

## Eastside housing study reports residential development not feasible

The Coos Bay City Council heard a presentation last month on the final findings from AKS Engineering and Forestry; the consulting firm was contracted to judge the feasibility of a housing development in Eastside, Coos Bay. The study found that a development of that kind would not be feasible.

The work was commissioned in a partnership with the Port of Coos Bay, who own the 110-acre tract of land, as an attempt to find solutions to the area's housing needs. It was done thanks to a grant from Business Oregon.

The 45-page report (including a further 290 pages of appendixes) is comprehensive in its analysis, with detailed looks at everything from geotechnical surveys to market viability. Zach Pelz was the principal point of contact for the project and he gave the presentation to the council.

"We moved forward with some work that the city had conducted back in 1996, and followed up with in 2000, and really updated that work based on current market conditions, current construction costs, current housing price evaluations. Then we met with the community two times to get their feelings in regard to development in this area," opened Pelz.

The report was conducted with a four-part framework: The aforementioned geotechnical and market analyses, financial modeling of the costs versus the potential revenue and community engagement through the two town halls and further stakeholder meetings.

The engineering drawbacks of the project were a large part of the issue with developing the site. The earth on that part of Eastside consists of deep, soft dredge that would require significant mitigation, to the tune of nearly \$225,000 per acre, in order to support large scale development.

"There are three compounding factors working against the site. First, there's dredge fill on top of deep, soft soils that is liquifiable during an earthquake. It requires expensive ground improvement before anything can be built," said Pelz.

"Second, nearly half the site is potentially jurisdictional wetlands, which is really costly to mitigate. And third, the surrounding infrastructure. Roads, bridges, intersections, other public works such as sanitary pump stations are either constrained or at capacity."

AKS conducted multiple analyses of potential housing options, from a full buildout, to small and large-lot family homes, apartment buildings and commercial spaces. They found that given the costs to extend infrastructure and mitigate the wetlands, returns on investment would not be viable.

For instance, according to the market analysis if apartments were developed, rents would need to reach \$3,500 to \$4,000 per month to support the project. That is nearly double what is achievable in the market. Homes would need to sell between \$672,000 and \$788,000, which is between 40 to 70 percent higher than what the market can support. AKS stated that it would take a nearly 40 percent subsidy of total devel-

## Ballots are out, now what?

Here's what your County Elections Office has to say

Ballots for the May primary were sent out on April 29. It takes about a week to arrive so if you're reading this and still haven't received a ballot, you can reach out to the county clerk's office to double check.

In speaking with county clerk Julie Brecke, there are some helpful tips to share for making sure your vote is counted quickly and securely, as well as some interesting insights on the process.

"Once mass mailing starts, we open up all the ballot boxes. At that point we do start processing. As we get ballots we start scanning them, start signature verifying," said Brecke. "Once we get enough, we can actually start doing tables, opening them, and sending them through tabulation. No results can be made public until after election night."

If you have your ballot here are some important reminders ahead of the Election Day deadline at 8 p.m. on May 19:

Oregon uses a closed primary system. Those registered as Democrats or Republicans will get a chance to vote on the candidates from their respective parties. Depending on your party registration your ballot may look different from other members of your household.

Those registered as non-affiliated with either major party will still receive a ballot with nonpartisan positions, local elections, and ballot measures.

Once you've made your choices, hopefully after some research and thought, make sure you sign your ballot. It is important that you use the same signature that you usually sign with; checking your driver's license for a reminder is a good idea. No need to use an overly formal or extra readable signature as those verifying your ballot will be comparing it to your normal, everyday "John Hancock".

When your ballot is fully completed you have a couple of options for where to take it.

Most clerks recommend using one of the 24-hour ballot boxes. For Coos County, there is one in each city:

**Bandon:** Bandon Library, 1204 11th St SW, Bandon. Drive-up outside.

**Coos Bay:** Coos Bay City Hall, 500 Central Ave, Coos Bay. Drive-up outside.

**Coquille:** Coquille Courthouse, 250 N Baxter St, Coquille. Walk-up outside.

**Lakeside:** Lakeside City Hall, 915 North Lake Rd, Lakeside. Walk-up outside.

**Myrtle Point:** Myrtle Point City Hall, 424 5th St, Myrtle Point. Walk-up outside.

**North Bend:** North Bend Library 800 Sherman Ave, North Bend. Drive-up outside.

**Powers:** Powers City Hall, 275 Fir St, Powers. Walk-up outside.

Ballot drop boxes are monitored via camera 24/7. Couriers



from each town work in pairs to get the secured ballot bags back to the county elections office as quickly and safely as possible. Only those within the elections office have the codes necessary to open them, not the couriers themselves.

