

# Corbin Reloads: New roles, new look, same high expectations

CORBIN new year means new expectations for Tony Pietrowski's Corbin Redhounds.

After coming off a 19-11 mark that saw them go 13-6 against 13th Region opponents while having a runner-up effort in the 50th District Tournament, and semifinal effort in the 13th Region Tournament, Pietrowski's squad has hopes of advancing even further this sea-

"I think it's gonna be kind of a work in progress for this year," he said. "I mean we're much different compared to what'swe looked heading into the summer.

"Personnel wise, and as usual, you know a bulk of our of our team is still involved with football, so until we kinda get all those guys out and get some time with them, I'm not sure how we will look early on," Pietrowski added.

With the departure of transfer players such as last year's leading scorer, Ryder Akins, and Dawson Farmer, Pietrowski said he will lean heavily on Evan Ellis.

"He's a kid that came in last year, and has done a good job of

being a leader for us so far," he said. "I expect him to have a big season and then of course, we will depend a lot on Eli (Pietrowski).

"Eli is a kid that's been in my program literally since he was born," he added. "He understands importance

Pietrowski feels his team has what it takes to be competitive and be in the thick of things by regular season's end.

"I believe we will be right in the mix of things in the region to start out," Pietrowski added. 'Whitley County continues to get better. Eric has done a great job, and he's got his kids really invested, and Jeff (Davis) always does a great job at South," he continued. "Williamsburg has a new coach, and overall, this is just a very competitive district year in and year out."

When it comes to the 13th Region outlook, Pietrowski said he's taking a wait and see approach.

# Wilson confident in mix of veterans and youth for 2024-25 campaign

CORBIN — Coming off a 19-11 season that included an 11-8 mark against 13th Region opponents, Isaac Wilson's Corbin Lady Redhounds enter the new year looking to build on last season's postseason run.

Corbin reached the 13th Region Tournament semifinals last season, falling 71-53 to North Laurel, after finishing as the 50th District runner-up with a 44-27 loss to South Laurel.

Combine experienced players with talented youth, Wilson believes this year's squad has the potential to take a substantial step forward.

"We have a good mix of returning experience along with some talented youth that makes this season promising," he said. "We had low numbers this summer but still feel as if we had a very successful summer. It gave some of our young kids some valuable experience that we feel helped them coming into the season. We played on nine different days and everyone got to play a ton of minutes that only bodes well for their development this season."

Corbin returns four core players, each with a chance to play a major

 Lydia King -"Junior who is looking to taking the next step in leading this basketball team," Wilson said. "She has contributed on the varsity level since her freshman year and she is poised for a solid Junior year this season."

• Izzy Walker — "Senior and probably our most experienced guard who returns," Wilson said. "Her experience will be needed to help some of our young kids development throughout the season."

• Addy Wilson (Sr.) – "Senior who is a very solid shooter and her length can affect the game in many different ways," Wilson said.

• Kalley Stewart (So.) - "Returning sophomore who started at times last season and played some big minutes for our program," Wilson said. "Her length and athleticism really is a problem and in girls basketball and she rebounds the basketball at a high level for us. The minutes she got as a freshman last season was huge for her growth and I expect to see her make a

jump this season. "We have a pretty good mix of experience along with youth this coming season," he added. "We will rely on our youth more this season than we have in the past few seasons. It is important for our upperclassmen to lead by example and to guide our young kids in order to continue our recent program success."

Wilson will also lean on a handful of returning underclassmen and newcomers, several of whom he expects to play varsity minutes:

• Aubree Clemens (Jr., transfer from Whitley Co.) – "Transferred from Whitley County and looks to come in and have a breakout Junior season," Wilson said. "She is a very skilled player who posses a ton of size and length. Her defensive presence in the lane is definitely felt and something that we expect to help us defensively as well as rebounding this coming season."

• Cami Price (So., transfer from Whitley Co.) – "Also transferred from Whitley County and will be a sophomore guard for us this coming year," Wilson said. "She was a starter in the district tournament last year against us and brings

a lot of varsity experience in with her from her Freshman season. She is very quick and really prides herself defensively. She looks to bring a positive impact to our program this season."

• Paityn Creech (So.) - "Returning Sophomore who looks to find a role this season," Wilson said. "She is probably our hardest worker and we know that we will always get 100 percent effort out of her on every single possession. He leadership and effort was seen all summer and we expect to continue to see this shine

during the seaon." • Lynlee Pietrowski (8th grade) - "Incoming eighth grader who has had a great career at the middle school and is looking to bring that success with her to the next level," Wilson said. "Her IQ for the game is some of the best we have had here in the program and something that make her special at her size. She is a very unselfish player who has a chance to be very special by the end of her career here at Corbin."

 Braylen Frederick (8th grade) – "Incoming eighth grader, who shows some promising skills at the point guard position," Wilson said. "She is one of the truest point guards I have ever had the privledge to coach and who looks to get her teammates the ball in all situations. "Finding games that will push us and challenge us is always something that I look for and this year is no different. I do feel that our schedule will best prepare our basketball team to improve and be the best version of us come tournament

# McKeehan brings fresh mindset, defensive focus to Lynn Camp boys

CORBIN - These are exciting times for the Lynn Camp boys basketball program.

First-year coach Marcus McKeehan has taken over the helm, and ready to lead Lynn Camp to success.

