Leonia Ruth (Thomason) Garcia Svoboda passed away Feb. 9, 2017. She had lived in Reedsport for 70 years prior to moving two months ago to Spruce Point Assisted Living in Florence.

Leonia was born Nov. 23, 1918, in Glencoe, Okla., to Wesley Ira Thomason and Clara Emma (Hesser) Thomason. She had 10 siblings and was one of the middle children. She was baptized into Jesus at the age of 13 and this would define the person she became for the rest of her life.

After high school graduation while she was still 17, she moved from the family farm into Stillwater, Okla., to work and earn funds to attend college. She worked three years as a nanny, grocery store clerk, in a cleaner and as a clerk in Penney's Department Store so she could attend Oklahoma State College for one year.

She married a fellow college student, Alfred Garcia Nov. 4, 1939. Their son, James Allen, was born Jan. 10, 1941. Alfred died as an U.S. Air Force pilot in World War 11 in November 1943.

As a widow her complete focus was to care and provide for her son. She worked for Ingham Lumber Company as a bookkeeper.

In 1945 she became reacquainted with a longtime family friend, John Svoboda. He had come back to visit family in Oklahoma after working one year in Oregon as a logger. It was pretty much "love at first site" for John and Jim. After a year of correspondence and John's visits from Oregon back to Oklahoma they decided to become a new family of three. Leonia and Jim packed up and traveled by train to Oregon. On April 28, 1947 Leonia and Jim married John and lived in Reedsport in the new EK Woods company housing. On March 4, 1948, their daughter, Donna, was born. In 1959 they had the first all-electric home in Reedsport built. She remained living in that home until two months ago.

Leonia went from working out of the home as the provider in Oklahoma to a homemaker and volunteer in the community in Oregon. She gave great effort to make her home a peaceful refuge. She loved being a wife, mother, mother-inlaw, grandmother and great-grandmother. She was a member of the Highland Baptist Church from 1955 to 1965. In 1965 when the Reedsport Christian Church was being formed she joined the congregation and worshiped there until December 2016. She was so happy to attend the celebration of their 50th anniversary.

Leonia was preceded in death in 2010 by Johnny, her husband of 63 years; her parents and all of her brothers and sisters, Melvin, Gertrude, Wesley, Earlie, Riena, Pearlie, Victoria, Ora, Clara Emma and Faunetta; and her dear granddaughter, Nicole Svoboda.

While in practice, Dr. Pettitt touched many lives along the Oregon coast as he cared for and doctored animals. He was deeply loved, and a blessing to many, preferring to do business with a hand shake

and his word. He often sat quietly with grieving pet owners, sometimes giving them a smile or a hug instead of a bill.

After retiring in 1994, Joe treasured time spent with his wife, children, and church family as well as the many hours spent in his garden and with his animals. He prayed daily for those he knew and loved. If he knew your name, you were special to him. One of his greatest joys was growing enough fruit and vegetables to share with friends and neighbors, and enough carrots to lovingly share with his horses all winter long.



Wave was born April 6, 1923 in Bradford, Tenn., the fifth of six children born to Hiram and Mary Crider Young. He died at home in Coos Bay from age-related causes Feb. 16, 2017. He dreamed from a young age, sitting along the highway trying to identify makes and models of automobiles, that one day he would sell them, eventually "playing hooky" from school where he

served as senior class president, to go to Detroit to drive cars back to Tennessee form the brother-in-law who inspired him.

He went to work for DuPont right out of high school and transferred from Alabama to Hanford, Wash., where he and co-workers all "failed" their World War II draft notice physicals. They were needed for a very secretive war related project. He remembered when General Groves, who was head of the Manhattan Project, told a select group of employees that once their project was operational the war would be over - and it was. Japan unconditionally surrendered.

After the war, assisted by beloved younger brother, Henry, he started used car lots in the Tri-Cities, Wash., area. On April 30, 1948, he married Fredda Ratliff and his "favorite daughter": and only child was born a year later. Patricia Armbrust of Scio, her son Chad and Chad's two sons survive Wave. The young family moved to

Newport, Wash., and at the age of 26 Wave had his first new automobile franchise. It was while there he started a lifelong commitment to the children of the world by becoming a member of Kiwanis. He also noted that flying was a faster mode of transportation and learned to fly his first airplane.

