Oregon's Secretary of State visits the South Coast ahead of May primaries

Oregon Secretary of State Tobias Read spoke to a room full of engaged voters on March 8, 2026, at the Sprague Community Theatre in Bandon. The event, which brought the Oregon executive branch's second-in-command to town, was hosted by the Coos and Curry Chapters of the League of Women Voters. Read spoke extensively about the importance of civic engagement, voter participation, and ongoing efforts to prevent election interference.

In the current political climate, there has been an intentionally sewn sense of mistrust in our election apparatus. There have been repeated attempts from the Trump administration to abolish vote-by-mail. Oregon has been a pioneer of universal vote-by-mail for decades; the practice was expanded to include primary and general elections by a vote of the people in 1998.

"Democracy is not self-sustaining; it depends on participation. That's why voting by mail is not simply a convenience, it is also a safeguard," said Read from the stage of the Sprague. "Oregon is the gold standard when it comes to running safe, accurate and fair elections. Voting by mail makes sure that every eligible voter can participate, amidst busy and complicated lives."

The practice has seen Oregon leading the pack in terms of voter participation. In primary elections since 2000, Oregon has had an average voter participation of 46.25 percent compared to the national average of 18 percent. Read credits a huge part of that level of participation to vote-by-mail.

"It removes barriers that we see too often in other places, like voter intimidation and long lines. It gives all of us, as voters, the

time to be thoughtful. To make smart decisions and informed choices. You can sit on your couch in your pajamas and vote, that's a nice thing," said Read.

Vote-by-mail also has many built-in security measures that protect the integrity of elections. Each ballot has an individual barcode, allowing election authorities to track them easily. Our county clerks independently verify each signature against multiple records. Everything is on paper ballots, and the machines used to count them are never connected to the internet, and independent inspectors test them before and after each election. The president himself voted by mail from DC for his residence in Florida.

Despite that, Trump has issued two executive orders that have attempted to gut vote-by-mail: the first was shot down in a legal challenge led by multiple states

(including Oregon), and the second is currently on the Supreme Court's docket. The writing of Article 1, Section 4 of the U.S. Constitution is cut and dry on the matter.

"The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof," states our foundational document.

Read went on to praise the work of county clerks across the state, calling them the backbone of our democracy and urging us all to support the work they do. Clerks, who administer, count, and verify our elections at the local level, have seen a rise in threats and harassment amid heightened suspicion and misinformation.

"Social media is flooded with misinformation. Lies about how votes are counted, who's registered, who's eligible. These

public officials are being vilified for following the law and doing their job, and we can't have that," said Read. "Elections offices across Oregon have been threatened. Ballot boxes have been vandalized. We've had staff harassed online and in person, and yet they keep showing up. They keep doing the work, maintaining the rolls, counting the ballots. That is service, that is protection of democracy."

Read wrapped up with a couple of public service announcements. With cuts to the U.S. Postal Service, it's been encouraged that voters drop their ballots off themselves at any of the valid drop boxes around the county. A list of locations is available on the county website.

If you need to use the mail, be sure to have your ballot sent at least one week before election day. If you can't manage that, the ballot must be postmarked

by May 19. The safest way to ensure that happens is to take your envelope to the Post Office and request it be postmarked then and there. Also, verifying your signature, most commonly against the one on your driver's license, is important for preventing any irregularities with your ballot.

Read went on to take questions from the audience on combating misinformation, reaching young voters, and how to best support our county clerks. Those answers included a sobering story of a county clerk who was relieved to have bulletproof glass installed in the elections office.

One recited fact that was pertinent: despite economic struggles, famine, pandemic, and war in the United States of America, never in its history has a primary or general election been canceled.

"Democracy has never been easy. We wouldn't have had to fight for it, we wouldn't have marched for it, we wouldn't have amended our constitution, time and time again, to bring more people into the promise of our country. Every generation inherits this fragile, remarkable thing. And every generation decides if it will be strengthened or diminished on their watch.

"I think this is our moment. It's not that democracy is failing, it's being tested. It's being tested by fear, by cynicism, and by powerful interests that want to weaken faith in our institutions and our obligation to follow the will of the people. But our democracy does not belong to the loudest voice, or the wealthiest person, or the most powerful office. It belongs to people who show up, who tell the truth, and refuse to give in to apathy and despair... Don't underestimate your power," closed Read.

