Kitzhaber: Small ports to be dredged

BANDON — Gov. John Kitzhaber, the Oregon Legislature's Coastal Caucus and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have announced a historic partnership to fund critical dredging projects for Oregon's small coastal ports.

Under the new agreement, dredging is scheduled to begin as early as this weekend at the ocean entrance to the Siuslaw River near Florence, followed by the entrance to the Umpqua River and the Port of Port Orford this fall and winter.

Dredging will continue at other small Oregon coastal ports in 2014.

"Our South Coast Ports Coalition, consisting of Bandon, Brookings, Gold Beach, Port Orford, Siuslaw and Umpqua,

brought the attention of our plight to the Coastal Caucus and the governor," said Port of Bandon General Manager Gina Dearth on Monday. "Without their support and understanding of how crucial it is to keep our bars dredged and safe, this would have never happened."

When nearly all dredging funds for Oregon's coastal ports were cut in the 2013 federal budget, the Coastal Caucus, the governor and the Regional Solutions Team worked together to secure state funding for these vital infrastructure projects, according to a press release from the governor's office.

Oregon state lawmakers and the USACE then entered into an agreement that allows the federal agency to accept state funding for the express purpose of

dredging the federal navigation channels into Oregon's small coastal ports.

"Faced with a major budget shortfall, a lot of individuals and organizations stepped up to move this exceptional effort forward quickly, with the Corps, Regional Solutions, the Coastal Caucus and Congressman DeFazio all providing critical leadership," said Kitzhaber. "This kind of diverse collaboration is the most effective way to build a stronger economy for the entire state and a great example of how we get things done in Oregon."

Ironically, Bandon's notorious Coquille River bar was not dredged this year for the first time in the Port of Bandon Commission's collective memories and

Crum nets 30 days for menacing

COQUILLE — A Bandon man was sentenced to 30 days with three years of probation after being convicted last month of pointing a weapon at law enforcement on Christmas Day.

Charles Crum, 52, was found guilty by a six-person jury on four counts of menacing after it ruled that he had leveled a pellet gun at four officers outside his home on Dec. 25, 2012. The prosecution said that act prompted the officers to open fire. The sentence could have netted Crum a year in jail and a

USFWS commits to abatement plan

BANDON — The Coos County Board of Commissioners last week reversed a decision to spray insecticide to kill adult mosquitoes on 10,000 acres in and around the Bandon Marsh Wildlife Refuge.

But the county did hire a professional to apply a larvicide on about 300 acres of the Ni-les'tun Unit of the marsh.

That application was dropped by fixed-wing aircraft from an elevation of about 40 feet Thursday afternoon. Costs to apply the larvicide, which is ingested by and fatal to mosquito larvae, were paid by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The decision not to spray an insecticide came two days after local cranberry growers, bee keepers and organic gardeners, among others pleaded with the Coos County Board of Commissioners to reconsider at a lively meeting Sept. 9 at the Sprague Theater in Bandon.

Coos County Commissioner Melissa Cribbins said it came down to a concern for the local cranberry growers and conflicting information about whether

the insecticide Dibrome would prevent farmers from selling their crop due to chemical residue.

"(The question is) would we be solving one economic problem to cause another," Cribbins said last week.

Meanwhile, the adult mosquito population has abated

somewhat, but the results of the larvicide won't be seen for several weeks.

"The theory is that the larvicide application will prevent new hatches of mosquitoes for the next 45 days or so and that the existing mosquitoes will be dying off from old age relatively soon, hopefully within a few

weeks," said Commissioner John Sweet. "If we can prevent new hatches for the next 45 days, mosquito season should be over."

The current risk for disease transmission due to a mosquito bite remains low and there

67th Cranberry Festival deemed a majestic success

BANDON — It was a moist, misty morning Saturday, but crowds still gathered to watch the annual Cranberry Festival Parade, which was deemed by many onlookers as the best ever.

The parade lasted more than an hour and was full of floats, school children, animals, classic cars and various and sundry entries, including a larger-than-life mosquito, unicyclers and two trucks carrying harvested old growth logs from a burn.

