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## Organizers host Memorial Day at Sunset Heights via Facebook

Organizers of Memorial Day at Sunset Heights Memorial Park established a Facebook page, Tillamook County Memorial Day, for a livestream that took place Memorial Day, May 25. U.S. Navy Captain John M. Kirby was the guest speaker for the event.

Veterans' Services Officer Bill Hatton first attended the Tillamook Memorial Day event 28 years ago with his

wife and daughters. In May 1992, he had been home for one year after serving in Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm.

"In February 1991, as our battalion was preparing to breach through the minefields on the Kuwait border, I witnessed the first helicopters bringing casualties back to the casualty collection point," Hatton said. "The next few helicopters landed and the Marines in body bags were off loaded. It was the first time in my Marine Corps career that I witnessed the

true cost of war."

Hatton said Desert Storm lasted 43 days. The land campaign is referred to as the '100-hour ground war.' Although the war was short, 146 Americans were killed in action.

"For the families of those killed, the impact of that short war is forever," Hatton said.

Because of Hatton's experiences in Desert Storm, the invasion of Iraq and participation in Operation Iraqi Freedom II, it is important to him to honor those that

made the ultimate sacrifice.

Part of the ceremony at Sunset Heights Memorial Park involves reading the names of Tillamook County veterans that have passed away during the last 12 months.

"As a Veterans Services Officer, reading the names is especially significant because our office provided services for many of those that have died within the past year," Hatton said. "When I hear the names being read, I form



a mental picture of the last time we met with them."

The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Memorial Day event are significant, but not eternal, Hatton said. The event did not have the traditional crowd of 100 people or more, the Boy Scouts raising the American flag, coffee and doughnuts, or veterans pairing off and sharing stories with one another. "Despite the pandemic,

by conducting the event and broadcasting it livestream to the public, we continue to honor those veterans that served our nation and our community," Hatton said. "I think they would be gratified that even in this crisis, they have not been forgotten."

## Primary sees 49% turnout at local polls

On Tuesday May 19, Tillamook County voters hit the polls to decide Federal, State and local primary elections. Forty-nine percent of the registered voters in Tillamook County cast ballots in the primary election according to information on the Tillamook County Clerk's office website.

The Tillamook County county commissioner races were decided in the primary election with the winners garnering a majority of the votes, so no runoff will take place.

Unofficial results show Erin Skaar won County Commissioner position No. 1 and David Yamamoto won County Commissioner Position No. 2.

Skaar got 6,395 votes compared to challenger, Bay City Mayor Christopher Kruebbe, who received 1,813 votes.

Incumbent David Yamamoto received 5,318 votes, his challenger David McCall got 3,771 votes. Yamamoto will retain his seat on the commission and Skaar will take over Jan. 1 2021 after being sworn in.

## Tillamook High School holds graduation procession May 29

The entire community is invited to join Tillamook High School (THS) for the senior procession Friday, May 29. Students will leave the high school at 6:30 p.m., travel down Miller, turn west on 11th, travel north on Pacific, and then east on Third Street to end at the Fairgrounds (location of graduation) at 7 p.m.

THS encourages you to line the procession route, decorate cars, cheer, yell,

honk, hold up signs, decorate houses and help celebrate the graduates.

Follow all social distancing guidelines recommended by the Oregon Health Authority. People are encouraged to remain in their cars. Do not block private driveways or streets. Do not stop traffic for pictures or any other reason. The ceremony starts promptly at 7 p.m.

Due to limited parking, only cars

## Courthouse reopens to employees May 26

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners discussed at their board meeting on May 20 directing non-essential county employees to return to work. The courthouse will be reopening on Tuesday, May 26, to employees only and be closed to the public until June 8.

Commission Chair Bill Baertlein said the county

has been shut down for six weeks and it is time to get employees back to work. The commissioners will vote on the board order on Friday, May 22.

"My understanding of it is we're opening the building to employees only but not the public yet," Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said. "We're eager to welcome our employees back to work in Phase I with all kinds of provisions for safety and social distancing."

In a phase down the road, the commissioners will open the building to the public by appointment only.

Incident command has been working on this reopening for two or three weeks.

