

Chief receives plaudits at retirement ceremony

In a packed city council chambers at North Bend City Hall on the morning of May 19, North Bend Police Department (NBDP) Chief Cal Mitts and his family received their flowers (in a literal and figurative sense). Mitts retired from the NBDP after five years with the department closing what was described as a "chapter that was never supposed to be written."

This would mark the second time that Mitts would retire from a local police force. Following a fractious period for the NBDP which led to the resignation of Chief Robert Kappelman and Captain Curt Bennett in October of 2021, City Administrator David Milliron reached out to Mitts and Gary McCullough for help as interim Captain and Chief respectively. Both had previously served as leadership with the Coos Bay Police Department.

The pair, after some apprehension, accepted the offer with McCullough serving 18 months as interim chief of the department. In April, 2023, Mitts took over the role in what has become a succession plan that continued with the appointment of Ed Perry on Tuesday.

An actionable succession plan is not the only thing that Mitts brought to the apartment. He received an exceedingly complimentary send-off from Milliron, McCullough, Former Coos Bay Police Chief and City Manager Roger Craddock, and former District Attorney Paul Frasier. All mentioned the expansion, enrichment, and experience he brought to the department and the exceptional leader he is.

"When Cal Mitts came to North Bend, he brought more than experience. He brought calm, credibility and a clear sense of purpose," Milliron said. "He helped take a department that was in a defining moment and turn it into one that is fully staffed, technologically advanced, professionally respected and better prepared for the future. He leaves this city in a far better place than he found it, and that is the mark of exceptional leadership."

Under his leadership, the NBDP modernized their operations, brought back the K-9 drug detection program, and expand-

ed community policing roles through a Community Services Officer and Community Resource Officer.

The department, which is now fully staffed for the first time in ten years, was able to eliminate mandatory overtime, streamline incident reporting, and bring the force up to date with a full remit of new equipment, vehicles, and technology.

Mitts was nicknamed "The Accelerator" during his stint as director of the South Coast Interagency Narcotics Team (SCINT), which he said was due to the fact that he "doesn't like complacency."

"My time at the department has been very rewarding," Mitts told the World. "It's exceeded any expectations I had coming in... Seeing the growth and leadership within the department, as well as in the city and administration, it is now and hopefully always will be one of the greatest police departments in the state."

Mitts was thanked for his service with a shadow box of his badge and commendations, as well as a knife engraved with his title, badge number, and service period. His wife Megan was recognized as well for the sacrifices

made throughout his service and gifted a large bouquet of flowers.

His successor now-Chief Perry has a long history with the NBDP, which he joined as a reserve officer back in 2003. He made full patrol in 2011 and, upon being recognized as the new chief, has worked his way up the entire chain of command in the department. He received his Bachelors of Science in Criminal Justice Administration and Communication from Bushnell University, graduating with a 3.88 GPA.

"Chief Perry is one of the most gifted and talented law enforcement officers I've ever worked with," said Mitts on his successor. "What he brings to the table as far as his skills, leadership ability, and vision is truly remarkable. I have no worries, no hesitations, in his ability to bring this department even further from where it was when I got here."

Reed's appointment represents and even wider full-circle moment for the department and city, as his great-grandfather, Oliver E. Reeve, served as the North Bend chief of police in 1939.

"Ed Perry is the right leader at the right time," Milliron said.

"He knows this department, he has earned the respect of his peers, and he understands both the responsibility and the opportunity that come with this moment. He inherits a stronger department because of Chief Mitts' work, and I am confident he will build on that foundation with professionalism, humility and vision."

Perry told the World, "Chief Mitts is an amazing person, an amazing mentor. I couldn't have asked for a better person to work with. Being the captain under him has been amazing. I think it's a huge responsibility [to be chief]. I'm ready to see where we can go, and with the people we have I think we're going to go great places."

As part of the aforementioned succession plan, Sergeant Jake Hult has been promoted to Captain, and Officer Jerad Jaehng has been promoted to Sergeant. The goal being to develop a long line of department leaders that were trained in and represent the North Bend community.

Mitts said in his retirement he is excited just to spend time with family and watch the further growth of the department from outside of the public eye.

Wyden and Hoyle visit for annual Town Hall

Dozens of Coos County's politically engaged citizens and members of office were in attendance for Oregon Senator Ron Wyden and Representative Val Hoyle's annual Town Hall on May 27, 2026. The North Bend Community Center was the venue for feedback on protections for federal workers and lands, the Pacific Coast

Intermodal Port Project (PCIP), and campaign finance reform.

The event began with an introduction from North Bend Mayor

Jessica Engelke, who introduced the two legislators. According to Wyden himself, this was the 1,167th town hall he'd conducted during his time in Washington. He and fellow Senator Jeff Merkley are two of the only policymakers in D.C. who make the point of holding a yearly town hall in each of their constituent counties.

