Celebrates 100 Years of Highway 101
with New Exhibition, Special Photography Showcase



Portland, OR — This Friday, take a scenic drive up the coast when 101 at 100: The History of Oregon's Most Iconic Highway opens at the Oregon Historical Society in downtown Portland. On view through October 11, this interactive installation explores a century of transportation, culture, and coastal life shaped by one of Oregon's most beloved roads.

Stretching 363 miles along the Pacific Coast, U.S. Highway 101 has connected communities from Astoria to Brookings since its designation as a federal highway in 1926. 101 at 100 traces the road's evolution from Indigenous travel routes to a vital corridor

for commerce, tourism, and daily life.

"Having grown up on the Oregon Coast in Reedsport, Highway 101 was a constant presence in my life," said OHS Boyle Family Executive Director Kerry Tymchuk. "This exhibition invites visitors to discover the rich diversity of Oregon's coastal communities and to appreciate the remarkable feat of engineering that made Highway 101 possible."

In conjunction with the main exhibition, visitors can also see From Highway 101: Images of Oregon's Most Iconic Highway, a supporting photographic

exhibition by local photographer Peter Marbach. This visual celebration offers contemporary views of life along the coast — from majestic bridges and misty shorelines to the vibrant communities that line the highway — serving as a love letter to the road on its centennial.

The Oregon Historical Society's museum is open daily in downtown Portland, from 10am to 5pm Monday through Saturday and 12pm to 5pm on Sunday. Admission is free every day for youth 17 and under, OHS members, and residents of Multnomah County. Learn more and plan your visit at ohs.org/visit.

About Highway 101

Since time immemorial, people have lived and traveled along Oregon's coast. Native people used waterways, beaches, and extensive trail networks for travel and trade. In the 19th century, non-Native migrants settled along the coast, constructing makeshift roads of sand, wood, and gravel to navigate a stunning but isolating landscape of cliffs, forests, and windswept beaches.

As automobiles gained popularity in the early 20th century, the coast's isolation became a barrier to travel and economic growth. In response, Oregon

leaders formed the Oregon Highway Commission in 1913, launching an ambitious effort to build a coast highway. Completed over a decade through remarkable feats of engineering, the 363-mile road became U.S. Highway 101 in 1926, linking communities across seven counties. This exhibition traces how this iconic highway reshaped the coast and asks visitors to consider how movement, access, and infrastructure continue to influence who can travel, live, and thrive along Oregon's shores.

Trail Report:
William M. Tugman Park and Eel Lake

With such wonderful weather last week, it felt an opportune time to wake an old series of columns from its over-extended hibernation. The hope and mission behind trail reports is to provide us all with a reminder of how lucky we are to live in such a stunning stretch of the country and coast, and to encourage us all to take advantage of that fact.

The focus of today's report may not be much of a hidden gem to locals, but it is an exceedingly gorgeous bit of land recognized by the State as well-worth protecting. William M. Tugman State Park, which borders Eel Lake, rests in between North Bend and Reedsport along Highway 101, just north of Lakeside. One of its many advantages is its designation as a rest area for the highway, meaning it's free to park in the day use area without a state parks pass.

Funnily enough, the park gets its name from a news-man and editor. Tugman (born 1893), who was a huge proponent of State parks, was a World War I veteran and journalist for the Eugene Register-Guard and the Port Umpqua Courier. He would eventually settle in Reedsport after purchasing the Courier in 1954. The 560-acre park was named in his honor following his passing in 1961.

Nowadays the park serves as a campground, gathering area, and spot for fishing and boating. Reservations for camping can be made year-round. The developed day-use area provides restrooms, a playground, boat launch ramp, and some sweeping views of the lake.

A fish trap is set up where the lake runs into Eel Creek at its southern tip. The small hatchery helps to bolster salmon and trout

populations in the lake and beyond as part of the Salmon Trout Enhancement Program (STEP). It contains a specialized ladder so that the lamprey passing through can continue on uninhibited. In fact, Eel Lake could be a slight misnomer given that it is lamprey and not eel living there.