Baertlein said he believes they will not require employees to wear masks. Clatsop and Columbia Counties are not requiring masks for their employees. Bell said the

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# Tillamook Narcotics Team makes drug bust

On May 13, at approximately 3:48 p.m., Tillamook Narcotics Team (TNT) Detectives conducted a traffic stop with a vehicle on North Main Avenue near Goodspeed Road after observing the vehicle frequent a drug house near the area. TNT Detectives contacted two individuals in the vehicle Chelsey Snook, 30 of Tillamook, OR, and Jeremy Mastriano, 35 of Tillamook, OR. Detectives searched the vehicle relative to the investigation finding

nearly an ounce of heroin, a small amount of methamphetamine, a large amount of cash, a large amount of packaging supplies, scales and drug paraphernalia. Detectives also located a small amount of shotgun and rifle ammunition. Mastriano was arrested and transported to the Tillamook County Jail on charges of Unlawful Delivery of Heroin, Unlawful Delivery of Methamphetamine, Unlawful Possession of Heroin, and Unlawful Possession of

Methamphetamine. Snook was detained and released at the scene pending further investigation and charges. Because Mastriano is a convicted felon and not allowed to possess firearms and information was obtained in the investigation which indicated he had access to guns, further investigation into the ammunition located from the traffic stop was conducted. During the investigation, several additional subjects were contacted in relation to

the firearms. On May 21st, 2020 at approximately 10:18 AM, Andre Melson, 63 of Tillamook, OR, was arrested transported to the Tillamook County Jail on charges of Hindering Prosecution, Tampering with physical evidence, and Firearm used in a felony. Ultimately three firearms were located and tied to Mastriano, who had three additional charges of Felon in

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## Tillamook Mayor to face Debbie Boothe-Schmidt in November election



**Tillamook Mayor Suzanne Weber won the primary election and will face Debbie Boothe-Schmidt for State house District 32 in November.**

Tillamook Mayor Suzanne Weber won a clear majority in the May Primary Election and moves on to the general

election where she will face Democrat Debbie Boothe-Schmidt for State House District 32. The seat is cur-

rently held by Rep. Tiffany Mitchell.

"I'm humbled and grateful that voters chose our campaign to bring our common sense back to Salem," said Weber. "As the Mayor of Tillamook and a 50-year resident, I know that people here won't stand for being pushed around by Portland politicians anymore. We will fight every day from now until November to ensure that we give our rural working families and coastal communities a strong voice representing them in the State Capitol."

Suzanne Weber has lived in Tillamook for 50 years and has served her community as an elementary school teacher for 30 years. After retiring from the Tillamook School District, Weber opened a small retail business, which she ran with her sister-in-law. In 2002, she was appointed to the Tillamook City Council, a nonpartisan position she held

until 2010 when she was first elected mayor. Weber was re-elected for a third term in 2018.

Weber has been an outspoken critic of Kate Brown and Tiffany Mitchell's onslaught of fees, taxes and price increases to pay for Portland ideas that do nothing to help the Oregon Coast. Her priority is protecting our natural-resource based jobs and the families who depend on them. Over 50 percent of the contributions to Friends of Suzanne Weber have come from House District 32.

The race for House District 32 is expected to be among the most hotly contested 2020 legislative elections in all of Oregon. A strong plurality of district residents are registered as non-affiliated or Independent voters. Tiffany Mitchell's campaign spent more than half a million dollars to hold on to the seat in 2018.

 County commissioners will certify the results within 20 days. As of Wednesday, May 20, at 12:55 a.m., voter turnout for Tillamook County was 49.04 percent with 9,872 total number voting.

**State primary results**  
 In the race for president, Joseph R. Biden won the Oregon democratic vote with 354,108 votes or 67.43 percent. Donald J. Trump won the republican vote with 303,504 votes or 93.61 percent. Trump ran unopposed in the primary election.  
 For US Senator on the republican side, Jo Rae Perkins edged out Paul J. Romero Jr with 148,040 votes or 48.98 percent. The democrats will send incumbent Jeff Merkley

to the general election with 482,124 votes. Merely ran in the primary unopposed.  
 Democrats are sending Suzanne Bonamici, who garnered 77,906 votes to the general election in the US Representative 1st District. She will face Christopher C. Christensen, republican who received 18,766 votes.  
 In the 2nd District democrat race, Alex Spenser received 22,705 votes while republican Cliff Bentz leads unofficially with 34,389 votes.

Earl Blumenauer got the nod in the US Representative 3rd District race with 121,758 votes. He will face republican challenger Joanna Harbour who got 17,482 votes.  
 In the US Representative 4th district Peter Defazio will face Alex Skarlatos in the general election in November.  
 Incumbent democrat Kurt Schrader running in the US Representative 5th District, received 70.54 percent of the vote and will face republican Amy Ryan Courser who got 52.55 percent of the vote.



### Donate to the North County Business Relief campaign

Fulcrum Community Resources, a non-profit organization registered with the state of Oregon, has partnered with the Manzanita Visitors Center to create a North Tillamook County Business Relief campaign. The purpose is to raise funds to help our struggling local small businesses and residents who are self-employed. All business applicants in Manzanita, Nehalem or Wheeler, and surrounding North Tillamook County, are eligible.

We started this effort in mid-April. We have met once a week since 4/25 via zoom to distribute funds we have

received. To-date (5/22) we have distributed approximately \$40,000 to 40 north Tillamook County businesses, 25 of which have store fronts in our three-town area. This represents 29% of the total ask (through a simple application form). The \$40,000 is comprised of individual donations from \$20 to \$1200 (economic relief amount)

to \$5000. Our hearts are warmed by this outpouring of caring and generosity to keep our local businesses afloat.