Those who insist on seeing it through themselves can hand their ballot directly to someone at the elections office in the Coos County Courthouse in Coquille

during open hours from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Mailing is also an available option but due to recent cuts to the U.S. Postal Service, it is recommended you do so at least one week ahead of the deadline on May 19. If you are planning to do so close to election day, it is

## Federal lawmakers announce further \$11 million for rail portion of PCIP project

Last week, Congresswoman Val Hoyle and Oregon Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden announced another federal funding package was awarded for the Port of Coos Bay's Pacific Coast Intermodal Port Project (PCIP). The \$11.2 million dollar federal grant comes from the U.S. Maritime Administration's (MARAD) Port Infrastructure Development Program and is specifically allocated for development of the Coos Bay Rail Line (CBRL), a critical component of the proposal.

"Large infrastructure projects move forward one step at a time, and this funding advances an important next phase," said Melissa Cribbins, Executive Director of the PCIP in an official release.

"We remain focused on responsible planning, durable partnerships, and delivering measurable progress, and we are incredibly grateful to Oregon's federal delegation for their steadfast support of this effort."

Slated to be the first entirely ship-to-rail port on the West Coast, the PCIP relies heavily on further development along the CBRL, which is owned and operated by the Port. Improvements

to sidings, crossings and bridges are only a small portion of the upgrades necessary to make the huge increase in rail traffic viable for the project.

The containers unloaded from the supermax shipping vessels at the port will be loaded directly onto train cars which will make the journey from the North Spit to the rail yard in Eugene, before heading to the Midwest and beyond. It has been estimated that improvements to the line as a whole, including an expansion of that Eugene yard, could cost over a billion dollars.

"I want to thank Secretary Duffy and MARAD for recognizing the importance of this project," said Hoyle. "This award reflects and builds on the tens of millions we've already secured for it, and reflects a serious investment in Coos Bay. We're determined to make the South Coast a place where working people can find good-paying jobs, support their families and build a future. It's about time we start delivering on the promise that we made after the timber industry died to transition to an economy that provides family

wage jobs and the opportunity to build a future for working families on the South Coast."

According to Hoyle's office, these funds will be used to support the triplicate track and run-around section on the North Spit in preparation for increased cargo movement as the project develops.

The project, which has not been without its detractors, will be right across the federal navigation channel from the Hollering Place in Empire. The port is still in the pre-permitting stage and has yet to begin the necessary impact studies through the Army Corp of Engineers and Environmental Protection Agency.

Estimates for the cost of the entire project have ranged from 2.4 to 4.4 billion dollars, with the construction of the terminal itself contracted to Kansas City-based commercial developers North-Point.

Oregon's D.C. delegation have all been strong supporters of the project claiming it will create jobs, bolster the national supply chain and keep trucks off the road, paving the way for a green-

### North Bend citizens should Vote no on Measure 6-229!

The true motivation for Ballot Measure 6-229 proposing amendments to the City Charter is found in the video of the July 7, 2025 work session during discussion of the process of removing a City councilor by vote of the City Council after a public hearing. The City states that this is needed to allow for easy removal of a councilor.

This amendment resulted from the censure of a former councilor at a cost to the City well in excess of \$75,000. Beginning at minute 31:00 of the work session, the City administrator told the council that the "most important thing" was to find a way to remove a councilor, as the Council had not been able to protect him when his civil rights were being violated. He was referring to a long-time feud with a City councilor who repeatedly questioned his actions relative to Council Rules, the City Charter and state law.

He further states that other city models aren't working. The League of Oregon Cities Ninth Model Charter includes such a provision on Page 12. However, footnote 64 makes it quite clear that a city should consult legal counsel before removing a council member from office for violating the model provision, citing prior legal decisions.

This amendment was briefly mentioned during the August 6, 2025 charter review meeting starting at 27:31. This is the only discussion I found during all three committee meetings. During that discussion, the City attorney stated he had brought this matter to a group of lawyers at a conference and that the group could not come up with a good answer.

This is concerning because legal battles are based on unclear parameters. As I recall, the councilor's attorney during the censure hearing told the Council that if the Council voted to remove the censured councilor, there would be a suit filed and that the City would incur extensive legal fees with a very high probability that the City would be liable for payment of the councilor's fee as well. The League of Oregon Cities appears to agree with the councilor's attorney.

There have also been other questions and concerns arising from the process used to create these changes. I was asked to comment on these issues as well as similarities to the creation of the current City Charter (with amendments).

The 2000 Charter committee was formed by advertising in the local media. That process created a committee of twelve public members, one of whom was a licensed municipal attorney. The list of people involved can be accessed in the City website under Municipal Code. (click on the opened book titled City Charter). The council was not invited to propose members.

One councilor, Charles Graham, was appointed to act as the council's liaison. The 2000 committee held numerous meetings to discuss the charter; most of the committee attended all the meetings.