The parks trails rim the lake in both directions and provide great options in terms of difference in length and intensity. The northern trail is just over a mile long to the end and back. Its wide and relatively flat making it the more accessible option of the two, and perfect for a short lunch-time or after-work walk, especially as the days get longer. The trail reaches its end at a point with a lovely little bench and a notable, lone shore pine that overhangs the water, clinging to the last bit of soil on the edge of the lake. From that point you could see numerous little salamanders swimming about, which to my eye looked like rough-skinned newts (though I'm hardly an amphibian expert).

The southern trail is the more rigorous of the two, with more verticality and some thinner points, though it should be no trouble for a beginner to intermediate hiker. Both trails are very well maintained, with sturdy bridges where needed.

This main trail runs just over 3 miles, making it a 6.3-mile roundtrip around the southern end of the lake, running past the conservation easement boundary. The trail is lined with red cedars, spruce, shore pines, and the occasional hemlock or willow. My hiking companions pointed out plenty of berries and edible plants, and always had keen eyes out for mushrooms. Geese returning home from their winter

HOLY COW! HISTORY: 1936’s Big Chill

Temperatures plunge. Ice everywhere. Transportation is frozen in its tracks. An Arctic Armageddon.

Winter 2026, right? Think again. The 6 is correct, but the other three digits are off. Because this month is the 90th anniversary of the coldest February on record in the lower 48 states, the Winter of 1936.

How cold was it, you ask? Cold enough that a meteorological phenomenon occurred that hasn’t happened in the 90 winters since. But we’re getting ahead of ourselves.

Winter started out pretty much the same as usual in the most unusual of times, known as the Great Depression. The weather had been contrary in recent years. For instance, extreme drought and strong winds had combined two years earlier to create the Dust

Bowl, leaving 500,000 people homeless and ultimately displacing 3.5 million across Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas and beyond. After that, Mother Nature took a breather.

Then, in February 1936, Americans discovered just how “bad” bad weather could be.

The month started off cold. And grew colder. And colder still. Across the country, the mercury in thermometers kept dropping.

Just how bad was it? The temperature dropped to minus 60 Fahrenheit in North Dakota on Feb. 15, a state record that stands to this day. (And that’s not wind chill, mind you; it was the actual temperature.) Langdon, N.D., stayed below zero for 41 consecutive days.

Then there were the blizzards. Note the plural, because they came back-to-back, one right after the other. They roared out of the Great Plains and raged all the way into upper New England,

coating that region with nearly 3 feet of snow. Drifts of 10-15 feet were reported in some rural areas.

In an era when most American products were moved by rail, train travel came to a standstill. Roadways were too snowy for trucks; for the very vehicles that did manage to drive, the brutal, brittle air risked ruining engines. The result was what would today be called “supply chain interruptions.” Cities such as Boston, Chicago and Cleveland were paralyzed.

The toll was especially hard on livestock. Countless horses, cattle, sheep and pigs died of exposure, a serious blow to the bottom line of farmers already struggling with low prices due to the lingering Depression.

Perhaps nature’s greatest show of force came in St. Louis, where the Mississippi River froze over. That’s right: The Mighty Mississipp, Big Muddy, Old Man River, the Father of Waters, was

turned into a gigantic ice cube nearly one mile wide. Brave souls ditched landmark Eads Bridge in Missouri and crossed to East St. Louis, Ill., on foot over the ice.

Although the Mississippi had frozen over before, it was an exceedingly rare occurrence. And it hasn’t happened again in the 90 years since, either.

Estimates of the number of deaths from the extreme weather event vary. It was certainly in the hundreds. Iowa alone reported 20 confirmed fatalities.

Still, February 1936’s 25.2 degree average temperature in the United States still holds the record as the coldest February ever. (The worst month of all was January 1977’s 21.9 degree average.)

Horrific as that was, nature wasn’t finished inflicting misery on Americans that year. Just five months later, the mercury swung in the opposite direction. A ferocious heat wave baked much of the United States in July 1936,

triggering a second round of the Dust Bowl and claiming the lives of more than 5,000 people.

