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## Coos County Fair swings in with a bang

The Coos County Fair opening ceremony went off with more than just a bang, it started with a twenty-one gun salute by the Myrtle Point VFW.

It also began with a ribbon cutting ceremony performed by parade grand marshals alongside newly-crowned county and county-fair queens and princesses.

Longtime Coos County fair-goer and current vice-chairman Dennis Hermann hosted the opening ceremony. His brothers later joined him to sing the national anthem.

Hermann said the fair has been part of his family for as long as he can remember.

“My father was a maintenance man here and an independent contractor in Myrtle Point and he got all of us kids involved with the fair back then,” Hermann said. “And my grandfather was one of the first fair vendors. So we’ve been with the fair for a long time.”

Through every change that has occurred in the past century and more, the Coos County fair has remained. In its 110th year, the Coos County Fair is as strong as ever. In fact, the fair has been growing and becoming

better than ever, according to the vice-chairman.

“It’s just been building and building, and right now we have the backing of the county commissioners, volunteers and the maintenance departments that have all been incredible.”

The 2022 Coos County Fair has carnival rides, games, a huge array of food selections, 4-H exhibits, concerts, rodeos, magic shows and more.

The grounds have been transformed into a welcoming place for people of all-ages.

Hermann said he can remember coming to the fair as a young boy, and every generation – including the “old timers” would join in the fun.

“It was always a place for people to come together,” he said.

And if Hermann has anything to do with it, it will be a tradition that will continue for more than a hundred years to come.

“We have so much fun putting these things on. Yeah, it gets to be a headache, sure. But I never want to see this disappear,” Hermann said. “We will keep it going as long as we can.”

## Finished Blue House a ‘gift to the city’

For more than two years, anyone driving down Cape Arago has seen a historic home in the Empire District being brought back to life.

Step by step, construction on what has become known as the “Blue House” was seen by the community, with few knowing what was going on inside.

Well, any questions about the house have now been answered after Wayne Schrunk hosted an open house to show off the completed home.

In rebuilding the home, Schrunk combined the home’s history with the newest in technology to build a home he calls “a gift to the community.”

But to get there, took divine intervention - literally.

“I was driving by, the house was for sale and the Lord spoke to me and said, ‘Buy this house,’” Schrunk said.

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# Shore Acres State Park Holiday Lights to sparkle Nov. 24-Dec. 31

Holiday Lights at Shore Acres State Park will open this year Nov. 24-Dec. 31 with a new timed entry system for visitors to park their vehicles 4-9 p.m. A \$5 vehicle parking ticket assigned to a date and entry time of the visitors' choice is needed to enter the show. The event parking fee is the same as the normal day-use parking permit price for the park.

Holiday Lights visitors must reserve their spot and then have their ticket for parking ready to show the ranger at the booth when they arrive at their selected times. Visitors will no longer have the option to purchase a parking permit on site to park and attend.

"We're excited that the Friends of Shore Acres will host Holiday Lights again in 2022 and that this timed entry system will help keep the flow of traffic moving during this very popular event," says Lee Ricci, park manager for the Sunset Bay Management Unit.

Date and timed entry parking tickets are available now online. Reservations also can be made by calling 800-452-5687. The \$5 event parking permit is non-refundable.

The parking ticket is required to enter the event; however, the \$5 fee may be waived if the person making the reservation has one of the following and selects the option during the reserva-



tion process: 12- or 24-month parking permit; special access pass for either the veterans with service-connected disabilities or foster, guardian and adoptive foster parents of Oregon foster children; current Oregon State Park camping confirmation that coincides with the date of the event visit; or an Oregon Pacific Coast Passport.

The printed ticket, as well as the selected pass, permit, or campground confirmation, must be presented to park staff at entry to keep traffic moving.

This new process will help people quickly enter the parking area and prevent long waits to enter the park, which will improve safety issues on the Cape Arago Highway. In previous years, long lines have backed up on the narrow highway and blocked side roads, which hindered traffic and emergency vehicle access.

Although visitors can reserve their timed entry parking spot now, additional spots will be available later this fall for each evening during a seven-day roll-

ing window tentatively set to begin Nov. 18 for visits beginning Nov. 24. The rolling window will run through Dec. 31.

"We realize that it's early for many families to make November and December plans and we want people to have an opportunity for spur-of-the-moment visits," Ricci adds, "We're holding half the parking sites for that rolling seven-day window to ensure visitors can reserve closer to the event."

The Friends of Shore Acres launched the Holiday Lights

show in 1987 and it continued to delight visitors through 2019. The event was paused 2020-2021 for visitor safety during the pandemic. In 2019, nearly 60,000 visitors attended. Park staff expect the light show to be just as popular in 2022, if not more after a two-year absence.

was found hiding in the brush several hundred yards from the vehicle.

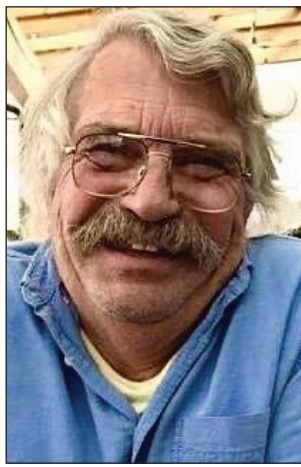
## Bruce Richardson

as a Sunday school teacher, leader of Lutheran Church Women's group and choir member for many years. Joyce was an active member of Eastside Home Extension.

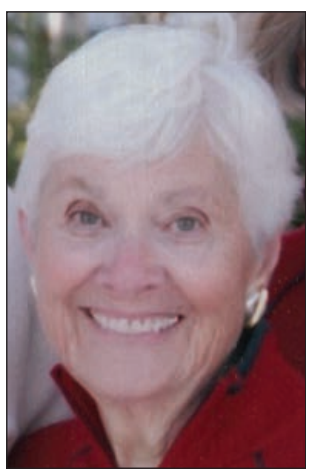
Joyce enjoyed embroidery, knitting and sharing her baking with family and friends. Her cookie jar was rarely empty.