What we have distributed so far has been helpful, and very gratefully received, but it still isn't enough! It falls far short of guaranteeing that

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

## FENCEPOSTS

It was a quiet morning fishing on Tillamook Bay when I got an alert on my cell phone from Kathy Burke: dead whale washing ashore on Bayocean Spit! Captain Pete and I hurriedly reeled in, hustled home and headed out to the beach. About a mile and a half north of our little village, we saw the dead whale. It was a juvenile gray whale, about 25 feet long, in bad shape. A park ranger was there to post signs protecting the carcass until Jim Rice, Stranding Coordinator for Oregon State University, could drive up to examine the whale.

The park ranger told me they planned to simply leave it there and "let nature take its course," as opposed to burying it, which they had done with a dead whale near Sand Lake recently. And, no, there are no plans to blow up the whale (for those not in the know, check out a story from Nov. 1970 about a whale being blown up on the beach in Florence). It's been almost 30 years since the Steen family last saw a dead whale washed up on Bayocean Spit. In May 1991, a large gray whale washed up near the south jetty. We reported that

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find to the authorities and to a friend whose husband worked for the Bureau of Land Management. The BLM employee got permission to retrieve the whale's skeleton after the mammal

had decomposed. He and an assistant went out with a flatbed truck and brought back the bones in late November, but they could not bring back the entire skeleton at one time. They asked if they could store some of the bones under our deck for a while; we said yes. The day after the bones were placed beneath the deck, our elderly neighbor, Art Bogart, walked by them and commented, "That was sure a big turkey you folks had for Thanksgiving." The skull of that whale was put on display in the Yaquina Head Marine Gardens near

Newport, Ore. If you find a live or dead marine mammal on the beach, contact Jim Rice at OSU. His cell phone is 541-270-6830, his office number is 541-867-0446, and his e-mail address is jim.rice@oregonstate.edu. Jim's primary interest, according to Oregon State's website, is working with the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at the OSU College of Veterinary Medicine to investigate the disease processes affecting marine mammals along the Oregon Coast. Sonya Thompson reported a couple of critter

sightings. Both a bobcat and a coyote were recently seen in her 5th St. NW neighborhood. But no elk or deer; perhaps social distancing among the species? In any case, those of you with small pets might want to bring them in at night. Sad news to report: Long-time Cape Meares resident Jay Jones, age 93, passed away May 19 after having suffered a stroke the week before. He was predeceased by his wife, Marcene, in 2015 and his daughter, Jaylen, in 2012. Condolences to the Jones family from all of us in Cape Meares.

If you have not completed your 2020 Census, please do so. Online it only took me a few minutes, verifying my address and the number of people residing at that address. The latest information I have seen to date shows Tillamook County at a little over 30% completion rate. Letters were mailed out in March and April with a code to enter. You may respond online (secure website), by phone or mail. While April 1st was a reference date, it is not the deadline. They will not ask for social security numbers or other personal data such as citizenship. They just need

the number of people in the household on April 1st of this year. Realizing not everyone has computer access, the phone number to call in English is 844-330-2020 or

844-468-2020 for Spanish. Other languages available are listed online at 2020census.gov website. Customer Service representatives are available every day from 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. Eastern Time. To respond by mail, please look to the website for guidance. You may be asking "Why is this so important?" Your response does matter! The results from the census determine how federal funding flows into states and communities each year for schools, fire departments, health clinics, even roads and highway construction. It helps fund

public transportation, programs to support rural areas, programs to restore wildlife, to prepare for wildfires, child abuse prevention, housing assistance for older adults and many other grants and programs. It determines how many seats each state gets in Congress. And it is mandated by the US Constitution in Article 1, Section 2. It is done every ten years to update allocations of funding and adjust congressional numbers. So please help our county get the funding we deserve by going online, phone or mail. I was surprised to see the

low percentage of voters in last week's election. Some people don't believe that a primary election is important, but there are always other issues included as well as deciding who is taking the lead in our government. Let's change that in November. Things are slowly opening up in our areas, which is a relief to business owners and patrons. I was thrilled with the Library opening and had a few books on order that I wasn't able to pick up before the shutdown. Houses of worship have become creative in our time of need. The county commissioners

have worked with Lincoln and Clatsop counties to open in concert with each other. There is an information listing on the Garibaldi city website and Garibaldi Oregon Facebook page of known hours of operation of businesses in our town. If you need to update your business information for that list, please contact Laura at City Hall on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 503-322-3327. Happy birthday (last Friday) to Teresa Oliver Munnholland at Garibaldi Shell! You're catching up with me! Please email or call with your information to share.

