

No Kings Rallies draw hundreds

The nation-wide No Kings Protest on March 28, 2026, was the third of its kind and involved over 3,300 organized rallies in all 50 states. An estimated 8 to 9 million people participated in protests against the current administration, including over 1000 in Coos Bay according to headcounts by organizers Indivisible Coos County.

Coos Bay wasn't the only town nearby holding demonstration, there were a reported 500 protesters in Bandon, another 100 in Reedsport, and a collection of folks with signs in Elkton. The issues at the forefront of the demonstration included the administration's attempts at voter suppression, the war in Iran, and the alleged cover-up of the Epstein files.

Despite the serious nature of the concerns, the demonstrations were entirely peaceful and full of community energy and comradery. There were counter protesters on hand in Coos Bay in the form of a patriot flag wave that garnered

a small handful of supporters. There were verbal jabs sent in both directions from the competing groups, but overall, no reported incidents took place.

North Bend man arrested on two counts of attempted murder

During an eviction attempt by deputies of the Coos County Sheriff's Department, a North Bend man, Jimmy Oiterong (27), was arrested following what the department is calling attempted murder.

The deputies, alongside members from the county's civil department attempted to carry out an eviction at 2398 Broadway Avenue in North Bend, when they were met with resistance from Oiterong. According to a release from the Sheriff's Office, Oiterong was in possession of a compound bow with an arrow notched and ready to fire. Oiterong was said to have been threatening to shoot the deputies who responded with force.

The deputies shot the suspect with non-lethal rounds from a bean bag shotgun, in an exchange that saw an arrow fired back at the deputies. To break the standoff, the Coos County Emergency Response Team was called to the scene to assist and deployed chemical munitions into the apartment.

This caused Oiterong to attempt an escape out the back door of the residence resulting in a pursuit that saw officers take down the perpetrator with the help of a Coos Bay Police Department K9 Unit.

After a medical evaluation at Bay Area Hospital, Oiterong was transported to the Coos County Jail where he would be booked on a litany of charges. Two counts of attempted murder for loosing arrows upon the deputies along with three charges for unlawful use of a weapon, in addition to charges for menacing, attempt to elude on foot, resisting arrest, and reckless endangerment.

The Sheriff's Office thanked the Coos County ERT team and the Coos Bay Police department for their assistance, and reminded that police action is not an indicator of guilt, with all charged presumed innocent until proven otherwise in a court of law.

Most people recognize the title *Steel Magnolias* from the 1989 film, starring Dolly Parton, Sally Field, Shirley MacLaine, Daryl Hannah, Olympia Dukakis, and Julia Roberts. Ulsted), and her daughter Shelby (Jasmine Azure). Shelby's engagement is the talk of the parlor, but soon everyone's joy turns to concern as she faces a risky pregnancy. That's when director Lisa Terranova's favorite scenes arrive.

"The women rally around Shelby and M'Lynn," she says, "And you see the essence of the love and concern these women have for one another. It's a very life-affirming moment."

When tragedy strikes, the friends are there to help each other through in solidarity.

"You have no idea how wonderful you are," M'Lynn tells her friends at the end of the play. With a smile, Truvy responds, "Of course we do."

Terranova says, "I want audiences to leave the theatre feeling optimistic about our humanity and our ability to carry one another through life's hardships with great friendship, tenderness, and humor."

Steel Magnolias, with its wit and wisdom, is sure to do just that. Running three weekends, shows will be at the Liberty Theatre in North Bend on April 17-19, 24-26, and May 1-3 at 7 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, with 2 p.m. Matinees on Sundays.

ODOT upgrades Myrtle Point sidewalks — again

MYRTLE POINT — Residents who think they've seen double — when it comes to handicap-accessible sidewalk improvements in the community — should believe their eyes after all.

An Oregon Department of Transportation official says two intersection improvements recently were redone because they didn't meet new federal requirements.

Dan Latham, an ODOT public information officer in Roseburg, said a recent project involved reconstruction at the northwest "corner" of Oregon 42 and Snyder and the southeast corner of Oregon 42 and Kincheloe.

"It appears that several

(handicap-accessible) curb ramps through Myrtle Point were built around 2019 and 2020, and two of those locations are being reconstructed as part of this project," he said.

Latham said most of the work in Myrtle Point has been completed. The contractor, Canyon Contracting of Stayton, worked there in December and has moved on to similar projects at other Southwest Oregon sites.