In opening statement's Wyden spoke directly to the issue of campaign finance, stating that the biggest issue facing our political future is unchecked money in Washington. The Supreme Court decision on Citizens United, which allows corporations and outside spenders to pump unlimited amounts of money into campaigns under the guise of free speech, needs to be "thrown in the trash," according to the Senator.

The first of the crowd questions was quite pointed. With a young woman asking Val Hoyle about her voting record in regards to Israel's ongoing campaign of destruction and settlement in Gaza and now Lebanon. Hoyle and Wyden both defended their positions.

Hoyle stated that she'd only voted for funding packages that we're couched in humanitarian aid for other embattled regions like Ukraine and Sudan. Wyden stated that the situation had been difficult for him, being raised Jewish, but disavowed actions taken by Benjamin Netanyahu and stated he would not be voting for any military aid for Israel in the future.

Another notable point of discussion encompassed the challenges currently facing both federal lands and workers, which have both been in the crosshairs of the current administration. It has been announced that the Bureau of Land Management's holdings will be up for sale and should be logged at an increased rate. At the same time, federal employees across multiple departments who are normally tasked with protecting those federal lands have been fired or placed under increasingly difficult working conditions.

Both lawmakers pointed to the idea that those are coinciding tactics aimed at privatizing large swaths of the federal government, from forestry to the postal service. Hamstringing federal departments and limiting their abilities so that those inefficiencies can be used as reasoning for corporations to fill the gaps.

Coquille's Sawdust Theatre prepares to begin 59th season of melodrama

Few community theaters have a vision and brand as consistent and specialized as Coquille's summer mainstay, the Sawdust Theatre. Since their first show in 1967, the "Sawdusters" have brought a melodrama to the stage every year since Sgt. Pepper's and the Summer of Love.

The summer shows at Sawdust represent a tradition that encompasses thousands of the city's residents and countless volunteer hours over the course of nearly 60 years. This year's show reflects that history directly. "Calamity at the Coquille Creamery" or "Udder Confusion" may follow some of the unique tropes of the melodrama genre of theater, but it does so through the hyper-local lens of a town's cultural cornerstone.

Just ask long-time Sawdusters and directors of this year's show Nancy Wilson and Kendall Roberts. Wilson was in the last production of "Udder Confusion" back in 2001, after joining the theater in 1993.

"We affectionately call it 'The

Cow Play,'" laughed Wilson. "It is definitely old school villain with the top hat and the cape and the mustache. The heroine is not tied to the railroad tracks this year, but it's a similar situation."

"She's very innocent and pure, and virtuous," explained Roberts, who's called the theater home since her mother was a dancer there in the 80's.

This play features heroine Henrietta Holstein and hero Ferdinand Farnsworth who must protect the family farm from the wiles of evil villain Franklin

Basher. It was written in the 80's by Diana Amling, an inaugural member of the company, Gael Berhow and Cindy Robnett.

Set in Coquille, as many of their shows are, locals are known to pick out people, places and events from the town's history. While they've done a few melodramas from outside the company over the years, nearly every show is written by, of, and for the people of Coquille.

"It's an honor, it's just awesome," said Wilson, on what its like to do shows so reflective of

their community. "Last year's play was based on real people, so people that had been around, people that are my age, remembered these characters. We always tie in the location names, so there's always something somebody is going to recognize."

Another trademark touch for Sawdust shows is their interstitial olios, which are musical numbers and dances that populate the spaces between each scene. This year's olios are directed by Stephanie Kreutzer and Chloe Stevenson.

"The olios are in between the scenes and keep the audience engaged, keep them going," said Kreutzer. "Singing and dancing a majority of the time. We do tap, the French can-can, jazz, some character numbers. We try to tie into whatever the play is about, and add a little bit of that in."

The olios lead a sing-along and introduce everyone to the unique show environment. Those who are used to a theatrical experience which separates the audience from the show are in