Oregon Department of Human Services (DHS) is providing additional food dollars for families with school age children who qualify for free school lunch. If the family of such a child was receiving SNAP (food stamp) benefits when schools closed March 13, \$384 will be automatically added to the household's Oregon Trail card for each child. Thanks to Eva at Tillamook DHS for verifying this information. If Covid impacted your household (or the household of a child in your orbit) financially, please telephone DHS at 503-842-4453 to inquire whether SNAP is available for your child. Another headline on the radio news this morning is a

spike in local water rescues. As the weather warms up each spring, it's important to remember that water temperatures in our rivers and the ocean lag behind due to melting snow from the mountains. When you kayak, canoe or boat, dress for the water temperature, not the air temperature. And always wear a life jacket. Some local eateries have re-opened indoor seating for diners. Bear Creek Artichokes, located in Hemlock, 503-398-5411, is open from 10 a.m. until 3ish p.m. Wednesday through Sunday. They have one table indoors, available on a first come, first served basis. people waiting to be seated, but don't let that hold you back. They have a wait because Trip Adviser rated the restaurant a 4.5 out of five. They are famous for their oysters, of course, but serve a variety of other seafood, as well as burgers. Being able to watch employees shucking and packing oysters while you eat is a plus. They also have a seafood market so

you can take your oysters home. We have had many dinner meetings at our home, better known as grilled oyster parties. If you need a gift for someone, look no further: A gift card to the Fish Peddler is a one-size-fits-all kind of gift, especially for me...hint, hint.

I'm still cooking recipes from my Mother's cookbook from 1943 called "Recipes for Today" written by General Foods Corporation at the request of the federal government. Food, gasoline, and other commodities were in short supply during WWII. The cookbook opens with a letter to Uncle Sam from "Your Loving Niece Victoriana". She shares her five new food rules because she knows he has a big job keeping those life lines running out to all the hungry people. Niece Victoriana's rule #1 was to eat food that was easy to raise. Rule #2 is my favorite: Buy only what you need; this is no time to hoard.

To handle the shortages of food and other commodities, the government distributed ration cards or stamps which neighbors shared or traded. If someone was out of food, the neighbors would pool their stamps to feed another hungry family. If nothing else, history teaches us that in times like these neighbors need one another. "Three things in human life are important. The first is to be kind. The second is to be kind. The third is to be kind" (Henry James).

**I'll leave you today with a recipe from Victoriana for a casserole topping for one small casserole:**  
*One cup of Toasties,*

*Grapenut Flakes, or Post 40% Bran Flakes*  
*One tbs melted butter*  
*¼ cup of grated American cheese*

Use cereal flakes whole or crushed slightly  
Heat cereal in sauce pan, shaking pan back and forth over medium heat  
Pour butter over hot flakes and toss lightly to distribute butter evenly  
Put into bowl and add grated cheese  
Mix lightly and sprinkle topping over any creamed dish or casserole  
(You can also add minced onion sauteed in melted butter)

# Tillamook discusses reopening city hall

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Tillamook City Council discussed at their May 18 meeting reopening city hall offices. There has been discussion within city hall on how to approach reopening the facility.

City Recorder Ukiah Hawkins said in his report that he and City Manager Paul Wyntergreen have talked about the logistics of social distancing. It is the consensus with staff to open completely to the public. City hall will be open on June 1.

Hawkins said city staff does not feel the need to wear masks as they can maintain physical distance. Masks will be available if customers request.

There is also glass separating customers and employees.

"We could also open up the chamber for you to physically meet in," Wyntergreen said. "If we do that, you would have enough room in there for the council to physically distance but we'd have to have any audience stand on the other side of the barrier in the lobby."

The council agreed to hold the June 1 meeting in the council chambers.

Hawkins also introduced the idea of a consent calendar, or consent agenda. Items in a consent calendar are put in an itemized list that does not include discussion. If a councilor decides they want to debate an item, they call pull it from the consent calendar and

included as a separate item within the agenda before the meeting.

"Part of the reason we do what we do and address individual items is because we're also educating the public on what we're doing so the public doesn't feel that it's just a rubber stamp," Mayor Suzanne Weber said.

Weber agreed the consent agenda is a good way to concede. Councilor John Sandusky said he was part of a board with a consent agenda and it was used to stifle discussion. Councilor Jorge Rios said any councilor can say they want to discuss something.

The council agreed to have the consent agenda for a trial period and will reevaluate it.

## Tillamook discusses ratification of emergency declaration

Tillamook City Council met Monday, May 18, via teleconference to discuss ratification of the emergency declaration. The emergency declaration is in effect until the end of the day on Sunday, May 31.

Tillamook County entered Phase I of reopening on May 15, which will last at least 21 days. The county will then apply for Phase II.

On May 4, city council directed staff to reopen certain public parks, park facilities and businesses within the Tillamook city limits. The city will be following the constraints of Executive Order 20-12, the

Phase I sector guidance for outdoor recreation, and the social distancing guidelines as parks and boat launches are opened.

