In 1980, Clara began working at Southwestern Oregon Community College and started the relocation process to Coos Bay. Teaching was perhaps her greatest passion (although she also loved good conversation, acting, reading books, tragic heroes, going to the movies, her four grandchildren, dark chocolate and romantic love so much that it is hard to say exactly what her greatest passion really was.) She worked incredibly hard and grew her career from being the tutor in the welding program to becoming a tenured, full professor of English. She believed in her students, worked them like coal miners, and especially relished teaching Women's Literature. She loved thousands and thousands of students, but her favorite student was the "nontraditional student": a woman well past the age of joining a sorority, who had children or maybe had worked for years in a low paying, thankless job, who came to Southwestern to build a new life for herself. That was the student Clara looked for in her classroom on the first day of school.

After retirement, Clara served on the Southwestern Community College school board, continued to serve on the Dolphin Players board and was active in the theater with her spiritual sister, Alice Carlson, and built powerful relationships with her grandchildren. In 2008, she had a massive stroke and spent the rest of her life recovering from it. Learning to walk again, teaching herself to read again, moving from being right handed to left, she created a new world for herself at Ocean Ridge Assisted Living. While this world was smaller than any other she had ever experienced, she celebrated every ounce of joy and pleasure in it, and she was happy. Her friends (Alice, Mel, Sally, Leah, Jennifer, Oshi, Josephine, Clara Lou, Joanne, Dorrie and many more) stayed by her side with visits, food, books, stories, trips to her favorite restaurants, going to plays and movies. She had, in twenty years of professional work, amassed a nest egg that made a place like Ocean Ridge possible, but the true

wealth was this amazing group of friends.