I observed the process to get an understanding of how the citizens felt about their charter and, as I recall, other councilors were also present but not participating. The current committee was appointed at the request of the City administrator by nominations from the present councilors in accordance with Section 2.04.100 of the Council Rules adopted by Ordinance 2052.

Five names were submitted by councilors and approved by Resolution 3369 on July 22, 2025. Advertising for interested citizens did not occur. One of the appointed citizens was not present at any of the meetings, either in person or online.

Two members of Council were appointed for this 'Citizen Charter Review Committee'! There is no provision in the Council Rules for a Council/Lay-Committee! Section 2.04.100 Subsection 13(a) allows the mayor to appoint a council member AND AN ALTERNATE to act as liaison to a lay-committee.

The liaison's duties are stated in 2.04.100(13)(d) as follows:

(A) When serving as a liaison to a lay committee, council members will not attempt to lobby or influence the lay committee on any item under consideration.

(B) Limit their role to explaining the council's position or expectation of the lay-committee and

(C) Not vote at the lay-committee's meeting at any time.

You will see numerous instances of lobbying and voting by the two councilors by reviewing the videos of the three meetings on www.YouTube.com. (Search for North Bend OR Charter Review Committee Meetings; the meeting videos are not posted on the City website.)

The current committee held three meetings on August 6 (59 minutes), September 10 (44 minutes), and December 4 (31 minutes) of 2025. The Charter to a city is similar to the Constitution of the United States.

After watching the three charter committee videos, I found myself very confused; transparency is the issue.

First, it was quite unclear why it was stated there were 14 or 15 items to be discussed yet only 5 items are listed in the Notice of Measure Election filed with the county. What happened to the other items? I saw no discussion or voting on these other 9 or 10 items.

Second, why were the videos shown only on YouTube and not included on the city's website?

Third, a packet with side-by-side comparisons was made available to the committee but not posted to the city website.

Fourth, why were no written minutes provided as this would have given context to the videos? Not necessarily verbatim, but at least the arguments 'For' and 'Against' the items.

Fifth, why were two councilors allowed to be appointed to the committee which is not in conformance with Section 2.04.100 of the Council Rules?

Sixth, one lay-committee member indicated her lack of understanding

of parts of the document and requested what she should do. She was told that any questions should be addressed by email to the city administrator or recorder and that answers would be provided by the administration unless the questions needed to be forwarded to the City attorney for clarification. This occurred toward the end of the fifty-third minute of the August 6, 2025 meeting.

Whether that person sent an email or received a reply is unknown. If so, we were never informed of any such actions – TRANSPARENCY?

The 2000 committee was provided with answers to such questions when asked or at the next meeting. One of the lay participants was a practicing municipal attorney who had the advantage of speaking with the city attorney at every meeting.

SOME COMMENTS REGARDING THE OTHER FOUR PROPOSED CHANGES

Extending the Mayor's term of office from two to four years: The City claims that the change will get the election cycle of the mayor in sync with the other council members' terms. One person spoke of very few cities having more than two years and most of those were the larger cities. Approximately 70 percent of Oregon's 241 cities have a two-year term for Mayor.

I am aware of at least five (and probably more) former City councilors who are opposed to a four-year term. I do not understand how changing to four years creates a syncing as compared to two years. What we would lose is another chance to vote for mayor! What we could gain is a group of four councilors every four years with total control – NOT a good situation.

If there is a major dissatisfaction with the council, a 2-year period for mayor gives us voters a chance to change the majority of the Council at each and every election. There was a comment from the City administrator that the mayor would not have to bear the expense of running for office every two years.

Our current mayor has been challenged in three election cycles. Our former mayor was only challenged in three out of ten cycles! Perhaps this indicates continuing dissat-

### Food for thought: May Ballot Measure for changes to North Bend's City Charter

Ballot measures are limited in amount of text and can only be YES/NO. So, I hope every North Bend voter spends time reviewing as they consider in Resolution 3377's charter changes.

While I don't speak for the council or the city, I was a part of the team putting it forward. I wasn't on the committee tasked with making the recommendations, but, as it happens, I support all the changes. For the curious, I've included several links at end so that you can review and decide for yourself.

The proposed changes come from the League of Oregon Cities 2025 Model Charter (link below). Like other states, LOC maintains a model charter as it compiles and analyzes member city information, goes through litigation on behalf of member cities and influences state legal matters that member cities' have prioritized as a collective.

Not all standardization is needed, in my opinion, but the few changes being proposed for North Bend are useful - North Bend has not engaged in a charter review for 20 years or more, I believe.

To get to the ballot measure, council followed charter code and state law. Each step of the way, a qualified Oregon law team reviewed. Council authorized a committee to review LOC's analysis of our charter, as well as discuss additional recommendations if anyone had them. That committee met several times. The measure contains only updates that committee voted to include by a majority.

