

Tillamook County moves down to Moderate Risk Other counties surge in COVID cases

Tillamook County Health Department reported Friday, April 30, 26 new COVID-19 cases over the last seven days, April 23 through April 29, with 25 positive and one presumptive cases. The county has had a total of 621 cumulative cases since the pandemic began.

"There are a number of counties who are experiencing an increased number of positive cases of CO-VID, considered a surge condition," Administrator Marlene Putman said. "Fifteen counties are moving to

Extreme Risk." Tillamook County has moved down from High Risk to Moderate Risk, however. Putman said the state is reviewing the risk level of all counties weekly for the next three weeks. The state is currently over 300 hospitalizations.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said there are 339 COVID-19 related hospitalizations across Oregon. There are 811 ventilators available across Oregon. In Region 1 – Tillamook, Clatsop, Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah and Washington counties - 71 adult ICU beds are available.

We have more than adequate

PPE to care for our patients," Swanson said.

Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Ed Colson said 539 first doses of the COVID-19 vaccine were administered this week.

"As of April 29, 11,837 people have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, which is 45 percent of Tillamook County residents," Colson said. " Of those who have received one dose, 7,984 people are considered fully vaccinated, having completed the two dose series."

Thirty percent of county residents are considered fully vaccinated. Tillamook County's goal is to have 70 percent of residents fully vaccinated

in order to reach herd immunity. In the state, 0.03 percent of people have reported adverse reactions to the vaccine.

"Pfizer currently remains the only COVID-19 vaccine for those 16 and 17 years old," Colson said. "We're working with the school districts and do have these clinics now available for scheduling online on the dates of May 4 and May 5 and we have a tentative clinic planned on May 12 as well."

Colson said the Johnson & Johnson clinics would also be held on those dates.

There is no copay or charge for the COVID-19 vaccine, Colson

added.

No proof of immigration status or social security number is required," Colson said.

The health department encourages everyone to book a vaccine online or call if you need help at 503-842-3914.

Oregon State Police Bomb Squad investigate suspicious item reported

The Oregon State Police Bomb Squad responded to the Tillamook County Justice Facility Thursday, April 29, to investigate a suspicious item. The item was located in OSP's evidence room inside the main building. The Justice Facility houses the Sheriff's Office, an OSP outpost, Tillamook County Jail, Emergency Management and Community Corrections.

"A Tillamook County resident was recently arrested in Washington County and a pipe bomb was found in their possession. It was determined that a safe associated with this individual from an unrelated incident was currently in an evidence room at our facility. Out of an abundance of caution, we moved inmates and personnel to a safe location while the bomb squad did their work," said Sheriff Joshua Brown.

TCSO staff identified an area on the property to safely detonate a charge to open the safe. The area was cordoned off and deputies closed roads into the facility and ambulances were on standby.

"The OSP Bomb Squad opened the safe and it was determined that it contained no explosives," said Lt. Fernando Silveira. "We are back to business as usual."

'I chose to save lives' Brown defends lockdown plan

Gov. responds to calls for local control

regon Gov. Kate Brown defended her decision to impose more COVID-19 restrictions on some parts of the state the same day 15 Oregon counties were forced to close indoor dining and recreation.

"Cases are widespread, driven by new, more contagious variants. Oregon leads the nation for our rate of increase in cases over the last two weeks," Brown said Friday. "I was presented with



data showing two paths Oregon could take.'

Brown explained last week's decision to cancel a warning period and force the counties into the extreme-risk category of virus restrictions as the choice between those two paths: One path without restrictions and with additional virus deaths, and another path with more restrictions and fewer deaths.

"As your governor, I chose to save lives," Brown said.

Since she announced her plan to re-impose the restric-

> tions on indoor dining and recreation, the governor has faced significant opposition from impacted businesses and local government leaders concerned about the damaging economic effects of the plan.

Earlier this week, dozens

of county officials from across the state signed onto a letter from the Association of Oregon Counties and the Oregon Restaurant & Lodging Association, calling on the governor to pull back on her plan.

"The variants are indeed troublesome, and we share your concern for their spread. But shutting down our restaurants and further depriving Oregonians of their right to make calculated community engagement risks when the virus continues to spread elsewhere will not result in success," the 78 county commissioners wrote in the letter.

The county leaders pointed to the toll the pandemic's restrictions have taken on their communities and economies, saying the restrictions are dividing communities "rather than bringing Oregonians together" and

asking for greater local control over pandemic restrictions.

In response, Brown pointed to the state of the virus.

"What I would respond to in terms of the elected officials and businesses is that COVID is surging across Oregon right now," Brown said. "It takes community-wide measures to make sure that we can protect our most vulnerable Oregonians."

