## Community invited to revitalize Airport Heights Park

Community members are being invited to participate in the first open house to discuss the revitalization and redesign of Airport Heights Park.

The Coos Bay-North Bend Rotary Club is hosting the event from 6 to 8 p.m. on Thursday, May 16, 2024 at the North Bend Senior Center.

This community meeting will be an opportunity for citizens to meet the Groundworkshop consulting firm and Rotary Parks Committee teams, and to help guide the park's future.

Those who come to the open house can hear about the history of the park and how the design will be developed.

Event organizers are also encouraging everyone to share their thoughts and memories of their favorite parks, and help create a vision for the future of what Airport Heights Park might become through this unique process.

The park is located in the Airport Heights area of North Bend and is owned by the Coos County Airport District. In 2022, the airport district signed a Memorandum of Understanding

with the Coos Bay-North Bend Rotary Club to revitalize the park that has served the community for more than 60 years.

The park currently houses a playground, baseball field, sand volleyball court, basketball court, and tennis court.

The Rotary is working with a park consulting firm, Groundworkshop out of Portland, to develop a master plan to guide revitalization and redevelopment of the park for the next several years.

## Port of Bandon reopens newly renovated facilities

The Port of Bandon held a pair of ribbon cutting ceremonies last weekend, as some newly upgraded facilities were finally opened to the public ahead of Memorial Day Weekend and the popular Jet Boat Racing event coming to the area.

Members of the Port of Bandon's Board of Commissioners spoke alongside Port Staff, while representatives of multiple collaborating organizations came together to celebrate the huge step forward for the Port. The project was a combined effort of not only the Port and City of Bandon, but the Oregon State Marine Board, Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the Coos County Commissioners.

Speeches from the Reg Pullen, president of the Port's Board of Commissioners, and Port Manager Jeff Griffin, were followed by refreshments and celebration of the new launch ramp and marina's reopening.

These developments were funded primarily through funds from the American Rescue Plan Act and other development grants, through which the City was able to secure upwards of \$9 million for the massive project, including \$2.8 from ARPA. The funds went toward replacing the docks in the

Drew Farmer, on the other hand, is forward-thinking. We need viable ideas for creating good jobs and a thriving economy, and so much more, that will benefit us all. I had an opportunity to meet him and was impressed. I also read about his extensive government and management experience in the April 26 issue of The World. He's well-informed and has an understanding of many local, state, and federal issues.

### Think twice before approving higher tax to house prisoners

### The Portland Area Pays Our Bills

I read Oregon State Representative Court Boice's guest column of April 24th with interest. I'm not qualified to comment on his point of view regarding how the forests should be managed, nor on the supposed burdens of the Oregon's landlords, builders, and developers. I have never heard anyone be disrespectful of our farmers and fishers, small business owners and ranchers, but we run in different circles, so his experience may be different. I would, however, like to inform him (and the reading public), that his scathing attempt to blame the residents and business people of the urban areas of the state for the rural problems of Oregon is absurd, and demonstrates a complete lack of understanding of the economics of the state of Oregon. As he's in our House of Representatives, this ignorance is a pretty good reason to question his qualifications for that position in government.

It is a recognized economic fact, all across the United States (and probably most of the world), that the greatest tax base is the taxpayers in the urban areas. This is due to both higher population and the higher incomes of those who live there. This population's taxes, therefore, end up supporting the less populated areas, whether we're talking about a state, or states within the nation, making those in the rural areas dependent on those urban taxpayers, or those Mr Boice dubs "the Metro Ruling Elite." The rural areas of Oregon have a vested interest in a healthy urban tax base, without whom there would be less money for schools, health services, and other fiscal outlays. In the fiscal year 2016-2017, the greater Portland area generated 1.9 billion of the 3.5 billion of the state school fund, while only receiving 1.36 billion of that money for its schools. The rest went to support rural schools. This is just one example. (<https://oregonbusiness.com/16881-oregon-fiscal-flow/>)

Whether or not the Right Wing rural residents like it or not, they are dependent on the metropolitan taxpayers they enjoy calling nasty names, just as the rural states across the US are dependent on the richer, more urban, states, for the same reasons I mentioned above. A 2023 study showed that, for every \$1 Oregon pays to the federal government, we receive \$2.91 in return, which isn't bad. We're #22 in terms of dependence on federal dollars, while Minnesota ranks dead last, receiving nearly \$7 in revenue for every \$1 they send

Mr Boice stated that this "Metro Ruling Elite produces nothing for our culture..." Except money, Mr Boice, and that ain't nothing. Without what they give us, Coos County would be even poorer than it is now. Ask our hardworking commissioners how much trouble they're having paying Coos County's bills this year, and they will tell you how lucky we are to have both state and federal monies to support us. I know it galls them, but it's true. And urbanites haven't "seized control," they were voted into office, just as Mr Boice was.

