## County Commissioner Taylor admits to courting ICE as the board comments on detention facility rumors

After the recent rumors of a potential Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detention facility came to the fore in recent weeks, the three members of the Coos County Board of Commissioners clarified their positions during their public session on March 3, 2026.

The rumors first gained traction when Commissioner Drew Farmer addressed what he'd been hearing during a Facebook livestream, as covered in last week's World. The expectation was that there would be a large turnout for the 9:30 a.m. meeting. While there were a large handful of folks who showed up to give impassioned public comment, you could hardly call it packed room.

Still, the commissioners themselves felt it pertinent to address their positions on potential ICE presence in the area. After regular business was conducted, they spoke on the subject.

"Unfortunately, the whole topic is shrouded and clouded with misinformation and emotionalism that I don't think is appropriate in a republic based on the rule of law," said Commissioner Rod Taylor, who went on to tow the MAGA line about terrorists and criminals pouring across the border. He was more than in support of the idea.

"This county is in dire need of any kind of economic activity that we can generate. I personally believe that the construction, development, and operation of such a facility in Coos County is actually something that sits well with the majority of voters, despite the propensity of comments that we receive," continued Taylor.

"About two or three weeks ago, I actually sent a letter to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) asking them to look at Coos County as a possible loca-

tion for building such a facility, and I hope that they do."

The revelation that Taylor had personally reached out to the administration offering Coos County as a destination for ICE seemed to come as a surprise to his fellow commissioners. Commissioner Farmer made comment next, addressing why he felt an inclination to start digging, citing the Newport facility failing and the North Bend Coast Guard base receiving less funding as reason for concern.

"I don't consider it economic development. There shouldn't be a situation in which any kind of institutionalization is an economic benefit. And yet, there somehow was, given the situation in Lakeside based on what the state has done with the management of former Shutters Creek," said Farmer.

"There was in this a possible solution for Lakeside's problem, and a solution for the financial aspect, ensuring we have deputies on the road and jail beds for people when we arrest them," continued Farmer referencing the three potential sites discussed.

"That was not necessarily morally grounded in the other concerns I had, which brought me to an understanding of how people get to the positions they get to out of a desperate attempt."


Farmer stated his hope was to shame the state over their mismanagement of Shutters Creek and their attempt to reduce compensation to Lakeside for their wastewater facilities.

The city had built their facility over-capacity with the correctional institution in mind before it was shuttered in 2022 then converted for research of Elliot Forest, with a much lower need for the city's services. A lowering of those payments puts Lakeside in a precarious position.

Commissioner John Sweet was clear in stating that he

does not support a facility, and that communications with City leadership throughout the county have indicated they would not support one either.

"I have always been supportive of law enforcement," said David Jennings, a former juvenile detention officer, during public comment. "From my years of working in juvenile detention, I know that the ICE facilities are a disgrace and they certainly could not pass inspection... They clearly are a group who is poorly trained and I find it frightening that a group of law enforcement people could go into the community, wearing masks, and use violence to try to intimidate people."

"I am from Minneapolis, my family is in Minneapolis in the neighborhood where Renne Good was murdered," said Abby Knipp from North Bend, another public commenter. "The city is utter chaos... They have taken friends from my life, detained them unlawfully for 48 hours, abused them, then left them to walk home in negative degree weather. It is unspeakable, it is disgusting. And there have been really severe impacts on the economy, in Minneapolis and beyond."

Commissioner Taylor defend-

ed his decision to court an ICE facility during questions following the meeting, stating that he doesn't have concerns about the way ICE conducts itself.

"My motivation was to engender what I would perceive as the fiscal benefit to the county by having a federal facility like that positioned here," Taylor told the World. "I have concerns about public perception based on the way the biased news media presents situations to manufacture a gaslit public perception."

He gave the killing of Renne Good as an example of said gaslighting, placing blame on Good for interfering with a law enforcement operation. Taylor did not seem aware that ICE themselves has reported 35 deaths in their custody at similar facilities in 2025 and 2026 alone.

"Well, that may be. Are you aware that we have 5 deaths in our jail in the last, whatever, ten years?" said Taylor. "I'm talking about numbers. There's a certain percentage of people who die from whatever... I know that nobody died in our jail as a result of malfeasance on the part of any of our staff, so I have to assume that there may be a similar situation in these cases."

So far, the City of Coos Bay is the only local government

to make an official statement regarding a potential facility. The statement cites infrastructural strain and potential impacts on crucial tourism dollars as their main reasons for not supporting such a facility.

"For these reasons, the City of Coos Bay finds that a federal detention facility is incompatible with local infrastructure capacity, economic development priorities, tourism, and community-defined strategic goals. As such, and as the largest city on the Oregon Coast, the City of Coos Bay opposes construction or operation of any federal detention facility within the City, or within the immediate proximity to the city, including within the whole of Coos County," reads the official statement.

# HOLY COW! HISTORY:

## The Queen Who Saved Britain's Monarchy

It's been a rocky road for Britain's House of Windsor of late. Ever since the end of World War II, it has wobbled dangerously close to the cliff's edge of abolition, only to catch a breather and soldier on.

Currently, it's the alleged antics (illegal and unamusing) of Andrew Mountbatten-Windsor, the royal formerly known as Prince, that are putting the monarchy back on the endangered species list.