County Commissioner Race 2026:

An Interview with Richard Coleman

Richard Coleman is one of two candidates running for the County Board of Commissioners Position 3, as Commissioner Rod Taylor has chosen not to run for reelection. Coleman was a diesel mechanic in the Army, and currently works as a shop manager with Johnson's Rock Products, a local contractor.

I sat down with Coleman for a conversation on his priorities for the county and views on the role of government in smaller communities. Our 15-minute conversation has been trimmed for readability.

On his background and qualifications:

"I'm a third-generation county resident. My parents' family came here in

the late-40s, early-50s, so we've lived here for quite a while. I graduated from North Bend High School in '86, shortly thereafter joined the Army which took me out of the area for a while. I came back to the area in 2012, so I was gone about 25 years, but I came back. This has always been home to me. My plan was to retire here when I reached that age, but I got an opportunity to come back before that.

"I've got an associate's degree in diesel mechanics, did my schooling at Lane Community College. I bring my military experience. I was a squad leader and team chief in the shop; I was a mechanic in the Army as well. I understand teamwork, I understand delegation, I understand making tough decisions when you need to.

"My current job, I'm the shop manager at Johnson Rock, so I understand about money, how to spend money, and where to spend money, when not to spend money. I try to spend as local as possible. Unfortunate side is, with what we do and have to maintain, I do have to outsource, but I'm pretty big on supporting the local economy everywhere I can."

On his personal political views and the role of local government:

An Interview with Rick Osborn

ying for the Board of County Commissioners Position 3 is Rick Osborn. Osborn brings a long career's worth of experience working in and around county and state government to the race. Since moving back to Coos County following stints with Benton County and in Salem, he has operated his own businesses and sat on multiple budget committees, as well as ranking positions with the Bay Area Chamber of Commerce and South Coast Development Council.

I sat down with him to discuss how his experience led him to run, his priorities for the role, and using economic development to shore up county finances. Here's a trimmed version of our nearly 20-minute conversation.

On his background and qualifications:

"I was born and raised here. I was born in Bay Area Hospital, I graduated from Marshfield High School, went to Southwestern Oregon Community College (SWOCC) for a couple of years, then left to go to college. I came back and worked as a newspaper reporter here at the World newspaper covering Coos County, and then was communications director at SWOCC. I followed a career and family obligations to the Willamette Valley living in Corvallis for about ten years. During that time, I worked as the public information officer for Benton County.

I worked for about six years in the Benton County Board of Commissioners office. My office was situated in the middle of the three of them, so I got a



firsthand view of what commissioners do, what their days can look like, the kinds of decisions they make and how those affect the community. I worked with every department in the county, so I got a good look at public health, planning and community development, parks, roads and law enforcement... I was doing all the communications.

"Then I went to work in the in the state Senate, where I was a communications director. During that time, I developed a lot of contacts in the legislative and executive branch, and in the lobby. So, I feel like I have a good understanding of how that process works, which is important for a county commissioner. There's a lot of areas where we need to be able to leverage our relationships at the state level to do things that are good for our county.

HOLY COW! HISTORY:

America's First Monument Meltdown

History buffs were taken aback in 2021 when the New York City Council voted to remove a statue of Thomas Jefferson from the council chamber. Why should a historic work of art become part of a debate over contemporary politics?

In fact, "statue politics" is an American tradition that goes all the way back to the Revolution — and it happened in New York, too.

In 1766, the Province of New York (the British colony that became today's New York state) wanted to score some brownie points with the big boss. It passed a resolution honoring England's King George III. In language that would make the most fawning, fanny-kissing sycophant blush, the resolution noted "... the innumerable and singular Benefits received from our most gracious sovereign, since the Commencement of his auspicious Reign, during which they have been

protected from the fury of a cruel, merciless, and savage Enemy ..."

It ordered a gilt-covered lead equestrian statue of him to be erected in New York City.

So George was placed atop a pedestal in Manhattan's Bowling Green neighborhood on March 21, 1770. Although the statue went up amid great fanfare, the timing was lousy, as some colonists were already beginning to demand a break from the mother country.

It came in 1775 with the "shot heard round the world," the opening battle of the Revolutionary War. When the Declaration of Independence was signed the following year, George's reputation had dramatically deteriorated, going from "our most gracious sovereign" in the 1766 resolution to someone "... whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant ..." in the 1776 Declaration.