"I think we executed a great event this year," said Chamber Executive Director Julie Miller of the Cranberry Festival weekend. "I was pleasantly surprised at how many people stayed despite the wet weather we had on Saturday. And it did not seem to dampen their spirit."

Friday night at the Queen's Coronation at the Sprague Theater Bandon High School senior Emma Wampler was crowned as the 2013 Cranberry Queen as well as Miss Bandon Cranberry Festival. The second title allows Wampler to compete in the Miss Oregon pageant next June if she chooses.

Wampler's platform was about emergency preparedness. She told the audience she plans to complete Community Emergency Response Team training this fall and organize a student CERT group. She emphasized that the city and schools need to be more prepared in the event of a disaster.

She sang "I Dreamed a Dream," from the musical "Les Miserables" as her talent.

Spraying is counterproductive

As a former Coos County resident with family along the Bandon Marsh, I'm concerned about spraying for mosquitos. Both chemicals are dangerous to many insects besides mosquitos. This includes bees, which are already declining at an alarming rate, and many of the bugs that fish eat and natural predators to mosquito larvae. Killing pollinators puts our food supply at risk. Killing the bugs fish eat not only puts our food supply at risk, it jeopardizes the tourism brought in by fishermen from other areas. Killing insects that eat larvae is clearly counterproductive.

There is also concern that spraying will be ineffective while a thoughtful, targeted, long-term strategy would actually be beneficial.

First, let us give credit to Mr. Sweet in chairing this meeting and organizing the astute panel of experts whose job it became apparent was to convince the audience of locals that we all would be safe from this insecticide chosen to combat the pesky mosquitoes. Also, the method used to ask questions was very fair, even though about half were not able to speak because of time restrictions.

So, what did we learn from this meeting?

1. The government — local, state and federal screwed up royally in creating the problem. They spent a lot of taxpayer money to get the deed done all in the name of marsh land improvement or something akin to that, all supposedly to improve habitat. Whose habitat? Certainly not humans!

2. Admitting, by at least one of the panelists, that major mistakes were made in the recent past by the authorities and now it is going to cost a small fortune to un-do the mistakes in order to abate the mosquito problem. This apparently has happened on the East Coast as well, going back to the mid 1990s, and the experts are trying to learn from those mistakes.

3. Two wrongs don't make it right. It is wrong to expose humans and other critters to this insecticide even in small doses. We don't know what the long-term effects will be 5-10-15 years from now. Why expose when it is not necessary? Right the wrong by re-engineering the swamp to more closely mirror nature's plan.

4. I'm tired of hearing excuses for screw ups by any governmental agency. Mistakes happen, we all know, it's been admitted. Let's fix the problem in a sane manner that we all know is safe!

Alternative plan for spraying

The message was clear to the Coos County Board of Commissioners — Melissa Cribbins, Bob Main and John Sweet and to Nikki Zogg, Coos County public health director, to reconsider the proposed aerial spraying for mosquitoes in Bandon and Coos County.

The community members who were allowed to speak did an excellent job presenting their views of why they did not want Dibrome to be used as a control of the adult mosquitoes.

It concerns us greatly that alternative methods have not been considered and the development of an Integrated Pest Management Plan has not been completed to provide a comprehensive response to the issue.

We agree the mosquitoes are a nuisance but aerial spraying is not the answer. Aerial spraying is done usually when an imminent threat to public health and a declaration by the health officer/director has been issued warning the public that a vector-borne disease has been introduced into the human and animal popu-

lations.

At this time, we do not have any documented cases of disease caused by the mosquitoes that have been identified in the Bandon Marsh. My request regarding the species and testing of the mosquitoes that have been trapped has confirmed this.

Furthermore, a plan must address all of the issues and this includes the impact to the environment and all the other insects, honeybees, birds, bats, crustaceans, fish, amphibians who use the marsh and surrounding areas. Many of these animals help control mosquitoes but they are all essential for a healthy environment. In addition, these other animals contribute to our local economy by providing crop pollination, supporting fisheries, and maintaining the wildlife that draw tourists.