It's time for the Right to stop denigrating the people who help pay our bills (and vice versa, absolutely), and figure out ways to express their frustration with the changes that time inevitably brings without blaming the other side. The future is going to be grimmer for rural areas if we can't figure out new ways to make money. Mr Boice also complains those in charge in Salem "tax" us, to our detriment. Again, we get \$2.91 for every \$1 "they" tax us—not a bad bargain. And if people think that the solution is a Right Wing government in Salem, Republicans are consistent budget-cutters—much less inclined to spend money generously than Democrats—and would likely reduce, rather than increase, spending in Oregon, while possibly cutting the taxes the state so desperately needs.

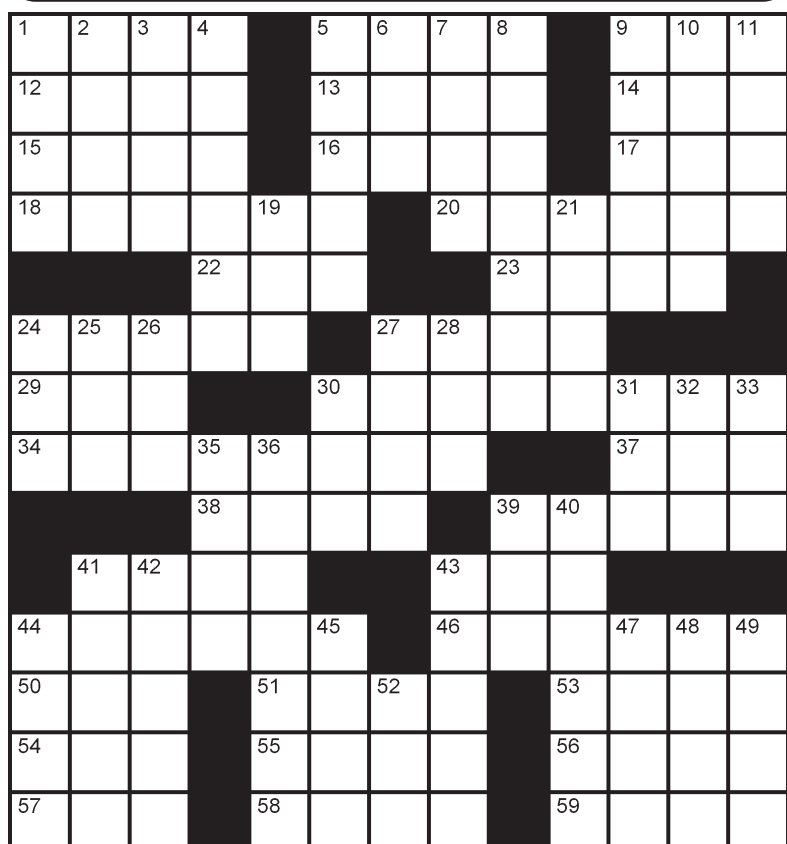

### John Dale Engels

October 16, 1936 to February 4, 2024

A memorial service to celebrate the life of John Engels, North Bend, will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday, May 25 at the Coos Bay Church of Christ, 775 W. Donnelly. John passed peacefully February 4, 2024 and private cremation rites were held.

John was born October 16, 1936 in Chicago, Illinois, to Ludwig and Lillian Engels. He graduated from Lane Technical High School in Chicago in 1954. He worked full-time and attended night classes until transferring to the University of Minnesota where he received a BS with distinction in Forest Resource Management (chemistry minor) in 1960.

John worked for the US Forest Service one summer at Mount Rainier and decided the Pacific Northwest would be his home. He received a job offer (via telegram) from the Bureau of Land Management in Eugene, Oregon, which he accepted. He continued employment with the BLM for more than 40 years in Eugene, Casper, Wyoming, and finally in North Bend/Coos Bay from 1976 until retiring in 2000.

His early BLM days in Eugene were rudely interrupted by a draft summons from Uncle Sam, but with a happy outcome. While serving with the 62nd Engineer Battalion (construction) at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri and attending a local church, he met Wanda "Joyce" Carmack. They married in November, 1963 at Crocker Christian Church, just one week after JFK's assassination. After completing his military service on "Lucky Friday," March 13, 1964 that he celebrated ever after, he returned to Eugene with his bride. They spent 12 years there and had three children.