In fact, the Declaration prompted the statue's demise. Gen. George Washington ordered it

read to his soldiers in New York City on July 9, five days after its signing. The Patriots went wild with joy. That night, 40 soldiers and sailors tied ropes around the statue and pulled. They broke. More rope was found, and the men pulled again. George and his horse tumbled to the ground, shattering into dozens of glittering pieces.

Toppling the statue served two important purposes. First, it demonstrated that the old order was being replaced by something new. And perhaps more important, it provided lead for much-needed Patriot musket balls.

George was turned into 42,088 bullets. New York's postmaster wrote in a letter that the British troops "will probably have melted Majesty fired at them."

Interestingly, not all of the statue's remains reached the Litchfield, Conn., foundry to be transformed into ammunition. Some Tories (Americans who remained loyal to the British) stole

an estimated 1,400 pounds of lead chunks and secretly sank them in nearby Davis Swamp.

Then there was George's head. The Patriots lopped it off, fired a bullet into it, and stuck it atop a pole outside nearby Cox's Tavern. That final outrage was too much for the Brits. They sent spies to pull it down and bury it. When they occupied New York days later, they exhumed the head and sent it to Lord Townshend back in England, "in order to convince them at home of the Infamous Disposition of the Ungrateful people."

Nearly 250 years later, you can now see what the ill-fated statue looked like. A replica was created with painstaking accuracy a few years ago. It is a featured exhibit in the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia, near Independence Hall.

Statues are important symbols. They are visual reminders of significant people who shaped our shared past. Toppling them can make a political statement.

(Think Vladimir Lenin's likeness coming down in the U.S.S.R.'s final days and Saddam Hussein's statue falling after Baghdad's liberation.) They can be wartime morale boosters, as in the case of George III in New York.

And they can also become lost legacies when they are snatched away from citizens who grow careless with their culture.

Henthorn sets record at Prefontaine meet

Coquille standout Ella Henthorn set a new meet record and Bandon's Marley Petrey won three events as South Coast athletes had a strong day in the 24th annual Prefontaine Rotary Invitational at Marshfield High School on Saturday.

Henthorn set a new meet record for the 3,000 meters with her time of 9:57.50, taking more than 20 seconds off the old record held by her mom, Holli, set back in 2004.

Henthorn also won the mile in 5:11.65, though that did not come close to setting a new record.

Petrey was the only athlete to win three individual events. She sped to victory in the 100 meters in 12.68 seconds and also won the 300 hurdles in 45.51. Petrey also won the triple jump with a leap of 36 feet, 3 inches.

Arcata's Skyler Collenberg set one meet record and nearly

set another on the boys side of the meet. His winning mark of 59 feet, 3 1/2 inches in the shot put set a new mark, breaking one set last year by Myrtle Point's Mason Detzler. Collenberg also won the discus with a throw of 171-11. The meet record is 173 feet, set by Marshfield's Dalton Milburn in 2012.

The only other meet record came in the 4x100 relay for the boys, where the Phoenix quartet of Aydan Cook, Cody Martin, Trae Casteel and Terelle Mc-Swain blazed to a time of 43.15 seconds. Runner-up Grants Pass also was under the previous record with its time of 43.24. Marshfield had held the mark since 2010 and this year's squad of Pirates was third in 43.79. Marshfield also was third in the 4x400 relay (3:30.65).

Bandon's Caitlyn Michalek was a double-winner on the girls side. In the javelin she won a

duel of state champions with her toss of 123-2, which was better than runner-up Danika Bushnell of Powers, who threw 120-4.

Michalek won the high jump by clearing 5-8.

Other winners from the South Coast on the girls side included Coquille's Ada Millet in the pole vault (10 feet) and Bristol Layton in the long jump (16-0), Marshfield's Sierra Sauers in the discus (112-4) and Siuslaw's Aidell Cadet in the 100 hurdles (16.41). Cadet was second behind Petrey in the triple jump (35-3).

Marshfield's Rylee McNally was second in the 100 hurdles (17.13), 300 hurdles (47.75) and long jump (15-6 3/4) and Bandon's Giada Moore was third in the longer hurdles race (47.86) and in the 400 (1:01.02).

Myrtle Point's Jayme Padgett was second in the discus (110-3). Kendra Bushnell of Power was second in the pole vault (9-6) and

Briana Huggins of Pacific was third in the high jump (4-8).

Bandon's Jael Legutki was second in the 3,000 (11:05.97) and North Bend's Addison Horning was third in the mile (5:28.67).