We respectfully ask the Coos County Board of Commissioners, Public Health Department and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to not aerial spray and to work together with the community to develop an alternative comprehensive plan to deal with the mosquito issue.

I can truly say that the city knew nothing about mosquitoes south of Bandon last year.

Later in the letter she says she needs to get rid of yellow jackets. But no spraying please. "This isn't Syria, where you can kill off defenseless creatures or people just because you want to. I have asthma, so if I lived near the spraying, well, I could die, but of course that would be an acceptable loss so that some golfer could tee-off."

I don't want to confuse this woman with the truth, but Bandon Dunes had absolutely nothing to do with our being concerned about the mosquito problem. In fact, Hank Hickox and Tom Jefferson came to the special meeting held by the City Council to share with us and with the standing-room-only crowd (who were impacted) the measures they had taken — on their own — to eradicate the mosquitoes.

And Bandon Dunes owner Mike Keiser offered to help the county take care of the problem by donating \$10,000 — a gift that was appreciated by those who live in the affected area (which has unfortunately grown larger in recent weeks).

This is a serious problem, caused not by Bandon Dunes, Coos County or the City of Bandon, but by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Bandon marsh, where the mosquitoes hatched.

And to blame Bandon Dunes in any way is simply not true — unless it is to thank them for their help.

Cover Oregon is complicated

The Medical Insurance exchange under Cover Oregon opens Oct. 1. First, if you are eligible to receive health insurance through another source (Medicare, Veterans, employer-sponsored health insurance), you are not eligible to receive health insurance through the Oregon exchanges. If the employer offers employee-only coverage, the spouse and family may use the exchange. If the employer offers coverage to spouse and family, the spouse and family do not qualify to use the exchange.

If you are not covered under one of the options listed above, you can shop the exchange for a better plan or premium for your family. The Cover Oregon Exchanges are open to all, regardless of income, although the more a person earns, the less help in tax subsidies will be available.

These are the five Insurance companies that offer coverage in Coos and Curry counties:

Pacific Source (nonprofit); LifeWise; Moda Health; Health Republic (co-op); and BridgeSpan.

The Oregon Health Plan and Healthy Kids Program (Oregon's Medicaid programs) will be expanded to cover more people.

Every plan covers doctor visits, hospital stays, maternity care, mental health care, emergency room care, prescriptions, preventive care and vision coverage for kids. Some plans cover alternative care. Dental coverage is available in stand-alone policies, purchased separately. There may be deductibles and co-pays for these services.

Preventive services listed at the website below are covered free of charge to those with health insurance through the exchange or private insurance, as directed by the Affordable Care Act ("Obamacare").

There is a penalty for people who do not obtain health insurance through some source. If you do not have coverage and do not qualify for an exemption, you must pay a penalty at the end of the tax year. The penalty for the first year is \$95 per adult and \$47.50 per child, or percent of family income, whichever is greater. The fine increases over time and in 2016 will be \$695 per adult and \$347 per child (up to \$2,085 for a family) or 2.5 percent of family income, whichever is greater.

"There are exceptions to the mandate: Individuals who cannot afford coverage because the cost of premiums exceed eight percent of their household income or those whose household incomes are below the minimum threshold for filing a tax return are exempt. People experiencing certain hardships also are exempt. Other exempt groups include prisoners, Native Americans eligible for care through the Indian Health Care service, immigrants who are in the country illegally, people whose religion objects to having insurance coverage, members of a health care sharing ministry

and individuals who experience a short coverage gap of less than three consecutive months." (from "The Fiscal Times.")

Coverage plans offered by the 5 companies offer 4 levels of coverage:

Level of coverage plan pays you pay: Gold, 80 to 20 percent; silver, 70 to 30 percent; bronze 60 to 40 percent; catastrophic (excluding Lifewise), no percent given at the meeting, but it will be less coverage, lower premium cost and will cost you more out of pocket.

These percentages are a generalization: You may still pay deductibles and other fees.

