

Coos Bay man arrested for stabbing, kidnapping

A Coos Bay man is behind bars after allegedly stabbing one person and attempting to kidnap another before fleeing onto the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College.

On Friday, Oct. 27, at around 5:37 p.m., a 9-1-1 caller reported he had been attacked and stabbed near the entrance of John Topits Park. Coos Bay police immediately responded to the scene, they found the

man, who told them 40-year-old Brian Springer of Coos Bay had attacked the victim and his girlfriend and tried to kidnap the woman. Springer was an estranged boyfriend of the woman.

Coos Bay police, assisted by other law enforcement agencies began searching for Springer near Topits Park. Just before 6 p.m., a Coos County Sheriff's deputy saw Springer on the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College, at which time Springer ran off.

With Springer loose on campus, Coos Bay police asked that the college lock down all buildings to keep students and other safe.

A few minutes later, Coos Bay police located Springer and arrested him in the parking lot of the college.

Prior to his arrest in the violent attack, Coos Bay police were already searching for Springer in relation to other incidents in the city.

Springer was transported to the Coos County Jail, where he is currently being

held on charges of assault 2, attempted murder, attempted kidnapping, menacing, coercion and unlawful use of a weapon in relation to the stabbing incident.

He was also booked on charges of attempted burglary 1, attempted criminal mischief 2, burglary 2, theft 2, identity theft and giving false information to a police officer in relation to previous incidents in Coos Bay.

At the time of his arrest, Springer also had a number

of outstanding warrants from the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Springer is currently being held in the county jail on four felony charges and eight misdemeanor charges.

The Coos Bay Police Department was assisted by the Coos County Sheriff's Office, North Bend police, SWOCC Campus security and maintenance, Bay Area Ambulance and the Coos Bay Fire Department.

Volunteers needed for historic cemetery cleanup

Oregon's Bay Area Beautification group's monthly volunteer cleanup falls on Veteran's Day this month. Volunteers will be cleaning up the historic Marshfield Pioneer Cemetery in recognition of the holiday.

The historic cemetery served as the Coos Bay region's primary burying ground in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

The cemetery is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and encompasses four acres of greenspace with more than 2000 gravesites and about 1200 gravestones.

"We have people that were in unmarked graves here that

were World War I veterans and some Civil War veterans as well," said Cricket Soules, a Marshfield Pioneer Cemetery caretaker.

She and her daughter, Becky Soules, have been embarking on an ongoing project to find and recognize veterans who were buried at the cemetery – as well as other cemetery restoration projects.

"We are always finding new information," she said.

Soules says she enjoys learning about the history of the cemetery and those who were buried there. She also enjoys working with students and teaching them about local history via the pioneer cemetery.

Those who volunteer to clean up at the cemetery will

be helping to honor those who were buried there, Soules said.

"We could use the help," she said.

Oregon Bay Area Beautification board members encourage volunteers to bring their kids and friends to learn about Marshfield Pioneer Cemetery as they make it a more beautiful place for everyone to enjoy.

Projects will include weed eating, planting, clearing around graves and some restoration projects.

The cleanup is rain or shine (unless there are dangerous conditions). Volunteers are encouraged to wear appropriate clothing and footwear and bring gas powered weed eaters with

71-year-old man rescued by search and rescue

On October 27 at 8 p.m., the Coos County Sheriff's Office Dispatch Center took a report of a missing mushroom picker. The woman, Cory Webber, was reporting Larry Silver (71) missing and had told dispatchers she had been mushroom-picking with Silver earlier in the day. Search and Rescue Coordinator Deputy J. Gray contacted Webber to arrange rescue efforts. It should be noted Webber herself has been the subject of a search and rescue operation in the past after she became lost hunting mushrooms.

Webber advised she and Silver were trespassing behind a locked gate on the Weyerhaeuser property near the intersection of West Beaver Hill Road and Seven Devils Road to look for mushrooms. Webber told Deputy Gray that she and Silver

got separated, and she could not find him. Webber described Silver as a 71-year-old male who has difficulty seeing at night and was ill-equipped for the terrain and weather.

A hasty search was initiated by Deputy Gray and several sheriff's deputies who did not

locate Silver at this time. Based on the information gathered by Deputy Gray it was determined that the missing person met the criteria for a SAR activation. Deputy Gray initiated a SAR call out for the morning of October 28 at 8 a.m. The following

morning, the Coos County Search and Rescue team gathered to search for Silver. At about 930 a.m., Silver was located by K9 Jager and handler Tony Deane. Silver declined any medical attention and walked out to safety under his own power. Upon further review

and investigation, Silver and Webber were both cited for Criminal Trespass II as the area they entered was marked with signs, "No trespassing," at the entrance to the area behind the locked gate.