While showing no signs of letting up the extreme-risk closures, Brown offered one concession for businesses impacted by the current closures: A plan with state legislators to provide \$20 million in relief funds.

Those funds will be passed to the 15 counties in the extremeMay 6.

Administrator of Human and Health Services Department Marlene Putman said 15 other counties are moving to Extreme Risk. As of April 28, there were 328 COVID-19 related hospitalizations statewide. Counties will be monitored closely over the next three weeks.

"Oregon is experiencing a surge in cases in most counties," Putman said.

Quarantine guidelines have been updated. Those unvaccinated or partially vaccinated are still recommended to guarantine for 14 days after exposure to COVID-19. Those fully vaccinated may not have to quarantine if they are asymptomatic after being exposed to someone with COVID-19, Putman said.

Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Ed Colson said as of Tuesday, April 27, 44 percent of Tillamook County residents have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine and 29 percent of residents are considered fully vaccinated. Less than 1 percent of Oregon's population has reported adverse reactions to the vaccine. Colson said these reactions are noted within the 15 or 30-minute observation time after an individual receives the vaccine.

Adverse reactions can range from minor reactions to someone needing to be monitored in the emergency room, Putman added. Reactions after the first dose may include a headache or chills for some people but these reactions are mainly seen after receiving the second dose.

"In Tillamook County, for the vaccine types, we do have Moderna, Pfizer and Johnson & Johnson, which are now available at our vaccine provider sites," Colson said. "When scheduling online, the clinic will include the vaccine type and the minimum age that will be required for that clinic."

Pfizer is the only vaccine authorized for those 16 and 17 years old. There is plenty of the Pfizer vaccine available for these age groups, Colson added.

"Our COVID-19 cases have decreased amongst those 65 years old and older," Colson said. "This group does have the highest vaccination rate at 75 percent."

Vaccines are free and no insurance is needed. Insurance providers may be billed an administration fee, which covers the cost of administering the vaccine, but this will not result in copays or impact deductibles.

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NKN High School updates long-established class photos

Neah-Kah-Nie School District is updating the class photos of the high school's graduates. Class photos have been hung in the high school halls since 1954 but came to a stop in 2013.

Neah-Kah-Nie School District Superintendent Paul Erlebach is in charge of the project. He said many of the class photos are not in good shape. The goal is to have all classes updated through the class of 2021 by the summer.

"A goal of the project is to update the class photos to 2020," Erlebach said. "The project also includes digitizing all photos by the NKN High School photography class."

Local framer Bonnie Lewis is helping with the project by fixing the photos or student names that have fallen down inside the current frames. Lewis is also responsible for hand lettering student names from class photos from 2013-2020.

Lewis will print the students' names and use museum grade glass, with a wood, black frame. The mat board will include the Neah-Kah-Nie High school logo with "Class of 2020" in red or black letters using the high school's logo style lettering. The framed photo will be delivered to the school by July 1.

Stacey Dills, Neah-Kah-Nie student services/special education director, is also a graduate of Neah-Kah-Nie High School. Her mother helped for many years to organize the class photos. Erlebach said her mother was the force in keeping the tradition alive.

Dills said updates on the school photos began last year. Her mom offered to help get the process started and Erlebach stepped in to help with the project. Dills said before 2012, her mom used to oversee the pictures being put together by the students.

by the students. "People love to come see their pictures on the wall," Dills said.

Dills was in charge of doing her class photos when she was a senior in high school. She was also class president.

"I look at them all the time actually," Dills said of the photos.

Secretary Delpha Corwin said teacher assistants were doing the newer class photos previously. These students were in charge of the class photos.

"It's been an office T.A. that had some artistic ability," Corwin said. "It takes a little bit of talent."

Art/photography teacher Steve Albrechtsen is responsible for having his photography class digitize the photos. He said this project is a way to honor the students and keep the tradition alive. The current plan is to modernize the process and make one larger picture, taking individual photo files and putting it on one document.

"It'll make for something that we can have a backup copy, which is great, and not have pictures fall down," Albrechtsen said. "We're going

through bags of photos, digitizing those, trying to figure out if scanning them works best or taking a picture of the picture works best."

The project includes a lot of outside project time for the class, Albrechtsen said. The students are now working on taking everything off the wall. All photos will be put on a larger website. Natalya Garrett is responsible for the Neah-Kah-Nie High School website, where the class photos will be located.

Erlebach said the photos are one of the core values of the school since the 1950s.

Mark McLaughlin, current math teacher and former student of Neah-Kah-Nie School, said the photos are a great memento of students' time at the school.

