## Coos County Ballot Snapshot

Here's what local races and measures you'll be voting on May 19

The May primary elections for this midterm year are fast approaching, with voting day set for May 19. April 28 is the last day to register to vote or change your party affiliation, and you can check your registration status now at [oregonvotes.gov/myvote](http://oregonvotes.gov/myvote).

While the primaries for the general election are party-restricted, and those races for Con-

gress, Senate, and Governor are set to be decided in November, there are several local positions up for grabs on this ballot. Two County Commission seats, the county clerk, and two measures for North Bend will be voted on.

While low voter turnout and general malaise can often color voting day in the U.S., it is local elections that make the most immediate impact on our day-to-day lives. It is paramount

that we all participate in our constitutional right to a representative government in an informed manner, especially in the races closest to home.

### Coos County Commissioner, Position 2

County Commissioners serve a four-year term in Coos County. Coming off the most recent of his three terms in the position,

John Sweet is running for reelection against first-time candidate Brandi Martindale.

Long-time residents of Coos County will know Commissioner Sweet well. His background is in forestry and business administration, having earned his bachelor's in both fields from Oregon State University. Sweet has spoken extensively about the county's financial difficulties and believes his experience is the

answer to the difficult funding challenges faced by the area's sheriffs and schools.

Martindale has been hitting the campaign trail hard in recent months. Born and raised in Coos County and a Coquille High School grad, Martindale is currently a certified life coach in the area. She received her bachelor's

## Development begins on the first phase of North Bend's new community plaza

If you've driven southbound on Highway 101 through North Bend in the last week or two,

you'll have noticed construction in the area around the North Bend Visitors Center. The development is a continuation of the City's mission to turn Grant

Circle into a community hub and town square.

The T-Mobile Plaza will convert an otherwise unutilized piece of pavement into a public space with a stage, seating, and a designated spot for community art and heritage displays. Thanks to a \$50,000 Hometown Grant from T-Mobile, and a further \$250,000 from Travel Oregon and the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development, what has been a long-term vision of the City's has broken ground.

"What was once a blighted, underutilized building and empty lot is now moving into the next phase of development as an accessible community gathering space. This project has been a long-term goal of the City Council and represents years of planning to enhance our community," said North Bend's Visitor Information Center. "Once complete, the site will be an accessi-

ble space for visitors and locals alike. The development will also serve as a hub for Main Street and City activities."

The space was designed by a local architecture firm, HGE

Architects, and its first phase will be built by Knife River, a local contractor. The project is project-

## Port Update: Eastside Housing Feasibility and Local PCIP Meetings

The Port of Coos Bay heard a presentation from AKS Engineering regarding their progress on a housing feasibility survey for a large piece of land in Eastside, Coos Bay. In conjunction with the City of Coos Bay, the port is exploring the possibility of housing to help alleviate the area's need to expand its housing stock. Evaluations of the same property in 1996 and 2000 came back negatively on development, but there is hope that with up-to-date building techniques and ecological changes, the outlook may be more fruitful this go around.

Zack Pelz, AKS' representative, spoke about their most recent findings, stating that a final draft will be ready soon. According to Pelz, around 70% of the site is wetlands, which are typically avoided in developments like this, posing significant infrastructure challenges for most construction projects.

As part of its preliminary economic analysis, AKS determined what the market was able to

support in terms of housing costs for the constructed units. Around \$346,000 to \$598,000 for homes, and \$1,320 to \$2,100 per month for apartments, was the market rate used to justify whether the costs of development would be worth it in terms of return on investment. As he hinted at with the issue of large amounts of wetlands, the investment in infrastructure would need to be significant.

Analyzing a small, 17-lot development on the edge of where the current housing stock ends showed promise. Analyzing costs for street, storm and wastewater, and other miscellaneous infrastructure expenses, the development would cost under \$4 million. That puts the per-unit cost within the \$346,000-\$598,000 range necessary to make the project feasible.

However, that does not consider off-site infrastructure costs like expanding nearby inter-sections and bridges to accommodate increased traffic. At a recent town hall held in Eastside, a strong turnout of around 80

residents made it clear that traffic was the primary concern regarding a development like this. In particular, the Isthmus Slough Bridge was a point of worry.