"We still have landscaping and seeding, and probably sign removal, but I don't know when that will take place," Latham said, regarding the work in Myrtle Point.

He explained there usually are two situations that will prompt the agency to replace what appears to be a new or good ramp.

"Some ramps that were built five, ten or twenty years ago might not meet federal requirements, so we have to replace them," Latham said. "To the casual observer they may look OK, but to someone in a wheelchair there may be something wrong that makes the ramp difficult to navigate."

"The ramps that were built in 2019 and 2020 met all state and federal standards at that time and passed inspection," he said, "but in the past few years, some of those federal standards have changed, which requires us to bring these ramps up to the new standards."

Secondly, Latham said, sometimes contractors' work doesn't pass inspection and doesn't meet contract specifications.

"When this happens, the contractor will have to replace the new ramp and they are responsible for the cost."

Latham said ODOT tries "to offer the best facilities we can for folks who either are using wheelchairs now or those who will someday."

In the past several years, the federal guidelines have changed, he added, and the two ramps in Myrtle Point were not compliant with the new ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) standards.

The overall project that includes the work in Myrtle Point involves improving pedestrian access by building ADA-compliant sidewalk curb ramps at 31 intersections in Myrtle Point, Brookings, Gold Beach and Roseburg. The

new ramps allow smooth and safe travel along sidewalks and streets for individuals in wheelchairs, parents pushing strollers and people making deliveries, Latham said. They include "yellow truncated domes" to provide a tactile walking surface for people with visual impairments.

The project includes six intersections in Myrtle Point along Oregon Highway 42 from Bothwick Street to Carlisle Lane, Latham said, adding that construction began in November with ramps in Roseburg.

"In December, the contractor moved to Myrtle Point and they are now finishing up the ramp construction in Gold Beach," he said. "In early April, they will move to Brookings for the final ramp

work."

All new curb ramps in Roseburg and Myrtle Point have been completed, Latham said, and so have most of the ramps in Gold Beach.

"The contractor will have to apply final striping and some landscaping around the ramps, and this will likely be completed in the next month or two," he said.

The contract completion date for the entire four-city project is July 16.

"We expect most work to be completed ahead of schedule, hopefully before June," Latham said. "The only work that might extend later is applying seeding to the landscaped areas."

The entire project also is well below its \$2,309,828 budget, he said.

HOLY COW! HISTORY: They Killed Jesse James — and Paid for It

It was unusually warm in St. Joseph, Mo., that early spring morning.

“Mr. Howard,” the man who rented the little wooden-frame house at 1318 Lafayette St., had just finished breakfast when he noticed that a print on the wall was hanging crooked. He stretched out his hands to straighten it, unaware that one simple act was about to set in motion a string of unintended consequences.

“Mr. Howard” was, in fact, the outlaw Jesse James (an alias he had used before), and it wasn’t just the temperature that had him and his family lying low in that spring of 1882. The James Gang had fallen on hard times, and Jesse was trying to (in modern terms) “put the band back together” for a criminal comeback. With many old members dead or in prison, it was time for new blood. Brothers Bob and Charley

Ford were handsome men in their early 20s who might have fit the bill. As the job description indicates, they were also crooks. In a classic example of “no honor among thieves,” while they were worming their way into Jesse James’ confidence, they were also secretly negotiating with Missouri’s governor for the \$5,000 reward on James’ head (about \$160,000 today).

A deal was cut: kill James and get the cash, plus a full pardon. Monday, April 3, 1882, arrived. With his guns resting on a nearby table, Jesse was straightening the picture when Bob Ford shot him from behind. Jesse James was no hero, but shooting an unarmed man from behind was the ultimate act of cowardice. Conspiring to collect \$5,000 for it added a Judas Iscariot dimension.

That was the end of Jesse James’ story. However, for Bob and Charley Ford, karma was kicking in.

The two backstabbing brothers wired the governor to collect

their ill-gotten gains, then turned themselves in to the authorities. Imagine their surprise when they were indicted for murder, tried, found guilty and sentenced to hang — all in just one day.

Two hours later, the governor spared them from the gallows with a full pardon. He shorted them on the reward, paying only \$500 — a far cry from the \$5,000 they were promised. (Politicians were no more trustworthy in the 19th century than today.)