"There's a symbol of your presence here," McLaughlin said.

Student Melanie Booth will be graduating in 2024 with her class photo on the wall.

"I think it's a good idea," Booth said of the project. "When you're walking down the halls after you graduate with your kid or whatever, they're in high school, you just look at the memories."

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Some regions could avoid virus surge with precautions, experts say

Vaccinations and gathering safely could be the keys for some communities to avoid the surge in case rates and virus hospitalizations seen across the state, according to a panel of Oregon State University experts.

"The larger share of the population that is fully vaccinated the better, the better the shield," said Daniel López-Cevallos, an OSU professor of ethnic studies with a focus on health equity, during a panel April 27.

While much of Oregon is seeing large increases in case counts in what experts have called the "fourth wave" of the virus, some counties, including Coos, Curry, Tillamook, Lincoln, and Clatsop still have virus numbers low enough to keep them out

of the state's extreme-risk category.

For those counties, López-Cevallos said vaccination could have the potential to help prevent infections and a move to that level of pandemic restrictions.

"The more, I think in rural communities particularly, (effective you are) in reaching your community, and getting the vaccines to them, (the more) you'll be in a better position to weather that next wave that we're seeing in other parts of the state," López-Cevallos said.

Still, vaccinations take time, with doses still hard to access in some areas and with time required between shots.

In the meantime, Chunhuei Chi, the director of the university's Center for Global Health, said community members can take steps to avoid spreading the virus until

they're vaccinated.

"Based on the Oregon Health Authority's statistics, one of the biggest contributions to the peak, to the spike in Oregon recently, has been group gatherings. All kind of group gatherings," Chi said. 'So one way to prevent that before you have enough of the population vaccinated is to restrict the group gatherings, particularly indoor."

And Marion Ceraso, an OSU professor affiliated with the university's extension service, said local communities will need to continue finding new ways to administer vaccines as more become available.

"I think local communities really are beginning to see that now that they have full availability to vaccinate everyone, and that they have the supply, that they're needing to reach out ... through other

mechanisms," Ceraso said. "Not just physicians' offices, but also some communities, some counties are reaching out, sending messages to community-based groups to say, 'can we bring a vaccine clinic to you? Can we bring it to your local organization?""

Beyond the preventative impact, federal officials this week provided another reason for community members to get vaccinated, which some experts say could keep de-

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mand for the vaccine high. Last week, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention eased its public health guidance for wearing masks, saying fully vaccinated individuals no longer need to wear facemasks while doing outdoor activities alone, or in small gatherings.

Since the guidance only applies to those who've been fully vaccinated, OSU medical ethics professor Courtney Campbell said it provides a

good reason to get the shot.

"It's also trying to provide, if you will, a kind of incentive, a kind of carrot, for the numbers of unvaccinated people in Oregon and throughout the country to encourage vaccination, Campbell said. "Then some of these other precautions that people have felt have been so hampering and inhibiting of their return to normality can at least start to be paled back a little bit.'

Vaccinations help stop mutations of the virus

There are those who say if everyone gets sick then we will have herd immunity, and that will solve the problem in a "natural" way. You will indeed develop some immunity if you catch the disease, but in the meantime you are a breeding ground for mutations in the ten billion viruses in your body. And I daresay that if a mutation with a 50%lethality rate shows up, the loudest anti-vaccine voices will be elbowing children and little old ladies out of the way to get to the head of the line for a shot!

Hospitality work is minimum wage? That's a myth worth busting

A s we all are aware, the tourism and hospitality industry took the brunt of the COVID-19 economic impact. All around the nation and state, not just in Tillamook County, the industry suffered massive layoffs and furloughs starting in early 2020. Across Oregon, the hospitality industry lost nearly 39% of its employees, compared to 9% of other in-



Now, tourism and hospitality businesses need their workers back – but hundreds of jobs are going unfilled. Local social media posts, the parents of school-age children, who have been until recently home-schooled, and may be again if COVID cases keep rising in the county.