**DEAR 911:** This is something you should discuss with your employer. Neither you nor your co-workers are trained caregivers, and no one should be administering medical care because of possible liability to the company.

You are obviously a sensitive and caring person. However, if the situation has become more stressful than you can manage, it's time to take a step back. To do so isn't "abandoning" anyone; it is looking after your own mental health so you can provide for your family.

**DEAR ABBY:** My parents divorced when I was a small child. My father remarried when I was 10, and I loved my stepmother dearly. She died in 1994 after 27 years of marriage. Daddy then met another lovely woman I'll call "Eileen," whom he dated for many years. By this time, I was nearly 40 and living 1,000 miles away from them. He eventually moved in with her, but they didn't actually marry until 2018. Eileen is only 13 years older than I am, so I have always thought of her as "my father's third wife," not "my stepmother."

Daddy died last year, and I'm not sure how much of a relationship I want to maintain with Eileen, or how to refer to her when I have occasion to introduce her to someone. She was extraordinarily good to my father (better than he deserved, I might add), and I'm grateful for that, but the link that tied

us is now gone.

She's coming to visit soon. Introducing her to my friends as "Dad's third wife" seems a bit cold, but introducing her as "my stepmother" would mischaracterize our relationship. She had no children of her own, and I don't want to give her the impression that I have bonded to her as if she were my mother. Please help. -- CHALLENGED IN THE SOUTH

**DEAR CHALLENGED:** Treat Eileen as you would want to be treated if the situation were reversed. Introduce her WARMLY as "Eileen." If further clarification is needed, she is "Daddy's widow." That she is third in the line-up does not need to be mentioned. As to giving her the impression that you feel bonded to her, don't obsess over it. Your relationship with her is either warm and rewarding, or it isn't. If it is only obligatory, ask yourself why you feel the need to keep her at arm's length, and act accordingly.

## Opinion: Why Congress should leave abortion to the states

Abortion regulation is an intractable problem mainly because no one knows the true nature of reality. Differing opinions about the existence and nature of God, the human soul, objective morality and other “first principles” lead to irreconcilable opinions about abortion.

If Congress, state legislators and judges want to address abortion now that *Roe v. Wade* has been overturned, they will need to address various difficult questions. The primary question is how the government should balance the rights of a pregnant woman with the rights of the preborn developing in her womb when those rights conflict.

Specifically, given that (1) each human being originates at conception and (2) development in the womb is the first stage of each human being’s life, when does each person first acquire rights under the law, including the right to life? At conception? At birth? At some point in-between? Or at some point after birth?

Three possible scenarios might be true, although some people stubbornly refuse to acknowledge all three:

—If a human being does not acquire rights under the law until birth or some point after birth, then the abortion debate is over. That is, unrestricted abortion should always be legal as long as it is not forced or does not otherwise violate the rights of a pregnant woman.

—If a human being acquires rights under the law after conception but at some point before birth, then abortion should always be legal before that point. However, how such a point could be determined objectively seems highly problematic. Past proposals, such as so-called viability or the first detection of a heartbeat, have been subjective.

Even if such a point could be determined objectively, the government would still need to determine under what circumstances, if any, a pregnant woman’s rights outweigh the right to life of the preborn. For example, abor-

tion might be legal even after the point at which a preborn acquires rights if the pregnancy threatens the pregnant woman’s life.

—If a human being acquires rights under the law at conception, including the right to life, the government will need to determine if there are any circumstances in which a pregnant woman’s rights would outweigh the right to life of the preborn, such as a threat to the pregnant woman’s life.

Is there any way to objectively establish (1) when a human being first acquires legal rights, including the right to life, and (2) under what circumstances, if any, a pregnant woman’s rights would outweigh the right to life of a preborn? These are the fundamental questions lawmakers and judges must answer to determine whether and under what circumstances abortion should be legal or illegal.

The answers depend on which “first principles” are correct. No one knows, however, which “first principles” are correct. That’s partly why abortion is such a heated and contentious issue because it’s ultimately a debate about which religious beliefs are correct. Abortion, therefore, will remain unresolvable until those “first principles” can be established objectively.

Lawmakers and judges are confronted with an impossible but unavoidable task. Some pregnant women are going to seek abortions. How should the government respond?

With ultimate truth so elusive, perhaps it would be best for Congress to leave abortion regulation to the states. At least that would allow Americans with differing opinions to choose among different options rather than force the entire country to abide by a single law that would be as inherently divisive as it would be inherently subjective.

