- The hike will traverse a sandy beach and may not be suited for strollers or other wheeled equipment not intended for operating off paved surfaces.
- Friendly dogs are welcome on six-foot leashes.
- Participants should dress in layers, including rain protection, wear sturdy shoes, and bring water and snacks, as well as a camera or binoculars for wildlife viewing.



A new word was entering America's vocabulary 90 years ago:

True, adolescents had been around since the dawn of time. Surprisingly, they weren't called "teenagers' until the 1930s, when researchers first noticed the demographic was emerging as a source of spending power. Tinseltown pounced on the prospect, targeting its movies - and the stars who kept theater seats filled to them.

In the case of one girl, Hollywood succeeded a little too well.

Fifteen-year-old Martha Vichnes was, in her family's words, "movie crazy." And she was in love, too. Not some passing crush on a high school jock, but a deeply passionate, intensely burning love.

Martha was in love with the king of Hollywood.

The minute he first appeared on the silver screen in 1931, Clark Gable **HOLY COW! HISTORY:**

A Teen's Daring 'Date' With the King of Hollywood

made it his home. A popular actor from the start, his breakout role in 1934's "It Happened One Night" propelled him to superstardom. Women were drawn to his combination of rugged vitality and smooth, graceful charm. Men saw him as one of their own: a man's man.

Martha dearly loved Gable. She spent hour after hour in her family's Brooklyn apartment writing hundreds of gushing letters to him. Although Gable never answered even one of them, she eventually believed that he loved her, too. By the summer of 1936, she decided it was time they went on a date.

Although Martha may have viewed herself as starlet material, nobody else did. "She began to imagine she was beautiful," her mother later told reporters, "which she really isn't. She's what we call a mud-gutter blonde.

What she lacked in looks, the teenager more than made up for in moxie. If her king wouldn't come to her in Brooklyn, she would go to Hollywood for their first date.

Her father had just received a \$500 bonus for his military service in France during World War I. He spent \$100 paying bills and stashed the remaining \$400 (worth almost \$10,000 today) in a bureau drawer as savings.

Martha secretly swiped it. Then, when her parents were at an American Legion ball one night, she tucked her 6-year-old brother, Harold, into bed and whispered, "I'm going to California. Don't tell anyone.

With that, she hopped on a plane and headed to Hollywood — and was probably disappointed when Gable wasn't waiting at the airport.

Undeterred, Martha took a room in the posh Roosevelt Hotel befitting her status as a starlet-to-be. Then she immediately went stargazing.

It started with a visit to the Trocadero Cafe, where the head waiter pointed out Robert Taylor. Martha found him handsome enough, but no Clark Gable. She later spotted Joan Crawford. Her verdict? "The actresses really aren't much. They use too much mascara and greasepaint."

A shopping spree followed the next day. With \$65 for an evening gown, a \$7 pair of matching sandals and a hat for \$2, daddy's money was going fast. "The champagne cocktails cost \$3.50, and I had to give the waiter a dollar tip — think of it!"

Martha finally got to see her beloved Clark Gable the day after that. She bought a ticket at the legendary Chinese Theatre and watched him in San Francisco, his latest blockbuster, which she pronounced "simply

swell."

Back in Brooklyn, the teen's parents had discovered Martha was missing. Six-year-olds aren't the most trustworthy confidants, and Harold blabbed. The father frantically called the American Legion in Los Angeles and shared his daughter's physical description. Members then fanned out looking for her.

By the time they eventually caught up with her, Martha had blown through all but \$6 of her father's money. Legionnaires chipped in and bought her a one-way train ticket

"Forget it," was all indulgent Joseph Vichnes said when reporters asked about his prodigal daughter. Her mother placed the blame squarely on Papa. "That's the trouble. She's daddy's girl. He's petted her entirely too much,' though she acknowledged Martha was "the best girl in the world."

And what about the lovestruck teenager herself? "I had a swell time," she confessed when she was finally home and all was forgiven. Would she do it again, a reporter wanted to know. Maybe, Martha said, though with the caveat that she should "think twice" before any other such adventure.

Her father may have been surprisingly forgiving, but his compassion

didn't extend beyond the family circle. He later sued the airline for the \$167 cost of the plane ticket, claiming it had sold the ticket to a minor. Vichnes lost both that case and an appeal.