3. Childcare services are extremely difficult to come by in Tillamook County, even on a part-time basis.

4. Enhanced unemployment benefits have helped people get by during CO-VID with a steady source of funds. And let's face it – a steady unemployment check can be better than working two weeks, then getting laid off again because risk categories get more restrictive. And restaurant owners don't want that to happen for their employees either, which could threaten going back on unemployment in a timely manner. 5. Many young people, such as high school graduates, lack transportation (a car). While our local bus system is very good, often the bus schedule does not coincide with hospitality work shifts. 6. People who might want to move to the coast and work will have a very difficult time finding a place to live, whether buying or renting. There's more to busting the minimum wage myth too. An extensive, years-long study of U.S. Department of Labor statistics shows that people who start their careers in tourism go on to make more money than those in manufacturing and health care. People in tourism also have higher rates of achieving a four-year undergraduate degree than those in other industries. Hospitality and tourism jobs are ideal for those in college, as many jobs have flexible work schedules that accommodate classes. Plus, it's the best industry to learn those important, beneficial skills - customer service, working as a team, meeting people from different cultures and backgrounds, showing up on time for your shift, and treating people with kindness. Visit Tillamook Coast is working with local tourism and hospitality businesses, Tillamook County Transportation District and Oregon Hospitality Foundation to help get potential job seekers the training and transportation they need to work in the industry. There are so many great tourism and hospitality businesses in Tillamook County. Please consider working in this industry.



dustries. Here, and in Clatsop and Lincoln counties, lodging was shut down for about 10 weeks. Restaurants were allowed to do take-out, but not all did. Museums closed, small retail shops tried online sales, farmers and fishers saw their revenue drop 75%.

community meeting comments, and even a recent oped hint that people don't want those "minimum wage" jobs anymore. But the reasons for not heading back to work have little to do with wage. More on that in a minute.

Recently Visit Tillamook Coast conducted a pay survey - and found the minimum wage argument a myth. The majority of the hotel/ vacation rental sector pays an average of \$22 an hour - including benefits. That calculates to \$42,240 base pay for an individual working full time. That's close to \$44,592, which is the average individual's wage across ALL industries in Tillamook County, and very close to the average household income of \$49,895. Most restaurant businesses pay \$15 an hour, plus tips. At that rate, even a part-time server can earn a full-time wage.

If there is any business in any industry that pays minimum wage, it's usually for short term work, such as day labor. Paying minimum wage to regular employees results in constant turnover, and in the long run, that's way more expensive than paying staff a wage that keeps them wanting to come back each day.

While our tourism and hospitality businesses have survived - lodging is in better shape than other sectors – all are facing staff shortages, often so drastic they may not be able to operate at full capacity. It doesn't help that 1.9 million fewer people age 25-54 (the prime age labor force participation rate) are holding or looking for jobs than there were before the pandemic. Many have decided to drop out of the workforce for now, for several reasons.

1. This age group has largely not yet been vaccinated. They don't want to risk themselves or their families to exposure.

2. This age group are

lot across the street, which is going to be home to the farmers market most likely." Councilor Hans Tonjes, a local developer, cautioned against remodeling, saying, more often than not, he was disappointed with the results. Sounds like he has a prejudice against a remodeled City Hall. The Council rejected their own advice, indebted the city to buy the Underhill property (current debt still \$1 million), paid lip service to remodeling the old growth structure, while manufacturing excuses for scraping the property for a new, costly, yet to be determined price tag, Taj Mahal of a building. Through a changing litany of justifications, the proposed new building would be built for growth, maybe an emergency shelter, tsunami proof, everything under one roof, maybe add affordable

housing, fight climate change, insert current hot topic here. Can't you hear The Music Men saying, "And it won't cost you anything, or maybe just a little more on your already incredibly low property taxes." Cue the 76 trombones.

A November 2019 bond for the new City Hall was rejected by a 68% majority. Mayor Bullard was right about one thing. Manzanita doesn't want higher taxes Temporarily staggered, Council claimed to hear citizens' concerns. Later, Council launched Manzanita Listens, a series of Zoom meetings for citizens to ask questions and offer opinions on options for a new City Hall and its financing. Except no talk about a remodeling option or its potential to reduce costs was permitted. It was the only topic off the table. The council should have named the series Manzanita Listens to What Council Wants To Hear

Listen to what Manzanita is saying:

• Many citizens wonder if Council has their own agenda rather than citizens'.

 Many citizens don't want higher property taxes and Council wasting their tax dollars.

· Citizens don't want ma-

nipulations of City finances to pay for more than we need just to ask for more elsewhere later.

· Council is underestimating the full cost of the project. Lumber costs are up 180% or more since the Bond measure rejection.

• Why not consider a fair estimate of the remodeling of Underhill option?

Many think we don't need extensive services from municipal government. They want a small government that provides basic utility services and police to keep the tourists in check. As soon as there is an oversized building, they think council will find new ways to spend other peoples' money.

The Music Men and Women at City Council are leading us down the primrose path of their predetermined, grandiose City Hall plans and will claim the narrowly focused Manzanita Listens advised them to do it. And they will want you to open your wallets to pay for their dreams if they can't manipulate City finances or sign a new non-voter approved loan to achieve them. Otherwise, voters would have to approve a Bond.