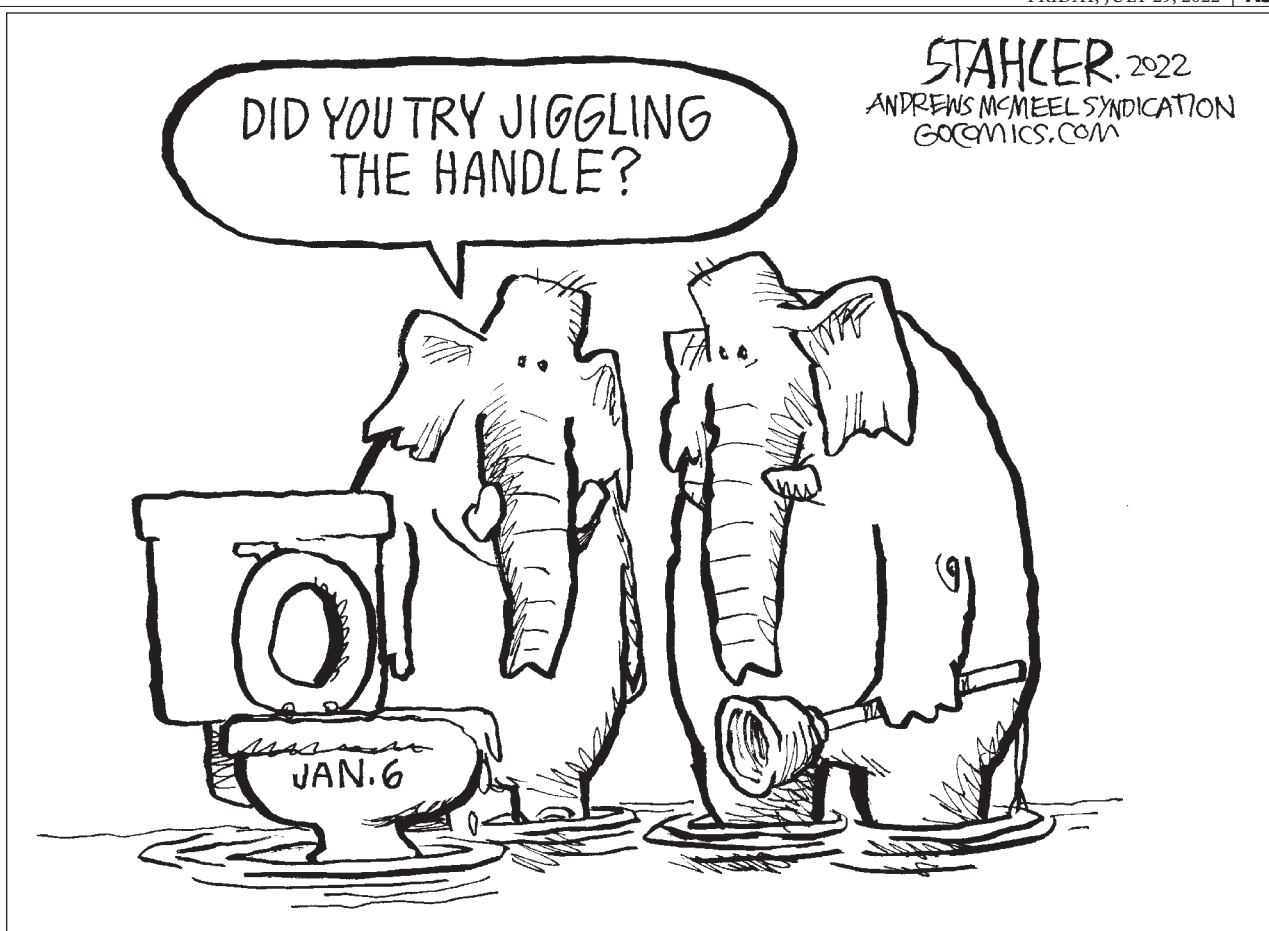

## Ditches are a vanishing paradise

Annette Choszczyk lives in rural western Colorado these days, but when she was a kid, the Highline Canal in Denver was her summer paradise.

“To us, it was river and a playground, complete with rope swings, swimming holes, crawdads and a trail alongside it that adults and kids could walk on to the foothills or far out into the prairie.” They always called it a ditch, this 71-mile-long canal that carried water all over Denver.

Throughout the West, thousands of ditches that snake for miles through semi-arid country are nothing less than beloved. They add living green corridors to walk or bike along, impromptu wetlands frequented by birds, and always, a respite from summer heat.

But now a warming climate delivers less melted snow to rivers that supply these diversion ditches with water. Federal legislation also mandates piping many earthen ditches to cut salinity in the Colorado River water that’s sent to Mexico.

The result: Dry trails, disappearing wetlands and the end of a rural and urban amenity.

Many people mourn the loss. “With less water we have to figure out how to try to retain the best of what we value the most,” says John Fleck, a water researcher at the University of New Mexico’s Utton Center. He says the Griego Lateral, in Albuquerque, that he regularly bikes along, was built in 1708, and during the COVID lockdown, the ditch bank was mobbed with bikers and walkers desperate to get outdoors. “There is incredible value in these ditches,” he says.

But Fleck points out that we’re confronted by difficult choices: “How much water do we keep in rivers and which ditches do we save?” Any loss can be painful, and in a blog post, Fleck said simply: “I love living near a ditch.”

You could say of Cary Denison, former project coordinator for Trout Unlimited and an irrigator, that he was born in irrigation boots. “In western Colorado, my dad was the superintendent of the Fire Mountain Canal,” he says, “and my first job was irrigating.” These days, though, Denison thinks rivers get short-changed because too much water gets diverted into ditches.

“Then a river suffers,” he says. “We need to maintain enough water in the river for fish and plant life.”

Dennison recalls a startling moment as he irrigated family property outside of Hotchkiss, Co. The gated 12-inch pipe was clogged, so he and his brother began cleaning it out, expecting a mass of leaves and twigs. But the clog turned out to be the biggest brown trout — “and I fished almost daily,” he says — that he’d ever seen. That fish had come a long way. Their property was nine miles from the diversion where the

river was sweeping almost entirely into the ditch.

These days Dennison is an irrigator himself and lives in the town of Ridgway. But he recalls that giant brown trout as “a day where irrigators should have taken less.” The experience led Denison toward his work in conservation: “We need to take only the water from rivers we absolutely need.”

Fleck and other students of the Colorado River see a time coming soon when many water diversions will cease because of their lower priority dates. Some ditches are already dry, as the water gets left in the river for the Lower Basin states of Arizona, Nevada and California. These states share the river equally with the Upper Basin states of Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Wyoming, where the river begins and gathers strength.

Over centuries, says Fleck, “one of the things that we’ve done in all these Western landscapes is to

narrow the river itself with levees and dams and control it in a narrow channel. And we’ve distributed water across the floodplain through ditches. It’s this huge rich, complex social and cultural ecosystem that we’ve all lived in for hundreds of years.”

