ICE inquiries over potential facility sparks concerns amongst locals

Rumors about US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) interest in a detention facility somewhere in Coos County bubbled to the surface last week when County Commissioner Drew Farmer addressed discussions he'd had with contractors during a Facebook live stream on Wednesday, February 24.

While there is currently no indication of a formal proposal being made for such a facility, ICE's pursuit of land on the coast has been clear since their failed attempt to set up operations at the Newport Municipal Airport late last year. Both citizens and city officials pushed back on this proposal after their resident Coast Guard helicopter was moved to vacate that space.

Farmer's approach to the situation came off as a practical one, trying to get ahead of potential ICE operations in the area, and direct them to where they would be least impactful on local populations and infrastructure. Though he made his personal opinion on ICE's tactics clear.

"As folks will already identify, as I mentioned, not a fan of how ICE conducts itself, how it does its operations right now. I think they're sloppy, poor allocation of resources, wrong people, wrong places," said Farmer during his livestream. "But if a facility is going to happen in Coos County, how do we manage that situation? It's already obviously being seriously explored. So, I had a conversation with contractors."

With the access to runways a priority for this kind of detention center, it is no surprise to hear that Coos County is on the list. Proximity to Southwest Oregon Regional Airport (OTH) centered discussions on three possible sites, according to local sources.

The first involves renovation and lease of the third-floor at the Coos County Jail. The County's Board of Commissioners, alongside Sheriff Gabe Fabrizio and District Attorney Jody Newby, voiced their desire to avoid cooperation with ICE back in February of 2025, when discussions over whether to comply with detainee requests were held. Though, the jail's financial struggles and pod closures have been well-documented.

The second possible site is the former Shutter Creek Correctional Facility. Leased to the state from the federal government, the minimum-security state prison was closed in 2022. That lease was maintained when it transferred to the Oregon Department of State Lands in 2023, transitioning the facility into a headquarters for Elliot State Research Forest. That would likely rule this out at a possible site.

The third is a roughly 30-acre, federally-owned parcel of land just outside of Lakeside. Farmer identified this as the most tolerable of the three given it's the furthest removed from population density, and potential kickbacks that will help with Lakeside's budget. However, even if it were to be built, the facility would be temporary at best. Nationwide,

these detention centers would likely not survive the next administration, if they even make it past this year's midterms.

Calling ICE's detention and deportation tactics controversial would go without saying. Reports on these detention centers across the country point to inhumane conditions, with ICE refusing proper oversight from legislators and local officials. An influx of both detainees and ICE agents, as well as any protests in response to their presence, would put a strain on local law enforcement and aging infrastructure.

The City's of North Bend and Lakeside held special meetings

in executive session on Wednesday and Thursday respectively, last week. Officials at the City of Lakeside were reached out to for comment, but neither City has released an official statement at the time of writing.

Farmer would later take down his Facebook video citing a lack of clarity causing panic amongst the community. He communicated intent to provide that clarity through written communication sometime soon. In the comments, he tried to provide some peace of mind to those who felt a facility was imminent, stating that he got jumpy and the "threat was gone".

"I talked to [Congresswoman]

Val Hoyle earlier, it's my understanding that [border czar] Tom Homan has told her that there is no plan to put a detention facility in Oregon," wrote Farmer. Commenters expressed their lack of faith that Homan is being honest.

Oregon has been classified as a sanctuary state since the 80's, with local officials prohibited from assisting in federal deportation operations.

Not Slowing Down: Coquille Tribe announces further development following re-opening of restaurant

Just a week after opening the doors of their newest endeavor, the Coquille Tribe announced their next development project was already well underway. Work on the Ko-Kwel Casino Resort has been non-stop in recent months, with the newly remodeled Plank House Restaurant re-opening its doors in February.

The huge development push coincided with the rebranding efforts that took place last summer. On the 30th anniversary of the Mill Casino's opening, it was announced that the North Bend staple would be proudly reflecting its tribal heritage with a new moniker. The Plank House is the first in a long list of things to come.

The tribe most recently announced a groundbreaking will take place on their new Travel Center this spring. Intended to accommodate those traveling up and down Highway 101, the center is planned to include a gas station and retail offerings right across the way from the casino.

