




years, he was an outstanding athlete for Coos Catholic Grade School and Marshfield High School, where he held several school records.

His father Jess Ott owned a series of boats that carried passengers, milk cans from the many dairy farmers along the river, and anything that needed to be transferred to town. The boaters picked up shopping lists from the farmer's wives and did their shopping when they docked in Marshfield. Jess Ott, Keith's dad also had the mail contract and carried the mail to and from Allegany and Marshfield. The boat captains would drop off mail and shopping orders along the river and to the post office in Allegany.

Keith was an award winning scholar.

His elementary education was in Allegany and his high school was about 10 miles downriver at, Coos River High School. Yes, the children then went to school by boat. Keith remembered many picnics, school and social events that were facilitated by the boats. Some of the boats were steam powered stern wheelers.

After graduation from high school, as the class valedictorian and the third of the "Ott" siblings to win the Johnson Scholarship Cup, Keith started as an apprentice to Loyal Neish, who had a machine shop on the Marshfield water front. He spent one winter in Cleveland, Ohio learning special welding and machining techniques.

When World War II broke out, Keith wanted to join the U.S. Navy Seabees, but couldn't due to his eyesight. He could have joined to carry a rifle but that wasn't what he wanted. He elected to accept an industrial deferment and worked on building ships, The Liberty, Victory and minesweepers for the duration of the war.