But increasing aridity is already changing that pattern. Earlier this summer, Choszczyk, who now lives in western Colorado, mourned the loss of some of her local ditches as they got piped, ending the riparian ribbon that enhanced her neighborhood.

“Generations of children will have poorer childhoods because they will never have a ‘wild’ place along a ditch to explore,” she says.

It’s hard to love a semi-desert once you’ve come to appreciate the wonders that a ditch can bring.

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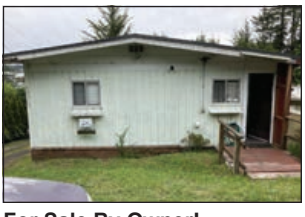

State law authorizes the governing bodies of cities and counties to adopt ordinances to be referred to the voters that prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the area subject to the city's or county's jurisdiction. The City of North Bend is referring to the voters an ordinance prohibiting psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City.

## Vo is medalist in U.S. Junior Amateur at Bandon Dunes

Keaton Vo mastered the Bandon Dunes course on Tuesday, nabbing medalist honors at the 74th U.S. Junior Amateur and earning the top seed into the match play portion of the tournament.

The top 64 players following a playoff Wednesday morning advanced to match play, where they needed to win six matches over four days on the Bandon Dunes course to be declared champion and join a select group that includes Tiger Woods, Jordan Spieth, Johnny Miller, David Duval, Scottie Scheffler and Will Zalatoris.

Vo shot a 69 in his opening round on Bandon Trails on Monday and then lit up the Bandon Dunes course with a 7-under 65 that included seven birdies, two bogeys and an eagle. He matched the course record previously set by James Piot during the 2020 U.S. Amateur, the last USGA event hosted by the resort. Piot won the U.S. Amateur in 2021.

"It was a great round," said Vo in an interview with the United States Golf Association. "It wasn't perfect golf. My goal was just to try and get a good seed coming into match play. But I hit the ball much better than I did yesterday. I missed in the right spots and converted my putts, so it was a really fun round all around."

Vo was not troubled by the links style golf courses at the resort.

"I really enjoy it," he said. "It suits my game really well. I'm from Texas and we (hit) a lot of low balls and we know how to flight the ball (down) well. If I can just keep the putter rolling this week, I should be in a pretty good spot."

He also likes his chances in the match play portion of the event for the same reason.

"I really enjoy match play," he said. "You don't have to play perfect golf. I tend to keep it in the fairway and keep the pressure going throughout the round, so I'm really excited. I feel like this course suits me well."

Vo, who is from Austin, Texas, finished two shots ahead of Jayden Ford of New Zealand and Grant Lester of Washington, D.C. Four more players were at 6-under — Joshua Koo of Cerritos, Calif.; Nicholas Gross of Downingtown, Pa.; Dianchao Wu of the People's Republic of China and Jack Cantlay, the younger brother of PGA player Patrick Cantlay.

Cantlay made news in the opening round on Monday when the 18-year-old from Los Alamitos, Calif., set a nine-hole scoring record for the U.S. Junior Amateur with his 8-under 28 on the front nine at Bandon Dunes (his second nine of the day) that included four birdies and eagles on both par-5s, one with a

45-foot putt and the other with a 65-foot chip-in.

"I think that's the first time I have broken 30," Cantlay said in an interview with USGA.

"There's a first time for everything, I guess. It's just another round of golf, sometimes you play good and sometimes you play bad. Today I played good."

Cantlay's effort was impressive given thick fog that rolled in during his back nine Monday.

Tuesday's qualifying round was delayed more than two hours due to fog and the final players finished at dusk.

On the plus side Tuesday, the winds stayed down after a brisk breeze made afternoon conditions challenging a day earlier.

When the final scores were posted, 11 players were set for a playoff Wednesday morning for the final five spots in the field, that group all finishing at 1-over.

Also safely into match play is defending champion Nick Dunlap of Tuscaloosa, Ala., who was 1-under both days of qualifying.

Luke Potter of Encinitas, Calif., also advanced, finishing in a tie for eighth at 5-under. Potter reached the semifinals of last year's tournament.

Collin Hodgkinson of Beaverton was the lone Oregonian to make it into match play, shooting a 1-under 70 at Bandon Trails on Tuesday after shooting even par in the opening qualifying round. He was scheduled to play Dunlap in his opening match Wednesday.

Jordan Giles of Talent was closest among the other Oregonians, the 13-year-old finishing at 3-over.

Drew Woolworth of Lake Oswego finished at 6-over, while Cole Rueck of Corvallis, the son of Oregon State University's women's basketball coach, was 11-over and Miles Eastman of Portland was 12-over.

Miles Russell was the youngest player to advance. The 13-year-old Jacksonville, Fla., resident birdied four of his final six holes, including nearly recording an ace on the 15th hole at Bandon Dunes, to make it into match play at even par. He is the third youngest person to make match play since 1990.

Omar Khalid Hussain, who is 18, became the first golfer from Pakistan to make a cut in any USGA championship, finishing the two qualifying rounds at even par.

Match play was due to start Wednesday with the round of 64 following the playoff for the final sports.

The rounds of 32 and 16 are scheduled for Thursday with the quarterfinals and semifinals on Friday and the 36-hole championship match on Saturday. All the matches are on the Bandon Dunes course.

The event is open to the public for anyone who wants to come watch. The Golf Channel will provide live coverage from 3 to 5 p.m. both Friday and Saturday.

# AS I SEE IT: Moore Mill

The first picture I am sharing is of Moore Mill, taken not long after the Moore family bought what was then Cody Mill, before it burned in 1909.

An article in the Feb. 3, 1916, Western World carried a very large headline: "Moore Mill to Re-open."

Even in those days, the mill was one of the area's largest employers and it was big news when it shut down .... or reopened.