It was all downhill from there for the Brothers Ford. Killing a celebrity made them celebrities, too — but in a bad way. Bob was viewed much like John Wilkes Booth, who also shot Abraham Lincoln from behind. Even people who loathed Jesse James felt he didn’t deserve an ending like that.

Bob and Charley tried to cash in on their newfound fame. Bob posed for pictures in cheap arcades, a forerunner of pay-per-view. The brothers reenacted the shooting on stage, but the

audience’s dislike of them — and their inability to act — doomed the show. Two years later, Charley, riddled with tuberculosis and addicted to morphine because of the intense pain, died by suicide.

Bob Ford stumbled from job to job. He opened a saloon in New Mexico Territory, tried his hand as a policeman in Las Vegas, and finally wound up in Colorado, where he opened another saloon. When it burned down, he reopened in a tent. Then it was on to yet another saloon in another town.

He was working there on June 8, 1892, when a man walked in and said, “Hello, Bob.” As he turned around, Edward O’Kelly fired both barrels of a double-barrel shotgun, killing Ford instantly. O’Kelly became known as “The Man Who Killed the Man Who Killed Jesse James,” until he himself was killed in 1904 while trying to shoot a policeman in Oklahoma City.

And so, the bloody trail of murders finally came to an end.

It just goes to show you never know what chain of events your actions can set in motion — nor can you predict how or when they will stop.

And the long, deadly path that produced such a high body count started 144 years ago this spring in that little frame house in St. Joseph, Mo., with a betrayal by a supposed friend.

Coos County turkey season forecast

After a mild winter, conditions remain drier than normal into spring this year, it is not likely the conditions will be a significant problem for turkey survival in Coos County. For turkeys in this area, nesting may begin earlier keeping the hunt season on track. What remains to be seen is whether significant rain will occur after hatching takes place. Rain in May and June has a higher likelihood of creating problems for turkey poult survival.

That being said, the spring rains may affect the distribution of turkeys. Prior to green up turkeys get much of what they eat from agriculture lands. Some of these birds will likely move out to clearcuts and other forest openings as the weather improves.

High School Recap: Local athletes compete in Oregon Relays

Oregon Heritage Tree Program celebrates 30 years

The Travel Information Council and its volunteer Oregon Heritage Tree Committee, invite com-

munities across Oregon to shine a spotlight on their heritage trees in 2026, particularly during Arbor

Month in April.

Founded in 1996, Oregon was the first state in the country to launch a state-sponsored heritage tree program. The goal of the program is to educate Oregonians about the value of these trees and promote their appreciation.

Over the past 30 years, 85 trees have been designated across the state in 26 of Oregon's 36 counties. Seventy-nine heritage trees are still living and provide the chance to engage the senses and learn about significant people, places and events at historic sites, public gardens, and hiking trails across the state.

Oregon Heritage Tree Committee Chair Dave Hedberg encourages the public to visit a state or local heritage tree. "Visiting an Oregon Heritage Tree is a chance to engage your senses and learn about local history in the real world – not just in books and on screens. All of Oregon's Heritage Trees are deeply connected to the people of the past. Enjoying these

trees today connects us with our history."

There are three state-designated heritage trees in the area:

Shore Acres Monterey Pine, Coos Bay: This Monterey pine was planted between 1906 and 1921 by the Simpson family as part of their extensive estate. Louis J. Simpson was a lumberman, shipbuilder, and founder of the city of North Bend. In 1942, Simpson sold his estate to Oregon, designating it as a park. This tree was recognized in 2002 as the largest of its species in the United States by the National Register of Big Trees.

Smith Farm Walnut, Coos Bay: This black walnut is a remnant of a larger grove, planted around 1865, that marks the farthest navigable point on the Coos River. Before S. Coos River Lane was built in the 1920s, people and goods unloaded at this community landmark and popular meeting place. The Smith Farm Walnut is an example of how trees were often used as important landmarks for naviga-

tion before the advent of electricity and modern roadways.

Coquille Myrtle Grove, Coquille: This grove of Oregon myrtle was protected by the Garden Club of Oregon through the "Save the Myrtlewood" campaign and given to the People of Oregon in 1949. The Garden Club started many conservation projects including the "Don't Be a Litterbug!" campaign and Operation Wildflower on state highways. The Oregon myrtle is a highly valued evergreen hardwood that has played a significant role in Oregon's coastal economies.

Individuals, cities, tourism organizations, and heritage groups are invited to nominate a tree with documented historic significance to the state.