Given that March is Women's History Month, the current scandal provides the perfect opportunity to revisit the tale of how one woman single-handedly kept the royal family on the throne. That woman just happened to wear a diamond tiara.

Talk about being born with a silver spoon in your mouth: Mary of Teck seemed destined for royal greatness from the moment she was born in 1867 in the same room in Kensington Palace where her first cousin, Queen Victoria, had been born 48 years and two days earlier.

Born Victoria Mary Augusta Louise Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes, to her family she was "May," nicknamed for the bright and sunny month of her arrival. A

bright and sunny girl, her childhood, although happy, was strict. From the moment she learned to walk, she was groomed to move elegantly through the highest levels of Britain's aristocracy.

That preparation paid off in 1891 when she became engaged to Prince Albert Victor. He was second in line to become king (the position young Prince George holds today).

However, the prince died in a global pandemic just six weeks later. Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales didn't want to let this prize get away, so they persuaded Albert Victor's brother, Prince George, to marry her instead.

After they tied the knot in 1893, royal watchers were stunned by what came next. The couple were genuinely happy together and developed a deep bond.

The prince finally became King George V on May 6, 1910. And his wife was now styled Mary of Teck, Queen of the United Kingdom and British Dominions and Empress of India.

You'll know Queen Mary if you've seen the hit TV series "The Crown" or the Academy Award-winning film "The King's Speech." Both portrayed her

exactly as she was in life: coldly strict, emotionally remote and personally intimidating.

Britons of the time appreciated her devotion to duty. They respected her, but they didn't love her. However, George V did, and that was all that mattered.

Their lives ran smoothly. Until World War I erupted.

And Queen Mary was among the first to sense that the global conflict posed a clear and present danger to what insiders call "the Firm" — the British royal family and the organizational machinery that supports it.

There was a delicious irony in the predicament. George V, the man who symbolically led Great Britain in its fight against Germany, came from a German family. A very German family, in fact.

When the Great War (as World War I was called at the time) began, the sovereign was head of the House of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. German royals had married into the British monarchy for centuries. In fact, the English royals often spoke German among themselves in private. George V was even a first cousin of his Teutonic rival, Kaiser Wilhelm II.

That posed a serious problem in London. British wartime propaganda had skillfully whipped up a frenzied hatred of all things

Germanic. It was greatly aided in its work by the Kaiser, who had once urged his soldiers to act like the vicious barbarians led by Attila the Hun in the 5th century. The Allies promptly labeled their German enemies "the Hun," and anything even remotely associated with him — including beer, sausage and sauerkraut — was verboten.

Queen Mary sensed danger. With anti-German sentiment spreading, it was only a matter of when, not if, it would reach Buckingham Palace.

Her husband remained unmoved. She slowly but steadily worked on him until she eventually won him over to her way of thinking. And in July 1917, George V issued a royal decree. From that moment on, the House of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha was gone, replaced by the House of Windsor (a name taken from the family's beloved Windsor Castle solely because it "sounded English"). Britons enthusiastically cheered the change.

In Berlin, Cousin Wilhelm sneered, saying he looked forward to attending a performance of the "Merry Wives of Saxe-Gotha-Coburg," a mocking reference to Shakespeare's "The Merry Wives of Windsor."

However, Mary of Teck had

the last laugh. Within 16 months, Wilhelm and his House of Hohenzollern had lost the throne in Germany. The same happened to the czar's House of Romanov in Russia and the emperor's House of Habsburg in Austria-Hungary.

While the Windsors survived. As for Queen Mary, a world-famous ocean liner, a battleship and even a university were named in her honor. All because she had the steel-eyed calculation to spot a threat at the outset and the courage to neutralize it before it metastasized.

## Letter to the Editor

I'm writing as a military spouse because my service member can't. They are required to stay silent. Families are not, and I believe we have a responsibility to speak up because the impacts on us are happening in real time. So I'm asking my community, even while we are away from home, to hear one active-duty wife.

In less than a week, six U.S. service members were killed. Three jets were shot down in friendly-fire incidents, and early reporting shows hundreds of civilian deaths, including children. For military families, those headlines mean phone calls and knocks at the door.

There has been no authorization from Congress. Decisions that send service members into harm's way deserve debate and a recorded vote, especially given recent polling showing only 27 percent of Americans approve of the strikes.

Oregon knows what this looks like. Since 2001, Guard units have rotated into the Middle East at least 16 times, or roughly once every year and a half for 25 years. That does not include active-duty deployments that families like mine are facing.

Nationally, over 3 million tours have been tied to Middle Eastern conflicts since 2001. Those conflicts have cost 7,085 U.S. service member deaths and over 53,500 wounded. Every one of those numbers represents a family living with loss, injury, or a loved one returning home changed or not at all.

We have been here before. Iraq. Afghanistan. Both began with confident explanations and strong early support. Both lasted far longer than anyone first suggested.

I have heard the new "warfighters" language. Words matter. Reducing service members to a slogan makes it easy to forget they are parents, neighbors, and friends. They are whole human beings.

I will say this plainly. I do not want my family living under the shadow of another drawn-out conflict for the next decade. Many military families are uneasy about this escalation, even if we don't always say it publicly.