"We have reached an agreement with the Coach timber interests and will open our logging camps within a week or ten days, in view of starting the mill by the 15th of March. Geo. W. Moore."

"In an interview with a representative of Western World (owned and edited by my grandfather, L.D. Felsheim), Mr. Moore stated that an agreement has been reached with the Coach timber interests, for the purchase of their product. The price agreed upon is \$2.25 per thousand. Mr. Moore having been successful in making arrangements whereby his company is able to pay the price demanded, although it is in advance of what the company has heretofore been able to offer.

"We expect to open our camp within a week or 10 days, employing about 45 men in the beginning. This will enable us to get things in shape so we can start the mill, which will employ about 75 men. Our product will be carried to California ports by the Estabrook steamers, as before.

"The Moore mill is the largest on the Coquille river and one of the best equipped in the county. It has been closed down since the summer of 1914, when Bandon was swept by fire. At that time the lumber market reached such a low figure that it was impossible to continue operations. The mill had been one of the main contributing features to the success of local commerce and it is anticipated that its resumption will put new life into the community, acting as an entering wedge to a general rejuvenation."

The second picture I am sharing is of the Beaver Hill Coal Mine, a photo which came from a 1909 Coos County chamber

publication.

"Coos County has the only coal mines in operation in the state of Oregon and practically the only coal in marketable quantities on the Pacific coast south of Puget Sound. It is estimated that the coal area of the county is about 400 square miles. Lignite coal of a good quality is mined. It retails locally for \$4 and \$6. San Francisco and Eureka furnish a market and Portland is expected to be a big future market. Many of the coal burning steamers get coal at Coos Bay. The quality is declared by experts to be suitable for naval vessels. A company has been formed to start a briquet plant and use the coal from the local mines.

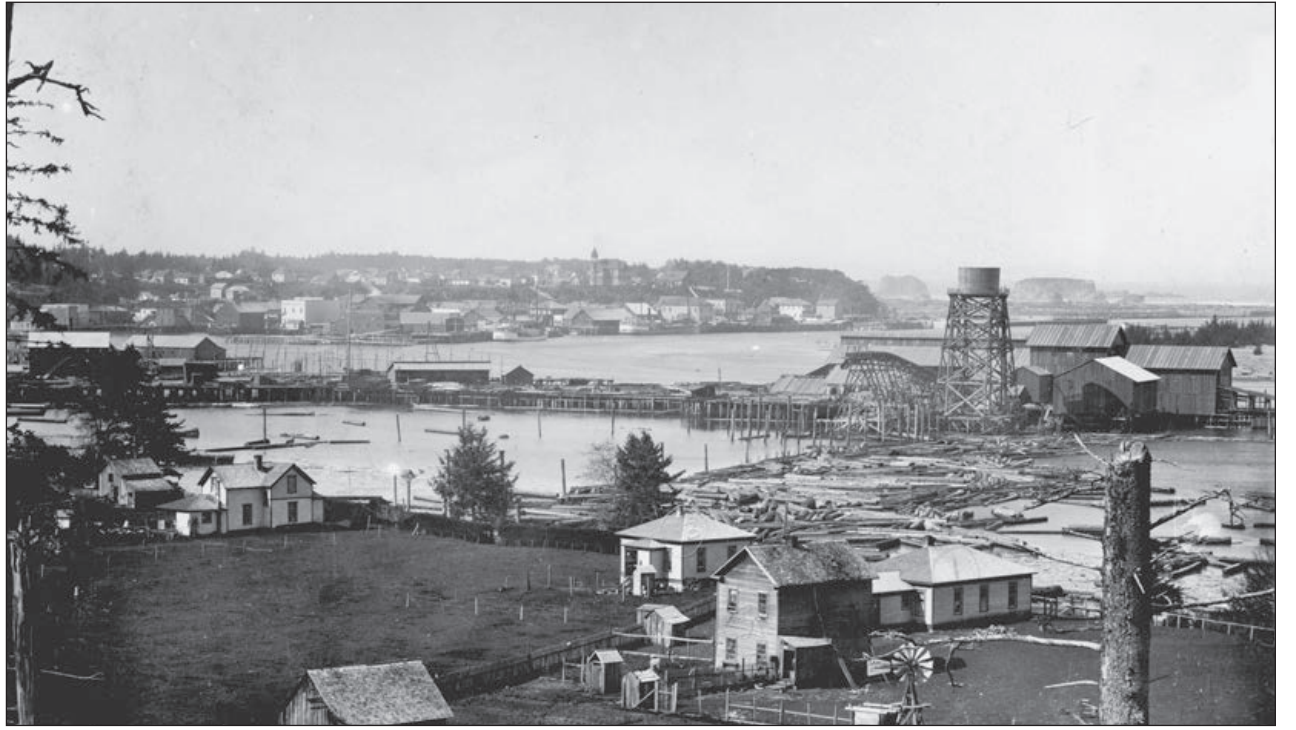
"While coal mining has been an important feature of the industrial life of the county in past years, it is believed to be only in its infancy of possible development. The harbors of Coos Bay and the Coquille river give the water transportation, and the coal lands are obtainable at reasonable figures.

"Minerals of a valuable kind are also found in Coos county in a belt south of Myrtle Point where there is gold, silver and copper. Several holdings in that locality are being developed among them being the Salmon Mountain mine. In the pioneer days gold was washed from the beach sands and considerable prospecting done."

The third picture features the Bandon Concert Band, around 1910, as they play in concert on First Street looking west toward what is now Edgewaters Restaurant and the vacation rental dwelling in the old Breuer building.

A publication put out by the Bandon Commercial Club has this to say:

"There are but few small towns that have ever had a band, and but few cities, much larger, that can boast of as good a band as the Bandon Concert Band. The band was organized about Feb. 28th, 1902, after many struggles, under the direction of several musical artists, men, who by the way, were popular with the members of the band and the people. The band now ranks with the best concert bands in the country. It is now composed of 24 men, fully equipped with high grade instruments and fully uniformed. The Bandon people are proud of their

band, and well they should be, for it is thoroughly popular with all who had heard it render the most difficult standard music and operatic selections."

