Bay Area Hospital Board Announces New CEO Among Other Executive Positions

The Bay Are Hospital (BAH) Board of Directors meeting on October 14 was another standing room only affair as multiple announcements for the executive team were made. Amid the hospital's well documented financial struggles, the new board had sought fresh leadership shortly after their swearing in, leading to the resignation of the prior CEO Brian Moore back in July.

A motion passed to begin execution of a contract for the CEO position with the now-previous Chief Operating Officer Gretchen Nichols. Nichols received glowing praise from the board, staff, and wider hospital community alike in an interview process that involved as many of those parties as possible.

"We looked for a CEO candidate, and we had the CEO here already," said Board Chair Simon Alonzo. "Gretchen has immense experience in the healthcare industry. She's led very successful hospitals. She knows what we need, and she's also here to stay."

The choice for continuity makes sense, as Nichols has been an instrumental part of the turnaround that has begun under the watch of Interim CEO Kelly Morgan. The challenges that BAH faces are myriad and unique, so selecting someone that can not only hit the ground running, but has already been a part of the

marathon, is a boon for the leadership team and saves a bedding in period.

"I think [Nichols] has a really good vision for where she wants BAH to be. Her background being a nurse but also being the CEO of bigger and equivalent institutions gives her the experience she needs to lead us, and get us back on stable ground," said Board Secretary Patrice Parrott. "She understands where we were and now how far we've come.'

Many board members made the point that Nichols began working at BAH after coming out of retirement, having chosen the Coos Bay area to be her permanent home. They believe this shows her commitment to bettering our community and proves she's here for the long haul. She boasts a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Master of Business Administration. Prior to joining Bay Area Hospital, Gretchen served as a Hospital President for a health system in Portland, having worked her way up the entire chain of command.

"In my career, I started at the very bottom. My first job in healthcare was a CNA, then I became a nurse, then a charge nurse, then assistant nurse manager. I did every single role all the way up to the top of the organization, so I come with a lot of unique perspective about organizations and operations. But it really starts with the people, that's why I stay and why I keep coming back," said Nichols just after the vote passed.

"The heart of this organization is really important. It's important for this community, and all of the employees here, and our partners and physicians in the community who are counting on us. So, I want to be here to help this community and the hospital carry forward. We spend a lot of time talking about our finances, and we have to get them in order and save the hospital, to build that strength back. But we also have to invest in our people."

Nichols and the board thanked Morgan for his guidance during this period. According to his report to the board, BAH's operating costs for the month of September was a roughly \$930,000 loss. Still a huge number, but put in perspective it is the first time the hospital has operated at a sub-seven figure loss in the 15 months of data shown, indicating that the restructuring seems to be working to help stabilize finances. Though, it seems that help from the state legislature will still be a crucial component of achieving normalcy.

That restructuring comes at a real cost as well. While many of them have been attributed to reductions in contract labor and natural attrition, jobs are being lost. The public comment section of the meeting consisted of two speakers upset with the loss of the Case Management Department leader Candy Johnson, who was clearly a well-appreciated figure among medical staff.

Also during Morgan's pre-



sentation, it was announced that a permanent CFO had been found in Patrick Banks, who is currently a Regional Finance Officer and Hospital CFO with HealthTech in Washington. Banks earned his MBA from University of Michigan's Ross School of Business. In November he will be taking over from interim CFO Doug Dickson, who joined alongside Morgan.

Later on in the meeting it was announced that Dr. Derrick Oaxaca would be appointed the new Chief Medical Officer. Oaxaca is a well-known member of the local medical community and has worked as an emergency medicine specialist in Coos Bay since earning his MD from Texas Tech's Paul L. Forster School of Medicine in 2019.


Coos Bay

from 10 AM 6 PM. This is the perfect place to pick your Find more own





You've heard about the Unsinkable Molly Brown, the brassy, nouveau riche millionaire mine owner's wife who made it safely off the sinking Titanic. As incredible as that was, she had nothing on a remarkably feisty feline. Because he survived not one, but three ship sinkings ... and in wartime, too, no less.

At least, that's the story. Listen to it and decide for yourself.

Meet Unsinkable Sam, the luckiest cat in the world. It would be all too easy to make a lame reference to a cat having nine lives. Sam must have had at least twice that many.

Very little is known about his early life. He was likely born in Germany because he wound up on a German battleship in World War II. For centuries, sailors kept cats with them on the

high seas, partly for the companionship, partly to go after rodent stowaways.

And he wasn't on just any old battleship, either. It was one of the biggest, most ferocious, and potentially deadliest of all: the mighty Bismarck. It was such a grave threat that even the dauntless and determined Winston Churchill was worried about it.