Pelz reminded the board that there were still numbers that needed to be considered in the final report and further development areas within the site that they wanted to add and explore, as the first 17 plots were just a preliminary analysis. Another town hall will be taking place on Wednesday, 25, at 6 PM, at Eastside Elementary, where those more fleshed out numbers will be presented.

When the report is completed, planned for sometime in mid-April, it will be presented to the Coos Bay City Council in a joint meeting.

### Local Meetings on the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port Project (PCIP)

The Concerned Citizens of Empire, a group of locals with well-documented ques-

tions about the PCIP project, is holding a meeting at the Dolphin Playhouse on Wednesday, March 25, at 6 PM (unfortunately, the same time as the Eastside Housing Feasibility Town Hall). The

meeting will discuss the potential impacts of a large industrial development across the channel

# HOLY COW! HISTORY:

## The Woman Who Crashed D-Day

Dwight Eisenhower had reached his decision. And when Ike put his foot down, that was the end of things. After all, as the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, personally responsible for planning the largest military invasion in human history, his plate was overflowing with priorities.

But that didn't fly with a feisty 35-year-old newspaper reporter. So when Eisenhower decreed that no women journalists would accompany the initial Allied landings on French beaches during the coming D-Day invasion, Martha Gellhorn shrugged it off. There was no way someone was going to keep her from missing out on

not only the biggest story of the year but one of the biggest of the entire war. She would simply switch to Plan B.

All she had to do now was come up with Plan B.

The daughter of a prominent doctor in St. Louis, Gellhorn was fascinated by world events from an early age. She dropped out of Bryn Mawr College to become a journalist. Writing first for The New Republic, she eventually landed her dream job as a foreign correspondent for United Press in Paris. It turned into a nightmare when a male co-worker sexually harassed her. As so often happened in those decades long before the #MeToo movement, she was fired for reporting it.

Gellhorn was down, but far from out.

After spending a year wandering Europe, writing for newspapers back home, and covering fashion for Vogue magazine, she dabbled in the pacifist movement and even wrote a book about it.

Somewhere along the way, she had managed to become friends with Eleanor Roosevelt. The first lady offered her a job assisting with writing Mrs. Roosevelt's popular "My Day" newspaper column. In fact, she even invited Gellhorn to live in the White House for a while. Talk about having connections!

She later took a job traveling

the country with a New Deal government agency and lost it when a bit of social activism went too far.

And that was when Ernest Hemingway entered her life.

It was a star-crossed romance from the start. They went to Spain together and, in between writing news stories and ducking fascist bullets during that country's civil war, they fell in love.

It was an on-again, off-again relationship for four years until they decided to tie the knot in 1940. It was her first marriage, but Hemingway's third (of four). And although both Hemingways covered World War II, "Papa," as he was nicknamed, increasingly resented Gellhorn's long absences. "Are you a war correspondent or my wife?" he demanded in 1943 as she left their Cuban estate to follow the fighting in Italy.

The breaking point came in the spring of 1944. Husband and wife were in England, though separately, each reporting on mounting tension in the buildup to the anticipated invasion. Hemingway had tried to stop her from reaching Britain. When Gellhorn got there (after a nerve-racking journey through U-boat-infested waters), she told him their marriage was over.

Then came Ike's edict: No women reporters allowed to cover the Allied landings in France.

A marriage that had just failed,

a potentially career-ending dead end. A lot of people would have given up. Not Martha Gellhorn. Ike or no Ike, she was going to Normandy.

She was fully aware of the consequences. Being caught disobeying a general's orders could have landed her in Leavenworth for a long time. And that was the least of it: A civilian caught without permission inside Army ranks would be liable to face espionage charges.

Gellhorn didn't care. The story was too big.

She drove to southern England, persuaded American MPs that she was a nurse who had missed her ride back to the base, and bluffed her way onto a hospital ship. Once onboard, she hid inside a bathroom, hoping against hope she wouldn't be discovered.

Her ruse worked. She made it. Two days later, Gellhorn was in a party that went ashore near Omaha Beach. She worked alongside medics recovering wounded GIs and ferrying them back across the English Channel. Once in port, she jumped ship and wrote what she had seen as the only woman journalist to land at Normandy on June 6.

The military was furious. She was briefly arrested and stripped of her war correspondent credentials. When the brass cooled down, she returned to the front

line in Italy and was among the first journalists to report on the horrors of the Dachau concentration camp when it was liberated. "I followed the war wherever I could reach it," she said later.