There is much conversation these days about climate change and how traditional weather patterns are changing. To which 1936 could easily snicker and say, “Hold my beer!”

The fact that studies show mocktails are harmful should be enough to make any rational adult say no to mocktails for minors.

Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain the benefit can be punished by fine or imprisonment or can be barred from the program. All consumers will be required to demonstrate eligibility based at least on (1) household income at or below 135% of Federal Poverty Level guidelines for a household of that size OR (2) the household’s participation in one of the federal assistance programs. Forms of documentation required for enrollment based on income: Prior year’s state, federal, or Tribal tax return; current income statement from an employer, or paycheck; Social Security statement of benefits; Veterans Administration statement of benefits; retirement/pension statement of benefits; Unemployment/Workers’ Compensation statement of benefits; federal or Tribal notice letter of participation in General Assistance; divorce decree, child support award, or other official document containing income information for at least three (3) months’ time. Forms of documentation required for enrollment based on program: Current or prior year’s statement of benefits from a qualifying state, federal, or Tribal program; a notice letter of participation in a qualifying state, federal, or Tribal program; program participation documents (e.g., consumer SNAP card, Medicaid card, or copy thereof); other official document evidencing the consumer’s participation in a qualifying state, federal, or Tribal program. 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Marshfield boys stretch win streak

Marshfield's surging boys basketball team won two more games last week, extending its win streak to six in a row in the Sky-Em League heading into a huge home game Tuesday against Marist Catholic that could decide the league title.

The Pirates pounded Cottage Grove 74-40 in the Pirate Palace on Friday, after edging the Lions by just two points on the road two weeks earlier.

Marshfield completed a sweep of the Lions and also beat North Bend earlier in the week 69-37. The Pirates improved to 7-2 heading into their final home game against Marist Catholic, which is 6-2.

Third-place Junction City is 5-3 and also has a shot at the league title with home games against Marist Catholic on Feb. 20 and Marshfield on Feb. 24. Both Marist Catholic and Junction City beat Marshfield in the first round of league play and lost to

the Pirates in the second round. Junction City beat Marist Catholic in its second meeting with the Spartans but had a two-point loss to Cottage Grove in its first meeting with the Lions.

"We're trending in the right direction at the right time," Marshfield coach Jesse Ainsworth said following Friday's win. "I like who we are right now."

Ainsworth explained that the Pirates have not peaked, but rather keep improving, which is understandable given how young the team is.

Marshfield returned just one starter from the team that lost the state championship game to Baker last winter — junior Keller Vinyard. Among the rest of the squad, only senior Chandler Wyatt saw any significant time last season.

The other three starters are freshman Max Ainsworth and sophomores Austin Salter and Brett Butler Jr.

"It's not like we peaked too early," Jesse Ainsworth said. "We went through struggles and adversity."

And the Pirates came out stronger on the other side, which the coach loves, and why he doesn't mind the early losses.

"It was good to see how the team would rebound (from those) and they rebounded well," he said.

Max Ainsworth, the coach's second son, is the team's leading scorer and Vinyard adds scoring punch. On Friday, they helped the Pirates open a big lead early and Cottage Grove never was able to make a dent in the Marshfield advantage.

Ainsworth hit five 3-pointers and added three free throws after being fouled on another shot beyond in the arc in the first quarter alone. He had two more treys in the second quarter and 26 points by halftime, when Marshfield led 47-19. By the end of the game, Ainsworth had scored 40 points.

Vinyard, meanwhile, had nine points in the first quarter and finished with 16. Butler added two 3-pointers and scored eight points.

More than the offense, though,

Jesse Ainsworth is thrilled with how the Pirates are playing when the opponents have the ball.

"Most importantly, we're playing really good defense," he said. "We're sound. We're disciplined. We're getting in the gaps. We're doing the things I've been preaching."

It helps that Marshfield has good size, which makes its matchup zone particularly effective.

Max Ainsworth is 6-foot-2 and the other four starters are at least 6-4.

That means all five starters can effectively play any of the positions in the zone defense, which gives the team better flexibility. During the recent win streak only Marist Catholic managed 50 points against the Pirates.