So, when the Bismarck steamed out of port in May 1941, the British made destroying it Priority 1, 2 and 3.

Bismarck quickly sank the battleship HMS Hood, causing the Brits to dispatch dozens of warships to hunt for the German ship. When it finally went to the bottom of the Atlantic on May 26, almost 2,100 crewmen went with it. British and German vessels picked up 115 survivors.

Sailors on one of them, the destroyer HMS Cossack, spotted something clinging to a piece of debris floating in the water. Upon closer examination, they found it to be a "tuxedo cat," black with white markings on its mouth and chest. (Think of Sylvester in the old Looney Tunes cartoons.) He was the only survi-

vor the Cossack found.

The cat switched sides that day, going over from the Axis to the Allies. Since the Cossack's crew didn't know his name, they called him Oscar. It's theorized that they called him that because in the International Code of Signals, "O" means "man overboard."

Although his allegiance had changed, his luck hadn't.

That fall, the Cossack was torpedoed by a Nazi U-boat west of Gibraltar. The Cossack sank on October 27, almost five months after the Bismarck went down.

Once again, a drenched cat was seen clinging to a piece of debris and was once more hauled aboard a British warship, the HMS Ark Royal. In a neat twist of fate, that aircraft carrier had played a key role in disabling the Bismarck the previous spring.

As word of the cat's repeated ability to cheat death on the high seas spread, folks stopped calling him Oscar and gave him a new name: Unsinkable Sam.

The plucky feline had yet another rendezvous with Fate

waiting right around the corner. This time, it was the Ark Royal that was dispatched to Davy Jones' Locker. Barely two weeks after the Cossack's loss, another U-boat torpedoed the mighty carrier, also off Gibraltar.

A motor launch plucked a "quite angry but otherwise unharmed" Sam from the sea. He must have been thinking, "This is really getting old!'

That was the end of Sam's adventures. He spent the rest of his wartime service as a mouser in the Governor General's building on Gibraltar. He eventually wound up a "Home for Sailors' in Belfast, Northern Ireland, peacefully passing away at a ripe old age in 1955.

Historians are quick to poohpooh the story. They claim it's riddled with more factual holes than the hull of the Bismarck. Serious students of World War II lump it in the "tall tales" category.

Yet, it was so widely circulated around the British Isles during the war years that it seems something involving a cat at sea must have happened.

Perhaps we'll never know.

Cribbins was appointed to the Coos Bay City Council in



2023 and re-elected in 2024. His priority is a focus on access to healthcare, education, and improving economic opportunities for citizens in House District 9, as well as the rest of rural Oregon. Cribbins previously served as the Board Chair of Bay Area Hospital District, as well as on the board of Boys and Girls Club of Southwestern Oregon.





Governor Tina Kotek has officially declared October 16th through the 19th as a critical time for statewide earthquake preparedness, urging all Oregonians to join a massive effort backed by two key initiatives: the Great Oregon ShakeOut and the Great Oregon Camp-In.

The proclamation emphasizes that "the safety and resilience of Oregonians depend on our collective understanding of how to prepare for earthquakes and other natural disasters," calling practice drills essential for saving lives.

The efforts, led by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management (OEM), aim to cultivate a

culture of preparedness.

The core of the preparedness push centers on International ShakeOut
Day. Oregonians should know and practice the lifesaving action: "Drop, Cover and Hold On."

"The ShakeOut is more than a drill, it's a reminder that preparedness saves lives," said Erin McMahon, director of the Oregon Department of Emergency Management. "By practicing together, we are less likely to panic in the moment; activities like the Shake-Out and Camp-in create a culture of resilience that strengthens our communities."

Decades of research and expert consensus confirm that this action remains the safest immediate response during an earthquake, particularly

in older structures.

It's noted that during earthquakes, the greatest risk comes from falling debris, collapsing ceilings and shattering glass. Being inside the building and attempting to evacuate during shaking exposes individuals to serious injury.

The best practice is to stay low and take cover under sturdy furniture, which offers the best protection until the shaking stops and safe evacuation can begin.

"Whether it's cooking without power or talking through your emergency plan with loved ones, these activities help build confidence and readiness," said Kayla Thompson, OEM's Community Preparedness Coordinator.

Thompson encourages families to make the activities fun, suggesting a "supplies scavenger hunt" using the "Be 2 Weeks Ready" toolkit or building a living room fort for non-powered activities.