Before picking sides and posting, I'm asking you to hear us and remember who gets sent and who waits at home.

## Valley Catholic boys beat Riverside for 3A title

COOS BAY — **Riverside** wanted to play fast in the OSAA/On-Point Community Credit Union 3A boys basketball championship Saturday night at **Marshfield** High School.

That was just fine with Valley Catholic, the highest scoring team in the state.

After the teams played fairly even for the first three quarters, **Valley Catholic's** style of fast won out over Riverside's as the Valiants beat the Pirates 77-61 to win the state title.

"It's just crazy," said Valley Catholic junior **Garrett Frank**, who played a huge role on both offense and defense in the win. "It was a dream since my freshman year to win state. Now it's come true. I'm super happy to get it done."

The Valiants had lost in the semifinals the past two years. They survived an overtime thriller with **Cascade Christian** to avoid the same fate again this year and then did everything they needed to come out on top Saturday.

"That experience over the past years — we just came back better," said Valley Catholic senior **Cooper Bonnett**.

Riverside was in the tournament for the first time since 2007 and trying to win its first championship at the 3A level. The Pirates won the 1980 title as a 1A school, beating **Enterprise**.

And their all-out, full-court style had carried them into the finals, including their own wild semifinal win over **Banks**.

"They played their butts off all season," Riverside coach **Cole Ashby** said.

For three quarters, that style helped them keep up with Valley Catholic as the teams traded runs and stayed close to each other on the scoreboard.

Valley Catholic led 18-16 through one quarter, 37-34 at the half and 53-49 through three quarters.

But in the fourth, Valley Catholic was able to pull away behind a couple of big plays and a couple of big shots by **Michael Mehta**.

"Our legs gave out on us," Ashby said. "They got tired in the fourth quarter. Valley did a great job. They came out and shot real well in the fourth quarter."

The Valiants also got an unlikely huge contribution from Bonnett, their smallest player on the court.

On Valley Catholic's first possession of the fourth the Valiants missed a shot and a Riverside player grabbed the rebound. But Bonnett stole the ball and got it to **Marcus Mueller** for a

hoop.

**Jesus Pena** hit one of his five 3-pointers for Riverside to pull the Pirates back within three but Bonnett hit Frank in stride running to the basket on the other end for what became a three-point play restoring the six-point lead.

A short time later the Valiants missed another shot and Bonnett again stole the rebound, giving Valley Catholic another possession that eventually led to a goaltending call on a shot by Mehta.

"I'm a little guard," Bonnett said. "I see them not looking at me. I just go get a jump ball (or a steal). Being able to steal possessions (is big)."

Pena hit another 3-pointer for Riverside, but then Mehta came up with consecutive 3-pointers and **Hank Lomber** hit another and Valley Catholic was in control the rest of the way.

Mehta also had a huge 3-pointer early in overtime in Valley Catholic's semifinal win.

"He's amazing," Frank said. "I know he's one of the best shooters in the state. I love when I can pass it to him."

Lomber's 3-pointer gave Valley Catholic a 69-55 lead and the Pirates weren't able to come back.

Soon Valley Catholic was celebrating.

"Our team showed up in the biggest game and played one of our best games of the season," Mehta said. "I think we stuck to the game plan. We didn't stray from it."

That included not panicking under Riverside's pressure.

"We held our composure all the way through the game," Mehta said.

And it included keeping the pace high.

"Run, run, run — it works," Mehta said.

"We just didn't panic," added Valley Catholic coach **Bryan Fraser**. "We stayed true to ourselves. We came out and ran every chance we could."

Valley Catholic also got a huge defensive effort from Frank against **Cooper Cemore**, Riverside's stellar junior who became the school's all-time leading scorer during the tournament.

"When there's a big matchup, he's not afraid to take it," Fraser said of Frank. Cemore did finish with 19 points, but shot just 6-for-15 from the floor under pressure from Frank.

"That was my assignment," Frank said. "I wanted to do anything to win, even if it wasn't scoring."

Frank did a lot of that, too.

He finished with 21 points, including shooting 11-for-12 from the foul

line.

Mehta scored 22, including four 3-pointers, and Lomber hit two 3-pointers and had 19 points while also grabbing 11 rebounds. Mueller also was huge rebounding for the Valiants with nine boards, while Bonnett had nine points, seven rebounds and seven assists.

"Down the stretch, rebounding was crucial," Fraser said.

Lomber and Frank both are juniors and will be hoping to make it back to the state tournament next year, when Valley Catholic moves up to 4A.

"I've got five or six kids who are going to come back," Fraser said, referring to other reserves who didn't see as much time. "It's my first offseason to instill what I really want to do."

Riverside, meanwhile, will be trying to get back to the Bay Area after reaching the title game this year.

The Pirates graduate starters Pena, **Cougar Philippi** and **Colby Crowell**, but Cena and **Jeremias Calvillo** will be back along with other role players.

And now that they have made it to the tournament, Cemore is hungry for more.

"I want to come back and get it all," he said.

Even though the Pirates came up short, he was thrilled with their season and their tournament.

"We played amazing," Cemore said. "It was a crazy run."

