ALL-STARS: The Boys Basketball Team

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Trevor Foley, Mansfield

A hard-working defensive specialist who could also score on offense, Foley capped his senior year with 286 points, the third-most on the team, along with 76 assists and 176 rebounds. He also had 31 blocks and 50 steals for Mansfield before going down with an injury late in the Hornets' playoff run that saw it get to the MIAA Division 2 state final. A key player for the Hornets, Foley was especially clutch on defense, which Vaughan called one of the best parts of his game. "He really finished last year strong, and this year his expectation was high," Vaughan said. "He really rolled into the season playing at a high level, both offensively and defensively. He was a defensive specialist we needed night in and night out to put our team in a position at an elite level. Offensively, he was an X-factor a little bit. There were a lot of ways he could play well on both ends of the floor."

Chris Hill, Mansfield

Hill was a crafty scorer with 300 points for the season on 42% shooting from the field. Another regular in the starting five, the Mansfield senior was a pacy player who went through all decisions, helping dictate the flow of the game. Hill led the team in rebounding with 212 and blocked shots with 35. He also had 59 steals. "Chris was a good piece player," Vaughan said. "On offense and defense, maybe you wouldn't realize he had such a great impact on the game, but you pull up the stat line and it's four steals, 12 points, nine rebounds and two blocks. He could really settle down and did a little bit of everything for us."

Eddie McCoy, Mansfield

McCoy willed the Hornets to the MIAA Division 2 state final with impressive performance after impressive performance after injuries had hindered Mansfield during the postseason. A hate-to-face, but love-to-have type of player who was already an established shooter and rebounder, the junior sharpshooter finished the season with a team-high 365 points, was 63% from two-point range, and had 105 assists with 92 rebounds in 28 games played. "I think he grew as the year went on and got better towards the end of the season," Mansfield head coach Mike Vaughan said. "Earlier in the year, he was doing a good job of deferring, finding opportunities, and then when the lights were brightest, he stepped up and made the plays he needed to have. He worked really hard on his game to put himself in that position." Vaughan said.

Givany Carney, North Attleboro

Carney was a bright spot for the Rocketeers, leading the team in steals (27) while shooting 30.2% from 3-point range. He scored on average 10 points per game and grabbed 79 rebounds as one of the team's leading guards. "He was a tough matchup for some teams," North Attleboro head coach Sean Mulkerrins said of the senior playmaker. "He was really good at getting to the basket and had to do a lot for us. He was our vocal leader and

brought the passion, the fire and energy. He's a kid that had been there and done that. Having a kid that's willing to step up and be that guy, it took some of the pressure off others who hadn't been there."

Kevin Marinilli, Norton

Marinilli averaged 14 points a game, a "deceiving" number according to Liberatoro due to how valuable the senior was to the Lancers. A scorer who liked to shoot the 3-pointer (37% shooting), he was also a tremendous foul shooter with 84% made shots from the free-throw line. "That helps you win a lot of games in the fourth quarter when you can get a kid going 6-for-6 from the line in the fourth quarter," Liberatoro said. "That's the best (free-throw percentage) I've had as a coach. It's crazy good."

Marquise Pina, Norton

Pina assumed the role as the No. 1 scorer for Norton with ease, scoring 400 points this season with an average of 19 points per game. Late in the year, the Lancers' senior went off for 40 points against Millis, then followed that up with 31 against West Bridgewater a few days later. "He really was more of a complete player," Norton head coach Marc Liberatoro said. "Last year, he was the second or third option. Anyone that scores 400 points a season, that's consistency and doing it (well) almost every night. He had got to the point where the guy guarding him, he wasn't even seeing him. He was looking past him, he knew he was getting past him and looking for the help defense. It was pretty special."

Jason Andrews, Seekonk

Andrews willed the Warriors to several wins this season and was the biggest threat to opponents for Seekonk. An all-level player, the versatile junior was utilized in such a way that it made his teammates around him better, making himself a better player in the process. When the Warriors had Andrews on the floor, they were 12-5, and without him, the team was 1-4. Andrews finished the year averaging 22 points, five rebounds and totaled 38 3-pointers. Defensively, he had 24 blocked shots.