Citizens deserve and should demand a compari-

son of a new City Hall vs. a remodel. And they want complete costs and a clear idea of how to pay for it. Since City Hall is supposed to belong to the citizens it represents, this seems only fair. City Council - are you listening?

Teach your kids about our aging population and process

This Pandemic has blurred the spheres of school, work and home. Students and their families have had to adapt to so much! With an upcoming School Board election and Infrastructure legislation pending, it is time to consider curricular approaches that serve the unique and specific needs of this community.

According to the United States Census (2019), one in four in Tillamook county is age 65 or older. That's 26.4% of all Tillamook county residents. The United States trails Tillamook county by nearly 10% at 16.5% age 65 and older.

America is aging and Tillamook county could lead the way. Students who study the Aging process (Gerontology) often pursue careers serving older adults in settings ranging from health care to private sector product development and innovation. Those lobbying for funding for the frail elderly may have (unintentionally) skewed public perception of old age as a time of dependency and dementia. Gerontology students learn that aging is a normal stage of life and gain a realistic and accurate perception of the entire life course. Awareness of what is normal vs what is disease with aging encourages students to explore how to help older adults they know. This knowledge also discourages

negative Ageist stereotypes and Age discrimination. Normal sensory changes

with age include the yellowing and uneven thickening of the lens of the eye (Presbyopia) which eventually makes all pastel colors look gray. The easiest colors for all ages to see are red, yellow and orange. The most effective combination is a yellow background with black letters; Helvetica style typeface. Lining America's highways are green signs with reflective white letters—a relic from 1930s Work Progress Administration surveys of men ages 18 - 30. Presbyopia obscures green and the white reflective letters cause glare. Teenagers may have the most car accidents, but older adults are most likely to be in fatal ones. Highly visible signage becomes more important as drivers grow older.

Presbycusis is the normal age-related changes in hearing. High frequency tones are lost. Smell, taste and touch also deteriorate with age. Our skin, nose and tongue lose the cells that process environmental information. The aged nose cannot always detect spoiled food or a gas leak. Two-thirds of your taste buds are gone by age 65, which can decrease appetite and makes detection of spoiled

food difficult. Replace worn Green Highway signs and Bluestamped expiration dates with warm colored backgrounds and legible print-and you might save lives! Decades of Charity Drives have equipped Tillamook High School with a culture responsive to those in need. Few high schools in this country can compete with Cheesemaker generosity. When one in four people in your county is over age 65 and you lead the nation by 10%, the time is right to teach vour children about the Aging population and process. Tillamook county students have proven they will put

f you've ever taken a deck of playing cards and thrown them high in the air, then quickly picked them up so you can put them all back in order, you have a little idea of what it is like to be the library courier driver. That deck of cards analogy repeats itself over and over throughout the day for the courier, except instead of playing cards,

they are library books...so you really have to enjoy organizing things to be successful at this job.

Let's say you have been wanting to re-read the classic novel The Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck. When you make your request, the only available copy is on the shelf at the library in Lincoln City. However, you want to pick it up at the Bay City Library. How does it get from Lincoln City to you in Bay City? Well, hang on tight because I am



about to tell the story of the whirlwind life of a library courier.

Bright and early every morning, our library software sends an individualized email to each of our library locations. This email contains a list of every item that has been requested by patrons and instructs the library worker at each location to pull the book off the shelf and check it in to see where it is to be routed. So, in Lincoln City, their list says to pull The Grapes of Wrath off the

shelf. When they check it in with the library software, it prints out a slip that tells the librarian to transfer that book to Bay City...for you! They put the slip in the book and place the book in a transit bin loaded with all the other items headed to Tillamook County.

Now back to the courier. The driver begins each Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, at the main library in Tillamook. She (or he) loads the van with courier bins destined for Pacific City, Lincoln City and Newport. The first stop is Pacific City where the driver picks up all the books going to the Lincoln County Libraries.

At about 9:30 AM, she meets the Newport courier at the Lincoln City Library and a gigantic exchange of library items takes place between these three library systems. It is not uncommon to trade

off as many as 15 - 20 bins of materials at this stop. Then the "big sort" begins. We set up the back of the courier van like a big mail processing center. Each library location, from Pacific City to Manzanita, has its own bin. I always feel like a high stakes blackjack dealer when sorting these books into the right bin. Accuracy is super-important so the item gets to its intended

destination. After another stop at Pacific City, the driver arrives at the Tillamook Library and normally drops off anywhere from 8 - 10 bins full of materials coming from these libraries to the south. Now we load up all the bins with requested items heading to the north libraries. Next stop is Manzanita where we usually have at least 4 or 5 bins full of books and DVDs that their patrons are waiting for. While

we are there, we pick up all of the items the Manzanita library has pulled to go to any of the libraries to the south. We take those back to the van and sort them into the right bins. The same process is repeated at our libraries in Rockaway, Garibaldi, and finally Bay City. There we will drop off several bins, including your copy of The Grapes of Wrath. When Angel checks that item in, a phone call or email is made to let you know your item is ready to pick up. Then there is one last stop at the Tillamook Library where the last of the requested items are checked in.