Pena had 15 points on his five 3-pointers for the Pirates and Calvillo scored eight points.

Valley Catholic's road to the final included a 90-71 win over Blanchet Catholic when the Valiants scored the most points in a 3A tournament game since OSAA went to six classifications and the 56-54 overtime win over Cascade Christian. In the win over Blanchet Catholic, Lomber tied the tournament record with eight 3-pointers and matched the single-game scoring record with 34 points, though that record was broken the next day.

Riverside got to the final with a 61-57 win over Pleasant Hill and a 63-59 win over Banks, the latter when the Pirates won despite Cemore fouling out late.

### THIRD PLACE

**CASCADE CHRISTIAN 64, BANKS 47:** The Challengers won the battle of two teams headed to Class 4A in the fall who both suffered devastating semifinal losses a night earlier.

The Challengers have been mainstays in the Bay Area since the tournament was moved to the South Coast.

Their hopes of leaving as champions ended with a gut-wrenching loss to Valley Catholic in Friday's semifinals.

But Cascade Christian responded with a quick start and then a trio of huge 3-pointers from Brady Kleker, one of two seniors on the squad, after Banks had cut the lead to eight points to start the fourth quarter.

"Coach drew up a play, we executed it right, and I knocked it down," Kleker said. "When I hit that first one, I thought, 'I've got a couple more for you.'"

Cascade Christian coach Brian Morse said Kleker's shots were huge. "It was getting a little too close for comfort," he said.

Like Cascade Christian, Banks was coming off a deflating semifinal loss, theirs to Riverside, and Banks coach Patrick Marlia said Cascade Christian responded better.

"Yesterday, our inexperience showed in the first half," he said of the Braves, who feature three freshman starters. "Today we came out slow and they punched us in the gut. They wanted it more."

When Banks settled down and was making a game of it in the second half, he noted "they hit big 3s."

Klecker had 16 points and fellow senior Deryk Farmer 11 for the Challengers. Hudson Gotzman, the team's lone junior, added 10 and sophomore Jake Holden nine.

Ryder Powell had 15 points and Fisher King 11 for Banks on Saturday.

Banks starts freshmen Powell, Jalen Janecek and Mason King and juniors Nate Lyda and Fisher King.

"This has been a great experience," Marlia said. "They will remember it forever."

"Hopefully we'll be able to get back into this next year and hopefully this experience will pay off."

Cascade Christian's roster features eight sophomores and a freshman, and they, too, were getting valuable experience.

For Kleker, the feeling Saturday was one of elation and appreciation.

"I feel amazing," he said. "This team came a long way."

"We're disappointed not getting first. But we are brothers. We put our hearts out there."

### FOURTH PLACE

**CRESWELL 62, PLEASANT HILL 42:** The neighbors and Valley Coast Conference rivals were playing for the fourth time and the Bulldogs won summer bragging rights with a big start in the first quarter and a big

push in the second half.

Pleasant Hill won both regular-season meetings and Creswell won the conference tournament final before winning again Saturday.

"We just came out with the confidence to do it this time," Creswell's Luke Bailey said. "We were really prepared and ready to go."

Creswell came out blazing in the first quarter. The Bulldogs got two 3-pointers each by Landon Vaughn and Tanner Frieze and another by Ace Arnold and led by as many as 12 points, 23-11.

Douglas Green pulled Pleasant Hill back within single digits with his own 3-pointer before the end of the quarter and then the Billies got as close as two points down in the second on a bucket by Jacob Neely before Creswell settled for a 30-25 halftime edge.

And in the second half, Creswell pulled away.

Creswell led by 10 through three quarters and Emerson Velarde started the fourth with a 3-pointer that sparked an 11-2 run that effectively decided the contest.

Creswell was strong on defense and rebounding.

"When we can hold teams to one shot, we are pretty good."

For the game, the Bulldogs had a 36-20 rebounding edge. Ace Arnold grabbed 11 boards to go with 13 points and Mason Schartz had nine rebounds.

COOS BAY — **Amity's** girls were riding high as defending state champions when they met **Vale** at a tournament in Salem back on Jan. 3 and lost to the Vikings 31-27.

The Warriors avenged that loss on the biggest stage Saturday, beating the Vikings 47-44 in the championship game of the OSAA/On-Point Community Credit Union 3A State Championships at **Marshfield** High School.

"It gave us extra momentum for this game," Amity senior Lyli Rideout said. "After that loss, we had to learn a lot about ourselves."

"It's all right to lose the first one if you win the second, especially if it's this one."

Rideout and her five senior teammates were able to celebrate back-to-back titles after Amity held off a furious comeback in the final moments by the Vikings, who entered as the top-ranked team based on their earlier win against Amity and a regular season that saw their only loss coming to **Henley**, one of the teams playing in the upcoming 4A tournament.

"That's a phenomenal team," he said. "Great kids, coached well. They work hard. They don't quit. My hat's off to them."

Vale coach **Randy Seals** wasn't surprised by his team's late rally, only disappointed it wasn't quite enough.

"That's what they do," he said.

"They never give up. They just kept battling, got a few shots to drop, got a few turnovers."

"I wanted it so bad for them. They've worked so hard. It just didn't turn out."

