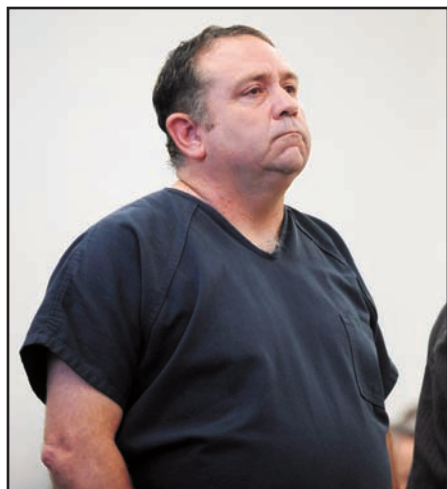

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Ex-teacher charged with sex crimes

BANDON — Over the last quarter century, Charles Eugene McLauchlin Jr. — known as “Mr. M” to his students — has been part of the Bandon School District. Thursday, July 25, he was arraigned on 25 counts of second-degree sex abuse for an alleged relationship he had with one of those students.

McLauchlin’s investigation has been ongoing since last August. While he was put on paid administrative leave as a teacher last fall, McLauchlin remained as an employee of Harbor Lights Middle School as a computer repairman and troubleshooter.

The school district says it followed proper procedure during the time of a sex abuse investigation surrounding the

former science teacher and running coach at Harbor Lights Middle School.

Bandon Police Department first began investigating McLauchlin Aug. 30, 2012. That investigation didn’t yield an arrest because no victim came forward on the record. Still, police stayed open to any new information in the case.

“We always leave cases open,” said Police Chief Bob Webb on July 25.

Prior to the investigation, McLauchlin had stepped down from his duties as cross country coach at Bandon High School for “reasons including recent time in the hospital,” Bandon Western World reported Aug. 23. McLauchlin, 55, was put on paid administrative leave shortly after the police began their investigation.

OPRD holds land swap open house

BANDON — Oregon Parks and Recreation Department staff will hold two open houses to discuss a proposed property exchange involving part of the Bandon State Natural Area. One meeting will be held in Bandon on Friday, Aug. 16, and the other will be in Mt. Vernon in Grant County on Monday, Aug. 19. Both meetings will be 7 - 9 p.m.

Staff will share more information and answer questions about the proposal to trade 280 acres of the 878-acre Bandon State Natural Area to Bandon Biota, a private landholding entity owned by Michael Keiser, owner of Bandon Dunes and other local golf courses. Bandon Biota proposes to use part of the land to create a 27-hole walking links golf course.

Under the proposal, Bandon Biota would pay at least \$300,000 for gorse control on nearby state park properties, transfer two land parcels near Bandon totaling 208 acres into the state park system, and pay as much as \$2.95 million to help purchase two other properties: oceanfront property in Lincoln County known as Whale Cove, and 6,100 acres in Grant County near Mt. Vernon for use as a future state park.

Staff will present maps and other information on the properties during the open houses and answer questions:

Friday, Aug. 16, 7 - 9 p.m., Bandon Community Center (The Barn), 1200 11th St. S.W.

Monday, Aug. 19, 7 - 9 p.m., Mt. Vernon Community Hall, 640 Ingle St.

The Oregon State Parks and Recreation Commission met in Coos Bay on July 17 to hear public feedback,

Bandon artists restore mural in Port Orford

PORT ORFORD — Bandon artist Vicki Affatati is at it again.

Affatati, who spearheaded a project to restore Jack Champayne murals in the Bandon area, is now restoring a movie mural on the side of the Savoy Theatre on U.S. Highway 101 in Port Orford.

The artists began work on the mural last week, painting an undercoat, which

will be followed by filling in the details of the painting. Inmate accused of assault

COQUILLE — A Bandon man who was already in jail for an alleged robbery has added to his list of charges by striking a murder suspect while both were in Coos County Jail, officials said.

Samuel V. Goldfaden was charged with fourth-degree assault and harassment July 21 for an attack on Coos County jail inmate Jesse Longhenry. Longhenry is awaiting trial for murder that will begin in January.