Speaking of music, Bandon's own Rachel Eickhoff has returned from a "once of a lifetime" trip to Europe where she joined 460 other Oregon students on the Oregon Ambassadors of Music Tour of Western Europe, after being nominated for the honor by Dave Weston, BHS band teacher.

Rachel, a sophomore at Bandon High, is the daughter of Linda Eickhoff, who is best known for her cheery smile as she answers the phone and works the front desk at City Hall.

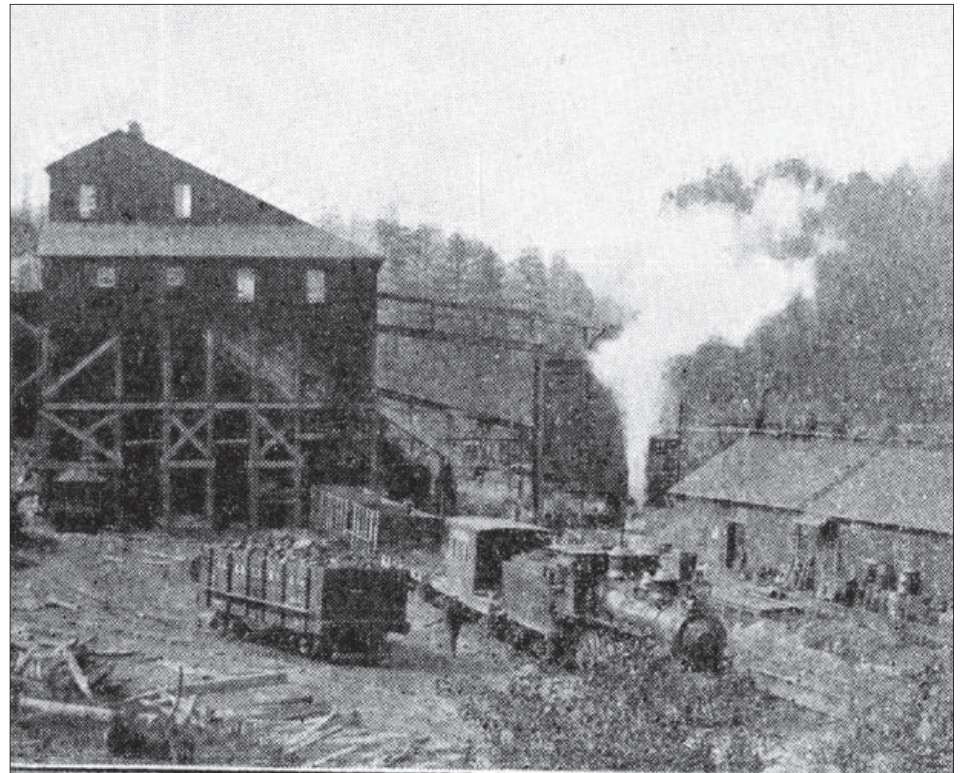
Other students have been nominated, but Rachel is the first Bandon student who earned the money for the trip. She credits Bandon Rotary, the VFW, Bandon Booster Club, Oregon Old-Time Fiddlers, family and friends for helping her reach her dream.

The band performed in four countries: France, Switzerland, Austria and Germany before returning home July 20.

Rachel will present a slide show of her trip on Tuesday, Aug. 9, at 6 p.m. at the Bandon Library Sprague Room.

And now on a less happy note, I have learned that three Bandon residents have died in the last couple of weeks.

Diane Kimes, 72, died at Swedish Memorial Hospital in Seattle, with her husband, David, by her side. Diane was a CPA who provided tax service for free at The Barn for many years. dilapidated structure on Dec. 31, 2019. A contractor for 48 years, who is now semi-retired, Schrunck began the job of restoring the home. And through most of the work, he had no idea what his final plans were.

"Ninety-five percent of the work I did myself," he said. "It came at a great time during the pandemic. We couldn't travel. So, I would go surfing in the morning and come work on this in the afternoon."

At one point, he even brought his granddaughters to the home, taught them some basics of woodworking, and let them pitch in a little.

He said one thing he was determined to do was to save as much of the original home as possible. The wood floors and much of the wooden interior was sanded down to raw wood and brought back to life.

For a while, he thought about making the home into a vacation rental, but during the middle of construction, the city of Coos Bay changed its rules for vacation rentals, so that plan went out the window. Now, Schrunck isn't 100% certain what the long-term plan for the property is.

But he knows one thing for sure. "I'm glad it's done," he said. "It's not going to be a vacation rental. I may do a 31-day rental for nurses or business people. Right now, my daughter and her family will be moving in and staying here while we build them a brand-new home."

The four-bedroom, three-bathroom home includes a state-of-the-art kitchen with a dining room and family room downstairs. One bedroom, or possible office is downstairs with three spacious bedrooms upstairs.

As he showed off his home, offering guests hot dogs and drinks during the open house, Schrunck said keeping as much of the home original was a personal goal.

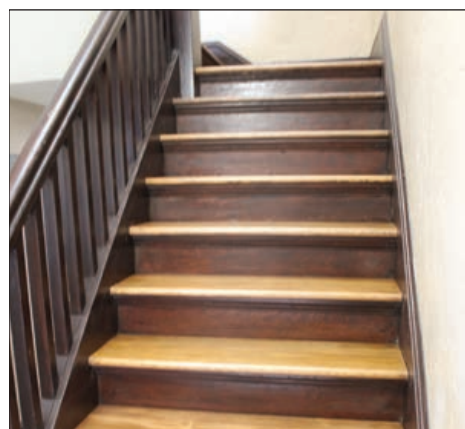
"Any of the lumber I used in here, I salvaged out of it," he said. "All of the wood was taken down to raw wood and then refinished."