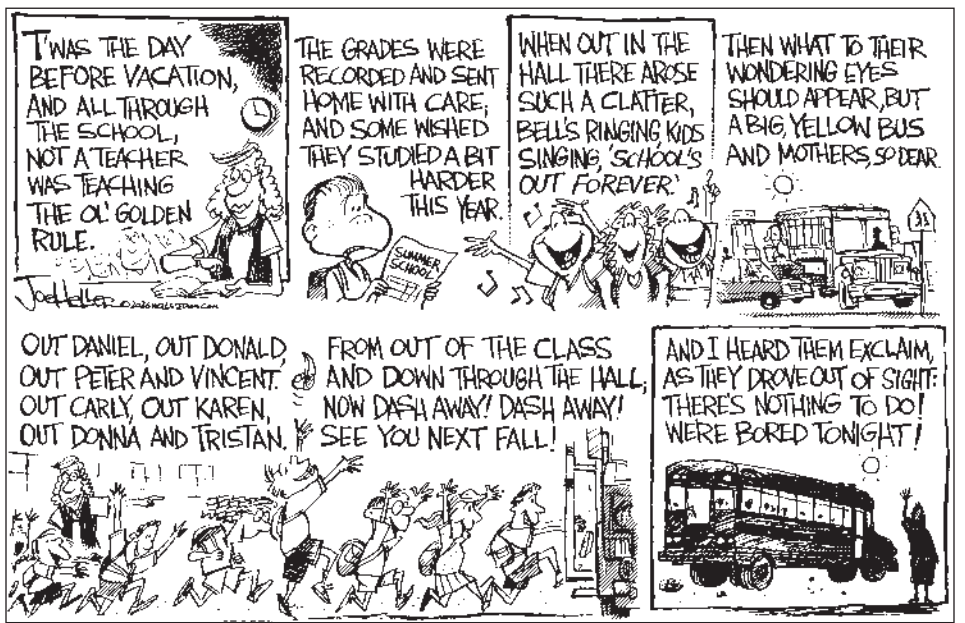

Holy Cow! History

The last great American snake oil salesman

Time was, if you had an ache or were ailing, some traveling “medicine” huckster promised his special elixir would fix you right up.

Well into the 20th century, smooth-talking pitchmen would travel the country, selling tonics made of dubious ingredients, guaranteed to cure anything from acne to the effects of advanced age. Small towns and rural crossroads were their preferred venues. Sometimes they traveled with musicians, putting on a show to attract a crowd before bilking gullible customers out of their hard-earned dollars for concoctions that were little more than alcohol — often as strong as a belt of booze — infused with anything and everything from serious narcotics to ineffective herbs.

Congress responded to the problem by passing the Food and Drug Act of 1906. For the first time, federal regulators had the authority to ensure that the medicines Americans took were safe. When the FDA was established in 1930, the handwriting was on the wall for snake oil salesmen. The old traveling



medicine shows and the products they promoted began going the way of kerosene lamps and Model T Fords. As their numbers dwindled, one stood out from the rest.

Hadacol. Dudley J. LeBlanc of tiny Erath, La., created it. In a state overflowing with colorful politicians, he was among the most flamboyant. He served in the legislature — first in the House and later in the Senate — on and off over nearly half a century.

He ran for governor in 1932, losing to the legendary Huey P. Long. His unsuccessful candidacy did leave its mark. LeBlanc proposed paying a monthly stipend to seniors. Long appropriated the popular idea, and it wasn't long until Social Security was established.

When it came to promoting Hadacol, LeBlanc had

no equal. Introduced in 1943, it was a marketing triumph. LeBlanc may not have known much about medicine, but he sure knew how to move the merchandise. Time magazine called him “a stem-winding salesman who knows every razzle-dazzle switch in the pitchman's trade.”

LeBlanc and medicine shared a checkered past. His Happy Day Co. sold Dixie Dew Cough Syrup and Happy Day Headache Powders — until the FDA shut him down over safety concerns.

Undeterred, LeBlanc turned to bottled medicines. Billed as a vitamin supplement, Hadacol was actually nothing but 12 percent alcohol, cleverly disguised on the label as a “preservative.” Time called it “a murky brown liquid that tastes something like bilge water, and smells worse.”

LeBlanc's high-octane tonic took the country by storm. Not surprisingly, it was especially popular in the South and the Heartland, where many dry counties banned alcohol sales. And he promoted his concoction with one of the greatest medicine shows of them all.

The Hadacol Caravan came to out-of-the-way

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ODFW announces Free Fishing Weekend

Everyone can fish, clam and crab for free in Oregon on Saturday and Sunday, June 6-7, 2026.

No fishing/shellfish licenses or tags/validations are required on these days (meaning you do not need a Combined Angling Tag, Columbia River Basin Endorsement, Ocean Endorsement or two-rod validation where two rods are allowed). Both Oregon residents and nonresidents can fish for free. Oregon State Parks also offers free parking on Saturday, June 6.

All other fishing regulations apply including closures, gear restrictions, bag limits, and size restrictions. Visit the Online Regulations page before you head out and remember to check myodfw.com for any in season regulation changes, especially for salmon and steelhead fishing.

Drought conditions make a difference this year. Some smaller lakes and ponds might already be warming up, so consider fishing early in the day or changing it up to warm water fish like bass, bluegill and crappie.

The Recreation Report is updated weekly and features the best bets for fishing for the upcoming week. Check out the weekly Recreation Report for zone reports and opportunities near you. Expect lots of rainbow trout to be stocked in Oregon's ponds and lakes for the weekend; check out the trout stocking schedule for more information and stocking locations.

Crabbing and clamming

Free Fishing Weekend is also a great weekend to try clamming or crab-

bing. Visit ODFW.com for all the information you need to get started clamming or crabbing including maps of locations and how-to's.

The Oregon Department of Agriculture regularly tests shellfish and closes areas when naturally occurring biotoxins get to levels that make crabs and clams unsafe to eat. As of today, razor clamming is open from the WA border to Cape Blanco and closed from Cape Blanco to the CA border due to elevated levels of domoic acid. Crabbing is open coastwide.

Closures can happen quickly and may change before Free Fishing Weekend. Remember to call the ODA Shellfish safety hotline at 1-800-448-2474 or check their shellfish ODA Food Safety page before you go.