John completed a correspondence course in highway engineering and became a BLM Forest Engineer, where he can be credited (or blamed) for some 80 miles of logging roads in the Siuslaw River country. Later in Coos County, he became an Information Services Coordinator where he worked to bring BLM into the computer age and spent two decades developing and managing BLM's "Timber Sale Information System." He was ahead of his time in the computer world and was largely self-taught. He received multiple recognitions over the years for his contributions to the BLM.

After retiring, John became a



cartographer with Ticor Title where he happily worked with maps and records for over a decade. He retired a second time in 2010 and began volunteering regularly at the Coos History Museum, archiving photos, indexing books and working the front desk.

John was a 61-year member of the Society of American Foresters, a member of the Coos Bay Church of Christ, and served two terms on the City of North Bend's Planning Commission.

John was truly a jack-of-all-trades. He loved surveying and science, reading and tinkering and was a general fix-it person. He loved number and word play and no doubt would have liked that he passed on 2-4-24.

John was preceded in death by his parents in 1955 and 1966, and his wife, Joyce in 2011. He is survived by his sister, Dorothy; three children, Debra, Karen (spouse Monte), and John P.; four grandchildren Mitchell (and wife Alayna), Mason, Madeline and Miller Koch; a niece and three nephews. Meeting a great-grandchild was on John's bucket list and was accomplished in 2023 when he met Mitchell and Alayna's daughter, Darcy.

July 5, 1944 - May 2, 2024

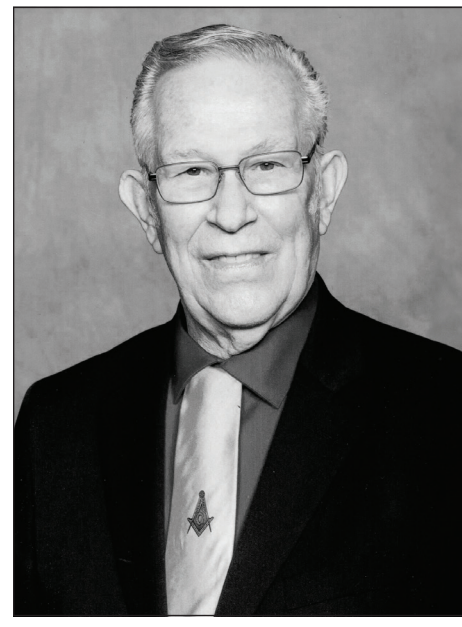

According to a new study by Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and the National Institute on Aging, men and women with hearing loss are much more likely to develop dementia and Alzheimer's disease. People with severe hearing loss, the study reports, were 5 times more likely to develop dementia than those with normal hearing.

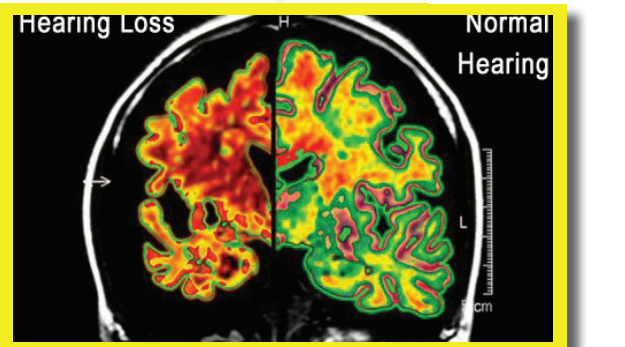

## Bulldogs, Pirates shine at Sky-Em district meet

**NORTH BEND** — North Bend's girls won the Sky-Em League track title at their home facility on Saturday and both the Bulldogs and Pirates qualified a bunch of athletes for this week's Class 4A state meet in Eugene.

North Bend's girls scored 182.5 points to easily beat Junction City (157.5), Marist Catholic (155), Cottage Grove (84) and Marsfield (70) and the Bulldogs also won the coed team title.

Ellie Massie raced to wins in both the 1,500 (5 minutes and 4.35 seconds) and 3,000 (10:56.23) for the Bulldogs. She also teamed with Emma Slade, Eva Jensen and Lauren Efraimson to win the 4x400 relay (4:16.86).

Efraimson also was a double-winner for the Bull-

(10.43) and behind Cottage Grove's Makya Alsup in the javelin (34.28).