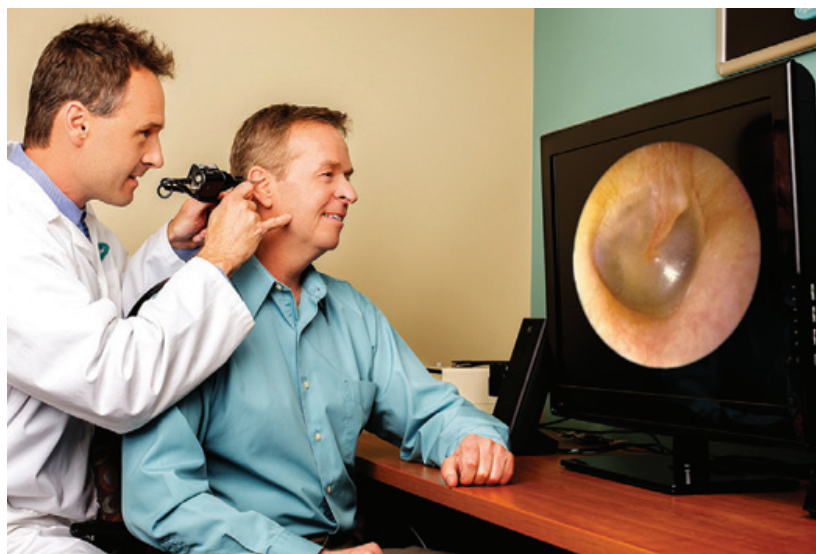
Visitors to an open house get a look at the history of the Blue House on Cape Arago Highway.

# Riddle man arrested in Hanks murder

Just hours after the body of Kendra Hanks was located in Douglas County, a Riddle man was arrested in connection with her disappearance and murder.

On Thursday, July 21, at approximately 3:30 p.m., detectives with the Douglas County Sheriff's Office along with investigators from the Douglas County Major Crimes Team contacted 39-year-old Troy Russell Phelps of Riddle at a residence in the 1500-block

of Pruner Road in Riddle. Phelps had become a person of interest in the investigation into the disappearance of Hanks.

Phelps was taken into custody after speaking with detectives. A search warrant was also executed at the residence where Phelps was residing.

On Wednesday, July 13, at approximately 3:30 p.m., the sheriff's office was notified of a deceased person found in Cow

Creek in approximately the 9000-block of Cow Creek Road. Investigators responded to the scene and confirmed the death of an adult female, which is suspected to be Kendra Hanks. The body was transported to the Oregon State Medical Examiner's Office on Thursday, July 14. The death was ultimately ruled a homicide. Sheriff's Office is awaiting positive identification from the Oregon State Medical

Examiner's Office.

The Sheriff's Office has been and continues to be in communication with Hanks' mother, who is aware of the latest developments in the case.

Phelps was transported to and lodged in the Douglas County Jail on charges of Murder in the First Degree and Resisting Arrest.

Additional details surrounding the investigation will be withheld to protect the integrity of the

investigation.

The Douglas County Major Crimes Team consists of investigators from the sheriff's office, Roseburg Police Department and Oregon State Police working in consultation with the Douglas County District Attorney's Office.

# Marine conservation effort in U.S. Virgin Islands aids key fish species, Oregon State research finds

A more than 30-year marine conservation effort in the U.S. Virgin Islands helped aid the recovery of a fish species important in commercial, recreational and subsistence fisheries, a

new Oregon State University study found.

Red hind, a species of grouper in the Caribbean, historically experienced intense fishing pressure, which led managers to implement progressively restrictive fishing closures in the U.S. Virgin Islands.

In a study just published in *Frontiers in Marine Science*, researchers at Oregon State and the University of the Virgin Islands found that the fishing restrictions at the location they studied helped lead to a more than 35% increase in average fish size and

the recovery of the population to a benchmark considered sustainable for many fish species.

"This is a management and conservation success," said Claire Rosemond, an Oregon State doctoral student and lead author of the study. "The recovery

of the red hind population at the spawning aggregation tracks management decisions, so it appears that fishing restrictions are helping to accomplish the intended goal of recovering the red hind population and fishery."

Globally, more than 200 species of marine fishes, including red hind, reproduce by forming spawning aggregations at specific times and locations. The predictability of these mass spawning events makes the aggregations susceptible to intense fishing pressure.

Locations of many fish spawning aggregations in the Caribbean have been known and fished for decades. This has led to population collapse of several important species, including red hind, which are an important source of income and food for local people.

By the late 1980s, the red hind population at a spawning site near St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands showed signs of decline with a decrease in average fish length and an extremely skewed ratio of females to males because fishing disproportionately removed the larger males.

This led fisheries managers in 1990 to establish the Red Hind Bank Marine Conservation District to protect the fish spawning site by seasonally closing the area to fishing during the months of peak spawning activity (December through February). In 1999, the district was permanently closed to fishing.

The just-published research focused on that spawning site. The scientists used historical data collected by other researchers between 1988 and 2009 and gathered their own data during several trips to the U.S. Virgin Islands between 2018 and 2020.

During those trips the researchers caught, mea-

sured, and released 1,203 red hind. The mean size of the fish they caught was almost 16 inches, more than four inches longer than the mean size reported from data from 1988-89. Meanwhile, the female to male ratio at the spawning aggregation became less skewed over time.

By a measure known as spawning potential ratio, the red hind are now at a benchmark considered sustainable for many fisheries, the researchers note, but that does not mean that continued recovery is guaranteed.

"To me the take home message is this management measure worked, but it also means this management measure is currently working, so at this point in time let's keep it the way it is," said Scott Heppell, a co-author of the paper who is a professor in the Department of Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation Sciences at Oregon State in Oregon State's College of Agricultural Sciences.