Goldfaden, 56, is charged with first-degree robbery and unlawful use of a weapon. He’s accused of stealing money from Wilson’s Market in Bandon at gunpoint June 28.

According to the charges, Goldfaden came into Wilson’s with his shirt over the bottom of his face and had his other hand behind his back.

Goldfaden allegedly apologized to the clerk as he approached the cash register, then swung his arm from behind his back and aimed a black, semi-automatic pistol at the man as he demanded money.

Goldfaden was found the following day and booked into Coos County Jail.

After last week’s alleged jail assault, Goldfaden posted bail and was released on the robbery charge July 24.

Then Monday, July 29, he was booked and released for the fourth-degree assault and harassment charges in less than three minutes.

If convicted, Goldfaden will serve a minimum of 90 months in jail without any chance to shorten his sentence through good behavior or alternatives.

Goldfaden will be back in court Aug. 12 for a pre-trial hearing.

History of Bandon talk

The Bandon community has survived many natural disasters and changes. Pullen is co-author of the new book “Bandon,” with fellow port commissioner Robert Stevens Miller III.

Solar EV charging station generating surplus power

BANDON — Since it was activated on March 13, the solar panels on the electric vehicle charging station adjacent to City Hall have generated a total of 4,654 kWh of electric power.

That's according to City Manager Matt Winkel, who added that the electric power generated by the charging

station represents an avoidance of 6,519 pounds of carbon dioxide, which is equivalent to the energy required to power the average home for 22 weeks or operate a TV for four years.

There have been a total of 109 electric vehicle charging sessions utilizing 1,195 kWh of power, Winkel said.

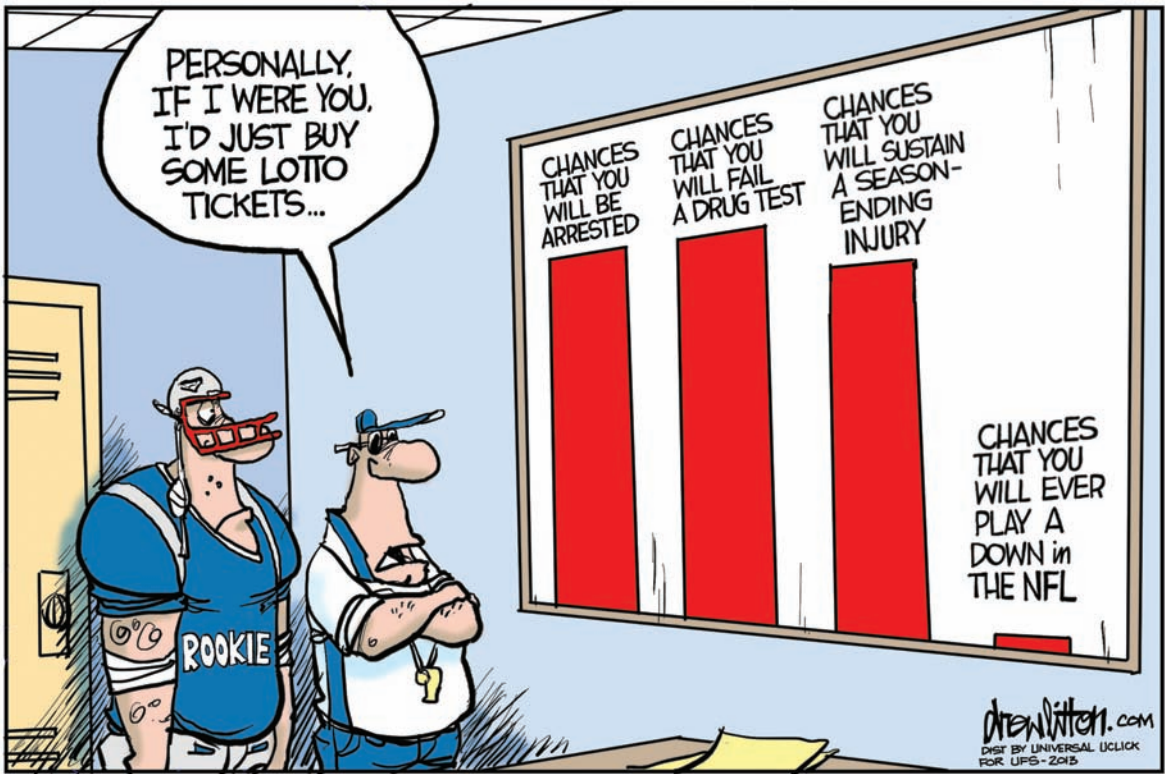

Personalize your get-home bag

If you’ve been reading this column over the past several months, you’re already on board with the theme, “Get A Kit, Make A Plan, Be Informed.”