North Bend also had two qualifiers in the pole vault. Abby Woodruff won by clearing 2.97 meters. Junction City's Elaina Deming finished second at 2.90 meters, but on her 18th birthday, North Bend's Roxy Day also got over the bar at 2.90, the automatic qualifier for the state meet. Slade advanced as a wild card selection in the high jump after clearing 1.49 meters.

Marshfield's girls had one state qualifier, Daphne Scriven, who won the discus (37.14 meters) and finished second in the shot put (10.07). Scriven shared outstanding thrower of the meet honors with Marist Catholic's Zakiya Newman, who won the shot put and was second in the discus.

Massie shared outstanding

dogs, taking the triple jump (10.57 meters) and 400 meters (1:02.67) and finished second in the 300 hurdles (50.96) to qualify for state in that event. The top two finishers advanced to state, along with any other athletes who hit auto qualifying standards.

For North Bend, that meant two athletes at state in several events.

Lennon Riddle won the 300 hurdles (50.04) and Drew Hood won the 100 hurdles (16.29) for North Bend. Hood also finished second behind Efraimson in the triple jump

runner with Marist Catholic's Bella Gubrub, who won the 100 and 200 and was part of the winning 4x100 relay team.

Cottage Grove won the boys team title with 172.5 points, while Marshfield (131) edged North Bend (130) for second. Marist Catholic had 121 and Junction City 96.5.

Marshfield had a good weekend in qualifying for the state meet, where the Pirates are two-time defending champions.

Bodey Lutes was named the outstanding boys runner after winning the 200 (21.97) and

400 (50.27) and helping the Pirates to wins in both relays.

In the 4x100, Lutes teamed with Joe Herbert, Quinton Kloster and Carter McGriff to win edge North Bend in a photo finish. Marshfield's winning time was 43.44 while the Bulldogs' quartet of Cole Hanson, Andrew Efraimson, Miles Baxter and Jason Padgett finished in 43.46.

Marshfield had a more comfortable margin in the 4x400 relay, with Herbert, Kloster, Chandler Wyatt and Lutes finishing in 3:29.40.

Padgett overcame Marist Catholic's anchor leg in the home stretch to give North Bend second and a spot at state. The quartet of Padgett, Efraimson, Landon Takenaka-Gaul and Sam Mickelson finished in 3:33.07.

Marshfield had the top two finishers in the pole vault, a Pirate staple, with John Parks and Danner Wilson both clearing 4.60 meters. The height, just over 15 feet, put Wilson into Marshfield's all-time top-10 for the event, which is a pretty distinguished stature given the many recent state champions the school has had in the event.

Kloster, who finished third, earned a Class 4A wild card for the event as the top finisher who didn't already advance to state by finishing first or second or hitting the automatic qualifying standard. Marshfield also advanced three second-place finishers to state — Herbert in the 100 (11.43), Kloster in the 400 (51.93) and Jaxson Stovall in the 1,500 (4:13.93).

North Bend also advanced a bunch of boys to state.

Padgett, the defending state champion in the 100, won that event in 11.11 and was second

to Lutes in the 200 (23.03).

Baxter was named top jumper after winning the high jump (1.83 meters), long jump (6.01) and triple jump (12.22). Teammate Caden Wirebaugh was second in the latter event (12.15).

North Bend's Wyatt Smith won the javelin (47.04). Shaunathan Wilder was the wild-card qualifier in the shot put after finishing third.

The Class 4A state meet at Hayward Field on the University of Oregon campus in Eugene begins Friday morning and concludes Saturday.

## Coquille girls claim District 5 league title

**SUTHERLIN** — Coquille's girls ran away with the Class 3A District 5 title on Saturday at Sutherlin High School, and qualified most of their key athletes for this week's state championships where they hope to win for the third straight year.

Coquille scored 177.5 points, finishing far ahead of St. Mary's (118) and the rest of the schools in the district, which includes all the regular Far West League schools but Glide.

The Red Devils won seven of the 17 events and qualified multiple athletes for the state meet in several events.

Holli Vigue won the shot put and discus for the Red Devils and was third in the javelin, where she was the wild card choice for state as the top finisher who didn't automatically qualify by finishing in the top two in an event or meeting the automatic qualifying standard.

She was named outstanding girls field athlete for the meet. Vigue's winning marks were 35 feet, 10 inches in the shot put and 123-10 in the discus.