The Wildcats struggled to a 7-22 mark last season while posting a 4-13 record against 13th Region teams. They also went 0-5 against 51st District competition – something McKeehan hopes to change.
"We have a great

group of kids that have come in here and worked hard all off-season since I took over in late March," he said. "Whatever time I tell them to be at the gym, they are there. Our goal is to keep playing through our mistakes and move onto the next

"They are hungry and eager to have a successful season," he added. "Our overall team depth will really help us. We have around 10 kids in the mix for varsity playing time."

A strong summer has given McKeehan hopes for a much-improved Wildcat squad.

"We had a very good summer season, got some good wins and really competed with teams that put running clocks on us last season," he said. "As I mentioned earlier, our kids are hungry and ready to prove teams wrong. We will play hard for 32 minutes each night."

Lynn Camp returns two starters combined with juniors and sophomores that received quality playing time last season.

"Caleb Woods is our senior veteran leader,' McKeehan said. "He can really shoot the ball and can play all five positions on defense. He knows how to lead our team through a v arsity season. Woods missed the first half of the year last season with an injury and he is back to 100 percent now.

Conner Mabe is a sophomore that started last year and is the Wildcats' "glue guy", according to McKeehan.

"Mabe has a constant motor. He plays about as hard as any kid I've ever seen," he said. "He does all of the dirty workrebounding, defending. He has polished his offensive skills in the off-season as well to really turn into a high level player.

"We lost Ethen Chafin, our leading scorer at 14 points a game," McKeehan added. "He is doing virtual school work and working a fulltime job, so he won't be with us for his last year of eligibility. We also lost three seniors from last year and two of them started in Caleb Wilburn and Jared King. Ethan Simpson was our other senior we lost to graduation."

McKeehan also has many players he will lean on this season.

"Landen Rose, a junior, came over from Corbin in the spring and really looked good this summer," he said. "He can shoot the ball and can create matchup problems with his length and skill set. "The Mayo brothers return for their junior season," McKeehan added. "Eisen Mayo is a quick defender and can create a lot of havoc on the defensive end, and like Mabe, he has worked on his offensive game. Elijah Mayo is a strong kid who can score and rebound really well.

"Kayden Powers, a sophomore big man, has really improved his speed and scoring ability to go along with his strength, which is defending and rebounding," he continued. "Ethan Curry is a steady junior with playing experience and is a great defender. Max Carnes, a junior, moved back to Lynn Camp after moving out of state for a year, and he is a sharpshooter. Shawn Reyes is another junior who didn't play on the team last year. He will get in there and scrap. DJ Wren, the star running back, is going to give basketball a shot his senior year and I know he will provide toughness and athleticism. We also have some freshmen in Cason Mills and Gavin Sutherland that played JV as eight graders last year that continue to improve. Braylan Humfleet, another freshman, came this summer and played with us and had a good football season, and we look forward to watching him grow in our basketball program as well. Tucker Neal is a lengthy freshman that we can't wait to see grow in our program as well."

McKeehan said he has 22 players overall in the high school pro-"One senior with a

ton of experience and another senior who is new to this sport from football," he said. "The bulk of our kids are in our junior class (six) and freshman class (nine) to go along with those (two) seniors and (five) sophomores. Our kids have worked hard all off-season and we have several with varsity playing experience. They have grown leaps and bounds to help get our program where we strive to be. Not only will we play a full JV schedule, we have enough numbers to play some separate freshman games as well."

Defensive play will be the Wildcats' strength along with depth.

"We will have five guys on the floor playing hard the entire time," McKeehan said. "We have more depth this season and when they need a break, we can put a fresh body in the game to sustain that energy. We have a couple good shooters, and even though we aren't blessed with great size, we rebound the ball pretty well from all five positions. "We really need to

focus on ourselves as a team, and not worry about everyone else," he added. "In our system, we preach playing to our strengths and we try to put our kids in situations where they can run a system that they can have success from. Transition offense and defense has been our number one priority in our practices.

Lynn Camp will play a competitive schedule that will have them prepared for the 13th Region All 'A' Classic and postseason play.

The Wildcats will once again participate in what McKeehan feels like another string 51st District.

'Our district is good," he said. "A lot of people look at it and see three Class A schools and one big school, but they can all play. Pineville won the district last year and made the semifinals of the region. Knox Central and Barbourville were really good last season as well. Looking at the 51st District this year, a lot of people will say it will drop off, but that's just not the case," McKeehan said. "All three of these teams are still good ball clubs. While they have all lost good players due to graduation or transfers, they all return good young players and have added some other players just like us. We are eager for the opportunity to play our district slate and I believe we will compete better with those teams this season as opposed to last year.

"I believe the team we put on the floor at Lynn Camp High School this year will play their hearts out every night to make our school, community, and alumni proud of them," he continued. "This group of kids are hungry and they've worked hard all off season, whether it be practices, running youth camps and youth leagues, or just helping out in our communities anyway that they can. These kids do whatever our coaching staff asks of them. If we were to ask them to come in at midnight or 5 a.m. for practices or to help the school do something, they would be here willing to help out. We preach servant leadership in our program and it's something that they can carry over outside of the gym. We want to represent our school and community with pride on And off the court. Go

We may have to grow and learn along the way, but our commitment to competing at the highest level and representing Laurel County with pride will

# Hard Schedule, Harder Mindset: Colonels prepare for a breakthrough



The Lady Colonels games that will challenge them from the get-



challenge our players to build confidence and experience as we head toward the postseason,"


she said.

"We have three really good seniors, and a great sophomore core," he added. "I would consider us experienced as well as young. We started and played a lot of young kids last year. We have about 30 kids in the program and 20 are sophomores and below. But we have six or so guys with a lot of varsity games under their belt."