I've ordered my opinions here on what concerns I've heard from neighbors,

not on how the changes appear on the ballot itself:

Updating the process of removing a city councilor by a vote of the City Council after a public hearing: Many have come forward to say that removal should only be allowed in recall elections. It seems like that comes from a presumption that council can kick anyone off if enough "don't like" the target person. I can see why that feels alarming. I feel alarmed thinking of that idea. But, that's not how I read the change.

Here's a clip from the proposal (link below, so you can verify for yourself):

"...no council member may actually coerce or attempt to coerce the manager or a candidate for the office of manager in the appointment or removal of any city employee, or in administrative decisions regarding city property or contracts. A violation of this prohibition is grounds for removal from office by a majority of the council after a public hearing..."

This very change is also mentioned in the 1st paragraph of the 2025 Model Charter which is telling to me (also, link below).

To me, how council manages itself should have some checks and balances I believe this new language introduces fairly for both "sides". Councilors and city staffers always have the court system if they feel wronged.

Without anything at all in the charter, serious violations of our oath like interfering with city contracts is left to the actual and spendy court system. We saw this with \$50K+

legal fees around censuring a council member in 2024 -- money we could have used elsewhere. That pile most likely would have been much smaller had we a clear path on our charter.

Aside from that and, in my opinion, more serious, opportunities can be pulled back or vanish because North Bend doesn't abide by its contracts. This can be the result when one council member acts outside our role and our oath. I think this closes this important gap in our charter.

Mayoral term to 4 years: Some believe that two-year terms keep the mayor closer to public views. I understand that. However, council decisions are rarely paths that can be completed in two years, much less during the two years of a term. I would prefer elected officials stick to the work that they are elected to do, rather than endless campaigning and using term change-overs as a reason this or that didn't get completed.

Updating title of City Administrator to City Manager: Our city charter requires a professional manager to run the city, a CEO really. Other charters authorize the mayor to be the CEO as well as council top spot. When we hire the next top city staffer, should we hire someone prepared to be a VP (i.e. City Administrator) or a CEO (i.e. City Manager)? If we don't change the title, we will get candidates with the wrong expectations for what the job entails.

## Droemer wins PGA Professional Championship at Bandon Dunes

BANDON — A year ago, Jesse Droemer was runner-up in the PGA Professional Championship when it was held in Florida.

Last Wednesday, he was crowned champion in the tournament for teaching and club professionals from across the country, taking the title by one stroke at Bandon Dunes Golf Resort.

Droemer, who is from Houston, edged Ben Kern of South Bloomfield, Ohio. Droemer shot a 2-under 70 to finish the four rounds of the tournament at 4-under par.

The brisk afternoon winds Wednesday weren't quite as taxing on the players as they had been a day earlier, when a large number of players shot 80 or higher. On the final day, 16 players shot rounds under par on the Bandon Dunes layout.

The best of those was 2025 champion Tyler Collet of Vero Beach, Fla., who followed his 81 in the heavy winds Tuesday with a 5-under 67 in the morning and early afternoon Wednesday that put him in contention. That included a big improvement on the par-4 eighth hole where he holed out from the fairway for eagle after carding a bogey a day earlier.

Unlike Tuesday, though, the scores for the late starters did not soar as they had a day earlier and Collet finished in a tie with three others for fourth place. Michael Kartrude of Royal Palm Beach, Fla., was third at 2-under.

Droemer, who was playing in the penultimate group, moved to the top of the leaderboard with birdies on the seventh, ninth and 10th holes. When he had a two-putt birdie on the par-5 13th hole, he was 5-under and three shots in front of the field.

But in the final group, Kern also birdied 13 and then hit his

approach close on 14 for another birdie. When Droemer had a three-putt bogey on the tough 15th hole, Kern had moved into a tie for first.

Kern nearly moved in front on No. 16, but his birdie putt lipped out.

Then came the pivotal 17th hole.

Droemer hit his approach close, but as with a few other putts, his birdie effort slipped by the hole.

A few minutes later, Kern's approach bounced through the green and down a hill toward the canyon and creek that separates Bandon Dunes from the resort's Bandon Preserve par-3 course. Kern's ball stopped before it got into the hazard, but his chip came up well short of the cup and he missed the par putt, dropping a shot behind.

Both Droemer and Kern recorded pars on the par-5 18th hole and Droemer was champion.

Droemer said it was an honor to join the long list of winners of the Walter Hagen Cup when he received the trophy from John Lindert, past president of the PGA.

And he was quick to give a shout out to Bandon Dunes caddie Carl Everts, who was on his bag for the tournament.

"I couldn't have done it without you," he said to Everts, who was in the crowd watching the trophy presentation.