The sheriff's office would like to remind you that if there are

signs or locked gates, and you do not own the property, it is not premises open to the public. There are several acres of public land for your enjoyment. However, there are also many acres of private land on which owners do not allow trespassing.

Two Coos County men sentenced

Two Coos County men will serve years in prison after pleading guilty to charges last week.

On October 24, Jamie L. Sharp (35) appeared in Coos County Circuit Court and pleaded guilty to Criminal Mischief in the First Degree and was sentenced to 25 months in the Department of Corrections. Sharp also pleaded guilty to Attempt to Commit a Class C/ Unclassified Felony – Theft in the First Degree and was sentenced to 10 days in jail.

Deputy District Attorney John Blanc prosecuted the case for the state of Oregon, ensuring the plea

agreement held the defendant accountable for his actions. All sentences given by the court are per documented sentencing guidelines and the laws of the state.

On October 27, Tristin M. Fields (24) appeared in Coos County Circuit Court and pleaded guilty

to charges of Unauthorized Use of a Vehicle and was sentenced to 52 months in prison. Fields also pleaded guilty to Burglary in the First Degree and was sentenced to 56 months in prison.

Chief Deputy District Attorney Jody Newby prosecuted the case for the state.

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Spartans deny Marshfield repeat volleyball title

North Bend finishes fourth at state tourney

SPRINGFIELD — The tears told the story as much as the scoreboard Saturday night at Springfield High School as Marist Catholic denied Marshfield a second straight volleyball state title.

The Spartans outlasted the Pirates in a match that went the full five sets and then some. In a tense fifth set that included nine lead changes both teams had match points before the Spartans finally converted one on a Marshfield error.

Marist Catholic won 19-25, 25-22, 23-25, 25-23, 17-15. It was the Spartans' first title since 1998.

Marshfield was trying to win its second in a row after claiming the first in school history last year. It didn't happen, but the loss to the Spartans doesn't tarnish a great run for the Pirates.

"It's an honor to get here two years in a row," Marshfield coach Tammie Montiel said. "It's hard to defend the title. You've got a target on

your back."

Added senior Paige Macduff, "I think we played hard and I think we made history. Even if we didn't win, we still did great this year."

The Pirates were ranked No. 1 the entire season and finished with a 27-4 record overall. Two of the losses came in tournaments when

matches are played best two sets out of three, to Class 3A champion Sisters and Class 5A fifth-place finisher Crater. The other two losses came in five-set matches against Marist Catholic.

The Pirates and Spartans each beat the other at home, with Marshfield sweeping Marist Catholic near the end

of the season. Before Saturday's championship match, the Pirates had not lost a set in the postseason, sweeping La Grande to get to the state tournament and then The Dalles and Cascade in the quarterfinals and semifinals.

It looked like they were on pace for another sweep after Marshfield overcame a slow

start in the first set, trailing 5-1 and 6-3, before scoring six straight points to take control.

In the second set, the Pirates again got off to a slow start, trailing 12-4 before rallying all the way back to eventually take the lead

Marshfield advances to quarterfinals

Marshfield advanced to the Class 4A football quarterfinals by beating La Salle Prep in a defensive showdown in rainy Milwaukie on Friday night, 12-7.

All the scoring came in the first half and the Pirates never trailed. Ashton Thornton connected with Steel Carpenter on a long touchdown pass and John Lemmons scored on a short run to put the Pirates in front 12-0 and the defense kept Marshfield there.

The Pirates forced four turnovers, including three on consecutive possessions in the second half as La Salle Prep tried to rally. Carpenter and David Bouska both had interceptions for Marshfield and the Falcons also missed one field goal and had another blocked by Marshfield.

Next up for the Pirates is a quarterfinal matchup at Seaside. The Seagulls blanked visiting Estacada 26-0 in another first-round game Friday.

The winner of the Marshfield-Seaside quarterfinal will meet either Mazama or Marist Catholic in the semifinals.

The Pirates beat Mazama at home in the regular-season finale just to reach the playoffs and the Vikings topped Pendleton 24-6 in the first round.

Marist Catholic, the No. 2 seed, topped Crook County 42-14.

