underhill Denies North Gas Co. Is To Be Sold

NORTH ATTLEBORO—J. LeRoy Underhill, president-treasurer of the North Attleboro Gas company, last evening denied a report in yesterday's Daily Sun that the company is about to be sold.

He said that "no one has made an offer" and that the officials of the company are "not anticipating sale at the moment."

In denying a report by a reliable source that negotiations are now going on, Mr. Underhill said his family controls the stock so he felt he should know about it if such a deal is to be made.

In fact, Mr. Underhill said, the company is "looking forward" to business because of natural gas which he expects to reach North Attleboro around August of next year.

He said the report of the sale may have stemmed from a joint hearing held by the Department of Public Utilities recently, on the application of the Brockton Gas Light company and Taunton Gas Light company for permission to merge.

Mr. Underhill said he is interested in that hearing because he "wondered what would happen" to his company's purchase of gas from the Taunton concern.

He said the officers of the North Attleboro company are himself as president-treasurer, his wife, assistant treasurer, his two sons, J. L. Underhill and John Gorham, and J. K. Milliken, directors.

Cool Weather to Stay 5 Days

EXTENDED FORECAST

The temperature in New England during the next five days: Wednesday through Sunday will average two to five degrees below the seasonal normal. Continued cool through the period with no marked day to day changes.

Some normals for the period are as follows: Boston 55, Providence 54, Nantucket 55, New Haven 55, Concord, N. H., 51, Burlington 51, Portland 52, Eastport 49, Greenville 46, and Presque Isle 46.

At Boston the normal maximum temperature during this period is 63, and the normal minimum temperature 47.

Precipitation during this period will on the average total less than one tenth of an inch occurring toward end of the week.

Sturdy Hospital Patients From Many Places

Sturdy Memorial hospital extended its services to 14 nearby communities, in addition to Attleboro, and to 43 other cities and towns, during the month of September, making a total of 495 in comparison with 416 for the month of September in 1950. These figures were given in the director's report issued today.

Patients admitted from this city were 191, from South Attleboro, 34, Haverhill, eight, Dodgeville, two, North Attleboro, 61, Attleboro Falls, 15, Plainville, 17, Wrentham, five, Norton, 30, Charley, 13, Mansfield, 44, Foxboro, 12, Seekonk, eight, Rehoboth, 11 and Franklin, two. There were 125 patients in the hospital at the first of the month and 500 were discharged during the month. Thirty-four children were treated.

The total number of accidents taken to the hospital during the month was 25. The obstetrical patients included 118 mothers and 104 babies. There were 14 deaths during the month.

UN Delegates Work Secretly On Iranian Oil

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Delegates from the United States and other U. N. members worked behind the scenes today in a concerted effort to start Britain and Iran talking together once more about their oil dispute.

They sought to avert an open fight before the security council over Iran's nationalization of the state British-owned oil industry in southern Iran. The council is scheduled to hear the aged, ailing Iranian premier, Mohammed Mossadegh, open his country's case on Thursday.

Reds Sending New Message To Ridgway; Due Tonight

TOKYO (AP)—The Reds will deliver a new message to the Allies tomorrow, presumably their latest word on reopening Korean truce talks.

Tonight they asked allied liaison officers to pick up the message at Panmunjom, proposed new locale for the talks, at 8 a. m. Wednesday, 6 p. m. Attleboro time, Tuesday.

That is only two hours before the time suggested by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway for a meeting of liaison officers in the Panmunjom area to lay detailed plans for renewing cease-fire negotiations.

The Reds gave no indication of what the message would contain. They sent word of the message to Munsan, advance headquarters of the U. N. command armistice delegation, where reports circulated that there may be changes in the five-man allied truce team.

There had been no indication that top Red commanders had drafted their reply to Ridgway's message broadcast Monday night. In it he agreed to renew truce

Staff Sgt. LaMarche Back Home; North Search Called off

Whereabouts of Air Force Flight Technician Caused Parents Concern When He Did Not Return from Attleboro Visit Last Sunday

An alarm, which was spread into a sensationalized story by a metropolitan news service, after the whereabouts of Staff Sgt. Harold LaMarche, 27, of 118 Arnold rd., North Attleboro, became of some concern to his family, was abruptly ended early this afternoon when Sgt. LaMarche, home on furlough from the Air Force base at Roswell, New Mexico, walked into the home of his brother, Richard, and delivered the keys to the latter's auto, which the sergeant had use of over the weekend.