Merkley, Oregon Delegation:

No New ICE Facilities in Oregon

Washington, D.C. -Today, Oregon's U.S. Senator Jeff Merkley led his Democratic colleagues in the Oregon congressional delegation—Senator Ron Wyden and Representatives Suzanne Bonamici (OR-01), Val Hoyle (OR-04), Andrea Salinas (OR-06), Maxine Dexter (OR-03), and Janelle Bynum (OR-05)—in demanding urgent answers from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and **Immigration and Customs** Enforcement (ICE) about any plans to expand ICE's

footprint in Oregon. "We write to request a full and detailed description of any plans to open or expand Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detention facilities in Oregon. Recent public job postings in the Portland and Newport areas suggest that planning is well underway to contract for a new or expanded detention facility, but no formal notice has been provided to local or state leaders, or to Oregon's congressional delegation," wrote the Oregon delegation to DHS Secretary Kristi Noem and Acting ICE Director Todd Lyons. "We strongly and unequivocally reject the need for any new detention capacity and urge you to honor the public's right to be informed and review your plans before any contracts are signed or facilities are opened. Oregonians deserve far better from the Trump administration than this shabby track record of absolute secrecy and total disdain for their communities' viewpoints."

The lawmakers raised serious concerns about increased ICE detentions of U.S. citizens and non-citizens alike, regardless of criminal history, and illegally denying due process.

They emphasized, "The information we require is critical to support Congress's responsibility to protect detainees' bedrock human and legal rights. As witnessed in the disastrous setup of Florida's Alligator Alcatraz in the Everglades, hastily assembled detention centers invite horrific abuse and fail to effectively support efforts to detain dangerous criminals who pose a genuine threat to community safety. One recent report from Amnesty International found that people detained in Alligator Alcatraz are living in inhumane and unsanitary conditions. These conditions include overflowing toilets, limited access to showers, exposure to insects without protection, lights on 24-hours-a-day, and lack of privacy including cameras above the toilets. This record of abuse demands deep skepticism and scrutiny of any plan to open detention facilities in Oregon."

Merkley has led the charge to oppose the escalating ICE presence throughout the state, partnering with the Oregon delegation to speak out against ICE activities in Portland and Newport. He urged Portland protestors to "not take the bait" in response to the Trump Administration's aggression toward the city and pushed

Oregonians deserve far better from the Trump administration than this shabby track record of absolute secrecy and total disdain for their communi-

ICE has been increasingly using dragnet practices to detain groups of people with little attention to citizenship or criminal history. Despite near constant claims and reassurances that ICE is pursuing dangerous criminal noncitizens, a recent review of immigration detentions in Oregon from January through October 2025 shows that less than 10 percent of those arrested had been convicted of a violent crime. In Oregon and nationally, the vast majority of people arrested have never been convicted of any crime whatsoever. In addition to not prioritizing public threats, ICE has been detaining U.S. citizens in record numbers. One recent report found more than 170 detentions of U.S. citizens in the first nine months of 2025.

The information we require is critical to support Congress's responsibility to protect detainees' bedrock human and legal rights. As witnessed in the disastrous setup of Florida's Alligator Alcatraz in the Everglades, hastily assembled detention centers invite horrific abuse and fail to effectively support


criminals who pose a genuine threat to community safety. One recent report from Amnesty International found that people detained in Alligator Alcatraz are living in inhumane and unsanitary conditions. These conditions include overflowing toilets, limited access to showers, exposure to insects without protection, lights on 24-hoursa-day, and lack of privacy including cameras above the toilets. This record of abuse demands deep skepticism and scrutiny of any plan to open detention facilities in Oregon.

Another significant concern requiring your attention is access to counsel. Oregonians in ICE detention are often moved from one location to another in a manner that effectively denies timely access to legal counsel. Recent legal filings from Oregon nonprofits show that current detention sites in Oregon do not have sufficient space for lawyers to physically meet with their clients. Denying



due process to detained individuals in this fashion is a moral stain that demands immediate action, and must not be replicated in any new detention site under consideration.

We reiterate our steadfast opposition to any new or expanded ICE detention facilities in Oregon. Please submit a written response detailing any plans to open or expand Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detention facilities in Oregon as soon as possible, and not later than Friday December 19, 2025.