Droemer later said Everts saved him countless shots with reads on some of the subtle breaks on the greens.

Everts praised the play of Droemer.

"We played incredible in the wind," Everts said. "He hit all the shots you need to. He made shot after shot, which is kind of cool."

Everts joined the ranks of Bandon Dunes caddies who have

helped golfers win big tournaments, including all but two of the United States Golf Association events the resort has hosted.

"I said local caddies win these things," Everts said.

The golfers played Bandon Dunes and Pacific Dunes the first two days of the tournament before the final two days were on Bandon Dunes. In all, 312 professionals from across the country started the tournament, all having advanced at one of 41 different qualifiers, before the field was cut to the top 90 and ties after two rounds and the top 70 and ties for the final round.

While Droemer won the title, the other battle was for the 20 spots in the upcoming PGA Championship in Pennsylvania.

As it turned out, no playoff was needed for those spots, with 20 players at 2-over or better for the week.

For a while, it looked like Austin Hurt of Bainbridge Island, Wash., was in danger of missing the PGA Championship. Hurt, who led after each of the first three days following his opening-day 64 at Bandon Dunes, had three bogeys and a double-bogey in the first five holes Wednesday. But in another

roller-coaster day that included just six pars (one more than his round Tuesday), Hurt had three late birdies to finish in the tie for fourth at 1-under.

Of the 20 players to make it into the PGA Championship, eight had Bandon Dunes loopers. The other local caddies included David Tatge, who was carrying for Garrett Sapp, who tied for fourth; Tony Shuster, Jeff Wells, Ricky Pruitt and Donny Hiebing who caddied for golfers tying for 10th — past champion Michael Block, Ryan Lenahan, Jared Jones and Chris Gabrielle, respectively — and Dave Friedland and Rigel Hahn, who caddied for Ryan Vermeer and Timothy Wiseman who tied for 18th. Another 23 local loopers helped their players make it to the tournament's final round Wednesday.

Three of the eight women in the tournament had made it to the final round. Sabrina Bonanno of Sammamish, Wash., was best among them, finishing in a tie for 34th. Allie Knight of Knoxville, Tenn., finished in a tie for 62nd and Sandra Changkija of Daytona Beach, Fla., finished tied for 69th.

Bandon Dunes has a long

## Petrey, Henthorn set records at Coos County Meet

Coos County's top track and field athletes put up several big marks in the 118th Coos County Track Meet on Friday at Marshfield High School.

The event is the oldest annual high school meet in the state and though the numbers of athletes were lower than most past years, there were several standout performances.

Marley Petrey of Bandon and Ella Henthorn of Coquille each one two events and broke a meet record.

Several other athletes won multiple events and all the county's six schools had at least one champion but North Bend. Marshfield's boys and Coquille's girls topped the team standings at the end of the night.

Petrey, Bandon's multi-talented senior and multi-time state champion, set a new record by the slimmest of margins in the 100 meters, where her time of 12.51 seconds edged the old mark of 12.52 by Marshfield's Madelyn Metzler in 2015. Petrey also ran the 400, not one of her typical events, and broke Bandon's school record with her time of 58.13. She now holds school records in the 100, 400, 300 hurdles, long jump and triple jump and is part of the school's top 4x100 relay team.

Henthorn, meanwhile, knocked her mom Holli from the

top spot in the 3,000 meters with her time of 10 minutes and 3.67 seconds. Holli had set the old record of 10:08.7 back in 2005. Henthorn also won the 1,500 in 4:52.11 and helped three other runners to fast times in both races.

North Bend's Addison Horning was runner up in both races with new bests of 4:50.66 in the 1,500 and 10:51.43 in the 3,000. North Bend's Ellie Massie had season bests while finishing third in the 1,500 (4:58.86) and fourth in the 3,000 (11:04.79). Bandon's Jael Legutki was fourth in the 1,500 (5:03.78) and third in the 3,000 with a new best (10:53.14).

Petrey and Henthorn were bypassed for outstanding runner by the coaches in favor of Marshfield hurdler Rylee McNally who won the 100 hurdles in 16.90 and the 300 hurdles in 47.56, both new bests, and was part of both winning relays. She teamed with Claire Roberts, Annhelena Vancannon and Kindall Wyatt to win the 4x100 in 51.74 and with Wyatt, Bella Cox and Brooklyn Pederson to win the 4x400 in 4:17.94.

The outstanding jumper for the girls was Coquille's Bristol Layton, who won both the long jump (15-10) and triple jump (32-6 1/4).

The outstanding thrower was Danika Bushnell of Powers, who out-dueled Bandon's Caitlyn Michalek in a battle of state champions in the javelin with a

winning throw of 123-0. Michalek threw 119-1.