Gellhorn and Hemingway divorced in 1945. She married again, raised an adopted son, and covered almost every major conflict in the world over the next 40 years. She was 81 when she reported on the U.S. invasion of Panama in 1990.

A U.S. postage stamp was issued in her honor in 2008, and the prestigious Martha Gellhorn Prize for Journalism continues to perpetuate her remarkable legacy today.

North Bend's Ellie Massey had good marks winning both the 1,500 (5:07.13) and 3,000 (11:07.61).

Other girls winners included North Bend's Lauren Wolfe in the 800 (2:42.99), Marshfield's Bella Cox in the high jump (4-8), Jane Moon of Gold Beach in the triple jump (31-10) and Powers cousins Danika Bushnell in the javelin (114-1) and Kendra Bushnell in the pole vault (9-0). Powers also won the 4x100 relay with a team including the Bushnells, Warner and Starlena Pina (55.45) while Marshfield won the 4x400 relay with a squad including Cox, Wyatt, Claire Roberts

and Kindall Wyatt (4:39.54).

The top mark for the boys came in the 200, where Marshfield's Carter McGriff sped to the finish in 23.01. Teammate Hadyn Widdicombe had a strong leap of 20-3 3/4 to win the long jump.

The only boys double-winners were Marshfield's Glen Crook in the shot put (42-1 1/2) and discus (127-8) and Christian Baugh in the 300 hurdles (43.24) and high jump (5-6).

Other winners included North Bend's Noah Bustamente in the 100 (11.60) and Angelo Pedrini in the 1,500 (4:20.20); Marshfield's Nicoya Pruess in the 400 (54.43), Donald Brice in the 800 (2:08.92), Jaxson Stovall in the 3,000 (9:04.71) and Max Johnston in the pole vault (12-0); and Gold Beach's Colin Elwell in the 110 hurdles (19.89) and Dexter Moore in the javelin (144-9).

Marshfield swept the relays. The team of Baugh, McGriff, Pruess and Chandley Wyatt won the 4x100 in 44.66 and Wyatt, Pruett, McGriff and Stovall won the 4x400 in 3:33.97.

### SIUSLAW ICEBREAKER:

Coquille's Ella Henthorn, who won the cross country state title last fall, debuted with strong times in both distance races at Florence.

Henthorn ran winning times of 4 minutes and 45.70 seconds in the 1,500 meters and 10:20.30 in the 3,000 to easily win both events.

Aidell Cadet of Siuslaw also had a bit meet. She broke the school record in the triple jump with her winning leap of 37 feet, 5 1/2 seconds. She also won the 100 hurdles in

Siuslaw's Danin LaCouture, who won the state title in the shot put last spring, won that event with a good opening mark of 35-8.

Other South Coast winners included Coquille's Bristol Layton in the long jump (15-3 3/4) and Skylar Duffy in the 400 (1:06.20), Myrtle Point's Delaney La Franchi in the high jump (4-10) and Jayme Padgett in the discus (115-4) and Siuslaw's Maren Hughes in the pole vault (8-4).

Siuslaw also has a new boys record in the triple jump after Will Johnson soared 46-4 to win that event. Johnson also won the pole vault, clearing 13-4, and ran a leg on Siuslaw's winning 4x100 relay team, which clocked a speedy 44.00.

Another member of that team, Thomas Morgan, won the 100 in 11.00. Morgan ran for Reedsport last year.

Mead, whose previous best in the event was 5-8 last year, cleared 6-2 to take the victory.

Bandon's Marley Petrey was one of several South Coast athletes to win two events in the season-opening invitational at Mapleton.

Petrey won the 200 (27.73) and long jump (16-3).

Teammate Jael Legutki won both the 400 (1:07.00) and 1,500 (5:18.92) and Bandon's Caitlyn Michalek won the javelin (111-10) and tied for first in the high jump with Briana Huggins of Pacific (4-10).

Bandon also won both relays and Huggins also won the 300 hurdles (1:00.23).

For the boys, Pacific's Landon

Splasso had a big throw to win the javelin (171-9) and also won the long jump (18-2).

# Oregon gas tax opponents file another lawsuit in federal court

Filing comes less than a week after a Marion County judge ruled the gas tax question will remain on May ballot.