The recovery of the red hind population at the spawning aggregation site is due in part to management decisions, fishers adhering to closures and long-term monitoring.

"The Marine Conservation District is a conservation success due to the participation of people from many different sectors," Rosemond said. "I think management agencies and fishers would be excited to know that their work and potential sacrifices, like not fishing in closed areas, have paid off."

Richard Nemeth of the University of the Virgin Islands is also a co-author of this paper.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Puerto Rico Sea Grant College Program, and the Department of Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation Sciences funded this research.

## New MRI trailer installed at Southern Coos Hospital & Health Center Trailer will enhance patient experience, improve staff workflow and increase availability of services

The new MRI Mobile diagnostic imaging unit is in place at Southern Coos Hospital & Health Center and is ready for patients.

Patients needing an MRI can ask their provider to schedule it at Southern Coos Hospital.

The Southern Coos Health District Board in May approved a 5-year lease of the unit, which replaces the former Alliance Imaging MRI mobile unit.

The MRI Mobile unit is located at the north end of the main hospital building, in a more convenient area than the previous unit and allows SCHHC to continue offering onsite MRI services.

A concrete pad was poured to accommodate the unit and it is now easily accessible from the hospital patient area and Emergency Department.

The move also creates more visibility and ease of access to the SCHHC Emergency Department entrance and opens up additional parking.

The new unit will provide an improved experience for patients, with reduced noise during pro-

cedures, a wider bore to accommodate patients of all sizes and a larger lift door to allow technologists to scan patients who are confined to beds or wheelchairs.

The MRI Mobile unit provides updated technology and electronic medical record integration. In addition, the new unit will improve SCHHC staff workflow through a more comfortable control room and updated software.

Enhanced services and growth potential can also be added, including the potential for neurovascular studies, such as triple study MRI Head/MRI Brain, a study performed after a variety of head injuries, including aneurysms. The study can also detect atherosclerotic (plaque) disease in the carotid artery of the neck, among other conditions.

In fiscal year 2021, SCHHC provided the public with 273 MRI scans - approximately 23 procedures per month. It is projected that the new unit will provide an average of 33 MRI procedures per month.

Additional services and patient volumes will help increase revenue for the hospital.

## Guadalupe Fur Seal receives care at Oregon Coast Aquarium

An injured Guadalupe fur seal is on the road to recovery thanks to the collaborative efforts of the Oregon Coast Aquarium (OCAq), the Marine Mammal Stranding Network (MMSN), and SeaLife Response, Rehabilitation, and Research (SR<sup>3</sup>).

The seal, a male yearling, was found stranded on Salishan Beach and reported by a private citizen to Jim Rice, Stranding Program Manager with the Marine Mammal Institute at Oregon State University. Rice and Research Assistant Charles Nye responded to the call.

The seal was identified as a

Guadalupe fur seal, a threatened species protected by law in the United States. The animal was lethargic and entangled in marine debris. After disentangling and assessing the seal's condition, Rice determined the seal needed additional care and contacted OCAq.

Once entangled, Guadalupe fur seals experience extreme fatigue and are unable to feed effectively. The seal was dehydrated and emaciated upon his arrival to OCAq. Staff administered antiseptic to the wounds

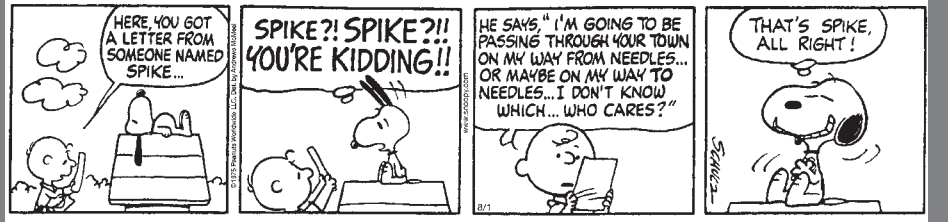

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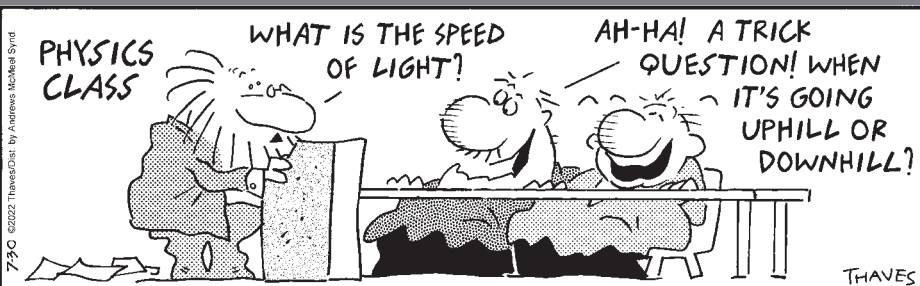

caused by the marine debris and provided him with fluids and nutrients.

OCAq partners with other animal rehabilitation facilities to ensure stranded and injured wild-life have the best possible chance at survival, rehabilitation, and eventual release. The Guadalupe fur seal was transported to SR<sup>3</sup>, based out of Washington state, where he will continue to receive care. SR<sup>3</sup> operates the SeaLife Rescue Center, the Pacific Northwest's only hospital dedicated to marine wildlife.

Guadalupe fur seals live in waters off southern California and the Pacific coast of Mexico, and are often observed feeding in Oregon waters.

This Guadalupe fur seal's survival is thanks to the dedication and collaboration of private citizens, volunteers, and wild-life professionals and facilities. OCAq is committed to Oregon's marine wildlife, and will continue these efforts with the belief that even one saved animal can help species recovery.

If you see a stranded marine mammal, note its location and report it to the Oregon State Police Tipline at 800- 452-7888, and the Marine Mammal Stranding Network at 1-866-767-6114.