Marshfield's Jaxson Stovall was a double-winner in the distance races on the boys side, leading 1-2-3 finishes for the South Coast in both races.

In the mile, Stovall finished in 4:24.29, Siuslaw's Henry Stone (4:33.07) and North Bend's Angelo Pedrini (4:38.15). In the 3,000, Stovall finished in 9:08.06, followed by Bandon teammates Beckett Pahls (9:17.45) and Sawyer Miller (9:19.13).

Other boys winners from the South Coast included Bandon's Noah Brown in the pole vault, where he edged Siuslaw's Will Johnson based on misses after both cleared 13-0. Johnson won

the triple jump with a leap of 43-5 and teammate Thomas Morgan won the 100 (11.32) and also was second in the 200 (22.45).

Marshfield's Christian Baugh was second in the 300 hurdles (42.66). Siuslaw's Caleb Gray was second in the javelin (156-9), just in front of Myrtle Point's Wyatt Richards (155-7) and Pacific's Landon Spalasso (155-5).

Bandon's Brown was third in the 800 (2:01.83).

Though the emphasis on the meet is individual performances, with limited fields in the various events for the 32 schools that sent athletes, Bandon scored the most points for girls, with Coquille fifth, Marshfield sixth, Siuslaw seventh and Powers 11th. Crook County had the most points for the boys, with Siuslaw third, Marshfield fourth and Bandon eighth

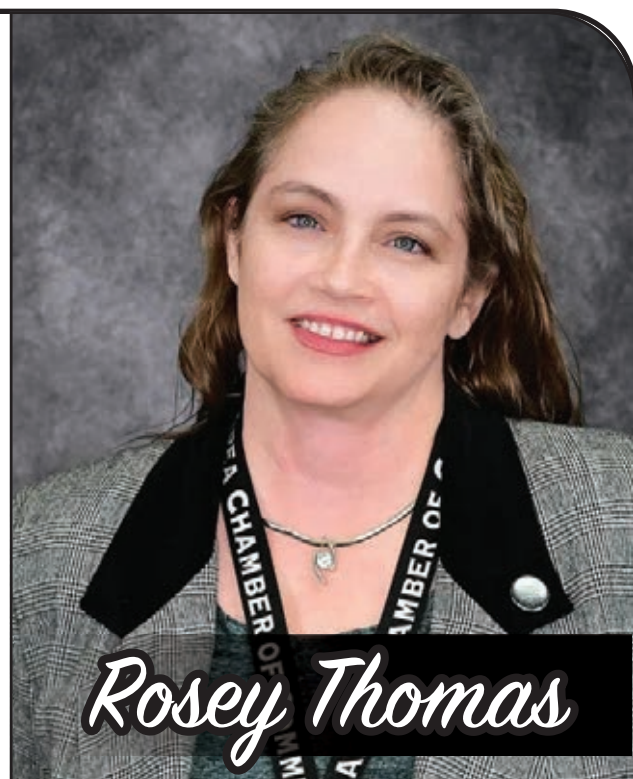

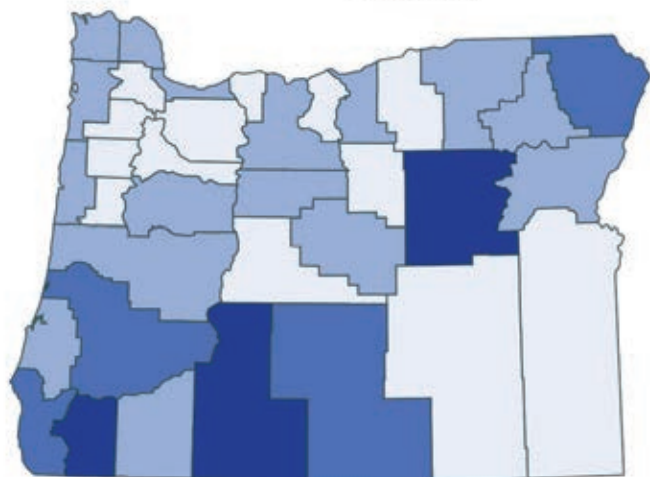

The Oregon Employment Department (OED), in collaboration with the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics released a report on the labor statistics in terms of job count for the South Coast last week, giving some insight on the economic trends of the region.