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Petrey leads Bandon to fourth straight state title

EUGENE — In her illustrious career at Bandon, Marley Petrey set numerous school records (as well as state meet records), helped the Tigers to three consecutive state titles, and scored the most points of an individual in the Class 2A meet as both a freshman and sophomore.

Until Friday, though, she had never won all four of her events in a single state meet.

Petrey capped her career in style with four titles and Bandon easily won its fourth straight team crown at Hayward Field.

"I am so stoked," Petrey said after taking titles in the 100, 200, 300 hurdles and triple jump. "I have been wanting to do this all four years. My freshman year I was so close (she was just edged out in the triple jump while winning the 100, long jump and hurdles)."

But for all of her individual accolades, Petrey was more excited for what she and her teammates did collectively.

"You cannot be much more happy," she said. "It's so amazing. All of our performances really came together to finish the best."

"We had so many girls doing so many things. We all finished so incredibly together."

Bandon scored 98 points, comfortably ahead of runner-up Enterprise (73). The Tigers scored in 11 of the 17 events. In four of them both Petrey and junior Giada Moore placed high.

In the 100 meters, Petrey easily won with a time of 12.54 seconds. Moore was fourth (13.01) and Bandon's Claire Briggs was eighth (13.22). In the 200, Petrey set a new meet record winning in 25.41 seconds. Moore was second in 26.09 and Briggs finished sixth (26.97).

In the 300 hurdles Petrey broke her own meet record with her winning time of 44.05. Moore was fourth in the race (47.29).

Petrey won the triple jump with a leap of 36-1 1/4. Moore

was third with a best leap of 33-7 1/2.

Caitlyn Michalek, like Petrey a senior, placed second in the javelin with a best mark of 130-9. Teammate Addison Jones was eighth (103-1). Michalek also placed seventh in the high jump, clearing 4-9 3/4.

Bandon's other two seniors also contributed. Marlie Carmack finished seventh in the discus on Thursday (99-2) and Safaa Dimitruk was eighth in the 800 on Friday (2:30.20).

Freshman Jael Legutki won the 3,000 on Thursday with a time of 10:39.53 and placed eighth in the 1,500 on Friday (5:02.91).

Dimitruk and Legutki also were part of Bandon's 4x400 relay team that placed fourth (4:18.91.) The other members of the relay team were Briggs and Jada Ryder.

Bandon's boys added to the trophy case as well, placing third in the team race. Weston-McEwen won the team title with 68

points while Enterprise had 59 and the Tigers scored 49.5.

The Tigers got 19 points in the pole vault, where Noah Brown won for the second straight year by clearing a new best 14-2 1/2. Jonah Brown placed fourth (13-3 1/2) and Beckett Pahls taking fifth (13-3 1/2).

Noah Brown was thrilled to set a new best and also to see his teammates on the podium with him for the second straight year.

"It makes me really happy," Noah Brown said of all three placing. "They are great teammates. We are always pushing each other to do the best we can."

Pahls also was third in the 1,500 (4:04.61) and fifth in the 3,000 (9:09.43). Both times were new bests.

Sawyer Miller added a third-place finish in the 800 with a new best 1:59.14.

Miller and Brown combined with Pahls and Tyler Senn to also give Bandon third place in

a close 4x400 relay to close out the meet. The Tigers finished in 3:29.82.

Reggie Turner placed sixth in the 110 hurdles (16.86) and Senn tied for third in the high jump (5-11 1/2).

Myrtle Point had a pair of throwers place in two events.

Freshman Wyatt Richards was the runner-up in the javelin (176-4) and placed third in the discus (140-5).

Senior Jayme Padgett was runner-up in the discus with a new best of 120-8 and placed fourth in the shot put (33-5 3/4).

Reedsport's only placer was the school's only boy in the meet, Adam Mead, who tied for sixth in the high jump (5-9 3/4).

Gold Beach's Cameren Higgins was fifth in the javelin (170-6) for the boys. For the girls, Jane Moon placed fourth in the 1,500 (4:56.88) while Coco Plaep was fourth in the 800 (2:24.97). Both Panthers had new personal bests.

Myrtle Point wins one in baseball playoffs

MYRTLE POINT — Myrtle Point's baseball team used stellar pitching to win its first game in the Class 2A-1A playoffs, beating Toledo 9-1 in the second round last week.

But an injury to the team's ace at the end of that contest proved costly and the Bobcats were eliminated in the quarterfinals for the second year in a row, losing to the combined Monroe/Alsea club 10-2.

Myrtle Point was the No. 5 seed for the playoffs and had a first-round bye before hosting league rival Toledo in the second round.

Myrtle Point ace Jake Sproul pitched into the fourth inning against Toledo, recording all 10 of his outs by strikeout. Fellow pitchers Sawyer Jackson and Skyler Zick combined for five more strikeouts and Myrtle Point allowed just one hit in the game.