Each person's case will qualify for differing amounts of deductions and tax credits. The tax credits are very generous and may be taken monthly or at tax time, or as a partial tax credit to accommodate those whose incomes vary each month. The tax credits may be changed during the year as a person's situation changes with marriage, divorce, birth or death of a covered member.

This is the example given at the meeting for "Jane": Monthly premium: \$300; income tax due: \$900; monthly tax credit: -240 (OR); year's tax credit: -2880; actual monthly cost \$60; IRS refund: \$1,980.

Oregonians can begin signing up for coverage on Oct. 1. Enrollment ends for this year in March. Then you will have to wait for the next open enrollment period to sign up. Payments will begin in the month in which you enroll and coverage will begin the next month.

People can sign up online at Cover Oregon: a new place to shop for health insurance <http://www.coveroregon.com/> (site not ready to receive applicants until Oct. 1) or by phone at 1-855-268-3767 to reach a person. There will also be a paper application available. The phones are staffed for questions now.

When you apply for a plan through the exchange, you will need to have documents on hand: Social Security card, or immigration documents; income documentation (pay stub or tax return); current insurance coverage information, if any.

Dental Plans: There are five companies offering dental plans here in Coos and Curry counties. Currently, a person must purchase medical insurance through the exchanges to be able to purchase the stand-alone dental policies. There were several requests to allow Medicare recipients and others to purchase these dental plans and I was told that conversation is already taking place, so perhaps it will become an option for many more Oregonians.

Dental Companies: Pacific Source; ODS; Dentegra; BestLife; Guardian (small business only). The premiums will be based on income, just as the medical policies.

Dredging

according to the most recent USACE survey.

The survey shows there is a shoal building 1,000 feet outside the jetties that is being monitored by the corps, Dearth said.

"It is comforting to know that the funding is in place for bar maintenance dredging next year," she said.

"SCPC is particularly grateful to the Coastal Caucus, Governor Kitzhaber and Jeff Griffin

of the governor's Regional Solutions team in Medford," Dearth added. "Jeff has been instrumental in guiding us through this ongoing process. I can't say enough about the other ports in our coalition. The managers of these ports are dedicated to this issue and the coalition as a whole has spent hundreds of hours since last winter keeping this moving forward. Their respective commu-

nities are lucky to have such dedicated people."

The USACE hopper dredge Yaquina will travel to the southern coast within the next few days to begin work in the Siuslaw River. Dredging operations at the ports of Port Orford and Umpqua will follow. The dredging operations would not have been possible without the funds made available by the agreement, according to the release. Of these ports,

the port of Port Orford was last dredged in 2010.

Ports and small coastal waterways are among Oregon's most valuable assets, providing a crucial employment base in Oregon's rural counties while helping to maintain and create jobs across the state, the release stated.

A 2013 economic impact study analyzing the Port of Bandon illustrates the positive economic effects small ports

have on their communities. The study concluded that maintaining adequate depths at Bandon was vital to the viability and growth of 54 local businesses directly employing 441 people, with an additional 177 jobs also dependent on the same economic activity. In only one year, this modest-sized coastal port directly and indirectly added more than \$27.4 million in value to the regional economy in 2012,

while returning nearly \$8 million in state, local and federal taxes.

"We give our sincerest thanks to Kitzhaber, the Coastal Caucus, Reps. DeFazio and Walden and Jeff Griffin, regional coordinator for the governor for the collaboration that took place to make this happen and the clear understanding of the positive economic benefits small ports have on their communities," Dearth said.

are no indicators to suggest that a mosquito-borne disease is circulating in any of the mosquito species in the marsh, according to Coos County Public Health Director Dr. Nikki Zogg.

"No hospitalizations or deaths associated with mosquito bites have been reported," Zogg said.

However, because no chemical measures will be taken to control the current adult mosquito population, the CCPH recommends that citizens in and around the Bandon community avoid mosquito bites by using repellents outdoors; wearing long sleeves, long pants and socks outdoors as weather permits; taking extra care during peak mosquito biting hours; mosquito-proofing their homes by installing or repairing screens on windows; and reducing mosquito habitat breeding grounds by emptying standing water around homes and properties.

