

The Boys Basketball All-Stars

Hayden Crowley, Attleboro

An elite shooter for an Attleboro team that had an abundance of weapons, Crowley averaged 12.4 points with 103 field goals and a school-record 77 3-point baskets this past season. The senior forward broke the career school record for 3-pointers with 192 as he finished his high school career with 811 career points and a 39% perimeter percentage. A relentless worker who worked hard to both get open and was deadly from the outside, Crowley came up clutch time and time again for the Bombardiers as a two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Connor Houle, Attleboro

A game-changing point guard with all the intangibles, Houle helped lead Attleboro to a 20-5 record as the team co-MVP for one of the top contenders in Division 1 all season. On top of his ability to take over a game with 14 points per game and 11 field goals, Houle was efficient at trusting his teammates to excel. He averaged 5.3 assists and four rebounds, and also took 13 charges over the course of the season. The Hockomock League All-Star and two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star was a 95% free-throw shooter promises to only get better as a senior next year.

Dante Monestime, Attleboro

A successful team is incomplete without a 'glue guy' and Monestime perfectly fit the role for Attleboro, filling in the gaps with his skill set and willingness to contribute. The senior contributor averaged 8.4 points with 96 field goals and a field goal efficiency of 52%. Often passing off to teammates for the better shot selection, Monestime averaged three assists and was a strong and versatile defender for the Bombardiers.

LaDainian Rodrigues, Attleboro

'LD' steadily elevated his game over the course of the season, acting as a force on both ends of the court for the Bombardiers. He paced Attleboro in scoring, averaging 15 points, 10 rebounds and three assists per game. A multi-dimensional scorer as a two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star, Rodrigues also led Attleboro in field goals made, going 56% from the field and 70% from the free-throw line. The junior team co-MVP forward for the Bombardiers consistently took on tough opponents and showed his promise as one of the top players in the league going into next season after receiving Hockomock League All-Star honors.

Phil Botelho, Bishop Feehan

Botelgo was tabbed a CCL All-Star selection and came alive down the stretch, posting a season-high 38 points and 20 points or more in five games. He helped will the Shamrocks to a tournament berth in Division 1, increasing his scoring average to 19.66 points per game in the final 10 games of the season, and averaged 14.2 per game his senior season. A strong defender, Botelho averaged 5.4 rebounds with 31 steals and took 18 charges in 21 games for the Shamrocks.

Brody Bumila, Bishop Feehan

When Bumila was on the court, the Shamrocks were a wagon. Bishop Feehan was 10-0 in games that the towering post presence and Catholic Central League All-Star played. He averaged 21 points with a 75.8% field goal percentage and 9.7 rebounds and 2.5 blocks on average to boot. An ankle injury sidelined him for the second half of the season, but prior to his injury, Bumila was one of the most dominant players in the league. The junior had a game-high 37 points and five 20-plus point games in his 10 games played. Bumila is a two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star.

Jake Webster, Bishop Feehan

One of the most improved players on the Shamrocks, Webster rose to the occasion this season, averaging 11.7 points per game (54.5%) with 62 rebounds and a team-high 57 assists. The junior CCL All-Star also led the team in steals at 2.1 per game. A dynamic athlete, Webster posted a team-high 20 points three times against Mansfield, Attleboro and Wellesley.

Aidan Marando, Dighton-Rehoboth

Marando was an efficient half of Dighton-Rehoboth's scoring tandem, averaging 18.1 points per game as the Falcons' primary ball handler and top defender. The senior two-time Sun Chronicle All-Star grabbed 6.8 rebounds with 4.4 assists per game while shooting 54% from inside the arc and 36% from beyond the arc. He also

made 47 3-pointers in his final season and was 81% from the free-throw line.

Josh Reidy, Dighton-Rehoboth

The Falcons junior was right there with Marando in terms of value and production, averaging 19.4 points per game

while shooting 54% from the field. Reidy averaged 6.2 rebounds and shot 32% from beyond the arc. When defenders drifted to Marando, Reidy was there to flourish for the nine-win Falcons.

Ryan Kelley, Foxboro

A worthy No. 2 for the Warriors, Kelley's role as a forward for Foxboro saw him finish third on the team in scoring, averaging nine points per game and 5.6 rebounds with 34 3-pointers. An elite shooter combined with height, head coach Jon Gibbs called Kelley a unique weapon who continued to expand his game into his senior season. He had a double-double (16 points, 14 rebounds) in a state tournament win over Greater Lawrence Tech. and had 16 boards against eventual Div. 1 champion Franklin. Kelley ended his high school career with 109 3-pointers and 627 points.

Eric Walford, Foxboro

Walford was the junior leader for Foxboro in most major categories, averaging a team-high 12.9 points with 3.7 assists and 1.1 steals per game. The Warriors' scorer also led Foxboro in 3-point field goals with 45 and was second from the charity stripe with a 74% free-throw percentage. Dynamic and a tri-level scorer, Walford's dedication to his craft resulted in him being named a Hockomock League All-Star as he showcased his talent in a 29-point overtime win over Taunton where he added eight boards and five assists.