"Every investment we make is rooted in our responsibility to provide opportunity, stability, and prosperity for our Tribal citizens," said Brenda Meade, Chairman of the Coquille Indian Tribe.

The tribe announced they would be opening Oregon's very first tribal-owned distillery last year. Expected by the end of 2025, Ko-Kwel Spirits will include full-service bars, a cigar lounge, and indoor golf suite. It will be the cornerstone business as part of a full new outdoor promenade that will have other retail spaces available. Tastings of the Ko-Kwel branded spirits are already available at the Plank House, which contains a separate tasting room in addition to its

dining spaces and bar. The travel center is just the latest in what the tribe hopes will be a continuation of their economic development in the area.

"This Travel Center is a strategic addition to the Tribe's growing business portfolio," said Margaret Simpson, Chief Executive Officer of Coquille Economic Development. "Its prime location on Highway 101 creates a powerful gateway for regional tourism, capturing traveler traffic, encouraging guests to explore our properties,

and reinforcing the South Coast as a destination. Just as importantly, it allows us to reinvest in our people, support local businesses, and contribute to the vitality of the broader community we share."

The tribe announced that there will be more details coming in the lead up to construction including hiring information and more specific timelines. Bringing further tourism to the South Coast is an endeavor that benefits the whole area.

"This development strength-

ens our economic foundation while generating the revenue that supports essential Tribal programs, services, and opportunities for current and future generations," said Meade.

"Investments like this strengthen the viability of our enterprises, expand economic opportunities, and provide meaningful benefits to our community. We are proud to welcome visitors to our homelands with the quality and hospitality that define the Coquille people."

HOLY COW! HISTORY:

The Man Who Married Peanut Butter and Chocolate

There's trouble in Candy Land these days. At least in one corner of it.

A nasty spat is brewing between confectionery behemoth Hershey and the grandson of the man who created its biggest-selling product.

Brad Reese says the famous sweet treat that bears his family's name is veering away from grandpa's original recipe. He recently alleged in a letter to a Hershey's honcho that the company is substituting milk chocolate with compound coatings and putting peanut crême in place of peanut butter.

Hershey's quickly and staunchly defended its market leader, insisting that the candy remains the same, although it acknowledges some of its ingredients are being tweaked.

This is no tempest in a sugar bowl. Reese's Peanut Butter Cups are not only Hershey's star product, but they're also America's best-selling candy. The Reese's factory in Hershey, Pa., produces 15 million peanut butter cups daily, and the brand generates more than \$3.75 billion in revenue in

the United States. Which begs the question: Given that the sweet is so widely popular, how much do you know about the man who came up with it?

H.B. Reese didn't try to become a titan in the world of Big Chocolate. But he began his career working for one.

Reese had grown up on his family's Pennsylvania dairy farm. So, it was only natural when, in 1918, Milton Hershey, of Hershey's Milk Chocolate fame, asked him to manage the Round Barn farm operation. It featured brand-new milking machines. However, the devices proved too expensive to be cost-effective, and Hershey pulled the plug (literally and figuratively) on the operation a year later.

Reese was now unemployed, 40, and head of a growing family — in the most literal sense. He and his wife, Blanche, would ultimately have 16 children. Reese's mother and two aunts lived with them, too. Mealtime in the Reese home was a feeding frenzy, with at least 20 and sometimes as many as 40 people at the table.

With nearly two dozen mouths to feed, Reese decided to give

candy-making a try. He set up shop in an old canning factory in Hummelstown, Pa., and began making milk chocolate-covered almonds and raisins. Although sales were encouraging, the business ultimately failed.

Reese was forced to take a job in a paper mill. Unable to cover the bills, he moonlighted as a butcher. And then a third job on top of that, canning vegetables.

In 1921, Reese returned to working for Hershey, this time in the shipping department. Blanche's dad bought the family a home. Things were looking up. But Reese had caught the candy-making bug and couldn't shake it. Working in his basement, he began producing an array of confectionary creations. For instance, there was the Lizzy Bar (named for a daughter) and the Johnny Bar (named for a son who also worked at the Hershey plant).

Two years later, Reese charged back into the candy business. Two and five-pound boxes were sold, with Reese even setting up tables in department store display windows so shoppers could see how sweets were made.