What next?

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service plans to develop an Integrated Marsh Management Plan this fall.

Commissioners passed a motion last week to encourage USFWS to stick to their commitment to monitor mosquito populations and treat refuge lands, if necessary, until the restoration is completed.

The plan was outlined in a letter addressed to Sweet from Richard Hannan, deputy regional director of the USFWS in Portland.

"This is a fairly complex endeavor that will require considerable planning and engineering to be successful," Hannan wrote.

Hannan said the USFWS is "committed to aggressively implementing these actions," and it is their hope the work will be completed in 2014.

"However, it is possible that we will not complete the work necessary next year and, if that is the case, it could extend into 2015," Hannan wrote.

Hannan added that the USFWS will continue to monitor mosquito populations and will treat refuge lands with mosquito controls, if necessary, until the restoration project is completed.

fine of more than \$6,000.

Crum's lawyer, Ron Cox, said Crum had called for an ambulance that day because was having chest pains. Instead, two Bandon police officers and two Coos County Sheriff deputies showed up at his rural Bandon property.

Police had been called, according to the prosecution, because of an outstanding warrant Crum had for failing to appear in court on another matter, and because they alleged he had a history of resisting arrest.

As they were leaving, after not being able to make contact, an armed Crum allegedly swung his door open. Police fired 30-50 bullets in his direction in the dark. He sustained some injuries and was treated at Coquille

Valley Hospital.

For the jury to convict on the charge of menacing, they had to find that Crum put the officers in imminent fear of serious physical injury or death.

On Monday, Judge Martin Stone sentenced him to 30 days for each of the four counts of menacing, but ruled they will run at the same time. He will also get credit for time served after his arrest.

Crum was also placed on probation for three years, must stay away from alcohol, bars and taverns and cannot attempt to contact the officers. He also was fined \$1,840 and his rifle was forfeited for destruction.

Prior to the trial Crum filed a tort claim with Portland Law Collective on

June 19 over the shooting, claiming his Constitutional rights were violated.

Crum submitted a written statement to the press prior to his sentencing Monday.

"I still proclaim my innocence and will continue to do so," Crum wrote. "There was no solid evidence to prove otherwise."

Crum claimed there were many conflicting statements during the trial and that he was targeted because of his last name. Crum's sister Kathy said Monday that the family plans to ask the courts to rule for a mistrial.

After the sentencing, Crum was placed into the custody of the Coos County Jail to begin serving his jail time.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Draft Timeline and Commitments for Mosquito Abatement at Bandon Marsh NWR, post September 2013 treatment:

October 2013 – Meet with experts (mosquito, marsh management, marsh ecology, engineers, hydrologist, equipment operators) to determine design parameters for Phase 4 of restoration project and creation of additional tidal channels.

December 2013 – Formulate preliminary design and engineering of tidal channels. Consult with experts on design. Requires analysis of aerial photography and topographic mapping (existing and on the ground).

January 2014 – Finalize design and engineering plans for tidal channel construction.

January-March 2014 – Complete administrative/permitting requirements

- Submit pesticide use proposals
- Prepare compatibility determination for mosquito monitoring/control

- Finalize Endangered Species Act section 7 consultation with National Marine Fisheries Service for phase 4 of restoration project (i.e. abatement of mosquitoes through tidal channel construction)

- Obtain U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permit
- Obtain Department of State Lands permit
- Obtain consistency determi-

nation

- Finalize supplement to the environmental assessment for the restoration
- Prepare special use permit for mosquito control with Coos County Public Health

- Obtain Coos County local land use compatibility statement
- Obtain Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife in-water work clearance/adjustment

- Consult with State Historic Preservation Office and tribes on archaeology
- Coordinate protocols for long-term monitoring of adults/larvae utilizing experts (Oregon State University entomology, etc.)

- Finalize logistics and obtain amphibious equipment and operators for Phase 4 channel construction

April 2014 – Begin tidal channel construction once all permits and documents are completed.