Let’s face it, most people know that they need to have some things set aside at home just in case the power goes out, but let’s discuss what happens when you’re not home and a disaster happens.

Several months back I shared a story about how I was unable to get home from work on one occasion. Although I didn’t have to sleep on the floor of my office, I did have a toothbrush, razor and other items that helped me get by until I could get home.

I live in Myrtle Point and commute to work in Bandon every day. My wife works in Coos Bay, so both of us are away from home a large share of time. The odds are very good of something happening while we are away from home. Some time ago, our son challenged us with this question: “If a disaster were to occur while you were at work, would you have what you needed to survive long enough to get home?”

Now, a few years have passed and my bag has grown. Since then, I am rarely without it. It goes to work with me, if I leave town for a few days I’ve got it with me. Like many folks my age, I take certain medications that keep my system on an even keel. In the event I’m stranded somewhere, then I would need my pills and have included a few days’ supply of my meds in the kit.

You may have guessed there are kits available to purchase. Someone gave me a three-day kit about the size of a kid’s lunch box. It is very tidy, compact and actually has enough to get by in a pinch. It contains a little first aid kit, some food bars, a couple of water

pouches and some odds and ends. I don’t carry it with me. Rather, I use it for demonstration purposes. Everyone’s kit will look differently

based on your individual needs.

As usual I recommend building your own kit. That way you will become invested in this project, rather than let someone decide for you what you’re going to need. I suggest you go online and check out the kits that catch your eye and get ideas to put in your own kit. Those ready-made kits are going to contain items you will never use. When you assemble your own you will have given some thought to every single item.

You can begin with a medium-sized backpack, some extra clothing items, some toiletries and a few food items. From there use your imagination. Play the “what-if” game. How about an extra pair of eyeglasses or an eyeglass repair kit? A sewing kit? Always include a first aid kit with easy-to-access Band-Aids and Tylenol. Those will be the items you reach for most often. Don’t forget a good quality, compact flashlight, maybe a small box of candles (and matches or disposable lighter). You’re starting to get the idea. Be careful, this thing will grow. Mine did.

declined to comment whether McLauchlin’s administrative leave was the result of medical issues or the pending investigation at that time.

“Due to the fact that we are dealing with a confidential, internal personnel issue, we cannot offer further comment,” Buche said in an email July 26.

School board member Francis Stadelman said the decision to put McLauchlin on leave came solely from Buche, though she kept school board members in the loop about the process.

“Many public employees — and in other venues — are put on administrative leave sometimes for a pretty long period of time

before the rubber hits the road,” Stadelman said.

The school board member added he believed McLauchlin’s medical issues “had no bearing on his administrative leave.”

McLauchlin went on to retire from the school district in February. Buche declined to comment whether the retirement was forced or the choice of McLauchlin.

As part of his retirement, McLauchlin received his full benefits as a member of Oregon’s Public Employee Retirement System.

PERS spokesperson David Crosley said there is no Oregon law that can prevent a public employee from receiving full retire-

ment benefits, regardless of a criminal investigation or conviction.

Prior to his retirement but while the sexual abuse investigation was ongoing, McLauchlin continued to do computer repairs at Harbor Lights Middle School in fall 2012.

“He was not here when school was in session,” Buche said via email July 25.

Brent Hutton took over for McLauchlin as the high school cross country coach around this time. He said he was not aware of the situation surrounding McLauchlin’s departure. His runners and McLauchlin would cross paths occasionally while running at practice, but

those interactions were limited to nothing more than “Hi, Mr. M,” Hutton said.

While he worked with McLauchlin, Hutton said he didn’t see anything he would describe as incriminating. Hutton was advised McLachlin would not be around after he was put on leave.