Business was good. But Reese

wasn't getting rich. He needed something that would set his candy apart from the competition. A few years later, he finally found it.

A customer complained to him about another confectioner's chocolate-covered peanut butter treat. Shoppers were interested, but the supply was erratic. Could Reese come up with something reliable?

After tinkering around his factory's kitchen, Reese stumbled upon the solution: put the peanut butter inside a special chocolate container. And with that, Reese's Peanut Butter Cups made its debut in 1928.

It was an instant hit. The cups sold for a penny and came in a wrapper that carried a subtle swipe at Reese's former employer, "Made in Chocolate Town, so they must be good."

Sales were so brisk — during the Great Depression, no less, when candy was a luxury — that Reese was able to pay off both his home and factory mortgages in 1935.

When rationing severely limited the availability of sugar during World War II, Reese dropped all other products and made only his

popular peanut butter cup. By the time he passed away in 1956, eight days before his 77th birthday, H.B. Reese was a rich man. Eight years later, in a move that brought his company full circle, his sons merged the family business with the Hershey Co. Will the company and Reese's grandson eventually smooth over their differences? Who knows? But this much is certain: America's sweet tooth fondness for grandpa's creation isn't likely to go away anytime soon.



Powers girls advance to state tournament

POWERS — With two big wins in four days, the Powers girls basketball team secured a trip to the Class 1A state tournament in Baker City.

The Cruisers beat Trout Lake of Washington 54-31 in the first round of the playoffs Wednesday and then topped visiting Harper Charter 52-38 in the second round Saturday.

That means Powers will be at the final site for the first time since 1996, when the Cruisers were runners-up. They won the state title in 1995.

Powers, which features five juniors, a senior and a sophomore, had lost playoff games on the road each of the past two years.

"I'm so happy to make it past the first round," junior Danika Bushnell said after the win over Trout Lake. "It's pretty awesome to win a playoff game. We changed our style this year. It's nice to see how all the hard work has paid off."

Even though the Cruisers have just seven players, they all play a lot of minutes and use pressure defense and a quick running style.

"They're just seven girls who work hard," Powers coach KamBria Swenson said. "They're tiny and they're fast."

And they have a strong determination.

"We just have girls that aren't going to let us lose," Swenson said. "They are going to put the (superhero) cape on and say, 'We aren't going to let it happen.'"

Against Trout Lake, the Cruisers led just 15-13 late in the second quarter, but scored 18 points in a row to effectively put the game out of reach.

Powers scored the last six points of the first half and the first 12 of the second half, all in about 4 1/2 minutes of game time.

Bushnell was a big part of that, hitting three 3-pointers and scoring 14 points in the third quarter on the way to a 24-point night.

She and her teammates forced several turnovers in the opening moments of the second half to seize momentum.

"We didn't want to lose," Bushnell said. "Our mentality was we have to come out fast and strong and we can't let down again. We let down in the second quarter."

The Cruisers caused problems with their defense much of the night, which is typical of their style of play.

"They're just seven girls who work hard," Swenson said. "They're tiny and they're fast."

In addition to forcing numerous turnovers, Powers limited Trout Lake's top scorer, Emma Patterson, to a single 3-pointer and five total points.

"The No. 1 thing we were trying to take away tonight was not letting 23 shoot the ball," Swenson said, referring to Patterson's uniform number.

The Powers coach was impressed with the Mustangs, who looked a lot like the Cruisers in terms of style.

"That Trout Lake team, they were tough," Swenson said. "They work hard, dive on the floor, get after it. That's the way we play."

Eden Patterson led the Mustangs with 12 points, but they struggled to find consistent scoring.

Meanwhile, Powers had its best outside shooting night in several games.

Danika Bushnell had four 3-pointers, Starlena Pina two and Kendra Bushnell one.

"Tonight, they finally put it together shooting wise," Swenson said.

KaiLey Jo Swenson, the team's only senior, had 12 points, Pina eight and EmilLia Swenson five.

On Saturday, it was Kendra Bushnell's turn to wear the cape, KamBria Swenson said.

Kendra Bushnell had four 3-pointers and scored 16 points to lead Powers, which overcame a slow start.