Al Tocchini, vice-chair of the Oregon Heritage Tree Committee says he and fellow members share a clear vision for the future of program- to be more inclusive. "In particular, we are seeking underrepresented stories of Oregon's

diverse populations in places that are accessible to the general public."

The Oregon Heritage Tree Program is administered by the Oregon Travel Information Council and a committee of dedicated volunteers from across the state. The Travel Information Council is a semi-independent state agency created by the State of Oregon in the 1970s to operate the highway blue logo sign program following the Highway Beautification Act. The agency now also operates the Oregon Historical Marker and Heritage Tree Programs as well as 39 rest areas at 25 locations in Oregon, providing clean, safe, and inviting locations that are open and free to use 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

As I See It

All that remained at Beloni Boys Ranch, located on the east side of Highway 101 between Bandon and Coos Bay, in January of 1975 was a small shop and the office building after a tragic fire (first photo) destroyed the boys' dormitory.

An article in Western World reported that a 14-year-old boy from Coquille was being held by police on charges of first-degree arson in connection with the fire that leveled all but a small portion of the nearly 4,000 square foot building. Fifteen boys were in the juvenile rehabilitation center at the time of the blaze. The fire occurred while a staff member was gone, having rushed another resident to Bay Area Hospital.

This fire occurred just a year after an arsonist

burned the Bandon High School building to the ground.

The second and third photos tell of the big fire that destroyed the large barn at Darry Van Leuven's ranch at Bear Creek. The fire of undetermined cause occurred in June of 1977 at 2 o'clock on a Saturday afternoon.

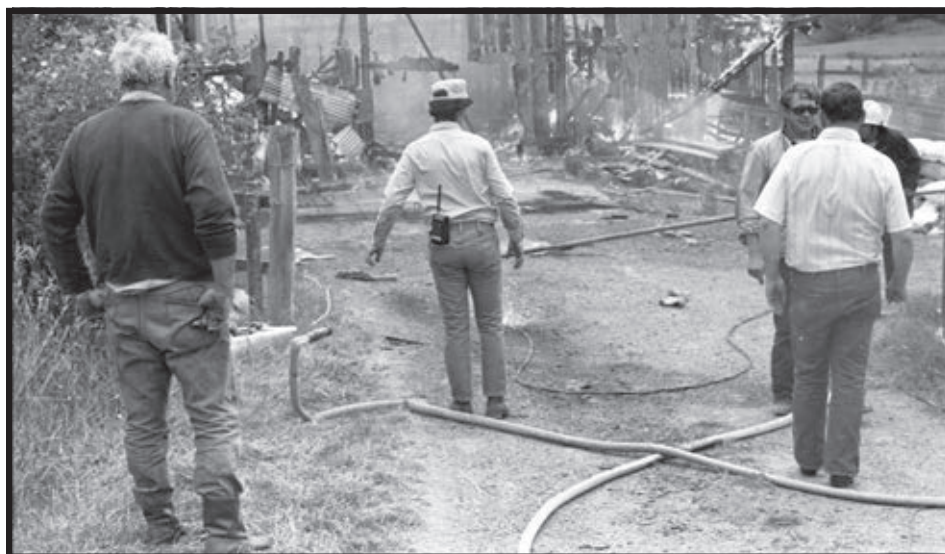
"Also completely wiped out in the blaze was Van Leuven's milking parlor, which included equipment valued at nearly \$12,000. Van Leuven, who is seen facing the camera in the second picture, along with fire chief Lanny Boston headed toward the burned structure, estimated that it would cost \$20,000 to rebuild the barn, which contained 5,000 square feet of space. He carried only \$5,000 worth of insurance,

and estimated the losses, which included the feed, would run about \$30,000."

Van Leuven said the barn was as old as he was ... since he was just a few months old when his father, Willis Van Leuven, built it.

"By the time the fire department (who was responding to a mutual aid call) arrived, the fire had just reached the roof (third photo) and in a short time the building was gone. In addition to the barn fire, electrical wires began burning in several spots nearby, and firemen also put out two small brush fires south of the barn which resulted from the bigger fire," according to my Western World article.

Neighbors from throughout the valley rushed to the site and were able to save most of the sacks of feed



and some baling twine.