Bushnell also finished second to Myrtle Point's Jayme Padgett in the shot put, with Padgett throwing 33-9 and Bushnell 33-3. Marshfield's Sierra Sanners was just behind at 33-1 and won the discus with a throw of 110-0 that was better than Padgett's 105-2.

Kendra Bushnell of Powers cleared a new best 10 feet, 6 inches to win the pole vault and Coquille's Ada Millet cleared 10 feet. Myrtle Point's Delaney La Franchi won the high jump by clearing 4-10 and Bandon's Safaa Dimitruk was winner of the 800 (2:35.61) while teammate Claire Briggs won the 200 (27.14).

For the boys, Marshfield's Carter McGriff was outstanding runner after winning the 100 in a personal best 11.20 and the 200 in a season-best 22.52. McGriff also was part of both winning relays, teaming with Christian Baugh, Chandler Wyatt and Jake Day to win the 4x100 in 43.82 and Day, Wyatt and Nicoya Pruess to win the 4x400 in 3:26.09.

Marshfield's Jaxson Stovall had strong winning times in both the 1,500 (4:05.25) and 3,000 (8:59.53).

Bandon's Noah Brown also was a double-winner, taking the 800 (2:00.77) and pole vault (13-6).

Day won the 400 for the Pirates in a personal best 50.92

and Baugh won the 300 hurdles in 42.06.

Myrtle Point's Wyatt Richards was named outstanding thrower after taking the javelin (161-2) and finishing second in the discus (136-10) behind Marshfield's Glen Crook (138-4). Cole Lehnerr of Powers won the shot put (45-6).

Myrtle Point also had the outstanding boys jumper, Brody Ligon, who won the long jump by soaring 20-1. The other jumps winners were Myrtle Point's Deven Lister in the high jump (5-10) and Bandon's Tyler Senn in

the triple jump (38-6). Bandon's Reggie Turner won the 110 hurdles with a new best 16.99. He also was second to Baugh in the 300 hurdles (44.51) while Baugh was second in the shorter race (17.89) both with personal bests.

Marshfield's boys amassed 176 points while Bandon was second (123), followed by Myrtle Point (98), North Bend (44), Powers (31) and Coquille (29).

For the girls, Coquille had 133.5 points, followed by Marshfield (121), Bandon (112.5), North Bend (54), Powers (49) and Myrtle Point (35).

Modernizing the title of City Administrator to City Manager: The City claims that this is merely a change of titles. An administrator works with a 'strong mayor' form of government where the mayor is in charge of the city and is generally not considered a member of council. This change appears reasonable but it may be costly.

Providing for Council Rules to be established by resolution as well as ordi-

nance: The city claims the change will make it easier to operate without much fuss. However, the purpose of Council Rules is to specify Council authority over meeting agendas, debate, voting and more - its' core functioning!

An ordinance is a 'SHALL'; a resolution is a 'MAY'. An ordinance by nature is hardened against tampering and that will protect Council authority from encroachment. Further, during the second meeting it was stated that an ordinance is subject to State guidelines and allows for a referendum vote. A resolution does

not.

Are you willing to give up a chance to challenge a Council action?

Updating the process to fill council vacancies in limited circumstances: The City claims this provision will allow the City to carry on, should a majority of councilors become unable to function.

“Providing for council rules to be established by ordinance or resolution”: To my understanding, ordinances are more formal, permanent. To me, this update simplifies how the council as a team can operate without permanent changes when they aren’t needed, as well as creates opportunity for time limits or other ways to try improvements and see what works.

“Updating the process to fill council vacancies in limited circumstances”: These have come from litigation where cities experienced a council without an elected quorum for extended periods. Without councils to choose courses of actions, city services can grind to a halt quickly. For us in North Bend, it’s a little more of a concern because our charter has lower monetary thresholds for when council must approve of a purchase. Many decisions in many

departments require council approval all year long. er kind of port. Detractors are worried about long term financial viability, ecological impacts and changes to the way of life in Empire.

"When I was Speaker of the Oregon House, I helped save the rail line to Coos Bay because I saw how critical the Port of Coos Bay was to all those who call Oregon's rural South Coast home. Now, we are one step closer to the Port of Coos Bay becoming the first fully ship-to-rail port facility on the West

Coast—with the potential to transform the region and our state," said Merkley.

"The Port of Coos Bay project stands to benefit working families across the region by creating good-paying, local union jobs and will continue to work with local and federal partners to get this project over the finish line."

The total state and federal funding for the project now sits at over \$160 million indicating a sense of momentum behind the project from lawmakers at both levels.

"I'm glad the teamwork with Senator Merkley, Congresswoman Hoyle

along with state and local officials has generated this most recent federal investment in the rail line that keeps this transformational Port of Coos Bay project advancing down the tracks," said Wyden.