Park areas that can create a crowd, including playground equipment areas, outdoor sports courts and skate parks remain closed. Park users must maintain at least six feet of distance from other parties on pathways, hiking trails and boat ramps. Park users are prohibited from congregating in parking lots for periods longer than reasonable to retrieve gear.

Tillamook city boat launches opened for use on May 11 on weekdays only, from dawn until dusk. Boaters must be in compliance with all state, city and

marine board regulations.

Transient lodging stays within the city limits are allowed with the exception that everyone must be in compliance with physical distancing requirements and other restrictions stated in Executive Order 20-12.


Mayor Suzanne Weber suggested starting committee meetings again in June.

"I do believe it's time for government to get back to work and I'm in favor of the committees starting again," Councilor Brian Reynolds said.

City manager Paul Wyntergreen will extend the emergency declaration at the end of the month and the council can ratify it at that time.

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I'd like to thank my team of supporters, who helped me during this election. The positive results are due to them, while the responsibility for the inability to obtain a majority rests solely on my shoulders.

## John D. 'Jack' Randall July 25, 1920 - May 18, 2020



On Monday, May 18, John D. ("Jack") Randall peacefully departed this world, two months shy of his 100th birthday. The youngest of four children, he was born to Herman and Edith Randall on July 25, 1920 at the family home in Albany, Oregon.

Jack's (our Dad's) earliest memory is of riding his tricycle on the sidewalk along Woodstock Boulevard at 52nd Street in Portland. Dad was two or three years old when he took baths in the kitchen sink and asked his mother to make a "rooster comb" of his hair. His sister, Eileen, played the piano and her friends gathered and sang (his favorite song was "Margie" and they sang it to him at bedtime: "Margie, I'm always thinking of you, Margie".)

Dad's father was a railroad engineer on the Southern Pacific line, working the 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. switch engine shift at Portland's Brooklyn Yard. When he drove home each day, Dad ran down the street three or four blocks to meet him. He would jump onto the running board of the old Maxwell Touring Sedan and ride the last few blocks home holding onto the doorknob.

The family moved to Gladstone in 1925 because his parents wanted to grow a garden and raise the kids in the country. They bought five acres and a house, planted fruit trees and a huge vegetable garden, kept pigs and chickens and a milk cow named "Muggins." During the Great Depression, his mother many times told him to invite this or that school mate home for dinner; she knew which families had no work and no food.

During the summers of 1937, '38, and '39 Dad worked as a "gandydancer" in a railroad section crew. The crew upgraded track, replacing ties and rails, "pick tamping" (packing ballast under the ties with a pick). This was brutally hard work. Putting in switch points along the rails was a critically important art because the trains would hit them at 70 MPH. Putting in ballast, ties, tie plates, rails and spikes had to be done with precision to stand up against the immense weight and momentum of the speeding locomotive and its following cars that rocketed across the switch plate to change direction.

In August 1941, Dad went to work as a "fireman" on the Southern Pacific, and in February 1942 married our Mom, Bonita Faye ("Bonnie") McEwen, at Moreland

Presbyterian Church in southeast Portland. Over the years they had four children, Mike, John, Nancy and Barbara.

When Dad was 21, he felt great satisfaction in learning how to run a steam locomotive. He worked with old heads, his dad's peers, who had thrown wood on steam locomotives at the turn of the 20th Century. Air braking ("a life-long study," Dad said), regulating steam distribution into the cylinders, accounting for variabilities in terrain, the train's tonnage and number of cars, its speed over the roadbed—all had to be mastered. There was a considerable body of theory in all this, but the real learning was a complicated mix of books and seat-of-the-pants experience.

Dad enlisted in the US Navy during World War II in early 1944, serving on a troop transport ship, the Cape Johnson. When at battle stations he served on a gun crew, but his regular job assignment was to operate valves in the ship's fireroom. Below decks, in the South Pacific, he worked in 135 degree temperatures, losing around thirty pounds in the process.

Dad was involved in six Pacific invasions at Saipan, Tinian, Leyte Gulf, the Philippines Campaign, Iwo Jima and Okinawa. Aboard ship during the war he traveled 99,000 nautical miles

After Iwo Jima was partially secured, Dad said that both at dawn and at dusk it was exhilarating to see the US Marines' sparkling P-51 Mustangs come roaring in from Saipan and make strafing runs against Japanese positions on the slopes of Mt. Suribachi and other parts of the island. Landing on the airstrip to refuel afterward, the Marine pilots looked no older than high school kids.

In the Philippines invasion at Lingayen Gulf off the northwest part of Luzon, Japanese kamikazes attacked Dad's convoy at sunset. The ships in his convoy put up a wall of anti-aircraft fire, but he said it was amazing to see how many of the Japanese planes flew right through the flack to hit or sink several ships in his convoy.