Until the final moments, Amity had been in front most of the game, stifling the Vikings with its tough defense and getting enough offense, especially from twins **Adie** and **Eliza Nisly**.

Eliza Nisly's drive to the hoop with 2:21 to go gave Amity a 44-34 lead and the margin stayed there until **Brooklyn Maag** had a rebound bucket for the Vikings with 1:11 to go.

Then Stepleton had a steal and a bucket with just under a minute to go to trim the lead to 44-38 and Amity missed a pair of free throws and scored inside while being fouled with 29 seconds to go. She missed the free throw, but Amity's lead was down to four points.

A few seconds later Miersma hit one of two free throws, but missed the second and Vale raced the ball downcourt for another bucket by Izzy Maag and the lead was down to three.

Amity missed two more free throws with 15 seconds to go, leading to Stepleton's shot that almost tied the game.

Miersma hit the final two free throws, Vale wasn't able to get a good shot off and Amity was celebrating a second straight title.

"It's crazy," Miersma said. "Just being able to do it with the seniors I love. I couldn't ask for a better group of girls."

All five Amity starters — Miersma, the Nisly twins, **Alyssa McMullen** and **Kyle Wilson** — along with Rideout, are seniors who were key parts of last year's team as well.

They also had a chance in the fall to lead Amity to its first girls soccer title and the first-ever title by a public school in the 3A-2A-1A classification, when they beat Valley Catholic.

"It's crazy — three championships in a row — and it's all the same girls," Rideout said.

"I don't even know what to think," Alyssa McMullen said. "I'm so excited. I just love my team so

much."

Amity put itself in position for the victory with its typical relentless defense, which stymied the Vikings much of the night.

"Defense wins championships," Miersma said. "That's what our coach always says."

Amity held Vale to nine points in the first quarter, 10 in the second and 13 in the third.

But because the Vikings also thrive on defense, Amity never had a particularly large lead and led by just eight heading into the final quarter.

But Amity was in front, making Vale play from behind, because of offensive contributions from multiple players.

The Nisly twins led the way, with Adie scoring 16 points with two 3-pointers and Eliza added 13, mostly from inside. Rideout also had two huge 3-pointers and seven points and McMullen added five. All of Miersma's four points came at the line, but they were huge as well.

"It's a team game," Miersma said. "We all contribute to the offense."

Still, every Amity player referred first to the team's defense.

"Our defense was great again tonight," Alyssa McMullen said. "We were so resilient tonight. Our mental confidence from freshman year to this year is so much better."

Most of the seniors were part of a team that reached the tournament as freshmen, placing fourth, and reached the title game as sophomores before winning the past two years. Miersma actually won her third basketball title, having been part of Western Christian's champion 2A team as a sophomore.

"You can't say enough about them," Jed McMullen said of the seniors. "It's a special group. I've coached them since kindergarten."

"I am so blessed to be able to ride their coat tails on a couple of championships."

While disappointed with the outcome, Seals tipped his hat to Amity for doing what it needed to do to win another title.

"Amity executed well," he said. "They hit shots they didn't hit against us earlier in the year. That's what champions do. They make shots."

Vale was trying for a title after just missing the championship game the past two years. Counting Saturday, the Vikings have lost three games in three years at the tournament by a combined total of seven points.

"I'm really proud of the girls," Seals said.

Stepleton led Vale with 20 points and also grabbed 14 rebounds. Izzy Maag added 10 points.

Like Amity, Vale was a senior-heavy roster, including all five starters — Stepleton, Izzy Maag, **Ellie Jacobs**, **Bailey Blake** and **Karlee Crane**.

And while Amity had a huge and vocal crowd, Vale also had a big and loud fan base, especially considering how much farther the Viking faithful had to travel.

"I want to thank the fans for making the 9-hour trip here and thank the Coos Bay and North Bend communities," Seals said. "They are making memories for the girls."

Amity overwhelmed Pleasant Hill 48-26 in the quarterfinals and then beat Banks 40-32 in a rematch of last year's championship game to reach Saturday's final. Vale topped Sutherlin 58-20 and Creswell 48-29 to reach the final.

### THIRD PLACE

**BANKS 55, CRESWELL 23:** The Braves shook off the disappointment of a semifinal loss to Vale by seizing control early and running away from Creswell.

"I'm proud of them for playing so well in what I think is the hardest game to play in in this tournament," Banks coach Nick Rizzo said. "They played their hearts out."

The Braves overwhelmed Creswell with their pressure, forcing the Bulldogs into 19 first-half turnovers and 30 for the game.

Creswell didn't score until nearly five minutes into the game and by that time Banks led 11-0. The Braves were up 16-6 after one quarter and shut out the Bulldogs in the second, building a 28-6 halftime lead.

Creswell shot just 1-for-14 from the floor in the first half and 4-for-30 for the game.

"They did their traditional locking

down on defense," Rizzo said.

Clarissa Shurts had a game-high 20 points for the Braves and Nylah Vanthom added 10. Emily Graham, the team's only senior starter, had six points and seven rebounds.

"I'm super proud of my team," she said. "I love them so much. I'm really proud of everyone and how they battled back."

The Braves were their typical extremely tough on defense. And they did well pushing the ball on offense.

"We were having fun," Graham said, explaining one sometimes forgotten key to success.