Use the Be 2 Weeks
Ready toolkit to guide
your activities and have
a Camp-In checklist,
which should include a
complete your emergency
plan. Taking stock of
your emergency supplies
is important as well as
knowing how to prepare

meals using alternative cooking methods, like a camp stove.

While earthquakes are often associated with well-publicized areas like California, the risk covers a much larger area of the United States. Oregon sits at the nexus of the Cascadia Subduction Zone, making robust preparedness efforts vital.

Before an earthquake strikes, experts advise taking these essential steps:

- Mitigation: Bolt furniture to walls and use safety latches on cabinet doors to prevent objects from folling.
- falling.
 Insurance: Discuss coverage with your provider, specifically reviewing extra expense and business interruption
- policies.
 Supplies: Assemble and store an emergency supply kit for a minimum

Even though the Great Oregon ShakeOut and the Great Oregon Camp-In have passed this year, they're good reminders that Oregonians should prepare for earthquakes in the eventuality that one should occur in the region.





As I See It

A small article in the Aug. 8, 1946, Western World, lets the readers know that Vern Brown, contractor and builder, accompanied by his wife and two children, and his mother, Mrs. Herb Brown, arrived in Bandon Tuesday after an absence of

"Mr. Brown, who has been engaged in war work for more than four years at Moses Lake and Tacoma in Washington, will resume his contracting business here. They plan to move into one of their Sunset apartments (first photo) at the beach.'

several years.

'City hydro-electric crews (second photo) are busy building a new substation, which will increase the flow of power into downtown Bandon. The new substation is being set up next to the present station behind the city hall (which today is the Bandon History Museum). Preparations were being made for the installation of three large transformers which were to have been moved in by a lumber stacker from the Moore Mill & Lumber Co. (third photo).

Sorry to hear that Carl Densmore, husband of former Bandon mayor Judy Densmore, died recently at age 86 in Bend, where they made their home. Judy is the matriarch of the family that has owned Sunset Motel since it was first built shortly after the Fire of 1936.

I've also learned that Donna Henderson, longtime owner of Spirit of Oregon in Old Town died recently at the age of 84. Among her survivors is her son, Jack Porter, who has been running the store, in the Masonic building adjacent to The Cobbler's Bench, for the last several years.

In my column last week, I mentioned the two fatal accidents on Highway 42 in the area of the Powers junction, which had occurred during a 24-hour period, but I had not received the names of those involved.

On Saturday, Oct. 4, at 10:44 a.m., an eastbound Chevrolet 1500, operated by Heather Renee Leach, 37, of Reedsport, lost control and spun into the westbound lane where it struck a westbound Ford F-350 operated by Nicholas Glenn Taylor, 56, Grants Pass, head-on. Leach died at the scene. Taylor and his passenger, Holly Taylor, 53, Grants Pass, were transported to an area hospital.

On Sunday, Oct. 5, at 12:59 p.m., a Ford Mustang, operated by Isaiah Michael Osbon, 23, Myrtle Point, was traveling west on Hwy. 42 when it crossed the center line and collided head-on with a Honda Civic, operated by Christian Anthony Percell, 26, Medford. A passenger in the Honda, Autumn Ruby Bishop, 25, Medford, died at the scene. Percell was life-flighted to an area hospital with serious injuries. Osbon was taken to an area hospital with minor injuries. Fatigue is believed to have been a contributing factor.

Last week someone posted that in the Four Mile area she had noticed quite a few mailboxes open at 9 a.m. and some mail scattered along the highway. She urged people to keep their eyes peeled and to double-check their mail. A similar post came from the Prosper area.

I attended the meeting last week between the school board and five teachers who had filed a grievance against the administration, including three, Nicole Guzman, Kate Hawthorne and Ashley Pearson who had earlier resigned, BEA president Jen Ells and BHS English teacher Kailey Carey.

I learned that afternoon that a fourth teacher, Jennifer Shinn, who teaches math at Harbor Lights Middle School, has also resigned.

Each of the teachers provided a statement during the grievance process; unfortunately the meeting was held in the high school library, without microphones and the teachers with their backs to the audience. I could hear only bits and pieces of the statements, but Guzman did provide her statement to me. Because of obvious space constraints, I will share a few of her remarks, which echoes how the others feel, as well. Much of the grievance revolved around the involuntary transfer of teachers, who say they

to voice their preferences as the decision had been made by the time they received an email telling them about their new assignment. She described the involuntary transfer as having a domino effect of negative consequences. "Four highly-skilled, highly-qualified teachers have now also resigned due to the way these transfers transpired and the resulting district culture of not valuing teacher expertise that has been created. I've been heartbroken to have to make the choice of leaving the district. I love my students and teaching," Guzman said. "The original request to resolve this grievance was to reinstate all teachers into their previous positions and follow proper procedures for any transfer ... though it would be a symbolic gesture at his point, as the

Although the board reportedly has 10 days to respond to the grievance, Superintendent Shauna Schmerer said that the district had followed the process, given timely notice, informed the teachers of open vacancies, but she did agree that communication had broken down although has now improved. She added that 37 of the 40 teachers had different schedules this year.