Dad was discharged in January 1946 and went back to work as a fireman on the Southern Pacific Railroad. He studied air brakes, the railroad's book of road rules, steam and diesel locomotive technology, and other topics. Dad brought home stacks of books to study on all these topics and he was promoted to engineer in 1950.

We kids remember Mom hushing us on at least a thousand mornings: "You kids be quiet! Your Dad worked all night and he's trying to sleep." In dead winter, as a young, low-seniority member of the "engineer's extra board", he'd get a call from the dispatcher at midnight for any number of distant jobs: driving to Albany, Wheeler, Salem, Tillamook, McMinnville, Corvallis, or Newberg to pick up a freight train in the pre-dawn hours. He said the jobs always seemed to come up at 3 a.m., and he had to drive to them "75 miles away through a sleet storm." He had no expense reimbursement but paid for his own gas, food and lodging. Jobs were paid on the basis of the weight of the locomotive(s) that an engineer ran, and the best jobs always seemed to be the farthest from home.

On any given job, he often ran the locomotive and three to five diesel power units, their air brakes and electrical systems hooked in tandem. At times in his career he pulled 125 to 130 fully loaded freight cars.

He was a strong union man, and several times was elected president of his local union chapter, The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

The Salmonberry River run over the Coast Range between Portland and Wheeler was among the hardest and most demanding, from a train-running perspective, but this also was the run he enjoyed most. The big engines slipped on the rails due to the 4 percent mountain grades, and this caused slack actions between the cars' couplers. There were "break-in-twos" time and again. If only a coupler knuckle broke, it could be replaced right there.

Otherwise, if the whole draw-bar had broken off a car, each of the separated units' brakes had to be set. He hauled the front section of the train ten or twenty miles to the next siding, then drove back and hooked up the separated units and hauled them up to the siding, leaving them there for a unit of car-men to come out from Portland and make repairs.

The Portland to Tillamook run paid well, had regular hours, and the scenery was great: leaving Portland in the early morning, hauling empty cars to the coast, climbing up through the deep forests and rugged peaks of the Coast Range, running down the Salmonberry River into Wheeler and along Nehalem Bay, through Rockaway and Garibaldi, then rolling into Tillamook in late afternoon. He laid over at the beach until morning, then headed back with full cars of wood chips and lumber, climbing the mountains again and rolling back down into Portland.

Dad loved the beauty: the rugged Salmonberry River, high rail trestles, deer and bear, the forests of the Coast Range—all of it. Against all

rules, he would stop the train and drop off or pick up hunters and fishermen along the Salmonberry.

He had angry memories of the public's recklessly tragic behavior at crossings. Over the decades his trains hit several passenger cars, and people were killed. Many times, kids would stop their cars on the tracks, playing chicken with his train that had no chance to stop. Then the kids would pull away at the last second before being hit, though Dad had laid on the horn, and finally "gone to Emergency." Every diesel power unit and freight car would apply full air brakes instantly and all diesel engines would shut down.

In some heavily loaded conditions the train would need about a mile to stop.


Time was lost as each locomotive unit had an isolation switch that had to be turned off individually. Each power unit had to be restarted one at a time and put back on line. Too frequently, all of this was accomplished while several rail crossings were blocked and car traffic backed up and horns blared. It was nerve wracking and maddening.

Dad was predeceased by our loving Mom, Bonnie, and by our brother John ("JR") and sister Barbara. He is survived by his truly wonderful second wife, Betty Rose (Lorts) Randall, his son Mike and daughter Nancy, and four grandchildren, Peter and Libby and Bryan and Emily.

Dad worked as a railroad fireman and engineer for 40 years. Then he had a 40-year-long retirement. He and Mom moved to Netarts in 1995. He loved the coast, clamming, crabbing, golfing with his buddies, and nailing his fourth and last "hole in one" at age ninety-one. He was an avid reader, kept himself physically and mentally fit, loved to have a beer, enjoy the companionship of family and friends, and laugh a lot. He was a generous man and always said, "I've been lucky all my life."

## James Brian Johnstone June 18, 1945 - May 18, 2020



Born in Edinburgh, Scotland, grew up in Hawick, Scotland on the Scottish Borders.

Son of James Johnstone, engineer and Martha Scott Johnstone, homemaker, both deceased.

Brian excelled in sports and played rugby, golf and was an Olympic triathlete swimming the butterfly stroke.

Graduated from Edinburgh College of Art with a Bachelor's degree in fine art and architectural studies, and came to the United States in the 1970s on a distinguished scholarship to study Pottery and Sculpture.

Brian was in every sense of the word a Renaissance Man. He travelled the world and lived in Spain for awhile where he lived with the Gypsies and mastered the art of the Flamenco Guitar and Spanish cuisine. He also lived in India on a tea plantation owned by a friend of his father's. There he learned Indian cuisine as well. His Indian food was authentic and delicious. Working for Morrison-Knudsen, he supervised construction of the largest penitentiary in the world in Java, Indonesia.