Opponents of gas tax hikes are once again suing the state of Oregon over a law that rescheduled the date of a gas tax referendum from November to May.

The Right to Vote on the Gas Tax Political Action Committee — organized by Sen. Bruce Starr, R-Dundee; Rep. Ed Diehl, R-Scio, and the Taxpayer Association of founder Jason Williams — filed a new lawsuit Tuesday in the U.S. District Court of Oregon in Portland one week after a Marion County judge denied their original claims, ruling that the gas tax vote would remain on the May ballot.

The lawsuit alleges Oregon Secretary of State Tobias Read violated the First and 14th amendments of the U.S. Constitution, as well as the Americans with Disability Act because it didn't provide Oregonians with enough time to collect the 500 signatures needed to get an argument into the Oregon Voters' Pamphlet before the March 12 deadline if they can't pay the alternative \$1,200 fee.

"Oregonians were told they have a voice, then the state put a \$1,200 price tag on it," Diehl said in a statement. "That's not democracy. That's a pay-to-play system designed to shut out ordinary citizens."

Four people and an unspecified number of unidentified people who intended to file arguments but missed the March 12 deadline are also listed as plaintiffs.

"We will continue to follow the law as it is set out by the Constitution, the legislature and the courts," Read said in a statement. "We hope this issue will be resolved quickly because there are rapidly approaching deadlines for elections officials to produce the voters' pamphlet in a timely manner."

The lawsuit stems from when Oregon Democrats on March 2 secured enough votes to pass a law rescheduling the date Oregon voters can approve or reject parts of a controversial 2025 transportation law that would raise the gas tax by six cents, double the payroll tax used for public transit and increase title and registration fees.

No Republican in either chamber supported the bill. Just one Democratic senator and five House Democrats voted against it. Gov. Tina Kotek signed the bill into law immediately.

Lawmakers blew past a Feb. 25 suggested deadline Read gave them to pass the law to allow time for Oregonians to collect signatures. The lawsuit says Read admitted that lawmakers compressed the timeline for Oregonians to include their arguments in the voter pamphlet after missing the deadline.

"Senate Bill 1599A collapsed the existing statutory framework meant to provide robust public processes related to explanatory and fiscal statements, racial impact

statements, and avenues for citizens to engage in pure political speech," the lawsuit reads.

The plaintiff's claims are similar to those made by Mary Martin, a disabled senior living in Klamath Falls who filed a lawsuit in federal court and argued that

the state violated federal disability rights by requiring she quickly submit 500 signatures or pay the \$1,200. The judge in that case ordered Read to let her submit her argument against the measure without a fee or gathering signatures.

Tuesday's lawsuit is at least the fourth lawsuit filed

after lawmakers changed the date of the gas tax referendum, the Statesman Journal first reported.





## As I See It

It's hard to believe that one could have such a beautiful garden only blocks from the ocean, but Buck Rogers (first photo) spent his retirement years cultivating this garden in a plot between Ninth and Eighth street alongside his beautiful home. This photo was taken in July of 1992 after Buck had retired from his business, Buck's Sentry Market, and joined his wife, Nadya, in community activities ...and passionate activism.

Today, that area is home to the Bandon Community Garden, which again is proof that you can grow almost anything in Bandon if you are prepared to give it the love and attention it needs.

If you think that the prospect of a Road Diet (narrowing the lanes through Bandon) generated some controversy in the community, you should have been around in July 1992 when a huge group of locals, including businessmen Martin Hauser and Al Layne, (second photo) gathered in front of city hall and inside at the city council meeting where the Parkway was discussed. Unlike the anti Road Diet people, who pretty much just signed their name to a petition, wrote letters, or testified at a council meeting, the Parkway people had plenty of swag, and most wore No Parkway shirts and buttons, while carrying No Parkway signs. They meant business!

The Parkway would have impacted turn lanes in the area of Elmira and Fillmore and Highway 101, and eventually, the idea was scrapped by the city council, just as the Road Diet was.

The third photo, taken in July 1986, is a telephoto shot of Old Town Mall, owned by Bob and Caroline McKemy, which later became the Wheelhouse and Crow's Nest. You can see Moore Mill in the background, and the sign for the Chicago Eatery, which is what it was known as in those days. Inside the mall were various small businesses.