That may sound like a lot of work, and it certainly is, but it sure beats having hundreds of people driving around Tillamook and Lincoln counties to get their own books off the shelves.

Despite recent progress, many Tillamook county families are still feeling the financial impact of COVID-19

The sun is finally shining outside my office, the temperature is rising, and I can see the flowers starting to bloom. Spring appears to have finally arrived at the Tillamook Coast. The warm weather combined with the release of the COVID-19 vaccines might make it seem like things are getting back to normal, but for too many of our friends and neighbors in Tillamook county, things are far from normal. The economic impact of the COV-ID-19 pandemic is still being felt by many of our workers and small business owners. With the virus continuing to spread in our community and with economic activity curtailed as Tillamook county once again moves into the "high risk" category," the conditions that caused so much economic hardship in 2020 seem poised to remain through 2021. As a result,

many Tillamook county families continue to live on the edge of poverty and homelessness.

This past year was a hard year for all of us, but especially for our Tillamook county families working in the service and hospitality industries that were particularly hard hit by the pandemic. Today, unemployment across Tillamook county, while lower than its peak last spring, continues to be higher than any other time since the Great Recession. Our seasonally adjusted total employment figures for the beginning of the year are also lower than any time since 2014. And, we still have three times as many unemployment claims than we did before the pandemic, with low-wage hospitality and service jobs continuing to be the leading source of unemployment claims in our community. All of this is occurring while housing costs in Tillamook county continue to soar. The typical price for

a home in Tillamook county set a new record last year, at around \$350,000. This is up from just over \$220,000 in 2012, an increase of almost 60% in less than 10 years! That is good for investors, but it is not good for working families looking for an affordable home to own. Yes, it is true that the eviction moratorium is still in place in Oregon, but these prices mean that fewer Tillamook county renters can become homeowners. This not only invites increased uncertainty into these families, but it also increases the scarcity of affordable rentals for those experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity.

At CARE, we daily see that the struggle is real for many of our friends and neighbors in Tillamook county. Every day we have clients calling or walking into our offices because they are struggling to pay the rent, or even find an affordable place to rent. So far this year, CARE has worked with more than 550 clients who are either homeless or struggling to remain housed, and we have distributed more than \$135,000 in housing assistance in only the first three months of this year. 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HISTORY AND HAPPENINGS AT HANGAR B

Went to my first training Las a tour guide through the museum. I will have the pleasure of telling hometown folks and/or tourist about the Hangar in person, once a month for 3 hours. Of course, the museum is awesome. If you have not been in the Hangar or seen the museum for a long time, you are missing a special treat. Rita Welch, Christian Gurling, and their crew are doing a dandy job. I see changes and improvement every time I go. The café has been leased. So, make it a day, go to lunch and see the museum. Do not miss the two short movies. One is about the condition of the Hangar, the other one is interesting also.

I mentioned in a past Article that Hydrogen was the fuel for the Blimps. No, that was wrong. (I am learning as I go along, Please excuse mistakes). If you see that I am wrong, please call me. I like the telephone better than the internet. It gives me a chance to get to know you.

This is what I learned about the fuel during my tour. The K-Class Blimps at NAS Tillamook used Helium as their lifting gas. Each Blimp held 435,000 cubic feet of Helium. The Helium was extracted from underground wells outside of Amarillo, Texas and shipped up to NAS Tillamook via rail cars with giant tanks aboard. These tanks were then buried in the earth for later use. Helium was chosen over Hydrogen because it is inert (not flammable) and the United State had a natural abundance of it at the time. It is no longer available in the United States. It has been reported that Algeria, Russia, and Oatar have access to Helium. Oatar is the largest contributor of helium.

There is a large machine that extracts the unused helium, and purifies it, sends it to a huge round steel storage container outside the building. The machine is still intact but only a picture is available of the storage tank. Again, I encourage you to come see this for yourself.

Another interesting thing I saw was a Drone, as long as a car, with a simple frame body and 2 motors at the front. (Looks like a giant green stick bug}. You will see it,

among the planes. Rita told me, that most of these were shot down. They were used as target practice. This must have been in the 60's. Rita told me a story about Marilyn Monroe. She was working in the factory that made the motors. A picture was taken of her as an advertisement. Someone from Hollywood saw the picture and you know the rest of her story.