Brian loved cats and was owned by many cats over his lifetime.

In 1997 Brian met Kate Burnett in Portland, OR. He played Flamenco Guitar at a place called Cafe Sol, a little

Spanish-themed tapas bar. They fell in love, and Kate traveled with Brian to Cave Junction, OR, where he was construction manager for a municipal water treatment plant. They bought an RV and lived in it for a year and a half until the project was completed. Brian and Kate loved the Oregon Coast and bought a house in Manzanita, Oregon. They were married in Cannon Beach, Oregon in the garden of the Wavecrest Inn in 1997.

In 2007 a 2.5 acre property in Nehalem, Oregon overlooking the Nehalem River came up for sale which featured a large shop next to the house. They bought the property and it was then that Brian put his ceramic skills to use and created Nehalem Clayworks, a pottery studio. The studio was a great success, until in 2016 Brian fell while closing the heavy sliding doors of the studio, breaking his hip. Following that, it was too painful for Brian to sit at the pottery wheel, so they closed the studio, sold all their equipment and leased the space to a landscaping company. Brian's health deteriorated during the years after that, which eventually caused his demise.

Brian was brilliant, had a great sense of humor and he and Kate laughed their way through some rough times. He was opinionated and blunt. He was well known and loved throughout the local community and Scotland. He will be deeply missed.

He is survived by Kate Johnstone, his loving wife of 23 years.

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

# Team explores ways to enhance community & economic vitality in Tillamook County

Earlier this year, a team from Tillamook County participated in a three-day course designed especially for rural communities seeking to capitalize on their natural and cultural assets. Working with national experts on sustainable tourism, economic development, natural and cultural resources, community health,

transportation, and branding, the nine-person team looked at ways to leverage existing and emerging programs and community assets that make Tillamook County a vibrant place to live, work and play. The Conservation Fund designed and delivered the program to a total of six teams from regions in Pennsylvania, Virginia, and

Puerto Rico, in addition to the team from Tillamook County. Groups were selected through an application process to participate in the program. Each community group included diverse representation from business and tourism, elected officials, civic leaders, public land managers, and engaged citizens.

The Tillamook County team assembled to attend the workshop that took place Feb 10-14, 2020, included:

Mary Faith Bell, County Commissioner; Deb Wilkins, USDA, US Forest Service; Michelle Jenck, Tillamook County Wellness; Nan Devin/Arica Sears, Tillamook County & Regional Tourism; Sarah Absher, Tillamook County Community Development; Eva Wilson, Tillamook County Creamery Association; Claudine Rehn, Tillamook Estuaries Partnership (TEP); Joanne Woeffe, Tillamook County Parks; & Erin Skaar, CARE.

Deb Wilkins initiated the application, stating, "In my role as Hebo District Ranger of the U.S. Forest Service and as co-chair of the Tillamook County Wellness Access to Physical Activity Committee, this seemed like the perfect opportunity for us. We know people are coming here to take advantage of our trails and outdoor recreation amenities. We want to make sure locals have those same opportunities and that everyone who uses these natural spaces can do so safely and with an understanding of how we can protect them. The long-term health of our economy and community depend on it."

Tillamook Team members received a great deal of useful information from the course, such as the fact that outdoor recreation is a major economic driver, contributing more to the U.S. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) than the pharmaceutical industry. National experts noted



that it is the "soul of the community" that attracts investment, such as social events, openness to newcomers, community aesthetics, physical beauty and green spaces. Presenters gave practical tips for how to enhance community livability in ways that attract new businesses and jobs, instill community pride and protect the natural beauty of the region.

"The Tillamook County team application presented an ideal candidate for this program due to the strong ties throughout the community and their passion for protecting and enhancing the area's natural and cultural resources," said Director of The Conservation Fund's Conservation Leadership Network, Katie Allen. "It's our goal to help communities foster valuable partnerships, reinforce development plans that balance environmental and economic goals and provide technical assistance to enable places like Tillamook County to become even more vibrant and thriving communities."

Members of the Tillamook team are involved in a variety of local efforts that work collectively to increase access to culture, recreation and other measures that increase community livability and

well-being. Research shows that these investments contribute to having a sense of belonging, which helps communities thrive. Ensuring that youth and families with young children reap the benefits of this work was a theme during the course's team planning sessions.

For more than 20 years, The Conservation Fund has delivered this course and other services to over 700 communities in the U.S. and Canada. The national course is offered annually at the National Conservation Training Center in Shepherdstown, WV with place-based programs offered on request.

1/8 teaspoon salt  
2 Tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

### Directions:


1. Preheat the oven to 350° F.
2. Mix the sugar and cornstarch together in a large bowl.
3. Add the cherries and stir to mix. Add the vanilla and mix again.