OSAA Executive Board finalizes districts for next four years

The Oregon School Activities Association Executive Board has approved the leagues and classifications for sports in Oregon's high schools for the next four-year time block.

In a 13-1 vote Monday, the Executive Board largely went with the final recommendation of OSAA's Classification and Districting Committee, making three changes, none which directly impact the South Coast schools.

Marshfield and North Bend will remain in the Class 4A Sky-Em League, with a few new members after adjustments to the enrollment range for the classification moved several schools up from Class 3A to Class 4A

Cottage Grove, Junction City and Marist Catholic remain in the league and Elmira returns after spending the current time block as a Class 3A school. South Umpqua also moves up to join the league.

Also moving up to Class 4A are Taft (Oregon West Conference), North Valley (Skyline Conference) and Valley Catholic (Cowapa League), which all had representatives several times ask the Classification and Districting Committee to leave them in Class 3A. Both Banks (Cowapa

League) and Cascade Christian (Skyline Conference) requested to move up to Class 4A for the next time block.

One of the changes by the Executive Board was a slight change to the upper end of the Class 4A enrollment scale that moved both Henley and Cascade back into Class 4A after the final recommendation had them moving up to 5A.

Because of that change, the Executive Board also went back to an earlier proposal with the three remaining 5A schools in Southern Oregon (Eagle Point, Ashland and Crater) as part of a 6A-5A hybrid league with South Medford, North Medford, Grants Pass and Roseburg. Eagle Point and Ashland representatives had asked the committee not to include them in a hybrid league with teams they would rarely or never play against in any sports. They have been in a league with the Eugene-area 5A schools the past four years and those schools will now be part of a hybrid league with 6A schools Sheldon and South Eugene.

The hybrid leagues are designed to greatly reduce travel for the schools.

In Class 3A Cognille will remain in

In Class 3A, Coquille will remain in the Far West League, which will be the

biggest in the classification to fit in three schools in Southern Oregon.

Siuslaw, Sutherlin, Douglas and Glide remain in the league with the Red Devils, but South Umpqua has moved up to 4A.

Brookings-Harbor returns after a few years in the Southern Oregon Conference, which has been fractured with North Valley and Cascade Christian moving up to 4A and Lakeview and Rogue River dropping down to 2A. St. Mary's of Medford also returns to the Far West League and Illinois Valley of Cave Junction will be a new member as it moves up from Class 2A.

In Class 2A, the Sunset Conference keeps South Coast members Bandon, Myrtle Point, Reedsport and Gold Beach, along with Oakland and adds new member North Douglas of Drain, which is moving up from Class 1A.

In Class 1A, Powers and Pacific remain in the Skyline League along with current members Camas Valley, Days Creek, Elkton, Glendale, Milo Adventist Academy, New Hope Christian, Riddle, Umpqua Valley Christian and Yoncalla. Rogue Christian Academy of Grants Pass also is listed with the league, though the

small school this year only sponsors three sports, all part of special districts rather than leagues — cross country, wrestling and golf.

The other change the Executive Board made Monday was moving Class 2A school Enterprise from the Blue Mountain Conference to the Wapiti League, which better geographically fits the school in the northeast corner of the state.

The Classification and Districting Committee also asked the Executive Board to reconvene the Computation of ADM task force next year to look further into recommendations about the classification and districting process.

Among suggestions during various meetings of the committee were returning to using enrollment for all four grades when determining school size during the classification process. Only the lower three grades were used in computing the enrollment numbers this year.

Another suggestion was for the committee to consider participation in extracurricular activities, not just enrollment, when determining where schools should be placed.

Pirates fall in tournament final

Marshfield's boys basketball team reached the champion-ship game of the Pirates' home tournament over the weekend, but came up short against Crook County in the title bout.

The Cowboys beat the Pirates 78-46 to win the Les Schwab South Coast Holiday Basketball Tournament.

Marshfield, the top-ranked team in the Class 4A coaches poll, had cruised into the final with a pair of wins, topping Sutherlin 94-58 in the first round and then beating Redmond 54-45 in the semifinals.

Crook County topped North Bend 86-27 in the opening round and beat Hidden Valley 58-41 in the semifinals.

Hidden Valley edged Redmond 66-64 in overtime in the third-place game while Philomath beat Sutherlin 60-26 in the consolation final.

North Bend topped North Marion 62-51 in the seventh-place game.