Timely hitting helped build the lead and both Jackson and Zick came up with big strikeouts to keep Toledo from cutting into Myrtle Point's lead.

"It feels great," Sproul said. "And I think we've got some good momentum going into Friday, too."

But Sproul had a tender arm after the game and then wasn't able to pitch Friday and Monroe jumped on the Bobcats for six early runs and cruised to the win and a spot in the semifinals against top-ranked Kennedy.

Lane Backman had three hits in the loss, but the Bobcats weren't able to string together hits to counter Monroe's early burst.

It was a contrast to Wednesday's win, when Myrtle Point scored in several innings.

The Boomers intentionally walked Sproul in all four of his plate appearances after he hit two long home runs against them during the regular season. He ended up scoring three of the runs. Zick, Chase Hawley, Kayle Morris and Jackson Gomez had key hits.

Despite the loss in the quarterfinals, it was a great season for the Bobcats, who shared the league title with Toledo with 9-1 records and earned the top seed because they had the better power ranking.

Myrtle Point's seniors were in the playoffs all four years. Sproul, who has signed to play for Umpqua Community College, finished his career with more than 400 strikeouts, seventh best in state history.

The Bulldogs had reached the playoffs by finishing third in the Sky-Em League.

Her winning mark was 136 feet, 4 inches.

Bushnell was grateful she and her softball teammates got to play in the playoffs and that she made it back for the track meet (they arrived in Eugene after midnight Wednesday).

"It was a lot of fun," she said. "I'm sure appreciative of our coaches. They have to get us here."

She was one of two placers for the Powers girls in the meet. Jadelin Warner was seventh in the triple jump (32-4 1/4) and on the track she was sixth in the 200 (27.69) and eighth in the 100 (13.54).

Powers also had two boys place in the meet. Cole Lehnher was third in the shot put (48-11 3/4) and sixth in the discus (135-7). Tyler Fandel of Powers was sixth in the javelin (153-4).

For Pacific, Landon Spalasso

had one of the best reactions of the day Friday when he uncorked a huge throw on his final attempt. He won the javelin with a throw of 186-7.

"I was so happy after that throw," said Spalasso, who transferred from Lakeview to Pacific this year. "I worked all four years of high school to get here and I finally did it."

In addition to winning the javelin, he also placed sixth in the triple jump (41-3 3/4) and fifth in the long jump (20-2 1/4.) All three of his event marks were new personal bests.

"I had an amazing two days," he said.

Pacific's Hannah Long placed in two events, taking fourth in the pole vault, clearing a new best 9-0 1/2. In the high jump, Long also placed fourth, clearing 5-0 1/4.

Henthorn wins stat title for Red Devils

Coquille sophomore Ella Henthorn won her first state title last fall, when she captured the cross country championship.

On Thursday, she affirmed that win by dominating the longest race on the track. Henthorn ran away from the field in the

3,000 meters, winning in 9 minutes and 51.14 seconds.

"My goal was definitely to win," Henthorn said. "I was (also) wanting to get the state record and school record, but it was not the day to do that. I am happy with my race."

The race was never in doubt after Henthorn took off at her fast pace.

Millet cleared a new best 11-1 in the pole vault. She also had a new best in the hurdles (46.96), bouncing back from an injury that slowed her early in the year to place in an event she won as a sophomore.

Wyatt was sixth (50.25) and Day seventh (50.44) in the 400 meters. In the 200, McGriff placed sixth (22.60). And Baugh was seventh in the 300 hurdles (42.72).

Marshfield's Nicoya Pruess also placed, taking eighth in the 800 in a new best 2:00.67.

The Pirates capped the day

with a third-place finish in the 4x400 relay, the squad of Pruess, McGriff, Wyatt and Day finishing in 3:23.25, a season-best time.