"This significant investment is great news for the port's fresh approach to generate thousands of good-paying jobs on the South Coast and to expand supply chain capacity for our entire country. And I'll keep pressing for the needed additional federal investments to complete this innovative ship-to-rail approach."

best to go to the post office in person and specifically request a postmark. All ballots must be postmarked on or before May 19 to be accepted.

You can use the My Vote tool on the Oregon Secretary of State's official website at [OregonVotes.gov](https://OregonVotes.gov) to track your ballot and see that it has been received.

It is highly recommended to vote early and to vote informed. Early voting better ensures your vote is counted quickly and allows for a faster turnaround of results after election day closes at 8 p.m.

"If people vote early then we can get those results out quicker," said Brecke. "It is a long day... We guarantee that everything that comes in gets scanned in so you can go online and see that it is received. Most of the time

we will get them all the way through tabulation, but if its two-o'clock in the morning, we look at how much is left and decide if we can get them through in a reasonable amount of time."

Election day is a marathon for elections office employees. The three full time staff members are there from seven a.m. until that late-night breaking point, only to turn around and be back in the office the next morning.

Counts are tabulated using air-gapped machines, and those handling ballots do so at tables with representatives from both major parties to ensure security. Results will be posted online as soon as possible once 8 p.m. rolls around on the 19th. Rolling updates are scheduled as posted on the county's elections web page.

Brecke also encouraged anyone who is curious about the process to sign up for observation. Mem-

bers of the community can register for a time slot to watch the proceedings as they unfold and pose questions to the team at the elections office.

If you have any other questions about the process, your ballot, or observation you can reach out to the Coos County Clerk's office at (541) 396-7610 or check the elections page of the county website at [co.coos.or.us/clerk/page/elections](https://co.coos.or.us/clerk/page/elections).

"The primaries are always a lower percentage [voter turnout], typically around 38% in our count... We would like to see people voting early and we would like to see that percentage rate go up," said Brecke. "The more people who are voting, the more voices are heard. Then we're getting a really good feel for what the public actually wants."

Vote early, vote informed, but most importantly vote in the first place.

opment costs to make the project worth pursuing.

Around 120 people attended the two town hall meetings, approximately 80 percent of which stated they were against residential development on the site. Most cited concerns over traffic and infrastructure as their leading concerns.

What locals did support was recreational use of the land for trails, parks and other easily accessible open spaces for folks to enjoy. AKS recommend-

ed that the city change the zoning on the area to reflect that use. Taking that 110 acres off of the possible development area for the city's urban growth boundary would potentially allow them to find that growth elsewhere. An agreement will need to be found with the port as to what is best for the parcel.

"Finally, we have an answer, and I appreciate that. We have clear direction that this is not feasible. It's great to get an answer, finally, that's

definitive... and we need to look at other ways to build the housing out through the urban growth boundary or whatever else it is," said Mayor Joe Benetti in response to the findings. "I also appreciate the public input that was gained. I think its important that we keep the public involved."

Each of the council members present expressed gratitude that they finally had an answer after thirty years of inquiries over development on the tract.

## As I See It

Every year as we approach Memorial Day, I remember the Stormwatchers festival held that weekend for a number of years, back in the 1980s. One of the main events was a sandcastle contest (first photo) which drew hundreds of people to the beach to craft a sandcastle or just watch. # Southwestern partners with Rotary Clubs to host “Gift of Literacy” program

“The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more you learn, the more places you’ll go.” — Dr. Seuss

More than 500 first-graders from throughout Coos County gathered at Southwestern Oregon Community College for a celebration of books and reading on April 23, 2026. The event marked the culmination of the Gift of Literacy Program, a six-month initiative designed to encourage a lifelong love of reading among young children. Reading is fundamental. It develops young children’s brains, provides a window into the world around them and helps them do better in all school subjects. Even so, 800 million people around the world cannot read or write. And many families (and some schools) have no books for children to read. With the idea of im-

Modeled after the Springfield Gift of Literacy, this well-established, time-tested, award-winning program supports reading and inspires thousands of young children. Each year, Coos County librarians and teachers choose the books. First-grade classrooms receive a set of the books in November, giving teachers an opportunity to read the

books in the classroom and build excitement. The Gift of Literacy Program culminates in the festive celebration at the College with music, guest book readers, and a play put on by youth actors with Little Theatre on the Bay. First-graders receive a bag filled with fun swag, a careers coloring book, and the year’s featured brand-new books! “Literacy is the foundation for lifelong learning, and it’s a privilege to support that journey from the very start,” said Southwestern President and local Rotarian Dr. Patty Scott. “This event reflects our deep commitment — not just to education, but to empowering every child in our community to thrive.” The Rotary Clubs, the