I visited with Dale Nielsen, a real interesting storyteller remembers his first job, he was 15. He and his friend, Ray Streeter set up pins at the bowling alley on the NAVAL AIR STATION TILLA-MOOK. His family owned a dairy farm near the NAS and they walked to the Station and asked for a job. He said "I liked it a lot better than milking cows and they were paid." They worked there for about 3 years.

Although, the Hangars, and all the buildings were set up so quickly. The Military created a small town atmosphere for the men and woman serving our country to keep us free. There was also a small store and a clinic. Dale's Mother Una, loved Hershey bars and they were not

available in civilian stores, so, Dale saved his money and bought his Mother, Una Nielsen, a whole box of hershey bars. On the way out of the gate, he was stopped by an air-policeman. "what do you have in that coat?", he said sternly

Dale showed him his box of bars and told the policeman that his mother loved them. The Police said "you cannot take anything off this Base." But he allowed him to take the hersheys to his Mom. Another day, he was feeling ill and asked to go home, instead, they gave him something to ease the pain and sent him back to work. It was a female nurse . So that answered the question about Women serving there.

Dale talked about the Blimps being tied down and the crew that would place them where they needed to be to rise. Every morning many Blimps were prepared for take-off. The landing for the Blimps was also an interesting thing to watch. There were Long ties hanging down and the ground crew needed to catch them to get control of the landing. Dale said "It was really funny to watch them

when the wind was blowing". One of them got away and landed in a farmers field and was destroyed.

Thank you Dale, I really enjoyed your stories.

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Lady Mooks play Banks tough on the road

Midway through a Class 4A Cowapa League softball game, the Tillamook High Lady Cheesemakers were in excellent position to perhaps get an upset victory against the undefeated Banks Braves.

Tillamook (1-5 league, 1-5 overall) trailed just 1-0 in the top of the fourth inning and had a chance to tie the game after junior pitcher Torrin Richardson (2-for-3, two singles) hit a single and then reached second base on a passed ball to get into scoring position. Unfortunately, Tillamook was unable to get a key hit to drive home a much needed run.

Banks, the defending (2019) Cowapa League champion, utilized its potent offense (11.14 runs per game average) and scored three runs in the bottom half of the frame for a 4-0 lead after four innings. The Braves (6-0 league, 7-0 overall) remained in control of the momentum and later added two more runs on their way to a 6-0 win April 27 at Banks High School.

The Cheesemakers, guided by second-year coach Joy Richardson, will be seeking to get a win today (May 5) when they face the Astoria Fishermen (3-3, 3-5) in a 4:30 p.m. home game at Tillamook High School. Astoria won 3-2 over Tillamook in the last matchup between the two squads April 17 in Tillamook.

We knew the beginning of our schedule was going to be a little rough, especially since three of our first six games were against Banks, but I'm proud of the girls,' said Richardson. "We've been within one in our other games. We had a different strategy today and we had Tori Pesterfield starting in the pitching circle instead of Torrin, who is usually our starting pitcher. Tori is more of an off-speed pitcher, she did a good job and I think she helped limit the number

of hits (eight) that Banks had. I'm just super proud of our girls for playing so well today and we only had two errors today, compared to eight we had in the first game we played against Banks (a 17-2 loss April 13)."

Following a scoreless first inning, Tillamook had an excellent scoring opportunity in the second inning. The Mooks loaded the bases on a single by senior Daisy Valencia (1-for-3), a walk by junior Lynsey Werner (1-for-2) and a Richardson single. The Mooks again just couldn't get a clutch hit to drive home a run though and it remained a scoreless contest after two innings.

In the third, the Mooks again had a good chance to put a run up on the scoreboard. Freshman catcher Kylie Burden (2-for-3, two singles) hit a leadoff single and then senior Nessa Hurliman reached base after she was hit by a pitch. With two baserunners and no outs, it definitely seemed like the Mooks would score a run. However, the Braves defense rose to the challenge though and they were able to stop what appeared to be a possible Tillamook scoring rally. "We

'We've had a couple of games now with Banks and I think we were really focused well in this one, we played with a high energy level and we felt like we had a good chance to win," said Hurliman, who hit her first ever home run in an April 23 home game versus Banks. which the Braves won 13-8. "It was so awesome to hit a three-run homer at home against Banks and I just loved it, because it made me feel so good. It was so amazing because lots of my family members came to watch the game.'

Tillamook had some momentum in the fifth when Burden again hit a leadoff single on a fly to center field. Again, the Braves defense held the Mooks from scoring and Banks got two more runs for a 6-0 advantage.