Before the defense really started clicking, Marshfield went through a stretch just before and after the start of league play when it lost five of six games and sits 13-7 overall.

The Pirates control their own destiny to hosting a game in the state playoffs. If Marshfield can win the

league title, it would be home for a shot at returning to the state tournament in Forest Grove.

Jesse Ainsworth explained that such success with such a young team is tribute to focusing on players long before they get to high school.

"We have married ourselves to our youth program," he said.

That includes some 40 "future Pirates" in the gym before 7 a.m. most mornings working on shooting drills, with youth teams heading to tournaments out of the area. It also means an aggressive summer league schedule for the high school team to develop in the offseason.

"I've had to sacrifice a lot of time," he said. "We're seeing the fruits of our labor."

In addition to Tuesday's game with Marist Catholic, Marshfield pays a visit to Cascade Christian for a nonleague game Thursday before finishing the league schedule the following week with games at Junction City on Feb. 24 and North Bend on Feb. 27.

Bandon Dunes receives top rankings from publication

Bandon Dunes Golf Resort recently again received high praise from two major golf publications.

SWOCC fell to 2-10 while Clackamas improved to 13-0.

As I See It

An article in the Dec. 25, 1930, Western World describes a suspected liquor ring, operating along the coast of Coos and Curry counties during the past two months.

“The arrest of a truck operator with a cargo of bonded liquor between Coquille and Myrtle Point Monday was the latest evidence of the so-called whiskey ring. The cargo is valued at \$20,000 and is being held in Coquille. “The arrest came about through suspicion aroused by the truck driver in trying to buy potatoes from farmers in the Elk river section. Sacks of potatoes were used as a ruse to cover the liquor in the truck. A barn in the Elk river section is reported to have been used by the liquor operators as a place of hiding, the supposition being that the liquor was taken off vessels beyond the 13-mile limit and brought into port by small fishing craft at or near Port Orford (first picture) and from there hauled to a place of storage at night, to be picked up by trucks from outside points. A high-jacking episode is reported to have taken place several nights ago. A number of touring cars came up from California and finding the liquor cache off the boat loaded up their cars and returned south, later loading it onto a truck for San Francisco. It was also said that several windshields were shot out in the episode. Curry has of late been a central point for considerable big liquor activity.”

The second story, written by then school superintendent R. L. Parks, appeared in the March, 14, 1957, Western World. The accompanying photo pictures Mr. Parks when he was grand marshal of the 1975 festival parade.

In his statement about good discipline, he says: “A school, like an army troop, must enforce strict standards of discipline or fail to accomplish its purpose. Strict discipline in the schools is a point agreed on by the school board, the superintendent, the principals

and the teachers. In hiring teachers in the Bandon schools, the ability of the teacher to maintain good discipline will be most carefully examined.”

In those days, “gentle parenting,” “redirecting” and “inclusivity” were unheard of.

An April 1912 headline in the Bandon Recorder reads: “The Grand Theatre (third photo) Discontinues Vaudeville. Why? For the simple reason that the majority of the acts that are booked into this county are so inferior in quality that instead of pleasing the theatre going public, they keep patrons, who enjoy high class pictures and good music, at home until said Vaudeville Artists (?) leave.”

An article on the front page of that same paper tells the story of the greatest disaster in marine history ... the sinking of the Titanic, which was said to be the “finest afloat.”

Dated April 15 New York -- the article reads: “The greatest marine disaster in the history of the world occurred last Sunday night when the Titanic of the White Star Line, the biggest and finest of steamships, shattered herself against an iceberg and sank with 1500 of her passengers and crew in less than four hours.

“Of the nearly 2200 people aboard, only 675 were saved, mostly women and children.”

There were a number of posts on Feb. 4 of people who had seen a helicopter flying in the Beach Loop area, and, of course, they wondered what was going on.