According to their report on April 7, 2026, over the course of the past year, Coos County's payroll employment rose by 160 jobs, for a gain of 0.7 percent. Most of those came through gains in private education and health services, which added 120 jobs over that time period. Other gains came in leisure and hospitality (50), manufacturing (50) and construction (40).

The largest sectors of loss included professional and business service, which saw a 120-position decrease.

Mining and logging lost 30 and information services lost 20. Interestingly, local government fell by 60 jobs, while each other government sector saw gains. Local Indian tribal government employment rose by 30 jobs, while Federal (20 and state (10) government also added.

In comparison, payroll employment in Curry County had fallen by 1.4 percent over the period of January 2025 to January 2026, this accounts for 90 jobs lost across multiple sectors. The two biggest industries affected were retail and leisure and hospitality, which lost 60 jobs a piece over the last year. Professional and business services, as well as financial activities each lost another 40 jobs in their sectors as well.

Those 200 jobs were offset by slight growth in other areas. Manufacturing was the biggest gainer with 60 jobs added over the past year. Government was another sector

that saw growth with 40 new jobs added across local (20), federal (10), and state (10) governments each seeing an uptick in jobs.

Month to month, there are fluctuations. According to the OED, payroll employment in Curry County fell by 100 jobs from December 2025 to January 2026, which the department attributes mostly to a loss of seasonal jobs. 30 jobs were lost in leisure and hospitality, with a further 20 in construction.

Currently unemployment sits at 5.9 percent in Coos County, slightly higher than the state average of 5.2 percent, as of January 2026. Comparatively Curry County has a 6.7 percent unemployment rate. The national average is 4.3 percent.

Libby is our oldest and most reliable partner in providing eBooks and audiobooks to patrons on the go. The app offers an extensive library of popular literature to patrons seeking the convenience of streaming content to their phones, tablets, and home computers. Its search functions are intuitive and its materials span topics relevant to all ages and interests.

One of my favorite ways to find new books to read or listen to is to browse their catalog using the "available now" feature. This allows me to narrow down their extensive catalog to items without a hold list and consequent wait time. "I'm pretty conservative minded, I think. I'm not an extremist by any means. I believe you need to talk to the people you're representing. I firmly believe elected people are public servants, that's what you are. You work for the people that elected you, so you need to keep in touch with those people. See what their needs and their wants are. You've got to stay somewhere in the middle.

"You can't be extreme one way or the other. Our country was founded on majority, so if you're somewhere in the middle, you're serving the majority of the people. That's what you have got to try to do. I get you're not going to make everybody happy, let's face it. If you can touch the most people, that's where you need to focus."

On his personal priorities and goals:

"What really pushed me and motivated me to run for this office was when I went to a meeting last year when they closed half the jail down and, in my opinion, gutted the Sheriff's Department. I live out in a rural part of the county, and we're pretty dependent on the sheriff's department for public safety. We don't have city police and we don't have a lot of state troopers around here.

"I think that's the majority of our county. If you really look at where our county is, we're mostly rural. So that was a big

priority for me."

On the budget and county finances:

"I understand the Sheriff's Department is the biggest budget out of the general fund, but I also believe they should be the first ones funded and the last ones cut. The main job of the County is the protection and safety of the citizens. You can't do that without a place to put criminals; you can't keep them off the streets. With half the capacity of our jail we've got a pretty severe catch and release problem...

"One thing, and it's been proven here fairly recently, that one of the things the county could exercise more is volunteers. I think we do a poor job of that. We have a local business, *Elkhorn Barbecue*, just organized a big cleanup out on the North Spit. It was a huge success. There were some county personnel that participated in that, but it was largely private citizens that went out there. The rubbish that was picked up was just phenomenal.

On homelessness and housing:

"I want to see what we can do with the homeless crisis we have. We gotta come up with something that's going to work for our county. I don't believe what's being dictated by Salem is working here in our area. That might work in a big city, but you can't apply big city stuff to small town U.S.A., it's just different.

"I really think a lot of the homeless people out here on the streets, it's almost

a lifestyle for them. They choose, and I'm not going to I'm not saying 100% of them, they don't want the responsibility. I think we've got a few different classes of homeless people. We've got some that were in institutions that we no longer have. So where do they have to go? If I had a family member in that situation, I'd do everything I can for them. If it's something I couldn't handle, I really wish there was a place for them to get the help they need. So, we need to get the facilities back up to help those people.