Since the meeting, I was sent a letter by board member Briana Hutchens. addressed to the school board, but written as a parent. Her letter follows. in part:


"I have been devastated over the last few months. Before I am a board member or a volunteer, I am a parent. I have had children in this district since 2013. At the time, I had an elementary and a middle schooler. I have never felt this divide like I do today. The middle school has not, since 2015, had a consistent leader. 
the front and back, and still received a 100 percent. Another said they just wrote the question as the answer -- and they were a valedictorian. The list goes on.

The fall bear eat-a-thon is on, ODFW warns of danger

Now that autumn weather has replaced hot summer days, bears have begun their annual fall eat-a-thon, known as hyperphagia, to prepare for winter.

This intense feeding period begins in late summer when berries and fruits ripen and peaks when fruits like pears and apples are available. During this time, bears spend up to 20 hours a day foraging for food, according to a release from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW).

Driven by the need to eat, bears will take advantage of free food – garbage, pet food, bird seed, livestock and poultry feed. State wildlife biologists urge Oregon residents, vacation rental managers, and visitors to remove or secure those food sources. Bears that become used to "people food" can pose a serious safety risk to people and

Oregon's black bears are highly concentrated along the coast, in the Cascades, and in the Blue Mountains. Coastal residents and visitors need to be especially vigilant as bears are common even in more populated and highly visited seaside towns.

However, the obligation also falls on vacation rental managers and guests to contribute to responsible coexistence with bears, according to the ODFW, which strongly encourages property managers to provide bear-resistant trash cans and educate guests how to use those cans and give them BearWise tips to minimize the risk of bear encounters or issues.

Skyler Gerrity, an ODFW Assistant Wildlife Biologist with years of experience working in coastal areas, says unsecured trash is one of the primary reasons bears



are attracted to neighborhoods.

"Bears can smell food from miles away and home in on that source," Gerrity said. "Leaving trash cans unsecured or accessible gives bears the opportunity to rummage through garbage, which can create a dangerous situation for people - and the bears too.

Bears also have an incredible memory of where they have found food before – female bears pass this knowledge down to their young. Feeding bears, whether intentional or accidental, can have long-lasting negative effects on multiple generations of bears.

Most conflict between humans and bears is preventable, according to the ODFW.

"Bears don't want to be around humans, but the prospect of an easy meal is often too good to resist," the release states.

The ODFW urges residents and property managers to remove items that attract bears to the area as the most important step to protect people and ensure bears stay

"Yes, I am friends with Shauna Schmerer. That's not new. In the 10 years I've been Booster Club President, Ms. Schmerer is the only superintendent to continuously attend meetings, volunteer and help with fundraisers.

"I believe the time has come for the board to publicly support our administration. This 'he said, she said' has got to stop. We are a small community and nothing good will come from continuing to let the teachers and the public shame our administration," said

that this letter publicly criticized educators and misrepresented the intent of our recent grievance hearing. The educators of Bandon, the teachers, counselors and specialists who show up every day for our students have acted in good faith throughout this process. Our grievance was not about personalities. It was about ensuring the District follows the contract, the same agreement both parties signed, and that exists to protect fairness, consistency, and the integrity of our schools. Educators have a right to raise concerns through the proper channels without the fear of retaliation or public shaming. Suggesting that teachers are harming students by exercising that right is both untrue and harmful to the fabric of our school community.

"Our members care deeply for their students. That's why we stayed, why we speak up, and why we continue teaching in

Bandon even when doing so is becoming incredibly difficult. We believe strong schools depend on strong relationships built on mutual respect and accountability, not division or blame.

"We call on the Board to reaffirm its role as an impartial body, committed to upholding the collective bargaining agreement and ensuring every employee and every student is treated with dignity and fairness. We will continue to advocate for what's right, to follow the process, and to focus on what unites us: safe, stable and thriving schools for the children of this community," said Ells.

I also received other letters, including one from parent Catherine Scobby supporting the teachers and another from Amanda Looney, former district business manager, who was critical of the superintendent. Both letters were addressed to the school board and, as such, they are public records. Looney's letter was also addressed to the Bandon City Council. I regret that we have no newspaper in which to share the letters in their entirety.