Marshfield and Marist Catholic are Sky-Em League rivals in all sports but football, where they are in separate special districts.

HEPPNER 28, BANDON 7: The Tigers saw their season end in a road loss in the first round of the Class 2A playoffs on Saturday.

Bandon ends the season with a 6-4 record. Heppner will play Regis in the quarterfinals. The Rams blanked Stanfield 64-0 on Friday.

GOLD BEACH 16, BLANCHET CATHOLIC 0: The Panthers shut out the visiting Cavaliers on a rainy night in Gold Beach to advance to the Class 2A quarterfinals.

Gold Beach will visit Lowell in the second round. The No. 3 seed Red Devils beat Clatskanie 48-12 on Friday in their first-round matchup.

BOBCATS MEET ADRIAN: Myrtle Point will battle Adrian in the eight-player quarterfinals. As the No. 3 seed, the Bobcats had a first-round bye.

The quarterfinal battle in Myrtle Point will be a rematch from the regular season. Myrtle Point beat Adrian 54-46 back in the season opener.

The other quarterfinal on Myrtle Point's half of the bracket features No. 2 Crane hosting Enterprise.

POWERS HOSTS ECHO: Powers will be home for the quarterfinals in the six-player bracket after having a first-round bye.

The Cruisers are the No. 2 seed after posting their third straight unbeaten league season.

Echo topped host Alsea 38-6 in the first round Friday night.

EUGENE — Bandon sophomore Marley Petrey has had a rough fall marked by a huge growth spurt, but she finished the cross country season in style Saturday, placing eighth in the Class 3A/2A/1A girls state meet at Lane Community College.

Petrey grew by a full inch just within the past few months and hadn't run as well as she was hoping. But she had a great race Saturday.

"It's definitely redemption," she said. "My last couple races I didn't do well for me. They felt really bad.

"This race, I came in with the mindset to try your absolute hardest, but have a lot of fun."

So when she had a great first mile and was feeling strong, everything fell into place.

"Coming in not stressing too much turned the tide," Petrey said.

Petrey crossed the line in 20 minutes and 15 seconds, picking up 17 spots in the final mile. Valley Catholic's Jaya Simmons was the individual winner in 18:20, pulling away from 2022 champion Daisy Lalonde of East Linn Christian, who finished in 19:03.

Petrey led the Tigers to fifth place in the team race, one spot out of the trophy hunt.

Analise Miller was 28th (21:00), Giada Moore 29th (21:02), Lilly Iverson 53rd (22:00), Safaa Dimritruk 59th (22:21) and Gracie Sullivan 103rd (30:00).

North Bend girls win one soccer playoff game

North Bend's girls soccer team won its first match in the Class 4A playoffs before losing to Scappoose in the quarterfinals on Saturday.

Keep looking at offshore wind

Addenda to my Letter-To-The-Editor published in the 10/06/23 edition of “The World” newspaper (Coos Bay, OR.)

There are several additional arguments to be made for taking a hard look at Offshore Wind Energy (OSWE) along the southwest Oregon coast/ Port of Coos Bay:

1. When and if offshore wind does come to our communities, and if the Port of Coos Bay is fully involved, the buildout time, extent, and impact will be far more manageable because it will be gradual and allow for proper planning for housing, schools, roadways, infrastructure, etc. By contrast, a container ship facility will be one big, “short-lived” construction project, quite disruptive if the Port’s number of 4,000 construction jobs is accurate.
2. If the Port of Coos Bay engages in OSWE to the level that the Port of Humbolt (Eureka, CA.) already has, we could gain more permanent jobs here than a highly automated container facility. These jobs would range across a broad spectrum of skills: some for manufacturing, assembly, and placement, highly skilled maintenance technicians, the craft and crew needed for all of the sectors, and the people required to handle the energy generated and transmitted on the grid. Current studies have shown that some aspects of OSWE negatively impact some marine life, but others are not and could even thrive. Can we do this in a way that enhances marine life and helps fisheries? We know shipwrecks and other underwater “structures do so.
3. Because energy production is a constant, it would not be subject to the impact of supply chain disruptions and economic downturns that the container facility would be. OSWE jobs would be far more sustainable.
4. The ocean is already in trouble due to warming waters, acidification, hypoxia, man-made pollution, and even changes in currents. The fisheries people already tell us that. OSWE may cause some collateral damage, but it is minuscule compared to what is already caused by climate change, which is only the tip of the iceberg. OSWE is being pursued for precisely the purpose of reducing ocean warming and helping stabilize our climate. That’s a win!
5. Lastly, and in some ways the most generally important, is the amount of badly needed scientific data to be generated and gained in exploring the pathways to OSWE. For this to work, we need to learn everything we humanly can about the ocean off our shore, its marine life and shore life (including birds), the geologies of the ocean floor right down to a matter of actual feet (footprint) as to where the best possible, least harmful locations for wind farms are. One of the companies planning to bid on OR’s Wind Energy