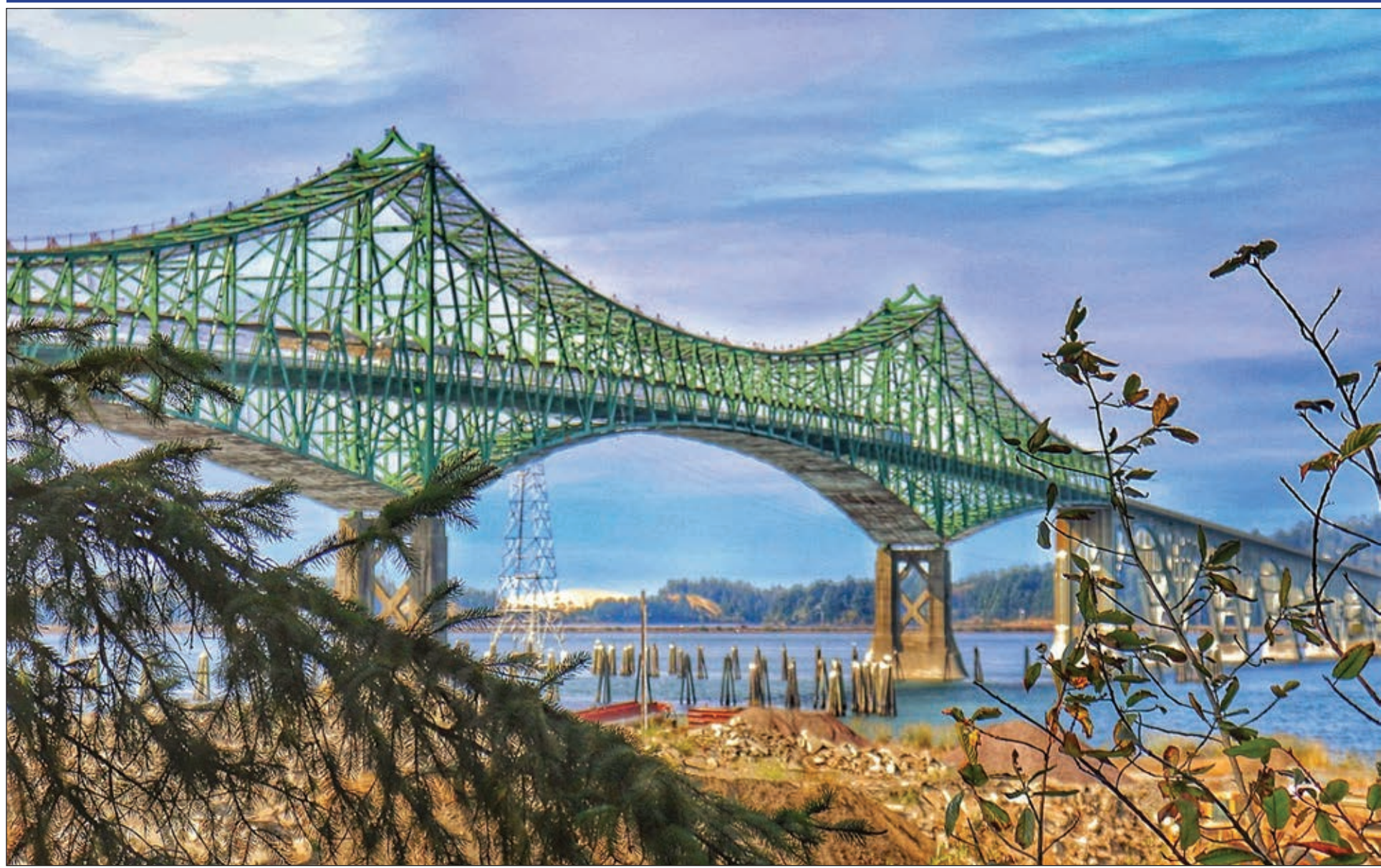

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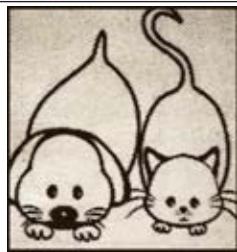

Tuition and fees are proposed to increase by 2.56%, in alignment with Board policy, the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI), and the Consumer Price Index (CPI), while student housing rates will increase by approximately 2.6% to maintain affordability and remain competitive with peer institutions. Improved enrollment trends and billing credit modeling allowed the College to project modest enrollment growth, with billing credits increasing to 42,000 after prior years of decline. At the same time, the College continues to face rising contractual, operational, and inflationary costs, including compensation, benefits, and long-term debt obligations.

communities. The admission price was simple: one Hadacol box top. It played in ballparks, on racetracks, high school football fields — anyplace that had bleachers. At times, the show drew as many as 12,000 people. LeBlanc packed them in with Hollywood A-listers on the bill, Ava Gardner and

Mickey Rooney among them. Singer Hank Williams wrote his hit song “Jambalaya” after hearing Cajun troupe members talking backstage. And the locals lapped it up. Over a 15-month stretch ending in March 1951, LeBlanc sold \$3.6 million worth of his potion — more than \$46 million today. Appearing on the popular “You Bet Your Life” TV show, host

Groucho Marx asked what Hadacol was good for. “It was good for \$5 million for me last year,” LeBlanc quipped. But nobody was laughing when his empire imploded. LeBlanc sold his interest in the cash cow to eager investors for \$8.2 million — more than \$103 million in 2026. As soon as the papers were signed, the new owners discovered they

were in big trouble. The legislator’s business affairs were just as reliable as his “medicine.” Advertising costs were out of control; \$2 million in bills were unpaid; the IRS wanted \$656,000 it was owed; and there was another \$2 million in “accounts receivable.” Hadacol’s collapse was a national scandal. The Federal Trade Commission branded publicity

surrounding the product “false, misleading, and deceptive.” Little wonder, then, that when LeBlanc ran for governor a second time in 1952, his candidacy went down in flames. He gamely carried on, coming out with a final nonalcoholic patent medicine called “Kary On.” But the damage was done. Nobody bought it.

Various owners later tried to revive the Hadacol brand name in the 1970s and 1980s; they all flopped. Scandal is no stranger in the Bayou State, and it’s not enough to bar a public figure from a place of honor. In 1993, more than 20 years after his death, LeBlanc was inducted into the Louisiana Political Museum and Hall of Fame.