Powers trailed 14-13 through one quarter but pulled ahead 30-25 at halftime and outscored Harper Charter 22-13 in the second half to pull away.

"Our nerves got the best of us that first quarter," KamBria Swenson said. "We had too many turnovers and made some little mistakes."

"We settled and made a couple adjustments that helped us pull ahead bit by bit."

Danika Bushnell and KaiLey Jo Swenson had 12 points each and EmilLia Swenson added seven. Starlena Pina hit a big 3-pointer in the second quarter that gave the Cruisers momentum to charge ahead.

"Every single person contributed something on the floor, whether it was on ball defense, rebounding, hedging screens, helping on defense," KamBria Swenson said. "The girls executed our game plan well and took care of their jobs."

"Danika was our motor tonight, keeping us on track and keeping us organized. Starlena hit one at a crucial moment that sent our momentum

surging ahead."

Lindsay Talbot had 15 points for the Hornets.

Before Wednesday's game, Powers had played just eight games at home and 19 on the road all year. KamBria Swenson built the schedule in a way that she hoped Powers would have a high enough power ranking to host the first two rounds, and it worked with the Cruisers as the No. 8 seed.

"These girls were road warriors," Swenson said. "We put almost 5,500 miles on the school bus to be home for the two playoff games."

Powers also got a huge win in the Skyline League championship game over regular-season champion Umpqua Valley Christian that boosted the Cruisers to No. 8 in the final rankings, the spot they needed to get two home games.

That win was equally important for confidence.

"It was huge, believing they could do it," Swenson said.

The Cruisers got to enjoy big home crowds. The gym was nearly overflowing Wednesday, with a crowd estimated at 250.

"Our community supports us so much," Danika Bushnell said.

KamBria Swenson said she has been coaching the girls on the squad since the juniors were third-graders and remembers back then telling parents they might struggle that first season but they were going to learn to shoot correctly and grasp all the other fundamentals that are so important in basketball.

"I said we're going to lose every game this year to win later," the coach said.

That came true with the two big wins leading to the state tournament berth.

At Baker City, the Cruisers will play top-ranked Imbler, which beat Mapleton 63-35 on Saturday. They meet in the first quarterfinal Thursday at 1:30 p.m. The second quarterfinal features Crane and Jordan Valley. Crane won at Southwest Christian 40-39 and Jordan Valley beat Skyline League runner-up Umpqua Valley Christian 43-29.

The 6:30 p.m. game features Country Christian and Echo. Country Christian beat Elgin 47-43 and Echo topped North Lake 45-39.

The final game pits Union against North Clackamas Christian. Union won at Dufur 50-47 and North Clackamas Christian beat Powder Valley 67-33.





As I See It

It seemed like an impossible feat, but less than a week after Bandon was destroyed by fire on Sept. 26, 1936, an ad in the next week's Western World told the public that Haga & Church, a local grocery store, would be open for business "next week." (first photo).

"Our Grocery Store and Meat Market were licked up click and clean, but we are still here and we are here to stay. Carpenters are already busy erecting temporary quarters at the Northwest corner of Second and Baltimore (second picture) and we expect to be open and ready to serve our patrons and friends by the middle of next week. Yours, for a bigger and better Bandon. Haga & Church, Groceries; Harry Houghton, Meat Market." Directly in the center of the photo, you can see the walls of the building, that later became Croxall & Perry Grocery before it was owned for over 50 years by Dave Elliott who operated Dave's TV. Today the "temporary quarters" have been remodeled, outside and inside, by Tom Stadelman and house a gallery. At the far right in the photo, you can see one of the three or four buildings that survived the fire ... the First National Bank building which today houses The Cobbler's Bench. At the left is the Stephen Hotel/Seaside Bakery building which today is the home of Cranberry Sweets. In the distance is the Coast Lumber Yard, which was torn down decades after the fire and is now home to a city parking lot.

The third picture, taken in 1982, shows long-time city attorney Myron Spady cooking hamburgers at city park during a visit by the Pickle Family Circus. My guess is that he was probably in the Lions club booth as he was a dedicated Lion until he died in 2021 at the age of 97, having moved his family here in 1950.