Mila Nguyen had 11 points to lead the Bulldogs.

Creswell coach Tyler Hollingsworth said the Bulldogs didn't handle the Banks pressure early and gave up too many easy baskets off turnovers.

"I wish we would have handled it better," Hollingsworth said. "We didn't get out of our little funk and the pressure kept mounting and mounting."

He was pleased, however, with his team's effort.

"I don't think they quit fighting, which is awesome," Hollingsworth said.

### FOURTH PLACE

**VALLEY CATHOLIC 59, SISTERS 36:** The Valiants used transition offense and tough defense to build an early lead and stayed out front.

"What a game," Valley Catholic coach Pat Thomas said. "I told them at halftime, often coaches talk about making adjustments. We didn't change anything."

"That's the first time we've played like ourselves down here."

The Valiants led 12-6 through one quarter and scored 22 points in the second.

They got 3-pointers by Katelyn Sheridan, Brooke Wilson and Rachel Pippin in the quarter. Pippin's gave the Valiants a 34-17 lead and Valley Catholic led 34-19 at the half, in part because of 14 forced turnovers.

Thomas said Valley Catholic was worn down in a quarterfinal loss to Banks, and though the Valiants beat Pleasant Hill in the consolation

semifinals, they were tired from the night before and didn't play like themselves. "I told them we were going to play better today," he said. "That's how we play. We transitioned well and we made shots."

season.

"My four seniors, it's maybe the best class I've ever coached," Thomas said. "They wanted to get down here so bad. Fourth place for these kids is so great."

While Valley Catholic has been a mainstay at the tournament, Sisters was at the final site for the first time, and got a chance to take home a trophy, which coach Kevin Cotner had said was his biggest goal this week.

"Just to be here, these girls have blazed a path, set a new standard for girls basketball at

Sisters," Cotner said.

As for Saturday's game, he said the Outlaws couldn't keep up with Valley Catholic's deep bench.

"I think we just ran out of gas today," he said. "(Valley Catholic) is so deep, running eight or nine girls out there."

Maddie Durham had 11 points to lead the outlaws and Audrey Corcoran added seven.

Valley Catholic topped Pleasant Hill 44-39 in its consolation semifinal while Sisters edged Sutherlin 37-34.

## Bandon loses twice at state tournament

Bandon's girls were eliminated from the Class 2A tournament on Friday with a 39-30 loss to Weston-McEwen.

The Tigers, who suffered a tough loss to Western Christian in the quarterfinals Thursday, fell behind by 14 points at halftime when the TigerScots outscored them 14-2 in the second quarter. Bandon trimmed the deficit to nine by the end of the third, but couldn't catch up.



## As I See It

As Bandon High School students anxiously awaited the opening of their new school across town, they learned in October of 1949 that they would be attending "downtown" classes as an emergency schedule was put into effect because of lack of heat in the old high school building (first photo).

"A recent flue fire at the old building caused the central heating plant to be condemned, leaving most of the building with no heat. Under the emergency schedule, to be used while the students wait for the new high school to be completed, two classes are held in the Masonic hall, in the Bank of Bandon building, during each of four class periods which make up the school day, another is held in the American Legion hall, while other classes are held in the chemistry laboratory, home economics room, office, or music room of the old high school, which have individual heating facilities. The seventh and eighth graders, who are normally in the high school building, are using the grade school auditorium (Ocean Crest School)."

Ironically, 25 years later, students once again were attending classes throughout the community after an arsonist burned the "new" high school to the ground in January of 1974.

The second photo I am sharing features Veral Tarno, who was running for sheriff in 1980. Pictured, from left, are Gordon Swan, Tarno, Police Chief D. S. MacDonald and Mayor Ray Kelley. I was also a member of the committee, but was taking the photo for the Western World.

Having just returned from the very successful 130th birthday celebration of the Coquille River Lighthouse (third photo), I thought it was appropriate to share this old photo which depicts the building of the north jetty. It's hard to imagine what went into building the lighthouse (in 1896) and the jetty.

I'm sorry to start off with

the sad news, but we lost Bandon High School graduate (Class of 1964) and outstanding athlete Greg Crew, who died Feb. 15 surrounded by his family. Born in Bandon Aug. 27, 1946, he was the son of the late Velma and Charlie Crew. He is survived by his wife, Jan, and the family they built together, including Deana, Rebecca (Jason), Tricia, Amy (Oscar), Gregg and Guy (Cindy). He was preceded in death by a son, Steve. He is also survived by his sister, Lynne. A Celebration of Life will be held July 4 from noon to 4 p.m. at Bullards Beach State Park.

I also learned that former Bandon teacher Liz Nakayama Hultin died Feb. 25 at the age of 79 after being diagnosed in early December with pancreatic cancer. Her husband Tom Hultin and her son, Barry Nakayama, who lives near Seattle, were with her when she died. Tom said there will be a Celebration of Life probably later in the spring when her beautiful rhododendron plants are in bloom.

Last week I mentioned that a golfer had suffered a heart attack while playing golf recently at Bandon Crossings, and in spite of extensive CPR, they were not able to save Ted McKenzie, 78, of Langlois, a relative of City Attorney Shala McKenzie Kudlac.

