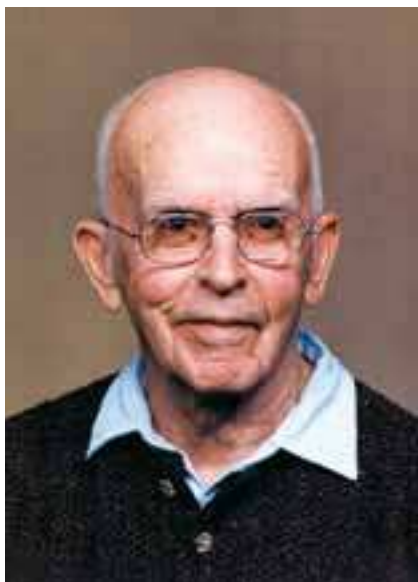

River had incorporated a "Dr. and Mrs. Cheslock Day" in their honor.

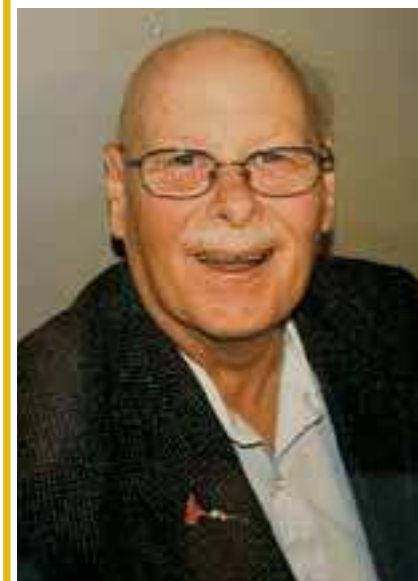

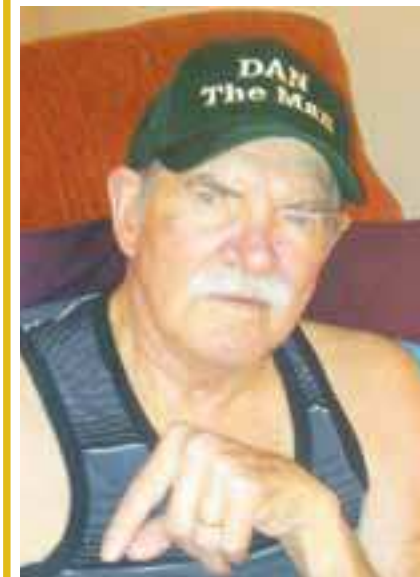