May-October 2014 – Complete tidal channel construction. Based on monitoring results and status of tidal channel construction, treat the Ni-les'tun Unit with mosquito controls if necessary.

Spring 2015 – Complete final tidal channel construction, if not completed in 2014 due to unforeseen circumstances. In the event construction extends into 2015, treatment of the Ni-les'tun Unit with mosquito controls would be implemented as determined by monitoring.

Deep-sea wind power developer hosts town hall meeting in North Bend

NORTH BEND — Renewable energy technology developer Principle Power will host a Town Hall meeting from 6 to 8 p.m., Monday, Sept. 23, at the North Bend Public Library, 1800 Sherman Ave., to update the community on the proposed WindFloat Pacific Demonstration Project.

Principle Power has received a \$4 million financial award from the U.S. Department of Energy and has begun project outreach, engineering design and initial project permitting for installation of five semi-submersible floating foundations outfitted with 6MW direct-drive offshore wind turbines

approximately 15-18 miles offshore of Coos Bay.

The company will provide information about the WindFloat and a status update on the proposed WindFloat Pacific project, in addition to discussion of questions related to research and future opportunities for public comment. The WindFloat is a floating foundation for wind turbines that enables strategic placement to minimize impacts to ocean users and natural resources, while capitalizing on the highest

capacity wind resources.

In addition, there will be representatives from the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management and Pacific Northwest National Laboratory of Seattle. One of 10 national labs managed by the Department of Energy's Office of Science, PNNL leads the identification and risk-based assessment of environmental effects of offshore wind energy development, while also contributing significant resources for atmospheric science research.

Drive-through influenza shot clinic returns Oct. 1

BANDON – It's time to roll up your sleeve to protect yourself from two varieties of seasonal flu and the H1N1 virus.

Southern Coos Hospital will again be offering its free drive-up flu clinic on Tuesday, Oct. 1. The gate will open at 7 a.m. and the event will continue until 2 p.m. or when all 700 doses have been administered. Often that occurs about noon so people are encouraged to come early.

The city of Bandon is again providing its property at the corner of Elmira and 11th Street in Bandon as the site for the clinic. People will enter from 11th Street and exit on 13th Street to Rosa Road. The hospital will pitch its large white tent so those who prefer to walk inside to be vaccinated may do so.

Nursing staff will provide several stations to keep

traffic moving and minimize the time it takes for people to receive their shot. Required paperwork will be distributed as people enter the site and collected before the vaccination. Donations to Southern Coos Health Foundation will be accepted to help cover the \$7,000 cost of the vaccine. A grant from the 2013 Immunize Oregon coalition will help pay for supplies and personnel.

Those receiving the vaccinations will be participating in a disaster preparedness exercise that is a cooperative effort between Southern Coos Hospital & Health Center in Bandon and the City of Bandon. People arriving at the site to get flu vaccinations will create an influx similar to what might be expected during a disaster, hospital officials explain.

"If we had a flu pan-

demic or a disaster where a lot of people were needing medical attention, we would triage away from the hospital to minimize confusion and congestion," said Debra Allen, a registered nurse with Southern Coos Hospital who is organizing the event this year. "We would treat those who did not need to be hospitalized and refer only the ones who did. This drill will allow us, the city and our residents a practice run that will be helpful should we ever have to respond to a real disaster. And we are glad to be able to offer you flu vaccinations without any charge to you."

Anyone age 18 and above is eligible to participate providing they are not sick that day, do not have allergy to eggs or a component of the vaccination and have never had a serious reaction to past flu vaccinations.

Tigers look forward after loss

BANDON — When the final buzzer sounded and Bandon's fate was sealed in the misty Cranberry Bowl on Saturday, the Tigers started looking ahead to what they could learn from their 49-6 loss at the hands of Oakland, the defending Class 2A state champions.

Oakland dominated the line of scrimmage, shutting down the Tigers' option attack all day and keeping Bandon without a first down in the entire first half.