“They didn’t tell me, ‘Watch for this, watch for that.’ They just said, ‘Hey, you’re the coach,’” Hutton said. “Now that I know what they’re charging him with, you can always look back and go, ‘Oh, I knew it,’ but no, not at the time.”

McLauchlin’s case will go before a grand jury next week before his arraignment Aug. 1.

Middle School.

It is estimated that the restoration work will take several weeks.

posted a document on the district website from the Teachers Standards and Practices Commission, which polices educators regarding professional and ethical behavior.

Approximately 200 discipline cases are investigated by the commission each year.

TSPC sets guidelines for competent and ethical educators and outlines the individual’s and district’s responsibilities.

The superintendent must report to TSPC within 30 days when, after appropriate investigation, the superintendent believes that an educator has violated standards by committing acts of gross neglect of duty or gross unfitness.

Gross neglect of duty is defined as any serious and material inattention to or breach of professional responsibilities. Examples include unreasonable

physical force against students or fellow employees; sexual conduct with a student; appearing on duty or at any district-sponsored activity under the influence of alcohol or any controlled substance; knowing and unauthorized use of school computer equipment to receive, store, produce or send sexually explicit materials; knowing and willful failure of a chief administrator to report a violation of com-

mission standards. (More examples in OAR 584-020-0040 (4).)

When TSPC receives a complaint, it conducts an investigation, then determines if there is enough evidence to charge the educator with a violation. A hearing follows.

By law, the commission must permanently revoke or deny a license to educators who are convicted of sex-related crimes.

Lakeside offers fishing that is out of the wind

Local lakes: Boaters have had trouble getting to fish some of our smaller coastal lakes like Bradley, Floras and Garrison because of the strong northwest winds. Tenmile Lakes, which is sheltered from the winds, has been the go-to lake for anglers looking to trout or bass fish. Cathy from Ringo's Lakeside Marina told us that fishing the deeper portions of North Lake from the train trestles to the floating toilet has been producing nice rainbow trout. South Lake, from Rocky Point to the county dock has been producing best. Wedding Ring spinners tipped with a night-crawler have been the most effective bait. Anglers are adding split shot to help get their bait down deep where the trout have been schooled up.

The lake temperature has been in the 70s, and the

largemouth bass fishing on Tenmile Lakes has remained good.

Local rivers and streams: Cutthroat trout fishing has remained good on the South Coast. Anglers are reporting good fishing on the Upper Sixes River above Edson Creek and on the east fork of the Coquille River between Sitkum and Dora. Black bodied Panther Martins with gold blades have been working well. Remember angling above tide water is restricted to the use of artificial flies and lures until Sept. 1 for coastal cutthroat trout.

Anglers Chinook salmon fishing on the lower Rogue River reported a slow weekend in the bay.

The tides this week should help improve the salmon bite, with an early morning high and an evening high tide. The fish have been biting two hours before to three hours after the high tide mark.

A few Chinook were taken on the lower Coquille River over the weekend. Anglers reported catching their fish just above Rocky Point, trolling herring.

Chinook slam-on fishing has been on and off on the lower Umpqua River.

Anglers are catching fish from the mouth to the U.S. Highway 101 bridge. Look for fishing to continue to get better in the weeks to come.

Smallmouth bass fishing up river has been excel-

lent. Anglers are doing well near Elkton down to Scottsburg. Four-inch plastic worms in purple and black have been very effective when drifting or casting.

Pacific Ocean: Tuesday was the last day of the selective coho salmon fisher on the South Coast. The next coho fishery will open Sept. 1 for non-selective or wild fish.

Today is the first day of the all-depth summer halibut season. This season will run every other Friday and Saturday until the quota is met.

Area shellfish: Boaters crabbing on low slack tide have been catching limits or near limits of Dungeness crab in the bay at Bandon. Dock crabbing is starting to improve on the early morning incoming tides on Weber's Pier. Congratulations to Owen Carpenter from Bandon

for winning \$100 cash in the 2013 Bandon Crab Derby. The next drawing will be Saturday, Aug. 10, at noon at Tony's Crab Shack.