* * *
A report came over the scanner at noon on Thursday, March 26, about a missing seven-year-old child, who was last seen on the beach below Devil's Kitchen. A search effort was underway, and a Coast Guard helicopter was being deployed to look for the little girl, but one report said that she had been located some 10 minutes after she had been reported lost. The search effort was being coordinated by the Bandon Police Department with multiple agencies, including Bandon Fire, the Coos County Sheriff's Office and the Oregon State Police.

In another incident reported over the scanner March 25, shortly before 2 p.m., Bandon Fire assisted Bay Cities Ambulance at the Bandon Fitness Center for a 65-year-old male who lost consciousness in the sauna, and was said to be in some sort of pain. Although the scanner said responders were unable to move him

out... it added that he was transported.

* * *
At 3:42 p.m. on Wednesday, Bandon Fire and Bay Cities Ambulance responded to a single vehicle accident on Highway 101 at milepost 258.5 for a report of a male trapped inside, and another man on the ground. Both lanes of travel were temporarily impacted, although the vehicle was said to be off the road, which was covered with debris. Bay Cities Ambulances transported one of the victims and the road was cleared at 4:14 p.m.

At 5:30 on Wednesday, there was report of a bad wreck just north of the Boulders Bridge near milepost 260. A Facebook poster who was one of the first on scene urged caution in the area for the single-vehicle accident.

* * *
Sunday, March 29, there was a report of a subject in distress in Bandon as a passenger in a pickup truck, thought to be a female, had been holding up a "help"

sign to a vehicle next to them. The driver was a male. The caller advised dispatch that the pickup turned at the Station Restaurant, possibly headed into Old Town. A Bandon Police officer was able to locate the vehicle and the subjects matching the description near Pacific View out near the South Jetty. He made contact and found the passenger was actually a male and admitted to holding up the sign as a prank. He was counseled for his behavior and the officer is going to contact his parole officer.

* * *
I have learned that Clarence Byers, a 1963 graduate of Bandon High School, died the evening of March 25 in Hillcrest South Hospital in Tulsa, Okla., where he made his home with his former wife, Judith (Rice) Byers, his son, Joshua Byers, and granddaughter, Alani Byers. He was born in Riverton on Dec. 1, 1944, to Sara and Clay Byers, and was an outstanding athlete, lettering and excelling in football, basketball and baseball. He was a skilled and trained barber, having attended and graduated barber school after high school, along with close friend and classmate, Mickey Peters of Bandon. He had been ill for the past

The family relocated to Bandon, Oregon during Harry's teenage years. Harry and his brother Earl excelled in boxing and participated in the Bandon Boxing Club, culminating in their participation in several Golden Gloves Boxing Tournaments.

Harry joined the Navy in 1963 as a Machinist Mate and attained the rank of Petty Officer Third Class at discharge. He served in the South China Sea on the guided missile destroyer USS Mahan (DDG-72) prior to the Vietnam war.

Harry was honorably discharged from the Navy in 1965 and relocated

to California where he became a certified EMT 1 & 2 working for A-1 Ambulance. In 1976 he began his lifelong career as a UPS package delivery driver and subsequently a UPS feeder driver. Partnering with his long-time friend Bill Smith, and a 14-member committee, they founded the Bandon Veterans Memorial. They tirelessly raised funds from the local community and partnered with the VFW to erect a memorial wall honoring local veterans.

Carrying on his passion for giving to others, he volunteered as a driver for the Bandon VA clinic, until it relocated to North Bend. He also drove for Pacific View Adult Living facility, transporting residents to appointments.

Harry's dedication to others was only surpassed by his love of fishing and spending his free time fishing the rivers and ocean in his boat with his family, friends, and beloved four-legged companion Gypsy.

Leroy Bracelin

Leroy Bracelin was born in 1940 in Coquille, Oregon to Larry and Marge Bracelin.

Leroy had a work ethic second to none. He often said, "A day I didn't work was a day I didn't get ahead." At just 14, Leroy went to work on Mrs. Perkins' farm after his father struck a deal with him — save enough to cover the cost of a car plus insurance, and he could buy one. With that as an incentive, he bought his first car, a '48 Ford, at just 15 years-old, and this was the beginning of his love of driving.

During his sophomore year, Leroy met his life-long love, Joanie Orr. After turning him down when he asked her out, she later asked him to the Sadie Hawkins dance, which was the beginning of a seventy-year relationship. They married in 1960, and were inseparable for the next six decades. Leroy was very proud of his family and was a wonderful husband, father, grandpa, great-grandpapa, and brother.