A press release from the Bandon Police Department indicated that on Feb. 24, at 5:45 p.m., Bandon police and Deputy S. Converse were dispatched to a residence on South Beach Loop to a report of a violation of a restraining order in progress. Upon arrival, Dominic L. Dibartolomeo, 56, was located on the property in violation of his restraining order. He was taken into custody and transported to the county jail.

Shortly before 5 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 26, two cars collided at Highway 101 and Fillmore Avenue, near the Bandon History Museum. Bandon Fire was on scene, and said that

everyone was out of their vehicles, but there was lane blockage. Responders described it as "a fender bender." The drivers moved the vehicles into the parking lot at Face Rock Creamery. They declined medical but responders requested that Bay Cities Ambulance come to the scene.

On Saturday, Feb. 28, at 6:06 p.m., Bandon Fire responded to Highway 101 and Seabird to the report of a large plume of smoke and a glow in the distance. This turned out to be a controlled burn, and Bandon Fire returned to the fire hall.

Officers from the Bandon Police Department Saturday responded to a reported crash on property belonging to Bandon Dunes Golf Resort after an automatic crash notification was received.

Upon arrival, Officer Jesse Macy located a heavily damaged, unoccupied silver SUV with extensive damage. As the investigation continued, it was determined that the vehicle has almost had a head-on collision with a Bandon Dunes security vehicle that was on the roadway, before crashing and damaging resort property. The occupants were transported from the scene prior to law enforcement arrival. Through follow-up investigation and the assistance from the Coos County Sheriff's Office Sergeant Adam Slater, a search warrant was obtained and executed.

The driver, Adam Reed, 50, Portland, ultimately admitted involvement and was arrested for failure to perform the duties of a driver, reckless driving and reckless endangering. Additional charges are being referred, along with potential charges for individuals who transported the driver from the scene and attempted to interfere with the investigation.

"We want to extend a sincere thank you to Sgt. Slater for his professionalism, expertise and willingness to stand alongside our agency. Interagency teamwork like this strengthens our community and ensures accountability when it matters most," said a spokesman for the Bandon Police Department.

I've learned that Margaret Pounder's building in Old Town, formerly occupied by Bandon Coffee Cafe, has been sold for \$425,000 to Randy Hoffine, owner of Pacific Properties,



who will operate his real estate office in the building.

In state playoff basketball games over the weekend, the Bandon girls defeated East Linn Christian 55-30 Saturday night at home, and headed to Pendleton for the State 2A Championship. They met Western Christian March 5 at the Pendleton Convention Center.

Coached by Jordan Sammons, the roster includes seniors Jazmyn Llewellyn, Safaa Dimitruk, Caitlyn Michalek and Marlie Carmack. Others are Jordyn Llewellyn, Olivia Kraynik, Sunny Thompson, Gracie Sullivan, Brylee Butts, Shasta Johnson and Gracie Miller.

The Tiger boys, who were league co-champions, fell to Lowell Friday night 39-36 to end their season.

For the first time in 30 years, the Powers girls team qualified for the State 1A tournament in Baker City and were to meet the top ranked team, Imbler. They beat Harper Charter Saturday 52-31, in spite of losing to the same team in December by 12 points.

I was working as editor of the Myrtle Point Herald in 1995, and was in Baker City when Powers won the crown that year, and when they placed second in 1996. The Cruisers were coached by Ron Hofsess and guided by 6'5" Jenny Mowe, who went on to play at the University of Oregon, and was drafted by the WNBA Portland Fire. Today she and her husband own Sweet Wife's Bakery in downtown Baker City.

Powers was not able to field a boys team this year.

Several members of the Bandon High School speech team have qualified for Nationals. Tyler Eickhoff, student body president and son of the city's popular front desk



gal, Linda Eickhoff, qualified in Humorous Interpretation. Brennan McFall and Alivia Bramhall qualified in Dramatic Interpretation and Duo Interpretation. Sebastian Newby is a second alternate in Humorous Interpretation. 



Gary was a father of three and grew into this role, making up colorful bedtime stories for his kids, and teaching them the right way to do chores. He

modeled for his children, what it was to lead an active, useful life.

In his life, Gary experienced the deep sorrows of losing his brother Fred to Cancer, his niece to Cancer, the death of his parents, and the loss of his son Elliot in a terrible car accident.

After receiving his cancer diagnosis in the spring of 2025, Gary continued to stay as active as he could. He rarely dwelled on his physical pain. He was comforted knowing he had cared for his family. March 22, 1934 - February 25, 2026


Robert Henry Gillett passed away peacefully on February 25, 2026, in Salem, Oregon. Born March 22, 1934, in Rockford, Illinois, Bob lived a life shaped by music, education, craftsmanship, and devotion to family.

Bob earned a bachelor's degree in education from Northern Illinois State College in 1956 and soon entered the United States Army. He served in the Fifth and Seventh Army Symphony Orchestra and Band, touring throughout Europe, primarily in Germany, performing on the bassoon. His military service strengthened his lifelong commitment to music and instilled a discipline that guided him throughout his life.