"Another class are the drug addicts. And the way you fix that, cut off the supply. You cut the supply; demand is going to diminish some. If it's as readily available as it seems to be, you're never going to fix the problem. We've got to help those folks too, again we don't have those facilities to really help those people.

"In addition, there are some that are trying. That's where some of the new low-income housing we're building comes into play. We do need some. The other side of that, to me, in our area I think rents and property costs are outrageous. They're not realistic for our economic area, so that's something else we need to fix."

On an ICE facility and federal presence in the area:

"I don't think you can call somebody that sneaks into the country an immigrant. That's illegal. Go sneak into another country and see what happens to you

there. We have to have borders, we're sovereign nations and we have rules and laws. So, I don't have a problem with those facilities.

"I have no problem with people coming to our country, that's how this country was built, we were all immigrants at one time. To put it in simple a way for me, I don't mind you coming here. Come through the front door, don't sneak in through the back. I think the process could be a little simpler for people. With some of the things going on its slowed down for a lot of people. There are people here with work visas that can't even go get those renewed..."

On the race and his opponent:

"I only met [Rick Osborn] recently at the County Budget Committee meeting, and we chatted. He seems to be a nice guy. It seems like we both have some common interests to me and care about the community.

"I hope what people can take away from me, win or lose, is that I do care about the community. I'm in this for the community; I'm not in it for myself. I'm not in it for anything other than trying to help our community become better. I do believe public servants serve the public. You're not a leader, I don't like the term elected officials, we are public servants. We're elected by the people and we're the best one to serve the majority interests of the community. That's what I strive to do."

"I came back to Coos Bay in late 2019 after about 4 years in Salem. My kid graduated high school, and I decided I wanted to come home. I've owned my own businesses for the past six years, *Farmers Insurance Agency* over in North Bend and *Blue Ridge Strategies*, my public affairs company. And *Blue Ridge Ranch and Rescue*, we have a small ranch that mostly my wife runs, but I do a lot of work, of course. Different animals we've rescued over the years, horses and stuff. That's not really a money maker for us, but it's a passion.

"I've been serving on the County Budget Committee for about 4 years, and I've been on the School District Budget Committee for a few years here in Coos Bay. I saw the Budget Committee as an opportunity for me to contribute. My goal, when I was gone and since I've been back, has always been to help this place to thrive, you know.

"I've been president of the Bay Area Chamber of Commerce, Chair of the South Coast Development Council. Coos Bay North Bend Rotary Club I've been involved with them and been helping out a lot with the Bus Jam and different charitable organizations like that."

On his political philosophy and the role of government:

"In general, the role of government is to lay the groundwork for having a functioning, stable society. Law enforcement, roads, elections. Parks are important because people need to be able to get outside and recreate whether they have money or not. All of those things are really important and help to develop our social climate and our community.

"Public health is an important one, and mental health, we see people who are homeless all the time out on the street that could use some of those services. I also think the government needs to be efficient in how it provides those services. There's a reason why government provides certain things that the private sector doesn't, it's because they're not meant to be profitable.

"Specific to the County Commissioners, it's a nonpartisan role and I really don't think that the big picture partisan politics plays into this job much, if ever at all.

You're basically running a \$140 million organization; that's 1 of 3 people in an executive role. You're supervising department heads and taking care of HR issues, setting policy and making ordinances about land use...

"The commission should be focused on how it provides the services that the county needs in an efficient way. For some people that means cutting everything. For me, we've been cutting so much that have to find a way to actually grow our law enforcement, and we can use a few more people in all of the county offices. You don't want to make it huge, but adequate for the community that we have and their needs."

On his personal priorities and goals for the position:

"The biggest issue for me is financial stability for the county government, and through that to help facilitate economic development. I think that the commissioners have an opportunity, sometimes they're decision makers on things and other times I think that they could be cheerleaders, substantively, by really focusing on how we grow our tax base.

"When you've got a \$140 million budget, about seven million of it comes from property taxes, so you've got to find a way to get creative about how you get your revenue. The long-term goal is to develop an economy here. I'm a supporter of the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port project and in my work as a consultant in public affairs and lobbying, almost all of my projects have been about economic development and small business growth. About new business opportunities on the coast that fit with our values.

"But first, we have to patch holes in the budget so that we're not constantly cutting and finding ways to put mandates on things. One of those is, I'd be in favor of pursuing a tribal Memorandum of Understanding for the Wagon Road Lands. I think that we can expand our parks holdings. I'd like to try to pursue perhaps some sort of a land swap to expand our RV holdings out at Bastendorff Beach. There are some opportunities possibly in the Coquille Valley with watershed mitigation, that we could potentially pull some revenue from to help stabilize things... These are things I want to explore.