During his senior year of high school, Leroy worked nights at Coos Head Timber Company on the

pond, feeding logs to the mill. He then went to work for Bob Angel, beginning with driving a water truck and working up to driving dump trucks and lowboys. Then, in 1966, he bought his first dump truck, a gas-fueled Ford.

But after two years of gasoline prices, he figured that the switch to diesel would soon pay for itself. So, he bought what became "Truck #1", a diesel rig he would later have restored into a show truck. With it, he hauled all over the state, going wherever the work took him.

In 1970, Leroy and his brother-in-law Irv "Spook" Yeager joined forces, pooling their trucks and buying Doyle Williams' excavating business. The acquisition added two more trucks, a lowboy, and a Cat to their fleet — and Bracelin-Yeager Excavating and Trucking was born. They worked on many local projects like the development of Shore Pines Mobile Park and the City of North Bend street jobs. They even hauled the sand from their pit to fill the Pony Village Mall complex.

Building their reputation by rocking logging roads for Weyerhaeuser and Darrell Fromm, Leroy and Spook eventually expanded the business further — acquiring a rock crusher, concrete plant, and asphalt plant. In doing so, they transformed Bracelin-Yeager into a complete material supplier capable of handling most any construction project.

Leroy always attributed the success of Bracelin-Yeager to his crew. He said they had the very best people possible, and he considered them extended family. In 2000, Leroy and Spook sold the business to what has since grown into Knife River.

But Leroy didn't only work hard, he also played hard! After retirement, Leroy's passion for racing saw him and Joanie traveling by bus, following the NASCAR circuit across the country and discovering the East Coast along the way. It was through those travels that Leroy fell in love with the South, drawn in by the people and their rich history. He made many new friends along the way and created

wonderful memories.

Leroy and Joanie spent much of their time in Southern California and Arizona, where Leroy loved riding through the desert on his Razor with his buddies. He also became a true collector of "treasures." Wherever they traveled, he kept an eye out for old equipment and interesting rust, eventually building an eclectic museum of things that includes cars, dump trucks, toy trucks, Indian memorabilia, and even a lumber carrier. Closer to home, he found joy in simpler pleasures too, putting around on his property and planting trees in his yard, including one for each grandchild.

He was recently asked what his occupation was and if he liked it. His answer was, "I loved it!" So all in all, his was a life well lived.

Leroy passed away peacefully at home, surrounded by his family and their unending love.