The Bandon Police posted pictures of the helicopter rescue and information on their Facebook page. “Officers from the Bandon Police Department were notified about 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 4 of a subject on top of a large offshore rock, known as Cathedral Rock, along the Bandon coastline. Sgt. Noel and Officer Zack Carpenter responded, and coordinated a rescue effort with the U.S. Coast Guard, Oregon State Police and

Oregon State Parks. The subject was believed to be experiencing a mental health crisis at the time of the incident. The situation was resolved safely and no injuries were reported. Due to the nature of the incident and out of respect for the individual’s privacy, the subject’s name will not be released,” said the Bandon Police Department spokesman.

There have been several shootings in the area in the past weeks, including a shooting in Port Orford, where the subject remained at large for several days before turning himself in, and a shooting death on Highway 42 near Coquille.

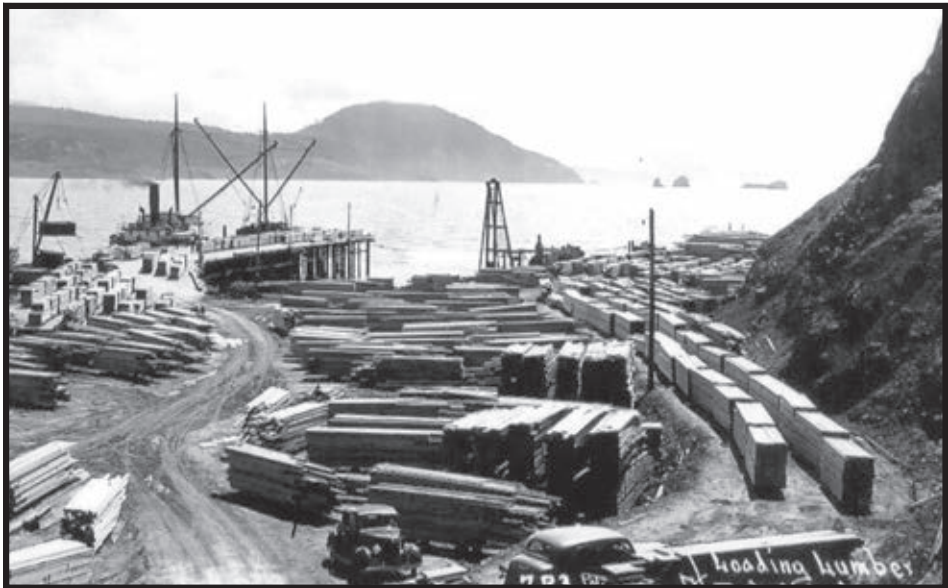
On Feb. 2, early in the morning, dispatch got a call about a disturbance at a home near Highway 42 in Coquille. Deputies arrived and found one person had been shot. First responders secured the scene and tried to help the victim, Bryce Randall, 25, Myrtle Point, but he did not survive.

George Jones, 31, Coquille, was arrested and taken to jail on charges of second-degree murder.

A week earlier, during the manhunt for the man from Springfield who had crashed his car on Seven Devils Road, and fled, leaving his three children in the wrecked car, another gun death occurred in the Seven Devils area, near Hemlock. But little has been released about it.

I contacted the sheriff this week to see what I could obtain after being advised by a Coos Bay man that several men had allegedly been hunting mushrooms in the West Beaver Hill Road area when they were approached by a man who accused them of stealing his car. The accuser allegedly shot one of the mushroom pickers in the chest, and he is believed to be in a Eugene hospital. In the ensuing chaos, I have been told that another shooting occurred during the incident and the man later died of his injuries..

Deputy Burgo of the Sheriff’s Office said that on Jan. 13, around 7:15 p.m., officers responded to the area to the report of a shooting. Upon arrival, it was discovered that two men had shot at each other, and both sustained injuries. One of the involved individuals died of his injuries at the hospital. The other man is in recovery and expected to survive. The investigation into this event is ongoing. This is all the information that will be



released at this time.” Which means no names of the shooters or the victims.