On public safety:

"That's the first priority, [the situation at the jail] is untenable. I'm not one of those people that wants to lock everybody up, but I also understand that the jail is the cornerstone of our public safety system. If you don't have a jail, people who are in those criminal circles talk to each other. They know that they're not going to get locked up and that emboldens them to do things.

"Then we get stuck with the homeless situation, where homeless people get put in there because they cause a problem, and most of those are mental health issues... Parole and probation, if there's no stick, the carrot doesn't necessarily have as much effect either. That's one of the core problems that we're having, and I'd like to put a lot of those revenues toward enhancing what we offer in the jail.

"I think we could go a long way with our volunteer efforts to, for example, offer some workforce training. I'm okay with people in jail getting their GED. I just want people not to be in a position where they find themselves coming back. I also support Bay Area First Step and them having a sobering center. In the jail could be in the right place, separate from the rest of the building, that way we can adequately deal with those needs."

On housing:

"When we talk about housing, I've had people mention that we just don't have the room. I think that we can create some room, and also, we need to be looking at it from a county perspective. Not just Coos Bay/North Bend, even though that is the biggest population center in the county.

"There is developable land near Lakeside, and down toward Myrtle Point and Coquille. As we talk about economic development projects, like the Port, and a need for more housing, not everybody's going to want to live in Coos Bay and North Bend. It's a great place to live but some people are going to be attracted to the small-town farming lifestyle in Myrtle Point or Coquille. A little bit less wind, a little warmer during the summertime, there's a lot to like. That's my goal. I want to see something happen no matter where it happens in the county, so that those communities benefit with new families, with kids in the schools, all of that."

On an ICE facility:

"I don't support a facility like that in

the area. I think it's too divisive of an issue, and one of the things I'm trying to run on is bringing people together. Proposing or pushing something like that doesn't bring us together, it's going to divide us a whole lot.

"I believe in strong borders, I think we should be keeping people out that we don't want here, especially when it's a violent offender or someone that is here illegally. They need to be shown the door immediately.

"We maybe have a couple of those folks here, but how many to do we actually have compared to somewhere it could be more streamlined or in a more populated area. So, it doesn't seem that feasible to me. Also, things have changed so drastically in our federal administration that I don't know how long this big ICE push is going to last."

On transparency:

"I'm committed to transparent government. I was a reporter and then a communications guy who was comfortable going to the media... We need to update the county website so that it's easier to use for the public, and have better use of electronics like Zoom to be able to have better public access to meetings."

On the race and his opponent:

"I'm feeling good about my race. I only just met Mr. Coleman and don't have anything bad to say. He came to the budget committee and sat taking notes. He's a nice guy and I like him but I think we're running our races independently of each other. I want to keep this civil; I want to bring people together. I even suggested to him that if he wins, I'd be happy to stay on the budget committee, and if I win, he should consider applying and continue to have a voice.

"I have support from democrats, from republicans, it just kind of runs the gamut and I'm really proud of that... We're all kind of on the same page, that we're not trying to push a partisan ideology, we just want the right thing for our community, and to be fair."

As I See It

All that remained at Beloni Boys Ranch, located on the east side of Highway 101 between Bandon and Coos Bay, in January of 1975 was a small shop and the office building after a tragic fire (first photo) destroyed the boys' dormitory.

An article in Western World reported that a 14-year-old boy from Coquille was being held by police on charges of first-degree arson in connection with the fire that leveled all but a small portion of the nearly 4,000 square foot building. Fifteen boys were in the juvenile rehabilitation center at the time of the blaze. The fire occurred while a staff member was gone, having rushed another resident to Bay Area Hospital.

This fire occurred just

a year after an arsonist burned the Bandon High School building to the ground.

The second and third photos tell of the big fire that destroyed the large barn at Darry Van Leuven's ranch at Bear Creek. The fire of undetermined cause occurred in June of 1977 at 2 o'clock on a Saturday afternoon.

"Also completely wiped out in the blaze was Van Leuven's milking parlor, which included equipment valued at nearly \$12,000. Van Leuven, who is seen facing the camera in the second picture, along with fire chief Lanny Boston headed toward the burned structure, estimated that it would cost \$20,000 to rebuild the barn, which contained 5,000 square feet

of space. He carried only \$5,000 worth of insurance, and estimated the losses, which included the feed, would run about \$30,000."