There were questions on private prisons in relation to ICE activity, which Wyden tied back into campaign finance reform. Large for-profit prison groups have been massive contributors in the political world, and have reaped huge dividends from the incarceration of ICE detainees. One of the major recurring themes of the hour-or-so town hall was support for the PCIP project. Four different representatives from various trade groups and unions took tickets to ask questions and instead used that time to voice their support for the project and thank the legislators for their work on securing funding for the terminal. Both politicians spun a familiar yarn on the importance of the project.

They both emphasized the importance of bolstering the country’s supply chain, and echoed the idea that the ship-to-rail terminal would take trucks off the road and pave the way for a green(er) kind of port. But the points that hit closest to home on the project involve the long-awaited return of industry. “We used to export timber, now we export our kids,” said Hoyle lamenting the fact that an economic replacement for timber on the South Coast has still yet to arrive, and that promising youth now seek their careers elsewhere. Both espoused their support for the project as a source of family-wage jobs that could sustain a community. The World asked Wyden just how many eggs were in the PCIP’s economic development basket. As required environmental surveys have yet to be

conducted, what else was being explored? “I’ve always said I’ll work with anybody who will lower prices. I think that’s one of the appealing things about the South Coast, is that everybody is paying attention to trying to get this done right and look at other opportunities,” said Wyden, who went on to say that those other opportunities might be. “Clearly clean energy. I wrote the Clean Energy Tax Credit, the biggest investment in finding clean energy in American history. The housing issue I talked about, that’s being funded with Low Income Tax Credits. And I’m the point person for the Democrats on healthcare, which is a major employer here as well. I think all of those things ought to be part of what we do to strengthen the community.”

for something different. There is no such fourth-wall in a Sawdust show; the company actively encourages audience participation to the point where you may just get dragged up on stage yourself. “We have an emcee that introduces to people who are new what we expect from our audience,” said Kreutzer. “Its audience participation. We don’t expect you to sit there and watch, this is not a sit back and be quiet show. We want you to boo, we want you to hiss, we want you to laugh.” That participation is a reflection of the theater’s entire ethos, it’s a holistically communal experience. From the writing of the show, to the hundred and fifty or-so volunteers that make each of them happen, to the audience members who may recognize a reference and holler

about it. “We’ve really gotten to where there’s a true family vibe here, between all the parts of the theater,” said Roberts. “Its not just the play, its not just the olios,” continued Kreutzer. “We are a family, we are a theater, we are Sawdusters. We all interact back here and have a blast.” Nobody reflects that vibe like long-time Sawduster Michael Thurman, who’s official title is Building Manager and Treasurer, though the list of hats he wears is always changing. Thurman, along with Sheba, the company’s three-legged dog and unofficial mascot, gave a full tour of the theater and its backstage spaces. When a 1994 fire took out the original home of the Sawdusters, they rebuilt. With support from the city and community the new building was opened for its first season in 2000. Now, the walls are lined

with photos and posters from every show in Sawdust history. “It takes about a hundred, hundred and fifty people to do a show every year,” explained Thurman. “We have almost 3000 volunteers listed from over the years. A lot of the people have been here a long time.” The Sawdust invites you to be a part of that long legacy and join them for this year’s production as a part of one of the oldest melodrama traditions on the West Coast. There is a benefit show for the Coquille Rotary Club on Friday, June 5 ahead of opening night on Saturday June 6. Then, a show Ateevery Saturday night at 7 pm until Labor Day, with a few Sunday matinees sprinkled in. Tickets are available in person, online at Sawdust-Theatre.com or via phone at (541) 396-4563.

I found a neat picture of Wilsons Superette (now Wilsons Market) 50 years ago while going through my extensive negative collection, and I realize that it is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, businesses in Bandon. A search on the internet indicated it was built in 1938, a couple of years after the fire. I remember the many years that Agnes Wilson and her family owned the store, which is on June Avenue, half a block off the highway. It is now owned by city councilor Archie Garrett and his family, and they've expanded into Coos Bay with a second market. Both are best known for their expansive menu of delicious take-out food. Prior to that and after the Fire of 1936, the city hall was located at Highway 101 and Fillmore, now the home of the Bandon History Museum. 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ODOT unveils new Coast bike map and safety campaign

Just in time for Oregon's busy spring and summer travel season, the Oregon Department of Transportation is releasing a newly redesigned Oregon Coast Bicycle Route map alongside a new safety awareness campaign reminding drivers how to safely share the road with people riding bicycles.

This is the first major refresh of the map in a decade and a reminder to travelers about a 40-year-old law many people may not know.

"This map invites people on bicycles to experience Oregon's stunning coastal landscape while providing essential information for a safe and enjoyable trip," said Ian Davidson, Bicycle and Pedestrian Program Manager. "Paper maps remain timeless for riders planning and enjoying their rides on the coast."