After losing to Crook County in the opening round, the Bulldogs fell to Philomath 56-46 in the consolation semifinals.

The girls tournament was

won by Redmond, which rolled through its three foes.


and SoWIB. The panel highlighted workforce programs, training pathways, and collaborative initiatives designed to strengthen skills and support the future of our workforce.





As I See It

The pictures I am sharing this week remind us what is happening in the state of Washington, with entire cities under an evacuation notice for flooding. Although not as bad, the Feb. 16, 1961, Western World, told of flooding in the downtown area, including First Street (first photo), which was saved from damage by city of Bandon crews, including Joe Harris, Bob Hiley, Jack Potterf and Harvey Hiley. Pictured in the white raincoat is Police Chief D.S. MacDonald; city manager John Fasnacht is also in the photo. More than seven and a half inches of rain fell in Bandon in two days that week. Highways around the area were closed, and a washout south of Bandon isolated Curry County towns for several days. The east end of the downtown Bandon district suffered most when Ferry Creek overflowed its boundaries (second photo). The plant of the Coquille Valley Dairy Co-op had about three inches of water across its floor. The Surfside Dairy plant was submerged in about two feet of water (third photo). It was located across Third Street and behind the cheese factory, which was located on the same property as Face Rock Creamery today, but closer to Ferry Creek.

The Bandon Rural Fire Protection District, which also provides fire protection for the City of Bandon, has a new fire chief. Garrett Gant, 43, son of Randi Stolz Okey of Colorado and Steve Gant of Bandon, has an extensive background in fire service including several years as an EMT with the New York Fire Department following the Sept. 11 attacks. He has a degree in fire sciences, and has a great deal of experience, retiring from the Ft. Collins, Colo., fire department on Aug. 24 as a Captain.

He is certified to teach swift water rescue, confined space rescue, ice rescue etc., and brings invaluable experience to the department. He and his wife Melissa Gant bought 42 acres of

cranberries in Bandon, where they live with their three children, Kayla 12, Lorenzo 9 and Savannah 7. He is the grandson of the late Bob Stolz and his wife, Barbara. Barbara Stolz is 96 and a half and lives in her own three-bedroom home in Highlands Ranch, Colo., south of Denver, where she moved 11 years ago following the death of her husband, and to be near her daughter. Randi says her mom is very active, and still drives.

Tim Lakey, who served a interim chief following the resignation of Nick Siewell, was honored by being named Deputy Chief, and presented with the number of his wife Sarah's late father and long-time member of the fire department, Roger Elliott.



He was a World War II veteran and a prisoner of war survivor. Friends posted: "Lloyd's courage, resilience and service to his country will never be forgotten." After being returned to Germany, he was among 6,000 men who began what was known as "The Sergeant's March," a 600 mile trek across Germany. Of those who started only 4500 survived. He was told by doctors that he would be lucky to live to age 50. His survivors include two sons, KeKoa and Kimo and their families. I also saw that Judge Michael Hogan, 79, died the day after Thanksgiving in Eugene, where he had served many years as a federal judge. 



shoes, bring water and snacks, and a camera or binoculars for wildlife viewing.



Timber Sales In Oregon And Washington Net Over \$67 Million



From the Bureau of Land Management

The Bureau of Land Management in Oregon and Washington wrapped up fiscal year 2025 with a standout timber performance. Across Oregon and Washington, the BLM exceeded its annual goal and, in support of the President's promise of increased timber production, offered 15% more timber than in fiscal year 2024. In total, BLM Oregon/Washington sold 241 million

board feet of timber for \$67,049,012 from October 2024 – September 2025.

"This year's timber efforts show what the BLM can achieve," said Barry Bushue, BLM Oregon/ Washington State Director. "We exceeded the timber target goal established in the One Big Beautiful Bill Act. Next year, the BLM is offering even more timber, which means supporting more rural jobs and improving forest health."

The sales support the BLM's commitment to the nation under the One Big Beautiful Bill Act and the President's order to increase domestic timber production.

The timber sold in fiscal year 2025 could build more than 15,000

homes and support about 3,400 jobs across western Oregon.

"America has significant timber resources, and Oregon and Washington have some of the best timber in the world," said Bushue.
"BLM timber sales ensure we retain our domestic lumber supply and reduce reliance on other imported building supplies."