Areas has already signed a 5-year contract with NOAA to share all the data they gather...straight to the scientific community. That data alone is worth the effort of looking.

6. OSWE technology is rapidly evolving. Much of what is here today will be better and cheaper down the line. Technologies specific to each location will and are being developed. We can all have a say in this if we get on board and help take a look. All viewpoints are welcome. Then we can discuss, debate, research, answer, and move forward as a community. For the benefit of future generations, we need to do better.

WHEREAS, there are legitimate concerns about the potential threat to democracy and the rule of law if an individual who has been impeached for incitement of insurrection is allowed to run for public office again, including the highest office of the land; and

WHEREAS, the Democratic Party of Coos County believes in upholding the principles of democracy, the rule of law, and the Constitution of the United States;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Democratic Party of Coos County expresses its support for reviewing the 14th Amendment, Section 3, of the United States Constitution as a means to disqualify candidates from seeking public office, including the presidency, based on actions that incited insurrection against the United States government;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Democratic Party of Coos County encourages our elected representatives including our Secretary of State to consider and explore the legal and constitutional avenues available to prevent individuals who have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States from holding public office, in accordance with the 14th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America.

1. You could ask why Councilor Tom Miller and Councilor Alan Pointer were not part of the recall? They both voted to purchase the property at 105 S. 8th Street, when Councilwoman Smith voted no! It is not vacant land. There is a two-bedroom house on the lot that can be used for retail or even possibly rented. The price increase also had to do with a large building on the property that had to be demolished and removed that contained asbestos, Plus the special conditions that the planning commission put on LSP4LIFE LLC, they fulfilled those requirements and were still denied.

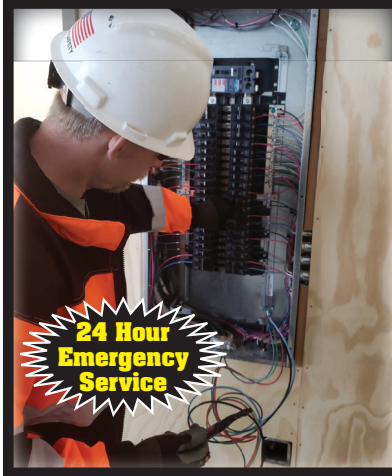
Woman arrested after fleeing from traffic stop

twice, the last time at 22-21 on an ace by Ava Ainsworth.

That turned out to be the last lead of the set for the Pirates as Marist Catholic got three kills in four points by Avia Tuguldur.

The third set was tight most of the way and Marist Catholic was poised to go in front 2-1 in the match, leading 23-21 on a kill by Lauren Rohman. Rather than fold, the Pirates scored four straight points to take the set — two on attack errors by the Spartans and the final two on kills by Bridget Gould.

That gave Marshfield momentum going into the fourth set and the Pirates led 23-22 after a kill by Macduff. But the Spartans got the final three points — two kills by Kimmy Spurlock sandwiched around a hitting error by the Pirates, staying alive in the match.

That set up the dramatic final set, normally a race to 15 points. Neither team led by more than two and the score was tied 10 times in addition to all the lead changes.

The Spartans had the first match point, leading 14-13 after a kill by Giana Elgarico. But Gould tied the set back up with a kill and an error on the next point by Marist Catholic gave Marshfield match point leading 15-14.

Marist Catholic scored the final three points on a kill by Tuguldur, a block by Tuguldur on a hit by Gould and an error on Marshfield for the final point, which prompted the Spartans' huge student section to rush the court and celebrate with the team.

Marshfield's girls, meanwhile, hugged each other and family members, consoling each other for the heartbreaking setback.

Montiel said just like her team, the Spartans played well.

"Credit to them," she said. "They were down and came back. We were down and came back."

Marist Catholic just came back one time more.