Sgt. LaMarche, who has 10 years Army experience, and has been lately stationed near the atomic base in the deep south, laughed at the idea that there was any need to worry about him. He was in perfect physical condition. No immediate statement as to his whereabouts was available, but Police Chief P. Joseph McKeon of North Attleboro, who got the first report of the return of the soldier, said he planned to have a talk with the soldier later.

In Attleboro, there was relief at the home of his grandfather, Philip LaMarche of 70 George st., where he had visited on Sunday night. He had a long chat with Mr. and Mrs. LaMarche whom he had not seen in two years. While they were certain that Sgt. LaMarche would return in due time, they were anxious to hear that the widespread hunt had ended, and it was with relief that Mrs. LaMarche got the word from the Sun. She had been much concerned over the multiplicity of calls she received from Boston newspapers asking for intimate family details.

Sgt. LaMarche, whose experience includes training with an atom bomb training group for which he had been specially cleared by the FBI, has made many important trips for the Air Force and relatives said that he would not always discuss these trips because of security involved. He was in Europe for 30 months with the Air Force during the late war and he told relatives that he intends to stay in the Army until he reaches retirement age.

Nomination papers in behalf of Mayor Cyril K. Brennan for reelection, and Joseph P. Third Arraigned In Silver Theft

U. S. Cavalrymen Gain U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea (AP)—Chinese Reds, shifted to crucial front today fought fierce hand-to-hand battles with attacking American troops on western and eastern fronts.

U. S. First Division cavalrymen backed out gains of more than a mile near Yonchon on the western front.

Chinese, thrown into action on the eastern front for the first time in five months, checked U. S. Second division attacks on peaks near bloody Heartbreak Ridge.

The Chinese surged east to halt the Allies who have gained up to 15 miles there since the Reds broke off cease-fire talks Aug. 23.

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Ward One Now City's Largest

Ward One, the South Attleboro area, has become the city's biggest voting precinct in total of eligible voters as a result of the concentrated drive concluded for registration there. It was revealed today when the list of voters by wards was recorded by the registrars. There are 1995 persons registered in the ward.

Uptown wards which used to hold sway in the totals have lost out to the south end mostly because of failure of persons eligible to register, it was indicated. Ward 5, which used to top all, has dropped to fourth on the list.

The total of 11,643 voters registered is less by nearly 500 than were eligible to vote in the city election two years ago, despite a recorded gain of more than 300 persons in the city's census total which is now 23,809. South Attleboro recorded 296 in a single registration session in that area, and many more came uptown to register when they could not be accommodated in their home sector.

Party representation is at a low ebb, with 3912 enrolled Republicans and only 754 Democrats. The independents, or persons who decline to affiliate with either party hold sway, with 6977.

South Attleboro Man Arrested on Four Complaints

After he was confronted by two small girls, sisters, who told their stories in his presence at police headquarters, Albert E. Bertenshaw, 59, of 91 Adamsdale ave., South Attleboro was arrested on four charges late last night.

Bertenshaw was charged with assault with intent to rape being wanton and lascivious in speech and behaviour, and with two counts of contributing to delinquency of minors. A machinist, and married, Bertenshaw obtained release under \$5000 surety for appearance in court today. He was represented by Atty. Daniel A. J. Doyle.

After pleas of innocence were entered today before Judge McGivney in court, Bertenshaw was ordered held in a total of \$11,000 surety for hearing on Oct. 16.

Patrolman Earl Pelletier and Patrolman Paradis took Bertenshaw to police headquarters last night and he was questioned by Sgt. Raymond Gazzola who was aided by Patrolman Richard LaPierre and the other officers. After being confronted by the two small girls Bertenshaw made no statements, police said, and warrants were issued. He called his attorney, Mr. Doyle, and bail was arranged.

NEW ST. LAWRENCE BILL TO BE OFFERED

WASHINGTON (AP)—John E. Burton, chairman of the N. Y. State Power Authority, said today a new bill to authorize the St. Lawrence seaway and power project would put the federal government in the business of marketing the development's power, valued at 13,000,000,000 kilowatt hours a year.