## County opens additional boat launches, posts no parking zone in Pacific City

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners held a teleconference board meeting Wednesday, May 20, to consider opening additional county boat launches during the COVID-19 local state of emergency. The commissioners opened Lake Lytle, Sollie Smith and Fishers Point boat launches.

The board of commissioners designated a state of emergency within Tillamook County on March 14 due to the spread of COVID-19. On March 22, they closed all county, state and federal parks within the county, all county parking lots, beach access,

and certain parking areas along road rights-of-way, and all county boat launches to non-commercial users. On May 5 and May 13, the county opened certain boat launches within the county during weekdays to users with a valid Tillamook County annual parking pass or day use pass.

The commissioners took out the restriction of the number of people per boat in the order.

"We're also adding the Tillamook Tidewater Access, the ADA handicap accessible boat dock on Hwy 131," Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said. "All of the launches will be open Monday through Friday, and close at Friday at 6 p.m."

Although the emergency still exists, the board deems it is appropriate to continue reopening county facilities in a safe and strategic manner.

The following Tillamook County boat launches will be open Monday through Friday for access with an annual or day pass: Lake Lytle, Nehalem Bay, Memaloose Point, Netarts Bay, Sollie Smith, Steiner, Fishers Point, Pacific City (off Sunset Avenue) and Three Rivers.

The Tillamook Tidewater Access (Brad Dawson Tidewater Handicap Access Facility), located at Hwy 131, will be open Monday through Friday. The Tillamook County boat launch located at Hungry Harbor Drive will be open Monday through Friday for access only by recreational or commercial dory boat operators. The boat launches and Tillamook Tidewater Access will be closed at 6 p.m. on Fridays.

All other county public boat launches remain closed to non-commercial users. All

county, state and federal parks within Tillamook County remain closed. All other county parking lots, beach accesses and certain parking areas along road rights-of-way remain closed.

The commissioners also voted to post a no parking zone on Cape Kiwanda Drive in Pacific City, from its intersection with Circle Drive to Pacific Avenue. The Tillamook County Public Works Department will install signs for regulating this zone.

Commissioner David Yamamoto said a majority of the business owners are concerned about too many people parking during the summer. If there are additional COVID-19 cases, the county may have to shut down again.

"Oregon Parks and Rec wants to keep beach parking closed for the time being," Yamamoto said.

The parking lot and beach access in Cape Kiwanda is closed.





State resources are decreasing due to completion of seismic grants; however, there is a partial offsetting increase due to the Oregon Corporate Excise Tax - Student Investment Account (SIA) grant. The SIA grant is budgeted to provide an additional 3 FTE in Instruction and 6 FTE in Sport Services. In addition to the SIA grant increases to staff FTE, there are other staff FTE increases due to enrollment increases and student needs at the Middle School and High School of 3.5 FTE in Instruction and 2 FTE in Support Services to be paid from General Fund resources. The increase in Interfund Transfers is providing funding of major Facility Acquisition & Construction projects including two elementary school playground shelters and major roofing projects for the high school and preschool buildings. These projects cost about the same as the seismic upgrades that occurred in prior years.



**STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN ACTIVITIES and SOURCES OF FINANCING \*\***

**SPECIAL NOTE:** The 2020-2021 Budget was prepared during a time of extreme uncertainty, as the country copes with the unprecedented situation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The extent to which this pandemic has a negative impact on the economy is hard to predict, but the current estimate is a shortfall between \$1 and \$3 billion in statewide revenue. Oregon Department of Education (ODE) expects a significant impact to the 2020-2021 State School Funding (SSF), but Districts are not likely to know the full extent of the financial impact for a few months. The next economic forecast will be released in late May, after which the Oregon Legislature will meet to determine funding levels. There are several federal and state relief programs, as well as the State's rainy-day fund, that may help offset some of the potential funding deficit. Due to all the unknowns around revenue shortfall, the District has developed budgets for several different funding levels ranging from \$8.3 to \$9.0 billion. The budget approved by the budget committee is based on the Governor's original \$9.0 billion biennium funding level. A backup budget will be implemented once the actual funding level is determined. The District also plans to use its reserve account to help offset funding shortfalls and to retain current staffing levels to the extent possible. This budget was built without staffing cuts or the use of furlough days.

During the last legislative session, a major re-investment in schools took place when the Oregon House passed House Bill 3427. This bill provides additional investment in K-12 and early childhood education through a corporate activity tax on business. The tax should bring in additional revenue of \$1.6 and \$1.8 million each year for TSD under a program called Student Investment Act (SIA). However, again due to the anticipated economic impact on businesses, revenue from this tax is likely to be significantly less. For purposes of this budget, the District has dialed back its SIA plan and reduced anticipated revenue to \$685,300.