Leaving the snow at Newport he moved to North Bend in 1954 and built the Young's Pontiac building which is located behind what is now Wendy's in Coos Bay. He later built the first car dealership on Ocean Boulevard where he had the Oldsmobile/Cadillac/ Mazda/Jeep franchises until selling them in 1986. Over the years he had earned his multi-engine pilot's rating and co-owned Coos Aviation. In 1968 he was elected governor of the Pacific Northwest District of Kiwanis, covering the area from Northern California to the panhandle in Idaho as well as British Columbia, Alaska and the Yukon. Keeping his commitment to serving the less fortunate and especially the youngsters, he also was a longtime supporter of the Salvation Army and at the time of his death was the Coos Chapter's Advisory Board's Life Member. He planned to never retire and kept his hand in business ventures until shortly before his passing.

She returned to Oregon after graduation and worked as a shorthand-typist in the Eugene office of the higher education chancellor.

She entered the University of Oregon in 1947. She majored in English and roomed in University House, where she became friends with a girl from Coos Bay named Eunice Peterson. During their summers Virginia and Eunice worked as singing waitresses at Paradise Lodge on Mount Rainier. On her days off, Virginia donned hiking boots and rambled all over the mountain.

In 1968 she moved with her daughters to Vancouver, Wash., and earned a master's in social work from Portland State College in 1970. She worked in Oregon's adult and family services agency in Salem, and then opened a private practice helping elderly and disabled clients. On weekends she took the girls hiking and backpacking. She climbed Mount Rainier with her brother Paul when they were both well into middle age.

Her retirement was one long adventure. She journeyed to Boston to set foot on ancestral turf-Thompson's Island in Boston Harbor. She spent a year in Chengdu, China, teaching English to university students. She saw Paris, Tahiti, Moscow, Uzbekistan, Tibet, Denali, Australia. She traveled the blue highways of the West in her little red camper, Rosebud.

In 2001, back in Iowa City for a high school reunion, she got reacquainted with Marvin Christensen-they'd both sung in a school production of Gilbert and Sullivan's Iolanthe. 
three daughters and their husbands, three grandchildren, one great-granddaughter and many other dear friends.

George was preceded in death by his parents, Horace and Anna Button; wife, Gladys Button; and his oldest son, Phillip K. Button.





National Monument. Now Ernie had never driven a motor vehicle before joining the CCC, which offered a Wee Drivers course and Ernie took the course and passed, he then had to pass a road test in a truck. He passed the road tests and became a truck driver. He also learned to drive a semi while in the CCC. The CCC had an open house in May 1941 and that is where Ernie first met Inez Tucker, the woman he would marry.

In July 1941 Reuben Tucker of Selma hired Ernie to drive lumber truck. Reuben's daughter. Inez. also was a driver. Ernie said he and Inez wanted to be together all the time so they married. They bought 40 or so acres that had a small cabin on it and some furnishings. They talked of raising a family and Ernie wanted Inez to quit driving truck and raise the kids, which she did. While driving truck a cow ran in front of his truck and Ernie wrecked and the truck burned up. But a man, Bob Frost, owned a sawmill and he asked Ernie to run carriage for him, Ernie had never worked in a sawmill, but he learned to operate the carriage. In June 1945 Reuben Tucker was killed in an accident, so Ernie quit working in the mill and went back to driving truck, this time for his motherin-law, Barbara Tucker. He bought a logging truck and in 1949 he hauled logs. Later he sold his logging truck and bought a lumber truck and hauled lumber. While he was hauling logs and lumber he built a two-story house using a hammer, handsaw, level and a square. There was no electricity so it was built by hand and as soon as it was finished enough to live in he and his family moved in. In 1956 a lot of the mills bought trucks and hauled their own lumber, it was hard for a trucker with just one truck to get enough loads to raise a family.

It was at this time that RD "Dick" Tucker came to Selma and asked Ernie if he would come to Langlois and be the sawyer in Dick's mill. Ernie asked him how long the job would last. Dick told him as long as he wanted to work so Ernie sold his place in Selma and moved to Langlois. He worked as a sawyer until he retired. He said he never asked for a job, never drew an unemployment check, never joined a union and never asked for a raise, but he supported his wife and raised seven children.

Ernie was active in the church he loved his family, he played the guitar and sang, his kids sang with him and even the neighbor kids loved to hear him play and sing, he played games with his kids, he loved the little children and said there was nothing any better than a baby's smile. He loved people and loved to help people. While working for Dick Tucker he took an electrical correspondence course and passed the test for a license to be the electrician for the mill. Also while working at the mill, he built the house on Bono Road he lived in until his death Friday, Feb. 10, 2017.



survived. The following summer they built a cabin of mostly hand-split boards and shakes. Over the years, they eventually purchased adjoining property and lived there most of Jeannie's growing up years.

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