People living in Oregon can pre-order a copy of the map by emailing their mailing address to: pedbikepublications@odot.oregon.gov.

To complement the map and recognize National Bicycle Safety Month,

ODOT launched a public awareness campaign focused on educating people driving and bicycling to stay safe on the roads. The main message: People on bicycles may use the full lane. Slow down, be patient and give extra space.

"Generally, most people bicycling stay as far right as safe or practical. But people on bicycles may use the full lane, to avoid obstacles, narrow roads and drop-off shoulders," said Heidi Manlove, Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Program Manager. "While driving, be patient and only pass a bicycle when it's safe."

ODOT's safety campaign includes billboard messaging along major travel corridors and popular coastal routes to help educate travelers about safely sharing the road. With more people expected on coastal highways and scenic roads in the coming months, ODOT is encouraging people to travel safely and understand Oregon's bicycle laws.

How to safely drive around a person riding a bicycle

1. Be patient and hold back for a safe place to pass that provides plenty of space.
 2. Once it's clear, move fully into the next lane.
 3. As you pass, keep your speed at 5 miles below the speed limit.
 4. Wait until you see the person bicycling in your rearview mirror before moving back into your lane.
 5. Remember: Oregon law allows drivers to cross a double-yellow line to safely pass a person on a bicycle when it is clear and safe to do so.
- Safety tips for people riding bicycles
- Use a white front light and red rear light, even during the day.
 - Wear bright or reflective clothing to help drivers see you.
 - Ride in the same direction as traffic.
 - Obey all traffic signs, signals, and lane markings.
 - Use hand signals so others can anticipate your moves.
 - Ride in a straight, predictable line.
 - Be careful in intersections —slow down, check for turning vehicles.

Oregon voters reject gas tax

Oregonians are on track to overwhelmingly reject

hikes to the state's gas tax, payroll tax and vehicle registration and title fees that would have gone toward funding the maintenance and operations of public roads and bridges.

Initial election results from the Oregon Secretary of State's Office shortly after 8 p.m. showed the measure failing by a 4:1 margin.

Had it succeeded, the measure would have doubled most vehicle registration fees, raised the gas tax from 40 cents to 46 cents, raised title fees from \$77 to \$216 and doubled the payroll tax used for public transit from 0.1% of a paycheck to 0.2% until 2028.

For cities and counties, the rejection means they won't be receiving more funding deeply needed to fix many sidewalks and potholes, particularly in rural areas. Half of the money raised by the gas tax, car registration fees and title fees goes to cities and counties.

"Without sustainable revenue, counties will face increasingly difficult decisions that directly impact road user safety and increase long-term costs to the public, such as making long-overdue safety improvements on

She deeply loved her immediate and extended family. Many decades were filled with family campouts, holidays, and gatherings. She especially enjoyed the annual “ladies retreat” where the women, on her mom's side, all got together.

Oregon's most dangerous rural roads, ensuring county road departments can maintain staffing levels and avoid operations and maintenance cuts and preserving investments counties have made in our shared transportation system," Association of Oregon Counties spokesperson Erin Good said in an email.

Measure 120's unpopularity doesn't come as a surprise. Nearly 250,000 Oregonians frustrated by potential gas tax hikes signed the petition that placed the measure on the ballot. Plus, gas tax hikes in Oregon are historically unpopular. Oregon voters have rejected gas tax hike proposals on the ballot more than five times since 1928.

The vote also comes as gas prices continue to rocket upward because of the Iran war. As of Tuesday, motor club AAA tracked average prices in Oregon at \$5.34 per gallon — more than 80 cents higher than the national average and \$1.38 more than May 2025.

What's next for transportation funding? Kotek earlier this month

convened 12 transportation and business experts and tasked them with finding a solution to Oregon's transportation funding crisis.

The workgroup is trying to solve the same problem lawmakers tried to in 2025: How to sustainably fund road maintenance and operations across the state.

The issue has plagued lawmakers since January 2025, when lawmakers had six months during the legislative session to find ways to raise revenue for the Oregon Department of Transportation or otherwise face a budget deficit. By June, Republicans and Democrats couldn't reach a compromise, and Gov. Tina Kotek had to call for a special session in the fall for Democrats to finally have the votes needed to pass a significantly smaller transportation funding plan.

That transportation package would have raised \$4.3 billion for the Oregon Department of Transportation over the next decade, including \$791 million in the 2025-27 budget cycle, but most of that anticipated revenue was halted when the coalition led by Diehl, Sen. Bruce Starr, R-Dundee and Taxpayer Association of Oregon founder Jason Williams

petitioned to place that law on the ballot.

Oregon legislators last voted to raise the gas tax in 2017, with a 10-cent increase phased in over six years. Since then, the cost of transportation materials and labor has gone up and more Oregonians are driving electric or fuel efficient vehicles, which means the state has gradually collected less revenue from the gas tax despite those vehicles contributing to the wear and tear of public roads.

Kotek's workgroup will present its final recommendations by the end of the year. Those recommendations will guide lawmakers in the 2027 legislative session.