Van Leuven said the barn was as old as he was ... since he was just a few months old when his father, Willis Van Leuven, built it.

"By the time the fire department (who was responding to a mutual aid call) arrived, the fire had just reached the roof (third photo) and in a short time the building was gone. In addition to the barn fire, electrical wires began burning in several spots nearby, and firemen also put out two small brush fires south of the barn which resulted from the bigger fire," according to my Western World article.

Neighbors from through-

out the valley rushed to the site and were able to save most of the sacks of feed and some baling twine.

* * *

A report came over the scanner at noon on Thursday, March 26, about a missing seven-year-old child, who was last seen on the beach below Devil's Kitchen. A search effort was underway, and a Coast Guard helicopter was being deployed to look for the little girl, but one report said that she had been located some 10 minutes after she had been reported lost. The search effort was being coordinated by the Bandon Police Department with multiple agencies, including Bandon Fire, the Coos County Sheriff's Office and the Oregon State Police.

In another incident reported over the scanner March 25, shortly before 2 p.m., Bandon Fire assisted Bay Cities Ambulance at the Bandon Fitness Center for a 65-year-old male who lost consciousness in the sauna, and was said to be in some sort of pain. Although the scanner said responders were unable to move him out... it added that he was transported.

At 3:42 p.m. on Wednesday, Bandon Fire and Bay Cities Ambulance responded to a single vehicle accident on Highway 101 at milepost 258.5 for a report of a male trapped inside, and another man on the ground. Both lanes of travel were temporarily impacted, although the vehicle was said to be off the road,



which was covered with debris. Bay Cities Ambulances transported one of the victims and the road was cleared at 4:14 p.m.

At 5:30 on Wednesday, there was report of a bad wreck just north of the Bullards Bridge near milepost 260. A Facebook poster who was one of the first on scene urged caution in the area for the single-vehicle accident.

* * *

Sunday, March 29, there was a report of a subject in distress in Bandon as a passenger in a pickup truck, thought to be a female, had been holding up a "help" sign to a vehicle next to them. The driver was a male. The caller advised dispatch that the pickup turned at the Station Restaurant, possibly headed into Old Town. A Bandon Police officer was able to locate the vehicle and the subjects matching the description near Pacific View

out near the South Jetty. He made contact and found the passenger was actually a male and admitted to holding up the sign as a prank. He was counseled for his behavior and the officer is going to contact his parole officer.

* * *

I have learned that Clarence Byers, a 1963 graduate of Bandon High School, died the evening of March 25 in Hillcrest South Hospital in Tulsa, Okla., where he made his home with his former wife, Judith (Rice) Byers, his son, Joshua Byers, and granddaughter, Alani Byers. He was born in Riverton on Dec. 1, 1944, to Sara and Clay Byers, and was an outstanding athlete, lettering and excelling in football, basketball and baseball. He was a skilled and trained barber, having attended and graduated barber school after high school, along with close friend and classmate, Mickey Peters of Bandon. He had been ill for the past year. He is also survived by his son Evan from Auckland, New Zealand, and Evan's three children.

area of Parkersburg Road in Bandon to a report of a suspicious vehicle. The deputy observed that the vehicle was heavily damaged and learned through dispatch that it had been reported stolen out of California.

While the deputy was investigating, he was informed by a local that an unknown male was in his yard, and he had seen that same subject in the stolen vehicle the previous day. The deputy was able to locate the man, and as

a result of the investigation, Ernesto Romeo, 37, was arrested for unlawful entry into a motor vehicle and unlawful possession of methamphetamine. The stolen vehicle was recovered from the scene.

It's good news for cities that HB 4148 has been approved, effective Jan. 1, 2027, which allows cities and counties to use up to 50 percent of its TL (Transient Lodging Tax)

revenue for critical local services like police, fire, emergency responses and road maintenance, without raising any new taxes. It reduces the share that had to go to tourist promotion and facilities from 70 percent down to 50 percent.

For example, Seaside has a huge surplus in its lodging tax revenue that must be dedicated to tourism, while struggling to maintain community infrastructure. Mayor Steve Wright said, "Today, the question is no longer how to bring visitors to Oregon. The question is how to sustain the communities that make these visits possible." HB 4148, supported by both of our state representatives, is a step in the right direction.