A recent post on the Bandon High School Facebook page from the local VFW Post congratulated Jordan Sammons, who had been named the VFW Post #3440 Teacher of the Year. “The well-deserved recognition honors educators who demonstrate exceptional dedicating to teaching patriotism and citizenship to students. “We are also incredibly proud of Marlie Carmack, who earned the VFW Voice of Democracy Award at both the post level and at the district level. Marlie’s powerful voice, thoughtful message and dedication to civic engagement have truly set her apart.”

Coos County Public Health officials are closely monitoring an increased rate of positive and presumptive cases of Pertussis, also known as whooping cough, within county schools. The illness is affecting both students who have not been vaccinated and some who have received vaccinations.

“Health officials note that the occurrence of ‘breakthrough’ cases in vaccinated individuals can be attributed to the natural evolution of the Bordetella pertussis bacterial strain, which may lead to reduced sensitivity to the pertussis vaccine or booster over time.

“Due to the nature of these breakthrough cases, and in an effort to main-



tain in-person learning to the greatest extent possible, Public Health is not currently enforcing the exclusion policy for unvaccinated students at this time. This decision will be continuously based on the evolving situation,” said Eric Gleason, deputy director of Coos Health and Wellness.

Anyone exhibiting signs or symptoms of Pertussis should consult a healthcare provider as soon as possible for testing or treatment.

The Meet and Greet programs resumed Tuesday, Feb. 10, at Bandon Fisheries Warehouse with the Southern Coos Health Foundation hosting the event. Alix McGinley, executive director of the health foundation, was joined by Bandon School District nurses Liz Deters and Lena Hawthorn to explain the school nurse program and to answer questions about the Foundation.

Rovalle had a challenging childhood, her parents divorced when she was two and her mother died when she was eleven. Rovalle moved in with her mom’s best friend Alma George and her family. Despite those difficulties she made the best with her new sister Shirley, and new parents Alma and Roy. She continued her education in Coos Bay and in high school met Dale Reiber. They married during Rovalle’s senior year, and Dale was drafted into the army immediately after. Rovalle finished high school and graduated from Marshfield in June of 1953.

In December 1953 she welcomed her first child while Dale was stationed in the Army in Germany. When baby Larry was 4 months old, Rovalle with infant in arms made the trip alone all the way to Permasens, Germany to

have him meet his dad. Back then this actually made the front page of the local newspaper, The Coos Bay Times. They spent 14 months together there until Dale was discharged. This was often one of Rovalle’s most memorable stories of her life.

Rovalle had two more children in the 1950’s and by then she and Dale bought a home and settled back down in Coos Bay while Dale began a career in teaching and coaching for Coos Bay Schools. Rovalle went to work for the Coos Bay Schools in the mid 1960’s starting as a secretary at Englewood School. Later she transferred to the high school and finished her career as the athletic secretary at Marshfield High School. This was the highlight of her career. She often recalled the excitement of the year Marshfield High School won the football state championship in 1992. She met so many folks in the community and she shared the excitement of Marshfield sports with them.

Rovalle retired in 1994 and that year Rovalle and Dale bought an RV and traveled and camped. They would spend several weeks in the spring camping at Quosatana Campground on the Rogue River joining friends and Dale’s brothers while Dale fished. It was like a second home to them for many years. Other travels included camping

in the desert of Eastern Oregon and trips to Mexico, Texas, Alaska, Arizona and Nebraska.

In 2003 they celebrated their 50th anniversary with a grand party in Charleston with lots of long time friends, and with Cliff Lance cooking oysters the way Dale would fix them. Dale and Rovalle were married 66 years before he passed in 2019. One close friend wrote and said “no one can say Rovalle without saying Dale and Rovalle”.

Erica, one of Rovalle’s granddaughters googled on an app that gave statistics about names and how many times they were used in the US. Rovalle was the one and only “Rovalle”. She was very unique indeed.



Even as Rovalle slowed down she followed Marshfield sports through the newspaper and paid attention to the successes of the football, basketball volleyball and wrestling teams. This was always of interest to her.

Rovalle had other interests and hobbies. She knitted all her children Christmas stockings and later on for all her grandchildren and their spouses and for the 7 great grandchildren. She canned tuna

and other fish (that Dale caught). And she canned vegetables from their garden and each year she would pick berries, though she complained that she didn’t like to, then she would make delicious pies for her family. She always had a homemade pie in the freezer to pull out when people visited.