"We felt like we had a lot of momentum at the beginning and we just came out and played really hard the entire game," said Burden. "Our pitchers both threw really good and we had some good scoring chances throughout the game. I had lots of fun, it was a really good game and we came out here and gave it our best shot and we were ready play."

Tillamook had baserunners in the sixth and seventh innings as Werner and Hurliman both hit singles, but the solid Braves defense prevented the Mooks from scoring as Banks recorded its second shutout this season.

Pesterfield, a sophomore, pitched the first four innings and Richardson followed her in the pitching circle and pitched the last three innnings. Banks outhit Tillamook by just one, 8-7.

"I think the girls are really thriving and they're just so very happy to be out here playing softball," said coach Richardson.

The Cheesemakers played Astoria May 3, (results unavailable because of Headlight Herald press deadline) and they have five games remaining on the abbreviated spring schedule. Following Wednesday's contest, Tillamook plays a 4:30 p.m. home game Friday versus the Seaside Seagulls (4-2 league, 4-3 overall), followed by a 4:30 matchup May 11 at Seaside. The season concludes with a May 13 road game against the Valley Catholic Valiants (0-4, 0-6) and a May 15 finale at home versus the Valiants.

This 1.2 mile loop through old-growth forest has beautiful views of haystack rock through the trees. Samantha Goodwin provided the following details on HikingProject.com:

Family Friendly:

• This trail is a nice short loop with some interesting forest and a beautiful view of the Haystack Rock and nothing too steep

Need to Know:

• There is a portable toilet at the trailhead. You do not need to pay to park at the trailhead.

Description: • The trail starts at the back of the Overflow Parking area in Pacific City, which will soon be developed into a city park. There are designated parking spots at the rear of the lot. The trailhead sign marks the pass through for the fence.

• Follow the trail through a Douglas fir plantation before heading uphill into the old growth forest. The trees are huge, the ferns are tall, and the moss is everywhere. The trail meanders up and down the slopes creating a feeling of isolation even though you're very close to town. The surface of the trail can be muddy, and watch out for mountain bikers.

• The trail leads out along the ridge until it reaches an overlook where a break in the trees frames a beautiful view of HayStack Rock. There's a bench if you want to sit and enjoy the view.

• From there, begin to head downhill and quickly come back out in the Douglas fir plantation. Cross a grassy two track and hike parallel to the back of the houses along the street. The trail soon reaches

the passthrough in the fence and the parking lot. Flora & Fauna:

• Douglas fir. Sitka spruce. Swordfern.

Following the kick-off event at the Pacific City Pathway, regular walking groups will begin meeting weekly. risk category for distribution to businesses, the governor said.

"Economic relief is something I can do as your governor to help Oregonians impacted by this fourth surge. What I can't do is bring back someone's life lost to this virus," Brown said. "That's why, as hard as this is, we State health officials also placed a timeline on the closures, saying Friday the counties in the extreme-risk category will stay there for a maximum of three weeks if case rates follow predicted trends.

must act immediately."

Those trends are the basis of the extreme-risk closure policy, said Peter Graven, the Oregon Health & Science University data scientist who helps the state predict how the virus will spread.

"The good news is, when

we pair these data together, it shows us that we have just three to four more weeks until we are in good shape," Graven said. "That's when cases will fall and our vaccine levels will be high enough that — with basic preventive measures — the virus cannot effectively grow."

The state officials again pointed to the data to explain why the current spike pushed them to force more closures. "I think what we're seeing

now is similar to what we saw in the fall. We are seeing an increase in cases across the state, traced to multiple different sources," said Dr. Dean Sidelinger, the state epidemiologist. "We're also seeing an increase in hospitalizations like we saw in the fall: A curve that became very steep and pushed us close to not having the specialized care in intensive care units that every Oregonian deserves, whether they have COVID, or a heart attack or motor vehicle crash."

Graven said that last point, the increase in hospitaliza-

tions, is the state's main concern, since hospital capacity is limited.

He said his mathematical models show the state could have lost 178 additional lives by the end of summer without the added restrictions, with most coming in the next several weeks.

The governor is still optimistic about lifting restrictions, saying the economy could see a reopening to pre-pandemic life by the end of June.

But that'll only happen

if vaccination rates finally outpace virus spread and hospitalizations, the OHA officials said Friday.

"The balance we've had in fighting this disease has really been it's not policy that drives the change, its policy with people following that policy," Sidelinger said. "The vast majority of Oregonians are doing what they can to protect themselves and their loved ones, but over these next few weeks, we need more Oregonians to join us."