\* \* \*  
I learned this week that HB 4188 had passed, essentially changing public meeting laws in Oregon. To someone like me, who serves on two public boards (the council and the hospital board), this was an important step in the right direction as it had become difficult (or downright illegal) for board members deciding through email on a date to meet ... without violating the public meeting law.

"This measure loosens the current ban on 'serial communications', which prevents members of a public body from deliberating in private by communicating asynchronously. HB 1477 says communications related to procedural matters, communications that share the views of outside parties, communications with the media, constituents, or the public, and communications from gathering information related to a deliberation or decision are exempt from the serial communications rules," according to the Oregonian. This is long overdue! Of course, we still cannot deliberate toward a decision in a serial email, but a lot of issues don't fall into that category, and the legislature finally agreed they should be allowed.

\* \* \*  
Ocean Crest Elementary School parents and guardians have been advised that the school has received a new visitor/volunteer management digital system thanks to the generous donation from the Bandon Dunes Charitable Foundation.

"We are excited to implement this system as part of our continued commitment to maintaining a safe and secure learning environment for all students and staff," said the district.

"Beginning immediately, all parents, guardians and volunteers will be required to bring a valid state-issued photo ID (driver's license, state ID card, passport or passport card) to the office when visiting the school. Your ID will be scanned

into our system for instant screening. The system checks visitors against U.S. sex offender registrations, criminal databases, government watch lists and allows us to maintain customized in-house denied visitor lists.

"With the new system in place, parents and volunteers will no longer need to complete and submit background forms. Please note that a valid photo ID must be presented each time you plan to attend classroom holiday or birthday parties, volunteer in the classroom (with teacher permission), chaperone or attend field trips, or be present in the classroom during the instructional day.


"We appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we implement this new safety measure. Thank you for your continuous partnership in keeping Ocean Crest a safe and welcoming place for students."

Eddie Sanders, a Bandon man who owns a mechanic shop on Fillmore Avenue and has been cited in municipal court on numerous occasions for feeding the seagulls, has once again made the news.

In court Monday, Mary Wilson, co-owner of the adjacent care center, and her employee Cola Bryant, appeared before Judge Gary Milliman, seeking restitution from Sanders for damage done to the roof of the building and the vehicle paint job of Bryant. Sanders did not appear.

In an emotional plea to the judge, Wilson outlined the damage done to her building and the feces that are tracked inside on the wheels of clients' wheelchairs. "This has got to stop," said Wilson, urging the judge to grant the restitution they sought. During the trial, Wilson pointed out that Sanders had stopped feeding the birds for several weeks, and they had left the area. But he had begun feeding them again, and



they had returned. Judge Milliman granted both women what they sought as restitution for the cost of the damages to their property. Wilson was awarded \$43,524, and Bryant was awarded \$9,952.

The Coos County Sheriff's Office has been made aware of a new scam circulating in the area. Allegedly, there are flyers circulating asking for donations to the Sheriff's Office and other local agencies to purchase ballistic vests for officers.

"This is a scam, and law enforcement would not solicit funds from citizens in this manner, especially for an item that is issued as part of our staff's overall safety. When donating or sending money to any entity outside of people known to you, please ensure you research the validity of the event, item or organization," said a press release.

I learned today that while there has been no official press release, the League of Women Voters of both Coos County and Curry County are hosting a meeting with Secretary of State Tobias Reed, who will talk about voting in Oregon. The public is urged to attend the event, which is being held on Wednesday, April 8, from 4 to 5:30 p.m. at the Sprague Community Theater in Bandon's City Park.

The Coos County Scanner reported that shortly after 9 p.m. on March 10, the Coquille ambulance was staged for a potential stabbing, with two adults injured and kicked multiple times. A knife had been taken away from the suspect (12 years old), and it was reported that the grandmother was not stabbed. Law enforcement was said to be on the scene, and the subject had been detained. They requested that the mental health mobile response team respond. The subject was transported to Coquille Valley Hospital and then on to Bay Area Hospital.

On March 3, Oregon State Senator David Brock Smith (R-Port Orford) officially launched his campaign for the United States Senate. The seat is currently held by Senator Jeff Merkley, a Democrat.