After completing a master's degree in education from Northern Illinois University in 1963, Bob devoted more than 30 years to teaching and directing school bands in Illinois and Oregon. Soon after, they moved to Oregon, where Bob taught briefly at Oakland High School before becoming band director at Marshfield High School in Coos Bay, a position he held for nearly three decades. Together, Bob and Dorothy raised two children, Eric and Michele.

Music remained central to Bob's life. He performed with a local woodwind quintet and directed the Bay Area Concert Band for many years. When health challenges later prevented him from playing, he gifted his cherished bassoon to a young college musician so its music could continue.



Bob was also an avid aviator, earning commercial and instrument ratings and delighting in flying his family across the country. After retiring in 1992, Bob and Dorothy traveled extensively, visiting every continent, including Antarctica.

In 2002, they moved to Independence, Oregon, where Bob designed their home in a local airpark, combining his passions for aviation, architecture, and woodworking. Faith was an important part of his life, and he and Dorothy attended Salem Alliance Church for over 20 years.

Bob will be remembered for his integrity, humor, and enduring impact as a husband, father, grandfather, educator, and musician. He is survived by his wife, Dorothy, his sister, his son and daughter in law, his daughter, three grandsons, and one granddaughter. He will be deeply missed and forever cherished.

## Ruth Georga Taylor

November 28, 1927 - February 3, 2026

Ruth Georga Taylor passed away at the age of 98 on February 3, 2026, at her home in McKinleyville, California. Ruth, who went by Georga, was born on November 28, 1927, in Mankato, Minnesota. Her parents, Ralph and Ruth Bray, operated a travelling theatrical show throughout the western states in the late 1920s and into the early 1940s. As young kids, Georga and her younger brother, Jerry, lived with their grandparents during the summer show season because Georga said, "we were too young to perform or be useful to the show." However, once old enough, Georga and eventually Jerry joined the show and assisted in setting-up and breaking-down the stage and props.

Theater interested Georga, to the point where she ventured to New York City in 1947 and attended the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, hired an agent, worked day jobs to pay rent and living expenses, and performed in several off-Broadway productions. The day job she would tell the most stories about was being a store detective to spot shoplifters at Lord and Taylor in Manhattan. Eventually, she made her way back west, to Oregon, where her parents had settled down. In Eugene, she met Fred Taylor, who was studying journalism. Georga and Fred were married in Coos Bay, Oregon on October 6, 1951. Three years later

they travelled to Europe for a belated, seven-month, honeymoon. On return to New York City in 1955, Fred started a new job, at the Wall Street Journal, the paper he would work on for the next 30 years. His promotions led to new places, including Detroit, Michigan where they adopted two children, Amelia and Ross. After Detroit, they lived in Washington D.C. in the mid-to-late 1960s, Belvedere, California in 1968-69, and eventually settled in Ridgewood, New Jersey in 1970 where they stayed for 16 years.

While raising two kids, Georga stayed interested in theater, writing and directing plays and musicals for local theater. She and Fred were both avid readers, political news junkies, and loved attending Broadway shows while living near New York City. She loved gardening and planting flowers to specifically attract birds. Another passion she had was designing "dream" houses on pads of graph paper.

In 1986, Fred retired and he and Georga purchased property in Charleston, Oregon that had a dilapidated house on it. That house torn down and Georga got her dream house! She designed the house and worked with an architect on the blueprints. Several years later Georga designed a guest cottage that was built to make more room for guests and visiting family. Georga and Fred lived in Charles-

ton for 29 years, until Fred's passing in 2015. Georga was active in the Coos County community. She volunteered at the Coos County Historical Society and at local elementary schools. Georga continued to garden and enjoyed beach walks, bird watching, ocean sunsets, summer farmers' markets, and hosting family and friends. She and Fred made annual trips to Eugene to visit journalism friends and catch a Eugene Emeralds baseball game.

After Fred's death, Georga moved to McKinleyville, California to be near her son and his family. From an ocean-front home to a double-wide mobile home, yet she loved the location and quickly created a new life for herself. She was able to walk to many places in McKinleyville and made personal connections everywhere she went. Georga's ability to volunteer had diminished, yet she donated to causes she believed in, such as reading literacy in Coos County, Planned Par-

enthood, Food for People, Oxfam International, and American Rivers. In her move from Oregon to California, she switched her baseball allegiance from the Seattle Mariners to the San Francisco Giants and religiously watched Giants' games.

A fall and broken hip in 2018 reduced her mobility and independence. A desire to stay in her home started a long-term relationship with a special set of caregivers, who at first assisted for part of the day, but eventually grew into 24/7 home care. For years, the best part of Georga's day was going on a drive or, an adventure as she called it, with the day-shift caregiver.

Georga is survived by her daughter, Amelia Taylor and granddaughters Caitlin and Rachael Evans of Portland, Oregon and her son, Ross Taylor, daughter-in-law, Anya Taylor, granddaughter, Elsa Taylor of McKinleyville and grandson, Zane Taylor of Arcata. Georga's family expresses their deepest



gratitude and thanks to the incredible caregivers that she had. We also express our thanks to Hospice of Humboldt, especially nurse Kerry, who helped us navigate the final stages of Georga's long and full life. We like to believe that she

held on one more day for that final visit from Kerry, to hear her say, "good morning, beautiful" one more time.

A small memorial service in Charleston is being planned for later this year.