Typical in a five-set match, there were a lot of impressive numbers, including 27 kills by Gould. Tatum Montiel added 20 kills and Macduff 16 for Marshfield and Ainsworth had 56 assists and five aces. Five different Pirates recorded double digits for digs, including 20 by Gracie Peach and 15 by Ainsworth.

For the Spartans, Elgarico had 28 kills and Tuguldur 16 and Rohman had 56 assists.

Marist Catholic also did a great job getting a hand on Marshfield's hits at the net or digging them up before they could hit the floor. Four Spartans had at least 12 digs in the match.

Gould, Macduff and Elgarico all were voted

to the all-tournament first team by the coaches and Ainsworth, Rohman and Marist Catholic's Avy Roundy were on the second team.

Despite the loss, Tammie Montiel said her team played well, keeping up the energy to handle the roller-coaster momentum swings through the night.

"I'm proud of the girls," she said. "They fought really hard."

The coach got emotional talking about the squad, especially seniors Macduff, Gould, Peach and Caitlyn Browning.

"I will miss those seniors," she said, adding that she had spent years working with them, stretching back to even before they were in high school.

The group had a unique career, since their freshman year also was the year the COVID-19 pandemic started. That fall, aside from a few matches in Reedsport, which had more flexible rules because it is in Douglas County, all of the Pirates' competition was outside on football fields.

The spring season was short and Marshfield's next season came to an end one match short of the state tournament.

The Pirates won last year and nearly again this year and Macduff said she will remember how the team's chemistry helped the squad succeed together.

"I'll remember the nights after the wins," she said.

Ten of the 12 Marshfield players in uniform Saturday also were on last year's championship team — the seniors Peach, MacDuff, Browning and Gould; juniors Ainsworth, Tatum Montiel, Alie Clark, Analise McCord and Gwyn Button; and sophomore Chloe Runn.

"It's disappointing to not come away with the championship, but we're going to hang another banner in the gym," Tammie Montiel said. All Marshfield squads that either win state titles or finish second get a banner in the rafters at Pirate Palace.

Marshfield advanced to the championship match with a pair of sweeps on Friday.

The Pirates beat The Dalles 25-13, 25-19, 25-14 in the quarterfinals and then topped Cascade 25-15, 25-21, 25-22 in the semifinals.

Marist Catholic had a tougher route to the championship bout. The Spartans had to rally from two sets down to beat Crook County in the quarterfinals 21-25, 28-30, 25-14, 25-20, 15-8. Then Marist Catholic lost the first set again before beating Mazama in the semifinals 25-27, 25-22, 28-26, 25-18.

Combined with North Bend's fourth-place finish, the Sky-Em League had three of the top four teams in the final tournament standings.

of Enterprise/Joseph/Wallow by one second to win the title in 16:18. Linton finished in 16:54.

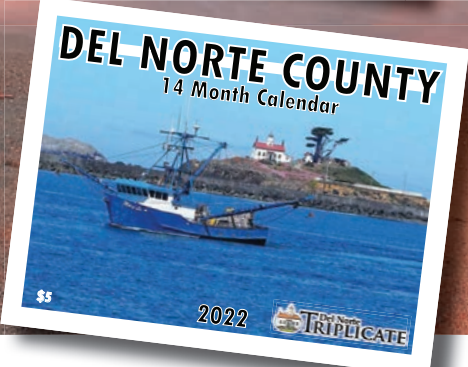
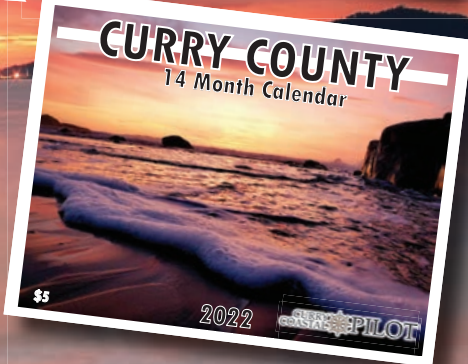
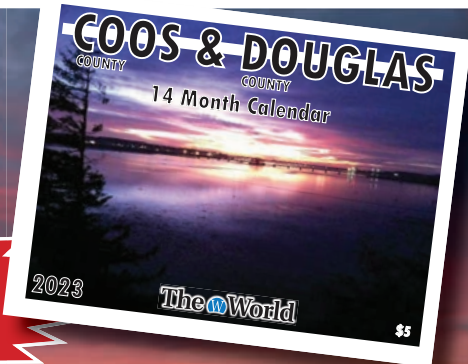