Wednesday, Feb. 18, shortly after 9 a.m., police were dispatched to a report of suspicious circumstances in Bandon City Park. Due to the park's proximity to local schools and out of what was described as an abundance of caution, area schools were placed in a lock-in while officers investigated, according to a police department press release. "After a thorough investigation, it appears the call was not associated with any credible threat, and there is no ongoing danger to the public. We appreciate the cooperation of our schools and community members as officers worked to ensure everyone's safety," said the police spokesman.

Another incident posted Sunday credited the Coos County Sheriff's Office and their K9 Poe with the capture of a wanted subject near Bandon. Jessica Eberhart, 40, Bandon, was arrested on an outstanding warrant.

"Thank you to K9 Poe and handler Sgt. Boswell for helping the Bandon Police Department track and arrest the individual who fled from Bandon Police while having outstanding warrants for her arrest," said the department spokesman.

In other local police action, on Feb. 22, around 12:45 p.m., Sergeant Boswell and Deputy Converse were dispatched to an area of Seven Devils Road and County Road 166 near Bandon to the report of a dispute taking place. As a result of the investigation, Robert L. Schnur, 33, Bandon, was arrested for Menacing (domestic) and

Assault 4 (domestic) and transported to the Coos County Jail.

At 6 a.m. on Feb. 20, the Bandon Fire Department was called out to a residence in the 1000 block of Beach Loop Drive for a "strong smell of smoke." The reporting person said the fire was out, but smoke was visible in the garage. When the fire department arrived on scene, they were unable to "size-up the scene" because the lights were out. This is a two-story house, and it appeared that the breaker box burned up. They checked for extensions and cleared the scene at 6:30.

Another scanner report Saturday at 1 p.m., indicated that CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) was in progress at Bandon Crossing Golf Course. The Bandon Police Department and the Coos County Sheriff's Office were responding to the medical emergency with an ambulance.

A post on Facebook by the Bandon Police Department let neighbors know that they might hear a brief rifle salute as part of the tribute honoring Bob's life of service performed by the VFW Honor Guard.

Sharing duties as hosts were Randy Texley, Reg Pullen and Barry Winters, with many others joining them in paying tribute to Bob, who was a member of the BHS Class of 1968.

A wonderful meal was prepared by Lori Osborne and her staff.

* * *
At a recent city council meeting, the council asked how many second homes occupied by part-time Bandon residents are inspected as part of the city's vacation check service. City staff contacted Chief Cory Dhillon for the answer. I am going to share a shortened version of the chief's response.

"The Bandon Police Department does not conduct routine checks on vacation homes or vacant homes. Rather, upon request, the department



conducts periodic checks on the primary residence of a Bandon resident who has notified the Department that they will be away for a short, defined period. These checks are performed on a limited basis and only as staffing levels and call volume allow.

"Due to limited staffing resources and the Department's primary responsibility for patrol operations, community safety, and crime prevention, the Bandon Police Department does not commit personnel or resources to monitoring vacation homes that may remain unoccupied for months at a time.

"The BPD conducts requested checks on residents' primary homes for short periods of absence and monitors properties that are clearly abandoned and subject to repeated trespass or criminal activity. The Department does not investigate or track vacation home occupancy," said the chief.





A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder

An uproarious evening of music, murder, and fun is coming to the Liberty Theatre through the Little Theatre on the Bay's production of *A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder*. to wealth, title, and the love of two ladies (played by Aymee Pedder and Ana Arbarca). The Broadway production, written by Robert L. Freedman and Steven Lutvak, won the Tony award for Best Musical in 2014

John Adamson, who's directed and performed in many local productions, including *Shrek*, *The Sound of Music*, and *Oliver!*, is the musical director for *Gentleman's Guide*. The cast also includes Kristina Seleshanko as the elderly woman who sends Monty down this devious path, as well as Jacob Renard, Petra Ivanitsky, Harlan Morse, J. Anahlaya Johnson, Jessica Bacon, and Jason Goodson who play a myriad of comical characters in the show.

"The music is unique and unlike any modern show soundtracks I've heard, and there are so many quirky settings and situations," Rescorla says, then laughs. "It's very silly and fun - but also, it has heart. It's just a ton of fun."