In addition to new sales, in fiscal year 2025 the BLM facilitated the harvest of 250 million board feet of timber valued at nearly \$66 million, a 7% increase in harvest volume and 9% more in revenue than fiscal year 2024. These harvests include sales that were purchased over the previous four years, reflecting years of

planning and collaboration with purchasers and operators in the community.

"Our foresters and partners in local communities are the reason for this successful year," Bushue added. "Together, we're building a stronger future for Oregon's forests, one timber sale and acre at a time."

In western Oregon, the BLM manages 2.4 million acres of some of the most productive forests in the world, and is committed to supplying a reliable, secure, and resilient domestic supply of timber. BLM forestry supports economic security, reduces risks from wildfire, conserves fish and wildlife habitat, and decreases costs of energy production. Local

communities rely on jobs that come from BLM forests, and timber from public land feeds local industry.

Each year, sales managed by the BLM's forestry program in Oregon and Washington support local jobs and generate more than \$1 billion for local economies. Revenue from timber sold on O&C lands is shared between the U.S. Treasury and 18 western Oregon counties. This funding provides local communities with the means to construct new county buildings; develop fairgrounds and museums; support libraries, schools, and jails; and build flood-control dams and reservoirs.



Northwest just finished warmest fall on record, scientists report

Across the Northwest, a record warm fall and

lack of snowpack going

into the winter is putting more drought pressure on Oregon, Idaho, Washington and western Montana.

Despite record rain in western Washington re-

cently, and earlier this year in central and southern Oregon, the showers are filling up already overdrawn reservoirs in many areas, scientists said on Monday at an online drought and climate outlook meeting hosted by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Snowpack in the region and in the Cascade Range, acting as a reservoir of its own for summer months when there's little rain and many communities rely on snowmelt, is simply not piling up.

Snowpack in the Northwest is sitting at the lowest level for the region as a whole at this point in the winter since record keeping began in 2001, according to Jacob Genuise, a climatologist at the Washington State Climate Office.

"We're seeing just really warm storms with a lot of rain and not a lot of snow," Genuise said. "Given all this warm rain, it actually melted some of our snowpack, and we saw a decline."

The Northwest just experienced its sixth warmest August on record, the warmest September on record — about 6 degrees Fahrenheit above normal on average — and the second warmest November on record, according to NOAA data.

Taken together, August through November of this year was the record warmest on average across the Northwest in more than 130 years of record keeping. NASA scientists, using NOAA records of global average temperatures dating back to 1880, found that this November was the third-warmest November on Earth, behind

only November of 2023 and 2024.

But in 2023 and 2024, a planet-warming El Niño weather pattern helped fuel record temperatures, according to the data. There was no El Niño event to drive temperatures this

Temperatures in the Northwest have been most abnormal across all of Idaho, eastern Washington and eastern Oregon, and in western Montana.

"It's definitely not good," Genuise said.
"We've seen much more above normal years in the past few decades than we did in the past."

Rain not snow

By the end of this summer, drought took hold of the Northwest, Genuise said, especially in parts of northern Idaho and southeast Washington. Snow melted too quickly in spring, creating drought as the summer went on, and abnormal heat also increased surface water evaporation in lakes and streams, lowering water levels that contributed to drought in parts of the region.

In the last month, most of western Oregon was at 50% of its normal level of precipitation for this time of year, according to Brad Pugh, a meteorologist at the National Weather Service's Climate Prediction Center.

Only southern and central Oregon have been spared major drought impacts this year, but reservoirs that filled from heavy spring rains are also being quickly depleted, he said.

Everywhere north of Oregon is experiencing above average rainfall, Pugh said.

This will potentially help pull the Northwest out of a region-wide drought in the coming weeks or month, according to Pugh, but much of that will also depend on whether or not it gets cold enough for rain to turn into snow and snowpack.

The only area in the region getting roughly normal snowpack is western Montana, where temperatures have been just-coldenough to turn rain to snow. All of Oregon and most of southern Washington are seeing "really, really deep snowpack deficits," Genuise said.

If the snowpack is still bad in the spring, there could be ongoing drought issues in the year ahead, Genuise added.

"We could see this change, and this is likely to change as we see some wetter and cooler systems later in the month, but we're definitely sitting well below normal as we talk here today," he said.