And the Oakers feasted on good field position, starting all seven of their scoring drives in Bandon territory after either turnovers — the Tigers lost three fumbles — or short punts in the wind.

"They're a good football team," Bandon coach Silia Polamalu said. "They feasted on the mistakes we

made. Good teams do that."

Polamalu actually was pleased with his team's defense most of the game. Oakland didn't hit many big plays.

"Our defense was pretty good for the second game," he said.

The bigger concern was why Bandon never got going on offense.

Polamalu thought the Tigers could run at the Oakers.

"They were more active on the line than I thought," he said.

But another issue was Bandon's players not working straight through to the whistle every play.

In the option offense, all the linemen need to do their part to open the holes.

"We're still not carrying out our assignments every play," Polamalu said, adding several plays looked like they were going to gain good yards before breaking down.

Bandon managed just 71 yards on

the ground, including 30 by fullback Will Lozano and 29 by quarterback Shawn Peters.

The Tigers avoided the shutout early in the fourth quarter, when Lozano plowed across the goal line to finish a drive that started with a long kickoff return by Trae Dyer and included Peters' only completion, a 16-yard gain to Tristian Davidson.

That gave Bandon at least one positive on offense going into two weeks of practice before the game against Chiloquin — which will be played at Douglas High School in Winston.

"We've got to make sure we work on our techniques," Peters said.

The quarterback said he still is confident Bandon can have a good season. The Tigers might not see another team like Oakland.

"I'm still pretty excited," he said. "That was a really good team. Possibly the best we'll play."

Fall Chinook season kicking in right on schedule

Local lakes: Trout fishing continues to be slow in local lakes and ponds due to the warm water temperatures. The fall stocking of rainbow trout is not scheduled until the end of September for Bradley Lake, and early October for Empire Lakes, Saunders Lake, and Powers Pond.

Anglers large mouth bass fishing out at local lakes and ponds are still reporting good action. Lake weekend, several bass were taken out at Empire Lakes in Coos Bay. Empire lakes has a few shallow fingers with lots of cover, which is perfect habitat for large mouth bass. Top-water baits are ideal in the think cover.

Local rivers: Larry from the Rogue Outdoor Store told me that salmon fishing in the bay at Gold Beach picked up a

bit last weekend. Some big Chinook are being caught, along with a few fin clipped coho.

Fall Chinook fishing on the lower Coquille River has started to kick into gear. Plenty of Chinook are being caught from the river mouth up to Bear Creek. A few big wild coho have been taken in the bay. Our angler brought in a coho that weighed in at 17 pounds which he caught trolling a pink Blue Fox spinner.

Salmon fishing continues to be excellent up in Coos Bay. Anglers are reporting good numbers of Chinook being caught from the chip pile to the McCullough Bridge. Local guide Bob

Cobb reported catching three limits of Chinook for his client Monday near the Marshfield channel. The average size Chinook being caught in Coos Bay has been 12 to 15 pounds with lots of each salmon mixed in.

Anglers fishing the Umpqua River are still reporting decent fall Chinook fishing. Last Sunday the Umpqua opened for wild coho from the mouth up to the Scottsburg bridge. The season is open until Nov. 30 or when 3,000 coho are tagged.

Pacific Ocean: Ocean salmon fishing has remained good with a mixed bag of Chinook and coho salmon being

caught. Last week ODFW made an in-season change to the wild coho season opening it up seven days per week starting Sept. 12 through Sept. 30.

Anglers bottom fishing out of the Port of Coos Bay reported good rock fish and ling cod fishing last weekend. This week's forecast has the swells building, so be careful.

Area Shellfish: Crabbers on Bandon's Weber's Pier caught a few keeper-sized crab over the weekend. Most of the crab have been undersize or female, making it tough to bring home dinner. Boaters out in the bay have been reporting decent numbers of crab taken with crab rings. It's been tough soaking crab pots because the small crab are getting to the bait before they can be very effective.

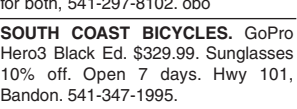