She was fortunate to live a long enough life to attend all the baby showers for her great grandchildren.

MILES APART, WORKING TOGETHER: OREGON LAWMAKERS BRIDGE THE DIVIDE

Sen. Kathleen Taylor and Rep. Court Boice represent far different constituencies but unite against a threat to all Oregonians: catastrophic wildfire.

By all appearances, it is hard to find two Oregon legislative districts more distinct than those represented by Democratic Sen. Kathleen Taylor and Republican Rep. Court Boice.

Taylor's inner Southeast Portland district is compact and among the most politically progressive in the state. Boice represents a sprawling, rural district along Oregon's south coast that leans conservative.

Their backgrounds are just as different. "There is quite a contrast between us," Taylor said.

Elected to the Oregon Legislature in 2015, Taylor brought with her a degree in public policy from Rutgers University and years of experience as a public servant

focused on making government work more efficiently. Boice arrived at the state capitol in 2023 after a career largely spent outside government, running a tourist lodge and piloting jet boats on the Rogue River.

But appearances—geographic and personal—can be deceiving.

"As different as our districts are, we both struggle with similar issues: a lack of housing; drug addiction; and education needs," Taylor said.

Housing, in particular, weighs heavily on her as she has watched prices skyrocket in Portland neighborhoods that have attracted an influx of young professionals. While Boice remains committed to bridging the rural-urban divide, Taylor gives him credit for understanding Portland's outsized role in the state's economy.

"Court and I both strongly believe that Oregon is healthiest when Portland is healthy and thriving," she said.

Together, they represent a far less reported story in an increasingly polarized political environment: lawmakers from opposite parties deliberately working to find common ground.

"I connected with Sen. Taylor early on and recognized she was a real leader," Boice said. "She is well-respected and always willing to listen."

Taylor returned the compliment. "Rep. Boice understands the issues of his district deeply," she said. "He is an effective, sincere advocate who is not interested in scoring political victories."

Boice, who chairs the Coastal Caucus, represents electric cooperatives whose

service territories are among the most heavily forested in the state.

"I really want to protect my co-ops because they have a long history of protecting their members' rates in the face of extremely tough challenges," he said.

One of those challenges—wildfire—cuts across partisan lines and has occupied countless hours of both lawmakers' time.

"Rep. Boice's passion to protect our forests and infrastructure from wildfire devastation strengthens CCEC's mitigation plan and our ability to manage power line rights-of-way," said Brent Bischoff, CEO of Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, based in Port Orford.

Roseburg-based Douglas Electric Cooperative General Manager Keith Brooks echoed that assessment.

"Court has been a consistent ally in addressing wildfire risk and keeping essential services affordable for rural families," he said.

Taylor, chair of the influential Senate Labor and Business Committee, has spent years immersed in wildfire policy, including service on the Senate Natural Resources and Wildfire Committee.

"The risks to electric cooperatives from wildfire cannot be any higher," Taylor said, noting her work on policy reforms following the catastrophic 2020 fires.

"Sen. Taylor prides herself on making

policy that is good for all of Oregon—and she means it," said Tucker Billman, ORECA's director of government relations. "She has used her role on the Senate Natural Resources and Wildfire Committee to prioritize real solutions, including championing cutting-edge camera technology that can detect wildfires before they become catastrophic."

The challenges remain immense, but both legislators draw optimism from their personal experience. Boice believes his more than 10,000 trips down the Rogue River prepared him for a tricky legislative

process—one he likens to guiding a boat through "shallow water, with the sun in your eyes, and a heavy load onboard."

Taylor has spent her career navigating the turbulent waters of state and local government. Each time she takes her oath of office, Taylor said, she is struck by the awesome responsibility—and opportunities—it carries.

"When I take my oath, it is a pledge to all of Oregon," Taylor said. "While I will fight like heck for my people and my district, I recognize that every other legislator is fighting just as hard for theirs." ■