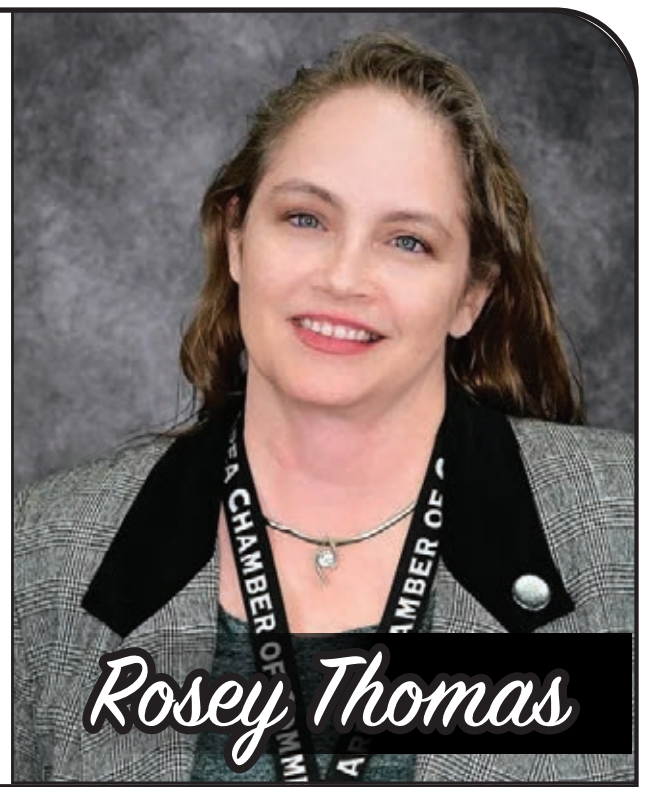

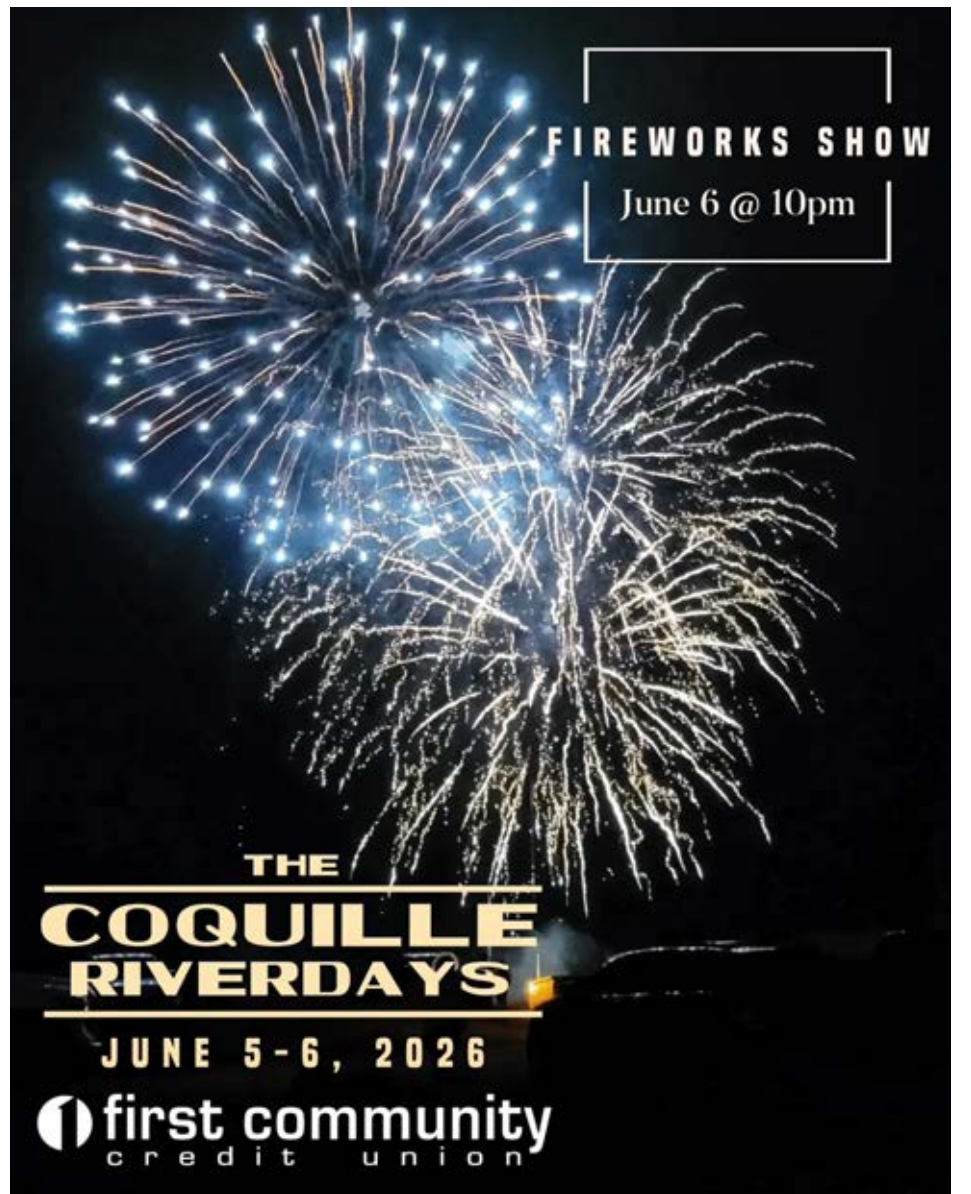
Mayor Flaherty, who is also a member of the chamber's board of directors, said the organization appreciates the community support and sponsorships it has received.

It's good news for cities that HB 4148 has been approved, effective Jan. 1, 2027, which allows cities and counties to use up to 50 percent of its TLT (Transient Lodging Tax) revenue for critical local services like police, fire, emergency responses and road maintenance, without raising any new taxes. It reduces the share that had to go to tourist promotion and facilities from 70 percent down to 50 percent.

For example, Seaside has a huge surplus in its lodging tax revenue that must be dedicated to tourism, while struggling to maintain community infrastructure. Mayor Steve Wright said, "Today, the question is no longer how to bring visitors to Oregon. The question is how to sustain the communities that make these visits possible." HB 4148, supported by both of our state representatives, is a step in the right direction.