SCINT team, but because it reminds their department that the business community values the work they do every day.



in Sociology from CUNY Queens College, and a master's in Social-Organizational Psychology from Columbia University. She has appeared at the Friends of Coos County Republican (FOCCR) Primary Forum and on the local conservative podcast, the Rob Taylor Report.

### Coos County Commissioner, Position 3

Rod Taylor currently holds the third position on the County Commission but has chosen not to run for reelection. Stepping up to try and fill that seat are Rick Osborn and Richard (Rick) Coleman.

Osborn is a Marshfield

High graduate with a bachelor's in English from Southern Oregon University, and an MBA from Portland State. He has served on several local budget committees, including those of the county, the Coos Bay School District, and the Corvallis School District. Rick keeps a strong focus on economic development, having also worked on the boards of the Bay Area Chamber of Commerce and South Coast Development Council.

Coleman is a North Bend High graduate and a U.S. Army veteran currently working in management at Johnson Rock Products. Coleman ran unsuccessfully for the SWOCC board in 2025 and has been in attendance at multiple events put on by FOCCR.

### Coos County Clerk

Julie Brecke is running for reelection as the Coos County Clerk, having served one term in the position. Brecke was a teacher in the North Bend School District for 15 years, and in addition to her work with the County, is an adjunct instructor at SWOCC.

She is challenged for the position by Marty Kuhrt, a Bandon republican with 20 years of experience in computer science, for which he received a bachelor's from Iowa State University.

Also running for the role is Pam Lewis, a coquille republican and registered nurse. Lewis served as an EMT supervisor for 30 years, as well as a nurse in multiple capacities: ER,

charge nurse, and in multiple correctional facilities. She has also served on the County Fair Board.

### Ballot Measures

There are two local measures on the ballot this May, both for the City of North Bend

The first is measure 6-228, titled Measure Maintaining Police Services Through Public Safety Fee Increase. The measure seeks to increase the City's public safety fee by \$5 per month to fund the police department.

"The fee supports core public safety operations, including patrol staffing, emergency response, and overall service availability," states the measure notice. "The increase would also fund a police

detective position, which is intended to improve the City's ability to investigate crimes, manage caseloads, and maintain timely follow-ups on public safety concerns."

The City warns that it may be required to reduce staffing throughout the department should a funding measure not be met.

The second measure, 6-229, concerns an update to the city charter. This would contain amendments to North Bend's primary operational guidelines.

Some of the primary changes proposed include:

- Increasing the Mayoral term from two years to four years
- Changing the title of the 'City Administrator' to 'City Manager'
- Allowing council rules

to be established by an ordinance or resolution

-Allowing the council to remove a councilor by vote following a public hearing

-Allowing the council to fill council vacancies by appointment

A yes vote would enshrine these changes into the City's constitution, with a no vote keeping the current charter, and allowing for further discussion on the matter.

The World will be going into depth on each of these ballot items in the weeks before the election, including interviews with candidates and deeper dives on the proposed measures. Stay tuned for election coverage all the way through vote certification.

ed for completion in three phases, with the first phase expected to be done by the end of June this year. That will include a small amphitheater with seating and recreational space ready just in time for North Bend's big summer event, July Jubilee.

"It provides an area for assembly and events. It's a pocket park, which is going in right now," said North Bend Public Works Director Relph Dunham.

The second phase will include further landscaping and planting. Also planned is a solar carport, which will be one of the first green projects for the city. The energy from that carport will power the Visitors Center, taking roughly \$6,000 off the city's power bill.

The third phase, which is expected to carry into the new year, consists of finishing the parking lot and installing a public restroom.

The total cost of the first phase of the project is projected at around \$700,000. \$300,000 of that is covered by the aforementioned grants. The remaining portion is covered through the City's transient lodging tax.

"That's where the funds are coming from because it helps as both a tourism attraction and as vitality for the community," said Dunham. "What will be remaining is the new public restroom, the carport, and finishing the parking lot. Then we'll be done, and it will be ready to enjoy for years."

The Visitor's Center will remain open during construction, and North Bend Main Street events are expected to continue without

a hitch. In fact, the St. Patrick's Day Sip n' Stroll had a great turnout regardless of the 'pardon our dust' nature of the construction work. A new business also opened just around the corner in

Coastal Photo Studio. The new space provides studio rentals for professionals, gallery nights, and other creative community events.