Callie Millet won the javelin, though her winning throw of 113-4 was far below her state-leading mark. She

suffered an ankle injury during the long jump and finished second to Vigue in the discus (94-11) and third behind two teammates in the pole vault, where she was the wild card pick.

Reagan Krantz won the pole vault by clearing 11 feet and Ada Millet was second, clearing 9-3. Limited by her injury, Callie Millet was only able to get over 8-6, but that was good enough to advance.

Melanie Lambson won the long jump for Coquille, soaring 17-7. She also was second in the triple jump (35-1) where the top five athletes all surpassed the automatic qualifying mark, including fifth-place finisher Emelia Wirebaugh of Coquille (33-6 ½).

Wirebaugh also was the wild card pick in the high jump, where she finished third (4-10 ½).

Bryleigh Mead won the 1,500 (5:17.49) and teammate Faith Gertner was second (5:18.78) giving Coquille two runners at state in that event. A day earlier, Mead was second in the 3,000 (11:41.58) to also advance in that event.

Ada Millet shook off being disqualified after coming in

with the top time in the 400 to post a big personal best 47.59 in the 300 hurdles and finish second, advancing to state.

Coquille also picked up a win in the meet-closing 4x400 relay, with the group of Synthia Salazar, Matti Nelson, Gertner and Ada Millet finishing in 4:25.55 to just edge out Brookings-Harbor (4:25.66).

Brookings-Harbor's squad included the top two finishers in the 400, Lexie Newman (1:01.89) and Johanna Larson (1:04.55).

Coquille's boys had one state qualifier. Jerico Jones won the shot put (43-0) and was second in the discus (127-1).

Brookings-Harbor's Peter Goode won both the triple jump (38-3) and 800 (2:05.85). The state meet for Class 3A begins Thursday at historic Hayward Field in Eugene.

had three hits, two runs and an RBI; Peach had three runs and three RBIs; Rowan Hampton had two hits and four RBIs; and Natalie Jadin had two hits and two RBIs.

Laila Veloz and Mirra Riddle each had home runs for North Bend. Riddle and McKenzie Breakfield each had two runs and Adrianna Delph had two hits.

Marshfield won the nightcap 19-9, scoring three runs in the first inning, four in the second and five in the third and putting the game away with six more in the sixth.

Montiel clubbed a pair of home runs and a double and added a single while amassing six RBIs and two runs in the contest. Hampton also had a home run. Peach had four hits, three runs and two RBIs; Hite had three hits, three runs and three RBIs; and Makenna Johnson and Mackenzie Fitzgerald-Thornton both had two hits, two runs and two RBIs.

Fortunately, our girls showed up to compete and got it done both defensively and offensively."

The result is the league title.

"I'm proud of this group and their efforts and achievements," Burns said. "We are fortunate to be led by a great group of seniors, including Makenna Johnson, Gracie Peach and Jayla Johnson who have been on varsity since their freshman year. In that mix of seniors is also Faith Hite, who has had a stellar year for us at the plate, and Natalie Jadin has really come into her own keeping the damage that can be done at the hot corner (third base) to a minimum."

Added to that leadership is the team's ability to play together and play for each other, no matter their role on the team.

"We have girls who are playing new positions for us this year and while it may not be their desired position, they continue to work at it and be the best they can be," Burns said.

Thornton, a sophomore, and Hampton, a freshman both could pitch, but have stood out in the outfield. Jayla Johnson, Jocelyn Mulkey and Montiel have handled the pitching duties and Montiel also is the league's top first baseman, Burns said.

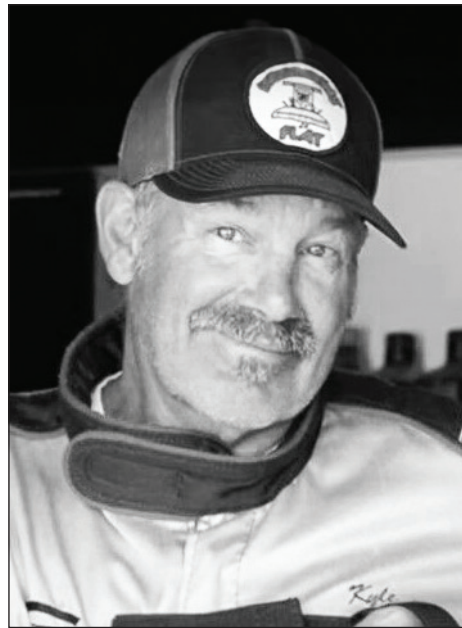