## Reedsport unveil new downtown EV charging stations

Hoping they will help supercharge visits to their historic downtown area, the City of Reedsport cut the ribbon on four new electric vehicle (EV) charging stations. Right across from city hall on the corner of Winchester and 5th street, the new stations invite passing drivers to explore the numerous shops, restaurants and community events that give the main downtown strip its character. “We’re hopeful that bringing in the new technology of EV charging stations will bring people to our downtown area,” said Reedsport’s Community Development Director, Steve Wilson. “Utilizing things like our pharmacy, our businesses, all the new restaurants. They can park their vehicle, we have four stations, and enjoy all that downtown has to offer.” The process as a whole took about a year to come

to fruition. The grant application process began in April of 2025 through the Urban Renewal District, which was able to secure grants from Oregon Coast Visitors Association, Travel Southern Oregon Coast, and the Oregon Department of Transportation’s Community Charging Rebates. The installation, from contracting to completion, was a nine-month process. The work was done through the collaboration of multiple city departments with contractors Central Lincoln PUD and Elkhorn Electric. Reedsport has long served as a travel hub thanks to its unique position which intersects multiple of the South Coast’s main arteries. Highway 38, the Umpqua Scenic Highway, runs right through the heart of the historic downtown connecting Highway 101 to the I-5 and the rest of the West Coast. Making the installation of the chargers, which contin-

ue to grow in demand, a no-brainer for the city. “There are very few charging stations on the Oregon Coast,” said Wilson. “For anyone coming through utilizing 101, they’re going to be on the look for where the next station is at. As you head northward the next isn’t until Newport. That’s a pretty significant stretch.” The average charge can take anywhere from 20 to 45 minutes, making it a perfect opportunity to grab a bite from a local restaurant, check out the goods from small businesses or visit attractions like the Umpqua Discovery Center. The U.S. department of transportation suggests “given the significant time required even when using fast charging infrastructure, EV drivers may also be inclined to combine their refueling stops with other activities, including visits to local stores, restaurants, parks, and attractions in the vicinity. Providing EV charging stations can thus enable rural communities to draw regional travelers driving EVs and to stay connected to the broader EV

charging network, benefiting both residents and outside visitors, as well as bringing in revenue for local businesses” The city thanked all those who were able to attend the ribbon cutting ceremony on April 24, which included community members, representatives from all of the grantors, the contractors and a huge contingent of city staff.

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## Two local caddies earn full college scholarships

Ten caddies from Oregon have been granted the Western Golf Association’s (WGA) Evans Scholarship, including two from Coos County. Safaa Dimitruk from Bandon High School and Annika Bones from Marshfield were both awarded the prestigious grant, which covers full housing and tuition, after selection interviews at the Waverly Country Club in Portland. Both youth caddies were sponsored by Bandon Dunes Golf Resort, which recently hosted the PGA championship. The students will begin college this fall as Evans Scholars, with most Oregon winners expected to attend the University of Oregon in Eugene. Final university placements

will be determined this spring. The Evans Scholarship is valued at more than \$125,000 over four years. Qualification for the scholarship involves caddies excelling in four key areas: a strong caddie record, excellent academics, demonstrated financial need and outstanding character. “These young people have distinguished themselves through years of hard work on the golf course and in the classroom,” said Dan Harmon, a WGA Director and the state chair of Oregon. “Caddying builds confidence, perseverance, and these students have embraced those lessons. We are proud to welcome them as Evans Scholars and look forward to the

impact they will make in college and beyond.” The WGA, headquartered in Glenview, Illinois, has supported the Chick Evans Scholarship Program through the Evans Scholars Foundation since 1930. Known as one of golf’s favorite charities, it is the nation’s largest scholarship program for caddies. Currently, a record 1,260 caddies are enrolled at 27 universities across the country as Evans Scholars, including 34 at the University of Oregon. More than 12,575 caddies have graduated as Evans Scholars since the Program was founded by famed Chicago amateur golfer Charles “Chick” Evans Jr. in 1930. Through the scholastic support received by

the foundation, Evan Scholars graduate at a 98 percent rate with a cumulative 3.3 GPA. Four out of ten scholars are first-generation college students and 96 percent are employed or enrolled in graduate school within six months of graduating. In addition to over 43,500 supporters nationwide, funds for the scholarship program come from Evans Scholars Alumni, who contribute over \$15 million to the program annually. All proceeds from the BMW Championship event during PGA Tour playoffs go straight to the program as well. 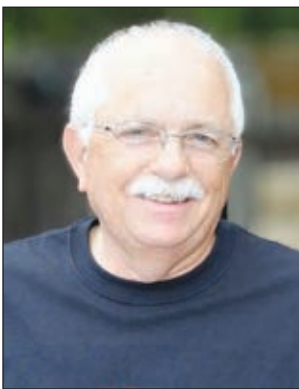
